Council sets priorities

1. Health care is the top priority for Town Council. In addition to lobbying for adequate 24/7 emergency room coverage, and contracting with a physician due to begin August 1, 2013, Council plans to continue its efforts to maintain adequate health services for Princeton. *Meeting planned for health care*
A public consultation meeting will be held in Princeton on January 29

to attempt to determine the future of health care in Princeton. A group of informed stakeholders will be invited to attend. The purpose of the meeting is to formulate a strategy for addressing Princeton's health needs in the year to come.
A video has been created to market Princeton to physicians.

Arts Council looks at 2013

A number of changes are taking place in Princeton Arts Council operations. There is a new policy in place for borrowing any Arts Council equipment. Anyone wishing to do so must contact President Marjorie Holland and must sign a document guaranteeing undamaged return or replacement of the item borrowed. There are also new rules for use of the Arts Council room.

A motion was passed on December 12th stating there will be no more group membership rates. Instead,

there will be a \$5.00 per year membership fee for all individual memberships, and for each member of a group. Membership dues should be paid in January.

Marjorie Holland expressed concern that groups who are part of the Arts Council are not making enough use of the Arts Council website to advertise upcoming events. She said it would be to the advantage of groups to inform the Arts Council well in advance of what sort of activities or events they would like

to host. If the Arts Council is aware of groups' goals, then the Arts Council is in a position to secure any grants that may become available, making it possible for groups to achieve their goals.

Judy Short attended the December 12th meeting to update the Arts Council on the kitchen the Rotary Club is installing at Riverside. Unfortunately, Rotary needs more funds for the project, and has received no support from the community. Rotary has put \$45,000 into the \$80,000 project. If anyone would like to make a funding contri-

bution, send a cheque to RDOS and label it Rotary Kitchen Fund. That way, a tax receipt can be issued.

The coming months are looking good for cultural activities. Arts and Culture Week will have several events. See the Spring Leisure Guide.

Princeton's theatre group, Crimson Tine, was disappointed by the low number of people who attended their past two productions, although everyone who attended appreciated the new padded seats in the theatre. The theatre group are planning an 'adult' comedy and dessert evening

for spring. It is called 'adult' comedy because it is restricted to adults. Auditions for a part in the play A Black Comedy took place in December.

Jon Bartlett reported the Traditional Music Society will feature a variety of European music at this year's festival to be held August 16 through 18. He is hoping for performances of Egyptian and Portuguese music as well as European music in general. He is looking for billets for the performers. If anyone can offer a spare bed and breakfast during the festival, Jon would like to hear about it.

Mel Berg, whose fellow musicians form themselves into a loose-knit couple of groups, told the Arts Council they would like to play at the gazebo in Veterans Square this summer, as they did the summer continued on Page 21

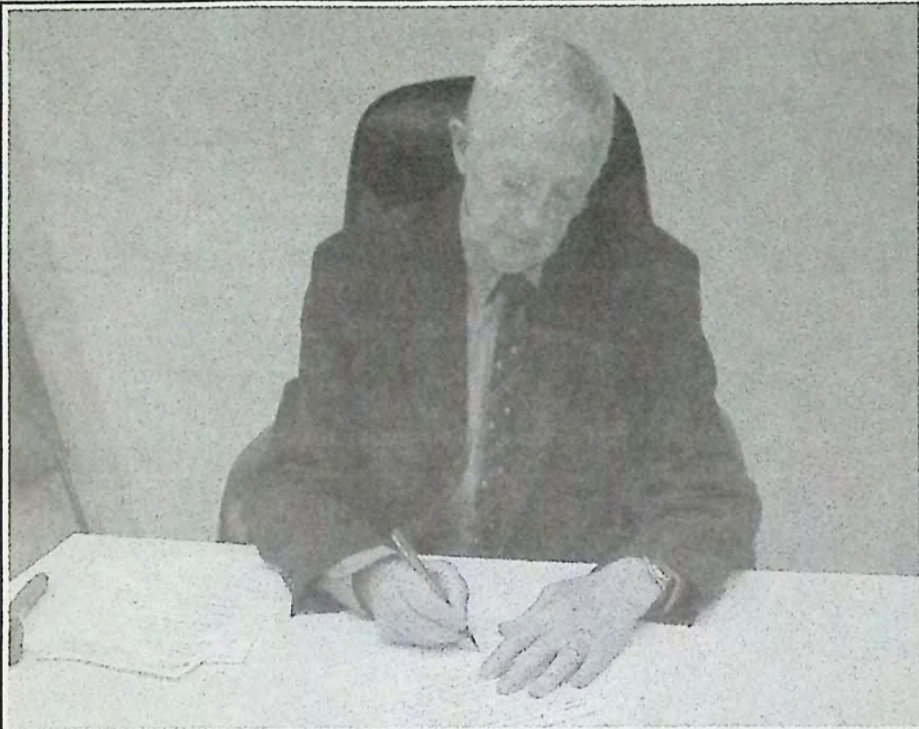
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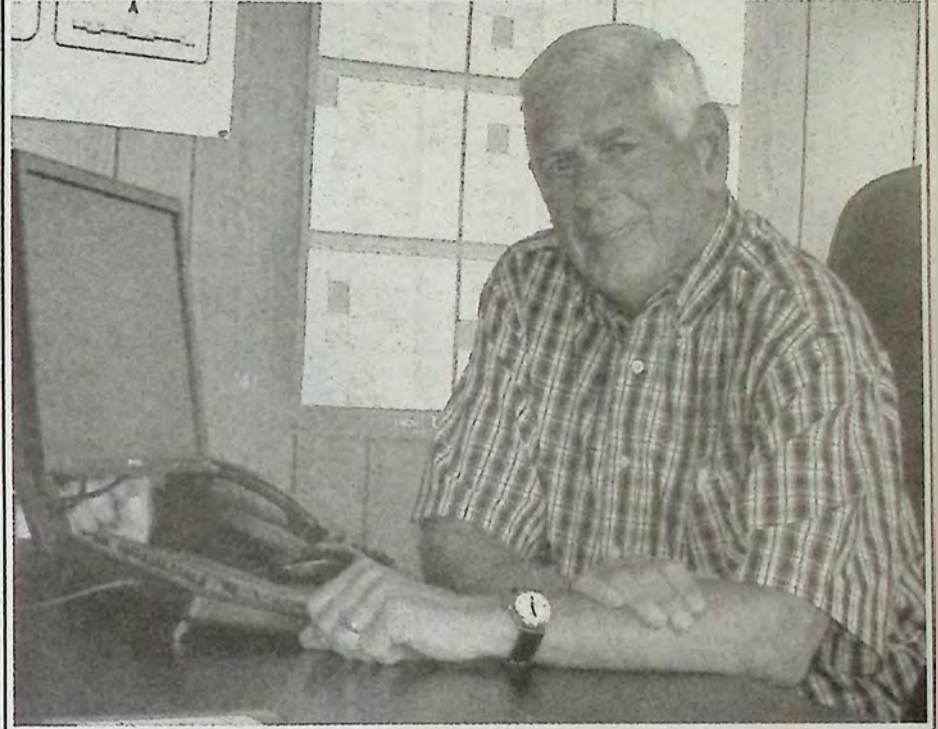
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2012 - Year In Review

2012 began with a new Town Council with a new mayor. Before the year was half over, Mayor Fred Thomas had died, and a by-election was held to elect a successor. Frank Armitage became the new mayor, and Doug Pateman joined Town Council.

Town Council had to deal with another change, as former Chief Administrative Officer Patrick Robins resigned and had to be replaced. Council brought in an interim CAO as his replacement.

There were a lot of celebrations in Princeton and area in 2012. Many were the regular celebrations - golf tournaments, bonspiels, the Air Show, class reunions, Racing Days, Rodeo, traditional music festival, the fair, the Halloween party and Christmas Light-up. For the first time in many years, Princeton hosted Little Britches rodeo, which was very successful, and two race meets, one at the end of June and one the second week-

end of September.

Remembrance Day was different this year, a lot colder, but with the pleasing addition of our own Air Cadets.

Arts and culture saw many activities ranging from the Spirit festival to art shows, concerts and theatrical productions. One of the new developments was a series of concerts in Veterans Square and the use of the former 'Bugnuts' premises as an extension of Sunflower Gallery.

Sports activities were focused primarily on young people, and the NHL stand-off made local youth hockey that much more attractive.

An ongoing pain in the neck was the reconstruction of the zigzag trail. Despite huge expenditures of tax dollars, the project seemed to run into one delay after another, to the point where local residents began to wonder whether it would ever be finished.

There were no major calamities in

Princeton during 2012, but a greater number than usual of deaths of long-time Princeton residents. During the latter part of August and into September, it seemed there were death notices covering at least one door to the Post Office every week. The year ended with many familiar faces gone from our community.

The museum made the news this year with a gift from the son of a former government agent. The museum received the original gold commissioner's records of gold claims in the Princeton district. This is a rare document, and caused quite a stir. Nobody knew it was still in existence.

The Government Agent's office of today, now known as ServiceBC, moved out of the Court House and into Princeton Plaza, leaving the owners, the Town of Princeton, wondering if there could be another use for the building, e.g. a new Town Hall.

Business activity in Princeton remained steady, but the world economy was reflected in the opening of two second hand stores, which expanded the existing shops - the Hospital Auxiliary Thrift Shop, the Crisis Assistance store, and the Elks country store. All of these shops add to the ways in which goods can be recycled.

The major battle of the year was the fight to keep the ER open at Princeton Hospital. A great number of people showed up to protest, bringing TV coverage, but several people gave their time and energy to opening a Save Our Hospital storefront, with support from a number of sources. Princeton will be welcoming a new physician in August, which will help the community.

Despite the high expectations of real estate profit when the mine opened, the price of houses dropped in 2012, as houses sat on the market month after month. Although interest rates remained low, and prices dropped, buyers remained cautious. The real estate market was flat at year end, with hopes for a better year to come. Many homeowners who really wanted to sell were still waiting for a buyer even after being on the market for more than a year.

Local residents showed a lot more concern about food in 2012. Many people who had never thought about food sources became inter-

ested in what it means to have genetically modified food crops, and signed petitions to send to Ottawa demanding GM labels and legislation to prevent further acceptance of GM seeds. The petitions had little effect, despite support from MP Alex Atamanenko and other Members of Parliament.

One of the deals made in Ottawa became a topic of protest for the average Canadian - the sale of part of the tar sands project to the Chinese government. Many local residents expressed concern.

2012 was one of the most seismically active years this planet has had for several decades. Approximately 80 volcanoes erupted during the past year, and there were some strong quakes in every region of Earth. Princeton was no exception to all the shaking going on, with small tremors occurring all year, sometimes every second day of some weeks. Most tremors were between 2 and 2.5, but there was one at 2.6. Most of the tremors were south of Princeton along the Similkameen River, but many were right at Princeton, or northeast. Only one tremor was in the northwest, approximately the headwaters of Asp Creek.

For the most part, nothing much changed in Princeton during 2012. Life continued at its customary pace, which seems to suit most people who live here.

Things I didn't know about Charities and Non Profits

Last year was my first stint as a volunteer director on a nonprofit charity board. I always thought nonprofits provided much needed services in our communities; services which would not exist otherwise. This is continually reinforced for me.

I am most amazed at the arduous struggle for existence faced by nonprofits. Securing donations requires time but also skill and knowledge.

I have an expectation that my taxes, and all our taxes combined, help cover the cost of community services, yet most small nonprofits, which form the majority of all nonprofits, do not receive one cent from government ministries. Larger charities even find ministry funding

inadequate and they must raise additional funds. There is much competition for the precious donor dollar, yet nonprofits do not all have the same resources to compete.

Many small nonprofits also lose out when it comes to community gaming grants. Although managed by the BC government, these grants differ from ministry funding. Community gaming grants are not available for seed funding. In the first year of operations, a nonprofit must find seed funding often from community donors and local businesses. Donors and businesses are inundated by hundreds of requests each year and can only respond to a lucky few.

Community gaming grants do not cover full program costs. Additional funds must come from elsewhere,

other than government ministries. In the case where a nonprofit is successful at raising funds one year, community gaming rules stipulate that a nonprofit must not have more than 50% of the previous years' operating costs as cash on hand. This in essence penalizes their fundraising efforts.

These community gaming grant rules and fundraising requirements serve to keep community service nonprofits in continual hardship, much like the causes and people they serve.

I imagine that if community gaming funding provided to community service providers was what was originally promised to the people of BC, things would be different. In 1999 this amount was \$125 million. While gaming revenues increased, almost exponentially, the amount provided to charities decreased. According to the MOU, today's gaming revenues of \$1.1 billion dollars, would provide nonprofits with over 300 million dollars annually. What a difference that would make to community services and the nonprofits providing these services!

Council of Canadians - Making Waves Sinking the Harper Agenda Conference - Part 2

In my previous column I mentioned that I had the fortune to attend a conference sponsored by the Council of Canadians entitled, "Making Waves - Sinking the Harper Agenda". I talked about a presentation by Robert Chernomas, Professor of Economics, University of Manitoba where he likens the current austerity measures being undertaken in Europe and throughout the world to class warfare.

The next speaker in the plenary sessions "Uniting Against Austerity: Strengthening Solidarity in the Movement for Economic Justice", was John Hilary, Executive Director of War on Want from the United Kingdom.

Mr. Hilary started his presentation by describing how former Prime Minister Paul Martin, toured Europe lecturing how to deal with deficits in prescribing a "Shock Treatment" for Europe. Mr. Hilary pointed out that there are similarities on both sides of the Atlantic

when it calls for the assault on social fabric and the "shrinking of the State". This was a good reminder for us of the slashing of transfer programs to the provinces in the 1990s of the Chretien government when Paul Martin was the Finance Minister - all in the name of deficit reduction.

Mr. Hilary also reminded us of Canada's attempts at the Rio Summit, along with the UK and US to get water as a human right thrown out and to have water treated as an economic commodity. He also described how Canadian and UK mining companies are forcing natural resources development in other countries, often against the wishes of local populations. He then talked about austerity in Europe which he likened to the greatest social restructuring in European history. Money has been stripped out of the economies of Spain, France and Greece and other countries which is, according to him, a recipe for disaster. Spain has

a 50% youth unemployment rate, over one million people accessing food banks and a policy of locking up garbage so it won't be stolen by hungry citizens.

Greece is slipping into anarchy while Prime Minister Cameron in Britain has stated that 500,000 public sector jobs are to be cut adding to the 2.5 Million workers currently unemployed. Social benefits are being drastically reduced, disability recipients are committing suicide and the first attempt at hospital privatization is failing. At the same time, there has been a 5% tax cut to the richest while the corporate tax rate dropped from 26% to 22%.

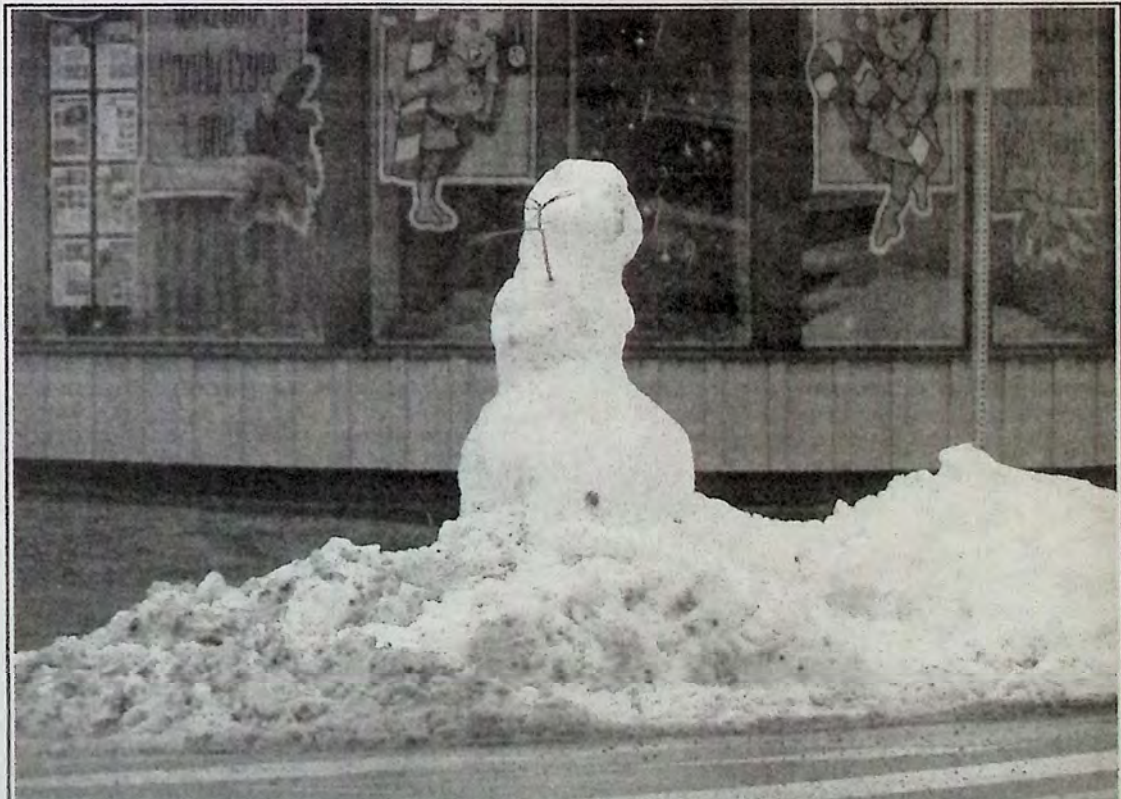
Being juried is a daunting thought but a mandatory process, and for those not successful the first time around, there is valuable lessons

Walter Despot Honoured

Queen Elizabeth II Diamond Jubilee Medal

The Queen Elizabeth II Diamond Jubilee Medal is a commemorative medal created in 2011 to mark the 60th anniversary of the accession to the thrones of Queen Elizabeth II. There are three versions of the medal: one issued by the United Kingdom, another by Canada, and the third for the Caribbean.

Named by Order in Council as the

Queen Elizabeth II's Diamond Jubilee Medal, the Canadian medal was designed by Cathy Bursey-Sabourin, Fraser Herald of the Canadian Heraldic Authority, and manufactured by the Royal Canadian Mint.

It takes the form of a disc with, on the obverse, a crowned effigy of the Queen circumscribed by the

words ELIZABETH II DEI GRATIA REGINA • CANADA (Latin for "Elizabeth II, by the Grace of God, Queen • Canada"). The reverse features Elizabeth's royal cypher crowned and superimposed upon a diamond shield, behind which is a bed of four maple leaves and a ribbon with the dates 1952 and 2012 to the left and right of the

shield and VIVAT REGINA (long live the Queen) below, all on a field of diamonds.

The Canadian medal, which is to "honour significant contributions and achievements by Canadians," is administered by the Chancellery of Honours at Rideau Hall and will be awarded to 60,000 citizens and permanent residents of Canada who made a significant contribution to their fellow countrymen, their community, or to Canada over the previous sixty years.

The medals are allocated either automatically to individuals within certain prescribed categories – such as those in the Canadian order of precedence, the Order of Canada, or recipients of the Cross of Valour – or by selection by specific officials, such as the Governor General, senators, the Chief of the Defence Staff, or presidents of various non-governmental organizations.

The Governor General was also permitted to make "exceptional awards" of the medal.

Here is the submission made by Boundary-Similkameen MLA John Slater nominating Keremeos resident Walter Despot for the medal:

"Mr. Despot was Mayor of the Village of Keremeos for nine years from 2003 - 2011 until he retired from political life. Walter is well known for his work and leadership in his capacity as Chair on the Okanagan Similkameen Regional Hospital District board and worked

tirelessly to put the needed upgrades of the Emergency Department of the Penticton Regional Hospital on the top of the list of Interior Health and Province. Since his retirement, he is still working on this project in the capacity as Chair of the South Okanagan Similkameen Medical Foundation which oversees fundraising for not only the Penticton Regional Hospital but health care facilities throughout the Regional District Okanagan Similkameen. Mr. Despot was also very instrumental in the development of the new modern diagnostic centre located in Keremeos. The centre includes an emergency department, x-ray facilities, laboratory and a physiotherapy clinic.

"Mr. Despot was very involved in the development of the new assisted living and low income housing, the development of Memorial Park, major sewer upgrades on the bench and the new visitor information centre.

"Walter has spent many years volunteering his time in the community in such organizations as: volunteer fire department where he served as chief in 1973, 1975, 1977, and 1980; fundraisers for the heritage Grist Mill; and community events as the Keremeos Elks Rodeo, Similkameen Pepper Festival and many more that enhance Keremeos and the surrounding area."

Copper Mountain Announces 2013 Production Guidance

Copper Mountain Mining Corporation (TSX: CUM) (the "Company" or "Copper Mountain") announced on December 21st production guidance for the 2013 year from the Copper Mountain mine located in southern British Columbia.

Copper Mountain is projecting 2013 production of approximately 80 million pounds of copper, 35,000 ounces of gold, and 315,000 ounces of silver. - Site cash cost are estimated to be (incl. mining, milling, maintenance, admin, and engineering) of \$1.25 - \$1.30 per pound of copper produced net of precious metal credits. (Calculated based on \$ 3.40 /lb Cu, \$1,500/oz Au and \$28.50/oz Ag). Total cash costs (incl. site costs, smelting and refining, transportation, interest and taxes) are estimated to be between \$1.80 - \$2.00 per pound of copper produced net of precious metal credits.

The mining rate is projected to continue at a rate of about 175,000 tonnes per day to provide 35,000

tonnes per day of mill feed. The forecast production is based on a head grade of approximately 0.35 percent copper. Mine site operating costs are estimated to total approximately \$13.65 per tonne milled with mining costs projected at \$1.48 per tonne mined.

From an operational point of view, the mine plans to continue to mine in both the Pit 2 and Pit 3 areas. Approximately 16 million tonnes of lower grade material will be stockpiled for processing towards the end of the mine life.

The Company's goal for 2013 is to continue to optimize performance of the Copper Mountain Mine, to maximize copper production.

Management plans to continue the exploration drilling for 2013 which will build from the 2012 exploration program. The 2012 exploration drilling has been focused along the western and northern edges of Pit 2, partly to expand the pit limits, test mineralization at depth and to infill gaps within the resource model.

Exploration staff are continuing to cut the drill core from the 2012 exploration program and management expects to be in a position to comment on the second half 2012 exploration results during Q1 of 2013. Plans for the drill 2013 program will be finalized after the 2012 results are evaluated.

The visitors took control of the game and added two more unanswered goals in the period (8:34 – Brandon Watson from Garrett Kucher and Cameron Dobransky, 8:05 – Troy Maclise from Evan Last and Colin Chmelka) to take a 3-1 lead by the time the third period started.

The final 20-minutes turned out to be the most excited 20-minutes of regulation play in the game with Princeton amping things up with a goal at 14:10 (Eric Kubis from Ben

Roasted Rainbow Trout with Relish

(NC)—What we eat affects how we feel. And for those people living with arthritis, healthy eating habits can often be helpful. The Arthritis Society has developed this healthy recipe for year-round entertaining. This elegant entrée is effortless to prepare and makes a leaner option than regular roasts, plus, trout is a great source of omega 3s. Serve with wilted baby greens and oven-roasted baby potatoes.

Ingredients

- Trout:**
- 2 lb. (1 kg) boneless rainbow trout, about 2 large fillets
 - 1/4 tsp. (1 ml) each salt and pepper
 - 1 Tbsp. (15 ml) each olive oil and Dijon mustard
 - 2 tsp. (10 ml) white wine vinegar
 - 1/4 tsp. (1 ml) dried thyme leaves

- Relish:**
- 1 Tbsp. (15 ml) olive oil
 - 1 small onion, chopped
 - 2 cups (500 ml) sliced cremini or white mushrooms
 - 1/2 tsp. (2 ml) dried thyme leaves
 - 1/4 tsp. (1 ml) each salt and pepper
 - 1/2 cup (125 ml) chopped roasted red pepper
 - 1 tsp. (5 ml) white wine vinegar
 - 1 clove garlic, minced
 - Chopped parsley (optional)
 - Lemon wedges

Directions

Trout: Preheat the oven to 425F (220C). Arrange trout on a lightly greased, foil-lined baking sheet. Sprinkle evenly with salt and pepper. Blend oil with mustard, vinegar and thyme; brush evenly over the trout. Roast for 8 to 10 minutes or until fish flakes easily when tested with a fork.

Relish: Meanwhile, heat oil in a large, non-stick skillet set over medium-high heat. Add onion, mushrooms, thyme, salt and pepper. Cook, stirring often, for 5 to 7 minutes or until browned. Stir in roasted red pepper, vinegar and garlic. Cook, stirring, for 1 to 2 minutes or until glossy.

Spoon mushroom relish over trout. Garnish with parsley (if using) and serve with lemon wedges. Makes 6 servings. More recipes are available online at arthritis.ca.

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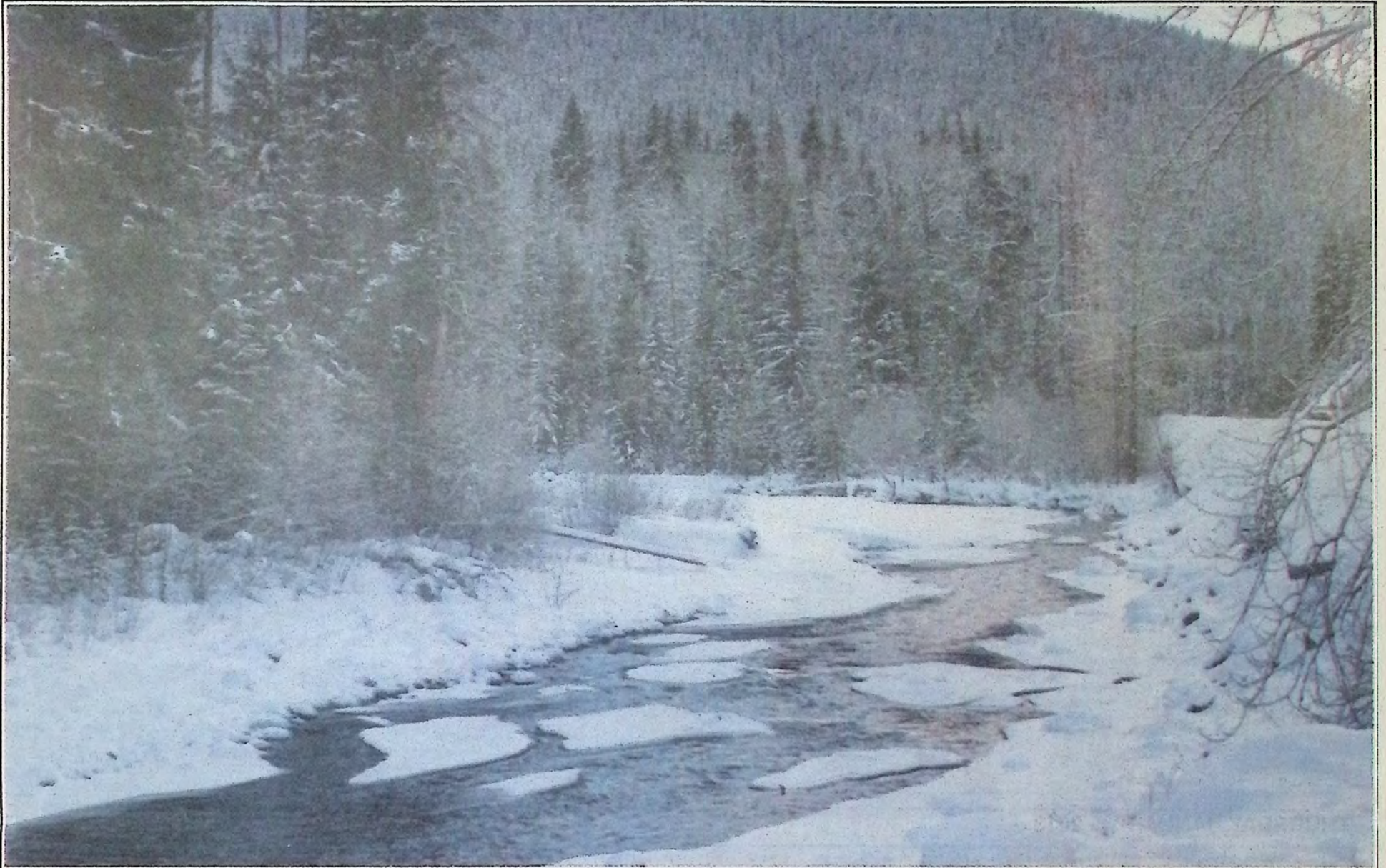

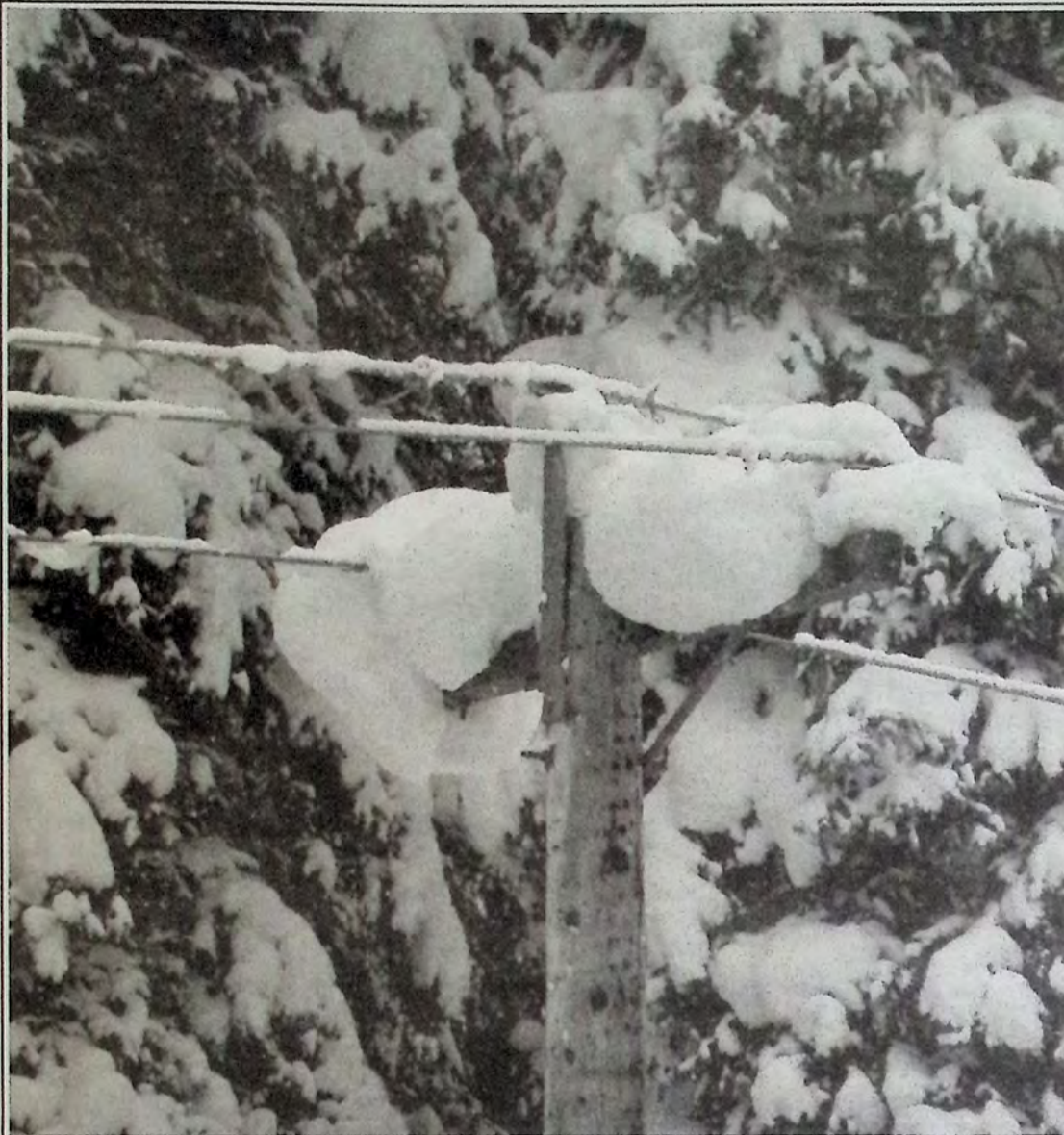

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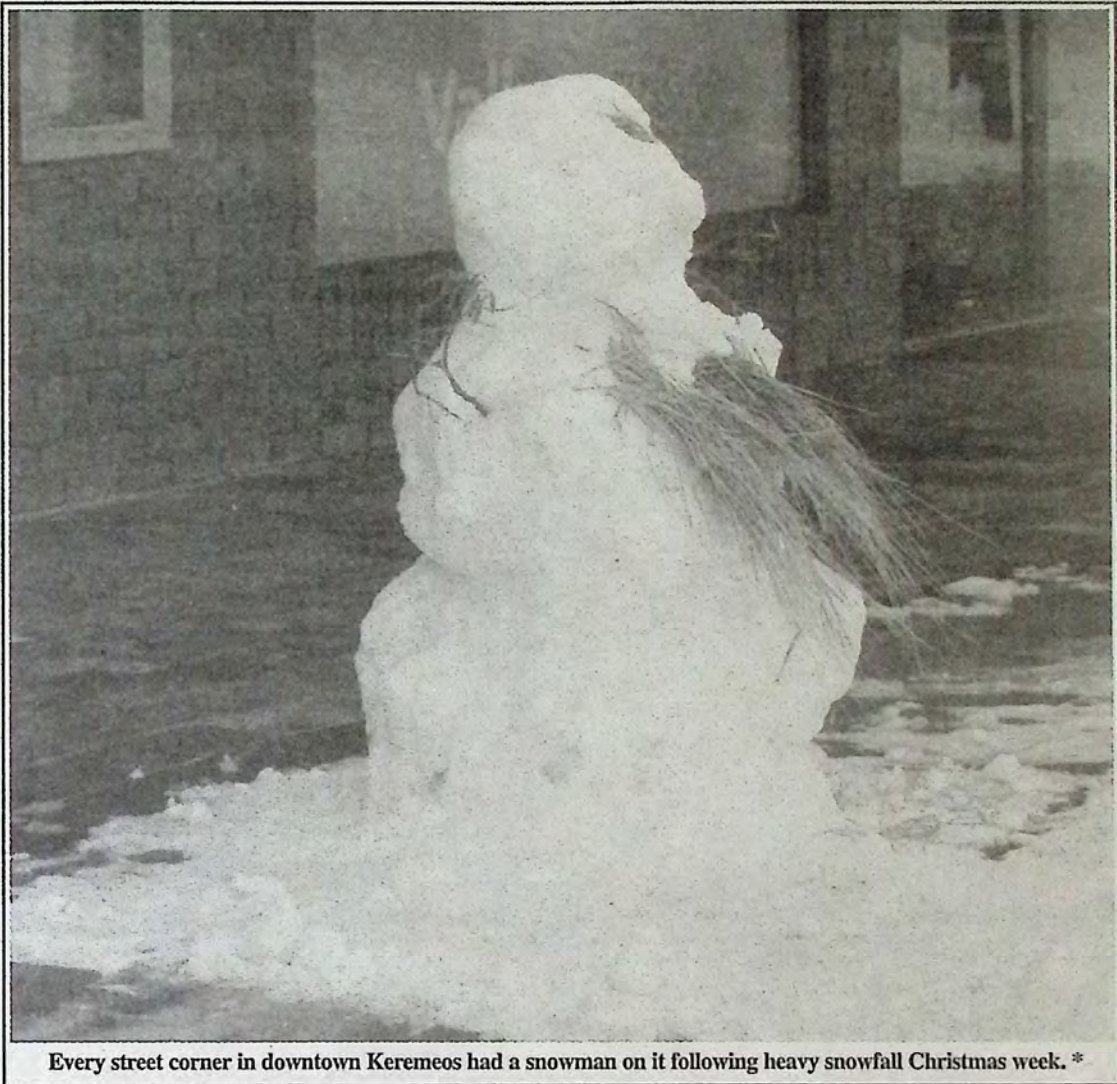

 John Hilary offers a solution how citizens can fight back. The first thing to do is to win the argument. People need to be mobilized to counteract the spin that somehow the public sector is responsible for this disaster. There needs to be popular education such as the "Occupy Movement" and we must work with labour.
 The next step Hilary suggests is campaigns, the strongest being at the local level where citizens stand up for their clinics, libraries and playgrounds, for example. There also needs to be a way of getting back the over \$150Billion in corporate taxes that have not been paid and a financial transactions tax needs to be introduced so that bankers can pay for the crises they have caused.
 Eleven European countries are implementing this corrective measure while Canada and the UK have resisted it.
 The third plan of action that Hilary

talks about is through politics. The structures of power need to be challenged. He talked about European coordinated general strikes that were to take place on November 14th. According to him, citizens need to unite against the global agenda that challenges our beliefs about what our society should be. They need to unite against austerity and to create a world movement for a better world and future.
 I agree with Mr. Hilary that ultimately it will be political decisions that get us out of this mess. After all, political decisions are what started this slide that has been responsible for the progressive widening of the gaps between the very rich and the middle class and poor.
 There is absolutely no reason that we should allow multinational corporations to dictate our agenda. We should not be signing trade agreements that increase the cost of pharmaceuticals, prohibit local municipalities from favouring local pro-

curement or that allow those corporations to sue our federal government if they feel they have been unjustly treated.
 It is not fair to place the burden of our crises on government employees by slashing jobs and programs that protect our citizens and our environment. People who make a good wage, whether in the public or private sector, contribute to our economy by buying houses, cars and by travelling and spending money in our local businesses. The best way of supporting small business is by retaining and strengthening well-paying jobs in our communities.
 It is certainly time for Canadians to "make waves" and to mobilize against the ruthless Harper administration. Just as we need to throw out the neo-conservative liberals in BC next May, it is time to mobilize to get rid of this current Conservative federal "wrecking crew" before it is too late.

The interim position was held by Helen Koning, who completed her term on December 20.

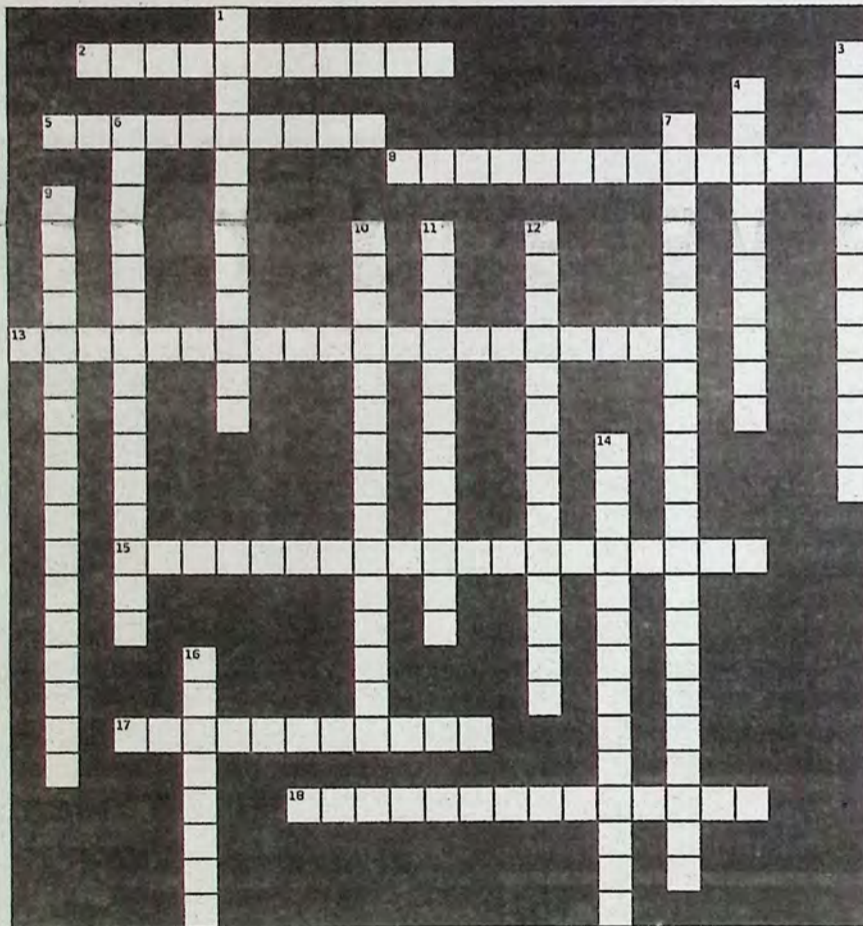
At the December 17 regular Town Council meeting, Robert Wilson was appointed, effective January 1, 2013.

Improvements to the downtown core have been huge achievements over the past few years, with Veterans Square being one of the most obvious and beautiful enhancements. *

For Princeton, 2013 could be a humdrum year in one sense. It is a year to finish old projects, not a year to begin new projects. 2013 is a year to create a strong foundation for future growth by completing unfinished projects and bringing all systems and structures up to standard. This year and next are the end of an era that began 30 years ago. What the Town must do for two years is clear the deck for future action.

If we look back over the past 30 years, we see a pattern of great achievements in the community: Downtown Beautification, an expanded museum, a new library, the development of Princeton Plaza, the development of the TransCanada Trail, two new bridges, the development of Veterans Square, Princeton Posse, and the Industrial Park, to name a few. Now it is time to look at what has NOT been done or assess what did not work out. This may mean tearing down structures that serve

no useful purpose, or is not up to present standards, and planning to replace it with something better or something different. It is also time to assess what was not achieved. In 2015, Princeton will move in a new direction.

For ordinary residents of Princeton, the same truth applies. This is the year to finish old projects, bring your home and property up to present standards, get rid of what does not work or serve its purpose, fix what needs fixing, and maybe plan for rebuilding in the future.

This is not a year to increase public debt, it is a year to actively reduce debt and build up resources in preparation for future expansion.

Working partnerships with those who have greater resources could attract capital and income to Princeton. Any opportunity for such a partnership should be pursued for the first five months of 2013.

Agriculture, the forest industry and mining are not likely to make great

gains this year, with the exception of gold mining, which could be a cause of sudden increase in economic activity. Resource industries should stabilize. The price of oil should stabilize. The resource industries will undergo subtle but profound changes in the next two years.

Agriculture will undoubtedly undergo continuing change in 2013. One of the major problems for the ranching industry will be finding ways to replace the aging ranching community with younger people.

The provincial election in May could bring some startling changes in government.

This year, spring should be warmer than during the past two years, and should bring less rain. However, there is a good chance of heavier than normal precipitation in February and early March.

The weather this year will be typical for this area. We can expect storms in the latter part of July and forest fire and drought hazards in mid-August.

Princeton has been more successful than most communities in avoiding problems caused by the world monetary crisis because of Princeton's natural resources base. Every effort should be made now to encourage the manufacture and/or processing of our resources. One of Princeton's assets is a good supply of water for processing agricultural products.

Princeton has always been a place where people worked hard at

resource industries. This is an asset now as high tech industries offer fewer opportunities for the labour force. Although the way people work is undergoing change, there will continue to be opportunities for employment in the basic resource industries. Young people should be encouraged to develop the skills needed to find employment in these industries.

Princeton has always had water problems from underground water as well as flooding. Excess of water has been an ongoing problem, and may become a serious problem again this spring.

Residents of Princeton will have a vision of how their town should look. They will spend more time making their homes and property prettier during the coming year and the following year. Improving the appearance of the town will be an ongoing project for individuals and the Town for many years ahead.

People will become more creative and innovative this year, and for a number of years ahead. Creative and artistic interests are increasing, and will continue to do so. Sports activities will gain greater participation, more sponsors, and better attendance.

In many ways, the coming years are a rejuvenation of Princeton's people. A new youthful attitude will prevail. This new spirit will become noticed in March and April.

The weather this year will be typi-

cal of our area during spring and summer, as well as early autumn. Late October will be rainy, and November will be colder than normal and dry.

We can expect more problems with health care in autumn. Our community is going to have to take action again to maintain a decent level of health care. Standards of care for the elderly will be an issue.

2013 is going to be a good year for local organizations to recruit younger people. The new members will bring new ideas of benefit to these organizations. The time is coming for the older community leaders to show younger people the way to do things, then let them do it. This will make the community a livelier place.

Christmas 2013 will be a time when people seek an ideal Christmas, and will be willing to spend and make an effort to realize a 'dream' Christmas. The weather will be fair, but 2014 is likely to come in with a major snow storm.

2013 can be summed up in a few points:

- getting rid of useless and outmoded structures
- improving the appearance of property and homes
- seeking a prettier town to live in
- greater interest in the arts and sports
- protecting health care
- finding gold in them thar hills

Development Variance Permits. A public open house is scheduled for January 28 to allow local residents the opportunity to learn about the process and become involved in bylaw updates.

4. The fourth priority is parks, recreation and culture. The last recreation survey was done in 1998. Council has made a contract with Lees and Associates to develop a Recreation and Parks Strategic Plan for management and development for the next 10 years. The cost is \$14,999 plus HST. Council anticipates stakeholder meetings and an online survey for public input. Council met with School District #58 to discuss opportunities to work with the school district on issues related to parks and recreation, the lease of Riverside Centre and joint use of parks and recreation facilities that will benefit both the Town and the school district.

5. The fifth priority is the Courthouse, a structure owned by the Town. Council has engaged David Nairen and Associates to provide a structural assessment of the Courthouse building. The report, due soon, will include the assessments of the mechanical and electrical systems. Council will then decide whether the Courthouse could be used as Town Hall.

6. The final priority is GIS mapping of the Town's infrastructure, that is, the water, sewer, storm drain systems. This may include mapping the Town cemetery.

The Town will begin its 2013 budget process this month. The official audit will be underway and completed in April. Council was pleased to report, on December 17, that preliminary estimates indicate the Town's expenditures for 2012 are well within budget amounts.

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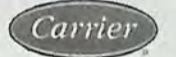
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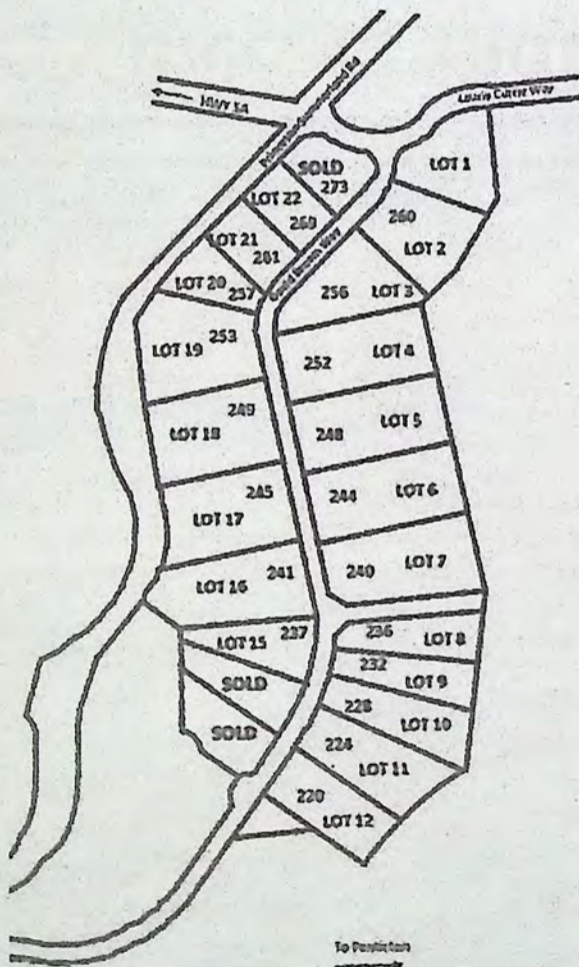
