Council approves climate station

At the request of Environment Canada, Princeton Town Council has approved construction of an automated climatological weather station which will fit into a grid being built across Canada. The primary purpose of the network of stations is to detect world scale climatological change over time. The site requested was at Princeton Airport.

The site will be enclosed by chain link fencing and will be located 150 feet from the water tower north of the airport. The enclosure will protect a number of sensitive instruments. The present weather station will continue in operation but will focus more on aviation requirements after the new instrument compound is completed.

PXA reports to Town Council

Paul Bedard, PXA President (Princeton Exhibition Association) appeared before Town Council on January 21 to report on the achievements of the PXA in 2012 and to update Council on plans for 2013 and future years.

Bedard outlined projects completed in 2012: repairs to the Ag barn roof, fencing along Highway 40, hazard tree removed, waterline upgrade, saloon roof repair, wheelchair access to washrooms, structural assessment of the grandstand, a new sound system, and tractor repairs.

The fairgrounds welcomed barrel

racing, team roping, the annual rodeo, Little Britches Rodeo, horse racing, the agricultural fair, two flea markets and the community Halloween party. Young riders put on gymkhanas during the summer.

Bedard advised Town Council of the new process in place as part of the project planning and budget development. Each user submits what improvements or additions they would like to see at the fairgrounds. This is the wish list. The Finance Committee then sets priorities from the items on the list and estimates the cost, which then becomes a budget item. Bedard sub-

mitted the budget to Council, an ambitious \$118,000 total with a deficit of \$34,000, which the PXA hopes to make up through grants and donations of materials and volunteer labour.

With praise for the Board of Directors, members and non-members who have come forward to help, Bedard told Council there is a high level of cooperation between all of the groups who use the fair-

ground facility. There is a good turnout for work parties, which become more enjoyable with a potluck lunch and general sharing of ideas.

He noted that the volunteer appreciation dinner initiated by Past President John Bey is an annual event that brings together all of the members and volunteers who put on events and do the work at the fairgrounds, making them better

acquainted.

The PXA presentation lasted longer than usually allowed, as there was a great deal to report, but Mayor Frank Armitage thanked Bedard for his comprehensive outline of what the PXA is doing and what it plans to do.

Councillor Marilyn Harkness told Bedard she sees the report as positive and gives her confidence that Princeton Exhibition Association is on track.

Lift pump will cost \$\$\$

At their January 21 regular meeting, Town Council authorized the expenditure of \$192,000 to upgrade the Ponderosa Sewer Lift Pump. There are indications that one of the two pumps is about to fail.

Due to the way in which the lift pumps were installed in a vertical cylinder with no means of raising the pumps to the surface for repairs, every time a pump needs repairs, a person must descend a ladder into a pit at the bottom of the concrete cylinder.

There are issues with Confined

Space safety, making repairs costly. In addition, there are no operating condition warning systems.

If there is a problem, a warning light shines, and the Town depends on some local resident in the Glenview area to see the light, understand it is a warning, and then contact Town Hall. The lift station was installed in 1970. There is no indication about the age or capacity of the pumps, and at present there is a light on which indicates a seal on one of the pumps has failed.

Princeton Town Council had three

options, all of them very expensive. Council chose to upgrade the existing lift station with self-priming pumps which will be installed in an enclosure above ground rather than at the bottom of the concrete cylinder.

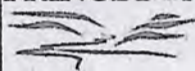

Will you join the fight to save Granite Creek? *

To The Editor,

We feel it is time our local government steps in to protect historic sites in this area. As many know, our passion is the local history. For years we have been asking to have the Granite Creek town site (which is on Crown land) protected. We have asked it to be put on the RDOS Heritage Registry. Currently there are no Area H locations on that registry. Recently, when a placer claim inside the town site came available, we decided to stake it. By doing so, no one else can dig on the site. We offered the claim back to the Mineral Titles branch so that they could put a "no staking reserve" on the site. It cost us \$104 to stake it, and when we contacted Mineral Titles they had absolutely no interest in protecting the site. It would cost us over \$800 to renew our claim and we won't be doing that. Only a few months remain to protect the town site from future mining activity should someone else

decide to stake it.

We have been told that it would be too expensive to add Granite Creek to the RDOS Heritage Registry. We explained that we have maps, photos and documentation of the site and will volunteer our time to assist them. It shouldn't cost anything. They were adamant that it would be expensive. RDOS recently suggested turning the Granite Creek town site into a park in order to protect it. We thought that was a fantastic idea. Unfortunately, the idea seems to have died as quickly as it was suggested. We are told how important tourism is to the area. Our valley is dripping in history, however, that history is not being protected even if it means tourism dollars.

In the late 1800's, thousands of pioneers worked dawn to dusk to open up this area that we all call home. They travelled great distances to petition the government for money to build roads and bridges. Once they got that money,

they did the back-breaking work themselves. As prospector Judge Thomas Murphy said in his Memoirs in 1930, the Granite Creek prospectors "had generous dispositions which never failed to respond to appeals for assistance or to relieve the distressed and unfortunate. The lives of all these men are closely associated with the early history of this country, on which they have left an impression so deep that future years cannot obliterate it. They are always noted for self-reliance, rugged endurance, and sterling worth."

Let's not turn a blind eye to what they did for our valley. Don't you think it is time our government did something to protect the legacy of these prospectors? Isn't that the least we can do to honour their memory and thank them for opening up our valley? Perhaps RDOS will listen if more people petition them to protect the Granite Creek town site. We are only two voices, but surely there are others who agree the site should be recognized and protected. If you agree, please send an email or letter to RDOS asking them to add the Granite Creek town site to their Heritage Registry and to turn it into a park to protect it from vandalism and digging. What Kind Of Agenda Is This?

There is a lot of talk about Agenda 21. If you have not heard of it, I am sure you will. It is an action agenda developed by the United Nations and its catchword is 'sustainable development'. I have been researching it. True to my usual way of finding the truth, I have read and heard what the opponents have to say about it as well as what the advocates. It is quite a mixed bag.

The opponents of Agenda 21 are not governments, as most governments in the world have signed on. In fact, most governments are pouring money into the implementation of Agenda 21.

Here is what the opponents say about it: Agenda 21 elevates Nature above mankind, it is a 40 chapter agenda aimed at controlling the world by establishing a world government, and are part of a plan to 'dumb down' the education system and the general public.

This is just some of what the opponents are saying. One of the opponents is the Canadian Action Party whose candidates have been

promoting opposition to Agenda 21. In the United States, the Tea Party, a vocal group within the Republican Party, has strongly opposed Agenda 21.

There is so much stuff on the web about Agenda 21 that I decided to look into the activities of one branch of it operating in Canada. It is ICLEI, a non-governmental body promoting legislation and its slogan is 'local governments for sustainability'. When I went to their website, I found some discussion of the Doha Climate Conference of 2012. A document titled 'Doha Climate Gateway' extends the Kyoto Protocol for eight more years and, I quote, "opens the path to a new universal climate agreement by 2015". It goes on to say the agreement is a "modest step toward ensuring a global, rule-based system for climate change", but the ICLEI is concerned "that the pace of the intergovernmental process is far below the level needed to respond effectively to the urgent climate crisis."

I sat back and contemplated what a universal climate agreement might look like and what a global rule-based system for climate change might look like. The whole concept struck me as ego-driven arrogance of the highest order. My own view of human significance on the face of Earth makes us equal to fleas on a dog's back: sure, we might annoy the dog on occasion, but if anybody is going to survive, it is the dog, not the fleas.

Climate is based on dozens of factors interacting over a long period of time. Is some group of

humans going to develop systems that put a leash on El Nino, that stop polar shift, that put an end to volcanic eruptions, hurricanes and cyclones? What kind of inflated ego thinks this is possible?

If the system is going to be rule-based, who is going to monitor us to see if we are adhering to the rules or breaking them, and who is going to deal with us if we break the rules?

Under the ICLEI heading on the website, there is a Security and Sustainability Forum. This forum offers seminars on the web (webinars) to assist governments, industry and academics to a better understanding and to promoting effective measures to adapt to the complexities of a changing climate. The next webinar is on January 31, from 1:15 to 2:45 Eastern Standard Time. If you want to see what this is about, go to ICLEI at 10:15 our time. If you want to see more webinars, there is an archive you can access.

I am not going to stop studying Agenda 21, simply because I am inclined to question most things and one of the questions I posed to myself was "what if climate change is simply a red herring or paper tiger to implement a hidden agenda?"

Another question I ask is this: "if our governments are so concerned about our environment that billions of dollars are being poured into conferences, forums and webinars, why is garbage still being dumped in the ocean and why are plastic bags still allowed and why is raw sewage being pumped into the ocean?"

I do not have answers, yet.

Town approves log yard

At the January 21 Town Council meeting, a lease was approved for Aspen Planers to establish a log sorting and storage facility on Town industrial land, lot 324

Laurie Currie Way, near the highways maintenance property south of highway 40. The land is not serviced, and Aspen Planers will provide a letter of credit to ensure

compliance with lease conditions and environmental clean-up. The Town agreed to enter into an eight month lease agreement at a rate of \$45,000 per year, prorated for the period agreed to.

A representative of Princeton Exhibition Association expressed concern that the activities of Aspen Planers might interfere with the use of the area outside the fairgrounds which is used for parking during major events. The Association was assured Aspen Planers activities would be accessed further along the highway and would have no impact on parking.

Greens hope to run Similkameen candidates

BC Greens in the Boundary Similkameen intend to nominate a candidate to run for MLA in the upcoming May 14 Provincial General Election.

Amidst shifting electoral boundaries the BC Green Party has run candidates in the South, Okanagan, Similkameen, Nicola, Lillooet, Boundary and West Kootenay since 1986.

In the current Boundary Similkameen Electoral District voters reside from Christina Lake though Grand Forks and Osoyoos up to Kaledan near Penticton and halfway up the Similkameen to just past Hedley.

The Boundary Similkameen population includes ranchers, students,

loggers, farmers, the retired, tradespersons and those involved in industry and small business.

BC voters have been customarily strategic in a "first by the post" electoral system that sidelines smaller parties like The Greens. In 2009 BC voters narrowly defeated a proposed change for a less sharply divisive system called STV.

Some predict the Green party will do better both provincially and federally following federal Green Party Leader, Elizabeth May's win in Saanich-Gulf Islands in 2011.

Lately BC Green Party Leader, Jane Sterk, has fended off calls in Saanich South to pull the Green Party out of the May 14 Provincial

General Election in favor of an NDP candidate.

The Greens posted a strong second-place showing in last month's Victoria federal by-election.

The Green Party principles, policies and program for government are the same as they were in 1983 when the BC Greens were founded.

Essentially the Green Party proposes precautionary restraint in economic growth with sharp turns toward practices to secure water, air and soil - in short, 'a sustainable future'.

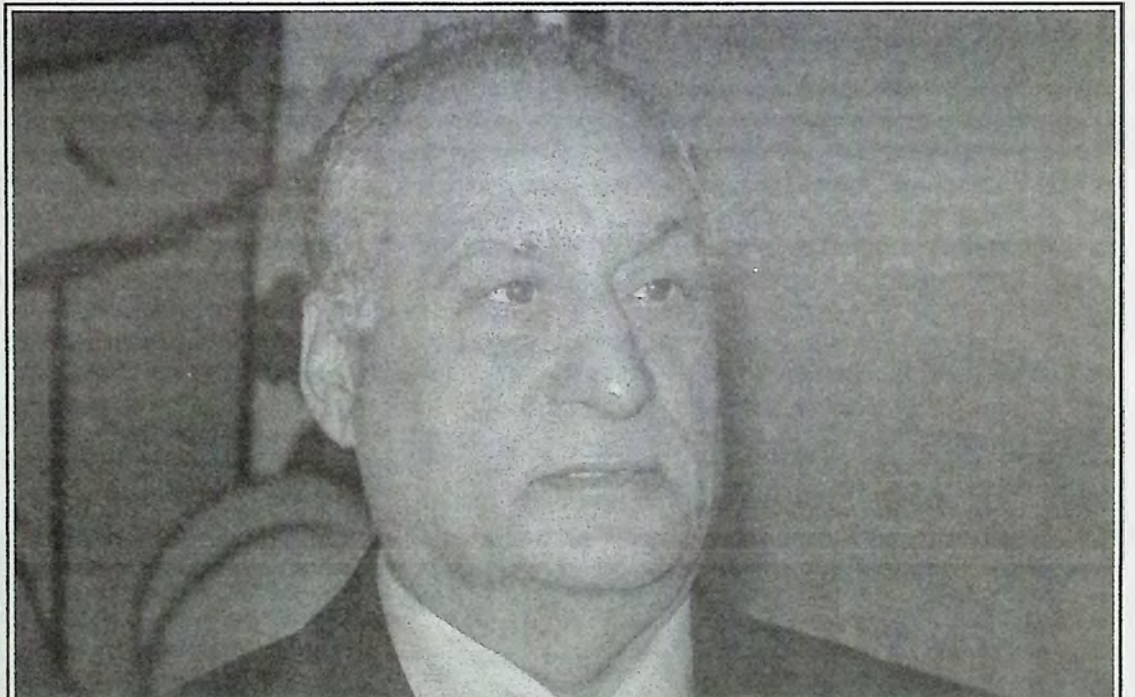

Nutella French Toast Cups

(NC)—It is referred to as roti telur in Indonesia, torrija in Spain, and French toast in Canada. No matter what the language there is a universal passion for this delicious dish. Nutella is celebrating World Nutella Day on February 5th by releasing their own recipe for French toast with a twist.

Prep time: 15 minutes / Cook time: 10 to 12 minutes / Serves: 6

Ingredients:

- 3 eggs
- 3/4 cup (180mL) low fat milk (2% or less M.F.)
- 1 tsp (5mL) pure vanilla extract
- 1/2 tsp (2mL) ground cinnamon
- 6 slices whole grain bread
- 1/3-cup (80mL) plain low fat Greek yogurt (2% or less M.F.)
- 1 tsp (5mL) sugar
- 1/4 tsp (1 mL) orange zest
- 1 cup (250mL) fresh berries (strawberries, blueberries and raspberries)
- 1/3 cup (80mL) Nutella

Directions:

- Pre-heat oven to 350F (180°C)
- Spray a six-muffin, non-stick muffin tin with cooking spray
- In a large bowl, whisk together eggs, milk, vanilla and cinnamon. Dip each slice of whole grain bread in the egg mixture one at a time lightly coating both sides. Gently press each slice of bread into the muffin cups.
- Bake for 10 to 12 minutes or until muffin cups are cooked and golden.
- Remove from oven and let cool for five minutes.
- Meanwhile, in a small bowl, combine yogurt, sugar and orange zest.
- Divide the Nutella equally between the six cups, spreading on the inside. Spoon in some orange yogurt and top with fresh berries.
- Serve with some extra fruit and a glass of milk.

Council, MLA award medals

The first business of the Town Council meeting January 21 was to award three Diamond Jubilee medals to citizens deserving of recognition for their contribution to their community.

These medals were struck in recognition of Queen Elizabeth II sixty years on the throne. Council was given two medals and MLA Harry Lali was given four medals for his constituency.

MLA Lali awarded one medal to Princeton resident Ken Carlson, who had taught in Princeton for many years early in his teaching career. He taught in other school districts but when afflicted with multiple sclerosis (MS), returned to Princeton. Despite a reduction in mobility, Carlson worked diligently for the MS Society, and was co-founder of Princeton's Accessibility Awareness Committee, raising awareness among

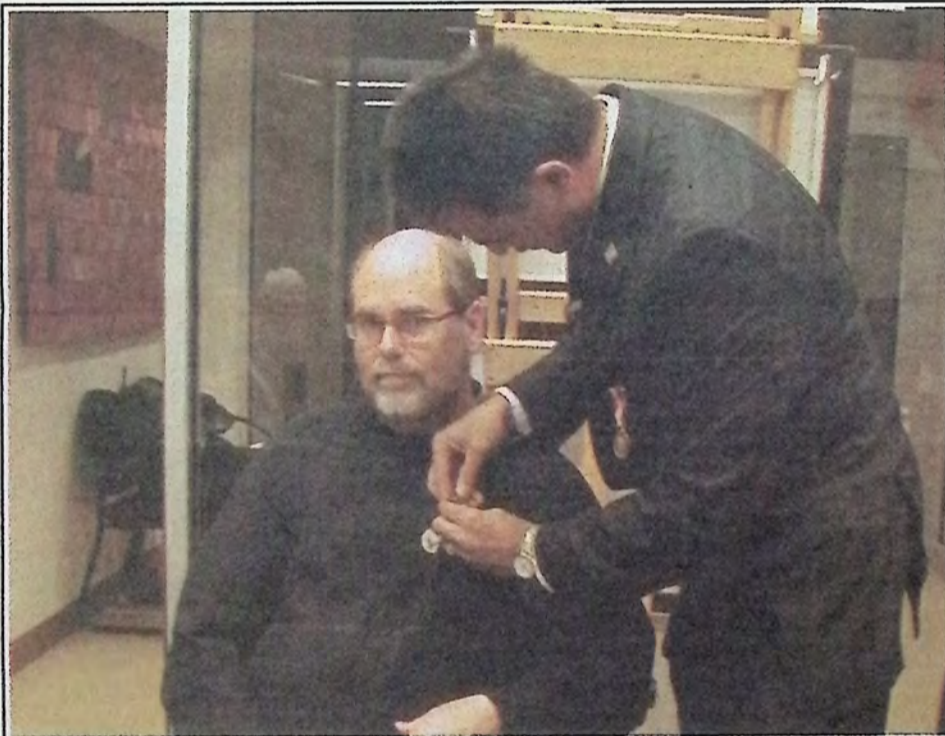
members of Town Council and local business people of the need for doorways accessible to those in wheelchairs and using walkers.

Town Council medals went to Edith Currie and Joyce Fraser. Edith Currie had a very long career as a school teacher in Princeton, but was also a partner with her husband, Doug, in a cattle ranch where they included raising race horses as part of their enterprise.

Joyce Fraser was the catalyst for creation of Princeton and District Community Service Society and was Administrator of the Society for 30 years. Well-known as an innovator in providing assistance for those less able to manage for themselves, Fraser's vision became reality in housing for the developmentally impaired and in Vermilion Court, British Columbia's flag-ship assisted living residence.

Gena Sandli rescues horses. To some people she is a saint. To others she is a nuisance. Regardless of your opinion, you have to give her credit.

She is doing something most of us would not be able to do and that's where things get interesting.

Words like abused, starving, neglected and abandoned are a regular part of her vocabulary and she has taken on the task to save horses

in any of those conditions.

Hurdles she encounters come from a variety of places. Often it's the horse owner who isn't prepared, for a variety of reasons, to surrender horses to Sandli.

Sometimes it's from someone else not interested in cooperating with a rescue.

Sandli has been doing this for seven years, has rescued 100 horses, seven goats and three dogs. She has seen just about any possible situation and she is currently monitoring a handful of possible rescues involving a number of horses, goats and dogs.

Sandli started an online petition January 12th. It has a long title, but it explains the purpose of the petition. It is called, "Giving more authority to horse and farm animal rescues in BC." and at the time of this writing there were 340 signatures.

"We receive on the average, a call a day with people asking for help. Most of the time we refer them to the RCMP and the BCSPCA. However, with the increase in these calls and abuse issues, we are going out on more calls than ever," Sandli says.

Her ultimate goal is clearly focused.

"Our hopes are to convince the provincial government that a people

funded rescue for horses and farm animals in this region is well over due. Our request to them will not be for money but for more authority to be able to have the power to seize, if necessary."

Her phone keeps ringing, more so now that the petition has taken flight. "A large amount of animal activists have now joined forces with Outbackjacks in support of this cause," Sandli told the News Leader this past Sunday, January 27th.

But isn't this really the job of the SPCA? The name itself implies it - the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals.

"I believe they are understaffed," Sandli responds.

"There's just not enough of them to cover this district - the way the economy is and the number of cases we are getting."

A fair comparison would be cut-backs to other provincially-funded services like Conservation and Forestry Services. The SPCA manpower simply can't handle the workload and meet the demands of ever-expanding territories.

What about the RCMP?

"The police in every community have been very supportive of us," Sandli says.

"Band members and (First Nations) Chiefs are also supportive."

Sandli says the next step is push the

petition onto each and every single BC MLA with hopes that at least one will see potential in the cause and more or less runs with it.

If that doesn't work the first time, Sandli says she'll just keep sending the petition over and over again.

She is also in the process of planning a "quiet sit down" rally in the spring but in the meantime animals currently being rescued need to be fed and some require medical attention, all of which costs money.

To help raise funds to cover these costs Outbackjacks Horse Rescue has established two thrift stores - one in Princeton at 225 Bridge Street (across from CIBC) and another in Keremeos.

Sandli says you can help simply by donating good quality saleable items to either of the stores to assist with fundraising rather than offering a cash donation.

Sandli explains it best with the comment, "The rescue is not about if they are rideable, it's about saving a life."

Town Council approved an additional sewerage expenditure of \$7,000 to evaluate the waste water treatment plant located in the Westridge subdivision. The age and condition of the treatment plant are unknown, and it is critical that an assessment be done as soon as possible. There is some correspondence on file indicating the plant was installed in 1993 and

there were some concerns that proper steps had not been taken to ensure a steel grate sub floor was treated so it would not corrode. It is now corroded and unsafe to work on.

The assessment will determine if other steel and electrical components are corroded. A manufacturer's representative advised the plant is probably nearing the end of its life.

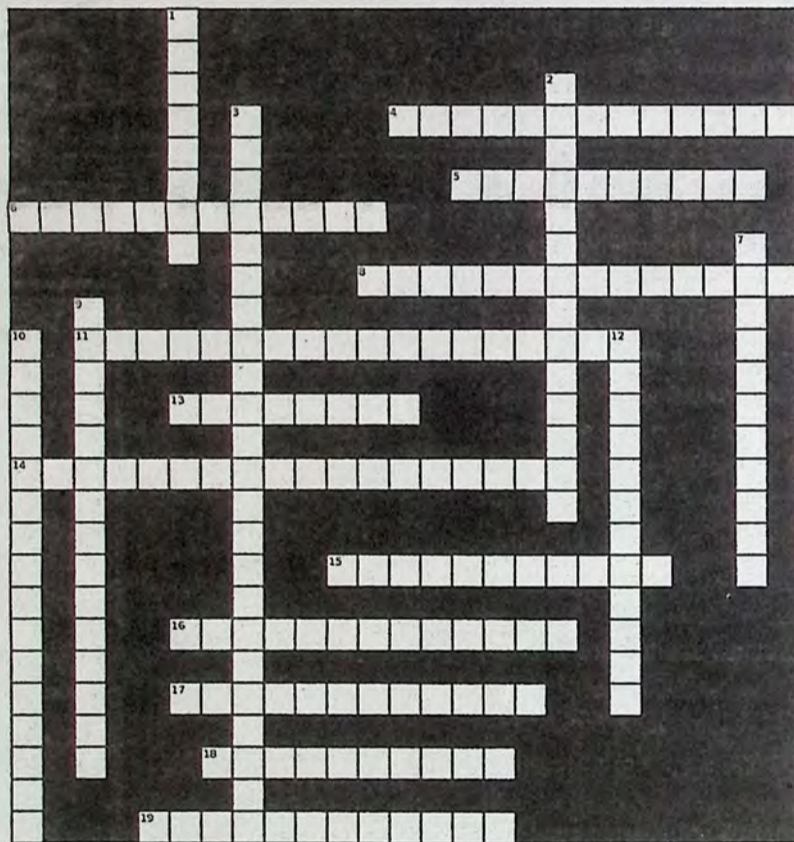
