

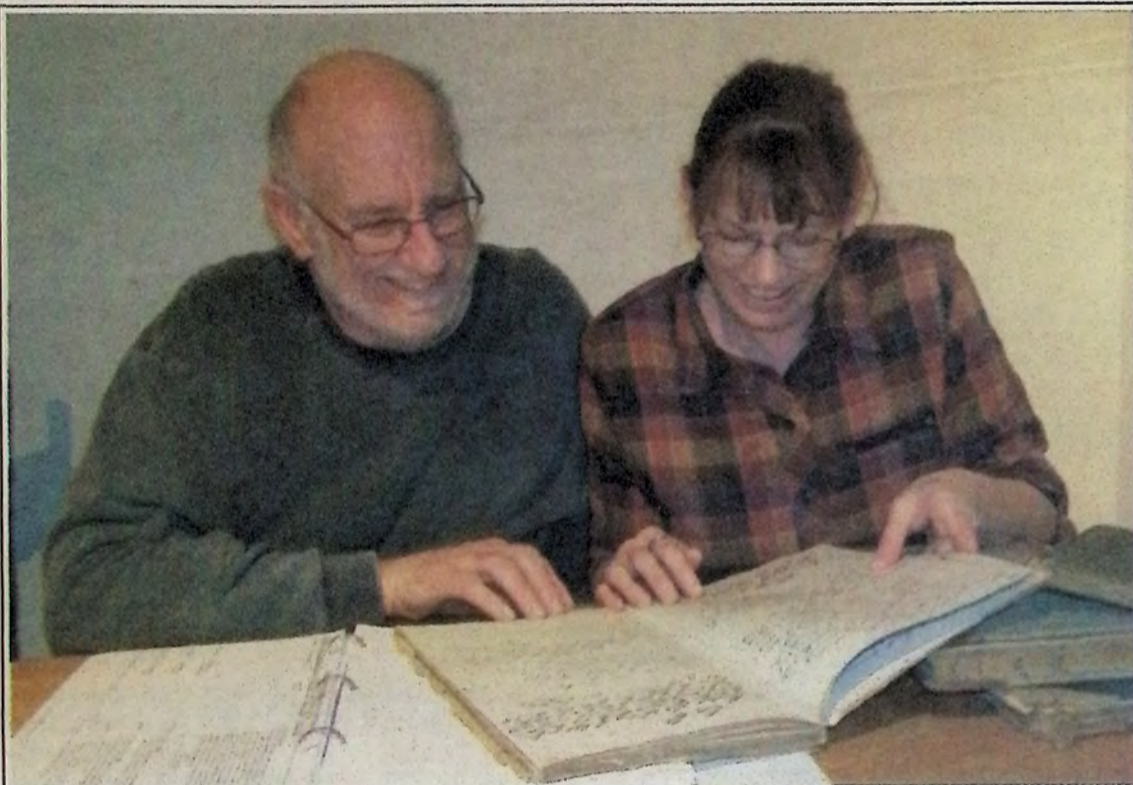

## Next step in health care

Many Princeton residents attended a consultation group exercise arranged by SOHC last month. At the February 18 Town Council meeting, Councillor Marilyn Harkness reported that the next step in health care consultations would be a meeting of health care providers to give their views on Princeton's health care situation.

Interior Health Authority will meet with local health care providers and by June hopes to have an official

plan for Princeton.

Local citizens have the opportunity to speak out about what they want for Princeton in terms of health care by going to the Canadian Centre for Policy Alternatives website. The website offers a number of options people can choose.

However, it offers no opportunity to say what the individual responder wants if none of those options are what is desired.

Princeton Community Arts Council has a busy schedule of upcoming events. The first event happens this Saturday, March 2, at Riverside theatre, when the Arts Council presents The De Danaan School of Irish Dancers, an exciting, fast-paced show of dancing in the style of Riverdance or King of the Dance, as seen on television. Joining them will be members of Princeton Highland Dancers seniors.

The next show will be on Saturday, April 20, when the Arts Council presents the Juno Award winning Alpha Yaya Diallo. This show features African musicians and dancers performing to high energy African rhythms.

April 20 - 27 is BC Arts and Culture week, and one of the high-

lights of the week will be the launch of the Garden Club's book of gardening tips about gardening in Princeton. 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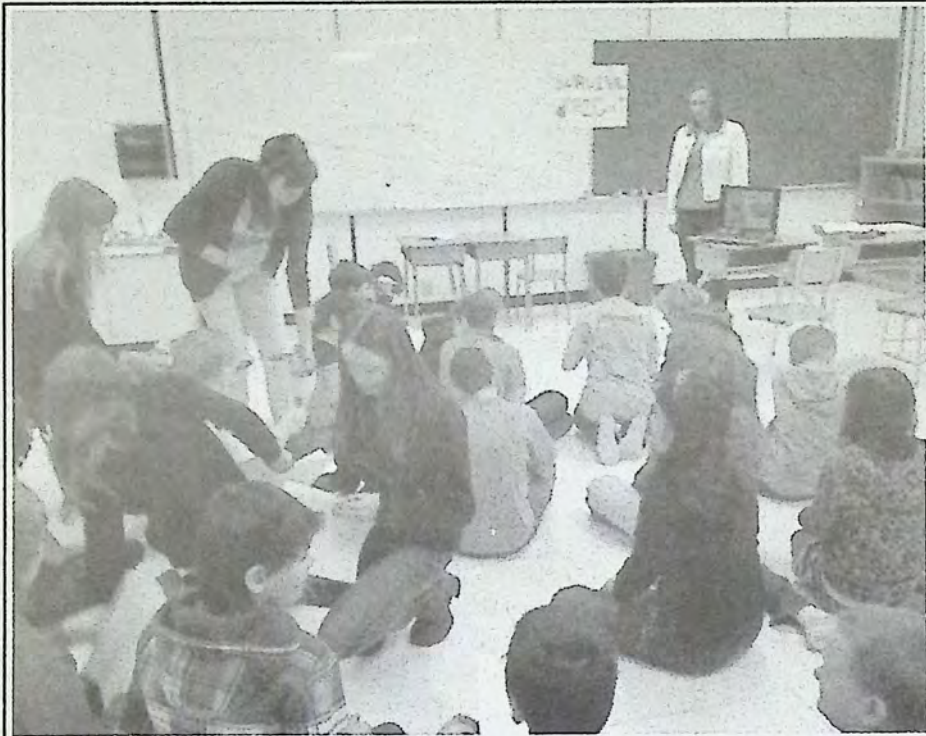

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## Chamber asks for more money

Chamber of Commerce President Brenda Crawford and Visitor Centre Manager Lori Thomas attended the February 18 Town Council meeting to report on the Chamber's activities in 2012 and to ask for an increase in funding from the Town. The Chamber received \$25,000 last year and is looking for an additional \$10,000 this year.

Crawford told Council a grant was received last year from the provincial government for upgrades to the Visitor Centre. The rock garden was revamped, picnic tables were built to make them wheelchair accessible.

Lori Thomas reported numbers were down by one percent last year, better than the provincial average which dropped six percent. There were an average of 4.2 parties daily over the year, with a total of 18,880 visitors in 2012. There were a lot of phone inquiries about Princeton, particularly about the mine, by people thinking of moving to Princeton. Crawford told Council, "In order

to move forward, we (Chamber) must be seen as separate from the Visitor Centre. The previous contract with the Town focused on the Visitor Centre."

Councillor Marilyn Harkness stated, after reviewing documents submitted to Council, "You should have included revenue as well as expenses."

Mayor Frank Armitage told Crawford many communities have a hotel room tax to cover the cost of the Chamber of Commerce. He advised Crawford that Princeton has the highest grant in aid per capita-

of any community in B.C.

Crawford complained to Town Council that a valley-wide tourist guide will take the place of a Princeton guide and the Chamber of Commerce was told nothing about this.

Mayor Armitage answered the complain by stating the Tourist Advisory Council for the valley received support from all members for a valley-wide tourist guide.

The Chamber of Commerce will enter into negotiations with Town Council regarding a new contract for service.

## Council adopts new traffic law

At the February 18 Town Council meeting, Council gave first, second and third reading of the new traffic and parking bylaw amendment. This document covers everything from who can park where to cleaning sidewalks and fines for not abiding by the law.

At the end of the meeting, during question period, local businessman

Ed Muckle asked Council why it had not addressed the issue of business owners and their employees parking all day in front of their businesses and discouraging customer parking. He noted there is plenty of parking space available off the main streets.

Council suggested this could be a whole new bylaw and worth consideration.

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# Flip Of The Coyne

I was angry when I got involved in the movement to save our hospital. For me it was more than just an emergency room; I wanted it all back. I wanted what was here before the IHA took over and the services that we once took for granted slowly disappeared. I have not given up on the idea that we could have day surgery here again or that we could have a more comprehensive health care model in our community. Since I first got involved I have learned a lot and I understand a lot more than I did.

Since the first meeting we had at the Belaire last spring, I have learned that our doctor shortage is a lot more complicated than we originally thought. For starters, doctors don't get paid a salary. They get paid for the patients they see. In a way this puts all the doctors in town in competition with each other, and especially with any new doctor that comes to town. I have also learned that although we have an ER doctor shortage, we don't necessarily have a doctor shortage in our community. We have three doctors that service Princeton.

One is offering walk-in clinic days and we have doctors who are accepting patients, so technically we don't really have a shortage of doctors serving our community. It gets complicated in that we have one local doctor that does not do ER work. The other two doctors do but they cannot work 24/7, so it has been decided that service to the ER will be limited so our doctors do not burn out. This sounds reasonable

from a staffing and safety point of view, but as a member of the community it sounds outrageous that we would not have full ER coverage in our community. The next issue is billing.

Did you know that IHA is not really the one that hires doctors? I didn't. Doctors work for themselves and bill to MSP. The only time they work for the Health Authority is when they work in the hospital or ER, so we have coverage within our community, but we do not have enough doctors that are doing ER work. If you were a new doctor coming to a town that could provide for around four full time doctors and there are three here already, it becomes a very competitive market. Luckily we should have a new doctor coming sometime later this year.

Something that has always bothered me is that we cannot have our babies born in Princeton anymore. I was very angry about that. My family has been having babies in this valley since before Europeans even knew the Similkameen existed, and now my family has had that connection severed because we cannot, without risk to mother and child, have babies in Princeton.

I was angry. I will admit I am not so angry anymore. I am still mad that my children's birthright has been taken away from them, but after having three children in five years, one of which we lost, I can say without a doubt that I would rather have a doctor and nurses who deliver in one month what they would deliver in one year in Princeton. As a family

who has had one stillbirth and other pregnancies with complications and difficult births, I can tell you that I would want my wife to be with the doctors who handle more births. I would love it if deliveries were done here again one day, but the specialization of roles has changed much of the way deliveries are done. The rural doctor is no longer trained the way they were 30 or 40 years ago, and unless that changes, I just can't see babies being born in Princeton again.

I know some people will be outraged by what I am saying, and I am sure I will get more than one angry comment from readers, but unless the system changes and delivery methods of care are changed, we are in a tough spot.

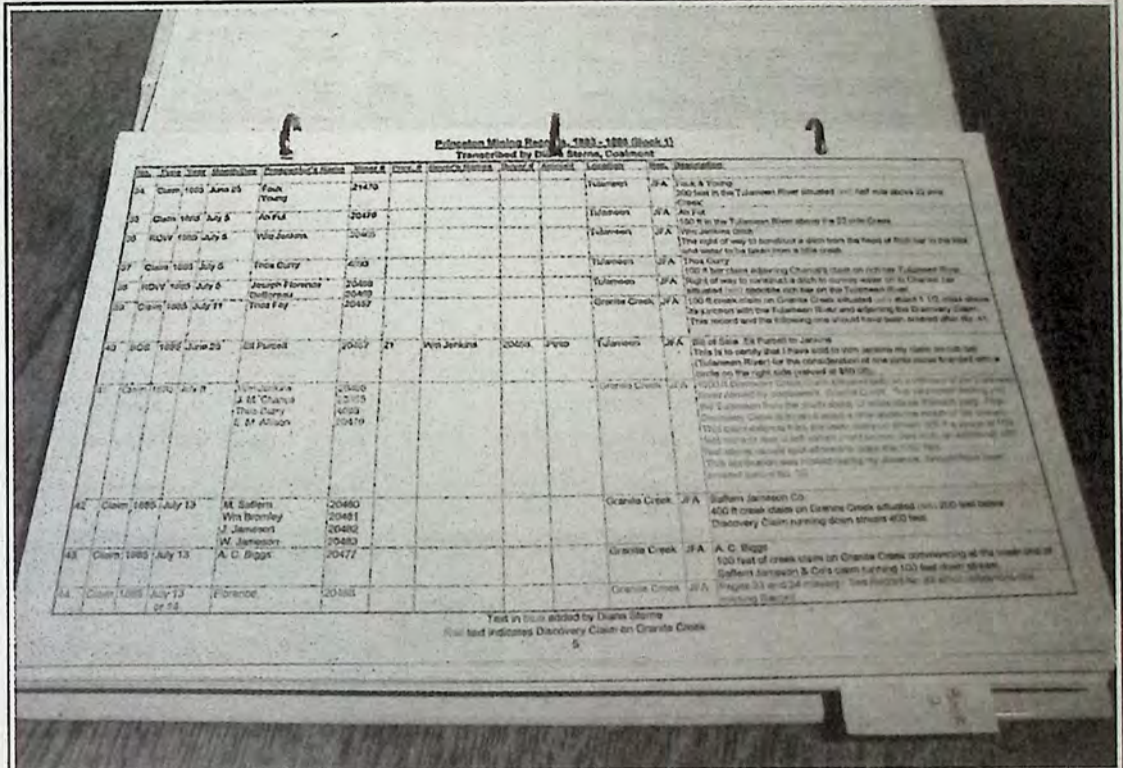
It's all well and good to claim we are part of the Okanagan because "no one knows where the Similkameen is, nor can spell it" but I think we are missing the real opportunity here.

**DON'T BE DUPED!** Primary Care can't meet the needs of the population of Princeton. No ER, No Surgery, No Babies can be born in this community. In many cases patients are already having to travel to Kelowna due to overcrowding in Penticton when faced with an emergency. Under a Primary Care this will never change.

Four reasons why a Primary Care facility will not meet the needs of Princeton:

1) ER is not part of a Primary care facility.

In many cases patients are having to travel to Kelowna due to overcrowding in Penticton.

2) Babies (obstetrics) and Surgery, is not part Primary

Care Facility.

3) Doctors paid on a steady contract basis are not part of a Primary Care Facility.

4) Continuity of care for rural BC does not fit with a Primary Care facility

Four reasons why a hospital with ER Services are vital for Princeton:

1) We are a resource based community with many high risk jobs. Workers deserve protection.  
2) Seniors. The median age of a Princetonite is increasing according to Statistics Canada. (approx. 51-53 years) Heart conditions, Respiratory issues can not wait. The average lifespan of a Princetonite has increased so to have heart and respiratory ailments within our community.

3) Kids. Accidents happen. Few things are more terrifying than being in the position of a parent dealing with the medical emergency of your child when access is not assured. Poverty, high risk activities, and teen alcohol and drug use, are all contributing factors.

4) Economic Stability and Growth. Who lives here, how our population grows or does not grow, who moves here, who does business here, who can afford to continue to do business here, who hires, property values, infrastructure. All of these things are directly impacted by access to medical services. Accidents on the job site force WCB rates up, this is problematic for many employers who are being forced to deal with workers health and safety at levels never seen before.


Four examples of the Independent Hospitals and why they work.

1) Bella Bella, 2) Hazelton, 3) Bella Coola, 4) Kippasse Bay all have something in common despite radically different geographic locals in the Province of BC. They are all small population based centres, similar to Princeton

## How Do We Heal Ourselves?

There is a phenomenon called 'spontaneous remission' or 'spontaneous healing'. This occurs when the body heals itself of a disease or injury which physicians say is impossible.

The first time I ever heard of this was when I was in my twenties. My neighbour had an aunt who was diagnosed with a terminal cancer, and was given a few months to live. After a few months had passed, I asked her how this aunt was doing. My neighbour said she had heard nothing from her family about it, and decided to write and find out. What she learned was this: her aunt, a schoolteacher who had saved a lot of money to buy a house, quit her job and moved to a motel in Las Vegas to live out her final months just enjoying life. She lounged around the pool, explored the desert, bought some new clothes for her new life, and just had fun. After five months had passed, she was still feeling well, and decided to visit a doctor anyway. He could find nothing wrong with her. She returned to her home town, checked in with her

regular doctor, who ran a series of tests and could find nothing wrong with her.

Medical researchers are now gathering thousands of case histories of people who have been told there is no cure for what they suffer from, but have somehow cured themselves. The cures range through a variety of cancers to MS and horrific injuries.

I read some of these case histories to see if there is a theme. I will share some with you.

A woman in her forties discovered strange little lumps in odd spots on her body. She went to her doctor, went through many tests and scans. She was called in one day to learn from her doctor that she had a form of cancer for which there is no treatment and which is always fatal. She drove home as if she were numb. When she arrived, she saw her husband and three children were in the back yard swimming pool. She thought, "They are all having fun, they're going to live."

Suddenly she felt filled with a strange new energy and decided, "I am going to look after me!"

She began to eat only healthy foods, went to the gym for exercise, and pampered herself in many small ways. After several weeks, the lumps disappeared. When she finally went back to her doctor, she felt really well. He could not believe the lumps had gone and ran all the tests and scans again. There was nothing wrong with her.

A man in his thirties was diagnosed with stomach cancer. When he underwent surgery, doctors found the cancer on the outer edge of his stomach was linked to his liver. They sewed him together and told

him there was nothing they could do. After he was released from hospital, he quit his job and decided to enjoy his last few months as well as possible. He went to ball games, horse races, got drunk frequently (a no-no) and did as he pleased. Years later, he went to ER for severe pains in his gut and told the doctors about his cancer. A scan showed he had gallstones. There was no evidence of cancer. He had the treatment for gallstones, recovered, and went back to just enjoying his life as a reprobate homeless person.

An elderly woman who was terminally ill with cancer suddenly began to heal after her verbally abusive, nasty-tempered husband died suddenly. Within months, her cancer was gone and she was living a happy, healthy life.

I was seeing a theme emerging of people suddenly deciding whatever time they had would be lived with enthusiasm doing what they really wanted to do.

Researchers saw a different theme in which people reacted to a threat strongly and suddenly in the most positive way - something in their own psychology triggered a flood of a healing substance. These researchers have identified the substance and are trying to find what triggers it. One of the clues came from a spontaneous remission in a nine year old boy who had a cancerous tumor in his brain. He learned how to relax and focus his mind through biofeedback.

The researchers continue to seek the answers and I hope they find the answers. Imagine how great life would be if we learned the secrets of how to heal ourselves of diseases and injuries!

# Curling Club reports progress

Shirley Campbell, representing Princeton Curling Club, attended the February 18 Town Council meeting to report on activities of the club during the past year. She told Town Council the club offers fellowship and sport, and supports Special Olympics activities. The club has hosted three bonspiels, and members have spent 1,200 volunteer hours keeping the ice

ready for play and providing other services in the club.

"Things are looking good," Campbell said.

The ice maker of the club told Council the job is very challenging with eight ice technicians working during the season. The ice must be checked twice a day seven days a week with additional work required for bonspiels. The club is

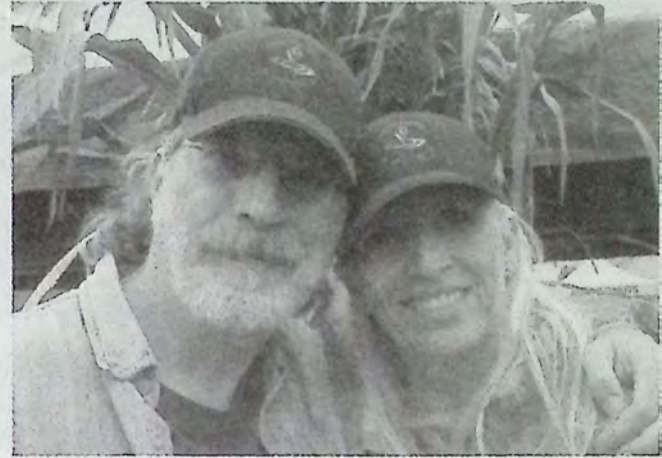
planning a Level 1 ice technician course for autumn 2013, with ice makers from all over the region expected to attend.

## RDOS resumes yard waste collection

In March, yard waste collections resume in Penticton, Oliver, Osoyoos, Keremeos and surrounding rural communities.

Collection starts in rural Electoral Areas 'A', 'B', 'C', 'D', 'E', 'F', 'G', the Towns of Oliver and Osoyoos and the Village of Keremeos on the week of March 4th to 8th. Penticton home owners receive their first 2013 yard waste pickup during the week of March 11th to 15th. Place materials out by 7:00 AM on your regular collection day. Residents should check their collections schedules for future dates.

Residents can place out an unlimited amount of leaves, twigs, grass and prunings in reusable containers or paper yard waste bags. Sticks under 3 inches (7.5 cm) diameter must be cut to 3 foot lengths (1 m) and bundled with twine. Maximum weight per reusable container, bag or bundle is 25 kg or 55 pounds. Reusable containers can include a well-marked garbage can. Local governments have free 'Yard Waste Only' stickers to place on cans to make it clear which one is for garbage.

Yard waste should never be placed in plastic bags. Any yard waste

placed in plastic bags will be left at your property. As large wood pieces can damage compaction equipment, branches over 3 inches (7.5 cm) diameter and wood will not be collected. Instead bring larger woody materials to the landfill.

Often residents are shocked to see garbage and yard waste going in the same truck. BFI Canada operates split-trucks that have two compartments. By adjusting a switch, the driver can go from compartment to compartment using the same opening.

## Author with valley history speaks in Hedley

Jim Douglass, author and son of a mine manager from the golden era of Similkameen Valley history is returning to visit with his daughter Jennifer, in Hedley.

A 'meet and greet' has been planned and Douglass will speak about his recent book about the JFK conspiracy, as well as discuss one he's currently working on.

He will be at the Hedley Seniors Hall at 10:30 AM on Wednesday March 6th.

His daughter, Jennifer says, "My Dad's a Hedlite, born in 1937, in Princeton. His family lived in the house we now call the 'pub' just outside of town (on Highway 3, Hedley) which was a Company house."

Jim Douglass has written six books: The Nonviolent Cross (Macmillan: 1968), Resistance and Contemplation (Doubleday: 1972), Lightning East to West (Crossroads: 1983), The

Nonviolent Coming of God (Orbis: 1991), JFK and the Unspeakable: Why He Died and Why It Matters (Orbis: 2008; Simon & Schuster paperback: 2010); Gandhi and the Unspeakable: His Final Experiment with Truth (Orbis: 2012).

From 1963 to 1965 Jim Douglass served as an adviser on questions of nuclear war and conscientious objection to Catholic bishops at the Second Vatican Council in Rome. He then taught theology at Bellarmine College, Louisville, Kentucky (1965), the University of Hawaii (1968-69, 71-72), and in the Program for the Study and Practice of Nonviolence at the University of Notre Dame (1969-70).

In 1977 Jim and Shelley Douglass helped found Ground Zero Center for Nonviolent Action alongside the Trident submarine base near Seattle, Washington. Jim Douglass

served a year and a half in jail for acts of civil disobedience at the Trident base. The Douglasses and Ground Zero developed an extended community in 250 towns and cities vigiling by the railroad tracks of Trident nuclear weapons shipments.

In September 1989 the Douglasses moved to Birmingham, Alabama. From Birmingham Jim Douglass has taken part in a series of peace-making journeys to the Middle East, including peace walks through Israel, the West Bank, and Jordan and a pilgrimage to Iraq after the Persian Gulf War. In 1993 the Douglasses founded Mary's House, a Catholic Worker house of hospitality in Birmingham for homeless families.

In 1993-94, Jim Douglass made four pilgrimages to Sarajevo under siege, where he met with religious leaders and carried messages bet- ..... continued on Page 18

## Lali responds to health problems

MLA Harry Lali was in Princeton recently, and gave the News Leader the opportunity to discuss health care with him. The News Leader referred to negligence of the elderly in residential care as exposed on the television inquiry program W5, and a discussion of private health care on 16 X 9, which talked about how the BC government fast-tracks police, Workers Compensation

patients and prisoners through a private hospital and pays the bills.

Lali responded by saying there is no accountability in our health care system.

"People complain to the government and they say they give money to IHA to run the health care in our area. People complain to IHA and are told the government doesn't give them enough money. Nobody

is accountable."

In addition to pointing out this 'pass the buck' technique, Lali stated there should be elected officials on health boards who will be accountable to those who elected them.

"As long as there are no elected officials involved in health care, we will continue to see this erosion of services to rural communities."

## SOHC releases report

The Community Consultation hosted January 28th by Save Our Hospital Coalition (SOHC) produced data that has since been analyzed and condensed into a summary report.

The 19-page report by Barbara Pesut, PhD, RN reviews the process that produced the data then examines the strengths and challenges of current healthcare delivery.

Regarding 'strengths' this is what Pesut says: "Participants reflected on a number of strengths in the community that support healthcare capacity. The dedication of healthcare providers and the climate of cooperation between healthcare professionals and the community were seen to contribute to a sense of cohesiveness. In particular, core groups of champions that worked across multiple levels of the community provided a strong network of communication, innovation and support. Physicians were acknowledged for their willingness to do house calls, to sponsor health promotion initiatives and to maintain regular contact with physicians in Penticton to ensure seamless care. Healthcare providers were seen as hardworking and flexible in their attempts to meet the community's

needs, which helped to overcome some of the system challenges. The care of seniors was cited as a particular strength of the community. The overall continuity of care provided in this rural community was viewed by some as an asset."

She adds, "Participants cited a number of services that enhanced care including walk in clinics; victim services; end of life care and hospice; a nurse practitioner who works at the clinic and provides services to the High School; a responsive EMS service with strong leadership; and the availability of both in-community and visiting services."

As for challenges, they fit into five themes: physicians and 24/7 emergency room coverage; escalating downsizing of services; emergency medical services; the impacts of commuting for care; and conflicts

in responsibilities and accountabilities for healthcare.

The Consultation exercise also generated a number of innovative ideas from participants including: a model of one stop shopping for care that uses a multi-disciplinary team paid on a contractual basis, the use of nurse practitioners and emergency medical services supported by physicians, an administrative model that includes local citizens similar to the model of the previous Health Boards, providing incentive programs for rural students to become healthcare providers, the potential for distance technology to reduce the necessity for commuting and more active public education around health promotion.

**Living Past 100**

**Parsley Is Better Than A Garnish**

We are continually being reminded to eat green, leafy vegetables, but most of us forget that parsley is one of the most powerful of these green, leafy vegetables. Parsley is higher in chlorophyll than most vegetables, and it can sweeten your breath if you chew it after eating fish, onions and garlic. The ancient Romans chewed parsley to remove the scent of alcohol.

In herbal medicine, parsley has been used for hundreds of years to improve kidney and liver function.

Eating parley is like taking a multivitamin capsule. It has a higher content of Vitamin C per gram than an orange. Parsley has a number of B vitamins, a lot of Vitamin A, and contains calcium and iron. It deserves to be more than a garnish.

Parsley should not be eaten in large quantities, because it can act as a diuretic and affect blood pressure, but parley should be eaten on a regular basis. It is one of those things that is best eaten in small amounts frequently.

Parsley is an excellent additive to soups, stews, sauces and salads. Mexicans use parsley as the main ingredient in salsa verde. Japanese chefs coat parsley with tempura batter and deep fry it. French chefs are fond of serving a dish of ham and parsley in aspic, and they often make a mash of garlic and parsley to sautes, grilled meats and poultry. Italian chefs make a sauce of butter, parsley and garlic to add to steamed mussels or clams served on the shell. Parsley is great in cheese dishes, tomato sauce and just about any kind of gravy. It goes well with curry and combines well with other herbs such as basil, rosemary and oregano. No kitchen should be without a steady supply of parsley.

There is a cosmetic use for parsley oil: it is used in shampoo, perfume, soaps, creams and skin lotion. If you have a rash or irritated skin, boil a handful of fresh parsley, strain it, and add the liquid to your bath to soothe the skin.

Parsley comes in curly or flat leaf, and if you want to have fresh parsley all year, it grows well in a pot indoors as well as it grows in the garden. If you want to preserve parsley, the best way is freezing. To freeze parsley, wash it and spin it dry, then place it on a cookie sheet and freeze it. When it is frozen, place small amounts in small containers or plastic bags so it can be used in small amounts as required.

## Nutella French Toast Cups

(NC)—It is referred to as roti telur in Indonesia, torrija in Spain, and French toast in Canada. No matter what the language there is a universal passion for this delicious dish. Nutella is celebrating World Nutella Day on February 5th by releasing their own recipe for French toast with a twist.

Prep time: 15 minutes / Cook time: 10 to 12 minutes / Serves: 6

**Ingredients:**

- 3 eggs
- 3/4 cup (180mL) low fat milk (2% or less M.F.)
- 1 tsp (5mL) pure vanilla extract
- 1/2 tsp (2mL) ground cinnamon
- 6 slices whole grain bread
- 1/3-cup (80mL) plain low fat Greek yogurt (2% or less M.F.)
- 1 tsp (5mL) sugar
- 1/4 tsp (1 mL) orange zest
- 1 cup (250mL) fresh berries (strawberries, blueberries and raspberries)
- 1/3 cup (80mL) Nutella

**Directions:**

- Pre-heat oven to 350F (180°C)
- Spray a six-muffin, non-stick muffin tin with cooking spray
- In a large bowl, whisk together eggs, milk, vanilla and cinnamon. Dip each slice of whole grain bread in the egg mixture one at a time lightly coating both sides. Gently press each slice of bread into the muffin cups.
- Bake for 10 to 12 minutes or until muffin cups are cooked and golden.
- Remove from oven and let cool for five minutes.
- Meanwhile, in a small bowl, combine yogurt, sugar and orange zest.
- Divide the Nutella equally between the six cups, spreading on the inside. Spoon in some orange yogurt and top with fresh berries.
- Serve with some extra fruit and a glass of milk.



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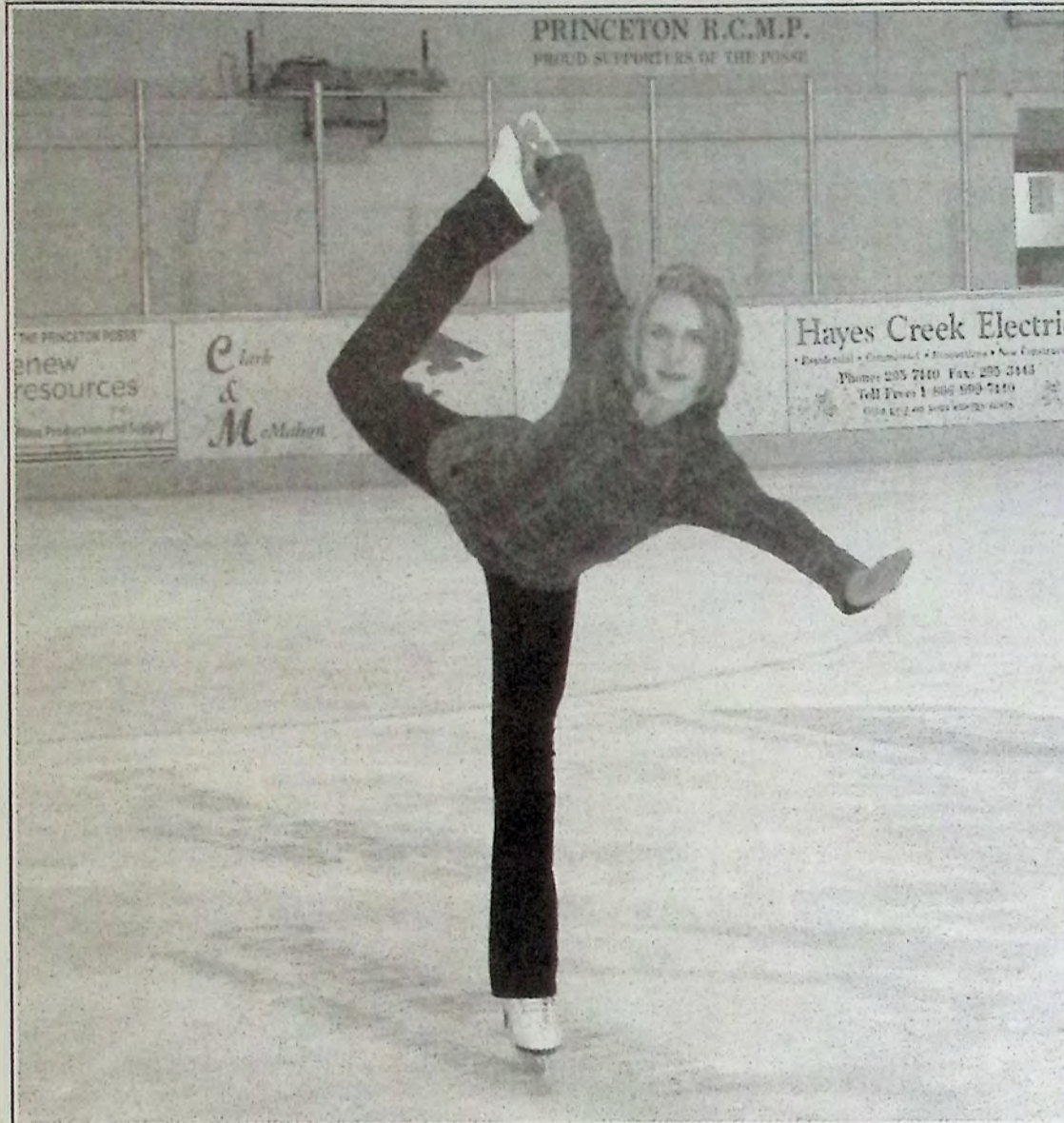

In March 2003 he was a member of a Christian Peacemakers Team in Baghdad in solidarity with the Iraqi people under the "Shock and Awe" bombing of Iraq.  
 Since 1996, Jim Douglass has been

researching and writing on the assassinations of Martin Luther King Jr., Malcolm X, and John and Robert Kennedy. He was the only writer to attend from beginning to end and report in detail on the only trial for the assassination of Martin Luther King Jr., held at Memphis in November-December 1999.

Jim and Shelley Douglass have received the Adin Ballou Peace Award from the Unitarian Universalist Peace Fellowship, the Martin Luther King Award from the Fellowship of Reconciliation, the

Paul Beeson Peace Award from the Washington Physicians for Social Responsibility, the Pope Paul VI Teacher of Peace Award from Pax Christi USA, the Beloved Community Award from Beloved Community Church, the Dorothy Day Award from the Religious Studies Department of Edgewood College, and the Pacem in Terris Peace and Freedom Award from the Catholic Diocese of Davenport, St. Ambrose University, Churches United, Augustana College, and the Stanley Foundation.

..... continued from Front Page -loops and will be promoting the fairgrounds and its events at a booth paid for by the PXA. She will have pamphlets about the fairgrounds and the big events of 2013, along with pamphlets to hand out.

The fairgrounds concession will continue its traditional menu. After consulting with the health inspector, Concession Manager Jennifer Bernard learned she will not have to make a new concession operation manual this year if she stays with the same menu, but if the menu changes, the approval process goes back to square one as each piece of equipment and each procedure will require reviewing. The same holds true if a new concession operator takes over. This was a great relief to Jen, as she spent countless hours last year in preparing the concession operation manual as required. The facility will undergo an inspection again this year, but no problems have been identified.

Rodeo Club President Ken Crompton reported the planning for the Stan Thompson Memorial Team Roping event on May 10, and the rodeo on May 11 and 12 is going smoothly. The club is beginning to plan for replacing the timed event chutes, but there is not enough money to do it this year.

Racing Days Association President Karrie Crucil reported they are well into planning for this year's race meet on June 29 and 30. Osoyoos has asked for dates two weeks before Princeton's horse racing and she is hopeful this will draw more American horses to stay in the area and run in Princeton's races.

Dan Kastor, President of Princeton's Agricultural Fair, has August 24 and 25 locked in on the provincial fairs schedule. Registration and fees for the Little

Britches Rodeo finals on those dates are in process and final approval is likely to be given soon. The Little Britches Rodeo Association has asked that volunteers from Princeton should be available. Anyone wishing to help out with the Little Britches events should contact Dan Kastor at 250-295-6993.

Bob Lind provided information about bucket forks for the fairgrounds tractor. PXA members agreed having forks on the tractor would greatly assist in moving fence panels, picnic tables and mobile stages, and approved an expenditure of over \$200 for the purchase of the forks. Bob Lind has generously offered to attach the forks.

Princeton Lions Club requested storage space for goods to be sold at a yard sale in late May, and offered to leave the unsold goods for the PXA to sell. Members were not opposed to the Lions having a yard sale, but could not provide storage nor did they wish to try to sell yard sale items left unsold. There is a public perception that the fair buildings sit empty when not in use, but a great amount of items are stored in the buildings including grounds equipment and Halloween spook house equipment. Members said they would consider allowing a yard sale at the grounds if everything was removed and the grounds clean after the sale.

Jen Bernard requested October 26 for the community Halloween party this year, and was given immediate approval, thanks to the excellent way the community turned out to help last year, including volunteers who came on Sunday to clean the grounds. The Rodeo Club and Racing Days quickly offered to sponsor the same things they sponsored last year.

Princeton Traditional Music Society is a member of the Arts Council who put on Princeton's annual Traditional Music Festival. This year the festival begins on

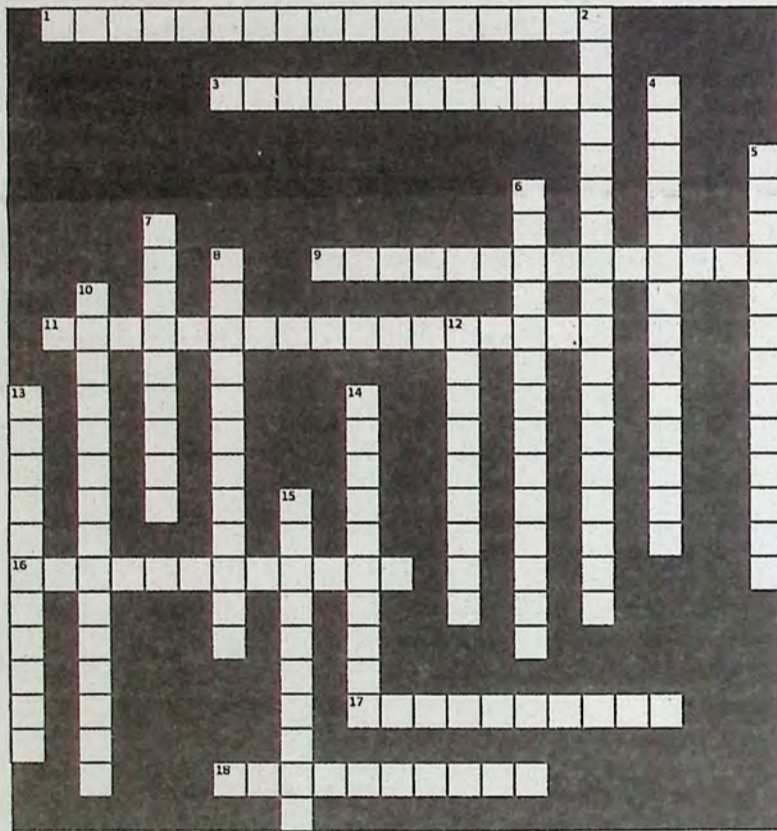

- obstetrics, mental health, long term care, physio, ER, minor surgery, and preventive medicine (dietitians etc.) YouTube Bella Coola Hospital.

**How They Work**

1) Different Payment structure. Doctors are paid by contract. (Alternate Payment Program or

Guaranteed Income Plan)

2) No Doctors are competing for Fee for Service (paid per Patient). Small centres can't sustain a fee for service market as well as supply ER Doctors.

3) Local Administration. Funding still comes from the Province via health authorities. The actual Administration is Local.

4) The Entire Community works together to form the entity for running the hospital. All positions are elected on a rotating basis via the community

**What is Primary Care?**

**Scenario**

Is this an example of primary health care?

**Explanation**

1) Angela is in a car accident and is rushed to emergency.

No

This scenario involves acute care

(the hospital). Primary health care is the kind of care you'd receive from your family doctor, nurse practitioner, physiotherapist, or other first-contact health care provider.

2) Mark takes his baby son Tyson to the doctor for a checkup.

Yes

Ongoing contact with a family doctor for preventive care throughout a person's life is an important part of primary health care.

3) Emily has surgery to remove her appendix.

No

As with Angela's visit to the hospital (above), this is not a primary health care situation. However, if Emily's family doctor was the one who discovered that she had appendicitis and referred her for surgery, that would be an example of primary health care.

4) Working with a dietitian, James and his family doctor develop a plan to help him manage his diabetes.

Yes

This is an excellent example of primary health care, which often involves teams of health care providers working together to help people live better with chronic diseases, such as diabetes.

Primary Care can't meet the needs of the population of Princeton. No ER, No Surgery, No Babies can be born in this community. In many cases patients are already having to travel to Kelowna due to overcrowding in Penticton when faced with emergency.

Under Primary Care this will never change.

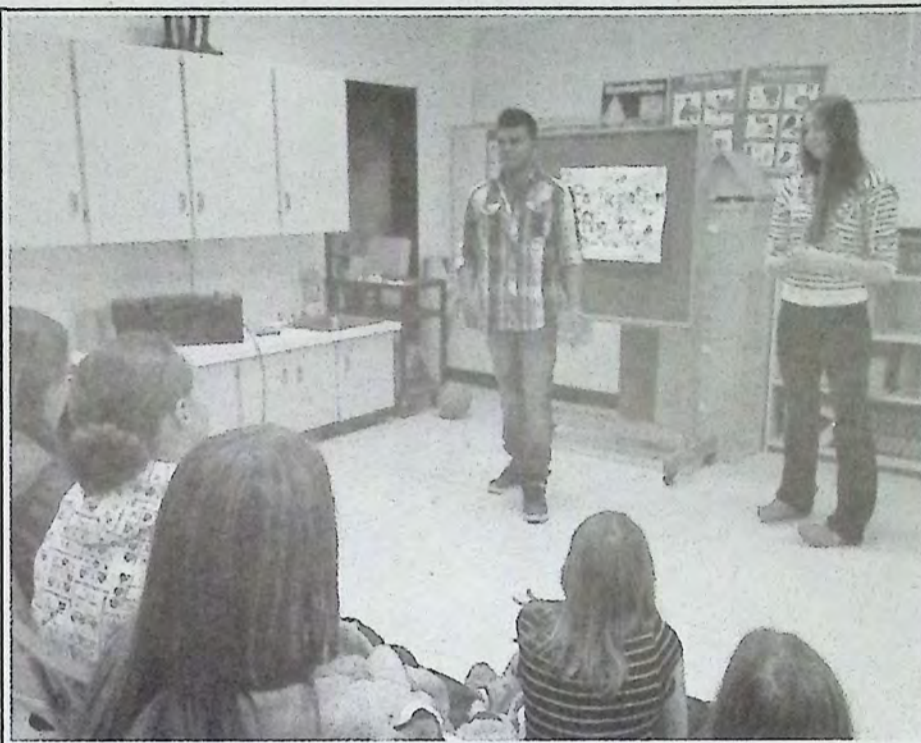

### Mayor wants deer a priority

Councillor Jason Earle was scheduled to give a report at the February 18 Town Council meeting on the urban deer problem. Councillor Earle was unable to attend, but Mayor Frank Armitage had some things to say about the problem.

Mayor Armitage, referring to a call about a deer attacking a dog, said he has real concerns about attacks on children, although no such attacks have occurred to date.

"People shouldn't have to guard their children," he said.

"I am very concerned as a citizen if we don't get a grip on this (the deer problem). Something must be done."

He stated emphatically that the urban deer problem will be a priority

of Town Council.

### Board outlines district budget

At the February 13 Board of Education meeting, trustees adopted the revised 2013 budget which totals \$28,276,884, which is slightly lower than projected. \$464,783 will come from surplus. On April 4, at 6:00 PM at the Board office on Tapton Avenue, trustees and staff will be present to explain the budget process to the public.

At the same meeting, Board Chair Gordon Comeau announced the Provincial Government will replace Nicola-Canford School. This is a small rural school near Merritt. This school is in need of major upgrade, and the government has made it a pilot project on which \$7 million will be spent. The plan is to replace the school with modular units. Similar projects will take place in northern British Columbia. The goal is to evaluate whether modular replacement is more efficient than traditional construction. The government will pay most of the costs. The school district has \$600,000 set aside for any modifications it requires.

### Board praises senior girls

The Board of Education for School District #58 (Nicola-Similkameen) had words of high praise for Princeton's senior girls basketball team, who rank fourth in the province. They may become third if the new ranking system bumps them up from fourth.

"Princeton should be really proud to have a team of this calibre," stated Board Chair Gordon Comeau.

Three members of this team have been offered sports scholarships for their outstanding skills.

### Family Services juggles space

Princeton Family Services Society will be switching locations of some of their services following a request made at the February 4th regular meeting of Town Council.

The Family Centre program, currently located at 120 Kenley Avenue, directly behind the Royal Canadian Legion, has seen a great deal of growth in the past two years.

PFSS asked permission from Town Council to move counselors into the building at 120 Kenley

Avenue with the Family Place program being moved to the Society's building at 56 Kenley Avenue.

Administrative staff would move to the main floor of their current location.

The request, approved by a motion made by Councillor Jason Earle and seconded by Councillor Marilyn Harkness, came before Town Council, as the Town owns the building behind the Legion.

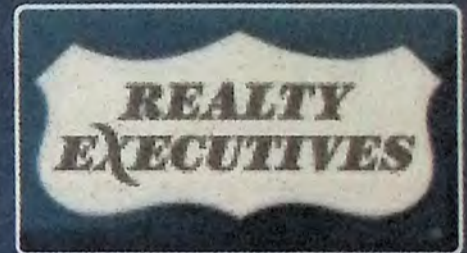
