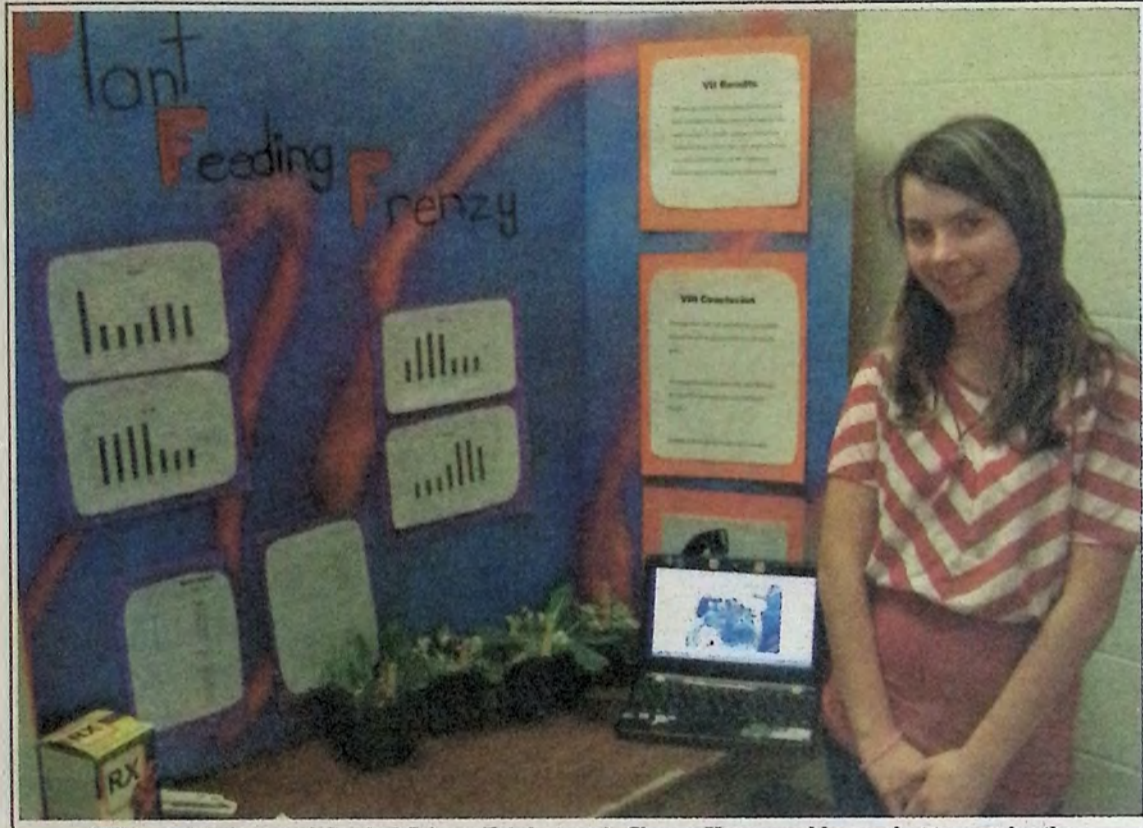

Rodeo Club plans dance

This year's rodeo will have an evening dance featuring Ken McCoy and his band. Members of the Rodeo Club met March 3 to review plans for the upcoming events scheduled for the second weekend in May, and confirmed Ken McCoy is booked for rodeo weekend. The rodeo begins with the Stan Thompson Memorial Team Roping event on Friday, May 10, followed on Saturday with the regular rodeo events beginning at 1:30 PM. Music begins right after the rodeo events. The concession will be serving food and there will be a refreshment garden. In case of cold or inclement weather, tents will be set up for the dance. The cost of attending the rodeo will be \$15.00 for the day, including the dance. For those who do not attend the rodeo, the cost of attending the dance will be \$15.00. Rodeo events will continue on Sunday. The morning will be slack events, with the Princeton final day beginning at 1:30 PM. Posters are being prepared and advertising will be done in newspapers and on radio. Sponsorship letters will be in the mail soon. The next meeting of the Rodeo Club will be at the call of the chair, sometime in mid-April. The meeting will be held at the fairgrounds.

'12 busy for fire department

Town Council accepted Princeton Volunteer Fire Department 2012 Activity Report at their March 4th regular meeting. The fire department responded to a total of 97 call outs and attended 16 public events. Of those call outs 24 were for motor vehicle incidents, 17 were residential property responses, 16 were public assistance related, 12 were for grass and brush fires/lightning strikes. Other calls included 7 for commercial property, 6 to assist BCAS, 5 institutional property responses, 5 vehicle fires, two natural gas leaks, one industrial property response, one downed power line and a request for mutual aid stand by. The 97 calls last year equated to 263 man-hours compared to 86 calls and

126 man-hours in 2011. Previous year totals are 79 calls/169 man-hours in 2010, 145 calls/347 man-hours in 2009 and 94 calls/206 man-hours in 2008. Fire losses in 2012 totaled \$520,000 (\$320,000 for the Town and \$200,000 rural) compared to \$775,000 in 2011 (\$125,000 Town/\$650,000 rural). The biggest fire of the year was the old Argo building in the former highways maintenance yard, which required mutual aid from surrounding fire departments to assist with the call. There was a total of 1,300 hours of practice time put in by fire personnel in the last year with highlights including live grass fire training with forestry firefighters, simulated air-

craft crashes fire training and a live car fire exercise with Hedley Fire Department. "There were 220 commercial Fire Code inspections done in 2012," states Fire Chief Eric Gregson in his report to Town Council. "The inspections identified a prob-

lem building. It has been pre-fire planned as no entry for firefighters due to the egress into the interior, because of the large volume of cars, motor bikes and other household items stored in it." A new fire hydrant was installed at a new building on Burton Avenue and

new evacuation routing and house number/hydrant location maps are at the fire hall. Some new equipment was purchased over the year including new turn out gear (five sets), four pagers, a major servicing of one air compressor and the purchase of a new compress air storage bottle.

Town amends parking bylaw

Town of Princeton Bylaw No. 869, 2013 came into being following a motion made to adopt it made by Councillor Marilyn Harkness at the March 4th regular meeting of Town Council. Councillor Kim Maynard seconded the motion. The bylaw, which received first, second and third readings on February 18th, is a bylaw to amend the Town of Princeton Traffic and Highways Regulation Bylaw No. 866, 2012. The amendments are to include two offences under Schedule B, which

include 'park in disabled parking zone' with a \$100.00 fine attached to it and 'park commercial or industrial trailer or vehicle' worth a fine of \$35.00. Another amendment to the Town of Princeton Traffic and Highways Regulation Bylaw received first, second and third readings at the March 4th regular meeting of Town Council. The amendment to Bylaw No. 866, 2012 is to provide for a two-hour parking limit on Bridge Street and Vermilion Avenue.

The description of the offense as it will appear in Amendment No. 2, Bylaw No. 871, 2013 reads, 'park in excess of two hours on Bridge Street or Vermilion Avenue' and attached to it is a \$35.00 fine. The amendment is due for adoption at the March 18th Town Council meeting. There was no indication of when these bylaws will be enforced by the local Bylaw Enforcement Officer.

Nature In Our Future targets valley bottoms

A private group subsidized through partnerships with a large variety of organizations, including government has outlined a strategy for conservation of 'sensitive' areas in valley bottoms in the South Okanagan and Similkameen watersheds. The strategy was presented to Princeton Town Council and the public on March 4. Very few people attended the public presentation held during dinner hour.

The main concern of the strategy is to preserve and conserve areas in the valley bottoms in which sensitive ecosystems have been identified. The concern is that increasing population in the valley bottoms is wiping out habitats for plant and animal wildlife.

An 86 page book presents a background for the strategy and the strategy itself, but all of this is on the net, with opportunity for feedback, by going to South Okanagan Similkameen Conservation Program (SOSCP). The identifier slogan of the strategy is called 'Keeping Nature in Our Future'.

Protecting biodiversity and species at risk are goals of the strategy, along with limiting development in rural areas. There is concern with climate change, disruption of natural fire cycles due to expansion of rural development, and what they call 'channelization' of meandering

water courses, which means straightening of streams and removal of wetlands such as swamps and marshes.

There is a list of 'sensitive' ecosystems which includes every sort of ecosystem in the valleys, from high elevation alpine areas, mature forests, wetlands, riverbanks, grasslands and rockslides.

Under land use planning and development, the strategy calls for a review and update of approval processes to ensure ecological considerations from the earliest stages of planning regarding private land development and public works. The idea is to use development permits and rezoning applications and bylaw reviews to implement biodiversity conservation priorities and address weaknesses in historic zoning that was not sensitive to ecological values.

Another part of the strategy is to recognize and support the role of non-governmental organizations undertaking habitat restoration and enhancement activities and give them faster access to permits without fees or with reduced fees. The strategy includes the creation of a sustainability checklist for proposed developments, and ensure First Nations unique knowledge, expertise and perspectives are reflected in planning.

The strategy would set targets to define and limit urban and rural development areas.

To implement the strategy, bylaws would divert rural development and population density away from rural regional district areas and into municipalities.

In resource areas or large holdings outside Agricultural Reserve Lands, the strategy states "intensive types of agriculture or resource development should not be permitted" or it should be limited.

The strategy calls for issuing violation tickets and prosecuting people for violations of development permits, and tax exemption programs offering tax relief for property owners who wish to enter into a conservation covenant to preserve natural areas. The strategy would encourage owners to donate private land to a local government or non-governmental organization to ensure long term protection of its natural values.

Whether the Town or Regional District is prepared to implement the strategy is yet to be determined, but the strategy appears to call for a lot of changes in regulations regarding land use, and places enforcement responsibility onto the local taxpayers. The strategy also calls for a lot of government involvement at every level, which will involve a cost.

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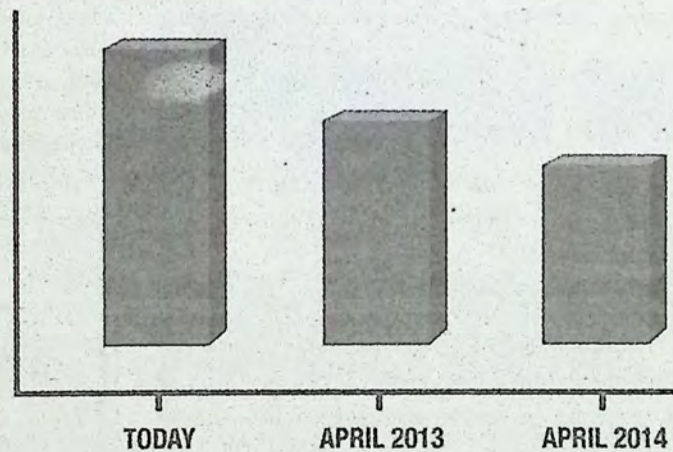

How To Beat A Parking Bylaw

Town Council has brought forward a sneaky bylaw amendment to force downtown business owners to quit parking their vehicles in front of, or near their places of business on Bridge Street and Vermilion Avenue.

While I don't have a real problem with the concept, partly because I'm likely one of the business owners it is targeted at, I do have a problem with a lack of a solution.

Sure, you can tell me there are plenty of side streets for parking but have you looked at any of them lately?

Try parking on Angela Avenue anywhere near Cooper's Foods. The street isn't wide enough for you to park on one side and not get dinged by someone trying to get past your vehicle.

Agenda 21 And Conspiracy: Watch Out!

Some environmentalists can be super-charged extremists. In the ongoing struggle between Agenda 21 opponents and Agenda 21 supporters, I have surveyed dozens of sites on the net, most of them by the opponents, few by supporters, and there is a lot of information worth knowing. There is just as much information or speculation that is so off-the-wall I shake my head in wonder.

There is a population control initiative by some Agenda 21 supporters that makes the hair on the back of my neck stand at attention.

One of the primary objectives of the supporters is population control and/or depopulation. John Lovelock, the man who first voiced the 'Gaia' hypothesis that the planet is a living organism, says democracy must be "put on hold" and "a few people with authority" should run the world so the environmental dangers can be addressed and in particular, climate change.

A Finnish woman, Pentti Linkola, is a rabid environmentalist who has said there should be a world government and people should be forcibly sterilized and the majority of the world's population should be killed!

A Texas University professor, Eric Pianka, has told students the ideal population of the Earth is half a billion people, which would be one-sixteenth of the planet's present population. The rest are excess baggage.

Who goes along with this? Here are some who have spoken out in favour: Ted Turner (founder of CNN), David Rockefeller (very wealthy), John P. Holden (Obama's top science advisor and author of *Ecoscience*), Hillary Clinton, and the Royal Family of England.

Earth's surface is 510 trillion square kilometers. Of this area, 70 percent is water, leaving 357 million square kilometers of land, much of which is considered uninhabitable even if people live there, such as in the Arctic. Current earth population is just over seven billion, leaving one-tenth of a square kilometer for each person. The current birth rate is 134 million per year, and a death rate of 56 million per year. This alarms a lot of people, because the birth rate is more than double the death rate. However, the birth rate is declining and the death rate is climbing. It seems the depopulation crowd would like to speed up the death rate and dramatically decrease the birth rate. They would like to see world population at half a billion, meaning more than 90 percent of us are excess baggage.

What really annoys me about the supporters of depopulation is the fact that the organizations they support do little or nothing to stop or even clean up the pollution of Earth. None of them are among the people picking plastic debris off the beaches in Hawaii. No, it is the ordinary caring people of Hawaii who are doing the work.

Has Prince Charles ever gone out

and cleaned crude oil off a duck? No, this is left to the 'real' environmentalists, ordinary people who care.

The debris from Fukushima is piling up on British Columbia's beaches, and I don't see any real effort by Ted Turner or David Rockefeller to get out there and clean up the mess. No, it will be ordinary caring citizens who do the job, just you watch. Yet, these are likely to be the people who are considered 'excess baggage' by the elite group who support depopulation.

Among the Agenda 21 supporters are people who want to tear down industrialized societies and have us go back to 'sustainable' lifestyles of hundreds of years ago - no systems to deliver energy, education, health care, communication, or comforts. I suspect this group yearns for the days of feudal lords in castles while the peasants live in hovels.

Some of the people who want to tear down industrialized societies also plan a re-wilding, which means wild animals will have huge plots of land on which to enjoy themselves, and people will be confined to specific locations. Can you imagine Canada with millions of moose, elk, bison, wolves, cougars, bears and all the rest propagating as they run free? It would make life fairly precarious for humans. We would have to put up some sturdy walls around those cities! Of course, that might play into the game proposed by those who want fewer humans around.

I do not fear Agenda 21 in and of itself, but I fear the kind of thinking of the people promoting it!

Global warming slows

A team of scientists has wondered at the slowing of global warming between 2000 and 2010, prompting a study by the University of Colorado (Boulder).

The university released a document stating the reduction in the warming trend (25 percent lower than scientists expected) is due to emissions of gases and ash from

volcanoes.

The gases invade the stratosphere and create a cooling condition while the ash is at a lower level and has the same effect. During the decade of reduced global warming, volcanic eruptions were on the increase.

During the past two years, and particularly during 2012, volcanic

activity has increased dramatically.

The winter just over has been the coldest and brought record snow to Russia, United States, Japan, Switzerland and northern India. While records have not been set in many locations, Britain will remember this winter as having more snowstorms than normal, and this will hold true for most of Europe, including Italy, where snow fell in Rome for the first time in decades.

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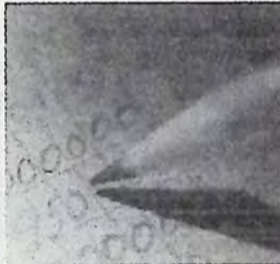

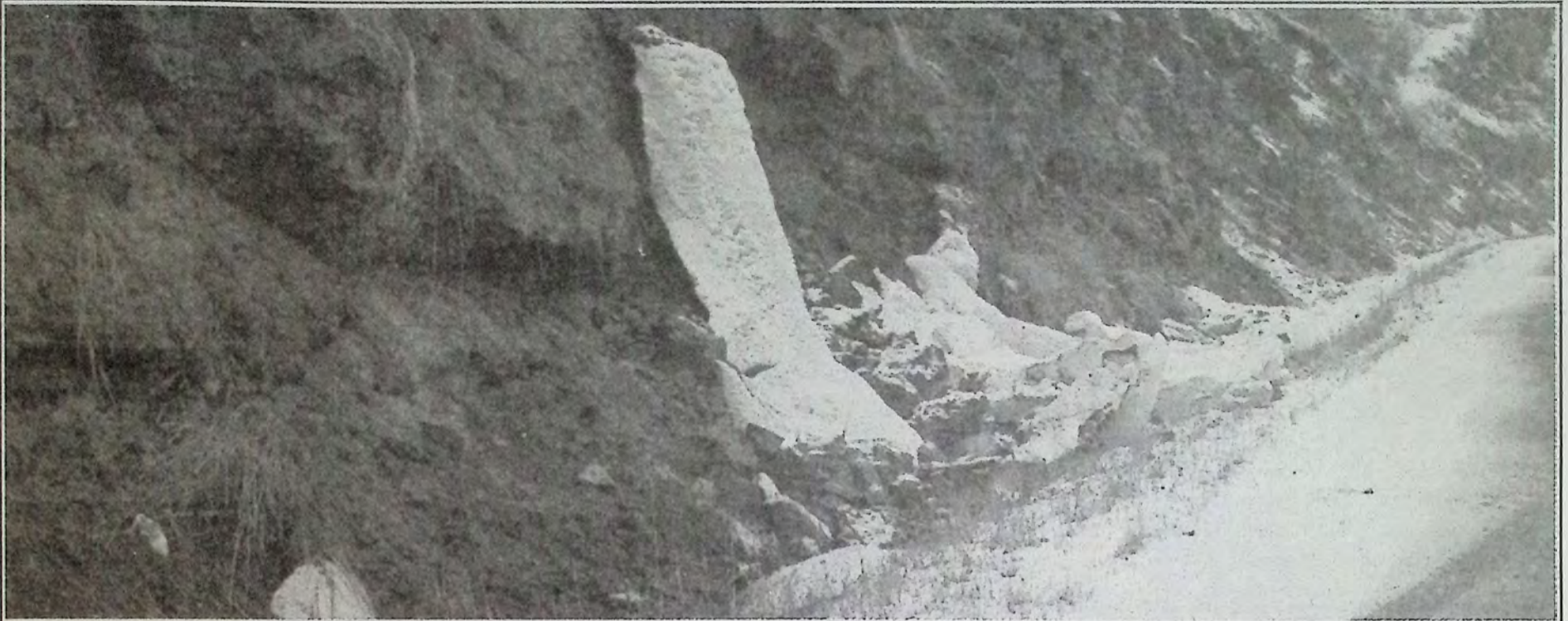

Electoral Area 'G' Report

Hedley's cultural landscape lit up last week, when James Douglass, long time peace activist who wrote JFK and the Unspeakable: Why He Died and why it Matters, visited Hedley's library on March 6th to speak for almost two hours about the book. It was a well-attended lecture, with almost thirty people in the audience. Below is a quote from award-winning filmmaker Oliver Stone about the book:

"Today, more than 45 years later, profound doubts persist about how President Kennedy was killed and why. My film JFK was a metaphor for all those doubts, suspicions and unanswered questions. Now an extraordinary new book offers the best account I have read of this tragedy and its significance. That book is James Douglass's JFK and the Unspeakable: Why He Died and Why It Matters. It is a book that deserves the attention of all Americans; it is one of those rare books that, by helping us understand our history, has the power to

change it."

Douglass owns a home in Hedley, and is descended William Crawford Douglass, a mine manager for the Nickel Plate Gold mine in the 1930's. James has used the house as a writer's retreat as the town offers the peace and quiet which is so conducive to concentration. Residents can be grateful for the Okanagan Regional Library presence in our small town, giving people from throughout the Similkameen an opportunity to hear this phenomenal peace activist and great writer speak in our home town. The Hedley branch has purchased a copy of the book and it is definitely recommended reading.

To Cell or Not to Cell: that is the question... at the Thursday meeting of the RDOS, rural Directors were asked to consider granting Telus a "letter of concurrence" which would authorize Telus to proceed with construction of a cellular monopole at a site which they own in the center of Hedley, at 786 Scott

Street across from the Hedley Senior's Centre.

Telus has indicated that they will NOT consider any other location than the proposed spot. There has been a substantial outcry from Hedley citizens about this specific location, with residents concerned about a myriad of issues, from aesthetics to health concerns and loss to property values.

When the numbers are crunched, there is almost an equal split between the "yes" and "no" voices. (Numbers have been derived from Standard Land's Open House: 44 yes, 5 yes to service -no to the location, and from a petition from a number of concerned citizens: 49

NO to the location.)

There are valid concerns for both sides and with such a close split I have asked the RDOS rural Directors to hold off their decision until we can hear back from the residents using a secret ballot. This will ensure that everybody who is of voting age and a resident within the view-shed of the proposed tower has some say in whether Hedley says, "yes we want cell service NOW, no matter what", or: "no, we don't want cell service if the tower must go THERE".

I proposed this ballot because I have been told by residents they felt intimidated to share their views because of possible harm from fel-

low residents holding the opposite view.

It is really important to consider that this proposed tower will only cover the town and extend a small way out the highway in either direction of Hedley.

No matter what citizens decide about this pole in the center of town, cellular service is coming to Highway #3 via two other cell towers on either side of Hedley, located on Crown land. The most dangerous areas of Highway #3 will have cell service by 2014 no matter what the residents of Hedley decide about the proposed monopole. Please watch your mailboxes for further updates in the coming weeks.

Cure For Obese Canadians?

In British Columbia, one out of every four Canadians is obese. In many other provinces, the percentage is higher. What are Canadians doing wrong? Is it lack of exercise or the kind of food they eat? Could it be both?

Reports of successful weight loss comes from statistics related to the treatment of diabetics and pre-diabetics. Obesity is one of the known forerunners of diabetes and some doctors are treating it successfully through radical dietary modifications. Pre-diabetics are stopping the progress of their condition, preventing diabetes.

The diet consists of drastically cutting down the amount of grains consumed, particularly wheat and baked goods containing wheat gluten. Reducing sugar consumption is part of the diet, too, but most people do not realize that grains are converted to sugar. Grains include wheat, rye, barley, rice, corn and several uncommon grains such as spelt and quinoa.

In addition to cutting out wheat and baked products containing wheat gluten, pre-diabetics must stay away from soft drinks and sweetened fruit juices, and all candy except dark chocolate in moderation.

Salt is an enemy for diabetics, so the diet includes cutting out salt. This means no potato chips, corn chips, ham, sauerkraut, and other salty foods.

People facing this diet think, "What can I eat?" You can eat meat, fish, eggs, yogurt, fruit and vegetables.

The problem arises with snacks and lunches. Snacks can now consist of a mixture of nuts and fruit, soups, salads, and bean dishes, such as chili con carne. Those carrying lunch kits can have a thermos of soup or beans, or they can take a salad to work or school, along with a piece of fruit or raw vegetables.

In some homes, the problem meal is breakfast. People accustomed to opening a box of dry cereal for breakfast may have difficulty finding alternatives. How about a dish of yogurt with a few berries? How about an omelette containing some green onions and peppers? Some people enjoy a bowl of hearty soup or stew for breakfast. Be creative.

Switching to a healthier diet can actually save money. If you are not buying breakfast cereals, toaster waffles, pizza, doughnuts, cookies, cakes, soft drinks, candy and sweetened juices, your grocery bill will probably drop. If you make your own soups, bean dishes, soups and snacks of vegetables and fruits, your grocery bill will drop even more.

Most obese people going on this healthier, diabetes-preventing diet lose 40 to 50 pounds in six months and feel a great deal better.

Mexican Party Potato Salad

(NC)—Canned cream-style corn gives this potato salad a delectable creaminess, without the usual mayo. Perfect for potlucks.

Prep time: 20 minutes / Cook time: 10 minutes

- 3 lb (1.5 kg) Yukon Gold potatoes, scrubbed and cut in 3/4 (2 cm) cubes
- 1 can (540 mL) PC Blue Menu Black Beans, drained and rinsed
- 1 cup (250 mL) diced red onion
- 1 1/2 c[up]s (375 mL) diced sweet red pepper
- 3/4 cup (175 mL) finely chopped green onion
- 3/4 cup (175 mL) chopped fresh coriander
- 1 can (398 mL) PC Blue Menu Cream-Style Corn
- Quarter jalapeno pepper, seeded and finely chopped (optional)
- 3 tbsp (45 mL) fresh lime juice
- 1/2 tsp (2 mL) salt

Bring large saucepan of water to a boil over medium-high heat. Add potatoes; once water returns to boil, reduce heat to medium. Cover and cook for about 10 minutes or until tender. Drain; transfer to baking sheet to cool completely.

Meanwhile, in extra large bowl combine black beans, red onion, red pepper, green onion, coriander, corn, jalapeno (if using), lime juice and salt. Add cooled potatoes; toss to combine.

Makes 10 servings.

Student sentenced to work

Colton Christopher Hudson of North Vancouver, a 24 year old student at BCIT, appeared in Provincial Court in Princeton on March 7 to answer to a charge of possession of illegal drugs. In May 2012 a service station employee reported Hudson to police, saying he reeked of marijuana.

RCMP were given a description of his vehicle and stopped him a short time after the report. The vehicle smelled strongly of marijuana, and police found 20 grams of the substance in the vehicle, along with marijuana cigarettes and hallucinogenic mushrooms.

After entering a guilty plea, Hudson was sentenced to six months probation with conditions

including no weapons and no illegal drugs, and 25 hours of community work service.

Man loses driving privileges

A 49 year old Okanagan resident, Steven Kevin Bank, appeared in Provincial Court in Princeton on March 7 to plead guilty to a charge of driving with a blood alcohol level over .08.

Bank was apprehended after a first report of a vehicle in a ditch, a second report of a similar vehicle parked on a blind corner, and a third report of the vehicle with the driver passed out at the wheel.

Bank was taken to the RCMP station for a breath analysis and blew .250 and .240. When sentenced, Bank was ordered to pay a \$1,200

fine because of the high readings, although he had no prior impaired driving convictions. He is prohibited from driving for one year.

Man serves probation for assault

In Provincial Court in Princeton on March 7, B.P.A. Ruoss entered a guilty plea to a charge of assault causing bodily harm. On November 18, 2012, he had returned to his home to discover 'For Sale' signs being erected on his property without authorization from him. There was a dispute and Ruoss assaulted two people.

Judge G. Sinclair asked Ruoss why realtors were putting up the signs on his property if he had not authorized it. Ruoss explained that his father had died not long before this incident, and Ruoss had inherited the property but under trusteeship. He was led to believe the house would be rented and the rent money would be given to him to help pay his rent in his new residence in Kelowna. Instead, the trustees had put the property up for sale.

Judge Sinclair ordered Ruoss to serve a one year probation and have no contact with the people he had assaulted.

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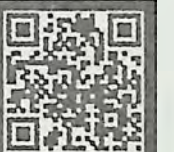

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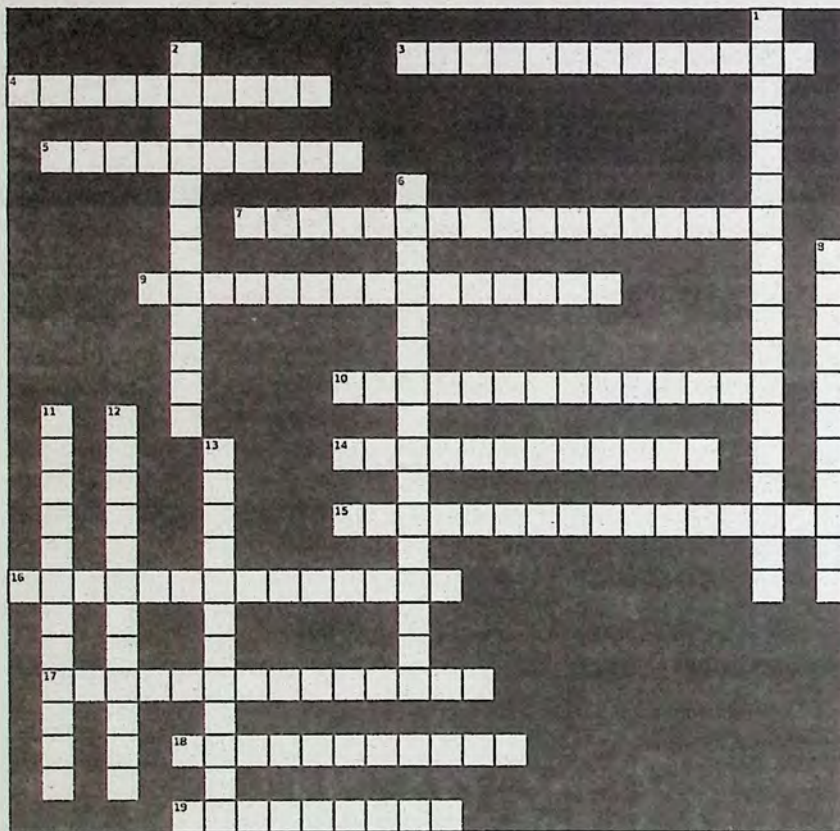

Solving literacy issues a book at a time

For the second year in a row, the Ministry of Education has drastically reduced the amount of funding they are allocating to communities all across BC through the provincial literacy advocacy agent Decoda Literacy Solutions. Decoda's job is to help communities provide literacy outreach programming to those whose literacy needs are not being met through other educational/conventional sources.

As a spin-off of the Winter Olympics in 2010 the provincial government announced several new provincial mandates:

Of significance to literacy, the provincial government wanted to leave lasting legacies behind in the wake of the Olympics and they wanted BC to be the most literate province in Canada.

To get to this means, they developed LegaciesNow 2010 and Literacy BC. Once the Olympics ended and priorities changed, these two agencies were disbanded and Decoda Literacy Solutions was formulated to administer the funds allocated to them through the Ministry of Education. All went well at first. Communities were asked to step forth and develop Literacy Committees/Groups, identify their communities specific literacy needs NOT being met through other means, make partnership connec-

tions, develop programs and hire Literacy Outreach Coordinators to facilitate the programs, learners, partnerships and etc.

Communities did this. Princeton formed Princeton Leaders for Literacy in 2008. By 2009, the local task group was moving forth...identifying literacy gaps, speaking with local groups and individuals on needs and wants for literacy, reaching out to School District #58 who presently has 3 representatives on the Princeton Leaders for Literacy Board, initiating programs and developing a literacy plan specific to our area.

All was still going well. One hundred and two groups were assembled and programs started appearing in over 400 communities as a result. The Ministry of Education doled out 2.5 million to Decoda in that first year. Then, last year things started to go south. The Ministry only handed over 1.5 million in 2012. Decoda was able to dig into their reserves and come up with the extra 1 million dollars so that the good work and successes could continue in all of the communities who took the challenge to make a difference. This year the Ministry of Education decided to only release 1 million to Decoda. This year however, Decoda's reserves are gone and 55 communities lost ALL their funding. The

result: 55 communities will be winding down all their good work, closing programs and turning away those in need. The Liberal Legacy is short-lived, but in their literacy legacy wake lie job loss, literacy gaps, and no hand up for those in need.

Some communities are closing the doors on their programs as we speak. There was no warning, no time and nowhere to turn with such little notice. Other communities, like Princeton, have a few months to find help or they too will face the same future.

At present, Princeton Leaders for Literacy offers computer courses for seniors through the Princeton and District Skills Centre, a tutoring program for anyone with literacy needs whether their needs are for reading basics, English as a second language, high school math or other literacy issues, a book program through Riverside Centre, a child-minding program for parents returning to school, a computer tutoring program through Princeton's Okanagan Regional Library and Princeton Secondary School, Welcome to the World literacy bags for new additions to the community and other forms of literacy aid such as Celebrity Reading Day at John Allison Elementary. "Princeton is already doing more than our fair share to help make these programs work," stated Literacy Outreach Coordinator

waiting for it, but reaching out to us for it. Rural communities were of course the hardest hit as always seems to be the case. Rural BC matters. We vote and pay taxes and contribute 70 % of the money that runs this province. We have needs too. It is time our provincial government starts treating us with the social consciousness we deserve. I am so sick of hearing the word 'sustainability.'

"Everything cannot lie on the shoulder of these 55 small literacy groups. We pay taxes so that our educational and health care needs can be met, but so far our governments are failing us dismally. Everywhere we look cuts are being made to programs that change people's lives for the better. The provincial government has been spending a lot of time talking about creating jobs in this province...cutting these programs is cutting jobs and not just for the 55 Literacy Outreach Coordinators, but to tutors, program facilitators, and many other organizations.

"It is thrown around so much it has lost all meaning. We pay taxes in our First World country to have a good education and good health-care. Canadians should not have to beg for the money back that they paid out for these services. Education, healthcare and social services are not sustainable, but rather supposed to be a wonderful spin-off from living in a wealthy country. If we want to talk about sustainability...where is the governments sustainability with our tax dollars? They are supposed to sustain services they collect taxes for. I am tired of hearing about millions of tax money going to political campaigns and celebrations and cuts being made to essential services. It is very sad for communities and the people of BC.

"The Literacy Outreach Coordinators in all of the communities that I have met have gone way able and beyond to stretch every penny that comes in, but we can't stretch nothing...that is what we have been handed now...thin air with no warning. It is very sad when Canada as a First World country stops caring about those who need our help and who are not just

"We are just asking for 1.5 million back to Decoda...money that effects thousands of people in our province. When did the citizens of BC become so insignificant? We really need the province to reconsider a terrible injustice."

It's bear 'wake up' time again

Black bears in the Okanagan have enjoyed a nice long slumber this year. Temperatures were not too cold, nor too hot. If the good weather continues, from mid to late March, they will soon awaken, and hunger will lure them out of their dens in search of water, a meal, fresh air and sunshine.

Cubs will have been born in the warmth of the den, sometime from mid-January to early February. Due to the pressures of nursing cubs and lack of food, sows can lose up to 35% of their body weight. So, when they emerge in the spring, they are thirsty and hungry; add maternal protection and it easy to understand why we need to be extra cautious about managing our attractants reducing the chances of luring them into our yards, and neighbourhoods.

Using traditional travel routes, spring will see sows, cubs, adolescent bears and big boars (mature male bears) moving up and down the creek beds and pathways between available water, food sources and their dens. Sows will often use backyards (where perhaps they have enjoyed a meal) as temporary shelter, especially if they fear a big male bear may be in the area. Boars are known to attack young cubs, so for the first few months sows are extra protective and can be a bit more defensive if they feel provoked.

Over the winter, we can get a bit lackadaisical about our garbage and refuse habits. Year round best practice around the home is to keep garbage locked up and secure until the morning of pick up. This includes recycling. Recycling can contain plastic food containers that continue to harbour the scents of foods packaged inside. If they are not washed as well as our human dishes, the scent can be really attractive to bears. With a nose that is 5 times better than the best tracking dogs, they can smell a potential meal a long way off.

Birdfeeders should be taken down by Easter, and stored till next Christmas season. Bee hives should be secured by perimeter fencing,

and any pet or livestock feed should be well secured in a barn, shed or garage.

Electoral Areas D, E and F in the Regional District have curbside garbage Bylaws in place, restricting residents to placing garbage to the curb after 5:30 AM on morning of pick-up. Everyone is safer for it.

Even if your area does not fall under a curbside garbage Bylaw, it is sensible to implement the same protocols around garbage and recycling. Not only are the largest predators thwarted by such actions, but rats, raccoons, dogs, and coyotes are also curtailed from spreading garbage. This is a safer, cleaner and definitely more neighbour friendly habit to implement.
