## RCMP arrest triple shooting suspect

The Princeton RCMP and RCMP Southeast District Major Crimes Unit have one male in custody in connection with a triple shooting that occurred Easter weekend in Princeton.

The deaths of the adult man and woman and injury sustained to a third man are being classified as being criminal in nature.

On Saturday, March 30th, at approximately 9:45 PM the Princeton RCMP attended to a complaint of an injured person at a property on Old Hedley Road in Princeton. Subsequent investigation

revealed that this adult male had been shot. The male victim was transported to Princeton hospital and then transferred to another hospital for more advanced care where he remains in serious condition.

Two other individuals (adults), a male and a female were also found deceased inside one of the buildings on the property. The Princeton RCMP along with additional resources from the RCMP Southeast District, including support from the SED ERT continued their investigational efforts through-

## Fire Centre urges caution with outdoor burning

The Kamloops Fire Centre is asking the public to exercise caution with any outdoor burning activities this spring.

As the snow melts, dried grass from last summer is uncovered and that material can be highly flammable. Almost all wildfires at this time of the year are caused by people and are therefore preventable.

Homeowners and industry personnel are encouraged to consult the B.C. FireSmart manual and take the following precautions:

- Ensure that enough people, water and tools are on hand to control the fire and prevent it from escaping.
- Do not burn during windy condi-

tions. Weather conditions can change quickly and the wind may carry embers to other combustible material and start new fires.

- Create a fireguard at least one metre around the planned fire site by clearing away twigs, grass, leaves and other combustible material.

- If you are planning a large burn, consider conducting smaller burns around the perimeter beforehand to create a fuel break and help stop the fire from spreading beyond its intended size. Each of these fires should be kept small and must be completely extinguished before starting a new fire.

- Never leave a fire unattended and

make sure that your fire is completely extinguished and the ashes are cold to the touch before you leave the area.

If you are planning to do any large-scale industrial burning or conduct a grass burn over 0.2 hectares (Category 3 fires), you must obtain a burn registration number ahead of time by calling 1 888 797-1717.

Venting conditions should always be checked before conducting an open burn. If conditions are rated "Poor" or "Fair", open burning is

restricted. The venting index can be found at: <http://www.bcairquality.ca/readings/ventilation-index.html>.

In British Columbia, the Wildfire Act specifies a person's legal obligations when using fire on or within one kilometre of forest land or grassland. If an outdoor burn escapes and causes a wildfire, the person responsible may be held accountable for damages and fire suppression costs.

Anyone found in contravention of an open fire prohibition may be issued a ticket for \$345 or, if convicted in court, be fined up to \$100,000 and sentenced to one year in jail. If the contravention causes or contributes to a wildfire, the person may be subject to a penalty of up to \$10,000 and be ordered to pay all firefighting and associated costs.

## Watch out for ticks!

The annual invasion of ticks begins as soon as temperatures rise to between 15 and 20 degrees Celsius. These ticks live on the ground in grassy areas, particularly along wildlife trails. The ticks feed on blood, attaching themselves to warm-blooded animals, including humans, and sucking blood until they are full and drop off. These insects can be black, brown, or spotted, and are shiny and shaped like a tiny crab with a pointy head.

Some of these ticks carry a serious disease called Lyme disease. Due to

the potential for Lyme disease, anyone discovering a tick attached to their skin should have it removed at a physician's office or an emergency room. The tick should then be sent to a medical laboratory to determine whether it is carrying Lyme disease.

Ticks most often attach themselves to the softer areas of the body, especially behind the knee, in the groin, underarms and at the hairline on the neck. Do not attempt to pull the tick loose by squeezing it. If you are out in the wilds where you

do not have rapid access to medical help, the best method is to cover it with a heavy oily substance such as petroleum jelly, as this clogs the insect's airways and it will back off. Then take the tick to a medical



# Museum reviews great year

Princeton's Museum and Archive Society held its annual general meeting on March 27. The meeting began with a review of a highly successful year. Sales of books brought in \$2,380, visitors donated a total of \$6,000, student grants brought in \$12,562, Town taxpayers granted \$24,000 and RDOS granted \$3,500. The number of visitors increased.

Operating costs totaled \$43,900, which covered the cost of the manager, who works part-time, and the cost of improvements to the archives, supplies, and other basics.

President Bob Wicks said he has spent an interesting two years participating in the stewardship of the museum.

"Creating a museum is a unique experience," he said.

He remarked on the excellent publicity received from a columnist who

wrote 'next to the provincial museum, Princeton museum is a must-see'.

Activities at the museum included the usual archives work and visitors tours, but the society worked on strategic planning, volunteer recruitment, management of artifacts, and administration. A lot of progress was made in the archives, Manager Robin Lowe told members. The biggest accession was the Granite Creek mining records, the earliest in the province, all hand written. Improvements were made in the storage of the museum's collection of artifacts.

An educational program was developed for students from kindergarten to Grade 12 and there were a number of student tours of the museum, as well as summer camps for youth and a Girl Guide sleep-

over adventure. This program will be expanded this year.

Seniors from Ridgewood toured the museum and enjoyed it.

Plans for the future include fundraising ideas, as well as expansion of the gift shop, research fees, facility rentals, photo sales, a raffle of a doll house in June, and creation of a money tree for recognition of private donors. Each leaf on the tree will represent a donor, and the donors on the brass plaques that were in the old museum will be recognized on the tree.

Improvements to the livery stable and the outbuildings are planned for the coming year.

A special summer exhibit will be The History of Toys. The museum would appreciate any donations or loans of toys, particularly those

# Flip Of The Coyne

In Nova Scotia the provincial government just put the brakes on the development of salmon farms after DFO said that there was some risk

to wild stocks. Why does DFO believe that fish farms are a threat to wild stocks on the east coast when here on the west the science shows

that they are actually impacting wild BC salmon?

I don't know if I blame DFO. They are taking orders from the Minister

of Oceans and Fisheries and they have a mandate to promote fish farms. I know that the people of the Department of Fisheries and Oceans are really not the people who should be the ones promoting fish farms when they are the same people who are supposed to be protecting wild fish stocks. It seems like there is a bit of a conflict there.

Fish farms off the BC coast have been contaminating the salmon runs for years now and the science is proving that they are making BC wild salmon sick. Independent scientists have proven that British Columbia's wild stocks are sick with diseases that have the ability to destroy the entire population of native salmon, yet in BC the DFO and the provincial ministry deny that there is anything happening in BC's waters. Why would the DFO have one story for one coast and another for the other coast?

This past week a humpback whale was discovered inside a salmon farm on the west coast of Vancouver Island. The company claims that the whale must have drifted into the farm but DFO investigators are not so sure about that story. There is some speculation that the whale

may have become trapped in the predator nets that surround the farm. It just happens that this incident comes on the heels of another fish farm was cleared of the drowning of 65 sea lions. I try not to jump to conclusions but when you start adding two and two together there seems to be a bigger problem with these farms and the predator nets as well. Maybe DFO just can't do the math or maybe they don't want too.

I shouldn't be so hard on the DFO. Its frontline workers are top notch. The problems seem to be higher up the chain of command. The Cohen report proved this when senior DFO talking heads couldn't give the same answers as the scientists. As I said earlier there seems to be direction from the Ministry which as we have seen the over the last year is more about an agenda from the Prime Minister's Office. Science that does not directly promote the government's agenda is either marginalized or the ministry faces budgetary cuts. DFO seems to be the brunt of these cuts more and more often as the Harper government changes environmental protection regulations and laws. The DFO workers ..... continued on Page 9

### Time For Me To Vent

I think I dislike this time of year about as much as I like it. Springtime is a wonderful time of year to do some open burning and that's the part I am really starting to dislike.

Air quality issues are a frequent item of discussion in our home and backyard fires add fuel to the argument that the clean air you breath in Princeton is not really all that clean.

The venting index provided by the Ministry of Environment (web address on the front page of this issue of the News Leader) is for you to help determine whether or not it is a good day to light up that pile of branches sitting in your yard.

While the venting index is a good idea, it's a little deceiving in that the closest reading to Princeton is identified as 'Okanagan' and I'm sure you don't want me to explain all over again that we are not in the Okanagan.

The deceiving part comes from a 'good' venting index reading in the Okanagan taken on a clear day when in actual fact it's an overcast day in the Upper Similkameen.

If you use the venting index I can't fault you for burning on a 'good' venting day according to the website data provided by the MoE. What I could blame you for is not using a little common sense when the Okanagan reading is 'good' and it's overcast outside.

The RDOS has been pushing their clean burning programs for years and are in the process of promoting the annual woodstove exchange program. It doesn't take a rocket scientist to figure out the agenda of that one.

They are trying to clean up the air by getting woodstove owners to turn in their old units and switching to newer, better (cleaner) burning units and toss in a rebate as an incentive.

They are also beefing up open burning regulations throughout the entire region because some people still burn yard waste on overcast days without thinking about it.

Expect an Air Quality Bylaw to come across the table at the Town Council level some time soon. There are already fines in place for burning outside 'normal' outdoor burning times (unless you have special permission) thanks to forest fire risks.

It won't be long before you won't be allowed to burn branches in your yard and you'll be faced with doing what most of us are already doing with them, recycling.

When that day comes you'll be surprised how clean the air around Princeton can really be.

To The Editor;

The Finance Minister made his budget speech on March 21st. As I sat in the House of Commons and listened while I browsed through the glossy budget literature, it actually did not sound too bad. However, as I read through various analyses of the content, it became clear that Budget 2013 left a lot to be desired.

Let's have a look at the announcement of Infrastructure spending: According to David MacDonald of the Canadian Centre for Policy Alternatives (CCPA), the \$14

Billion over 10 years infrastructure announcement is not what it appears to be. The government is just re-announcing existing programs like the gas tax transfer and 75% of this money is actually going to be spent in or after 2020. In 2014-15, there will be a \$1 Billion cut to the infrastructure transfers to the cities. As Mr. MacDonald goes on to say, "The Building Infrastructure Fund is one of the foundations for federal-municipal infrastructure spending. It is currently spending \$1.25 Billion a year and expires in 2013-14. The Federation of Canadian Municipalities (and the Alternative Federal Budget) was looking to have this fund renewed and significantly increased. Instead, spending in 2014-15 has gone from \$1.25 Billion to only \$210 Million - a significant drop."

The current P3 fund is being renewed at \$1.25 Billion over 5 years, however, many cities are not

## So Agenda 21 Is A Conspiracy Theory, Eh?

I just loved the letter to the Editor written by Rob Rubis. First of all, I love knowing people are reading this column, even if it is to point out my errors. Thank you, Rob. Secondly, he branded the whole Agenda 21 discussion as a conspiracy theory. You can look up Agenda 21 on the web under UN Agenda 21 and you will discover there is an Agenda 21 and 178 nations signed it. Take a close look at chapter 7, Human Settlement, and take it seriously.

The conspiracy theory label has been pinned onto anyone who objected to the ways in which Agenda 21 is being implemented. There are thousands of people in every state in the United States and thousands of people in Australia who are against Agenda 21 and voicing their objections loudly. One branch of the American Republican Party, called the Republican Tea Party, is solidly campaigning against Agenda 21. There appear to be a lot of conspiracy theorists out there.

I have just finished reading a book by Rosa Koire titled Behind the Green Mask, published by The Post Sustainability Press. I felt lucky to be able to get it, as there were few copies left on Amazon.com. In this book about Agenda 21, Koire describes how long it took her to catch on to the fact Agenda 21 exists as she fought measures designed to implement the plan. Then she describes the methods of implementation and what she believes are the goals of the plan.

I liked the part where she describes the buzz words of Agenda 21, words all of us have become accustomed to hearing but never attached any great signifi-

cance to them. These words are a learning experience. Buzz words include consensus, progressive, community, carbon footprint, smart, vision, stakeholders, regional, green, and sustainable. These sound so non-threatening, even appealing. Of course, that is what we want, don't we, is words that sound appealing?

I related these words to a recent document presented to Regional District. The document, titled Keeping Nature in Our Future, is about the sustainability of biodiversity in the South Okanagan and Similkameen region, and calls for Regional District to sign on to pass laws governing the use of land in the regional district, at considerable expense to taxpayers. The presenters held a public meeting in Princeton but it was from 5 p.m. to 7 p.m. and only four people attended. The rest of us were eating dinner. Odd time for a public input presentation, was it not?

In this document are lots of buzz words: vision, regional, sustainable, stakeholders, community and footprint. The document also contains strategies Koire identifies as those things we have to be aware of.

The first strategy is to make legislation at the regional level, where few local people can have a say. Then there is the problem that arises as a non-governmental group lobbies a regional government to pass laws and regulations. The biodiversity group are non-governmental and want laws and regulations passed at the regional level where you and I don't have much say, or even much knowledge of what is going on.

In Behind the Green Mask, Koire discovered "the lines between government and non-government groups begin to blur" and people we elect are being influenced strongly by people we did not elect.

Koire warns about an Agenda 21 initiative which calls for removing people from rural areas and moving them into cities. In the booklet about maintaining biodiversity in our region, there is a statement in the implementation section that recommends using legislation and regulations to move rural people into cities.

This is not the real Agenda 21. The real Agenda 21 says every-

thing should be done to prevent the drift of rural people to cities. Agenda 21 Chapter 7 says people should have access to the land and its resources. You see, it is not the real Agenda 21 that is the problem, it is the way some groups have chosen to implement it, distorting the goals to serve goals of certain groups.

Throughout the biodiversity booklet there are repeated calls to recognize and work with non-governmental agencies. In other words, let the non-elected people develop the strategies and the elected people can pass the laws that make the strategies work. What this does is legitimize non-elected agencies and their agendas.

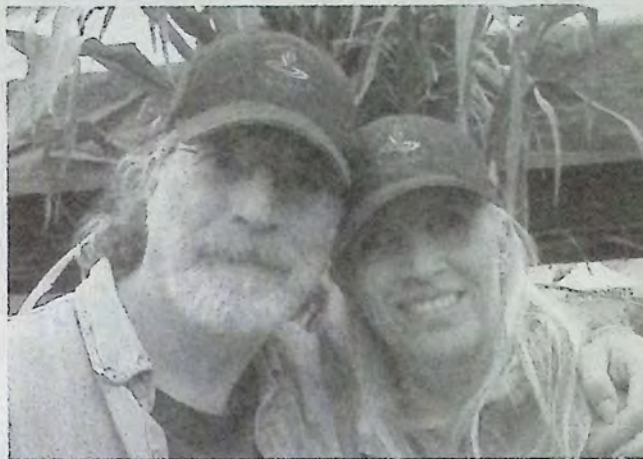
Another section of the biodiversity document I find alarming is that it identifies people on ALR land as the enemy. Under the heading Conflicts between Agricultural Land Commission Act and Biodiversity Protection, this document laments the power of the Agricultural Land Commission to remove agricultural lands from ESDPAs (environmentally sensitive development permit areas). In short, biodiversity legislation, when it arrives, cannot be enforced on land in the ALR, which is about the only protection rural people will receive if those biodiversity regulations are passed by Regional District.

The biodiversity booklet Keeping Nature in Our Future talks a great deal about laws, regulations and tickets and fines for violations. What it does not tell property owners is the impact it will have in practical terms. Suppose you have a small slough on your land and it contains a species of insect, we will call them widgymidges, rarely seen in this area. This could be identified as a sensitive piece of ground. You cannot drain this slough, and you will be obliged to protect it. If you want to sell your land, you will have to inform the buyer this is a sensitive area and the regulations governing it. In the meantime, you will be encouraged to turn it over to a land conservancy or trust which will take a chunk out of your property forever. Furthermore, you will be paid for this with your own tax dollars (grants given by government to the land trust non-governmental organization). Further, the plan is to build a network of protected areas. God help the landowner

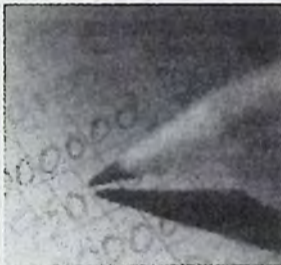

## New site operator, creative planning for Grist Mill

The Grist Mill, one of the Similkameen region's most prized historic gems, will have a vibrant future with a new site operator and conservation management plan, announced Minister of Forests, Lands and Natural Resource Operations Steve Thomson on March 25th.

The Grist Mill Conservation Management Plan lays out the goals and strategies for transitioning the site toward a more economically sustainable operation.

The new site operator, Chris Mathieson of Mathieson Heritage Services, was chosen through a request for proposal process.

Mathieson has an extensive and successful background as a 14-year veteran of the B.C. museum community. Most recently, he helped increase visits to the Vancouver Police Museum from 4,000 to 21,000 visits annually. Mathieson's skills and experience will help to ensure the long-term success of the historic Grist Mill site.

The site operator term runs April 1, 2013 to March 31, 2014, with an option to renew for an additional year. This term provides the Heritage Branch time to explore new business model options with the operator and to consider the recommendations of the conservation

management plan.

The B.C. government's recently released Heritage Strategy for British Columbia: Our Heritage, Historic Places outlines the Province's future plans to ensure B.C.'s historic places remain an active and dynamic part of B.C. communities.

"Having a forward looking plan and innovative site operator are essential to help ensure the Grist Mill remains a vibrant and alluring part of the Keremeos community. I look forward to hearing the innovative ideas Mr. Mathieson has for the site," states Steve Thomson, ..... continued on Page 7

## Donation aims at saving pets

Ask any pet owner and they will tell you one of their biggest fears is losing their four-legged friend.

That fear escalates if you add a vehicle accident or house fire into the equation.

Thanks to a donation made last week by Bob Smylie of Princeton, pets found in those situations stand a better chance of survival.

Marketed under the name of Wag'N O2 Fur Life (get the play on words?) each first responder kit contains three oxygen masks (one each of small, medium and large) which can be used on dogs, cats, ferrets, rabbits, guinea pigs, birds and more, three oxygen air tubes for each mask (22mm diameter), a carry bag for easy storage and mobility, a laminated instruction sheet which includes the ABC's of CPR for Cats and Dogs, a kennel lead for animal restraint and control, two animal incident report forms, two Pet Oxygen Masks On Board decals and an instructional DVD titled 'Pets Need Oxygen Too.'

The specially-designed animal masks can be used both on conscious pets that have suffered from smoke inhalation and pets that need to be resuscitated after losing con-

Lyme disease is difficult to detect if the infected person does not inform a medical practitioner of a tick bite. Lyme disease can mimic many other diseases.

Initial symptoms include flu-like conditions of aching muscles, and can go on to become much more severe. People are often told to watch for a rash after a tick bite, but according to the Arizona Lyme Treatment Center, half those infect-

sciousness from exposure to dangerous toxic fumes.

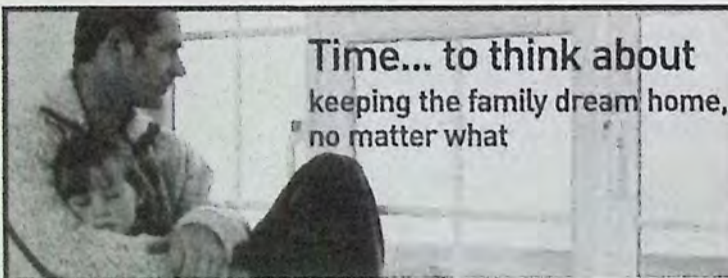

# Saddles 'n' Spurs

One of my brothers acquired an ex-race horse, a thoroughbred. He thought he might be interested in riding as well but his desire to ride was soon gone and he was neglecting his horse.

The horse was pastured on another small farm close by where there was no shelter. Lynn Valley gets an average of 150 inches of rain per year and the horse got severe rain scall. Rain scall causes the loss of hair and sores

full of puss on the back. It's really gross. This was new for me so I called the vet who came to look at the horse and give me advice. He said that the best thing to do was to put mineral oil on the infected areas.

After school I went to the local service station and bought a quart of 10/30 oil and each day I went to the horse and applied this mineral oil on his back. The problem was just not getting better, in fact the horse seemed to be getting sicker all the time so I phoned the vet and told him that the horse was getting worse, and he asked if I was putting mineral oil on it and I told him yes, every day and I had bought it at the gas station. He informed me quickly that wasn't the kind of mineral oil he had suggested! I bought the right oil and eventually the horse was cured.

One day my cousin came to visit me and wanted to go riding. So we rode over to Lynn Canyon Park and crossed the river and began to climb up the hill where a pipe line was being installed. While my horse was quite calm and had no problem, the thoroughbred was right out of his territory.

He reared up, fell over backwards and landed upside down in the trench that was dug for the pipeline. He was ahead of me by about 20 or 30 ft. and I could hear the poor horse's heartbeat from where I was.

He was terrified! I got off my horse and the two of us ran to the horse in the ditch, whose head was on the uphill side. It was thrashing and kicking but couldn't get up. Fortunately the hill was steep enough that we could lift his head up as he was fighting and flip him over in the ditch so he came back up on his feet and scrambled out of the ditch. Some may disagree but I don't think thoroughbreds make good trail horses.

## Living Past 100

### Grow Good Food At Home

Planting a food garden seems too much trouble to a lot of people, and impossible to those dwelling in apartments, but where you can put any kind of planter is a place where you can grow radishes, green onions, potatoes, or just about anything you might like to eat. You can grow tomatoes that climb a lattice, and you can grow pole beans in the same pot using the same lattice. If you have a small strip of growing space along a fence, you can grow beans, cucumbers and tomatoes that climb, and you can grow beets, carrots, chard, onions, corn and potatoes in the ground alongside the climbers. You would be amazed at the amount of food you can grow in a space 70 cm. wide and six meters long.

Why grow your own food?

Canadians live in a harsh climate and must import most of their winter fruit and vegetables at a high cost. Most commercially grown crops contain contaminants from sprays and/or fertilizers. Home grown food tends to be organic and healthier. To add to the advantage of home grown food, there is money saved. If you can buy a packet of seeds for a dollar and reap \$20 worth of food from it, that is a good deal.

You can even start growing food indoors right now if you have the space in front of a sunny window. You could put a couple of seed potatoes in a bucket of dirt and they would grow. You could have baby spuds by June. You could plant onion bulbs called 'sets' in a basin of dirt and have green onions in six weeks or less. Do the same with radish seeds and you could have radishes in a month. Right now, you could plant containers on a porch and cover them at night. You could have baby beets by the end of May.

If you have children, planting a garden becomes a learning experience. Children are always amazed when they learn how a tiny seed becomes something big that they can eat. Being able to provide their own food or being assured that you can provide it yourself gives them a sense of confidence in you and in their own ability to provide for themselves. Growing food is an achievement to be proud of. Being involved with growing food may make them more aware of how all plants grow, and the processes that are part of plant life. It may teach them to value plants more, because without plant life, none of us have life.

Creating abundance for ourselves, and teaching children that they can create abundance, gives a satisfying perspective to our lives. Planting a radish seed and seeing the little shoot come up gives us a sense of optimism, and optimism is a very healthy attitude toward life. Optimistic people live longer.

## Grilled Shrimp and Watermelon Summer Salad

(NC)—With all the time you spend this summer under the sun or next to the grill, be sure to cool off with something refreshing and delicious. Whether that's a splash of ice-cold lemonade, a dip in the pool or a delectable meal, the options are endless.

For a quick and easy side dish or meal idea, try this summer salad that is bursting with exotic summer flavours. Salty feta is the perfect balance for sweet, crunchy watermelon, and when paired with marinated grilled shrimp, it makes a gorgeous summer meal.

Serves: 4 / Prep Time: 15 minutes / Marinating Time: 30 minutes / Cook Time: 10 minutes

- 1 lb (500 g) jumbo shrimp (about 16), peeled and deveined
- 3/4 cup (175 mL) VH sweet Thai chili sauce
- Pam Grilling Spray
- 2 cups (500 mL) cubed watermelon
- 1-1/2 cups (375 mL) large croutons
- 1 cup (250 mL) halved grape tomatoes
- 1 cup (250 mL) torn fresh basil leaves
- 1/2 cup (125 mL) crumbled feta cheese
- 3 tbsp (45 mL) freshly squeezed lemon juice
- 3 tbsp (45 mL) extra virgin olive oil
- 1/2 tsp (2 mL) freshly ground pepper

- Place shrimp in large shallow dish. Pour 1/2 cup (125 mL) of Thai chili sauce over shrimp, turning so that all shrimp are well coated. Cover and marinate at room temperature for 30 minutes.
- Reserving sauce from dish, thread shrimp onto 4 skewers.
- Spray grill with Pam Grilling; heat to medium-high heat. Grill skewers, basting with reserved sauce during first 5 minutes only, until shrimp are opaque, approximately 10 minutes.
- Meanwhile, in large serving bowl, lightly toss together watermelon, croutons, tomatoes, basil and feta cheese.
- In separate small bowl, whisk together remaining Thai chili sauce, lemon juice, olive oil and pepper.
- Remove shrimp from skewers. Arrange on top of salad. Drizzle about 3 tbsp of vinaigrette over salad, tossing gently. Serve with remaining vinaigrette on the side.

Tip: If using wooden skewers, submerge completely in water and let soak for 30 minutes before using to prevent charring.

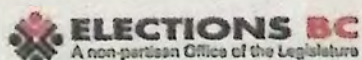

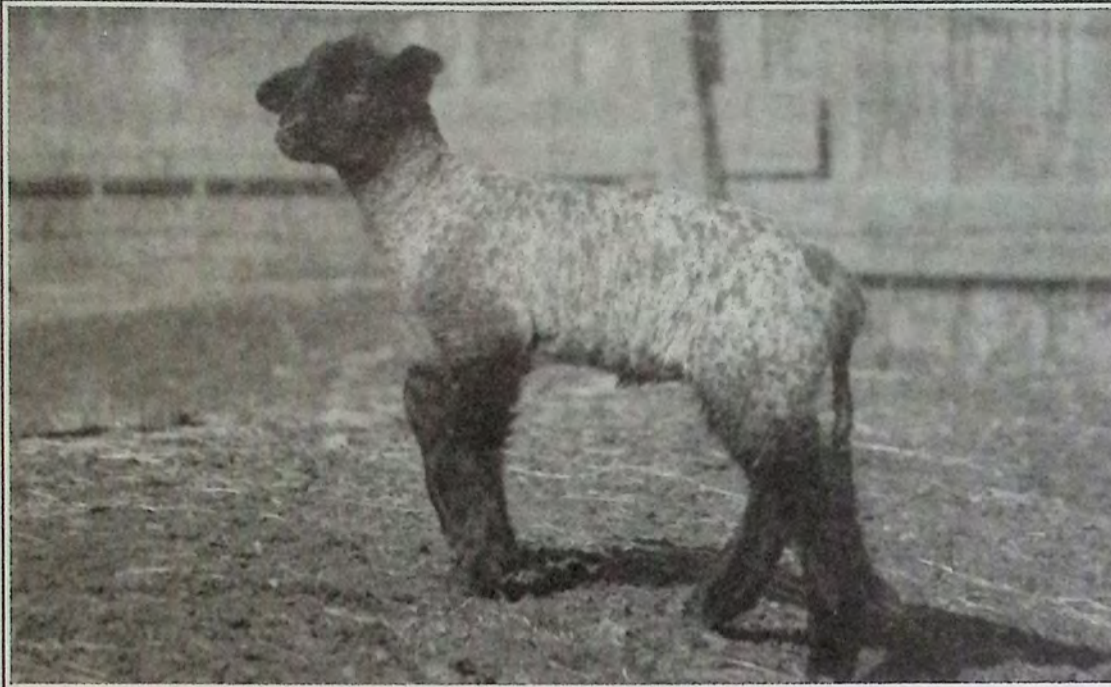

# Electoral Area 'G' Report

In the last few weeks since the March 7th Regional District Okanagan-Similkameen Board meeting, much misinformation has been lobbed around the town of Hedley respecting the proposed Telus monopole. As a person who has been elected to fairly represent the voices within "Area G", I feel it is important for people to understand the situation and its complexity.

There has been a tendency for people to VASTLY oversimplify the issue into a "pro-cell" or "no-cell" stance, which is a classic example of "all-or-nothing" thinking so dangerous to our advancement as a civilization.

Standard Land, acting as an agent for Telus, held an Open House in Hedley on November 8, 2012. In describing the Open House, Chad Marlatt of Standard Land states, "approximately 25 (people) made written comments - only four (4) comments received were not in favour of the proposal."

When reviewing the documents provided by Standard Land for RDOS scrutiny, I can find only 24 written comments; one is by a child. Among those written comments, two were in favour of cell service but not the location, one was in favour of cell service but had questions about the location, and one was in favour of preserving status quo (no cell service). In contrast, the petition opposing the proposed location contained forty-nine (49) signatures.

One person who attended the Standard Land Open House commented, "all they had was salespeople and no-one who could answer tough questions. I wanted to know how Canada's Safety Code measures up to standards in Europe and they could not speak to that."

At the March 7th Regional District Board meeting I proposed that the residents of Hedley within the range of the proposed tower be given an opportunity to vote on the proposed tower location. I felt that it was important for affected residents to realize that this location was the ONLY location which Telus would entertain, and that if Hedley was to receive cell service, it would only occur if the monopole was erected at 796 Scott Avenue. Regional District staff immediately devised a coverage map and mailing list, preparing for the secret ballot I had requested for our citizens. By Monday, March 11th, we were informed that Telus had decided to pull its proposal, indicating that it did not have time to hear back from the residents.

Allegations have been made maligning the character of individuals who signed the petition oppos-

ing the placement of the cell tower at the proposed location. "Word on the street" follows in bold.

• **A covert conspiracy has worked to prevent the opportunity of cell service and internet access.**

Approximately five years ago, the Hedley Country Market (location the recent Telus monopole petition was placed) was the site chosen for a petition REQUESTING cell service in Hedley. Clearly the owners of the store allow petitions both asking for cell service and protesting cell tower locations to gather signatures in their venue.

A resident who contributes regularly to at least two of our important social organizations placed a petition in our community grocery store as it is a centre of business for many residents who do not drive out of town to spend their dollars in larger centres.

The corner store was likely chosen as a location for the petition because many people visit it and the person who created the petition had a finite period of time (approximately two weeks after the TELUS Open House) to collect the signatures she needed to indicate to Telus that there was significant opposition to the location which Telus had proposed for its cell tower.

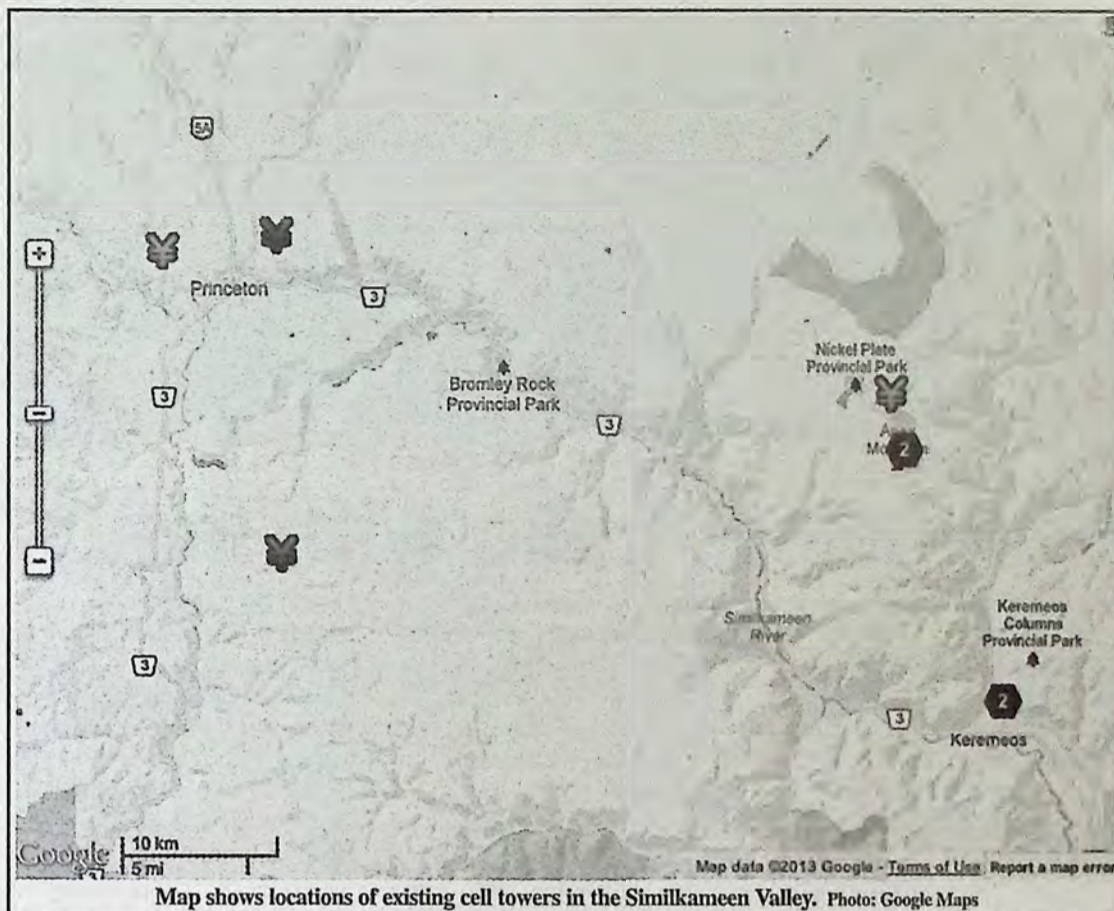
The Canadian Wireless Telecommunications Association states: "Industry Canada generally considers that once a participating land-use authority is contacted, the consultation process should be concluded within 120 days." Telus had a 120 day period "for comment" under the guidelines of its industry organization, but tells us that there is not enough time to continue the dialogue, which is why it is pulling out of Hedley without giving residents a fair opportunity to vote using a secret ballot.

Shaw cable has recently mailed out information to the users of its satellite service that it will be making high-speed internet available to its customers. The town is currently serviced by a China Creek internet which provides a high-speed service from 1.5 Mbps to 5Mbps which costs from \$44.95 a month to \$149.95 a month.

• **Transients were responsible for signing the petition in Hedley Country Market**

Eleven (11) of the signatories are, or have been, members of our community's leading social and political organizations, including the Hedley Improvement District, the Hedley Volunteer Fire Department, the Hedley Heritage Museum Society, the Hedley Farmer's Market, the Woodlie Park Committee, the OAPO and the Hedley Community Club.

documents have been lauded as "open, fair and transparent" compared to the questionable validity of the petition placed in the Hedley Country Market "where drunks sign up when they are buying their bottle of wine."

One of the twenty-four (24) responses received from the Standard Land Open House was written by a resident boy under the age of 16 who is neither a landowner nor of voting age; regularly the Hedley Improvement District elections will not even allow the opinion of non-landowners in decision-making.

• **The "preamble" of the petition protesting the location of the proposed monopole has been questioned and derided. The most salient point of any petition is not the preamble (the explanation) but the requested outcome:**

"We oppose the Telus proposal to construct a cell phone tower at 796 Scott Avenue."

• **Those who oppose the proposed location of the monopole deny the modernization of the town and prevent the economic development offered by a cellular service.**

I have been privy to many conflicting opinions held by Hedley residents, who cite safety concerns (both for and against cell-service/proposed tower location), who cite fear of recrimination for stating their views (residents who contest the location and fear harm for voicing dissenting to the tower proposal) and those who believe that our town's future prosperity hinges on this vital service.

While I know of no-one who moved to the Similkameen Valley

because of the location's technological advantage, I do know that Hedley offers one of the rarest things available in the modern world: functional community groups that care for our community. These social organizations take care of people-our OAPO (Senior's Centre) dinners are regularly delivered to those unable to attend. Grace Church and Hedley Community Club together raised more than \$1,000 recently to assist a local woman in dire need of medical supplies she could not afford. This is how we create safety in trying times, not with technology that enables an individual to dial 911.

Safety in the community of Hedley is created by First Responders and Firefighters who help people having heart attacks survive until the ambulance comes, who pull people out of car accidents on Highway #3 and who give countless hours of their labour to keep the community safe; these services are currently accessed using landlines and radios, which are effective within the range which our volunteers are allowed to travel. A dedicated corps of regular volunteers does more to ensure our safety than a reliance on technology. Not only that, but additional cell service could increase the operating costs of Hedley's Volunteer Fire Department as the provision of cell phones for every member becomes a standard requirement.

I would argue that our Hedley Heritage Museum Society and Hedley Farmer's Market do more to promote economic development (as well as provide an outlet for social development and education) than a Telus monopole erected in the centre

of town ever will. Both institutions have been regularly cited by newcomers to town as "the reason" individuals moved here, as the goodwill ambassadors at both function as the equivalent to a Chamber of Commerce found in many towns. These important organizations are run by good Samaritans who regularly volunteer or donate and lend money to the dedicated organizations that keep this community afloat.

When people talk about the economic development opportunities provided by Telus' proposed monopole, I wonder if they consider what will happen to the small, locally-owned company China Creek which currently provides service to this community. While downloading and streaming opportunities are limited with this service, it is inaccurate to state that Hedley "does not have high-speed internet". We residents do have access to a service far faster than dial-up, and many of us are adequately able to conduct our business using this service.

Because Telus belongs to the group known as the Canadian Wireless Telecommunication Association, I believe the public has a fair expectation of some adherence to the guidelines which have been developed by this organization along with those of the Federation of Canadian Municipalities.

Ideally the "Antenna System Siting Protocol Template" functions as a guiding document which directs businesses in the ethical procedures for dealing with what is currently a fairly divisive issue in Canada: people seek connectivity while others ..... continued on Page 23

..... continued from Page 5 whose property harbours a rare species on four feet. Then there will have to be a corridor to provide the species free rein in its efforts to go somewhere else.

In her book, Koire discusses this as a typical Agenda 21 ploy, but is it Agenda 21 or the fanatical environmentalists who saw Agenda 21 as an opportunity to bring their vision into reality?

Private land is not safely out of the mix. Neither is resource land. The document states development permits should not be allowed in any area of resource land identified as being sensitive, and intensive agriculture should not be permitted outside the ALR. How this works is, suppose you discover a gold mine

and stake a claim. The biodiversity team goes to the location and discovers widgymidges on the property. That makes it a sensitive area and forget the gold mine. Also, forget logging, developing a gravel pit, ranging livestock, building a greenhouse or any other activity that might disturb the widgymidges.

All this legislation, regulation, inspection, fines for violations, zoning, and acquisition of sensitive land is going to be paid for out of the public purse. The document clearly lists the Ministry of Forests, Ministry of Environment, and Environment Canada as funding all of this, in short, our tax dollars.

All of this reminds me so much of what Koire warns of in her book about Agenda 21.

Just as a sharing moment with the older loggers, like Dean Stinson and Dennis Cook and Jim Byrne, do you remember 1994 when we fought against having the entire south side of the valley out of a massive Class A park?

That was presented in a campaign called Nature Has No Borders. I think they're back, fellas, in a campaign called Keeping Nature in Our Future.

By the way, you can go to their website by searching soscp and you will see Keeping Nature in Our Future. Click on it and you will discover a lot of very nice information and pretty photos, but none of the implementation section I have been talking about.

The crash happened just east of Hedley early in the morning of March 30th.

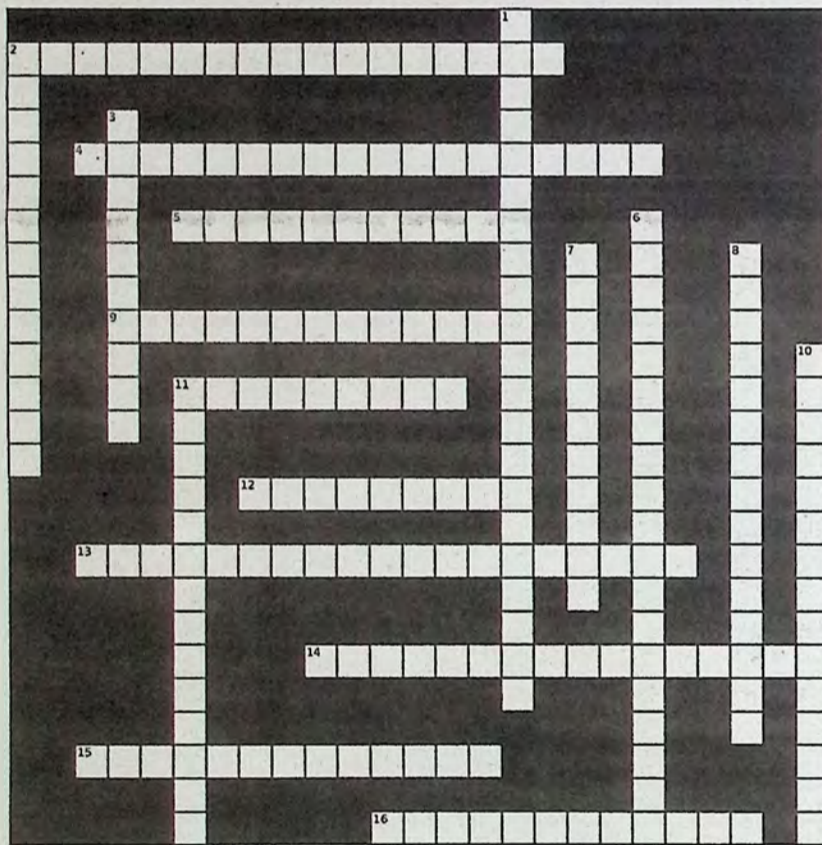
RCMP report the westbound vehicle missed a turn and crashed into a hydro pole.

## Health Care In Rural Remote Canadian Communities

As a result of inadequate funding from provincial and federal governments rural remote areas of Canada have witnessed a drastic reduction in health services over the past fifteen years. This has meant a loss of acute care beds, reduced accessibility, and scheduled closures of primary health care services.

Movement toward the privatization of health services is creating a two tiered system where only those with money will be able to access the best health care. Instead of reducing costs, this system will raise the average cost of health care for all Canadians.

People on disability and seniors are the most at risk from recent changes. With the reduction in home support, home nursing and community services, the provincial government expects those on fixed pensions to pay for private sector services out of their own pocket to keep them living comfortably and safely in their own homes. So what should be done?

Provincial Ministries of Health should stop hiding behind the myth of unsustainability and honor their obligation under the five principles of the Canada Health Act including equal access to health care for all citizens. Healthcare is sustainable.

The Federal Minister of Health needs to honour and uphold the Canada Health Act by accepting its responsibility to provide health care funding.

The provincial Ministers of Health must address the problem of doctor shortages in rural remote communities by offering extra incentives, paid for through public funding. Communities should not have to compete with each other to attract doctors as they are presently forced to do.

Medical students wanting to practice in rural areas should receive enhanced training, so that they are highly and broadly skilled for a practice in rural remote communities.

Provincial health authorities

should be listening to the people in their care and respect their needs.

And our federal government needs to stay at the health care table, negotiating with all provincial health ministers to establish a new Canada Health Accord that will provide adequate funding aimed at improving health care for all Canadians.

Our health care system is sustainable. We need the political will to ensure it stays this way.

The federal NDP under the leadership of Health critic Libby Davies, has undertaken consultations across the country on the future of public health care. As our Leader Tom Mulcair stated, "Canadians are concerned about our health care system and they want it to be a priority for their government too."

We will be using the input of Canadians to build our proposals for the 2015 election, a very important step towards building a stronger and fairer Canada.

## RDOS launches annual exchange program

Do you heat with wood? If so, here's a chance for you to upgrade your old wood stove or wood fireplace insert to a cleaner burning unit and save some money while improving local air quality!

Until April 30, municipal and rural residents of the RDOS can receive a \$250 rebate when they replace and render unusable their old wood stove or wood insert with a new EPA/CSA emission-approved wood, gas, pellet or electric appliance.

But don't delay as this offer is limited to the first 40 exchanges.

Participating retailers are also offering upfront a discount of \$150 or more. They have all the informa-

tion needed as well as documentation that shows the emission ratings of all the new stoves.

In many valley communities, smoke from wood burning units is the greatest source of particulate matter next to open burning. Particulate matter is one of the main pollutants that leads to poor air quality and can have serious health impacts.

Upgrading is important, but equally important is the operation of a wood stove, the firewood used, and the chimney. New EPA wood stoves when operated correctly will reduce smoke pollution by 90% and use 1/3 less wood. Chimney smoke is a sign of an inefficient burn, produces

unnecessary air pollution and wastes wood.

Burn only clean dry wood; do not burn wood with glue, paint or treated wood. A moisture meter is an excellent tool to measure the woods moisture content and it should read between 15% - 20%. Wood that is too dry, such as kiln-dried wood, is great wood for a campfire but not for wood stove use. Kiln dried wood burns too hot and can damage your stove. Wood with more than 20% moisture will smoke, creating more air pollution and you will lose the benefit of the heat as all the energy generated goes to boiling off the water in the wood.

..... continued from Page 4 using it. Apparently, it gives control to the corporate partners and cities are left to pay more in interest on long-term projects. According to the CCPA, the previous P3 fund has spent only about 30% of its total and has allocated 50% of the allotted funds.

In regard to training, Budget 2013 outlines a three point plan to address Canada's labour market needs: The Canada Job Grant, Creating Opportunities for Apprentices and Supporting Job Opportunities for all Canadians. According to the Canadian Labour Congress (CLC), Canada is falling well below the OECD average in the average hours of job-related non-formal skills training for employees, and in employer investment in skills training generally. The position of the CLC is that Canada needs a skills development strategy in response to a growing skills gap, an ageing work force, and the need for greater educational opportunities for groups such as First Nations, recent immigrants and youth.

The Canada Job Grant will take \$300 Million per year from the current Labour Market Agreements (LMA) going to provinces and will allocate it to a grant for job-related training. Employees will apply for grants up to a maximum of \$15,000 per employee. The province, federal government and employer will each provide one third of the funding. Adequate literacy is the one key skill that many Canadians lack. The current LMA is the sole source of government funding for workplace literacy training. This program is successful, so the question is, why does the government wish to reallocate money for literacy into the hands of employers?

In regard to Apprentice Training, this budget reallocates \$4 Million over 3 years to harmonize apprenticeship requirements across Canada. According to the CLC, this measure will improve the certification process and mobility of workers and will assist them in finding jobs in their field across Canada. The budget also ensures that federal projects and projects with federal funding will employ apprentices.

As far as supporting Job Opportunities for All Canadians, the budget puts in place targeted measures for specific groups under-represented in the labour market. This is a good thing. For example, there will be increased support for internships for recent post-secondary graduates consisting of \$70 Million over 3 years for an additional 5,000 paid internships on top of the 3,000 already announced in Budget 2012. Unfortunately, however, there is

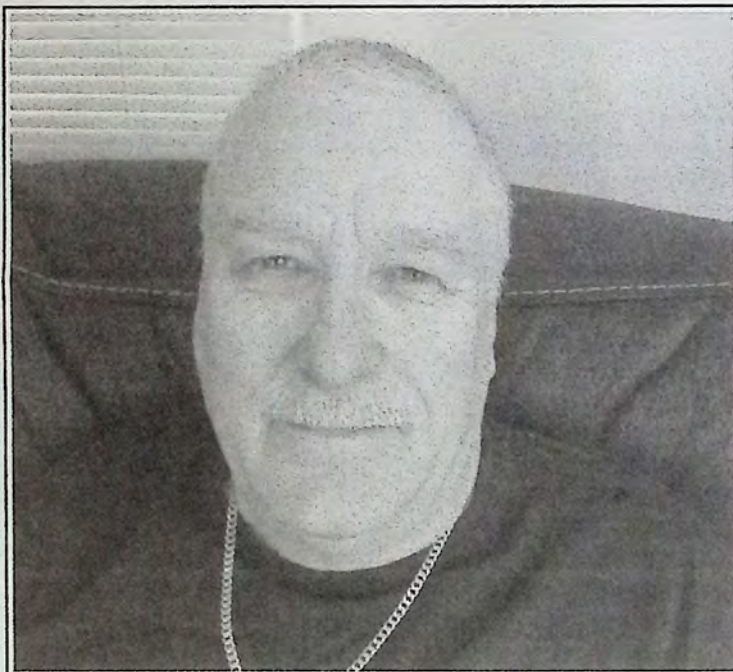
nothing in Budget 2013 to assist women in their labour market integration.

The main point to retain here is that in spite of the steps to better connect unemployed and under-employed and workers with better jobs, only 15% is new money. The rest of it (85%) is money shuffled around.

Finally, according to the CCPA analysis, Austerity Measures in 2014-15 will have reduced federal spending by \$11.8 Billion due to cuts in the last 3 budgets. It is estimated that the total employment impact due to austerity will be approximately 90,000 fewer positions in the public and private sectors.

One has to wonder what will happen to these people and what effect it will have on the communities they live in.

The "Antenna System Siting Protocol Template" begins with the purpose: "...all examples of local customization provided in the Appendix are endorsed by the wireless industry as being reasonable and practical components of an antenna siting protocol. Some of these examples are better suited to urban, suburban, or rural Municipalities, depending on the Municipality from which they derive, but they serve as "best practices" and should be considered..."

Among the endorsed customizations are:  
LOCATION

### Preferred Locations:

- Areas that maximize the distance from Residential Areas
- Industrial and commercial areas
- Areas that respect public views and vistas of important natural or man-made features
- Located in a manner that does not adversely impact view corridors.

### Discouraged Locations

- Heritage areas (unless visibly unobtrusive) or on heritage structures unless it forms an integrated part of the structure's overall design (i.e. through the use of stealth structures)

Further, under the section "Jurisdiction and Roles" a reader finds:

...Industry Canada also published a Guide to Assist Land-Use

Authorities in Developing Antenna Siting Protocols in January 2008, stating that it "considers the Municipality's and local residents' questions, comments and concerns are important elements to be considered by a Proponent seeking to install, or make modifications to, an antenna system." The CPC also establishes a dispute resolution process to be used where the Proponent and the Municipality have reached an impasse.

No such dispute resolution process has been considered, and in fact, when the elected official representing the populace asked for an opportunity to conduct a poll of those affected, the agent for Telus simply pulled the proposal.

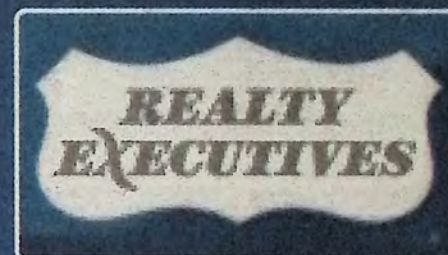
