## 24/7 ER could happen soon

According to Dr. David Smith, Princeton Hospital will likely undergo some changes in the coming year that will include a new clinic and the return of 24/7 ER service.

In an informal announcement made April 3rd during his first 'Ask The Doctor' session at the Seniors' Hall, Dr. Smith discussed the current doctor situation.

He has stopped doing emergency hours this month but remains available when needed and thanks to locums, the ER will be operational 24/7 Friday through Monday to the end of 2013.

Dr. Smith reported that with a new doctor who has 'signed up' to work here starting in August, and thanks to the recently introduced Rural

Doctor Incentive Program from the Ministry of Health, another doctor has expressed interest in coming to Princeton.

"If they sign, the ER should be open 24/7," Dr. Smith said.

The arrangement would then see three doctors working ER with Dr. Smith helping out 'when needed' which makes the doctor situation in Princeton appear "very positive" by the end of the year.

Dr. Smith praises Interior Health for the way they have addressed the local situation as well as local groups and residents for fighting to keep services in the community.

## 2012 drilling extends mineralization

Copper Mountain Mining Corporation ("CMMC" or the "Company") on April 3rd summarized results from the 2012 mine site exploration program, which was successful in extending mineralization both laterally and to depth beyond the current limits of the Super pit.

The 2012 exploration program consisted of a total of 18,400m of core drilling in 66 holes and 3,120m of shallow percussion drilling in 110 holes. Exploration was successful in confirming the continuity of deep mineralization below the Pit 2 area, extending mineralization to the north and northwest of Pit 2, and intersecting high grade mineralization below the Super pit bottom in Pit 3.

The most significant results from

the drill program were intersections of 123m grading 0.75% CuEq\* and 122.8m grading 0.69% CuEq at depths in excess of 150m below the bottom of the Super pit in the Pit 2 area; an intersection of 102m grading 0.70% Cu immediately below the bottom of the Super pit in the centre of Pit 3 area; and an intersection of 32m grading 3.03% CuEq in the southern end of Pit 3. This release summarizes the full 2012 exploration program and some of the results, in whole or part, were previously reported in September, 2012.

### Pit 2 Deep Drilling:

Five holes, spaced approximately 100m apart, were drilled with a southwesterly orientation deep below the western Pit 2 area, and intersected mineralization at depths

up to 250m below the bottom of the proposed Super pit. These deeper holes, together with those drilled in 2010/11, encountered mineralization below the existing resource over the entire length of Pit 2, with the best grades below the south wall of the pit. Pit 2 mineralization remains open in all directions except to the southeast.

### Pit 2 Near Surface Results:

Shallow drilling along the southern, northern and western edges of

the Pit 2 area was successful at infilling gaps within the block model as well as extending mineralization to the north, west and northwest. Fourteen, relatively shallow, holes were completed on the south and west side of Pit 2 infilling gaps and increasing confidence of resource blocks. Eleven, shallow to moderate length, drill-holes were completed on the north side and two medium length holes were drilled to the northwest from the northwest

corner of the pit. Additionally, five deep drill-holes below the west-central part of Pit 2 were completed from the north side of the pit.

Drill hole locations and an overall site map appear on Page 18 of this issue of the Similkameen News Leader for reference.

The drill results on the north side of Pit 2 extended mineralization; resulting in a northwards expansion of the Super pit. Additionally, ..... continued on Page 18

## 2013-17 financial plan receives three readings

Town of Princeton 2013-2017 Financial Plan Bylaw 872, 2013 was given three readings at the April 3rd regular meeting of Town Council.

In her report to Council, Town of Princeton Deputy Treasurer/Collector Shirley McMahon explains that requirements set out by Section 165 of the Community Charter determine the time frame for the adoption of the municipality's financial plan, which must be adopted prior to the annual property tax rate bylaw, set for May

15th.

"Section 165 (3.1) of the Community Charter requires municipal five-year financial plans to include a more explicit form of revenue and tax policy disclosure," states McMahon.

This requires municipalities to include in the five-year financial plan, objectives and policies regarding each of the following: the proportion of total revenue that comes from each of the funding sources described in Section 165 (7) of the Community

Charter; the distribution of property taxes among the property classes; and the use of permissive tax exemptions (such as revitalization tax exemptions).

# GMF assists with clean up

The Honourable Joe Oliver, Canada's Minister of Natural Resources, and Karen Leibovici, President of the Federation of Canadian Municipalities (FCM) and councillor for the City of Edmonton, Alberta, announced April 4th a Green Municipal Fund™ (GMF) grant for the Town of Princeton. The town put the \$59,840 in funding toward a soil vapour assessment and detailed site investigation of a property next to the town hall.

"Our Government is assisting municipalities across the country in achieving their goal of a cleaner and healthier environment for Canadians through the Green Municipal Fund," said Minister Oliver.

"Today's announcement is another example of how our government — in partnership with the Federation of Canadian Municipalities — is help-

ing communities like Princeton build a greener future for its citizens."

"The Green Municipal Fund offers a range of resources and services that specifically address the sustainable community development needs of municipal governments," said Leibovici.

"The financing and knowledge provided by the Fund supports the development of communities that are more environmentally, socially and economically sustainable."

Princeton will assess the health risks and level of contamination, and develop a remediation strategy for a brownfield property next to its town hall.

The remediated property will form the cornerstone of Princeton's civic precinct with a building constructed on LEED principles such as energy

efficiency, water conservation and local procurement. The site redevelopment will centralize municipal and provincial government services in a pedestrian-oriented civic centre. The new public square will help revitalize downtown Princeton and reduce urban sprawl.


The study results and all remediation activities will be documented on the town's website; allowing other communities to follow Princeton's progress and encouraging them to revitalize their own brownfield sites.

"Council is pleased to have the funding support from the Green Municipal Fund," said Mayor Frank Armitage.

"It has enabled us to carry out the soil vapour assessment and the detailed site investigation."

The Government of Canada endowed the Federation of Canadian Municipalities (FCM) with \$550 million to establish the Green Municipal Fund. The Fund supports partnerships and leveraging of both public and private-sector funding to reach higher standards of air, water and soil quality, and climate protection.

FCM has been the national voice of municipal governments since 1901. It fosters the development of sustainable communities to improve quality of life by promoting strong, effective, and accountable municipal government.

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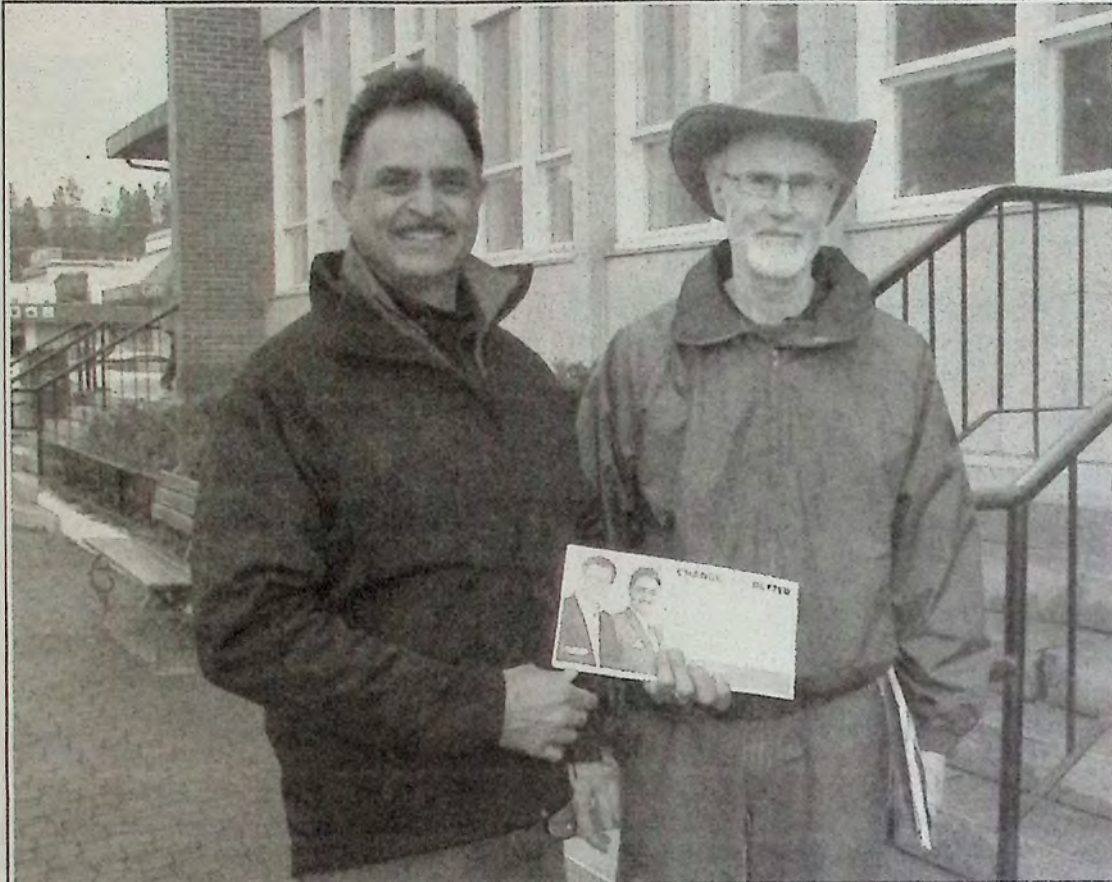

## My Turn

### I Can Save Canada Post

I am probably in the minority when I say I am a fan of Canada Post. Our relationship goes back to my teen years and the days when I had a handful of pen pals and an old manual typewriter.

Long distance telephone rates were insane at the time and what has now become known as 'snail mail' was the most affordable option I had to keep contact with friends far and away from my home in Kelowna.

The postal code system, as we know it was officially rolled out from 1972 to 1974 with the internet catching momentum a decade later. The current rate for sending a letter in Canada – the last time I checked – is 63 cents.

The postal code system was introduced to make mail move more efficiently and even at under a dollar I think it's still a great deal to mail a letter.

The introduction of the internet and popularity of e-mail (short for electronic mail) has cut into revenue for Canada Post. A recent article in Maclean's Magazine looks at this in greater detail.

My solution for Canada's mail service is simple.

Canada Post should embrace the new technology rather than point to it as a problem and develop a uniquely Canadian internet service.

Call it Canada Post Net, or whatever. Go bigger than Telus, Shaw or whoever the other big guys are. Maybe partner with the CBC and make the country's only true Canada-wide internet service.

Subscription rates to this service would pick up for lost snail mail revenues and maybe stamps may go down in price or as a Canada Post Net subscriber you would qualify for discounts on your stamps.

Either way, I find it interesting that the original form of written communication transfer in our country hasn't caught up with the current form of communication transfer in our country.

And with Canada Post Net offering high-speed e-mail, you'll never hear anyone complain about the time it takes for a letter to travel from Coast to Coast.

Plus, maybe over time the flyers that fill your mailbox may end up filling your inbox instead.

## More On The Environmental Goals And Agenda 21

Last week, I wrote about a book called Behind the Green Mask by Rosa Koire in which she describes her fight to stop a plan to eradicate 1300 acres of city homes and businesses and replace it with a 'vision' of high density urban development. In her book, she also says the goal of Agenda 21 is to reduce rural living to negligible and return the land to its 'natural' state, that is, no people living on it. As I said last week, that is a violation of Chapter 7 of UN Agenda 21.

Agenda 21 Chapter 7 is called Human Settlement and is very supportive of ensuring rural people are as well taken care of as people in cities, that is, that they have government and health services equal to cities. The notion that people do not belong in rural areas, like the Similkameen Valley, comes from a radical environmentalist movement that sees people as the enemy of the natural order of the earth, as if the human species developed on some other planet and migrated to earth.

I am the first to admit that our species, humans, is the most successful species on the planet, (along with rodents, houseflies and mosquitos) and is the most

destructive, not only of other creatures and the planet, but humans are self-destructive. There are groups of humans who will happily eradicate other groups of humans in any of a dozen ways. We are not the only creatures on the planet who will kill each other for territory, but we are the only species which will kill for an idea, for a religion that preaches kindness, and for pieces of paper or bits of mineral or pretty rocks (currency, valuable metals such as gold, and pretty rocks like rubies, diamonds and emeralds).

This does not alter the fact that we are part of this planet, and we can harm the planet and each other, or we can smarten up and make our planet a better place to live. I believe that was the original intent of Agenda 21. The implementation of this document leaves a lot to be explained by those in charge of implementing it.

If you search on your computer for Simulated Reserve and Corridor System to Protect Biodiversity, you will find a map of the United States which shows the wildlife reserves and corridors in red, and the buffer zones in yellow. What is left for people are the blue zones, most of which are on the eastern seaboard. There is not much left in this plan for humans because they will not be able to use any land in the red zones and will have limited use of land in the buffer zones. The map clearly shows why rural people have to be moved into cities, because rural people and rural activities are in the way of this grand scheme.

I wonder if this is the real goal of Agenda 21, which appears to be very supportive of having rural people stay where they are, or whether it is merely the runaway

goal of those who hate the human species and love the wild animals more. Makes you wonder whether most of these environmentalists are filled with self-hatred and that is why they are doing so little to clean up the oceans, and why they did not contribute all of their millions to help seal off the Dai Ichi power station before it melted down two weeks ago.

The Americans battling Agenda 21 have just cause to fight it because of what it is doing to their lives and their livelihoods, but there are those who are making a lot of money out of it, too. Most of those who are making money out of it are large corporations who can build low income housing to replace homes and businesses declared "blighted" and deserving of destruction and replacement. That is the kind of thing happening in many states.

In many places, entire rural communities are fighting for survival because government services and health care are being regionalized. In health care, rural hospitals are being shut down despite the fact that a well-documented study showed that rural hospitals run more efficiently. Government branch offices are being shut down so that the people who worked in those offices have to leave their small town homes and move to larger centers. This is being done despite the fact that Agenda 21 clearly states all the things that must be done to prevent rural people moving to cities! It is easy to blame Agenda 21, but maybe Agenda 21 is not to blame at all, maybe there is a hidden agenda in operation that has nothing to do with the United Nations. After all, it is easier to blame the United Nations than those who are hiding behind it.

I hope the American people can put up enough of a fight to put a stop to some of what is going on and I hope it is not too late. If it is too late, then we're next, all in the name of sustainability. We can lay the blame for the deer problem on individuals who have fed them in the past, but the fact remains: laying blame does not solve the problem.

If Town Council wants to address the problem of shrinking local population, then it behooves Council to solve the problems the citizens have complained about.

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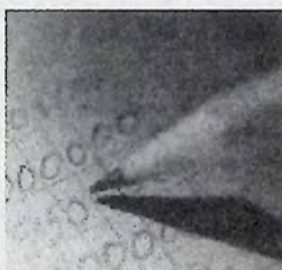

# Candidates Tackle Health Care Questions

## SOHC Surveys Fraser-Nicola Candidates

Voters in rural British Columbia are very concerned about the state of health care in their communities. Support Our Health Care (SOHC), in conjunction with the BC Health Coalition, has prepared a list of six questions dealing with rural health care issues. On March 18, these questions were sent to the four candidates running in the Fraser-Nicola riding, asking them to respond by April 2nd. To date, SOHC has received submissions from Michael Beauclair of the BC Conservative Party and Jackie Tegart of the BC Liberal Party (see below). If submissions are received from Harry Lali (NDP) and John Kidder (Green Party) their answers will appear in a future issue of this paper.

**1. Over the past ten years, rural B.C. communities have experienced a gradual erosion of health services and reduced accessibility to timely health care. Acute doctor shortages, scheduled closures of emergency departments, increased waitlist times, cutbacks in community nursing services, and difficulties with transportation to specialized services in regional centres are indicative of a health care system unable to meet the needs of rural patients.**

*If you are elected to the legislature in the 2013 provincial elections, what will you and your party do to reverse this trend and improve accessibility for rural residents?*

**Michael Beauclair (Conservative Party):** BCCP Policy 5.4.5. Studying other health care systems world wide to look for ways to improve our own, including ways to reduce increasing wait times.

One of the questions that I ask as a taxpayer is what do Hospital Trustees and Administration do? Interior Health has become a monolithic entity that is non-efficient and "Top Heavy." If elected there would be a new approach in Regional Health, I recognize that we live in a large riding with smaller population centres, there will be less administration and more people on the Frontlines, Doctors, Nurses and Techs, Healthcare would be de-centralized, we also have to look at an incentive plan to bring more doctors to Fraser-Nicola, more doctors, more accessible healthcare.

**Jackie Tegart (BC Liberal Party):** Thank you for the opportunity to share some thoughts and work done by the BC Liberals. As a Council member for the Village of Ashcroft, I certainly have first hand knowledge of the challenges regarding health services faced by small, rural communities. I hope I will have an opportunity to meet with you and your group to discuss this very important issue over the course of the campaign.

I recognize that there are times when providing the health care that people expect and rely on can be a challenge. Working to ensure that my constituents have access to the services they need will be a priority for me if elected. That said, I am proud of the accomplishments that have been made to our health care system under the BC Liberals.

I was pleased to see the recent announcement of the Rural Physicians for British Columbia incentive program, which will help attract doctors to 17 communities across BC, including Princeton, by providing an additional \$100,000 per doctor in exchange for a commitment of service of at least three years.

We also committed \$10 million to provide financial assistance of up to \$200,000 a year for rural, fee-for-service physicians who commit to ensure reliable public access to emergency services is maintained at their local hospital. This is in addition to other incentive programs to encourage physicians to set up, practise and reside in rural BC, including:

- Rural Recruitment Incentive Fund for full-time physicians to relocate.
- Rural Recruitment Contingency to assist with recruiting costs.
- Rural Retention Program for physicians who practice and reside in rural communities.
- Rural Education funding to support ongoing professional development.
- Rural GP and specialist locum programs to provide temporary physician support to enable physicians in small communities to take time off for vacations/professional development.
- The Northern Isolation Travel Assistance Outreach Program to help physicians travel to and provide services in rural and isolated communities.

**2. In February 2012, Kim Carter, Provincial Ombudsperson, released Public Report No. 47, The Best of Care: Getting It Right for Seniors in British Columbia (Part 2). In her report she presents 143 Findings and makes 176 Recommendations for improving care for seniors in our province.**

*What steps would you and your party take to implement the recommendations in this report?*

**Michael Beauclair (Conservative Party):** I cannot comment on these recommendations since I did not read the report, Please feel free to contact me with a summary of the findings (SOHC will send Mr. Beauclair the summary and will post his later comments on our website at [www.sohc.ca](http://www.sohc.ca)).

**Jackie Tegart (BC Liberal Party):** In response to the recommendations from the Ombudsperson, the BC

Liberal Government launched a Seniors Action Plan last year. The plan outlines steps that will make it easier for seniors and their families to access and understand the system, and steps to strengthen protections for vulnerable seniors. This plan was created by feedback from seniors, their families and caregivers.

The focus of the Seniors Action Plan is on continuing to improve the system of care in addition to initiatives to support healthy aging and helping seniors remain independent for as long as possible. Highlights include the establishment of a Seniors Advocate as well as \$15 million for the United Way to expand non-medical home support, and \$1.4 million to the BC Association of Community Response Networks to prevent elder abuse and neglect.

**3. Provincial health authorities seem to have lost the trust of the people they serve. What action will you and your party take to reestablish that trust, making our health authorities more accountable and more responsive to the needs of rural communities?**

**Michael Beauclair (Conservative Party):** BCCP Policy Optimize the delivery of health care and care of patients by: 5.4.1. Ensuring health care funding is focused on the best interests of patients and patient care, above all other interests. 5.4.2. Continuing to support the concept of a strong publicly-funded health system as the primary provider of health care services in British Columbia. 5.4.3. Ensuring that all British Columbians have access to quality care, regardless of their ability to pay.

Does not Accountability start with your Family Doctor and Local health care, we as individuals have responsibility to be honest with Doctor, Nurse, Paramedic and Technicians when it comes to our

lifestyles and habits, We should also be able to see the costs of Local Delivery of Healthcare and its associated benefits (close to families, reduced travel).

**Jackie Tegart (BC Liberal Party):** Government sets the overall direction and financial framework for health care in BC, but it is up to the local health authorities to make the vast majority of operating decisions at a local level. While I believe that this is generally a system that works well, I think that we all know there are situations where things get overlooked, or perhaps were simply not looked at in the correct light. This is why I believe it is important to have a strong MLA who will listen to the concerns of constituents, and advocate on their behalf when necessary. If elected, I commit to building a strong relationship with the leadership of Interior Health, because I believe that it is through respectful dialogue and strong communication that the best decisions get made.

**4. The demand for rural doctors exceeds the supply. In competition with each other, rural communities have resorted to providing incentives such as subsidized housing, paid for by local governments, businesses, or private citizens. To be able to compete in the resulting "bidding war", rural communities are now in a position where incentives are a requirement. What is your party's response to this situation?**

**Michael Beauclair (Conservative Party):** BCCP Policy 5.4.4. Supporting the principle that the citizens of British Columbia need to have input into the type of health care system they want. 5.4.5. Studying other health care systems world wide to look for ways to improve our own, including ways to reduce increasing wait times.

**Jackie Tegart (BC Liberal Party):** As mentioned above, I do recognize

that recruiting doctors to rural areas can often be a challenge. It is important that communities work in partnership with the local health authority to find ways to attract the doctors that we need. I applaud the community leaders of the Town of Princeton for the work they have done to date. If elected as MLA, I look forward to lending my support and advocacy as well.

**5. Rural communities in British Columbia share similar health care concerns. However, individual health needs and the way in which they should be addressed vary from community to community. As a candidate in the provincial election, what do you consider to be the most important health care issues in your constituency? And how would you address them?**

**Michael Beauclair (Conservative Party):** The Most Important Issue facing myself as A Candidate was Locating a Doctor that I could develop real patient-doctor relationship that best served my family and self within the Local Area, Long Wait Lines for Emergency and Lab As Mentioned earlier. When our house on the 21 acres was built the trees and brush were just pushed into piles with the dirt and rocks in order to clear for the house. It was a huge mess, my older brother and I cut up much of it for our wood burning furnace but a mess still remained in the lower part of the clearing.

Dad bought a Clydesdale, harness

and all. While other boys my age were playing baseball, soccer etc. I was having the time of my life clearing up the logs and the stumps with the Clydesdale.

He was well trained and when I hooked onto a log or a stump, if he couldn't just pull it out I would call gee or haw and he would move to the left or right and tug until the log or

stump came out.

From there I would have to say nothing. He would head for the burn pile, turn around it so that the stump would go up on the pile and he would stop until I unhooked the chain. What fun we were having! One day a friend of my Dad's was doing some logging on Hollyburn Mountain and asked if he could use the Clydesdale and Dad consented. From our place to his we had to go across Capilano River at Marine Drive.

Horses had priority on the road and while I never wanted to take advantage of that, I had to ride down the middle of the single lane bridge on the Clydesdale. Traffic was backed up behind me as far as I could see. Once across the bridge I headed up toward the logging site on the top of Hollyburn Mountain.

It was a long ride but lots of fun. A couple weeks had passed and we hadn't heard from the man so my Dad and I went to see how things were going. The man wasn't there but we found the horse tied in a narrow stall. I was glad to see him but as I walked in beside him, he tried to pin me against the side of the stall and kick me.

I couldn't go back out or he would have sent me flying. I reached for his halter and he tried to bite me so I hung onto it with all I had, keeping both hands on his halter. His eyes showed fury and fear! I managed to get my foot up on the manger, got on top of it and from there got my feet over the stall and safely on the other side. It was obvious that this horse had been overworked and abused terribly.

We continued to try and contact the man and when we finally did he told us that he had shot the horse. I felt like he had shot my friend.

## Living Past 100

### Enjoy Sex Safely

People are becoming careless again about sexual safety. A recent news release from the United States shows a 40 percent increase in the number of infections by sexually transmitted diseases (STDs). Following the HIV scare, the infection rate dropped for many years, but it appears to be rising again. The vast majority of STDs reported for treatment were not HIV, but everyone should keep in mind that unsafe sex is risky whether or not the infection is deadly.

Every kind of an infection poses a risk to the body. Every treatment with antibiotics or other medication is a strain on the body. People can spend months in hospital due to infection, and people still die from infections of various kinds. Every infection taxes the immune system.

In industrialized nations, there is no excuse for sexually transmitted infections except disregard for taking the necessary precautions. The information is taught in schools, the protection is readily available. Yet the majority of sexually transmitted infections were among people age 15 to 24, the most sexually active age group and the age group with the information needed to protect themselves from infection.

There are a large number of sexually transmitted diseases, some of them more difficult to treat than others. Genital herpes (warts) is treatable, but not curable, and outbreaks will continue through life. HIV is treatable, but not curable, and may cause such a decline in the immune system that the infected person may die from some other infection such as the flu or pneumonia or cancer. Other infections are curable, but still pose a risk to the body.

The increasing number of people requiring treatment for STDs during 2012 indicates a need for people to become much more cautious about protecting themselves. Although the major group infected last year was age 15 - 24, no age group is free from exposure and the increase in those treated for infection included people up to age 60. Anyone engaging in casual sex, that is, outside a committed relationship, runs the risk of being infected.

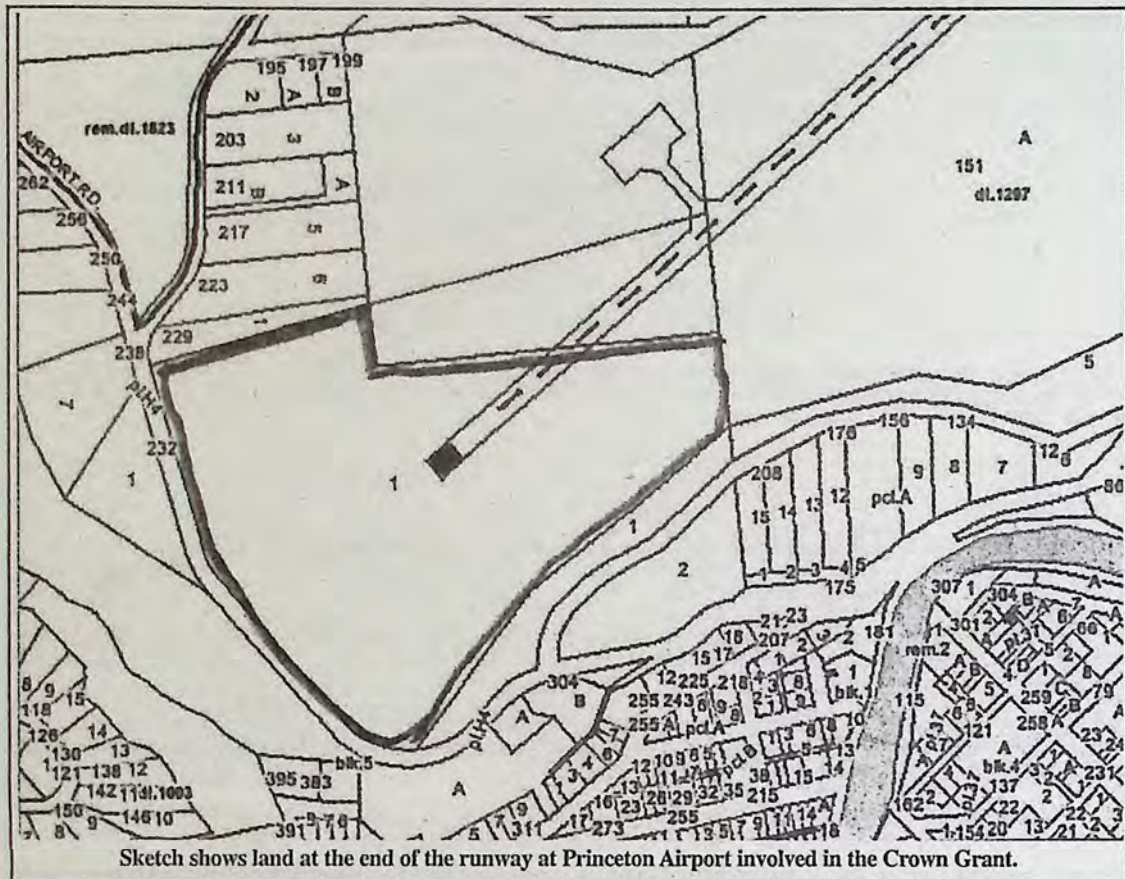

# BC Government's Budget 2013 Lacks Credibility!

In my experiences in life, people do not like to be fooled again, and again." - Harry Lali

## Here are 10 reasons why I DO NOT support the Provincial Budget:

- 1. Budget 2013 is NOT balanced!** Detailed scrutiny reveals that the Government's Budget 2013 hides a \$790 million deficit. Their claim of a balanced budget is quite simply false, and their fiscal recklessness will saddle B.C.'s next government with significant financial challenges to manage.
- 2. Budget 2013 is a \$790 million deficit.** By removing the short-sighted sale of public assets from the budget and restating expenditure growth for vital public services to more realistic levels, the true deficit is estimated to be \$790 million in 2013/14, \$847 million in 2014/15 and \$452 million in 2015/16.
- 3. This is Budget 2009 all over again – Remember the 12% HST?** Remember the last time this government brought in a low-balled budget deficit before an election and said the deficit was "\$495 million maximum", only to tell the people of BC after the election, "Oooops, we made a mistake!" That deficit was turned out to be \$1.9 billion after the election. That's how we ended up with the HST. How can anyone believe a government that said BEFORE the 2009 election that the 12% HST "is not on our radar", yet the same government brought in the 12% HST just days AFTER winning the election? No one is getting fooled this time around!
- 4. The BC Government has deliberately under-estimated its expenses.** This budget projects only 0.8 per cent growth in expenditures for the coming year; but average growth over the government's term in office has been 3.2 per cent. The numbers in their unbalanced Budget are an illusion and simply cannot be trusted.
- 5. The BC Government has deliberately over-stated its revenues.** The BC Government is counting on revenues and profits that are not there. They are booking imaginary BC Hydro and asset sale profits when none exist. They're counting on the sale of more assets in one year than the government has sold in the last ten years combined, and they're booking the money before the sales have been made.
- 6. Would you sell your house to pay for your grocery bills?** The BC Government is attempting to sell off your public assets to pay for its fiscal mismanagement. The Minister of Finance has booked \$475 million this year and a further \$150 million next year as part of their fire sale of public assets, even though not a single sale has been confirmed. On the issue of asset sales, respected Canadian economist, Don Drummond, offered this guidance to governments: "*Do not count chickens before they are hatched. If assets are to be sold, never incorporate any revenue from such planned sales into a budget before the fact.*"
- 7. The BC Government has mismanaged BC Hydro.** The government is continuing to siphon hundreds of millions of dollars from B.C. Hydro into general revenue, despite the Auditor-General's stern warning that the excessive use of deferral accounts "*creates the appearance of profitability where none actually exists.*"
- 8. Rural BC is abandoned, yet again.** The Government's budget cuts \$35 million from forest health programs at a time when our forested landbase badly needs help. There are no needed investments in tourism, agriculture or rural schools.
- 9. Government's Budget 2013 is a threat to Health Care in Rural BC.** British Columbians are bracing for another round of massive cuts in essential services. The BC Government's numbers simply cannot be trusted. Either the BC Government has understated expenditures dramatically, or they are planning a massive wave of secret post-election cuts to critical services for British Columbians. Health Care alone is being under-funded by \$245 million this year.
- 10. No one in BC believes the government's claims of a "balanced budget".** The media do not believe the numbers in the budget, experts and economist do not believe them, and more importantly, British Columbians, including my constituents, do not believe the BC Government's claims. The people know better.

## Princeton remains optimistic even with recent challenges

Still struggling to overcome the impact of the economic downturn, Princeton residents were understandably dismayed when, in March 2012, they were told that the local hospital was closing its emergency room.

A lack of physicians in the area, coupled with the high cost of bringing in locum physicians, was simply too great a hurdle to overcome.

A little more than a year later, the emergency room remains closed. But disappointment has given way to cautious optimism. Residents are now convinced that better days are ahead for this community of some 5,000 people. George Elliott, owner and publisher of the *Similkameen News Leader* weekly newspaper, and a Princeton resident for the past 26 years, says the closure may actually have brought the community closer together.

"I think people recognized that Princeton offers a lot of valuable services and that we have to be prepared to fight to keep those services. It's instilled a stronger and more positive community spirit," he said in an interview, last week with *The Pentiction Herald* for its annual *South Okanagan Outlook* special edition.

There has been some good economic news, as well. The most significant event was the re-opening local mine, owned by the Copper Mountain Mining Corporation. Elliott says the construction phase of the re-opening two years ago created about 350 jobs. "Today, the mine employs about 200 full-time employees. That's a big boost for a community this size."

Bob Wilson, the town's interim CEO, was born and raised in Princeton, returning to take the CEO position three years ago. He shares Elliott's view that the mine provided a major financial boost just when the town needed it most. However, he thinks more must be done to realize all of the advantages provided by a major employer like the copper mine.

"At the moment, many of the people employed at the mine don't live here. They commute from places like Kamloops, working here four days and returning to their home town for the next four days. Ideally, we'd like to see them become full-time Princeton residents. That's something we'll be working hard on in the future."

Elliott and Wilson also agree that Princeton offers many of the amenities that

working families are looking for.

In addition to two elementary schools and one secondary school, the area provides an incredible selection of outdoor activities. There's hunting and fishing, snowmobiling, cross-country skiing, and hiking.

And the Trans-Canada Trail runs through the heart of Princeton, attracting dedicated long-haul trekkers every year.

The area's history is also a draw, says Elliott.

"There are a number of ghost towns in the area. They're always a popular draw for visitors."

No doubt, the emergency room closure hurt, but Elliott and Wilson both feel Princeton is now bouncing back nicely.

"Let's just say I'm cautiously upbeat about the future," says Wilson.

## Legions spend too much at command, national level: veteran

A Canadian military veteran who held membership cards in four service clubs believes Royal Canadian Legions can survive but only if the old guard changes its attitude and less money is spent at the upper echelons of the pyramid.

Pat MacDonald spent 34 years in the Canadian military including lengthy stints in Bosnia, Africa and Germany. A Legion member for more than 30 years, while residing in Pentiction he also held memberships at the Army Navy and Airforce Veterans in Canada, the Eagles and the Elks.

"The biggest problem is resistance to change," MacDonald said in reference to recent financial woes of Legions. Although Legions are doing

well in towns such as Princeton, it's recently been revealed that both Pentiction and Vernon are among those which are in danger of closing.

"It's not our old veterans who are running things, but people who have spent little, if any, time in the military. They're well-meaning, in most cases, but just don't have business experience. If qualified people don't volunteer you get non-qualified people running the place. They tend to delegate and disappear, then blame the person who was in charge."

Upon retiring from military, MacDonald spent years in Calgary acquiring failing bars and clubs and then turning them around.

"Legions, in particular, will continue to be dinosaurs until they cater to young people. World War II vets came from the farms and small mining towns where there weren't nightclubs. Young

soldiers today want to go where you can play eight-ball and not an old snooker table, where you can wear a hat when appropriate and not be subjected to obsolete and draconian rules. They want to hear the music they grew up with."

A rule change that should be considered is allowing hats in the lounge area when services and official exercises are not in session.

MacDonald is extremely critical of the high-paying jobs and wastage at the provincial and national levels. If the Royal Canadian Legion is to survive into the next decade massive cuts must be made at the top, MacDonald declares.

Major conventions and glossy Legion publication for members are not needed, nor are many of the top salaries, he insists.

"Command and zone constantly interfere and step in and take over branches. They're not

qualified. The only people who can turn a branch around are local people. You have staff members at command and the national level making astronomical salaries when branches, which are supposed to be there for our old Canadian vets, are dropping like flies. It's sickening."

MacDonald notes that when a person pays \$50 to join a local branch, 70 per cent or more goes straight to a higher level. He's puzzled as to why zone and B.C.-Yukon command can't forgive dues for ailing branches until they're able to get back on sound financial footing noting that when branches fold, command will never receive dues.

MacDonald believes Legions must go almost exclusively with volunteers and those dealing with money must be properly screened.

Branches with paid bartenders and front-office staff are destined for failure, he declares.

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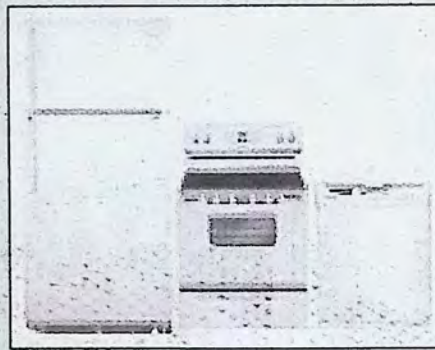
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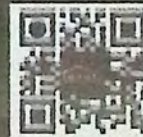
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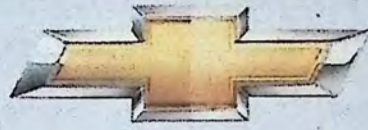
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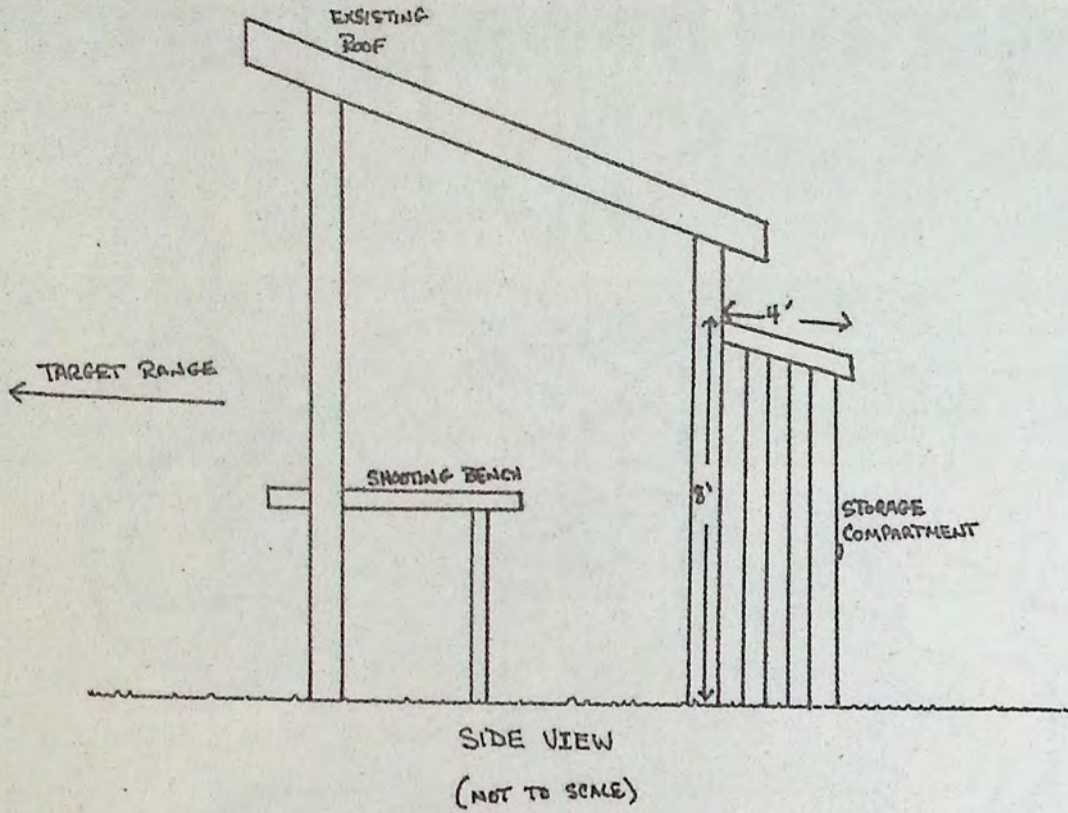
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Sketch shows a side view of the plan to build a storage space at the gun range. Sketch: Princeton Fish & Game Club

# 2012 drilling extends mineralization

 results from drilling to the northwest of Pit 2 (12P2-36) indicate that lower grade mineralization extends for distances of 300m beyond the northwest edge of the Super pit.

Percussion drilling in the northeastern side of the pit proved to be a rapid and inexpensive way of obtaining more data from the upper benches to assist with mine planning. Favourable results of the diamond and percussion drilling suggested higher tonnages and grades than projected by the reserve model which was confirmed by initial mining in Pit 2.

#### Pit 3 Drilling:

In the Pit 3 area 12 holes totalling 5,200m were drilled in the southern and central Pit 3 areas and helped determine the extent of historical mining in high-grade areas, as well as extending mineralization both laterally and to depth. Ten holes were drilled on three, north-easterly oriented, "scissor" sections spaced approximately 100m apart, at the southern end of Pit 3, while two holes (P3-11 and 12) were drilled off the ramp near the centre of the pit, to the northwest and southeast, respectively. Two of the holes (12P3-05, 06) in the southern end of the pit were not completed due to broken ground, and a third hole (12P3-01) was abandoned in high grade mineralization after intersecting an historical underground working. Results of the drilling in the southern end of Pit 3 indicate that a zone of variable, but generally narrow, thickness but relatively high-grade mineralization, trends along the volcanic-intrusive contact and that only part of this zone was previously mined during the underground era.

Three holes drilled well below the maximum depth of historical workings (12P3-09, 10 and the lower part of 12P3-12) did not intersect significant mineralization at depth and suggest that mineralization in the southern end of the pit is, at least partly, depth limited. Drill-hole 12P3-11 intersected high grade mineralization immediately below the bottom of the proposed Super pit as well as extending mineralization to depths of 150m below the Super pit near the approximate centre of Pit 3, which together with the results from the south end of Pit 3, suggests that mineralization maybe plunging to the northwest.

#### Alabama Ridge Drilling:

Mineralization in the Alabama area is generally more disseminated and less structurally controlled, and therefore is generally of lower grade

relative to other areas of Copper Mountain. Drilling in the Alabama area was designed to increase the resource grade and classification. Results of the drilling were generally favourable indicating potential for some higher grade areas within the Alabama zone and demonstrating pervasive low grade mineralization. A total of 16 holes were drilled along NE-SW oriented sections spaced 60m apart, over the central and western parts of the Alabama ridge. Although drilling failed to extend mineralization to the west, it did delineate a zone of moderate grade mineralization below the ridge crest, and almost all holes ended in mineralization.

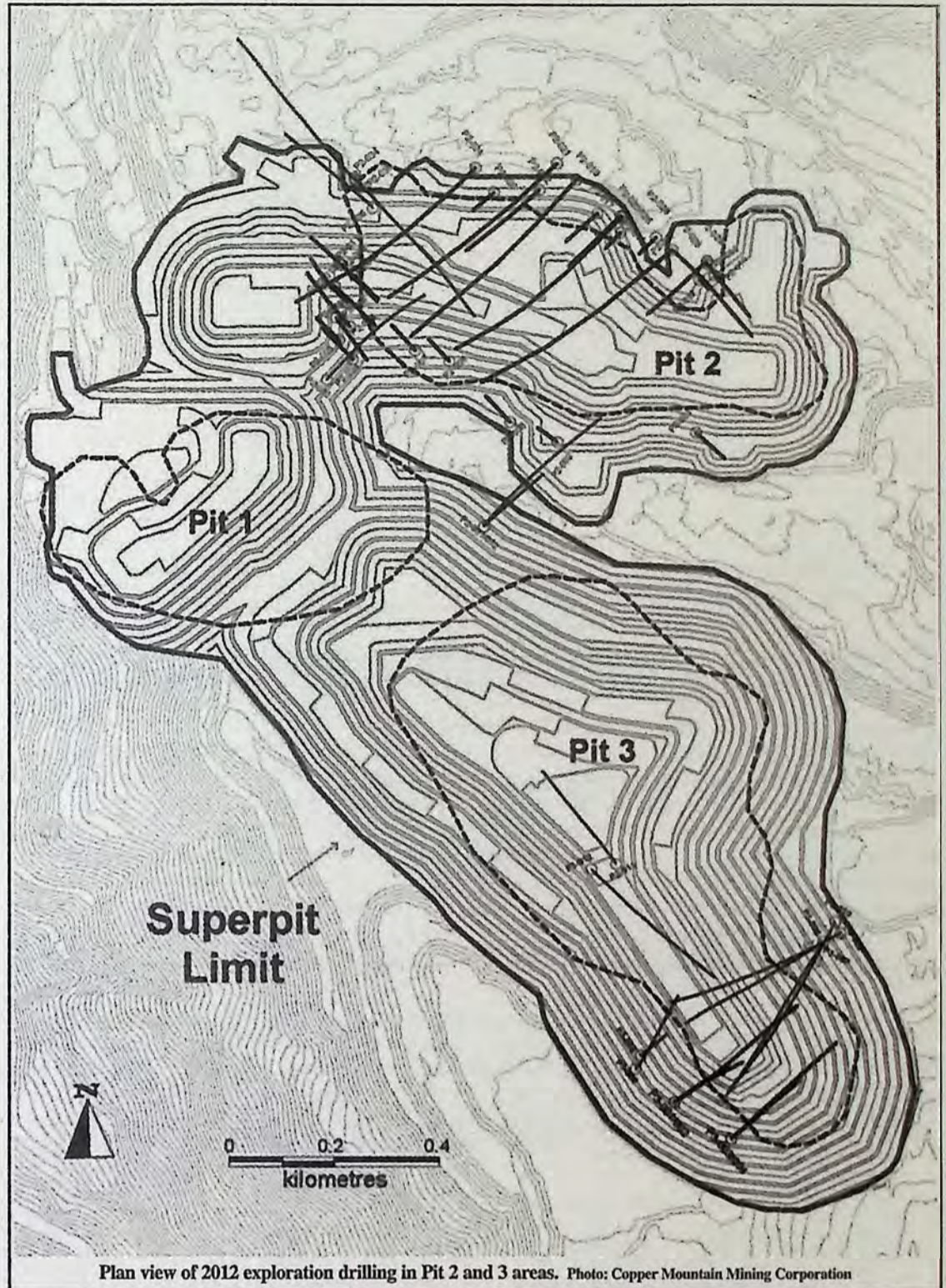
The mineralized system at Copper Mountain is classified as a bulk-tonnage, alkalic porphyry copper deposit that is hosted within Nicola Group volcanic rocks and Lost Horse Intrusions. Mineralization is structurally controlled and focused at multi-directional vein intersections and within vein stockwork systems. Drill holes are usually drilled at angles of -45 or -55 degrees to provide the best indication of the lateral extents of vertically oriented mineralization.

#### Quality Assurance

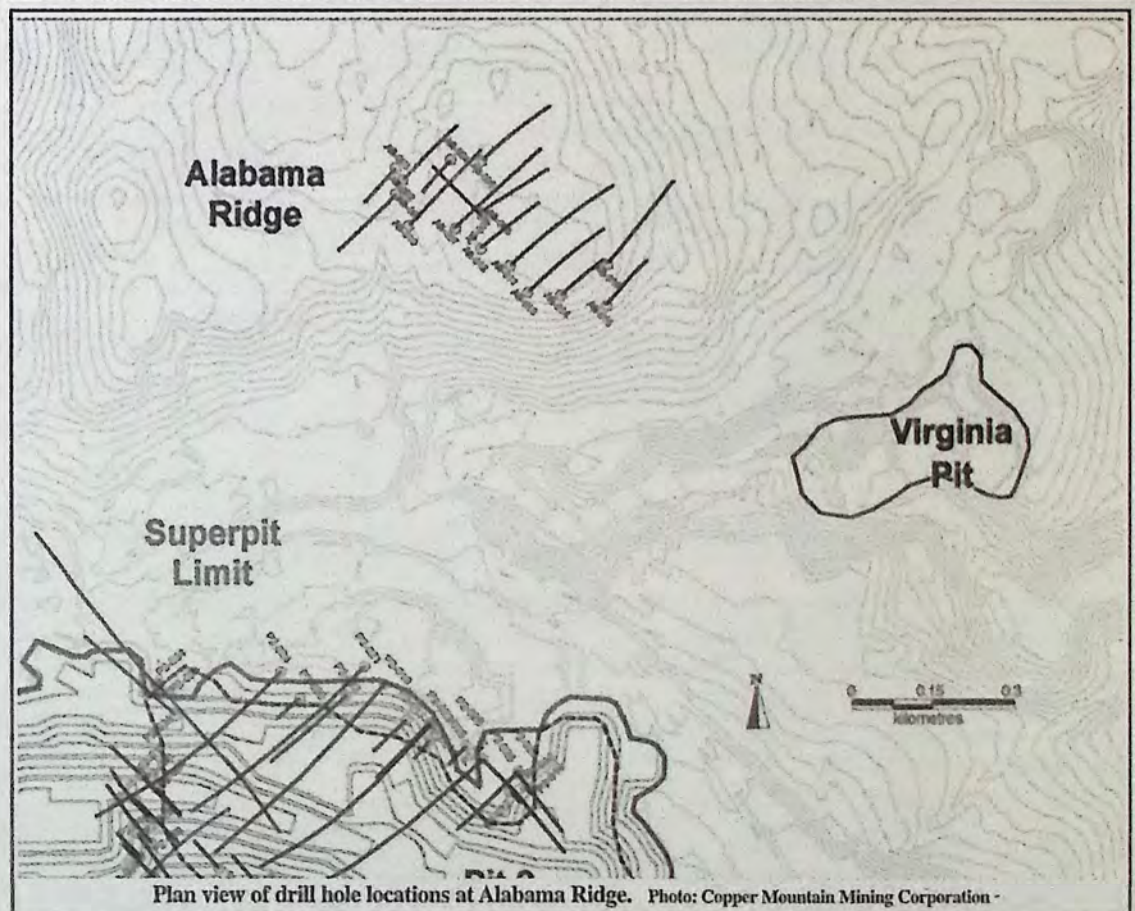
The company employs a system of quality control for drill results which includes the use of blanks, certified reference material (standards) and check assaying. Core is logged on site and split with a diamond saw. Samples are analyzed for copper at the mine laboratory. Gold and silver, as well as a large number of duplicate copper assays are determined on pulps by Pioneer Laboratories in Richmond, B.C. The drilling program is supervised by Peter Holbek, M.Sc., P.Geo., a qualified person as defined by National Policy Instrument 43-101.

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# Regional Board approves 2013 budget

The Regional District of Okanagan-Similkameen's Regional Board has approved a \$59.9-million operating and capital budget for 2013.

The operating budget provides funding for 135 services administered throughout the regional district. The budget was approved at the Regional Board regular meeting of March 21.

"The budget process is long and arduous — as it should be," said Dan Ashton, Regional Board Chair. "We start this process in the fall and give it several good looks before turning it over to ratepayers for their own inspection. Then we take at least one more serious look before giving the budget final approval."

The budget process started last summer when RDOS managers started building their programs for the 2013 calendar year for each of the services they administer.

Managers were then required to bring forward change requests, including making a case for increased funding.

Following 1st reading by the Board, the budget was then delivered to stakeholders through a series of public consultations held throughout the regional district. Budget documents were also available for review on the RDOS website.

"We wanted to make sure everyone who desired to review the budget had an opportunity to do so," said Director of Finance Sandy Croteau.

"Our budget is substantial and complex, but we do everything we can to make the review process open and transparent."

The 2013 budget includes \$28.9 million in operating expenses and an additional \$20.7 million in capital expenditures. The RDOS also

administers \$13.9 million in municipal debt payments for its member municipalities.

Operating expenses for 2013 are up about \$410,000 from 2012, largely due to inflationary and contract increases.

"We take the responsibility of financial stewardship very seriously," said Chair Ashton. "If we don't need to spend even a single dollar, we look for ways to save that dollar."

The RDOS expects to collect about \$13.1 million through requisitions from its six member municipalities, eight electoral areas and Penticton Indian Band. An additional \$15.8 million in revenue is budgeted to be collected in user-pay fees, grant funding and other sources.

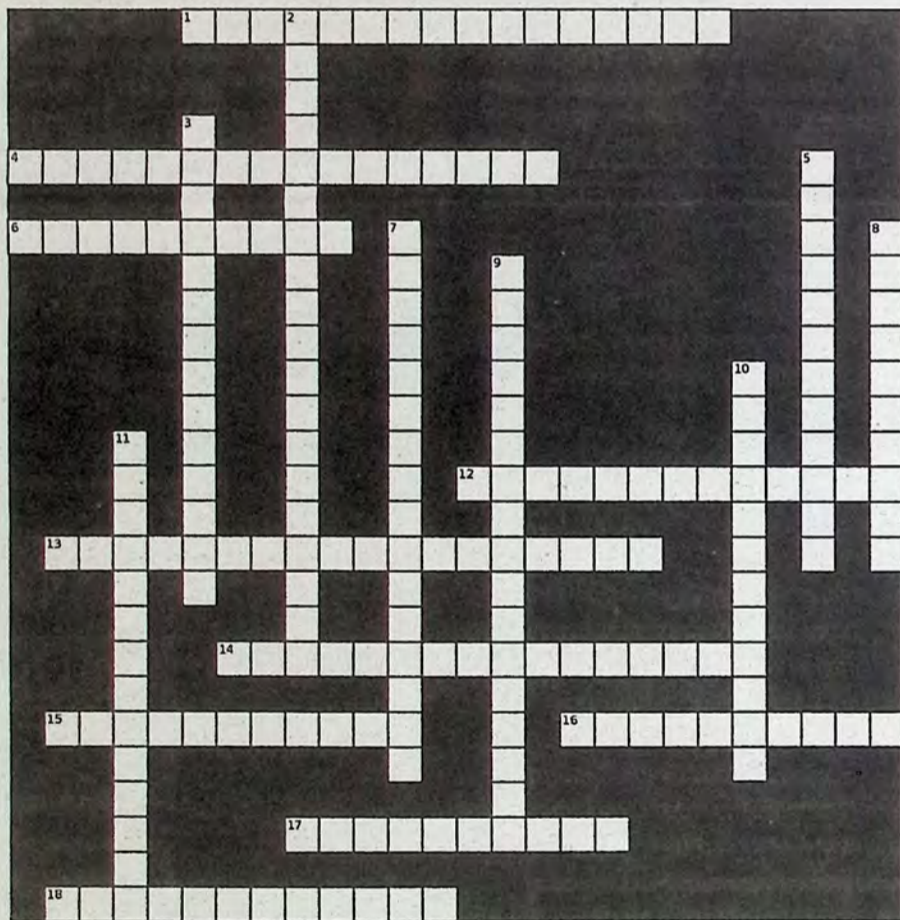
On April 5, 2013 the SOTS and Keremeos Detachment members arrested a 24 year old Hedley male.

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# Candidates Tackle Health Care Questions

 other incentives we should be all looking at, the question is, How much can the community afford and how much healthcare can we expect? What do we want as a community? I admit there are no easy answers but we have to start somewhere.

**Jackie Tegart (BC Liberal Party):** I think that the single largest health issue that we all face is the rising cost of health care, and the need to find ways to do things better, faster, and cheaper. Since 2001, the Ministry of Health budget has doubled to \$16.5 billion per year, and we are responding to growing needs by committing an additional \$2.4 billion over the next 3 years.

However, we are also pursuing innovative new approaches to medicine that can help "bend the cost curve" while improving outcomes.

A good example of this approach is our commitment to nurse practitioners. In 2005, we started the first program in B.C. to train Nurse Practitioners, and currently there are approximately 250 nurse practitioners registered to practice in BC. Following this, in May 2012, our government announced a \$22.2 million initiative to fund 190 new nurse practitioner positions over the next three years. This initiative will provide opportunities for existing nurse practitioners who have been unable to secure a position, as well as ensure there are opportunities present for newly-qualified nurse practitioners graduating in the future. BC is also only the second jurisdiction in Canada to have qualified nurse practitioners admit and discharge patients from hospitals.

6. On March 14th, the provincial government passed the Seniors Advocate Act. Although this is a

positive step for senior citizens in British Columbia, the advocate position is not established as an independent office of the legislature and cannot be the effective critical watchdog that it needs to be.

If you are elected to the legislature would you support an independent seniors advocacy position with real authority to act on behalf of seniors?

**Michael Beauclair (Conservative Party):** Yes I would support an independent Seniors Advocacy Position with Real Authority, since the BCCP "Ensures that our MLAs put the interest of their constituents ahead of that of their party. Thank you for your tough questions. Michael Beauclair BC Conservative Candidate; Fraser-Nicola

**Jackie Tegart (BC Liberal Party):** The BC Liberals have placed a high priority on improving services for

seniors. We are following through on our commitment to establish an Office of the Seniors' Advocate, which will make British Columbia the first jurisdiction in Canada to establish a position of this kind.

The Seniors Advocate will function as a part of government, which will allow the Advocate to work collaboratively with different ministries. However, as a Statutory

Officer, the Advocate will also have strong statutory powers. Anyone who is concerned that a statutory officer won't have enough influence should look at some of the other statutory officers in BC, such as the provincial health officer, Dr. Perry Kendall. Other good examples are the auditor general for local government, the chief coroner and the comptroller general.

This year the RDOS has partnered with private businesses and municipalities for a two week pre-sale of compost bins and the Green Cone. The pre-sale will last from April 1st to April 14th. Residents can come into participating locations and order bins during those two weeks. The bins will then be delivered to the locations for pickup by residents in early May.

In Penticton residents can pre-purchase compost bins or the Green Cone at Art Knapp's Plantland and Florists, Giardino Penticton Nursery and Whole Foods Market. In Keremeos visit Don and Anna's Greenhouse and Garden Centre or the Village of Keremeos Municipal Office.

The Summerland Municipal Hall, Oliver Landfill, Osoyoos Sonora Community Centre and the Princeton Town Office are also set up to pre-sell compost bins and the Green Cone.

The Green Cone will be sold for \$104.85 plus taxes. This system is buried partially in the ground where it breaks down all types of food

waste, meat and even dog waste directly in the soil. This system does not take yard waste so it is a great compliment to an existing compost bin.
