## RCMP conclude Hedley crash investigation

South Okanagan Traffic Services (SOTS) conducted an intensive investigation into the Highway 3 fatal motor vehicle crash just outside Hedley on March 30th. The investigation included the assistance of the Penticton Forensic Identification Section, Collision Reconstructionist and Pathologists. "Multiple versions of the incident were received by SOTS investigators, primarily involving the identity of the driver," states Sgt. Hallett of SOTS.

consistent with the deceased male, 29-year old Steven Roy (no fixed address) being the driver of the vehicle at the time of the incident."

Sgt. Hallett says some residents of Hedley identified another male as being the actual driver of the vehicle.

"Forensic and physical evidence has eliminated this male as being a possible occupant of the vehicle at the time of the collision."

SOTS will not be recommending any charges in relation to the incident.

# Candidates speak at forum

A total of 75 area residents attended the Fraser-Nicola All Candidates Forum May 1st at Princeton Legion Hall.

In their opening statements each candidate had three minutes to talk about their background and what they saw as key issues in the riding.

Liberal Jackie Tegart admitted that being an MLA is a huge commitment but said she believes Fraser-Nicola needs a strong voice in Victoria. Tegart, who is in her third term as Councillor in Ashcroft, was born in Princeton and her parents met in Allenby.

She said her experience comes from community building.

"If there were simple answers to all the issues we would have solved them, but there are no simple solutions."

John Kidder of the Green Party calls Ashcroft home and is the co-founder of the BC Green Party. He worked in Princeton for a period of time.

"The Green Party represents a different way of looking at things – a different way of thinking about our province."

Kidder says there has to be a move-

ment in shifting away from resource-based industry and concentrating on building small businesses, which in turn build local economies.

Conservative Michael Beauclair is from Merritt but his father was born in Princeton and helped build Highway 3. He explained that he had a very practical reason for joining the BC Conservative Party.

"They were the only party that would listen to me."

Beauclair sees a number of challenges in Fraser-Nicola and coming from his background in forestry he pointed to the Mountain Pine Beetle as one of them.

NDP incumbent Harry Lali stated, "This election is about choices, and there are a lot of issues at stake."

Lali, who is the only candidate without a direct family or employment tie to Princeton, pointed to his years of experience as the MLA for this riding and his existing track record.

"I have the experience as a MLA and come to Princeton frequently to get the job done, or do you want someone without a proven record?"

In the question and answer period questions came from various

sources, previously submitted, submitted during the forum or coming directly from the floor.

The first question related to air quality and the desire of Princeton Co-Gen to assist with improving it with a project costing \$1.2-million. They wanted to know if when elected the Fraser-Nicola MLA would support a joint funding project.

All four candidates said they would work with all governing bodies to bring about the funding needed to assist with the upgrade in filtering.

NDP Harry Lali added that this was an "environment versus jobs" issue and that "there's no reason why we can't have both" providing a responsible approach was taken.

When asked to list transportation priorities all candidates pointed to improvements in infrastructure.

Green Party Candidate John Kidder stated, "Highways and bridges are important" but suggested a need to encourage train travel and the reduction of small vehicles on the road.

Harry Lali (NDP) was Highways Minister for three years and said due to the volume of "mega projects in the Lower Mainland in the past

twelve years" other roads in the province have been neglected and need to be improved.

Michael Beauclair (Conservative) agreed with Lali with the statement, "Our secondary highways are in poor shape" and need to be repaired since resources are being moved on many of the secondary routes.

When asked if the candidates would go against their party on an issue the foursome were all in agreement that the desires in Victoria will not always match those of the residents in Fraser-Nicola.

"You are elected to represent the people who you represent, not the other way around," was how Harry Lali (NDP) put it.

"The will of the people must come before the party line," Conservative Michael Beauclair added.

"I'm applying to represent you,"

## First Nations - Part 1

We have seen a fair amount of coverage in the news lately on First Nations' issues. In this first installment on the First Nations, think it might be helpful to put this into an historical context.

The situation of Métis, Inuit, and First Nations peoples is one of the most complex and persistent challenges for the Federal Government.

Successive Liberal and Conservative Governments have failed to establish an agreement on the place of Indigenous peoples in the Canadian federation, and their average living conditions remain far below other Canadians.

Aboriginal issues capture mainstream public interest in a cyclical way, when a crisis emerges. The

IdleNoMore movement (INM) arose as a protest against changes to the Navigable Waters Protection Act, which were part of the Conservative's 2012 budget implementation bill, but quickly became a nation-wide peaceful protest movement that has galvanized Aboriginal and non-aboriginal Canadians to demand change.

Popular pressure and a hunger strike prompted a high-level meeting with the Prime Minister and the Assembly of First Nations (AFN) in January, after which the Prime Minister agreed to provide oversight of the file. AFN National Chief Shawn Atleo's decision to attend the meeting on the Prime Minister's terms was controversial among First Nations, and revealed a divide between First Nations leadership and a grassroots movement increasingly frustrated with the status quo.

The Aboriginal population represents approximately 4% of Canada's overall population. According to Statistics Canada's 2006 Census, there are approximately 1.7 million people who identify as having some First Nations, Inuit or Métis heritage in Canada, among whom almost 1.2 million report an "Aboriginal Identity", marking a stronger attachment to that heritage. Of this number, almost 400,000 are Métis, 50,000 are Inuit and the others (700,000) have "North American Indian" background.

Half of Aboriginal peoples in Canada are under the age of 25, and the population is growing at 2.5 times the rate of the rest of the country. This makes Aboriginal peoples the youngest and fastest growing population segment in the country, which will increase the significance of this demographic over time.

In 1969, the Trudeau Government published a white paper on "Indian policy" that recommended scrapping the Indian Act, abolishing the Indian Affairs Department's special programs, and transferring Indian lands to Indian people and

away from ownership by reserves. Aboriginal leaders denounced the white paper as a recipe for assimilation. They said it rejected their special standing in Canada as the original occupiers of the land. The Federal NDP joined them in this position.

Trudeau relented and in 1982, existing Aboriginal and treaty rights were recognized and affirmed in Section 35 of the Constitution. Despite several Government policy moves towards recognizing self-government, successive Liberal and Conservative Governments have failed to make progress on establishing a true "nation-to-nation" relationship.

Following the 1990 Oka Crisis, the Federal Government created a Royal Commission on Aboriginal Peoples (RCAP). In 1996, RCAP made over 400 recommendations including that the Indian Act be replaced by a third order of government for Indigenous peoples within Canada. This was welcomed by a majority of Indigenous peoples as well as the Federal NDP. Progress on implementing the recommendations has been very slow, and most is left undone.

In 2005, just as they were heading to certain defeat after a decade in power, the Martin Government put forward the Kelowna Accord. In the Accord they pledged a \$5.1-billion budget plan to address the low standard of living of First Nations, Inuit and Métis peoples in Canada so that it would be equal to that of all other Canadians.

When the Harper Government came to power, it promised to meet the targets of the Accord, but has failed to do so.

In 2008, the Federal Government issued an Official Apology to the Survivors of Residential Schools. In his speech, Prime Minister Stephen Harper acknowledged the important role NDP Leader Jack Layton had played in pushing for the apology to take place.

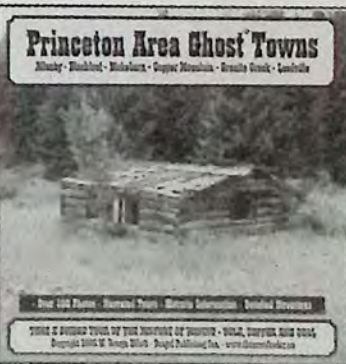

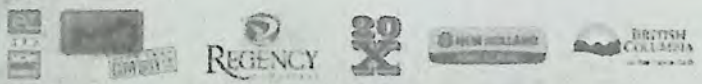

## It's Election Time Again!

British Columbians face another election, time to decide who to pick on the ballot. This election has had a twist to it as the CBC has caught the Liberals in a couple of inaccuracies.

The first was the claim that thousands of people left BC when the NDP were in power. The CBC checked, and it turned out BC had a net gain of 126,000 people when the NDP formed the government, but there was a net loss of 50,000 when the Liberals came into power.

The other inaccuracy stemmed from Clark's claim that Moody's, a credit rating agency, verified the liberal budget as balanced. Moody's denied that statement. Credit rating agencies do not verify budgets as balanced or not. Moody's stated they agreed to the budget's plan to balance the budget but doubted it could be achieved in the specified time given.

Moody's does say the Clark government has 'a track record of prudent fiscal planning' but added that the Clark government would have to sell off a half billion dollars in

assets to balance their current budget. Moody's April report stated these sales 'cannot be relied on to resolve structural budget imbalances'.

Moody's further denied it ever expressed concerns about a change in BC's government that would lead to a downgrading of BC's credit rating. Moody's gives BC a negative credit outlook due to recent accumulation of debt under the Liberals. To reverse the negative credit outlook, BC would have to pay down the debt.

Dominion Bond Service says the Clark government's budget might not be implemented if there is a change of government and the election of an NDP government "could result in a change in fiscal direction". This is the same as saying if the NDP forms the government they might come out with a budget of their own.

Saying the NDP would spend an extra \$3 billion was another error CBC's Reality Check discovered. The NDP spending plan would re-allocate funds and might cost \$2 billion more.

The Green Party is in the mix and what they want is sustainability, end to corporate welfare, more power at the regional level, more renewable energy initiatives, no subsidies for polluters, and an end to governments going into debt.

The Conservatives want more focus on resource industry revenue.

For all of the parties, the top consideration is health, followed by education.

Both the Green Party and the Conservatives have never been in power, but it might be interesting to see what they would do if elected.

I am not sure about any of the parties. I like parties that tell you quite boldly, "Here's what we'll do and this is how we'll do it." I especially like to know the 'how' part of the equation.

Most people tend to see an election as being a contest between parties and their leaders. I tend to make it a local contest between who the candidates are in my own voting area. Is the candidate a person of good reputation, does he or she have any experience in government at any level? Will this person serve the needs of my area first, or serve the political party first? These are the questions I ask myself during any election campaign.

One of the things I really don't like is character assassination unless the candidate can be proven to have done something illegal. If the person has done something illegal, then that person should not be in government, in my opinion.

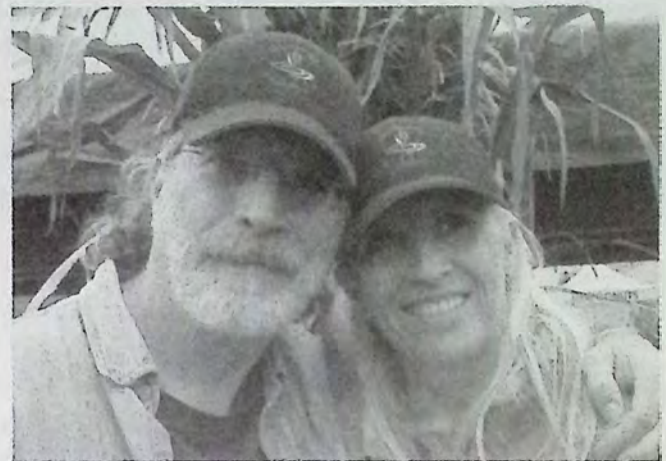
When it comes to character assassination, nobody does it better than the federal Conservative Party. They took shots at Ignatieff before an election was called. The ultimate character assassination took place the day after Justin Trudeau became leader of the federal Liberal Party when the Conservatives started running television advertisements questioning Trudeau's ability to lead a government. My own reaction was to laugh. Are the Conservatives so frightened of the Trudeau name that they have to attack him long before any election is on the horizon? This could seriously backfire, as the Conservatives are giving Trudeau a lot more publicity than the Liberal Party could afford!

The fact is, most Canadians do not like these "attack" ads, even though experts in advertising say they work. What I see is one more use of American-style electioneering, just like the polling station scam during the federal election. The new game seems to be this: if you can't win by offering a good solution to the nation's problems, then fight dirty. No wonder politicians have such a bad name!

We will find out next week what kind of government we British Columbians will live with for the next four years. I hope everyone with the right to vote will go out and mark their ballots. It is not only our right, it is our duty.

In the new year we will see another general juried art show for all artists, but...it may have a theme. So stay in touch and wait for more information.

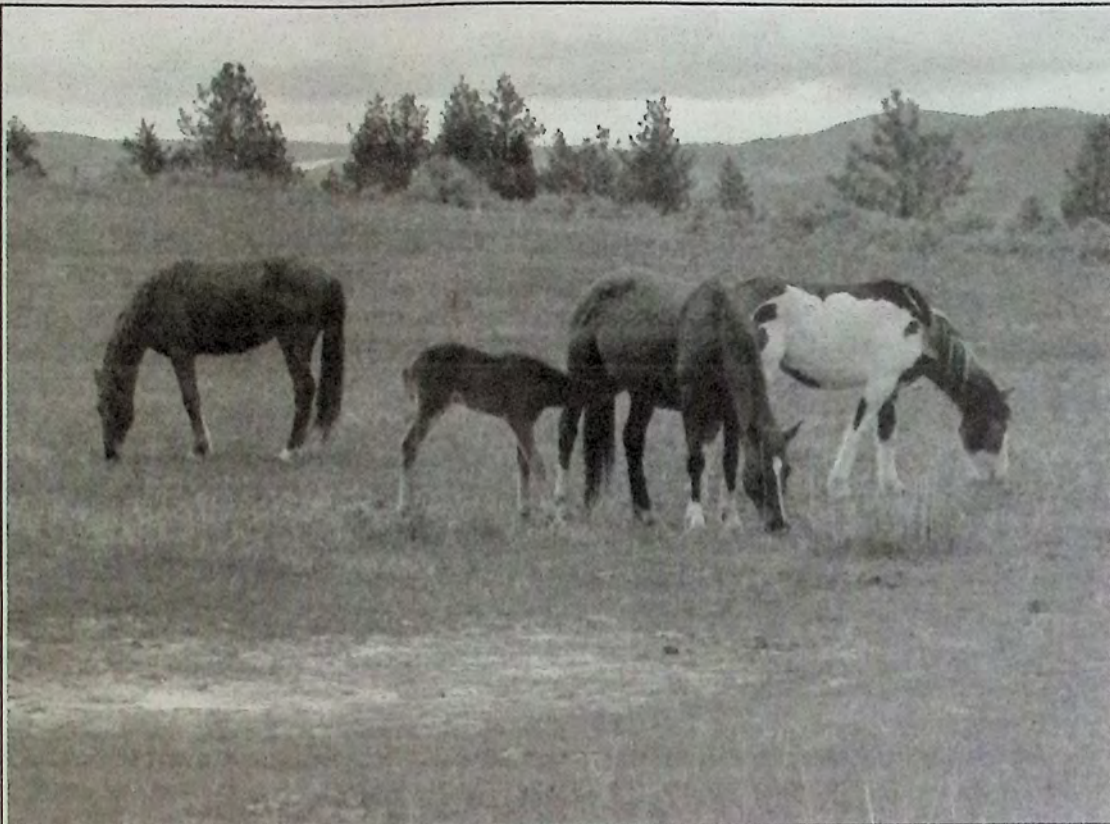

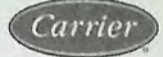

## Spring in the US breaks records

Thousands of weather records have been broken in the American mid-west and prairie regions this spring. Most areas have weather records dating back at least 100 years, but no spring has been so cold as the spring of 2013. From Minnesota to Denver, Colorado to Rapid City, South Dakota, freezing temperatures and snow have set record lows. In Denver last Wednesday, the high for the day was just 2 degrees Celsius. In Rapid City, the heaviest snowfall in any month was in April. In Minnesota, baseball teams fled south due to snow and low temperatures. In Canada, conditions were not any better in the prairie provinces. Saskatchewan has experienced the longest winter on record, and record lows and record snowfalls for March and April. Meteorologists believe a huge high pressure zone over Greenland is forcing the jet stream further south, dragging colder air southward from the northwest. Some weather commentators are calling this spring 'the winter that would not end'.

## Hedley dinner helps kids

Sharon and Loretta Minshull, along with Jean Robinson and family, put together a fundraiser in Hedley to support Kids Help Line. Walk So Kids Can Talk is a Canada-wide initiative to raise funds to make sure the Kids Help Line continues to operate. The Bank of Montreal is the major sponsor, but smaller fundraisers such as the Hedley dinner and loonie auction contribute to the success of the program.

When young people feel they have nowhere to turn to deal with their problems, they can call Kids Help

Line. Assistance can be found for them no matter where they live. This service to children saves lives, as one young woman at the Hedley dinner was contemplating suicide when she called Kids Help Line and found the help she needed. One of the key issues for many young people is bullying, but there are many different problems young people face and feel they have nowhere to turn for counseling or assistance.

The dinner was delicious, with lots of variety and lots of food, as fewer people showed than expected. The

array of donated goods for the loonie auction was outstanding. Businesses and organizations in Princeton, Hedley, Keremeos and Penticton were generous in their donations of goods and gift certificates. Thanks to their generosity, a total of \$1,200 was raised to keep Kids Help Line in operation.

The major fundraising event in BC is the Abbotsford-Fraser Valley walk, where the Hedley funds will be presented. All of the money raised in BC stays in BC to assist the Kids Help Line here.

## RDOS supports Co-Gen request

The Princeton Co-Gen Corp. owns and operates a pellet plant on Old Hedley Road in Princeton. The Plant employs 40 to 70 people directly and another 40 to 60 indirectly in the Princeton area. It is a significant contributor to the Princeton economy.

The current ownership group purchased the plant in 2006 and were immediately required to invest heavily to upgrade the electrical system at the Plant and, with increased testing by the Ministry of Environment, are aware that their emissions are a significant factor in the poor air quality ratings for

Princeton during specific times of the year. Scrubbers are required for the 4 stacks at the Plant, estimated to cost approximately \$1,200,000.00.

The ownership group has solid demand and would like to increase their production. They need to address the air quality issues prior to doing so. The owners have met with federal and provincial representatives and are interested in making a submission to senior levels of government for the funds necessary under the tripartite funding model, of which they would pay the local share.

The Regional Board of the RDOS

(Regional District of Okanagan Similkameen) discussed the matter at their April monthly meeting and supports the request from the Princeton Co-Gen Corporation to the government of Canada for funding to purchase equipment to meet air quality standards in emissions from the Pellet Plant. - submitted

## Utility bill shocker

**S**ome area residents have seen their electricity bills spike compared to last year after FortisBC introduced a new billing system.

In Olalla, Robby Kilborn believes the company's two-tiered charges have resulted in a significant jump compared to last year. Other residents living in rural areas within the Regional District of Okanagan-Similkameen have also noticed big changes in their recent billings.

Under its new system put in place on July 1, 2012, Fortis bills people in two blocks instead of charging a flat rate for electricity use. It charges 8.8 cents for the first 1,600 kilowatt hours and any electricity use above that costs 12.95 cents per kW-h. Bills are tallied over a two-month period.

Fortis stated it changed to the two-tier system because the B.C. Utilities Commission wanted to curtail electrical consumption.

Kilborn, who lives in a separate addition but in the same household as another family member, said since the change has been implemented they've been paying substantially more even though they've been diligent about using less power.

In a period between Dec. 28, 2012 and Feb. 26, 2013, they were charged \$766; in the previous year from Dec. 28, 2011 to Feb. 23, 2012, their bill was \$1,107—a difference of \$341 and a jump of nearly 45 per cent.

When Fortis implemented the new system part of that included a rate increase of 6.6 per cent.

Kilborn noted how this has occurred even though they scrutinize how much electricity is used. For instance, he restricts stove usage cooking on only one burner about four or five times a week and never uses the oven; there are two refrigerators and one small newer freezer in the home; they've shut off most of their baseboard heating and keep the heat about 60 degrees; they use the washing machine one or two times per month; the home is equipped with high efficiency light bulbs and no lights are kept on unnecessarily.

Donald Thorsteinson of Oliver is also having trouble accepting that Fortis has only raised rates by about six per cent compared to last year.

His most recent bill was for a two-month period running from late December to early February, he was hit with a bill for \$1,384. Last year for approximately the same time frame, his bill was about \$900. This amounts to about a 40 per cent increase from 2012.

Thorsteinson, who is 79, was able to make special payment arrangement with Fortis to pay the most recent bill in two instalments and then he'll be switching to monthly equalization payments

of \$380 a month.

The total is still much higher than last year when he was making equalization payments of \$350 per month and had a zero balance at the end of the year.

"There's no way you can heat a house with all the electrical for 800 kilowatts a month," he said. "You just can't do it so you're automatically up in a high rate."

After he began taking his concerns public and to the media he's spoken with other people that have told him they're also experiencing "sky high" Fortis bills.

Thorsteinson said he and his wife haven't been doing anything differently than they were last year nor have they made any changes to their home.

As a couple that live on a pension they've got a limited amount of money available. Thorsteinson said the additional amount they'll be paying for electricity will now come out of their grocery money.

The FortisBC website states the BCUC asked the company to adjust its rate structure in order to provide a price incentive to encourage conservation. The site also states a majority of customers, about 75 per cent, will see a decrease on their bills because of the new rate structure. The average customer, using about 2,500 kW-h or less every two months, should see a modest decrease.

Chris Collingwood, whose mother lives in Okanagan Falls, believes the increase is a cash grab.

Collingwood's mother lives alone in an 1,100-square-foot, two-bedroom, and one-bathroom home with no basement. He noted her one-month electric bill is for 654kW-h.

"This initially looks more like what Fortis was claiming in the statistics they gave previously," said Collingwood. But when we look closer at the numbers for my mother's place and realize that she was not living at her house at that time period (Dec. 5, 2012 – Feb. 2013 things become suspicious."

He pointed out his mother's place wasn't occupied during that period and that the thermostat was turned down to 50 degrees (Fahrenheit), no appliances were being used, no oven and only a single 60-watt bulb was used.

"Is this the environment the average Fortis customer's house should be like in order to obtain this 'slight decline' they referred to?" he asked.

Collingwood said he's dubious that the rate increase was made exclusively in an effort to make customers more fuel efficient and has no interest in obtaining financial gain.

In a letter to the Herald, Dennis Swanson, Director of Regulatory Affairs for FortisBC, said the company understands customers' concerns with the cost of electricity.

"Much of this discussion has come forward in recent weeks as our customers have been receiving their winter bills under our new residential conservation rate that we were mandated to implement by the BC Utilities Commission."

Under the residential conservation rate, 75 per cent of customers will have lower bills, averaged throughout the year, said Swanson.

"As many of our customers have noticed, win-

ter tends to be a highest-use season for electricity and it is common for customers' bills to increase to reflect this," he said.

## And just how accurate are the new metres

Rob Kilborn of Olalla is convinced there's something amiss with the electricity metres that were installed on the family's home.

Kilborn said that FortisBC installed the digital metres in November of 2010 and since then he's questioned the readings it provides.

In reviewing bills from the past several years, Kilborn noted that in 2010, they were charged for 340 days and used 18,557 kilowatt hours; the previous year in 2009, they used 19,564 kW-h over a 366-day period. There were also power tools in use on the property during in 2009 as well.

In 2011 (the metre was installed in mid-November of 2010) they used 29,470 kW-h in 366 days and in 2012, they used 32,676 kW-h in 365 days.

However in looking back at records that date back to 2004, the metre readings don't seem to make sense, he said.

In 2008 (364 days), they used 15,016 kW-h; in 2007 (368 days), they used 15,097 kW-h; in 2006 (368 days), they used 15,238 kW-h; in 2005 (367 days), they used 17,086 kW-h and in 2004 (366 days), they used 16,395 kW-h.

In the most recent bill from Dec. 28, 2013, to Feb. 26, 2013 (123 days), according to metre readings, they've used 15,876 kW-h.

"We're being charged a lot more wattage than we're using, said Kilborn, who knows of nearby residents living in a mobile home park that don't have the digital metres and he's been told they're rates are similar to previous years.

Kilborn and other residents are circulating a petition which they plan to forward to Fortis which requests an inside audit to find out why electrical usage has changed since the new metres were installed.

# Mischa Popoff releases outrageous 'bully' video

The bull took Mischa Popoff by the horns in his latest YouTube video, titled *Mischa Popoff Will Not Be Bullied*.

The independent candidate for Boundary-Similkameen makes no apologies for getting turfed from the B.C. Conservative party on April 25 for comments made in several newspaper columns. But it's how he says it that makes this a contender for the most memorable video you'll see in the provincial campaign.

Dressed in jeans and a cowboy hat in a cow pasture, Popoff rails against the B.C. Liberals and Tory leader John Cummins while getting constantly nudged in the rear end and pushed up against a fence by his sidekick, a bull.

To his credit, Popoff stays on script while the toro uses its head and horns to lift and drop him from behind for more than three minutes.

"Hey, ya ever feel like you're being bullied? People in the Boundary-Similkameen sure feel that way," he begins.

Popoff goes into a history of candidates getting pushed out of the way in his riding, then cranks up the verbal intensity as he rants against Conservative leader John Cummins.

"The leader of the B.C. Conservative party kicked me out because I'm too conservative. The bullying's gotta stop," says Popoff.

At one point he grips the fence to stay standing. No matter. He stays focused on the camera and keeps tub-thumping:

"If John Cummins wants to pretend that I'm insensitive of women, just because I said we should discourage single motherhood and encourage kids to be raised in families, he's got another thing coming.

"Who got to you John? What kind of leader are

you?"

The off-beat video could pay off at the ballot box, said Wolfgang Depner, a political-science graduate student at UBC Okanagan. It generates attention and makes him sound like a voice for the people.

"I'd say it's effective," Depner said. "It's certainly an interesting visual. It's memorable. If you're running for public office, you need to get the public's attention, and this video certainly does that."

Popoff points out the B.C. Conservatives did well in his riding in the 2009 provincial election. Candidate Joe Cardoso garnered just over 20 per cent of the votes - a share Popoff apparently plans to steal from Cummins this time around.

"John Cummins just bullied me and all the farmers, and loggers and hard-working people of this riding right out the picture," he said.

"Shame on you, John. We're gonna find out on May 14 exactly how this is gonna play out.

"You can rest assured of one thing John -- the bullying's gonna stop right then."

Despite online critics saying the video borders on bestiality, Depner predicts Popoff could reach "a substantial double-digit amount" in the riding's popular vote. The candidate is tapping into a part of the riding that's sympathetic to his kind of populism.

"This type of defiance that Mischa Popoff tries to express has some traction," Depner said. "(It) speaks to this populist streak in the Okanagan."

Within one week there have been 21,000 hits.

# Challenge event asks RDOS for help

Challenge Penticton is looking for a \$25,000 boost from the Regional District of Okanagan-Similkameen.

Barb Haynes, general manager for the long-distance triathlon, told RDOS directors that Challenge Penticton has a total budget of \$960,000 for the inaugural 2013 race.

Of this, \$575,000 in projected revenue will come from athlete registration fees, \$170,000 from global sponsorships and \$85,000 from local sponsorships, including the RDOS. Merchandising, a retail expo, and other revenue sources will account for the remainder.

"At the end of the day, we will balance our budget and be able to move forward," she said.

Haynes said Challenge will actively promote communities within the South Okanagan-Similkameen as part of its publicity and promotion of the triathlon.

So far, 1,362 athletes have registered for the

Aug. 25 event. It's anticipated the total will reach up to 1,700 by race day.

While that is about 1,000 fewer than last year's Ironman Canada triathlon, Haynes noted it has surpassed the original 1,200-athlete goal.

"Eventually, Challenge Penticton will get to a point where it is in a positive profit scenario, once our numbers grow back to where we have typically enjoyed them," she said.

It's anticipated the turnout will be close to 3,000 within three years. The race route remains unchanged from previous years under Ironman.

Haynes said any potential profits will be channelled through grants back into communities throughout the South Okanagan-Similkameen.

George Bush, RDOS director for Cawston, lauded the plans to support outlying communities along the race route.

"Before, we were never even put on the map, yet hundreds and hundreds of us (Cawston) citizens

came out to support it," Bush said.

Challenge is competing for entrants from two other high-profile triathlons, also being held on

Aug. 25. Ironman Canada, which has now moved to Whistler, will also be run that same day as will another Ironman race in Louisville, Ky.

Haynes noted Challenge will offer \$75,000 in prize money for the top 10 male and female professionals -- up from \$60,000 offered by Ironman Canada in 2012.

All the pro athletes registered in the Challenge race will be required to participate in a certain number of community and other events during the week leading up to the race.

The Challenge Family, through its sanction by Triathlon B.C., requires that there be drug testing of urine samples. No blood tests are required.

RDOS directors deferred the \$25,000 sponsorship request to a later date.

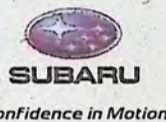

# Crue rocks SOEC

Let's not beat around the bush. Motley Crue is far from a great rock-and-roll band. When you look at other 1980s hard rock bands, they don't have a song in their catalogue anywhere near the caliber of Jump or Wanted Dead Or Alive or collectively an album that can hold its own with Appetite for Destruction or Pyromania.

Yet, they're still together... and 32 years later.

The four original members of Motley Crue played a 95-minute show at the South Okanagan Events Centre last month, the first date of a Canada-wide tour in support of their yet to be released and still-unnamed 10th studio album. (They previewed the lead single, Sex.)

So how does Motley Crue do it?

It's all about the show.

They had some bizarre effects, starting with their grand entrance, where they marched through the aisles on the SOEC floor dressed as what appeared to be a grim reaper, with the two accompanying go-go dancers/back-up singers on their shoulders making way to a stage which resembled a Cirque du Soleil show on LSD.

The music was loud, there were continuous and often unnecessary 'F' bombs and they encouraged audience participation.

"We were just in Australia with KISS and you guys are (expletive deleted) an awesome audience," Nikki Sixx told the sold-out crowd late in the show.

The effects also included a roller-coaster drum kit where Tommy Lee hung upside down. He later invited an audience member to ride with him which added little to the show and killed the momentum.

There's also notoriety. Motley Crue made headlines throughout the 1980s and 90s and for the wrong reasons... run-ins with the law, Sixx's near fatal heroin overdose and Lee's homemade porn movie co-starring ex-wife Pamela Anderson which even hardcore porn lovers found boring.

Their concert shirts made reference to the "bad boys of rock and roll." Some audience members even wore black wigs resembling the bad-hair from the 80s, the decade Motley Crue first blew on the scene.

They've obviously mellowed. All reports are that they were complete gentleman, even staying in the same motel where a judge's convention was going on at the same time. And give them credit. Here's four middle-aged men up on stage giving the fans what they want with no signs of slowing down or calling it a day.

Chances are they did little to convert new fans, but don't tell the old ones that. The audience seemed receptive and delighted with their performance, minus the bitching that they didn't plan an encore.

The four-man band, plus the two dancers, saved their three showstoppers for last -- Dr. Feelgood, Girls Girls Girls and Kickstart My Heart, the latter which you now hear at nearly every Penticton Vees hockey game.

Opening for Motley Crue was Canadian rock band Big Wreck.

It must be noted that singer Vince Neil omitted the quirky line in the bridge to Girls Girls Girls.

Vince: "Hey Tommy check this one out."

Tommy: "What Vince where?"

They didn't say it. And that's plain stinky.

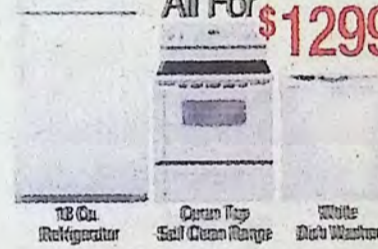

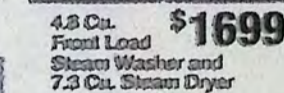

## Century Grain Asparagus Benedict

**Vote by Mail** You can ask for a Vote by Mail package from your district electoral office or through the Elections BC website at [elections.bc.ca](http://elections.bc.ca)

**Vote at advance voting** Voters can attend any advance voting location in the province from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. (local time), Wednesday, May 8 through Saturday, May 11. All advance voting locations are wheelchair accessible. ♿

**Vote on General Voting Day** Voters can attend any general voting location in the province from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. (Pacific time), Tuesday, May 14, 2013.

### Identification Rules for Voting

Voters must prove their identity and current residential address to get a ballot or register to vote at the time of voting. Any one of the following pieces of Identification is acceptable:

- BC drivers licence
- BC identification card
- BC Services Card
- Certificate of Indian Status

If you don't have any of the above, bring two documents that together prove your identity and current residential address. A complete list of acceptable identification is available from Elections BC.

Voters without identification can be vouched for by a voter in their electoral district who has identification, or by a direct family member, or by someone who has legal authority to make personal care decisions for the voter.

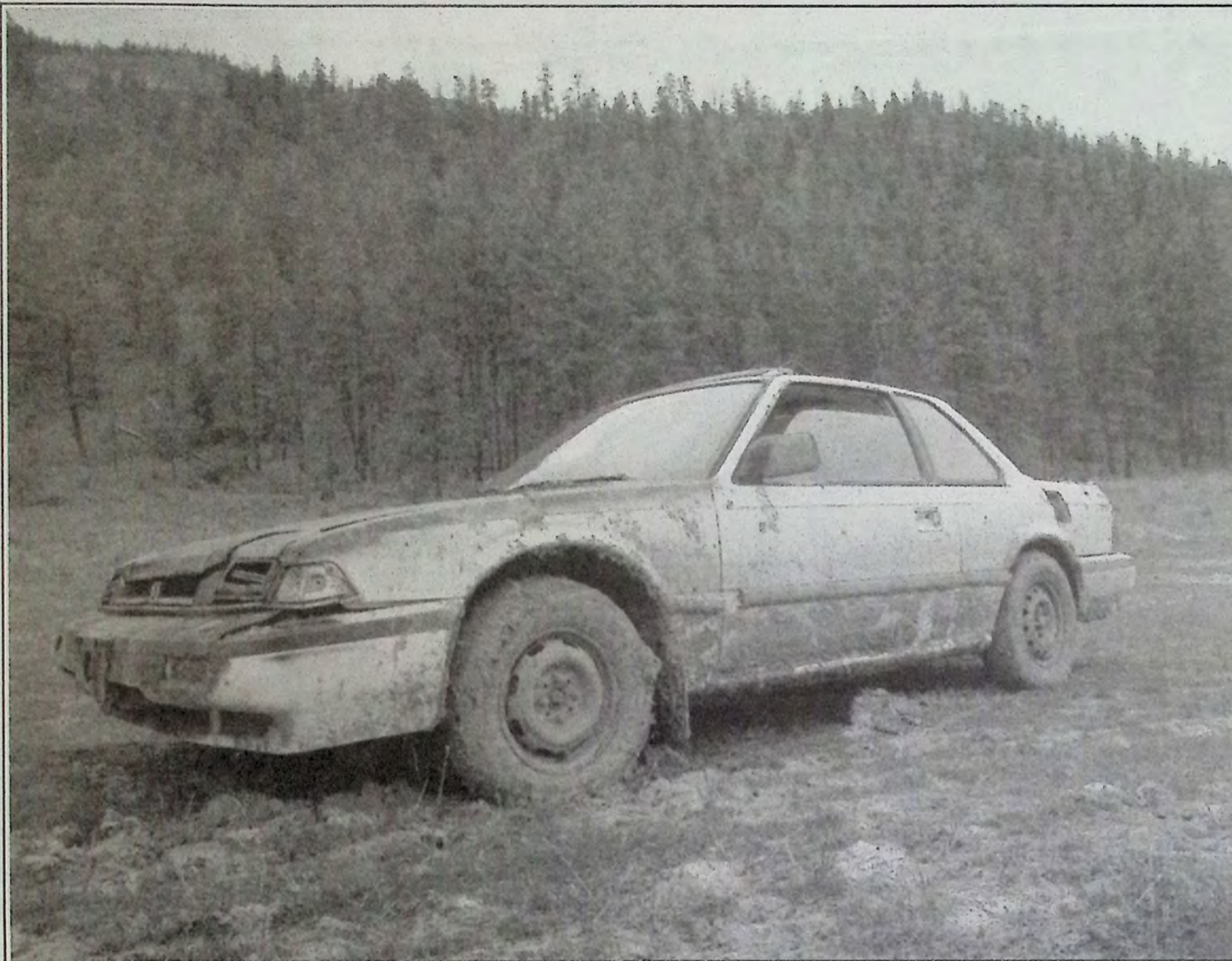

# Candidates speak at forum

..... continued from Front Page was how Liberal Jackie Tegart explained her point of view on the subject.

"We do not have whipped votes," John Kidder said of the Green Party.

"We value diversity across the board and the constituency has to come first."

On the subject of privatization Harry Lali (NDP) responded with, "When you give away the power of your utilities to foreign interests you give away your sovereignty."

A question on the centralization of healthcare saw all candidates agree

that the current system is not a successful system.

"This is a huge issue in small communities," Liberal Jackie Tegart said.

"We need to work really hard through local elected officials and advocates to make IHA hear us."

Asked to list economic priorities forestry, skills and training, transportation and mining were common choices.

Liberal Jackie Tegart listed fiscal responsibility, a balanced budget, debt reduction and economic development, which received a few jeers

from the audience.

When asked for opinions related to the reintroduction of the 'business vote' in municipal elections all candidates agreed on the current one person - one vote system.

Conservative Michael Beauclair said business can have influence and that votes should stay with individuals.

Probably the best line during the evening came from John Kidder

(Green Party) on the subject of gas fracking. When the microphone was handed to him he said firmly that there should be "no frackin' fracking - it's pretty straightforward."

## Lali supports rural, seniors healthcare

Last week BC NDP leader Adrian Dix announced New Democrats are committed to a variety of expanded health care services for people in communities where they are needed the most.

"We will commit \$70 million over three years to enable more seniors and people with chronic disabilities and complex conditions to receive home support and community care," said Dix. "An NDP government would improve the standard of residential care for seniors who cannot remain at home, investing \$35 million to improve basic services."

Effective home support reduces the demands on our higher-cost acute care beds in hospitals, freeing up needed resources for other health services.

For BC's rural communities, the NDP will invest an additional \$45 million to rebuild basic surgery, obstetrics, diagnostics and critical care in hospitals.

"I am most proud of the Rural Acute Care Initiative, which will restore critical services to hospitals directly in our community," said

Harry Lali, the Fraser-Nicola NDP Candidate. "Our rural hospitals, in communities like Princeton, Ashcroft and Merritt, should provide basic surgeries, obstetrics, diagnostics and critical care restoring the safety and services rural British Columbians deserve."

After 12 years, the BC Liberals have increased privatization, cut long-term care and home support services, and cut front-line mental health services. Wait times for some important procedures have grown, many emergency rooms are overcrowded, and patient care - particularly for seniors - has suffered.

Lali said, "The BC Liberals now say they will cut even further, reducing spending on health care to well below what is needed to maintain core patient services. Their last budget arbitrarily decreased overall health spending to create the illusion of a balanced budget."

Harry Lali and the NDP support quality public health care. Health care is one of the strongest expressions of British Columbians' shared commitment to a fair and compassionate society.

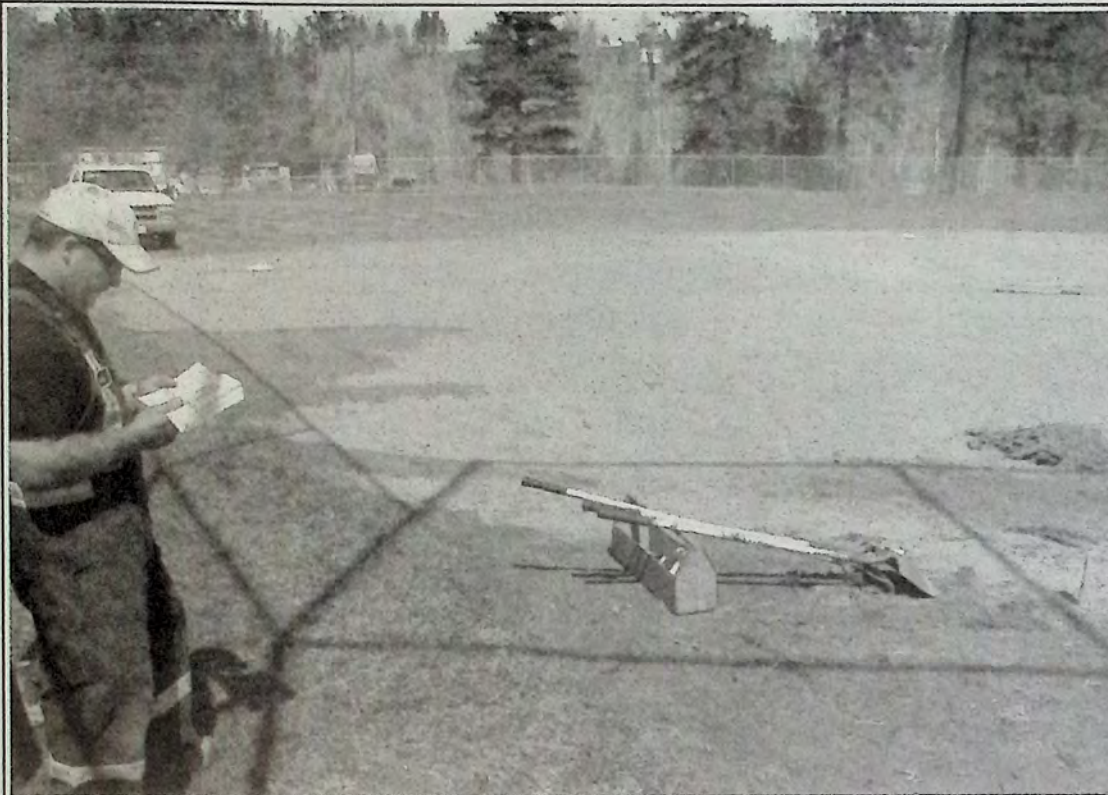

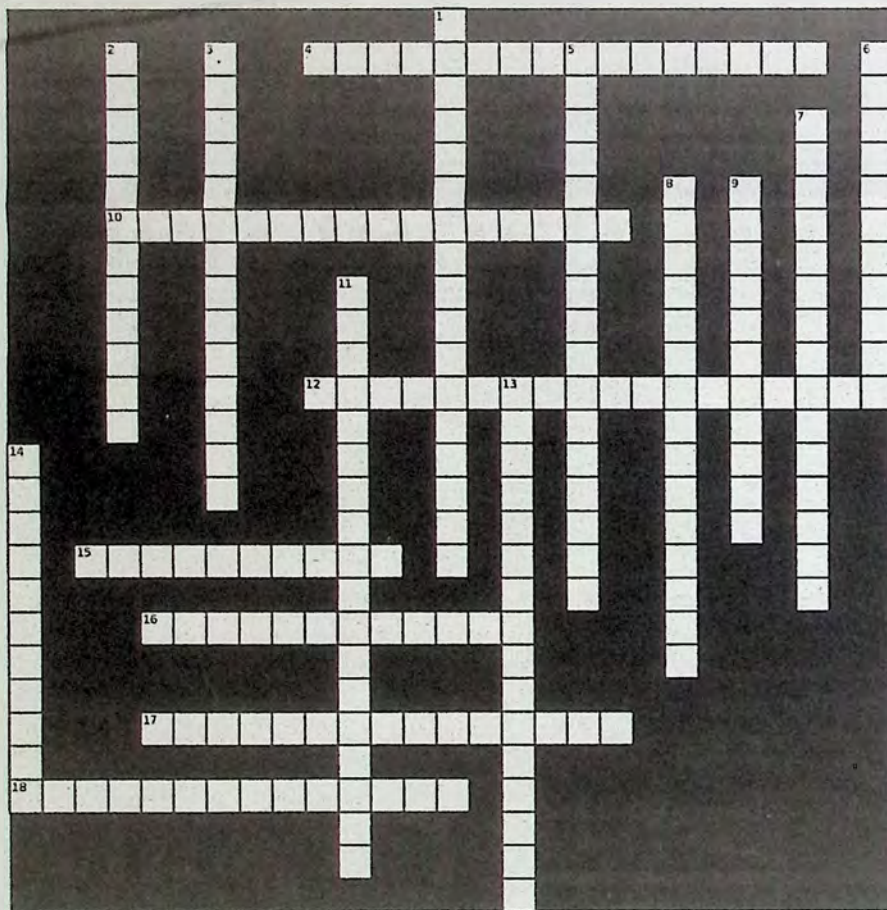

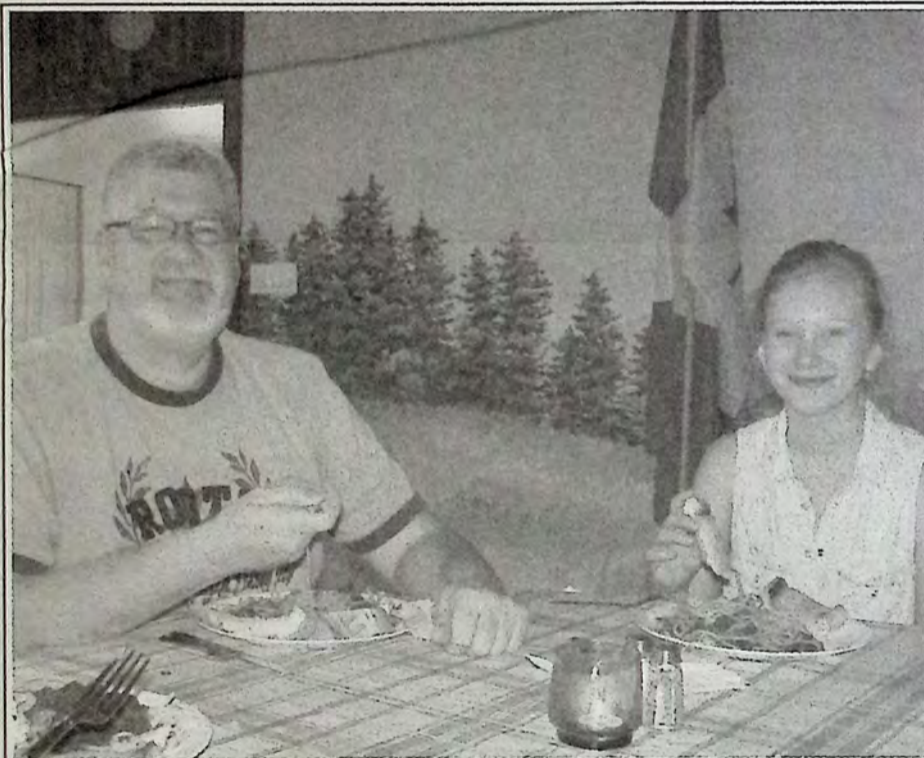
