How the Similkameen voted

Now that the dust has settled following British Columbia's 40th General Election May 14th it is time to look at how the ridings in the Similkameen Valley did.

In Fraser-Nicola, which includes Princeton, Coalmont and Tulameen, Liberal Jackie Tegart was elected with 5,539 votes, or 44.9%. Incumbent Harry Lali (NDP) had 4,785 (38.8%), John Kidder (Green) finished with 1,774 (9.5%) and Michael Beauclair (Conservative)

collected 832 (6.8%) of the votes. Looking at margin of victories, Tegart beat Lali by 754 votes, slightly less than the 873-vote margin Lali had over Liberal Ella Brown, which re-elected him in 2009.

In Boundary-Similkameen, which includes Hedley, Keremeos and Cawston, Liberal Linda Larson was elected with 7,853 (46.3%) of the votes cast. Sam Hencheroff (NDP) had 6,656 (39.3%), John Kwasnica

CMMC announces '13 Q1 results

Copper Mountain Mining Corporation (TSX: CUM) (the "Company" or "Copper Mountain") announced May 14th revenues of \$55.1 million after pricing adjustments and treatment charges for the three months ended March 31, 2013.

Jim O'Rourke, President and CEO of Copper Mountain, remarked "although concentrator operating time has challenged us longer than we anticipated following the start-up period, we are confident that the major issues causing unscheduled downtime of SAG mill grates, ball mill motor programming, tailing line wear repairs and water level in the tailings management facility have been addressed and are behind

us. The resolution to these design and supply issues provide a significant step forward towards us achieving our production goals".

O'Rourke continued, "Looking forward, management's efforts are fully focused on optimizing mine and mill operations which include finalizing the review work on the installation of secondary crushing at the mine site. The test that was completed in March, with pre-crushed ore to the SAG Mill, was extremely enlightening and demonstrated that with pre-crushing the concentrator can achieve throughput rates above the designed capacity of 35,000 tpd. Following this test with pre-crushed ore, a second test was completed with ore blasted with high energy

explosives to create increased fragmentation to enhance SAG Mill capacity. This test was also successful in demonstrating increased mill throughput. In the immediate and short term, we plan to continue to utilize high energy blasting and continue with a contractor to crush up to 10,000 tpd of minus 2 inch ore to meet our tonnage goals. Long term we are focused on finalizing our plans for the installation of a secondary crusher to consistently achieve mill tonnage above our 35,000 tpd design capacity".

Production during the quarter totaled 14.2 million pounds of copper, 5,300 ounces of gold, and 64,200 ounces of silver. Sales for the quarter were 15 million pounds of copper, 5,800 ounces of gold, and 69,200 ounces of silver, generating a gross profit of \$8.1 million for the quarter.

Copper Mountain Mine
During the quarter, the company completed three shipments of concentrate containing approximately 15.0 million pounds of copper to Japan for smelting and recorded revenues, net of smelter charges and pricing adjustments, of \$55.1 mil-

lion, realizing a gross profit of \$8.1 million. The total cash cost of copper sold for the three months ended March 31, 2013 was US\$2.18 per pound of copper after gold and sil-

ver by-product credits. Mining activities continued in the Pit #3 and Pit#2 area during the quarter. A total of 14.5 million continued on Page 2

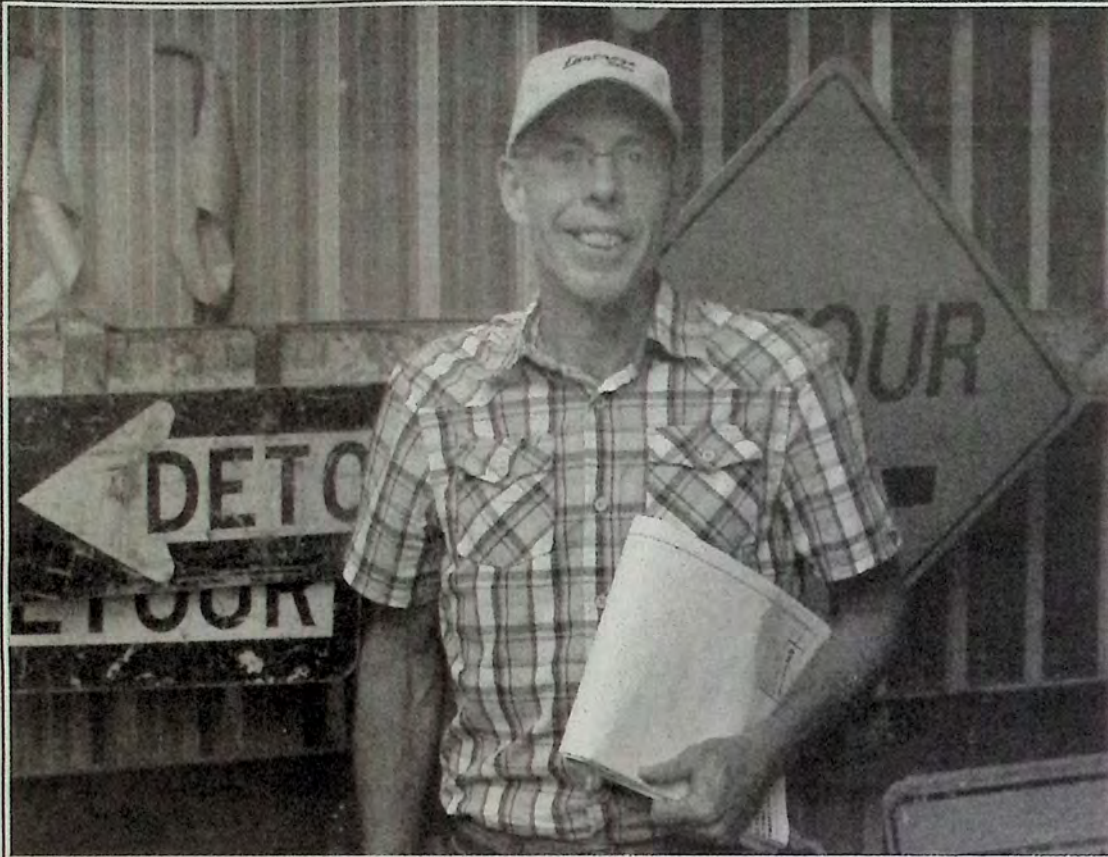
- Gross profit for the quarter was \$8.1 million.
- Copper concentrate shipments totalled approximately 26.8 DMT during the first quarter of 2013.
- Concentrate contained approximately 15.0 million pounds of copper, 5,800 ounces of gold, and 69,000 ounces of silver.
- Total production for the 2013 first quarter at Copper Mountain Mine (100%) was 14.2 million pounds of copper, 5,300 ounces of gold and 64,200 ounces of silver.
- Mining activities continued at a steady rate of 172,000 tonnes per day moved during the first quarter of 2013.
- Milling activities continued to improve – Operating time in particular, improved by approximately 5% to 85.9% in the first quarter of 2013 (including 93.3% in February) as compared to the 2012 average of 82.1%.
- EBITDA¹ and Adjusted EBITDA² were \$7.5 million and \$17.6 million respectively.
- Adjusted earnings^{3 4} were \$7.8 million or \$0.08 per share.
- Site cash costs were US\$1.62 per pound of copper produced net of precious metal credits.
- Total costs were US\$2.18 per pound of copper sold net of precious metal credits and after all off site charges.
- Average realized copper price for the period US \$3.56 per pound.

..... continued from Front Page tonnes of material was mined, including 4.3 million tonnes of ore and 10.2 million tonnes of waste at an average mining rate of 172,000 tonnes of per day moved during the first quarter of 2013. The ore grade averaged 0.35% Copper for the first quarter. Site cash costs were \$1.62 per pound of copper after gold and silver by-product credits. The mill achieved a 93.3% availability during February and after a planned shutdown in early March, the mill achieved above budget availability of 92% to the end of the month as compared to an availability of 85.9% averaged during the first quarter. Mill throughput improved after the scheduled maintenance shutdown in early March to an average of 31,000 tpd but 11% below the target tonnage. Prior to the shutdown in early March a contractor was engaged to crush a 70,000 tonne sample of the hardest Pit 3 ore to minus two inch. Upon starting up on March 8th the mill treated the finely crushed sample and demonstrated that with pre-crushing ore to minus two inches, the SAG mill can achieve throughput rates above the designed 35,000 tpd. The test confirmed that secondary crushing is an option to pursue to

ensure stable and consistent increased long term mill throughput rates for ore from all pit areas. Immediately following the fine crush sample test, another test was completed with ore from high energy blasting. This test also successfully demonstrated increased mill throughput and has provided a path for short term tonnage improvements, however, an evaluation of alternatives confirms that the longer term solution would be the installation of a secondary crushing unit to ensure consistency in the SAG Mill feed size. Plans are to continue to utilize high energy blasting that creates more fines in the SAG Mill feed and continue with a contractor to crush up to 10,000 tpd of minus 2inch SAG mill feed for the short term. Management will continue to evaluate the pre crush solutions for a final decision as to the long term plan by mid-year. The Company ended the quarter with a working capital of \$10.1 million, as compared with a working capital of \$10.7 million at December 31, 2012. Cash at the end of the quarter totaled \$8.7 million as compared to \$24.3 at the end of the previous quarter as a result timing of the last shipment of the quarter

which occurred on March 31, 2013. This shipment had a value of \$16.2 million, of which the 90% provisional payment was received on April 3, 2013 bringing cash resources to \$23.3 million. During the quarter the Company was required to adopt IFRIC 20, Stripping Costs in the Production Phase of a Surface Mine. The Company applied the requirements to production stripping costs incurred after January 1, 2012, in accordance with the transitional provisions of IFRIC 20. **Exploration Update** The 2013 exploration program is being reviewed based on the 2012 results. The 2012 exploration program consisted of a total of 18,400m of core drilling in 66 holes and 3,120m of shallow percussion drilling in 110 holes. Exploration was successful in confirming the continuity of deep mineralization below the Pit 2 area, extending mineralization to the north and northwest of Pit 2, and intersecting high grade mineralization below the Super pit bottom in Pit 3. The most significant results from the drill program were intersections of 123m grading 0.75% CuEq and 122.8m grading 0.69% CuEq at depths in excess of 150m below the bottom of continued on Page 21

For the record: I DID, in fact, note that much of what Ms Johnson has cited in editorials on HAARP, Agenda 21, and Climate Change WAS the work of those commonly referred to as "Conspiracy Theorists". Does this make her a Conspiracy Theorist? You decide.

My letter regarding "Lord Monckton" was meant to illustrate the First Rule of Research: Consider the Source. The sources I cite below are academic, authoritative, credible, peer-published and verifiable. "Lord" Monckton is none of these.

The "Global Warming Scenario" does indeed suggest that earth's burgeoning population (now esti-

mated at 7,117,050,000, according to <http://www.worldometer.info/world-population/>), and the carbon added to the atmosphere since the beginning of the Industrial Revolution is largely responsible for increasing GLOBAL temperatures in THIS instance of Global Warming.

I boldface words here because Ms. Johnson makes several questionable claims in this editorial, and builds a case for a global carbon tax conspiracy on tenuous factual connections.

She does not reference her sources, but the international scientific bodies listed at the end of this letter concur that;

GLOBAL temperatures have

risen between 0.7 and 0.8 degrees Celsius since 1880.

• Most of the warming has occurred in the past four decades.

• Global warming has slowed in recent years. The concern is that it has not stopped.

• The downsides of continued global warming far outweigh any perceived benefits.

• Past climate swings have had many (non-human) causes, but the current one is due in large part to anthropogenic forcings.

• The ten hottest years on record GLOBALLY have been in the past two decades.

• The Arctic Ocean will likely become ice-free in summer within the next few years.

• The polar zones are more severely affected as temperatures rise. In spite of this;

• 2012 was the warmest year in the contiguous United States at 3.2°F above 20th century average.

• We are nearly at a "Tipping Point" beyond which we will likely see global temperature rises exceeding the 2 degrees Celsius considered "safe" for continued human habitation on the planet.

How Would We Live If We Were Few?

The concept of reducing the world's population to one-half billion (500 million) is touted as an ideal number by many of those people who think the planet should have 90 percent fewer people. I did some deep thinking about what this would mean. If we reduce the world's population by 90 percent, we would have only an average of five million people per continent, or major region, with five million spread out over Earth's scattered islands. Have you thought what life would be like with only five million people in North America, or in Europe?

One of the things we know about having higher populations is that there can be a division of labour. If there are enough people to provide food, housing and clothing, then it is possible to have health care, education, and a few comforts. When our continent last had only five million people, it was before the Europeans arrived.

Living was at a subsistence level. I say this because food and shelter are always the top priorities on the scale of human needs, and it takes a lot of human effort to make those possible. Any of our pioneer ancestors who came here to homestead can tell you how much time and effort it takes to establish a home and a farm.

Imagine our own area with 90 percent fewer people. We would have about 600 people. Could those people feed themselves? I doubt it, unless they were prepared to eat a lot of beef and venison, few farm products, and as many fish as they could catch and wild fruit as they could pick.

Do not for one minute think we

would have all of the modern conveniences we have now. With so few people, and many of them children, who is going to keep the electricity and natural gas flowing? Who is going to take care of importing food when there is a crop failure? There will be no mandarin oranges for Christmas, and maybe no calendars to tell you when it is Christmas!

Who is going to sail ships, broadcast news, drive transport trucks, provide health care and hospitals? Who is going to maintain and fly aircraft? Who is going to keep the satellites aloft? Who is going to service our cell phones? Who will have time to study for 12, 14, or 18 years? Who will write books? Who will preserve the knowledge we have now?

Saying the Earth would be better if there were only half a billion people on Earth requires a change in perspective for all of us. If we truly feel the Earth would be better, then we have to put Earth ahead of humans, because the Earth is relentless in its ability to undo all of what we have created on Earth. Floods, glaciers, tidal waves, forest fires, hurricanes, tornadoes, earthquakes and volcanoes create damage now, but without the power to rebuild, without enough hands to do the work, each Earth event would leave permanent destruction in its path.

When we see our planet from space, we see it as beautiful. When we see a hurricane from space, it is majestic in its awesome power, but it is a fearful thing if you are in its path. This beautiful planet can be deadly, and if there are very few of us, then each devastating event takes a greater toll than when there are many of us. We might teeter at the edge of our own extinction even more than we do now with our foolish weapons of mass destruction. We have control over our weapons, but not over Earth's wrath.

Even without major Earth events, how soon would our systems deteriorate? Imagine our water supply system not maintained, our sewer systems not maintained. When all of us are concentrating our efforts on

growing or catching food, keeping warm, keeping a roof over our heads, who has time and energy to maintain our modern systems? Our systems are built through cooperative effort, through pooling resources and through division of labour. When each adult is engaged in finding food, keeping warm and maintaining one household, who has time for maintaining large systems?

For thousands of years, we humans gradually built up what little we created before the year 1100 A.D. Then our population began to expand and continued to expand. There was something else that expanded: our knowledge base. The more people there were, the more it set some free to explore, to gain knowledge. At this point in time, when Earth's human population is greater than it has been before, our knowledge of ourselves and our planet is greater than it has ever been. Every one of us in the industrialized countries is learning more all of the time because we have the time to learn more. There are enough of us now so that thousands of people can devote themselves to finding more information about everything.

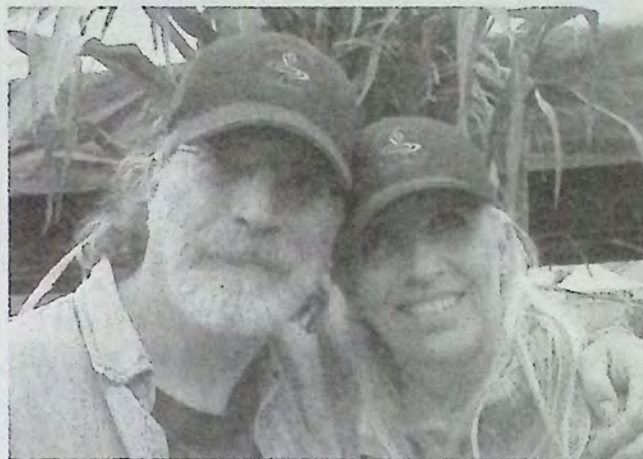

Thoughts on the Districts "Inquiry Model"

At the April PAC meeting at SESS the 6 parents in attendance were presented with School District 53's latest proposal, which they plan to adopt (or not) at the next meeting on May 22, 2013. It is called the "Team Inquiry Model".

This "Model" is based on research done by an academic in New Zealand who determined that if educational staff; teachers, administration and support staff, took time to meet together to discuss and ask questions about teaching strategies, specific difficulties, student's and their needs, then they could come up with ways to improve the learning outcomes for their students. They are probably right, and I support the fact that the people who spend their days teaching our children should be talking together, in fact I thought that they already did!

I recently attended the Learning Forum at SOSS on May 8th to educate my self about this new proposal. The District staff and the Trustees presented the "Inquiry Model" to mostly other District staff and a handful of parents. Out of the 50-60 people in attendance I would estimate that there were 10 parents, of which Keremeos had 2 representatives.

If the District adopts this "Model" it will remove approximately 10 hours of teaching time from the

current school year, this is down from the 14 that was presented to us at our April PAC meeting. So throughout the year our kids will be dismissed early about 6 or 7 days. This can be done because the district currently provides more face to face teaching time than is legislated by the government. It's a case of not taking anything away from us because the district was giving us more than we were supposed to get in the first place! And because the District is making this a blanket policy, it will occur on the same day at the same time for every school in the district. In the current proposal they have chosen Wednesday afternoons, it may be more palpable to parents on a Friday.

In my discussions with both of our local Principals at the Learning Forum I was told that they have managed to incorporate time in the current schedule for "Inquiry Time" without having to dismiss the student body early on any days. So my question then becomes one of "why doesn't the rest of the district follow Keremeos/Cawston's lead with their scheduling?"

Early dismissal will generate problems for many working families in our area, especially those families with younger children attending Cawston Primary. In Oliver & Osoyoos (I was told) the community centers are already considering working with the board to offer programming for those early dis-

missal days. What do we do in a community that does not offer any recreational, arts or after school programs for their children? Tough darts!

I have a bit of a problem with the speed at which this is being presented to parents and then voted on. As a parent I only found about the "Inquiry Model" at the April PAC meeting. I had heard inklings earlier, through emails but the official presentation was not made until April. One of our local Trustees indicated when speaking to me at the Forum that they had not heard any complaints about the proposal. If one month's notice is what constitutes due diligence for informing parents then of course there would not be any complaints. To me this feels like district staff shoving their agenda down our throats before any of us notice! The District has set up a comments form on their website for anyone who wants to give an opinion. It can be found online at <http://www.sd53.bc.ca/>

My other issue with this proposal is about developing a measurable baseline for determining success (or failure). Is any amount of improvement (no matter how small) justification for continuing the "Model"? I think that before adopting this model the District should set a significant goal for improvement to warrant taking 10 hours of face to face teaching time continued on Page 23

B.C. voters have spoken: Economy matters most

 The night before the election a colleague quipped that it will be nice to stop talking about red lights and orange ties and get back to focusing on the substantive issues that people care about. The economy tops the list.
 But before we leave the election behind, I would like to add my thanks to all the men and women who ran for office. You do us proud. Election nights and the days following remind us what a privilege it is to live in a free society where ideas get debated and people get a free vote.
 The people who run for office deserve special thanks for making this possible. Running for office, like playing hockey, is a tough zero-sum game.
 The pollsters got a lot wrong. The media didn't call this election either. But there was one barometer of the public mood that proved accurate: A pre-election survey of small business owners.
 The Canadian Federation of Independent Business surveyed more than 1,000 small businesses in March on their support for possible policy commitments that leaders might make.
 Support for keeping the budget balanced, paying down government debt and not increasing taxes exceeded ninety per cent.
 A question on resource development showed a strong majority support; further developing the province's resources with appropriate environmental safeguards in

place.
 Small business owners are often a good barometer of public sentiment and these economic issues clearly were important to many British Columbians.
 The Liberals made a number of strong commitments around the economy, including sticking to balancing the budget and introducing tougher penalties for ministers who miss budget targets, allocating 50 per cent of future surplus revenues to debt reduction and working toward eliminating the debt.
 Now some advice for the new government: Stick to your commitments, keep your eyes squarely on the economy and do not take small business for granted.
 Going into the election, a shocking 76 per cent of small businesses did not believe their priorities would receive attention during the election. It's nice that in many ways they

were proven wrong by all parties.
 But this sentiment reflects, in part, many recent policy decisions that have been very costly for small businesses, including the introduction of a new statutory holiday, three increases to the minimum wage and transitioning to the HST and then back to the PST.
 Some pundits are already chalking this election up to charisma triumphing over bookish manner.
 But give the electorate some credit. Lipstick doesn't win elections, ideas do.
 Now that the election is in the rear view mirror, it's time to make sure the government sticks to the economic ideas that have proven so popular.

 Notice of Alternative Approval Process

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN pursuant to Section 86 of the Community Charter, that the Board of Directors of the Regional District of Okanagan-Similkameen seek the approval of the electors within the boundaries of the Regional District for the adoption of the 9-1-1 Emergency Service Loan Authorization Bylaw 2623, 2013.

In general terms, the bylaw is to authorize borrowing upon the credit of the Regional District a sum not exceeding one million six hundred and forty thousand (\$1,640,000) for the purpose of completing upgrades to the 9-1-1 Emergency Services system for the Regional District of Okanagan-Similkameen.

The alternative approval process applies to qualified electors within the entire Regional District which comprises the City of Penticton, the District of Summerland, the Village of Keremeos, the Town of Princeton, the Town of Oliver, the Town of Osoyoos and Electoral Areas "A", "B", "C", "D", "E", "F", "G", and "H".

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE THAT the Regional District may proceed with the approval of the 9-1-1 Emergency Service Loan Authorization Bylaw 2623, 2013 to borrow the specified funds, unless at least ten percent (10%) of the qualified electors (those meeting the criteria below) within the Regional District indicate their opposition by signing the Elector Response Form.

The Regional District has estimated the total number of qualified electors in the service area to be 68,635 and that 10% of that number, or 6,864 qualified electors, must submit signed Elector Response Forms to prevent the Regional District from adopting the bylaw without the full assent of the electors by referendum.

An elector response form must be in the form established by the Regional District. Elector Response Forms are available from the Regional District office, including by mail, fax, or e-mail, on request or on the Regional District website at www.rdos.bc.ca. As well, copies may be obtained at the office of the participating municipalities, upon request.

The deadline for delivering the original signed Elector Response Form to the Regional District is 4:30 pm on Tuesday July 2, 2013.

The only persons entitled to sign an Elector Response Form are those who meet the following criteria:

- Resident electors must:**
- (a) be 18 years of age or older;
 - (b) be a Canadian citizen;
 - (c) be a resident of British Columbia, for at least 6 months;
 - (d) be a resident of the Regional District of Okanagan-Similkameen for at least 30 days; and
 - (e) not be disqualified by an Provincial enactment, or otherwise disqualified by law, from voting in an election.
- Non-Resident property electors must:**
- (a) not be entitled to register as a resident elector of the Regional District of Okanagan-Similkameen
 - (b) be 18 years of age or older;
 - (c) be a Canadian citizen;
 - (d) be a resident of British Columbia, for at least 6 months;
 - (e) be a registered owner of real property in Regional District for at least 30 days;
 - (f) not be disqualified by any Provincial enactment or otherwise disqualified by law, from voting in an election; and
 - (g) only register as a non-resident property elector in relation to one parcel of real property in the Regional District.

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
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Breakaway Roper Taylor Cherry of Quesnel gets ready in the chute at Princeton Rodeo May 11th.*

HIV can be avoided, but many people refused to take precautions so they could avoid it, so millions have died of AIDS. There is now another sexually transmitted form of gonorrhoea that is resistant to antibiotics, and will take lives until people learn to avoid infection.

Avoiding fatal diseases is easier in today's world of medical knowledge, as even those infected with a deadly disease are often saved to live on for many years. In our industrialized society, having clean water to drink, clean food to eat, enough food to eat, and decent homes in which to live helps us avoid fatal diseases to some extent. Perhaps that is why there are so many people living past 100.

At the same time, we are subject to exposure to deadly viruses, such as SARS, and a recent virus similar to SARS which emerged on the Arabian peninsula, because it can be carried via air travel. In the distant past, such outbreaks tended to be limited to a small area. Today, because people travel so much, these isolated outbreaks can become widespread. -Keeping a healthy immune system is our best defense.

Copper Mountain Mining

Copper Mountain Mining Corporation (TSX: CUM) (the "Company" or "Copper Mountain") announced May 16th that one of the two ABB transformers powering the SAG Mill motors at the Copper Mountain mine has experienced a failure of one set of coils in a transformer that has temporarily interrupted the SAG mill operation. The cause of the failure is being evaluated by the supplier, but details are not yet available. A transformer from a ball mill is being moved over to the SAG mill and the SAG mill was scheduled to be back in production by Saturday, May 18th

As part of the original design of the concentrator, the SAG mill and two ball mills have identical motors and transformers that are interchangeable in the event of a component failure. The Company is proceeding with its contingency plan of relocating one of the Ball mill transformers to replace the failed SAG mill transformer. This action will allow the mill to restart production with the SAG Mill and one Ball Mill. As these are specialty transformers, it is anticipated that it will take approximately 4 weeks to repair. As a result, production will be limited to approximately 1,000 TPH or 24,000 TPD during this period. The Company has informed its' insur-

ance carrier of the incident and the manufacturer of the transformer has sent a representative to assist at the mine site. The damaged transformer is being shipped for rebuild in Edmonton.

Jim O'Rourke, President & CEO of Copper Mountain commented, "This transformer failure is an extremely unfortunate event for the operation as our team has been making significant strides in getting our SAG mill up to full capacity. Immediate metal production will be impacted, but all resources are being made to minimize the impact."

About Copper Mountain Mining Corporation:

Copper Mountain's flagship asset is the 75% owned Copper Mountain mine located in southern British Columbia near the town of Princeton. The Company has a strategic alliance with Mitsubishi Materials Corporation who owns the remaining 25%. 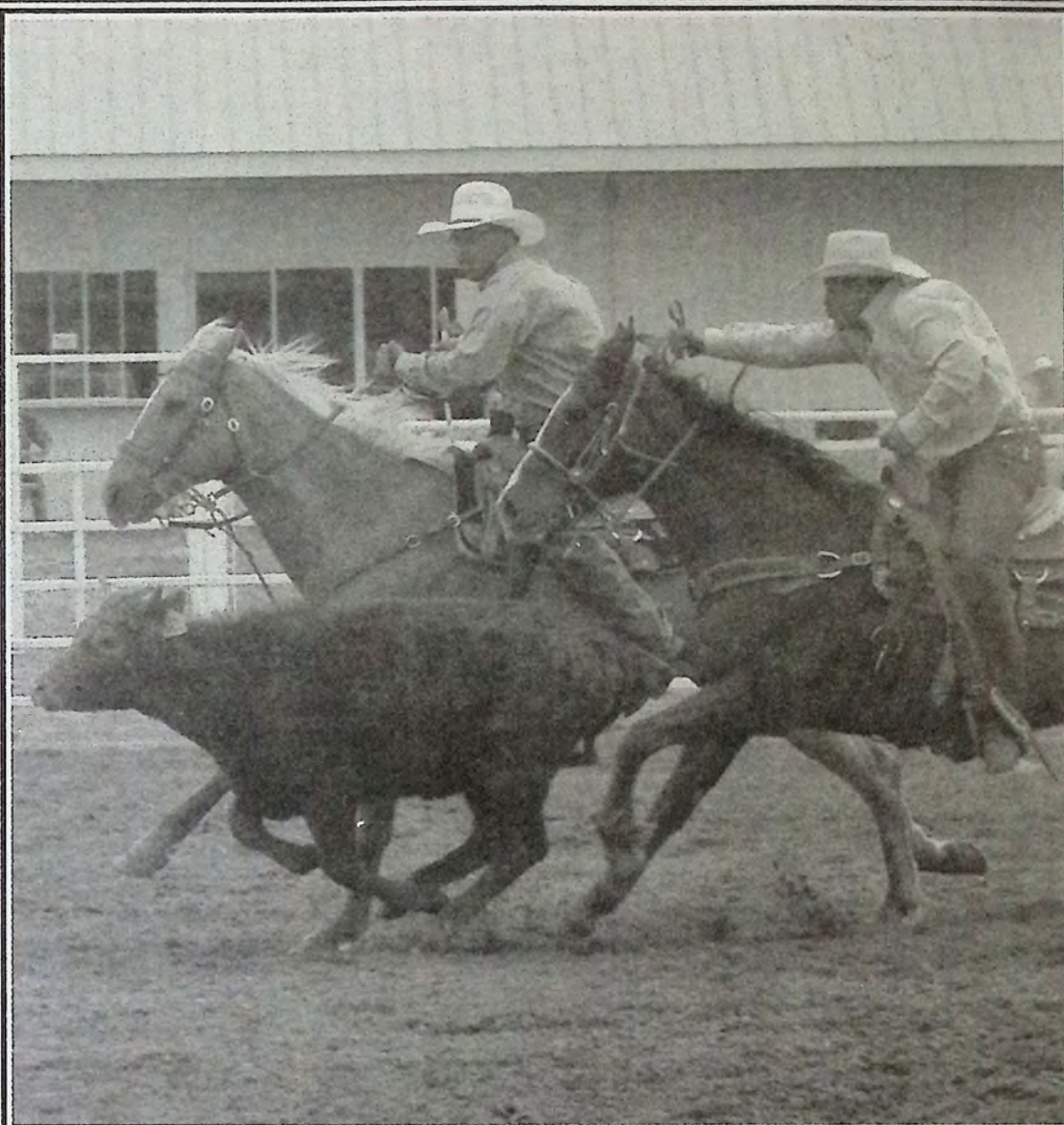

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Princeton gains hospice volunteers

Princeton Hospice Care has recently trained 4 new hospice volunteers. This past week Linda Brooks from Moog and Friends House in Penticton was in Princeton to train new people and update the skills of some of the existing volunteers. Participants were Jamie Holloway, Social Worker; June Hope, Princeton Hospice Volunteer Co-ordinator; Agnes Newman, Trisha Akerly, Victoria Olsen, Bernadette Kelleher. Existing volunteers are Betty Reheis, Lola Dieno.

Palliative Care is a program of active, compassionate care primarily directed towards improving the quality of life for the dying. It is delivered by an interdisciplinary team that provides sensitive and skilled care to meet the physical, psychological, and spiritual needs of the client and family.

When Should Someone Begin the Hospice Palliative Program?

Because it can take some time for Hospice Palliative Care professionals to tailor palliative care and symptom management to each person, it is best to begin some level of professional care before a crisis exists. 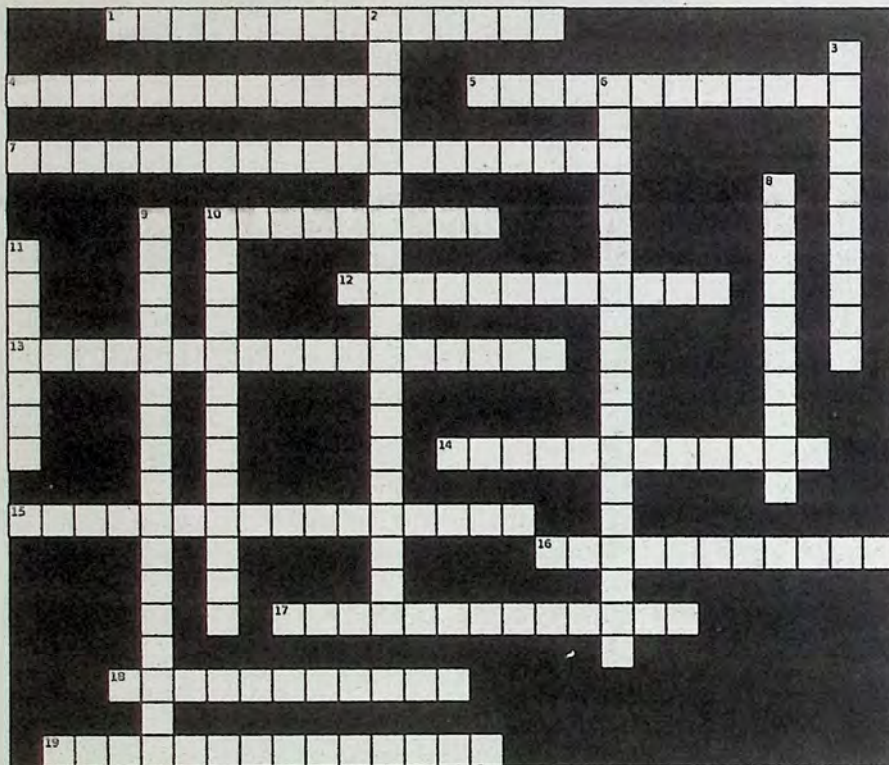

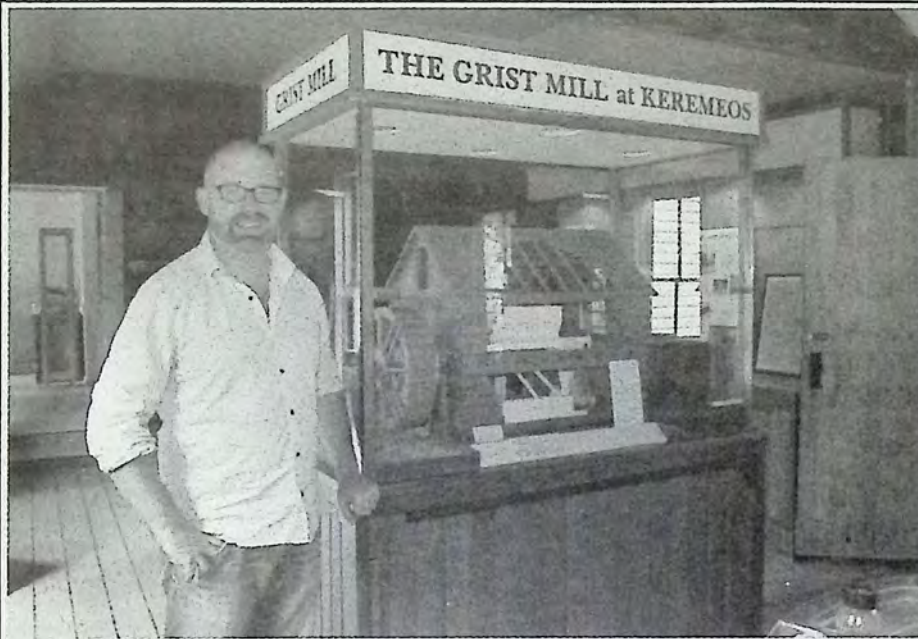

Local student wins bursary

The 2013 recipient of the Jim Hebden Chemistry Bursary is Alicia Myers of Princeton Secondary School.

Myers, who intends to study chemistry and physics at Mount Allison University in New Brunswick starting in September, was recognized for her academic performance and outstanding service to her community.

The panel of judges was overwhelmed not only by the number of students applying for the bursary, but also by the quality of their applications.

"I think any of the applicants would be worthy in one way or another," stated Jim Hebden.

"These young people are to be com-

mended for maintaining excellent grades while, at the same time, exhibiting a high level of involvement in their communities."

The judges express thanks to all of the students for their submissions.

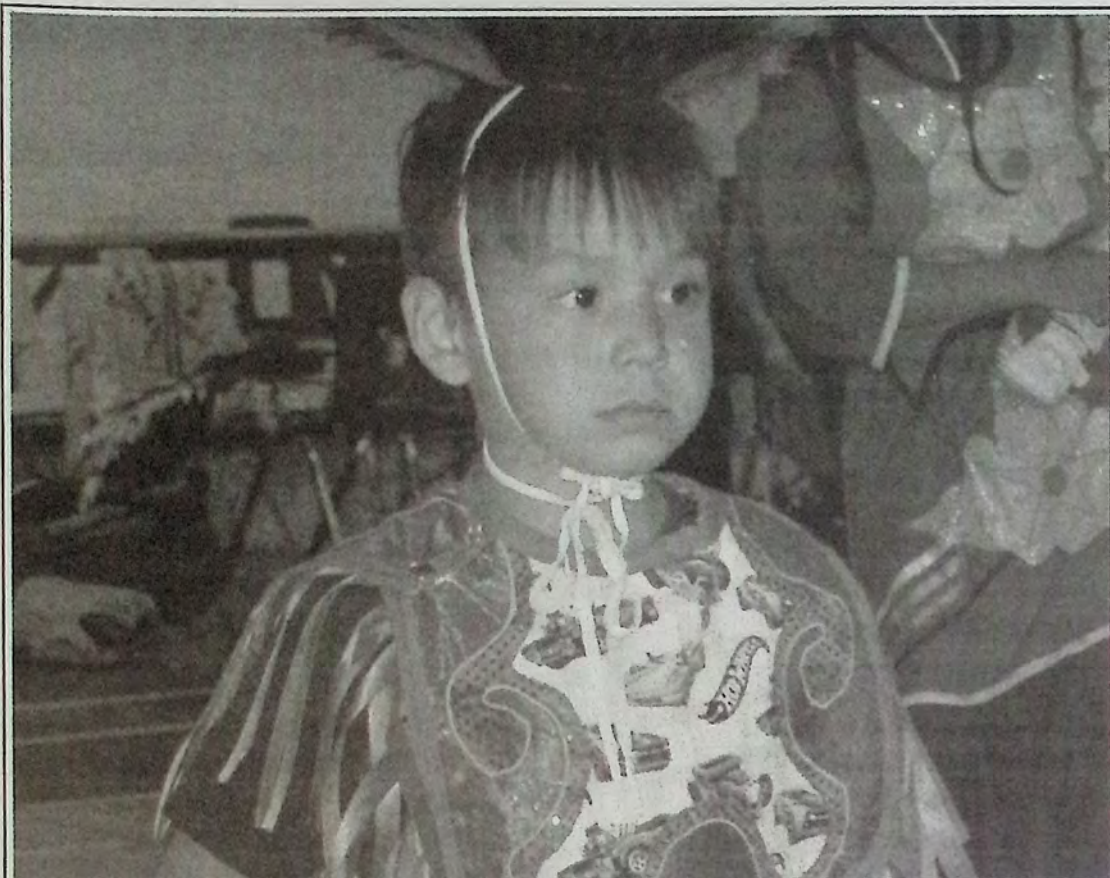

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How the Similkameen voted

..... continued from Front Page (Green) 1,481 (8.7%), Mischa Popoff (Ind.) 608 (3.6%) and Doug Pederson (Ind.) 349 (2.1%).

The margin of victory increased in the Lower Similkameen with Larson beating Hencheroff by 1,197 votes, considerably more than the 811-vote win by Liberal John Slater over Lakhvinder Jhaj (NDP) in 2009.

The Canadian Taxpayers Federation (CTF) has calculated the pensions of all MLAs who did not win or seek re-election in the May 14th vote. The total payout could top \$26 million.

MLAs are eligible for pensions after six years of service. Pensions increase by the rate of inflation every year, and can be collected at age 65. The CTFs lifetime estimate figures assume the individual lives to age 80. Taxpayers put in \$4 for every \$1 a politician pays into their pension account.

"The MLA pension payout ATM is spitting out cash at a rate taxpayers can only dream of," said Jordan Bateman, CTF B.C. Director. "A dozen former MLAs will soon join the million dollar pension club while most of us are scraping together every nickel we can find for our own retirements."

These numbers assume MLAs "bought back" missing time from 1996 to 2007, when there was a far more modest pension system in place. The list of MLAs who bought back has been kept secret, but the CTF have yet to hear from any of the retirees that they didn't buy back that missing time.

Exiting MLAs also receive up to 15 months of severance at the \$101,859 MLA annual salary, which includes a top-up if the politician takes a job at less than six figures. They are also eligible for up to

\$9,000 in training funds.

"Not only do these MLAs receive overly generous pensions, they get a severance package and training money," said Bateman. "Taxpayers are on the hook for millions just to transition these politicians back to the real world."

Bateman noted that in 1996, the BC Liberals ran against this type of gold-plated pension plan, and that NDP Premier Glen Clark brought in a fairer, dollar-for-dollar system. Unfortunately, the BC Liberals flip-flopped in 2007, bringing back a gold-plated plan and allowing MLAs to buy back missing years of service.

Not included in the list or \$26 million total is Premier Christy Clark, who lost her Vancouver-Point Grey seat. In the highly unlikely event she does not seek a seat elsewhere, her year 1 pension would start at

\$59,900 for a lifetime total of \$1.03 million.

Harry Lali (Fraser-Nicola) is on the list and according to the CTF will receive a pension of \$63,886 per year resulting from his 14 years of service which will total \$1.1-million.
