Zigzag problems irk Council

The hold up on completing the zigzag project appears to rest with issues between the two parties who have made the most money on the project.

In a verbal report presented at the May 21st regular meeting of Princeton Town Council, Interim CAO Bob Wilson gave an update on the project.

Wilson explained that a conference call, lasting 45-minutes, was held in the previous week between

Town staff, the zigzag contractor, Mierau Contractors Ltd., and designers, Bruce Carscadden Architects where, "we listened to both sides argue."

Princeton Mayor Frank Armitage described the long delays in meeting the original timeline of eight-weeks as a "big source of embarrassment" and indicated that the project will be completed – to the architect's design – in the next week.

Town will provide coverage

A motion made at the May 21st regular meeting of Princeton Town Council by Councillor Kim Maynard, and seconded by Councillor Doug Pateman, authorized the Town to purchase liability insurance coverage for user groups who do not have access to liability insurance from other sources.

"It has always been a concern that groups carrying out activities within the Town on Town property or road allowances, may not have insurance in the unlikely event of something happening," states Interim CAO Bob Wilson in his report to Council.

"It is a requirement of anyone or group requesting use of Veterans Square to have liability insurance to indemnify the Town and quite often

the insurance is expensive for a non-profit small group that doesn't have a Provincial affiliation."

Wilson says that with the Town purchasing this insurance it should eliminate some concerns about groups holding activities without insurance.

"In my opinion, it is better to have all the groups who are not part of a Provincial organization, to have some form of insurance."

The Town's insurer, Municipal Insurance Association agrees.

The package will cost the Town \$2,000.00 and groups would be required to register with the Recreation Department and a fee would be charged to help recover some of the cost.

"Some examples of its use would include anyone using Veterans Square who doesn't have their own insurance, any group using our

trails, parks, Riverside Centre, Arena, Skateboard Park and other such things as skating parties, pool parties, reunions, etc."

Mayor Frank Armitage commented that the \$2,000.00 cost of the insurance was, "well invested into the community."

Lali says, he'll be back

Recently defeated NDP MLA Harry Lali spoke May 23rd with the News Leader's George Elliott about the results of the Provincial Election.

As for the low voter turnout in Fraser-Nicola Lali says roughly 1,300 fewer people voted of which he estimates 500 NDP voters did not cast ballots in Princeton.

"NDP voters stayed at home," Lali says.

"The polls were not wrong. Past voter support tracking shows 3,000 NDP voters stayed home across the province."

Lali says other NDP MLA's who were defeated in the Provincial Election have stated the same thing, however, in Fraser-Nicola a couple other factors came into play.

Lali says that the combination of complacency and the mind set that

he was "a shoe-in" to win just made voters not want to go to the polls.

"My record in success in winning became an impediment for me."

As for talk about Adrian Dix being the wrong leader for the party Lali disagrees.

"I think it was the wrong campaign, I think the BC campaign was flawed."

Lali says the approach taken provincially to not respond to attack-style ads produced by the BC Liberal party ended up hurting the BC NDP.

As for complacency, Lali says had the NDP won, Princeton would have had a full-time hospital.

"The biggest issue in Fraser-Nicola voters did not come out to support, which was a shame."

Lali says, "voters didn't go out to

vote (in BC) as they didn't feel a sense of urgency and the positive campaign (conducted by the BC NDP) was an utter mistake."

Have we seen the last of Harry Lali?

"I'll be back," he says.

"Never say never again."

Lali comes from rural India and has spent 47-years in rural British Columbia and has no plans to move.

"There's too much work to do. We'll rebuild the constituency and come back to fight another day."

Copper Mountain Mining Corporation

Copper Mountain Mining Corporation (TSX: CUM) (the "Company" or "Copper Mountain")

announced May 22nd that further to the Company's news release of May 17, 2013, the damaged SAG mill transformer was replaced late Friday and the mill was back in operation by 6:00 PM Friday May 17.

Site maintenance personnel were able to successfully replace the damaged transformer with identical transformers from Ball Mill #1. Operations over the long weekend with the SAG mill and one ball mill was better than forecast and operated at an average rate of 1,100 tpd or an average of 25,400tpd.

The exact cause of the failure is being evaluated by the supplier and an independent third party consultant. Preliminary testing has indicated that damage is limited to one set of coils in the transformer, which could help with shortening the timing of repairs. The damaged transformer was trucked to ABB's transformer repair facility in Edmonton, Alberta. ABB has sent a technical specialist from its plant in Italy to oversee the dismantling of the damaged transformer, which was scheduled to take place on Tuesday May 21, 2013.

ABB's transformer facility in Italy have ordered the raw materials necessary to manufacture a replacement set of coils which will be flown to their facility in Edmonton for installation in the damaged transformer. The repair of the one set of coils is

forecast to take 2.5 weeks.

The Company has instructed ABB to manufacture a full set of coils for the transformer for an estimated cost of \$125,000 to ensure additional coils are on site and available at all times.

Jim O'Rourke, President & CEO of Copper Mountain commented, "We are extremely pleased with our mine site teams' ability to work quickly and effectively to get the SAG mill operational one full day ahead of our original estimate and at an increased throughput rate. This operation with one ball mill demonstrates the extra ball mill capacity available once we are able to get full tonnage through the SAG mill."

About Copper Mountain Mining Corporation:

Copper Mountain's flagship asset is the 75% owned Copper Mountain mine located in southern British Columbia near the town of Princeton. The Company has a strategic alliance with Mitsubishi Materials Corporation who owns the remaining 25%.

The Copper Mountain mine commenced production in the summer of 2011, and has continued to improve its operations during the year; and attained design capacity in the summer of 2012. The 18,000 acre site has a resource of approximately 5 billion pounds of copper and remains open laterally and at depth. 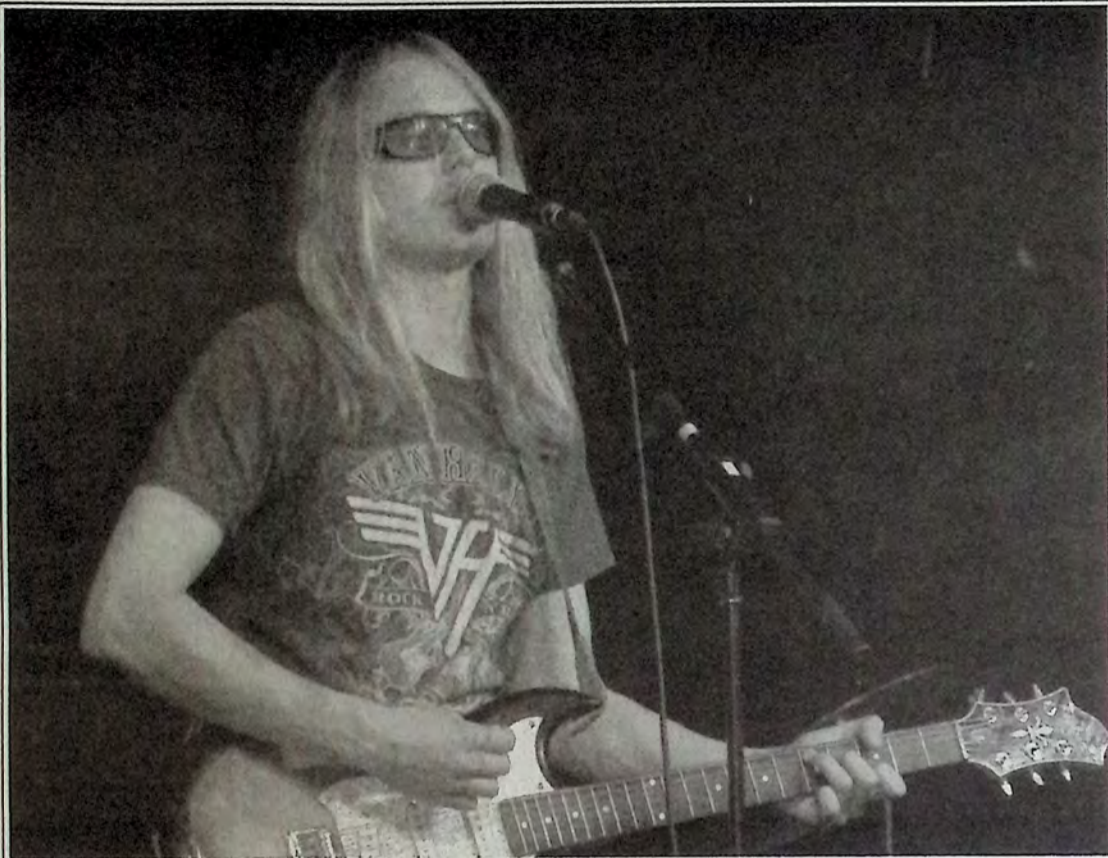

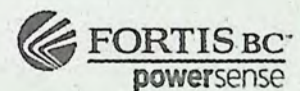

Bills often end up getting paid late and volunteers start to disappear as the financial situation becomes too depressing for something that is supposed to be a fun thing to do.

If that group has any paid employees, they start to get nervous, or impatient, and before you know it, they quit.

Remember, volunteers put in the effort because they are doing something for their community, regardless of what the event is.

And they are doing it because it's supposed to be fun, foster goodwill and attract people to our community.

The Town of Princeton has been very generous in recent years using money from a community forest licence to issue grants-in-aid but often it is not enough.

I have no clue what the answer is, but if things don't change, expect more non-profit organized events in our area to cease and some of the groups to fold.

As citizens of our community I feel we are obligated to prevent that from happening.

Princeton Generates A Lot Of Fun

I write to my American cousin about once a week to tell her what I'm doing. She lives in Phoenix, Arizona, and continually expresses her amazement at the number of events I go to in such a small town. When she was here last summer for a family get-together, there were no major events going on, but I showed her where the events take place that I write about in my emails.

This year, to date, I have gone to the following local events: the Alpha Yaya Diallo concert, the Crimson Tine play, a movie at Riverside Theatre, the Highland Dancers recital, the Celtic dancers concert, the rodeo, the Spirit Festival, and a concert by local musicians. These are not all of the events that went on, of course, just the ones I attended. In addition, there were family gatherings and dinners with friends. All in all, if you want to have an active social life, Princeton is a good place to be.

There will be many more major events this year, and I will go to a number of them. When I look at all of the things there are to do in

Princeton, I feel maybe my cousin is right - we have an awful lot of events for such a small town. When my cousin visited, I took her to our museum, and sparked an interest in her to visit the excellent museums in Phoenix. We have a small art gallery in Princeton, and last fall she took her daughter to visit the Phoenix art gallery.

I recall small towns I have lived in, and there were just one or two big events each year. I have lived in a couple of cities, too. Victoria always had something going on, the symphony, the art shows, the live theatre, and outdoor events. However, in the Italian city I lived in, which was as big as Victoria, there were only three big events: the trade fair, the local saint's day, and the opera held in the Roman amphitheatre in the summer. I loved the trade fair, the saint's day was notable for the big parade, but I do not like opera, so did not attend.

For a small town, we do a lot, especially during the warmer months. Note that I have not included all of the hockey games, golf tournaments, bonspiels and cross country skiing events, nor have I included the many recreational opportunities such as fishing, hikes with the field naturalists, bowling, karate and the many school events which involve parents and children.

Our ability to present all of these events involves three components. The first is the leadership of the groups hosting the event. Princeton is blessed with some talented people who will step forward to offer their skills, time and persistence to make the event happen. I think of Ernie Lawrence

who, for 25 years, put together our Christmas Songfest, now hosted by the Arts Council and organized by Esther Donovan. I think of Jon Bartlett and Rika Rubesaat who have put together the Traditional Music Festival, and the leaders who make sure annual events take place as they have for the past 40 years or more.

The second component is sponsorship, and I have to give full appreciation to the local business people who are forever so generous in their support of our many events. These events could not take place without these sponsors, and I often feel we do not give them enough credit for being major players in the fun we put together in our little community. This is one of the reasons we should make every effort to shop locally, giving back to those who give to us.

The third component of our fun events are the volunteers who step up and do the work. I have always done a lot of volunteer work of one sort or another. My father was a great believer in being part of the community, of making where we live a better place to live. It is part of our family tradition to be a participant in the community. The other reason I volunteer is because I believe we should give back to our community. Without those who volunteer, we do not share, and if we do not share, we do not have a community. I do not expect the other guy to do it all. The final reason I volunteer is because I have had the pleasure of getting to know some of the best people anybody could want to know. I have made friends through being a volunteer, and some of those friendships have lasted decades.

Each person who volunteers does so for individual reasons, but together they form a social network that supports all of us and supports our sense of community. Princeton is blessed with willing volunteers who make things work so we can enjoy our community.

I suspect we can do this because we are a small town. Perhaps it is easier to organize events and round up volunteers in a small town, but I am sure there is more to it than just being a small town. I suspect there is something about Princeton people that makes them want to have fun, to do things in a big way. What else could motivate all this fun for so many years?

New record set for winter

Alaska has been recording lower temperatures for the past two winters, but this past winter has broken the all-time record for the longest winter in Anchorage. The previous record was 230 days, set 30 years ago. The new record, set May 19, is 232 days with snowfall. Another record was broken on May 17 when the lowest maximum temperature was recorded.

The entire Bering Sea area is undergoing significant geologic activity. Three volcanoes have been erupting on Russia's Kamchatka peninsula and two are erupting in Alaska. Added to the

volcanic activity, there have been several significant earthquakes (over 5 on the Richter scale) during the past four months, including an undersea swarm during the past two weeks. Both volcanic ash from eruptions and upheaval of deep sea icy water related to undersea seismic activity can affect weather.

As British Columbia's weather tends to originate in the Gulf of Alaska, the cooler and longer Alaskan winter combined with the geologic activity may mean another cool spring for Canada's west coast province.

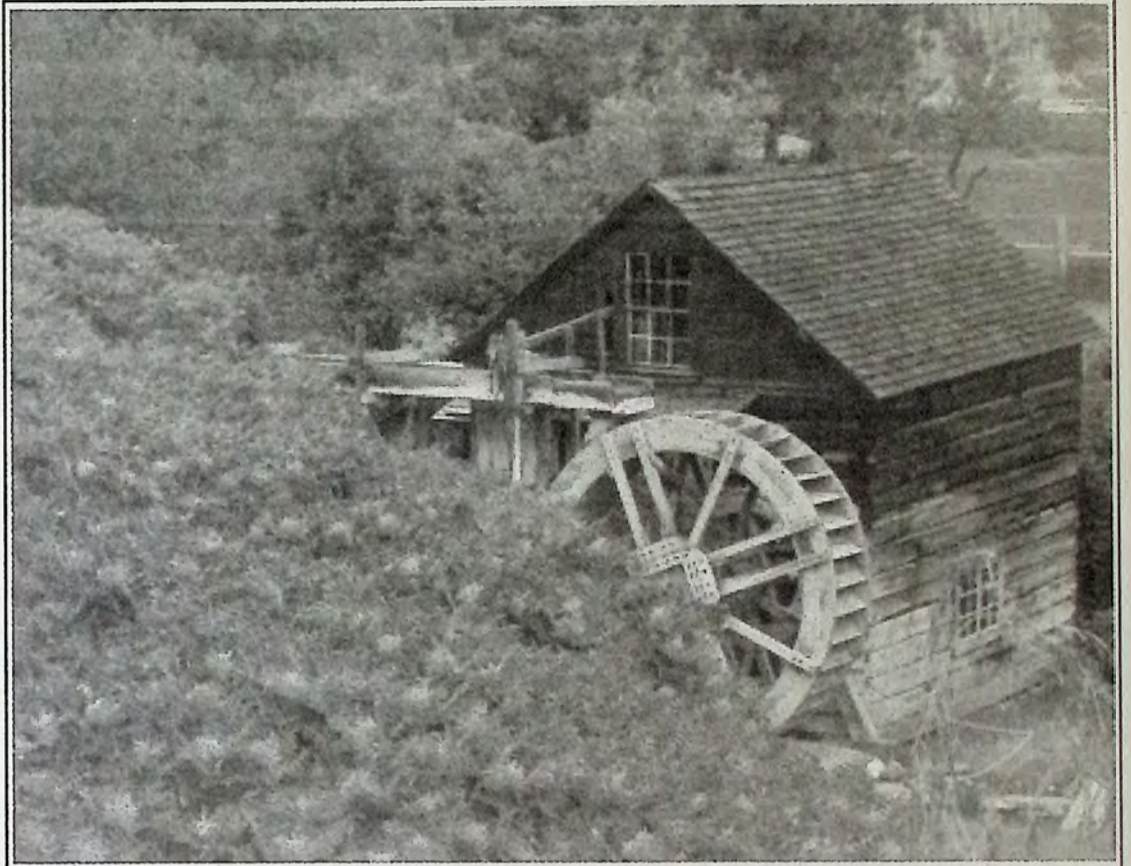

Council approves office equipment purchase

In a motion made at the May 21st regular meeting of Princeton Town Council by Councillor Doug Pateman, and seconded by Councillor Kim Maynard, the Town of Princeton will purchase a new black and white multi-function photocopier/printer.

The price quoted by Ricoh Canada totals \$12,121.08 plus taxes.

"The existing copier requires frequent servicing as it struggles to maintain the volume of printing we require," explains Deputy Treasurer Shirley McMahon in her report to Council.

"This has often resulted in staff frustration and late agenda publication."

The Ricoh Canada quote was the lowest from the two approved suppliers as identified by the BC Corporate Supply Arrangement. The other quote was \$13,700.00.

Bylaw amendments to bring more apartments

A property located at 223 Burton Avenue contains a total of eleven apartments on the second floor. Those have all been rented.

The same property has commercial space on the main floor, which has remained vacant since completion of the project.

Town Council gave second reading to Bylaw No. 876, 2013, an amendment of the Town of Princeton Official Community Plan Bylaw, which will change the land use category of the building from Business Transition (BT) to Medium Density Residential (MDR).

In addition, Council gave second

reading to Bylaw No. 877, 2013, which amends the Town of Princeton Zoning Bylaw, which changes the property at 223 Burton Avenue from the Business Transition (C3) zone to the RM-4 (Multi-Family Residential - High Rise) zone to permit the conversion of three vacant commercial spaces on the ground floor to ten residential suites.

The next step will be a Public Hearing scheduled for 7:15 PM on June 17th at the Princeton Library Meeting Room on Vermilion Avenue.

Following the meeting the bylaws will receive third reading and after a time for reconsideration, they will be adopted.

Public works receives new trucks
Princeton Town Council awarded a contract to Metro Motors of Port Coquitlam for the purchase of two trucks for the Public Works Department.

The contract, worth \$53,564.00, was awarded at the May 21st regular meeting of Princeton Town

Council and is for one half-ton pickup truck and a three-quarter ton pickup truck.

"Town of Princeton Public Works Department requires a replacement for a 1995 GMC three-quarter ton pickup along with a half-ton pickup for the use of the public works manager," states Deputy Treasurer Shirley McMahon in her report to Council.

Town Council had approved \$62,750.00 for the purchase of the new vehicles as part of the 2013 Budget.

Of the quotes, Metro Motors (Ford) had the lowest of the four received for the half-ton pickup at \$21,875.00. The highest was \$24,980.00.

Metro Motors (Ford) also had the lowest of the five quotes received for the three-quarter ton pickup at \$25,900.00. The highest one was \$29,705.00.

Vehicle delivery is expected within 60 to 90 days of contract award.

"Both vehicles are needed as soon as possible," McMahon adds.

Notice of Alternative Approval Process

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN pursuant to Section 86 of the Community Charter, that the Board of Directors of the Regional District of Okanagan-Similkameen seek the approval of the electors within the boundaries of the Regional District for the adoption of the 9-1-1 Emergency Service Loan Authorization Bylaw 2623, 2013.

In general terms, the bylaw is to authorize borrowing upon the credit of the Regional District a sum not exceeding one million six hundred and forty thousand (\$1,640,000) for the purpose of completing upgrades to the 9-1-1 Emergency Services system for the Regional District of Okanagan-Similkameen.

The alternative approval process applies to qualified electors within the entire Regional District which comprises the City of Penticton, the District of Summerland, the Village of Keremeos, the Town of Princeton, the Town of Oliver, the Town of Osoyoos and Electoral Areas "A", "B", "C", "D", "E", "F", "G", and "H".

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE THAT the Regional District may proceed with the approval of the 9-1-1 Emergency Service Loan Authorization Bylaw 2623, 2013 to borrow the specified funds, unless at least ten percent (10%) of the qualified electors (those meeting the criteria below) within the Regional District indicate their opposition by signing the Elector Response Form.

The Regional District has estimated the total number of qualified electors in the service area to be 68,635 and that 10% of that number, or 6,864 qualified electors, must submit signed Elector Response Forms to prevent the Regional District from adopting the bylaw without the full assent of the electors by referendum.

An elector response form must be in the form established by the Regional District. Elector Response Forms are available from the Regional District office, including by mail, fax, or e-mail, on request or on the Regional District website at www.rdos.bc.ca. As well, copies may be obtained at the office of the participating municipalities, upon request.

The deadline for delivering the original signed Elector Response Form to the Regional District is 4:30 pm on Tuesday July 2, 2013.

The only persons entitled to sign an Elector Response Form are those who meet the following criteria:

- be a resident of British Columbia, for at least 6 months;
- be a resident of the Regional District of Okanagan-Similkameen for at least 30 days; and
- not be disqualified by a Provincial enactment, or otherwise disqualified by law, from voting in an election.

Non-Resident property electors must:

- not be entitled to register as a resident elector of the Regional District of Okanagan-Similkameen
- be 18 years of age or older;
- be a Canadian citizen;
- be a resident of British Columbia, for at least 6 months;
- be a registered owner of real property in Regional District for at least 30 days;
- not be disqualified by any Provincial enactment or otherwise disqualified by law, from voting in an election; and
- only register as a non-resident property elector in relation to one parcel of real property in the Regional District.

Saddles 'n' Spurs

The horse was terrified of the blanket and saddle and after several unsuccessful attempts to get them on I remembered seeing a twitch in the tack room.

A twitch is made up of a stick or pole about the thickness of a hay fork handle and about thirty inches long.

A hole is drilled through one end and a loop of rope is made about eight inches in diameter. With one hand on the pole you put your hand through the loop and take hold of the horse's upper lip, pull it through the loop and twist until it squeezes the horse's upper lip. I don't see them used much any more and haven't used one in years.

The idea was to get the horse's full attention diverted and gain control. The more you twist the more attention you get from the horse. It sometimes worked very well.

I went and got the twitch and used it on the horse to attempt to saddle him. I took my time and soon the blanket was no problem. Next came the saddle. This was even more frightening to him than the blanket!

The horse kept spinning around and I'd lose the blanket and have to start all over again. The horse and I were not in a corral or a fenced area which made it more difficult and I didn't want it to get away from me so I got this great idea, I would tie the twitch onto the hitching post - big mistake!

The horse leaned back full weight and was pulling so hard that blood started coming through his lip. I quickly got behind him and kicked him in the butt as hard as I could. He jumped forward and I untied the twitch. No harm was done to his lip.

Back to starting over with more patience and gentleness! It took some time but finally I was ready to mount, saddle secure. I took my

time to let him get used to my reins so he couldn't buck.

Living Past 100

A Sour Miracle Gives Health

This is the season for rhubarb. Many people do not like this tart stem and avoid it. Others love it as stewed rhubarb, rhubarb pie or rhubarb coffee cake. Those who enjoy rhubarb are taking good medicine.

Rhubarb is native to areas of China, Siberia and India, where it grows very large. One variety is called Chinese rhubarb. It has green stalks and is extremely tart and sour. It is used primarily for medicine. The rhubarb with the red stalks is called garden rhubarb. It is the rhubarb we love.

Believe it or not, rhubarb is good for dental health. The juice of raw fresh rhubarb coats tooth enamel and protects it. Brush with it every second day to improve dental health! Eating stewed rhubarb is good for dental health by reducing decay.

NOTE: Never cook rhubarb in an aluminum pan, as it will remove the oxidized aluminum in the pan and if you eat the rhubarb, you will be eating the oxidized aluminum. However, if you want to make your aluminum to shine, cook rhubarb in it and toss out the rhubarb when the pan is shining. Rhubarb should be cooked and stored only in glass or stainless steel.

Rhubarb has been used in the treatment of cancers. Rhubarb contains two substances in the juice that fight breast cancer and melanoma. The Chinese have been using it successfully, reducing tumours by as much as 70 percent with a simple recipe of cooking 2 cups of chopped rhubarb stalk in one litre of water for an hour, and giving the patient one cup of liquid 2 or 3 times a day.

Herbalists combine mashed rhubarb root, cabbage juice and powdered Oregon grape root then add this to high quality gin, along with eight crushed zinc tablets. The tincture derived from this is given for psoriasis and arthritis.

In China, rhubarb syrup was successfully used to stop intestinal bleeding, relieve inflammation of the pancreas (pancreatitis) and inflammation of the gall bladder. Rhubarb is also effective to reduce cholesterol. A dessert of one and a half cups of stewed rhubarb will be an antidote for a meal full of fats.

Chefs recommend using maple syrup and vanilla to sweeten and improve the flavour of rhubarb.

Rhubarb is easy to grow in Canadian gardens. It likes good soil with plenty of natural fertilizer, a sunny location, and a good soaking once a week. Rhubarb is propagated from a root, so if you want to grow it, find somebody who will give you a piece of rhubarb root. Plant it in September and enjoy it next spring.

Money held in reserve for these projects is being depleted rapidly, but there is no complaint from the Board of Management, the Princeton Exhibition Association. The repairs and improvements have been planned for two years, money set aside, and the Board is pleased to see the work being done.

Ken Crompton, President of Princeton Rodeo Club, reported the annual rodeo was not as financially successful as expected. Attendance was down despite the excellent weather, but those who did attend

had a good time. The Ken McCoy band was great, but too few people took advantage of the opportunity to join the fun on the Saturday evening of the rodeo. Crompton says the club will lose money this year if sponsors do not send money pledged.

The Princeton Racing Days Association plans a horse racing event for June 29. The original plan was to host two days, but there appears to be a shortage of horses. The annual Racing Days celebration begins June 28 with a parade downtown followed by the Youth Ambassador pageant.

Permission was granted to Walt and Cynthia Halipchuk to host BC Barrel Racing events on June 1, June 15 and July 13 this year. The events will last just a few hours, but will bring additional revenue to the fairgrounds.

The annual Agricultural Fair will take place August 24 and 25 at the fairgrounds and will be combined with the Little Britches Rodeo semifinals.

The annual community Halloween party will be held October 26 this year.

An issue of vandalism in the women's washroom was discussed at the May 21 PXA meeting.

During the rodeo on May 12 and last fall during the Halloween party, some little girls made terrible messes in the washroom that had the potential to damage the plumbing. Concession volunteers believe they have identified the girls and they will be watched during upcoming public events.

A general work party is planned for June 22 and 23 to prepare the grounds for the horse racing events. June 22 is the day to register entries for the races.

A work party is being tentatively planned for the second weekend in June. This will be a work party to paint the newly renovated racehorse barns.

The next regular meeting of Princeton Exhibition Association will take place at 7:00 PM at the fairgrounds office on June 18. Any member of the public is welcome to attend.

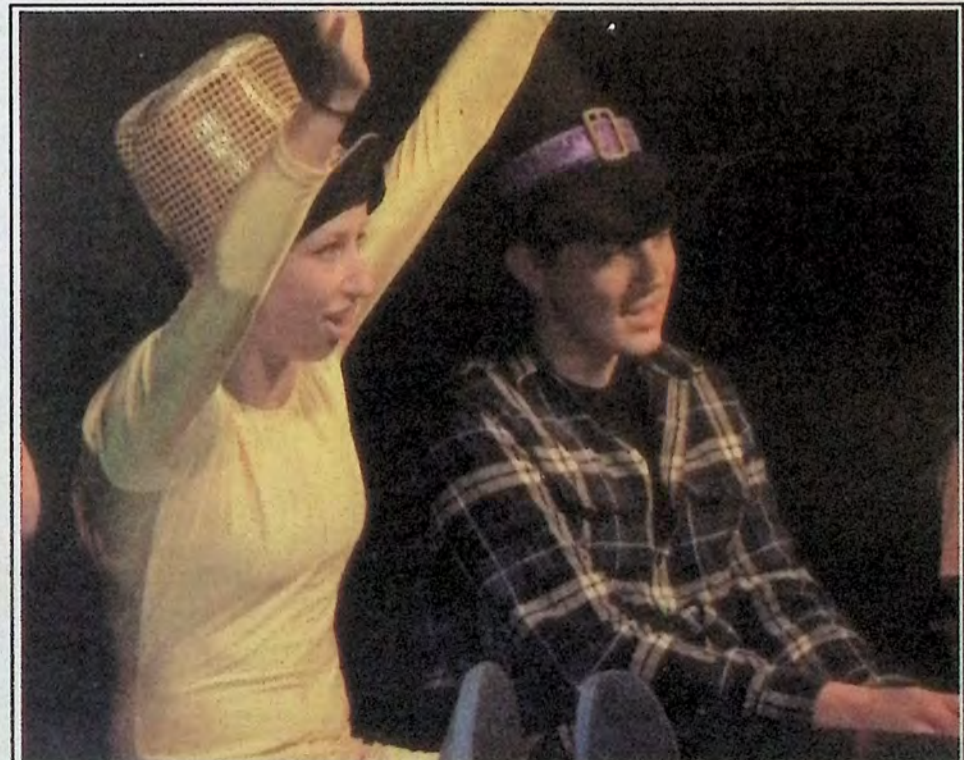

Coach resigns, trade show cancelled

Princeton Posse Head Coach Dale 'Duner' Hladun resigned May 23rd. In handing in his letter of resignation he referred to it as "the end of an era."

Financial issues have plagued the hockey club placing the Posse Executive in a position of 'catching up' instead of 'staying ahead' for much of the past season.

Unexpected extra costs, including a clerical error related to ticket price taxes resulting in a large outstanding balance with Revenue Canada and a failed appeal, have not helped matters.

The depressing financial situation has also generated a handful of resignations from the Board of Directors.

Hladun's resignation takes place while he still had a year left in his three-year contract with the team.

In an attempt to generate extra

funds in the off-season, the Posse planned to host a Trade Show in Princeton Arena for the end of June.

Original projections were for around fifty exhibitors but only a fraction of those actually committed by the deadline of May 15th, which forced cancellation of the event.

Be adept at extinguishing fires in community inter personality conflicts and "fence sitting".

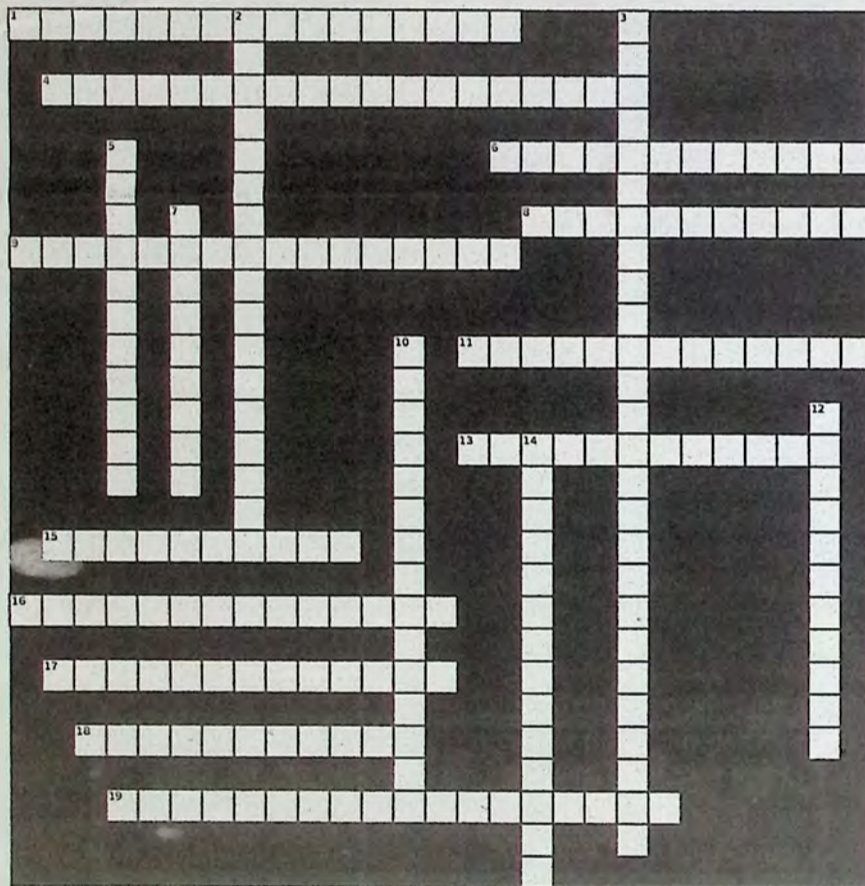
Actual firefighting skills and experience not necessary.

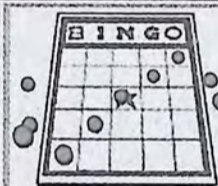
