RCMP seize large drug cache

Princeton RCMP conducted a search of a unit at a resort in East Princeton on Sunday, May 26th. Inside they discovered and seized a large quantity of cocaine, crack cocaine, methamphetamine, marijuana and a small quantity of prescription pills.

In addition, a large amount of cash was found and seized as well as several items RCMP believe were stolen property.

28-year old Dwayne Costa of Maple Ridge, BC has been charged

with multiple counts of possession of a controlled substance for the purpose of trafficking. Costa has since been released on court imposed conditions. Police are seeking two other individuals in connection with the seizure.

Police say this seizure of drugs represents an approximate street value of over \$10,000 and removes a significant amount of dangerous substance from the community.

Small business confidence drops slightly in May

The confidence of British Columbia small business owners fell slightly in May, after two consecutive months of increases, according to the Canadian Federation of Independent Business (CFIB). British Columbia's Business Barometer® index dropped three points in May to reach 64.9.

"Despite this latest slippage, B.C. is in general growth territory and among the most optimistic regions

in the country. Full-time hiring plans are reasonably positive with 25 per cent of respondents expecting to add staff," said Ted Mallett, CFIB's chief economist and vice-president.

"However, there is some reason for concern as almost half of business owners cite insufficient domestic demand as limiting their growth - the highest level in the West."

Small business owners in Alberta (68.8) are the most optimistic in the

country, although Newfoundland and Labrador (68.3), Saskatchewan (65.8), and British Columbia (64.9)

First Nations - Part 2

As per my previous column, as promised, here is my continuation on the First Nations issue.

In some parts of the country, Aboriginal rights were recognized and affirmed under historic treaties. In other parts of Canada – particularly British Columbia – few treaties are in place, so modern treaties (called comprehensive land claims) are being negotiated.

Both government and Indigenous peoples see these agreements as the way forward, but very little progress has been made. Since 1973, only 24 comprehensive land claims and two stand-alone self-government agreements have been concluded.

As of September 2012, there remain 93 active self-government and comprehensive land claim negotiations underway across the country. On average, reaching an agreement takes 15 years and many negotiations are completely stalled – in part because government negotiators insist that agreements must “extinguish”[1] rights in one form or another. This means that in exchange for an agreement that defines specific rights and benefits, the community in question must renounce any other rights they may be entitled to as Indigenous peoples. Many communities resist renouncing what they see as Inherent Rights, and this approach has also been condemned by a number of UN Human Rights bodies.

Even when agreements are reached, issues remain with implementation. Numerous independent reviewers, including the Auditor General, have confirmed that the Government of Canada is not fulfilling its obligations under these historic or modern treaties. Indeed, there are an estimated 700-800 charges of breach of such agreements (specific land claims) that remain unresolved. The federal government officially recognizes 346 of these specific land claims. At the present rate, it is expected to take 100 years to settle them all.

Faced with the failure of its approach, in September 2012 the Harper Government announced a policy shift to focus on comprehensive land claim negotiations with “willing” partners. This “Results-based approach”, means that the Federal Government will pull-out of negotiations if it decides they are not

progressing satisfactorily.

The NDP strongly rejects this approach, as the Federal Government has a responsibility to negotiate with all Indigenous peoples.

In 2007, the NDP tabled a motion for a child-first principle based on Jordan's Principle, which holds that when there is a jurisdictional dispute over which level of government should pay for an Aboriginal child's care, whichever government was first contacted will provide the service, and later seek resolution of the jurisdictional dispute. This motion was unanimously agreed to by the House of Commons.

In 2008, the NDP tabled a motion in support of the United Declaration of the Rights of Indigenous peoples that was adopted by the majority of the House.

The NDP was also instrumental in bringing about the 2008 Residential School Apology.

In 2009, the NDP tabled a motion that was unanimously agreed to by the House to declare June as National Aboriginal History Month.

In 2010, we hosted an Aboriginal Candidate's Summit in Ottawa that brought indigenous candidates running for the NDP together with representatives from the three national Aboriginal organizations representing distinct peoples.

In 2012, the NDP tabled a motion based on the principles of the Shannen's Dream campaign, which maintains that per-student funding for First Nations' education should be at least equal to the funding provided for other Canadian students. This motion was unanimously continued on Page 21

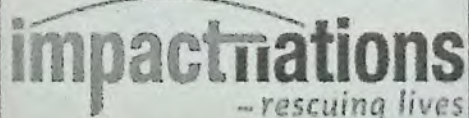

The cultures that have been allowed to develop in our Senate and our federal and provincial legislatures are the results of a rapid deterioration of our colonial institution.

Harper's decision to prorogue the government of the day, not once but twice, for no other reason than because he could not have his way, was one of the earlier tell tales.

In 2008 to avoid a non-confidence vote, and again in 2009 to suspend Parliament for three months, to dodge an ongoing investigation into the Afghan detainees affair http://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Canadian_Afghan_detainee_issue.

When Bev Oda was found to have

lied in Parliament, she should have been expelled promptly.

As the result of Harper's stalling, the government instead lost a motion of confidence and was found in 'contempt of Parliament', putting Canada on the front pages of the global media.

Since then Harper has used every opportunity to demonstrate his level of contempt for the people, our federal Parliament, and the Queen.

Harper has appointed a total of 58 people to a Senate he insisted was going to be elected, and the spending of billions of dollars without debate, zero transparency and no accountability have become the new norms.

Traditionally a budget is a separate

Bill, outlining in some detail the government's spending for the year.

But Harper, in an outrageous display of contempt, packaged the budget into two Bills numbers C-38 (the Jobs, Growth and Long-Term Prosperity Act) and C-45 (the Jobs and Growth Act), and rammed them through Parliament with virtually no debate.

Those two Bills included changes to more than 120 laws and regulations, and radically changed the way governments function in Canada.

Today nobody can be held accountable for anything by anybody.

That includes the Premiers, our Prime Minister and our Supreme Courts.

To abolish the Senate would only serve as a distraction.

The Queen is no longer an effective Head of State, and the time has come to sever our colonial ties.

Then we can finally write our own Constitution, and become a sovereign democratic society where the people control the politicians and the courts enforce the laws instead of re-writing them.

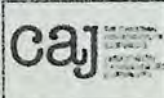

What Older Women Really Want

When a group of young women get together and talk about men, what they want in a man is quite different from what older women want. Young women want a good looking man, one who makes a decent living, a man who could father healthy children and stick around to raise them. They want a good lover, a faithful man, and a man with ambition who could improve the financial resources of a family.

All of this changes when it is single women over age 50 discussing what they want in a man.

Recently, I began exploring dating sites for older women and looked for comments from the widows and divorced women I know. These women range in age from 55 to 75, and yes, they would like a man in their lives, but what they want in a man is rarely found on a dating site.

Two widows talked about what they would really like, and one said to the other, "You try to find a carpenter and I'll try to find a plumber."

Another said, "I want a man who will mow the lawn and take out the garbage."

This clearly indicates the top priorities for what kind of companion they want: they want men who can do the hard jobs or know how to change washers or fix things. This

requirement is due to the high cost of hiring people to do things. For most widows and most divorced women, money is an issue because most have very little. As one woman said, "If he isn't willing to mow the lawn or fix things, I want a man with enough money to hire people to do it."

Along with finding a man with skills, women want a man who keeps himself fit and well-groomed. They also want a man who shows appreciation for what they can contribute to a relationship.

Older women have been through at least one long term relationship. They know about caring for a husband, making a home, and doing all of the things women do to create a good social network for a family. Widows have gone through the loss of a loved man, and divorced women have gone through the grief of a relationship that would not work. Some divorced women have experienced abusive relationships and don't want to go through that again. Some widows have gone through years of home nursing and don't want to do that again. Everybody comes with some baggage, good or bad.

When we women gathered around the computer and looked at the men available, it was surprising how quickly the same responses formed a trend. Men who posed with Harleys were immediately greeted with a negative response. A tattooed man in a T-shirt posed beside his motorcycle says "unreliable, immature" to an older woman. Men who appeared scruffy, especially those with untrimmed beard and hair, were immediate discards because they did not appear to take pride in themselves.

It was amazing how many men advertised themselves as romantic, but how few expressed any sense

of what that means to them. Older women are not so interested in romance as they are in a man's ability to be a good companion, to do their share of maintaining a good relationship with a woman. In many cases, it was clear that what a man wanted was a woman who would look after them in their old age. For widows, that was definitely a turn-off as they have been through that scenario to the bitter end.

Some older women had tried dating. One said the fellow turned up with two days' growth of whiskers, sweaty and wearing wrinkled clothing, then took her to dinner and began by insulting the waitress. Forget him! Another dated the same widower several times, and the more they dated, the more she became aware she was a substitute for his dead wife, including telling her how they would do things and what things they would do. He no longer consulted her about what she would like to do. That ended.

Most older women are not desperate for a relationship with a man. Most have been through enough with men so that they want a relationship which is going to enhance their lives, not make more work for them. Let's face it: men tend to leave the work of maintaining a relationship to the woman.

Men want to have a woman who looks after them and gives them the freedom to go out and do the guy things. When an older man wants a relationship with an older woman, he has to keep in mind she has looked after a man for a lot of years, but she has also been independent for years. I know many women who enjoy the independence, and enjoy not having to cater to a man 24/7. I know a woman who was married for nearly 30 years when her husband decided to find a younger woman. After several years as a single woman, she began a relationship with a man nearly 20 years older than herself. Their relationship is warm, loving and full of fun, but she refuses to live with him. She wants to maintain her independence. She does not want to be tied down to cooking, cleaning and catering to the demands of a man, even though he is a nice man.

I suppose what most older women want in a man is a considerate companion who does his full share. I suspect that is asking too much from most men.

Electoral Area 'G' Report

Director Angelique Wood

SOFI - Remuneration: Why so Much???

People may wonder why the costs of an Electoral Area Director are so much higher than those of the Mayors and Councillors serving for Municipalities. There are a number of differences between the support and pay available to a Municipal Board Member compared to an Electoral Area Director sitting on the Regional District Okanagan-Similkameen.

As an Electoral Area Director, I must drive great distances in the course of my work, which means that my expenses are high as I am reimbursed for my gas costs spent in attending meetings throughout the 2,122 square kilometre region of "Area G" and the 10,414 square kilometre RDOS as a whole. My base pay for being an Electoral Area Director is \$1,689.28 a month. Many of the expenses and remuneration are covering expenses which I am expected to pay out of pocket. Until February this year, I worked as a waitress to supplement my income- and working "on the side" is usually necessary for most elected officials to make ends meet.

In addition to representing the people of "Area G" at the RDOS, I have also been appointed by the Regional District Okanagan-Similkameen to attend meetings of the Southern Interior Local

Government Association and the Southern Interior Beetle Action Coalition. Both of these other Boards cover areas spanning from as far west as Lytton and Bralorne, as far east as the Kootenays, as far north as the towns of Clearwater and Valemont, and south to the US Border.

These additional duties mean that I regularly drive in excess of 4 or 5 hours to attend meetings, and many of those meetings occur on the evening of our arrival and starting the next morning until around 3:00 PM. These meetings require staying overnight in a hotel, eating out while on the road, and mileage costs. It is through this representation that I have lobbied the BC Utilities Commission and Fortis on residents' behalf over the two-tiered conservation system. It is through these Boards that we as residents of the Similkameen have a better opportunity to have our voices heard in the Province of BC, and where we are able to band together with other rural representatives and demand a better deal for rural BC.

Unlike Municipal Board members like Mayors, I don't have any staff or secretaries to assign work to. Every phone call I make from my home (office) phone is a long distance one, unless I am calling Penticton. I do not bill the RDOS for this. If I want a document or

report for a resident or group I print it myself, using the home office supplies which I was assigned by the Regional District. Since I live in a remote community, there are times I purchase stationery, stamps and other office supplies rather than wait for the time delay of ordering things through the head office. When a project is time sensitive, I would rather pay for things myself and be reimbursed than miss a deadline or not have materials on hand for a presentation or meeting.

Telus: Cell Service is coming: 2013-2014

The RDOS Board has issued its second letter of concurrence for the construction of a cellular monopole along Highway #3, as part of the plans for greater cell coverage throughout the highway corridor. So far, Telus has planned and engineered for two sites between Princeton and Keremeos which will extend the coverage along our most dangerous stretches of highway. It is anticipated that this cell service will be in place by sometime between the end of 2013 and 2014. Most residents along Highway #3 should expect they will receive cell service due to the erection of these two poles.

There has been a lot of controversy and misinformation about a cellular monopole proposed for the continued on Page 21

Provincial Partnership.

Over the past ten years, Success By 6 has built a network of Early Years community coalitions across BC that involve local credit unions, local United Ways and government representatives along with many diverse stakeholders including parents, grandparents, educators, health professionals, local governments, Aboriginal leaders, children's librarians, recreation coordinators and many more. Collectively they plan how their community's children can best be supported.

Today Success by 6 is a network of over 120 Early Childhood Coalitions in BC that support over 550 communities. 1,700 people are involved on these coalitions and an additional 1,500 volunteers take part in supporting their work. - submitted

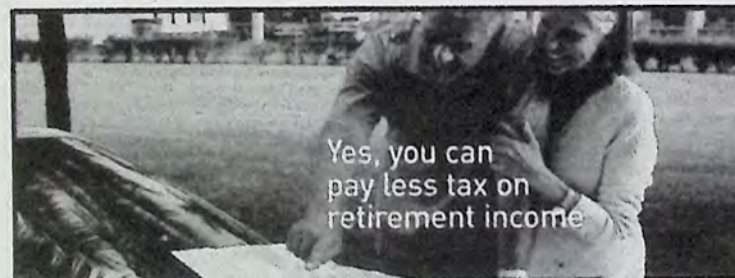

Saddles 'n' Spurs

Continuing riding on the unbroken buckskin horse that I borrowed from one of the cowboys I had no problems until I got to a wire fence gate and had to dismount to open and close it. In closing the gate I had to hold the horse and bend down to put the post into the wire loop at the bottom. As I did this the horse struck out with his front foot and kicked me in the side of my head!

Wham! It hurt! I hung onto my head and the reigns until I got my senses back and thought – we're now even for my twitch and the kick in the head. The saddle blanket had slid back some so I loosened the girth, fixed the blankets, tightened the saddle and had a nice ride back through the beautiful, peaceful scenery surrounding the Triangle Ranch.

There were no cowboys around when I got back so I put the new green broke horse back with the others, hung up the tack and left. I loved the challenge and the horse – a great day.

A little later on another Sunday I borrowed the buckskin again for another ride.

I was up in the hills in the Triangle valley – I think there is a golf course there now. I was riding in a direction away from the ranch house on a bit of a ridge and wanted to find a safe

place to get down to the valley. I came to an area that looked like a slide at one time. It didn't look steep to me and the horse seemed willing.

It was some time later that I found out the slide is called scree. I turned him left and we stepped off into the loose broken rock and about three to four steps down I found out I'd made

a serious error in judgement. I bailed off and grabbed the reigns and pulled the horse around and we both pushed a lot of rock down the hill as we scrambled trying to get to the top again. We made it to the top never to try anything like that again.

Living Past 100

Try An Old Cure For Nausea

Many people experience nausea when traveling, particularly if traveling by sea. Others experience nausea if riding on midway machines that shake, roll and spin. Many women have nausea every morning during early pregnancy. An old cure for nausea is ginger, and it works very well.

In a study done at the University of Utah several years ago, powdered ginger root outperformed the best patent medicine used to control nausea. Two capsules of powdered ginger root prevented nausea better and for longer than the standard medication. It works even for morning sickness.

Ginger is an ancient remedy for many things. It has been used as a blood thinner, and has no side effects such as those that accompany warfarin.

A hot ginger compress works wonders for sore muscles and stiff joints. To make this compress, grate about one cupful of raw ginger root and place it in a cloth bag (you can make one using a small piece of cloth and tying the corners) and put the ginger bag into hot water (not boiling). Then squeeze the juice from the bag into the water, and place the bag in the water and simmer for seven minutes. When the water is yellow, remove the bag and place it over an aching muscle or joint. Save the water. It can be added to a hot bath to ease an aching back or placed in a foot bath to soothe sore feet.

This ginger compress can be used on the chest to relieve congestion from asthma or bronchitis.

For an extreme headache caused by stress, make a thin paste of powdered ginger and apply it to the forehead and temples and lay down for awhile. This eases the sensation of pressure that caused the headache.

For problems with mucous build-up in the sinuses, throat or lungs, drink a tea made with fresh ginger root. To make this tea, grate about two table-spoons of fresh ginger and add it to two cups of boiling water. Let it steep for half an hour. Drink one cup every two and a half hours until the congestion is gone.

So, in addition to spicing up your chicken or stir fry, ginger can work wonders in many ways.

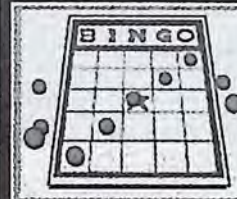

Quinoa Spinach & Shiitake Salad

(NC)—Delicious seasoned quinoa forms the base of this warm greens-and-veggie side salad. Leftovers make a great packed lunch. Prep time: 20 minutes / Cook time: 35 minutes / Makes 6 servings.

Ingredients:

- 2 cups (500 mL) Chicken Broth
- 1 pkg (225 g) PC Organics Roasted Garlic and Fine Herbs Quinoa
- 2 tbsp (25 mL) olive oil
- 1/2 cup (125 mL) thinly sliced shallots
- 1/2 cup (125 mL) finely chopped sweet red pepper
- 6 oz (180 g) shiitake mushrooms, stems discarded and caps thinly sliced
- 3 tbsp (45 mL) red wine vinegar
- 1 pkg (142 g) baby spinach
- 1/2 tsp (2 mL) salt
- 1/4 tsp (1 mL) freshly ground black pepper
- 1/4 cup (50 mL) crumbled feta cheese

Directions:

- In saucepan, bring chicken broth to a boil. Stir in quinoa and contents of seasoning pouch. Reduce heat to low, cover and simmer for 12 to 15 minutes or until tender. Remove from heat; let stand, covered, for 5 minutes. Fluff with a fork.
- In large nonstick frying pan, heat oil over medium heat; cook shallots and red pepper for 4 to 6 minutes, stirring occasionally, or until lightly golden and softened. Stir in mushrooms; cook, stirring occasionally, for 6 to 8 minutes or until mushrooms have released their juices and are starting to turn golden. Add vinegar; cook, stirring to bring up browned bits, for 1 minute. Stir in spinach; cook, stirring, for 2 minutes or just until wilted. Stir in salt and pepper. Remove from heat.
- In large bowl, toss quinoa with warm spinach mixture. Serve sprinkled with feta.

Monopole controversy larger than a Yes or No to cell service.

For many in Hedley, the issue isn't simply a Yes or No to cell service. The range of cell service is still undetermined based on the site location - we know it won't have a wide breadth, and the two other poles erected along Highway #3 will likely service many residents around Hedley. The site location of the monopole in Hedley's downtown is being contested by many town folk for a number of reasons.

Originally, TELUS' only site choice was central Main Street (Scott Avenue); the monopole would obstruct the existing sight-lines of the Mascot Mine from the Hedley Museum, the vista of the mountains, and would certainly detract from the old-timey feel that makes Hedley a magical place to many. Finally, the proposed site and proximity to its neighbours poses health concerns to some. TELUS has options to the site location of the monopole; TELUS could explore the option to co-locate with China Creek's facility which transmits an internet signal into town from across the Similkameen River. Industry

Canada suggests that co-location should ALWAYS be considered.

In February, after the TELUS/StandardLand open house in Hedley, TELUS/StandardLand gave concerned Hedley residents a "take it or leave it attitude" in regards to their concerns.

All along, Ms. Wood requested TELUS to honor the standards set forth in the Canadian Wireless Telecommunications Association best-practices guidelines and to follow protocols - including examining the potential of co-locating before new sites are developed and requesting more time to address the concerns of her constituents and to find solutions in order to bring service to Hedley.

Ontario (61.9), and Manitoba (61.0) are slightly below the national average, while New Brunswick (58.1) and Prince Edward Island (55.6) are further back. The biggest declines occurred in Quebec (58.9), which dropped five full points, and Nova Scotia (50.0), which is by far the lowest in the country.

"Despite this slight drop, we're continuing to see B.C. small business confidence remain above the Canadian average," says Mike Klassen, CFIB BC director of provincial affairs. "However, we still consider British Columbia's economic recovery as fragile and not to be taken for granted."

agreed to by the House.

The idle No More movement arose in response to the Conservative's omnibus budget bill which gutted the Environmental Assessment Act and the Navigable Waters Act directly affecting the Indigenous peoples. The NDP supported this campaign.

Government Position

Aboriginal issues were not among the five priorities in the Conservatives' election campaign. Before the 2006 election, Conservative Leader Stephen Harper barely mentioned the Kelowna Accord, and has since failed to meet its targets.

Since coming into power, the

Conservatives have failed to deliver on the promises they made to renew the Crown's relationship with Aboriginal peoples, first in the Residential School Apology in 2008, then at the January 24th 2012 Crown Gathering, and again at the January 11th 2013 meeting with the National Chief Shawn Atleo.

Instead, through omnibus bills like C-38 and C-45, the Conservatives have gutted the Navigable Waters Protection Act and weakened environmental protection laws failing to uphold the Crown's duty to consult Aboriginal peoples.

The federal government has a moral obligation and must live up to its responsibilities of First Nations in Canada.

centre of the town of Hedley. While most residents are in favour of cell service, the location proposed by Telus was received with diametrically opposing views. It is often a contentious issue for an industrial utility to site its infrastructure within a town boundary, so it is not surprising that residents responded the way that they did.

I have been working with the General Manager of Telus to consider other options, and in the next few weeks engineers will be out in the fields looking at the possibilities of co-locating their hardware on existing sites that already service the town. In the best case situation, residents will be receiving cell service WITHOUT the erection of a monopole in the downtown core.

At the RDOS Board on Thursday, May 16th, I did NOT vote to issue a letter of concurrence as urged by

a local petition, as it would compromise the efforts I had made up to that date to create a better solution for all stakeholders concerned.

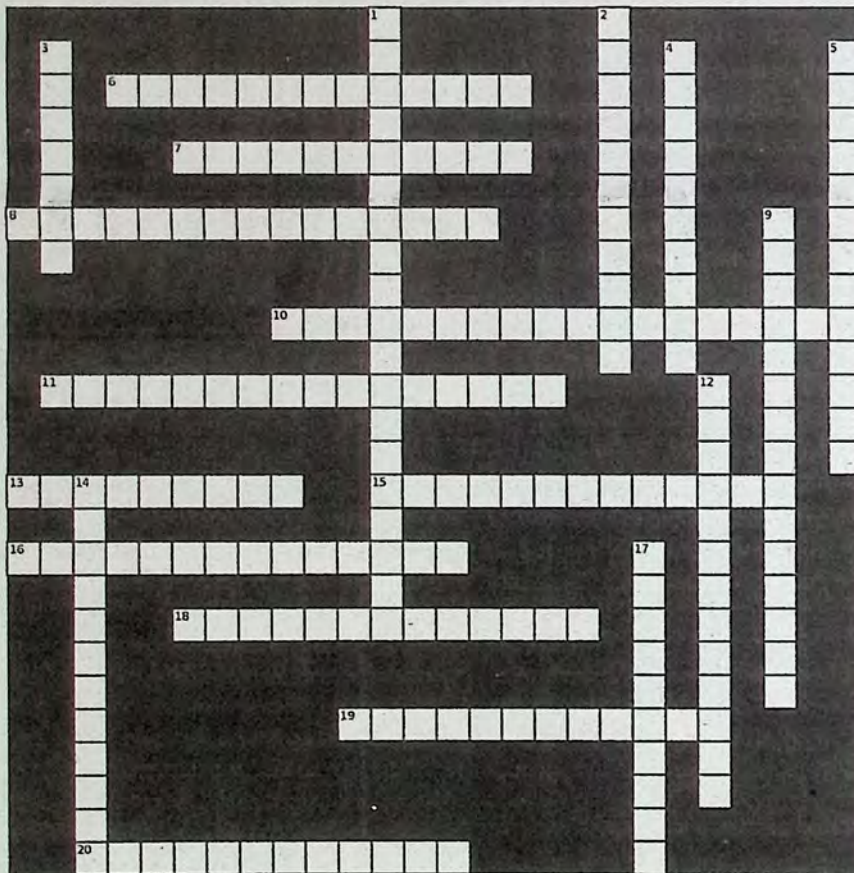
