New zoning planned for court house

A change in zoning for the court house building received first and second reading at the June 17 Town Council meeting. The new zoning would replace 'institutional' use with C-2, downtown commercial, thus allowing for many possible uses for the building.

At the same meeting, a letter from Dierra Maynard was received. She voiced her objections to the Town selling the heritage building (constructed in the 1920's). Maynard's

letter advised Council she had done some research into funding for preservation of heritage buildings. Council made the decision to receive and file her letter.

During question period, Mayor Armitage cut Maynard's question short, informing her that Council would not make a hasty decision regarding the future of the old court house. He did agree to having Maynard share the information she had obtained about funding.

Action goes on at fairgrounds

Paul Bedard, President of Princeton Exhibition Association (PXA), describes the activity at the fairgrounds as "ongoing daily". One barn used primarily for race horses has been renovated, including new roofing. Bedard said contractors did excellent work at reasonable costs. A second barn had repairs and Bedard and Racing Days President Karrie Crucil have been preparing the stalls for occupancy by race horses this week. There have been problems with water pipes leaking and this must be fixed soon.

Work on the grandstand and the electrical system continues. Volunteers spent Sunday working on the grounds in readiness for the horse racing meet on Saturday.

Karrie Crucil reported she had

gone to Osoyoos to help with their horse race meet. This was the first race meet in many years and there were a few glitches she helped smooth. She said she met a bus tour operator at Osoyoos who wondered if there would be parking space for his 25 passenger bus in Princeton as he hoped to bring a busload from Penticton for Princeton's races. She advised him he could bring six 72 passenger buses and there would still be plenty of room for more in Princeton.

Local businesses have been very supportive of needs at the fairgrounds. Weyerhaeuser has been an ongoing supporter, and contributions have been made recently by All Purpose Roofing and Princeton Redi-Mix. At the June 18 PXA

meeting, Paul Bedard expressed his appreciation to these businesses, and to the volunteer workers, notably the Bernard family, who have been doing odd jobs at the grounds. The Bernards have refurbished six picnic tables, stabilized a set of stairs, replaced faucets in the washrooms and did some weed whacking. The

recent excessive rainfall has hampered outdoor activities at the grounds.

Dan Kastor, President of Princeton Agricultural Fair Association, reported things are moving ahead for the fair on August 24 and 25. The Marron Valley Drill Team is on board for entertainment along with

Mat Duffus and Dale Seaman's Highway 97 band. Entertainment includes many attractions for children. Laser tag returns, there will be inflatables to play on, and Shirley Freding will have arts and crafts for children. Vendors are applying for space at the fair. Jamie Payton is continued on Page 2

Letters object to zoning change

A hearing was held June 17 regarding a request by owners of a building on Burton Avenue to have a change in the use of the building. The new building was constructed to feature commercial occupants on the ground floor and residential occupants on the second floor. The request by the owner was to allow residential occupancy in what was originally planned as commercial space.

Town Council received two letters from those objecting to the request. The first was from a resident in the area who had requested, several years ago, to have zoning changed

so he could have a commercial enterprise offering overnight accommodation.

His request was denied on the grounds it was not suitable in a residential area. He objected to changing the original plan for the building.

The second letter objected on the grounds that adding more rental units to the already glutted rental unit market was not in the best interest of those who already own rental units. He did not want the original plan changed.

Council has not made a decision about the request.

The next meeting of Princeton Exhibition Association is at 7:00 PM July 16 at the fairgrounds office. All meetings of the Association are open to the public.

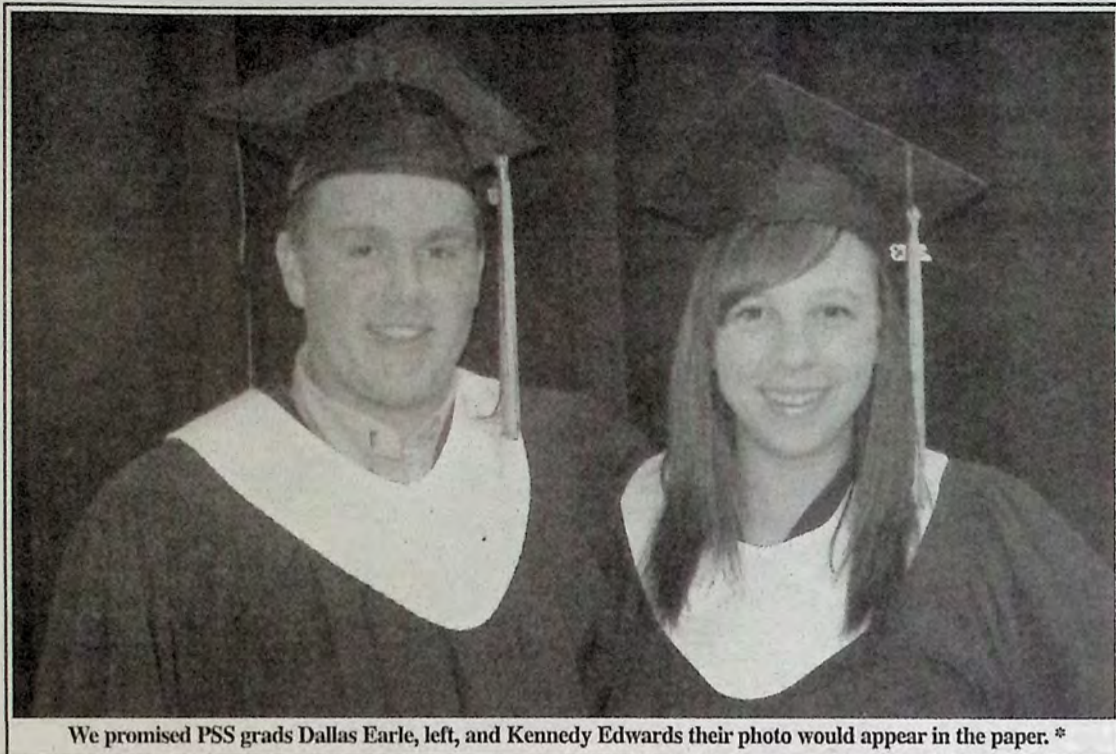

Courting A Successful Solution

There's been a lot of talk about the courthouse building over the past few years.

At one point it looked as though it was destined to become the new Town Hall.

A building assessment was done which indicated it would cost a lot of money to bring the historic structure up to code.

Thankfully Town Council wisely chose to quit spending money on the building and letting go of plans to convert it into a municipal building.

I point this out to remind you it is not entirely the fault of the current Town Council that local taxpayers share in the ownership of the giant White Elephant on Vermilion Avenue.

Do I think it should be remedied with a wrecking ball?

Absolutely not.

There is not a lot of local heritage remaining and I think we have an obligation to preserve and share as much of the history of the area as we can for future generations.

That being said, I have no simple solution in mind on what to do with the building.

We've talked about it in our office and we have come up with a lot of ideas, but they are just ideas without price tags attached to them.

I personally think it would be a great (new) location for the Sunflower Gallery (also on Vermilion Avenue), which would offer enough space for a full-blown Art Gallery.

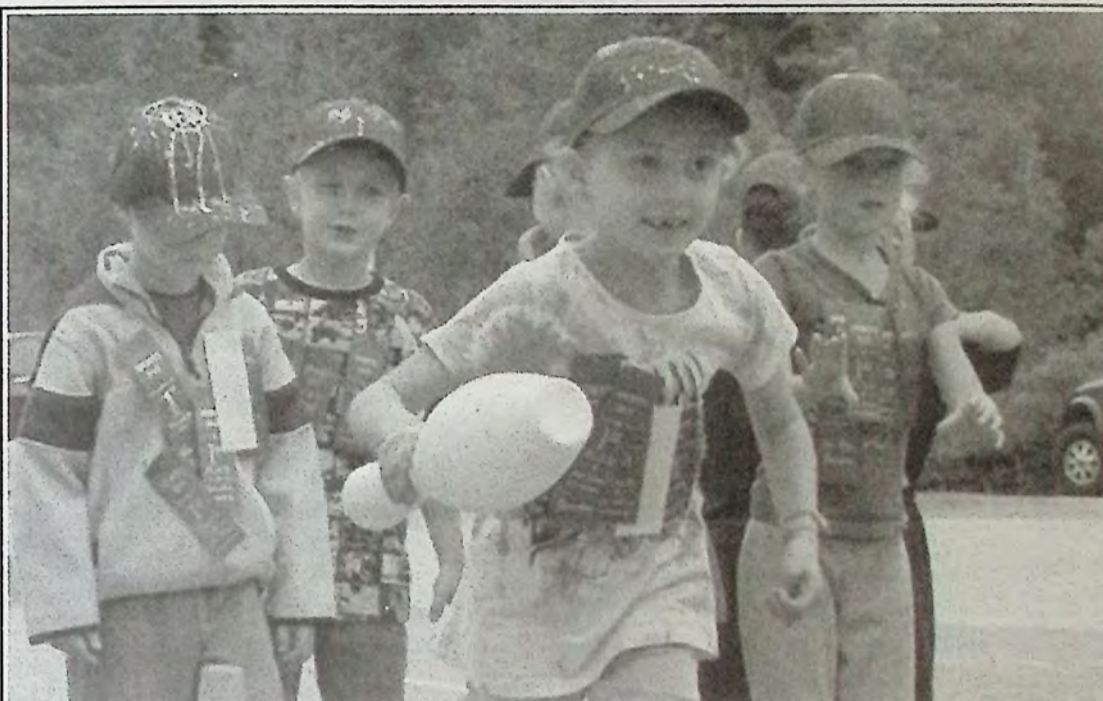
Another suggestion from our office is to convert it into some sort of interactive experience that could be partnered with Princeton Museum. It could possible enhance the offerings in the community for tourism.

Regardless of what happens to the building, if it ends up on the auction block you can pretty much guarantee the building will come down to make room for something else.

The tough decision comes from picking between keeping it and trying to fit it up with grant money or selling it off and collecting property taxes from private enterprise.

The logical choice would be to ask what would be more profitable for the community and using that as a way to measure the value of both possibilities.

And as much as I'd like to see the Town keep it and convert the building into something useful, it will require support from within the community to make that happen.

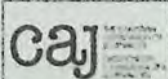

I Didn't Expect To Pick Rocks!

In 1965, my husband and I lived in northern Alberta. We came to Princeton for a two week visit with my parents and sister. We arrived in mid-afternoon. After supper was over and the dishes were done, my father handed me a steel bucket and said, "Let's go to the new racetrack."

"What new racetrack?" I asked. "The one where there's going to be horse races on Saturday," he replied.

Confident we would find out more about this racetrack, my husband and I, along with my sister and our two daughters, dutifully piled into his station wagon and headed to the racetrack. Having it located out past the town dump did not really recommend it, and there wasn't much to recommend it when we arrived. There was a track cleared out of the bunchgrass, a fence

around the track, and a few bleachers, along with a funny wooden stand which would sell soft drinks and snacks during the races.

I soon found out what the buckets were for: we were going to walk the track and pick rocks.

"I didn't come here to pick rocks!" I told my father.

"Everybody has to do their share," he told me.

Everybody included vacationers from Alberta, apparently.

My children were not thrilled about picking rocks, but they helped. Certainly, our family was not the only group out there. There were all sorts of people picking rocks, hammering things, wiring things, moving things. The bare bunchgrass bench land was bustling with activity.

It was a great relief when dusk finally came and we could go home. We were tired. I hoped it was worth my effort.

The following evening, we stood on my parents' front porch of their house on Allison Avenue and watched the Racing Days parade line up. In those days, the parade lined up on Allison Avenue, then wended its way to Tulameen Avenue and crossed the wooden bridge to go down Bridge Street, up Vermilion Avenue, to end in the playground in front of Princeton Elementary-Secondary School, roughly where Dairy Queen and Esso are located today. The school burned on August 13, 1982.

When the parade ended, the crowd watching the parade was welcomed to the school gym to see the crowning of Miss Princeton. I did not go to that first Miss Princeton pageant as I had two youngsters to care for and they were hyper after the parade.

The first horse races were a lot of fun. As there was no grandstand and a limited amount of bleacher space, people nosed their vehicles up to the racetrack rail and sat on the hood of the vehicle or leaned against the rail to watch the race. This would never be allowed today due to the potential for injury of the spectators. Insurance companies run everything today.

The first race went by in a haze of dust. Oldtimers like my father had thoroughly discussed the merits of each horse and placed side bets. Today, we have racing forms and computerized wagering. My father had a good eye for horse flesh and often won.

In 1969, we moved to Princeton, and Racing Days became one of the high spots of our year.

One year, my 10 year old nephew stayed with us and went to the races. He was given five dollars for snacks and drinks (you could do that back then). After the third or fourth race, I noticed my nephew had another hamburger in his face and another drink can in his fist.

"Where did you get the money for more snacks?" I asked.

He got really dodgy about answering.

"Tell me the truth!" I demanded.

"I won it," he said.

"How? You're not allowed to bet."

"I hung around the old guys like Grandpa, and when they figured out which horse was going to win, I got one of Grandpa's friends to make a bet for me. I won every race."

The kid did a lot better than my take.

I have been to some great Racing Days class reunions, danced into the wee hours at Racing Days dances, eaten my share of pancakes at Rotary Park, and photographed more than my share of Racing Days parades. I have been to an awful lot of Miss Princeton and Youth Ambassador pageants, and had the pleasure one year of seeing my grand-daughter chosen as second Youth Ambassador.

These are all such good memories, even if I didn't come here to pick rocks.

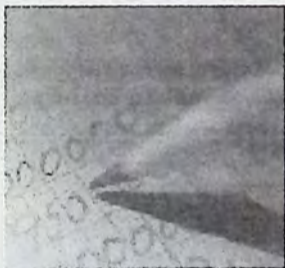

2012-13 was a year for continued change on the service provision front, as well as the kind of gratifying recognition from peers that gives staff the second wind needed to forge on.

In October, CFOS earned the Minister's Award for Excellence & Innovation from Western Diversification at the CFBC Conference in Nelson for its tireless efforts to promote Economic Gardening both in the Okanagan and beyond. Also at the conference, Executive Director Mary Ellen Heidt received the Don McMillan Award for her outstanding efforts.

Economic Gardening took giant steps forward this year, gaining tremendous traction. CFOS created the stand-alone Canadian Centre for Economic Gardening the tagline "information into opportunity."

Su Baker and crew also scoured the continent to line up a stellar roster of guest speakers and sponsors for the first annual Economic Gardening conference to be co-hosted by C2EG and CFOS in Kelowna October 8 and 9, 2013.

Also in 2012-13, Su finished train-

ing with the Edward Lowe Foundation to become the first certified Economic Gardening Practitioner in Canada.

Meanwhile, on the service provision front CFOS continues to be part of the wider shifting landscape, with Community Futures around the province struggling to find the right format with WorkBC service providers to prop up lagging numbers of clients seeking self-employment.

Here again, CFOS took the initiative to have their Association lobby the Ministry of Social Development, asking that the Employment Program of B.C. make self-employment a higher priority. At home, CFOS is beefing up marketing efforts (including social media) with good effect. As a result, preliminary figures show higher numbers out to monthly Self Employment "anyone-can-attend" info sessions.

At the same time, CFOS continues to explore ways to fill the growing niche for "business succession" services, with rich opportunity in many sectors to draw sellers, suitors, and loan partners.

When it comes to the potential for gold in "them thar succession hills," you can be sure CFOS will find it.

And There They Go!

The History of Princeton Racing Days

Horse racing in Princeton is a tradition. A weekend of action is planned around horse racing and Princeton calls it Racing Days. We start with a big parade on Friday evening, followed by the Youth Ambassador pageant. There is usually a lot to do that weekend, but the main feature has always been horse racing.

Racing Days began with the vision of local business people and Town Council. The idea first took hold in the autumn of 1964 when Princeton was in the midst of a very depressed economy. Business leaders wanted to draw people to Princeton. They saw all kinds of tourists passing by on the highway and wanted them to

stop in Princeton for more than a hamburger and a tank of gas.

Horse racing was part of Princeton's history, particularly on the July 1 weekend. If you go to the intersection of Vermilion Avenue and Highway 3, there are sculptures commemorating a horse race for native women which took place down Vermilion Avenue more than 100 years ago. This race, called the Klootchman Race, is depicted in a drawing from that time and formed the model for the sculptures.

The July 1 celebration was a natural for the decision to do something to bring people to Princeton. Horse racing was also a natural for Princeton, as many horse races had

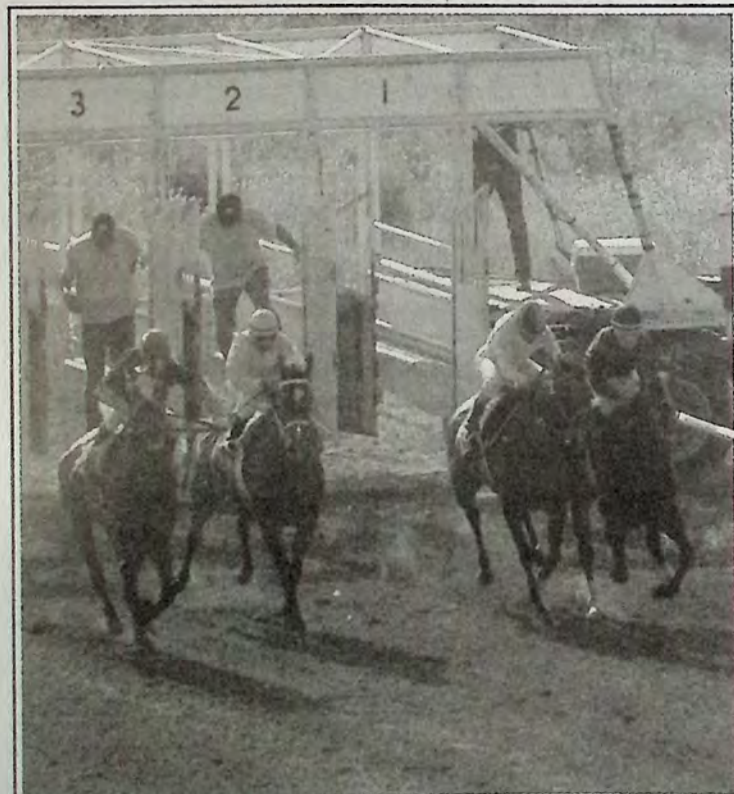
taken place here a century before Racing Days began. This was, and still is, a great place for raising race horses. Many local horses have vied for, and won, the Similkameen Cup and the Tulameen Cup. Last year, a local horse won both!

The idea of holding a weekend of horse racing inspired local people to go all out, have a parade, host some dances and a pancake breakfast, and make a weekend of fun. Volunteers worked really hard to build the racetrack. Town Council designated the land and local contractors took their equipment to the site and started work as soon as the snow was gone.

In terms of what we see today, the first races in 1965 were really more like an impromptu country race, but in terms of local business participation, the town went all-out, and so did the service clubs. Businesses decorated their shop windows with horse racing images, service clubs sponsored activities, and the first Miss Princeton, Edna Boulet, was crowned in the first pageant.

Today, horse racing in Princeton is very sophisticated with pari-mutuel betting on electronic equipment, but the atmosphere is still one of country horse racing and a time to relax and have fun. A big concession building and a big grandstand are part of the fun now, and there is an entire fairgrounds complex built around that first racetrack.

As for the vision of those business people, it paid off. Five years after Racing Days began, Princeton was booming. People were moving to Princeton for jobs in the sawmill and major exploration was underway at Copper Mountain leading to the opening of the copper mine.

Living Past 100

The Importance of the Right Pills

When you take too many pills, or the wrong pills, or your doctor prescribes a pill that does not combine well with another pill you're taking, you could die.

This kind of death is called iatrogenic mortality, or death by medical error. It includes physicians making mistakes in diagnosis, treatment and/or surgical error. As a person who wants to live, you need to be 100 percent aware of what pills you are taking and what pills you might be prescribed. Dare to ask your physician for clear answers about every pill you take and whether you should be taking it in combination with others.

The death rate from medical error in the United States is more than 10 times higher than the annual number of deaths from automobile accidents! You could say it is riskier to see a physician than to drive a car.

Part of the reason for this high number of deaths by medical error is patients' blind trust in what is being prescribed. The other part of the reason is that patients are not as careful as they should be about which pills they take and when. Pharmacists can help with both problems and often alert patients to possible problems with prescriptions, and pharmacists can help by making up those neat bubble packs of pills that tell you when to take the pills and govern how many you take. If you are inclined to forget to take a pill, you need some help.

Despite all of the expertise available from physicians and pharmacists, you are your own best first line of defence.

Always ask questions about any prescription. Always tell your physician or pharmacist about any other pills you might be taking, including vitamin or herbal preparations. Always tell your physician about any allergic reactions you may have had.

Taking care of your health is your responsibility, even in the doctor's office.

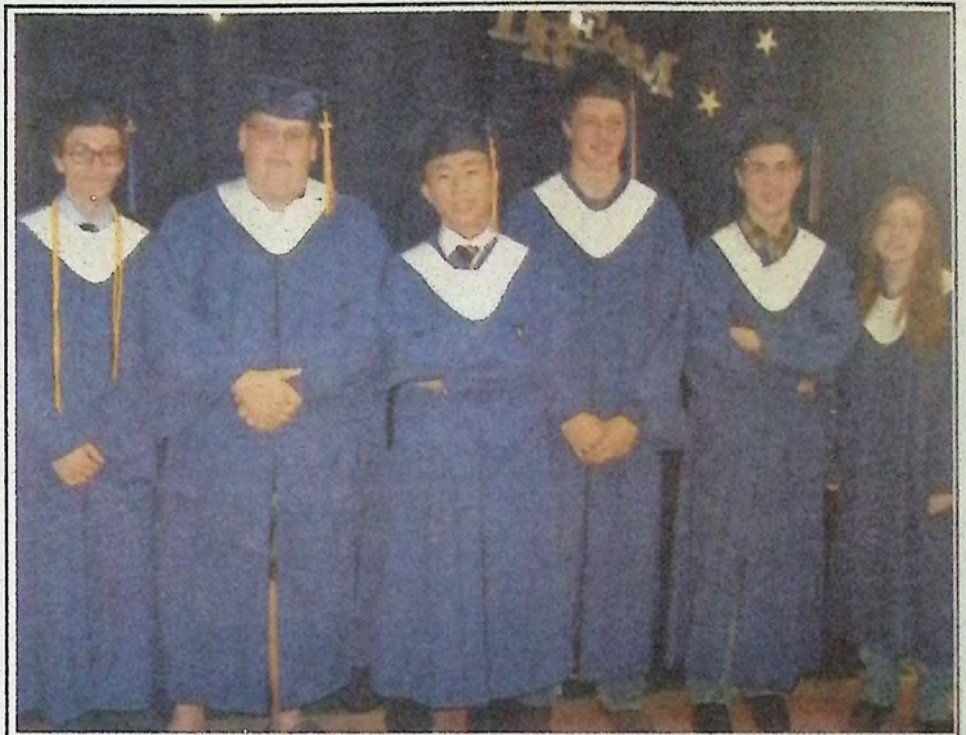

- 3 tbsp (45 mL) pine nuts, chopped
- 1 1/4 cups (300 g) Mozzarellissima cheese, shredded
- 2 oz (50 g) goat cheese (or blue cheese)
- fleur de sel, to taste

Directions:

1. On a lightly floured surface, roll out the pizza dough and top with a drizzle of olive oil.
2. In a bowl, combine grapes, rosemary leaves, pine nuts and a drizzle of olive oil. Set aside.
3. Slide the pizza dough on the BBQ and cook on medium heat for 2 to 3 minutes on each side until slightly golden brown.
4. Remove dough from BBQ and top with half of the Mozzarellissima, then all of the goat cheese and the grape mixture. Cover with the remaining Mozzarellissima.
5. Place back on the BBQ, close cover and cook on medium heat for 5 to 7 minutes, or until the cheese is fully melted. Remove from BBQ, lightly season with fleur de sel and serve.

Tip: Depending on the intensity of your BBQ, watch the dough and cook over direct medium heat.

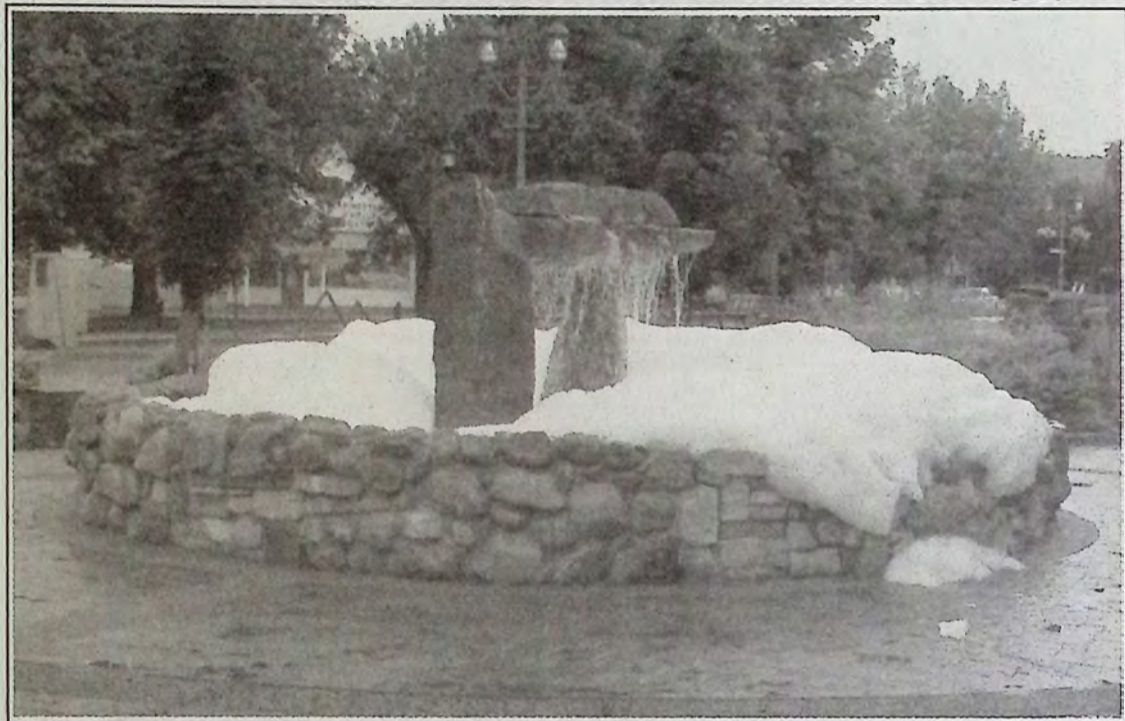

Local banding team attends meeting

 Three Vermilion Forks Field Naturalist members recently attended the Rocky Point Bird Observatory Hummingbird meeting in Burnaby. The meeting was held at Simon Fraser University June 15th and at the Widgeon Marsh in Coquitlam on June 16th. The members were Sue Elwell, Amanda Lahaie and Terry Tellier. All three have permits from the Canadian Wildlife Service of Canada to band hummingbirds.
 Researcher Dr. Doug Altshuler from UBC was the guest speaker. He explained the aerodynamics of "Hummingbird Flight" discovered

in his groundbreaking experiments. The Princeton team was honoured to be asked to present their banding techniques to the conference. As well as getting the chance to liaise with other banders and experts throughout BC they had a hands-on session at Widgeon Marsh.
 Banding by the Princeton group has verified that we now have four species of hummingbirds nesting in the area. They are Rufous, Calliope, Black-chinned and now Anna's. Recently the team captured a bird which had been banded a little more than two weeks earlier in southeastern Arizona. This is only the second Arizona bird captured in BC.

Data gleaned from banding the birds is used to determine migration routes, site dedication, population (sex, age, health), times they arrive, leave and breed, habitat requirements and pollination role. From this information we have learned about their primary threats which are global climate change, habitat destruction and invasive species.
 The Hummingbird Banding Team includes VFFN volunteers as well as generous homeowners who provide banding locations. The banders thank all our volunteers plus give special thanks and appreciation to the VFFN club for their ongoing support of the project.
