Council adopts tax exemptions

Voting on a motion made by Councillor Doug Pateman and seconded by Councillor Kim Maynard passed the adoption of Bylaw No. 881, 2013 at the October 7th regular meeting of Town Council.

Identified as the Town of Princeton 2014 Permissive Tax Exemption Bylaw, it allows Council to exempt land or improvements or both from taxation under section 197 (1) of the Community Charter to the extent

and for the time period and conditions provided in the bylaw.

The bylaw received first, second and third readings on September 23, 2013.

"A permissive exemption must come into force prior to October 31, 2013 to apply to the 2014 taxation year per section 224 (4) of the Community Charter," states Town of Princeton Deputy Treasurer continued on Page 2

Copper Mountain issues Q3 update

Copper Mountain Mining Corporation (TSX: CUM) (the "Company" or "Copper Mountain") announced October 8th production results for the third quarter of 2013 from the Copper Mountain mine located near Princeton.

The mine had record copper production for the quarter and exited the quarter on a positive note with September's copper production totaling 6.8 million pounds. Production for the quarter ended September 30, 2013 totaled 17.7 million pounds of copper, 6,417 ounces of gold, and 79,290 ounces

of silver.

Production improvements can be attributed to the increased average mill throughput rate made possible with the short term secondary crushing strategies that have been implemented and improved in late July.

These short term strategies include: utilizing an increased powder factor in the blasting in the mine to create more fines in the ore; continuing with a contract portable crusher at the primary crusher to crush plus 5,000 tpd of ore to minus two inches; and the introduction of the Company's own small portable

crusher that was purchased and installed at the coarse ore stockpile during the quarter.

The combination of these three activities is designed to create between 12,000 tpd and 13,000 tpd of minus two inch ore feed for the SAG mill. In September the average daily throughput of the SAG mill was 31,925 tpd with an average of 7,600 tpd minus 2 inch crushed product from the portable crushers. Mill availability at 94.2% for the

month was a positive contribution to the 89.3% average for the quarter.

Mill throughput during the quarter improved to an average of 29,130 tpd compared to 26,000 for the first half of 2013, an increase of 12%. The mill processed a total 2.7 million tonnes of ore at an average grade of 0.344 % copper during the quarter as compared to 2.5 million tonnes of ore for the three months ended June 2013. Mill recoveries for the third quarter were 87% as

compared to 85% for the first half of 2013.

Mining activities continued in both the Pit 2 and Pit 3 areas on plan and averaged approximately 154,300 tonnes per day mined.

During the quarter a total of 14.0 million tonnes of material was mined, including 3.9 million tonnes of ore and 9.4 million tonnes of waste. The projected life of mine strip ratio is 2 to 1 but higher in the continued on Page 22

Some ideas were tossed around, including adding a calf scramble and wild cow milking. These two events call for spectator participation and are popular events at other rodeos.

A Rodeo Club fundraiser was discussed. This would be a bus trip to Kamloops for the New Year's Eve

bullarama. A committee will look into that idea.

An election of officers took place. Ken Crompton was returned as President, with Odelle Simmons as Vice-President and Sue Gereau as continued on Page 21

Posse, swimmers, help Halloween

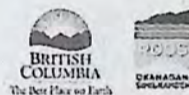
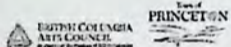

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Council adopts tax exemptions

Shirley McMahon in her report to Council.

Section 220 of the Community Charter stipulates what properties will be exempt from taxation under section 197. Sections 220 h, i and j refer to churches, homes for the elderly and hospitals and state that the building and the 'land upon which the building stands' is exempt.

In 2010 Town Council adopted a Permissive Exemption policy to recognize the significant value of volunteers, volunteer groups and agencies to the spiritual, educational, social, cultural and physical well being of the region. A property tax exemption is a means for Council to support organizations within the town that further Council's objective to enhance the quality of life while delivering services economically to the citizens of the town.

The properties listed for the 2014 taxation year include nine under the

heading of Places of Worship (Roman Catholic Church, Foursquare Gospel Church with four, Pentecostal Assemblies of Canada, St. Paul's United Church, Jehovah's Witnesses and Princeton Baptist Church), four classified as Hospital and Long Term Care Facilities (Silver Crest Housing Society with two, Interior Health and Princeton Long Term Care Society), seven noted as Not for Profit (Senior Citizens Branch 30 with three, Little Folks Nursery School and Princeton Community Services with three), fourteen considered Public Park or Recreation Grounds (Curling Club, PXA Grounds with two, Princeton Arena, Memorial Park, Princeton Golf Club, BC Crown/Trails Society of BC with four, the Old Fire Hall, Princeton Museum with two and the Masonic Lodge) and another six in the Other category (Town of Princeton including the Chamber of Commerce and Library).

When Will Time End?

system of calculating how long it takes our solar system to revolve on its path through the Milky Way Galaxy. Time does not end, it merely starts another cycle.

Sitchin concludes there is no way to calculate the end of time with any degree of accuracy. He speculates the predictions were not based on an actual end of time itself, but the end of a zodiacal progression. For example, we are now in the age of Pisces, moving toward the Age of Aquarius. The ancients believed very strongly in these 'ages' of the zodiac because it was important to calculate the date of the spring equinox. To make matters more complex, they assigned rulership to certain people based on what 'age' the stars indicated. Leo was the age of the Lion, so lion sculptures were popular. In the age of Taurus, bull pictures and statues were popular, and during Aries, the sign of the Ram, an Egyptian pharaoh lined an important promenade with statues of rams. The earliest Christian church, dug up several years ago, features a floor mosaic depicting two fishes, the emblem of Pisces, the zodiacal sign on the ascendant at the time of Jesus of Nazareth. The fish symbol was also the secret sign given between early Christians to identify like-minded believers.

The zodiac is based on which star constellations are on the horizon at dawn, and the sky was divided into 12 sections of 30 degrees, with

each of the 12 sections bearing the name of a constellation. This was the method used to determine the equinox. The zodiac is a method of calculating time, and the end of time, Sitchin suggests, would mean an end of a zodiacal time, not the end of all time.

This whole concept of 'end times' seems really out of step with what we know today. The ancient so-called priests were primarily astronomers who watched the sky and sundials to calculate time. This knowledge of the zodiac became a method of influencing important people's decisions, advising when the time was right to marry, travel or start a war. This was the birth of astrology and many people still believe planets influence individual lives. However, the idea of our world coming to an end is not part of either astronomy nor astrology, and not part of the science of today.

Any of today's astronomers will tell you we live in an unpredictable environment. Despite the fact that our solar system is one of astounding predictability, the rest of the universe is not predictable, it is chaotic. Often, asteroids, comets and other space debris rockets through our solar system and astronomers watch the progress of these objects to calculate whether or not they will hit our planet. A few hit every day. During some periods of time we have meteor showers, and sometimes a fairly large meteor strikes somewhere on Earth, but for the most part, we have been really lucky.

What, then, inspires all of these predictions that the world is coming to an end soon, or that we live in some kind of 'end times'?

I often wonder whether there is some kind of game plan served by making us afraid that everything we are, everything we have, is about to disappear. What purpose is served by telling us our world is coming to an end? Every one of us knows our individual world is going to end at some point, so what is the advantage of having all of us scared at the same time?

Every time I hear of one of these new predictions about the end of the world, or the 'end time', I ask myself, "Okay, who benefits from this scare? Who profits? Who gains power?"

Did you ever ask yourself those questions, or did you just look for reassurance that it was not going to happen?

There are frequent predictions that the end of the world is near, or that we live in the "end times", so I was fascinated by Zacariah Sitchin's book *The End of Days*. In this book, he explores predictions made in the Bible and in the Mayan calendar.

The Bible is full of such predictions and many people have tried to calculate from them which year or date might be the 'end'. Sitchin reviews all of the ways of calculating the end, noting that many present scholars have forgotten the Jewish calendar is not the same as the calendar currently in use.

Using the Mayan calendar, which predicted the end coming on December 21, 2012, obviously proved to be an error, although many people made a big deal out of the predictions. In fact, we are still here, and time marches on, because the Mayan calendar works on a

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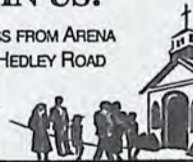

Law clamps down on breaches

Three men appeared in Provincial Court in Princeton on October 10 for sentencing on charges related to breach of probation.

Michael William Brown, age 22, failed to report to the probation officer as required. He was placed on a 12 month probation in an attempt to get him into counseling. He was ordered to work 20 hours of community service with the provision that each hour of counseling will be regarded as community service.

Shane Thomas Allison, age 19, of Hedley, entered a guilty plea to charges of breach of probation as well as assault causing bodily harm. He had attacked his father

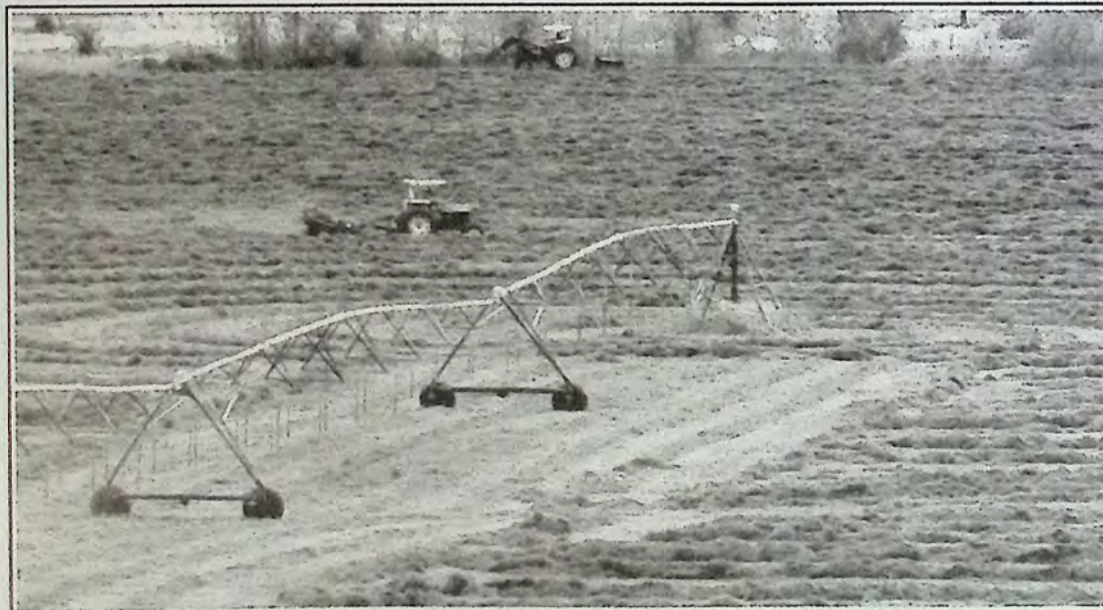
during an argument after the two had been drinking during a family celebration. He had been on probation at the time. Two other breaches of probation were related to consumption of alcohol.

Allison was ordered to serve a 60 day conditional sentence with a curfew, which is similar to house arrest. This will be followed by 12 months probation with a number of conditions including no consumption of alcohol. He is to begin counseling related to alcohol abuse. He may have no firearms except when hunting with another person on traditional First Nations land. He must give a sample for DNA records.

Stanley Gene Holmes entered

guilty pleas to two charges of breach of probation involving alcohol consumption. The 44-year old Hedley resident is seeing a counselor for rehabilitation for his problem with alcohol abuse and is involved in the restorative justice program with Upper Similkameen Indian Band.

Holmes was ordered to serve a four month conditional sentence followed by a 12 month probation during which he is to continue his counseling program. He is prohibited from possessing any weapons. As his breach charges are the result of complaints by his girlfriend, he is required to be sober at any time he contacts her and is to leave her presence at her request.



"Another round here!" This hayfield east of Hedley is round to accommodate the large boom irrigation that pivots in the centre of the field. If you look to the left of the irrigation boom you can see the curve of the hay swaths. Recent rains have prevented farmers from baling that last stand of hay. Notice below the irrigation boom the swaths are almost flat to the ground. Rain can leach important nutrients from hay and thus farmers are always at the mercy of Mother Nature. Two tractors with hay turners in tow are flipping the swaths of hay over. Exposing the swaths of hay to the wind and sun dries the hay: hay that is baled with too much moisture can go moldy, rendering the hay toxic to livestock. It can also spontaneously combust (start on fire) if there is too much moisture within the bale. In summer, cut hay can dry sufficiently in three days. In fall, evening humidity levels are high and the sun shines for less time each day. Without rain, a hay crop can easily take a week to dry in the fall (presuming it doesn't rain again). Living Past 100

Colder Weather Calls For Vitamin D

In recent years, the value of Vitamin D has made a comeback. During the 1940s and 1950s, Vitamin D was promoted during the colder months. Cod liver oil was considered essential for children if not for adults. Then Vitamin D supplementation went out of fashion because Vitamin D was being added to dairy products. This meant children who drink milk were getting the supplement. Nobody worried about adults.

Medical research has proven Vitamin D is essential for adults' health. Not only does Vitamin D encourage bone development and good health in general, it is an important nutrient in preventing cancer.

Canada is one of those northern nations where sunshine is in short supply for six months of the year. For adults working a typical day in an office, the opportunity to be out in the sunshine would be at noon hour or on weekends, if it were a sunny day. This severely limits the amount of sunlight Canadian adults are likely to have during the winter months. Because of these conditions, the Canadian government encourages everyone to take Vitamin D supplements during the dark months.

Vitamin D is effective in reducing feelings of 'the blues' of winter, and is known to increase energy levels. Vitamin D is important for feeling good as well as feeling healthy.

For older people, particularly post-menopausal women, Vitamin D supplements in winter are essential to prevent bone loss. Most calcium supplements contain Vitamin D, but the amount may not be sufficient. There is a blood test a physician can recommend to ensure Vitamin D levels are high enough to efficiently use the calcium recommended for older women to prevent osteoporosis.

When should you begin taking Vitamin D supplements? As the daylight hours grow shorter, and there are fewer opportunities for outdoor activities in sunlight, it is time to start taking a Vitamin D supplement. For the majority of people, taking a Vitamin D supplement from November 1 to April 1 is a good idea.

Vitamin D supplements come in many forms, and although cod liver oil is still a popular source, it can be taken in a capsule rather than by the spoonful. Most Vitamin D supplements are meant to be taken daily, and the amount taken should not exceed the recommended amount. Too much Vitamin D can be toxic, so treat this supplement as you would any medication: use as directed and do not allow children access to it.

Posse collect second 4-1 loss of weekend

The Princeton Posse hosted Summerland Steam October 5th in the second half of a weekend of home games in Princeton Arena.

The Posse fell 4-1 the night before to Kelowna Chiefs and scored their only goal in the second period.

In fact, Princeton has so far scored most of their goals in the middle frame with goals scored per period stats at 5-11-4 midway through the weekend.

The home team gave the visitors a gift early in the game when Dalton Dubetz was called for roughing and Justin Moltzahn 5-seconds later for high-sticking.

It didn't take Summerland long to take control with the two-man advantage and score a power play goal.

The goal was credited to Josh DaCosta with help coming from Ryan Donaldson and Kienan Scott.

The time was 5:15.

Kurtis Klinger got the marker with Eric Schmidt and Kendal Biro earning assists.

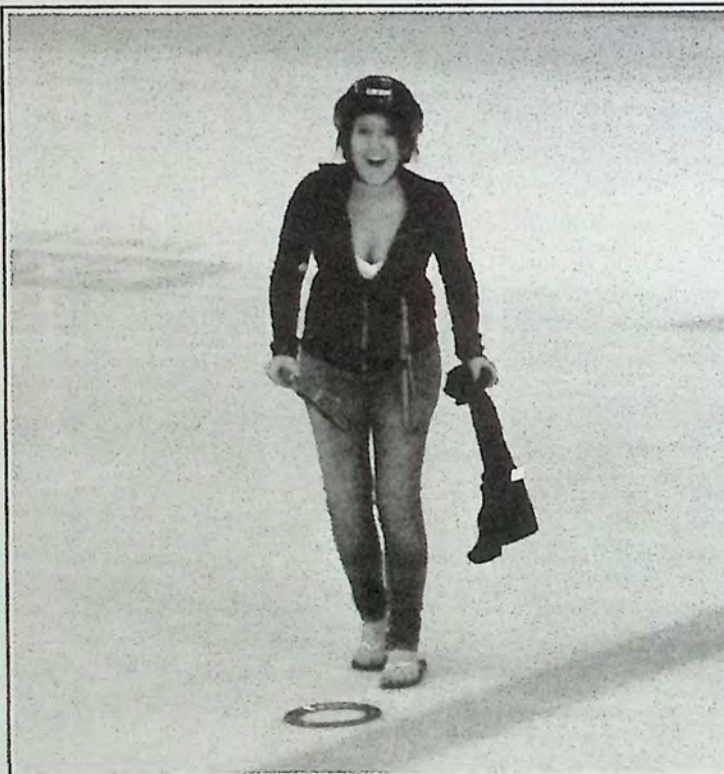
Princeton also out-shot the Steam 20-8 in that frame.

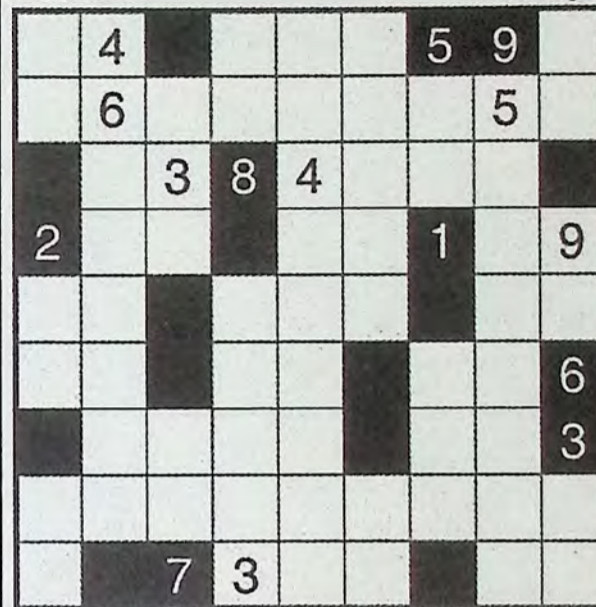

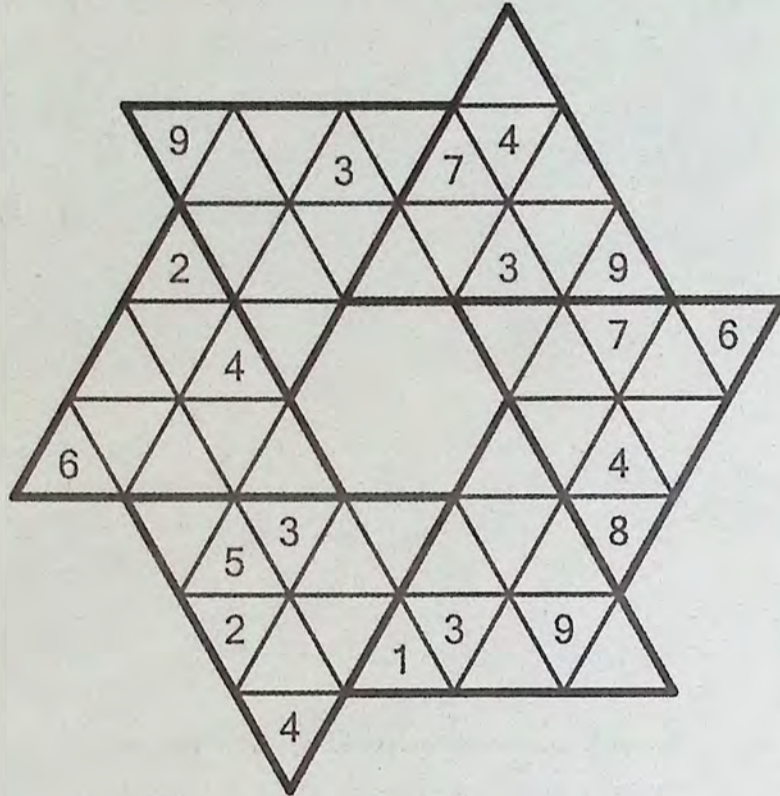

HOSHI SUDOKU - About The Puzzle

Sudoku - also known as "Number Place" - is a logic-based, combinatorial number-placement puzzle. The aim of Sudoku is to enter a number from 1 through 9 in each cell of a grid, most frequently a 9x9 grid made up of 3x3 subgrids. Each row, column and region must contain only one instance of each number. This Sudoku variant is called "Hoshi Sudoku". It contains six large triangles. The numbers 1 to 9 must be placed into the cells of each large triangle. Every line of any length - even uncontinuous - must contain every number not more than once.

The ultimate recycling project

The definition of the term 'repurposing' is the use of something for a purpose other than its original intended use. Repurposing an item can be done by modifying it to fit a new use, or by using the item in a new way.

If we look at the old courthouse building on Vermilion Avenue as the 'item' noted in the definition, then clearly the Town of Princeton has taken on probably the largest repurposing project in the region.

In 1929 the Province of British Columbia commissioned the construction of a new building to house court facilities as well as offices for the government agent, provincial police and various governmental agencies.

This was in response to Princeton being designated as a seat of the Supreme and County Courts the previous year.

The winning (low) bid of \$22,728 came from McLean and Giddings,

a construction firm from Vancouver. The Princeton Provincial Government Building was set to be completed February 1, 1930.

Oldtimers will remember the building this new structure was replacing. In fact, the original government building built in 1900, was moved to a nearby location when it was purchased by the School District and used as a school for a number of years until it was demolished.

Prior to that governmental administration for the Similkameen Valley had been handled by officials posted in Yale, in the Fraser Canyon. The gold rush at Granite Creek urged the Provincial Government to appoint a resident mining recorder in 1886 and purchased a log cabin to serve as his quarters.

The end of the gold rush at Granite saw the closure of the government office, however other mining operations in the area, most notably a coal mining operation opening in

community in 1898 saw the need for the relocation of government services to Princeton in 1900, the year the Granite Creek service closed.

The 'new' courthouse building was designed by the British Columbia Department of Public Works and was described in a 1977 Canadian Inventory of Historic Building - Historical Building Report as being "representative of small frame half timbered court house designs produced by the Provincial Department of Public Works during the 1920s and '30s."

The Town of Princeton has owned the building for the past several years and saw tenants slowly move away as provincial government services were either downsized or relocated. Provincial forestry services moved in early 2003, the Government Agent services left for a new location in Princeton Plaza a couple years ago and the Conservation Services office also closed.

The Town of Princeton will move into the renovated building next month and has saved local taxpayers easily hundreds of thousands of dollars.

A tour of the project last week showed mostly cosmetic changes in the form of moving a few walls, rewiring and new paint. There is a lot more to it than that, but a fraction of the work and cost associated with new construction versus repurposing.

Probably the most noticeable changes that will appear the the exterior of the building, aside from the new paint job and removal of the wheelchair ramp to the front door, will be a new covered front entrance which will extend out to the steps leading to the building, and the removal of some trees from the corner of the property for a cleaner look.

Wheelchair access will centre on the rear entrance with wider hallways and a lowered service window to accommodate those with

mobility issues.

The new Town Hall building, one of the oldest buildings still standing in Princeton, will set a new standard in the community. Town Council will still use the Library Conference Room for public meetings but all other office and administrative services will be in the old courthouse building on Vermilion Avenue - fitting considering the building has been used for various governmental agencies during its entire lifespan.

Turkey and Brie Puff Pastry Bites

(NC)—Using a butter puff pastry is the host or hostess's best friend. Try this delectable nibble for your next party and your guests will be coming back for more. Prep time: 20 minutes. Cook time: 22 minutes.

Ingredients

- 1/2 PC Butter Puff Pastry, thawed but still cold
- 5 oz (150 g) leftover roast turkey breast, finely diced
- 3 tbsp (45 mL) mayonnaise
- 1 pkg (200 g) PC Double Cream Brie, rind removed and cheese cut into 24 equal pieces
- 2 tbsp (25 mL) Dijon mustard
- 1 tbsp (15 mL) honey
- 24 fresh parsley leaves

Instructions

Preheat oven to 425°F (220°C).

Place puff pastry on work surface. Roll pastry out in one direction to form a rectangle; cut into 24 equal pieces. Press each piece into the cups of a 24-cup mini muffin pan, allowing some overhang. Freeze for 10 minutes.

In small bowl, stir together turkey and mayonnaise. Remove muffin pan from freezer; divide turkey mixture among the cups. Top each with a piece of Brie, pressing down slightly.

Bake in centre of oven for 20 to 22 minutes or until pastry is golden on bottom and cheese is melted and starting to brown.

Meanwhile, in small bowl, stir together Dijon and honey. Transfer pastry bites to a long platter; drizzle Dijon mixture over top and garnish with parsley leaves. Makes 24 servings.

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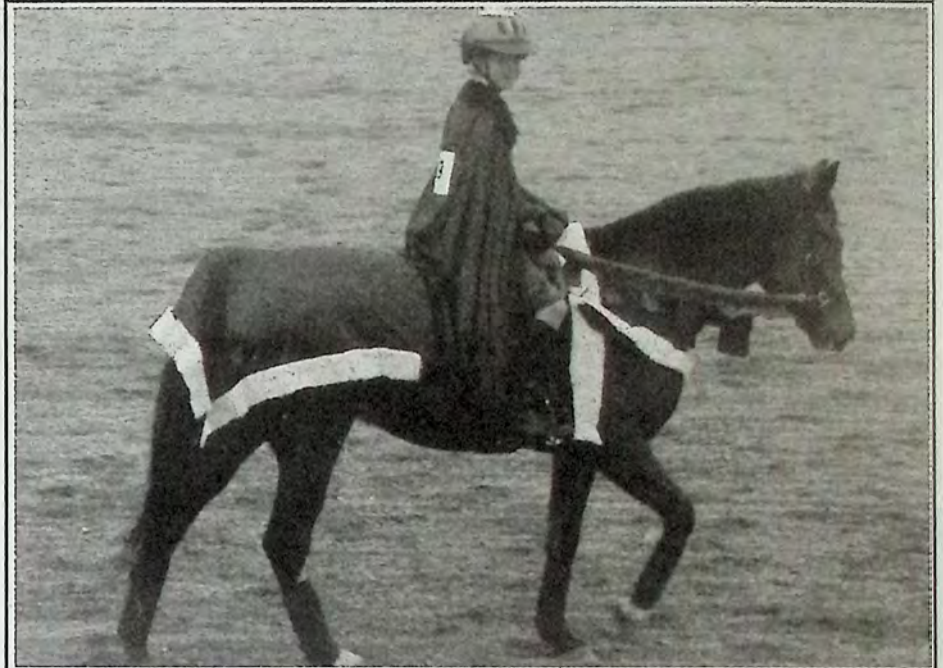

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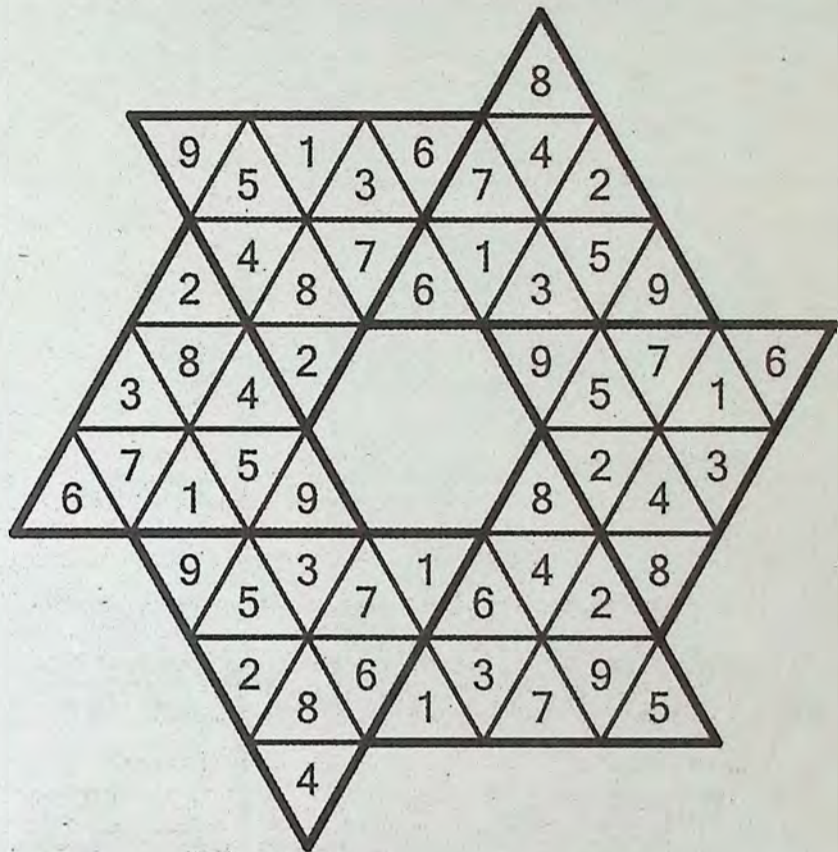

Are you good on the computer, writing, carpentry, grass cutting or planning new activities?

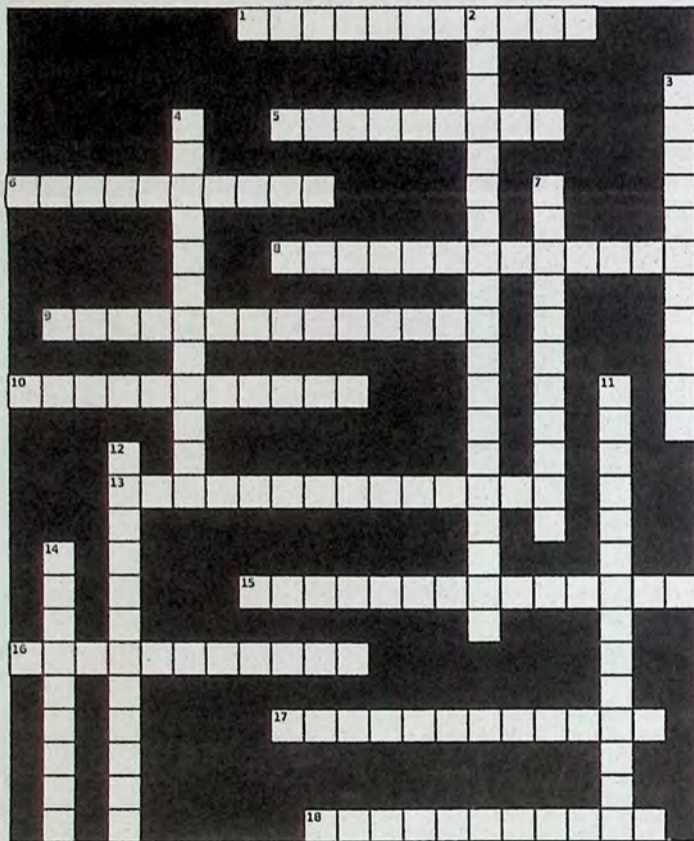
If you have a skill you would like to contribute please give us a call and we can answer any of your questions. It's not all work we have lots of fun as well and social gatherings a few times during the year.

Sego Resources Inc. (the "Company") (TSX-V: SGZ) announced October 11th that the Company had completed 1,784 metres of percussion drilling in 34 short holes on the Miner Mountain Project near Princeton, BC.

All drill cuttings were analyzed by a Niton XL2 Gold portable X-ray fluorescence analyzer for copper grade and selected mineralized cuttings were sent to Acme Labs for analysis. The focus of the program was to (1) test new zones identified by a recent airborne survey and subsequent data re-analysis of the Titan 24 Survey data (See News Release dated June 28, 2013) and (2) to extend known mineralization in the Cuba Zone.

Priority was given to targets with coincidental magnetic, IP chargeabili-

ty, and soil geochemical anomalies. The following drill highlights suggest extensions of the Cuba Zone, the presence of porphyry alteration and mineralization in the Quintana Zone, porphyry or skarn alteration and mineralization in the Upper Regal Zone, and indications of a new zone northwest of the Cuba Zone.

Highlights from the recent drilling of the foregoing mineralized zones are summarized below:

Upper Regal Zone (from September 8, 2013 News Release).

The most significant results from this zone were encountered in PDH-13-109 which was drilled on the flank of a large magnetic anomaly. Results are as follows:

- 30m of 0.31% Copper and 0.15 g/t Gold from 32m to 62m (end of hole)

including 10m of 0.55% Copper and 0.36 g/t Gold from 46m to 56m and 2 m of 1.026% Copper and 0.4 g/t Gold from 48m to 50m.

The mineralization consists of bornite and chalcopyrite in potassium feldspar veins within a large magnetite-rich zone, bounded by a halo of epidote-magnetite alteration containing lower copper grades. This alteration halo extends at least 50 metres north and south from PDH 109 and a least 120 metres to the southeast. The main magnetic anomaly extends 170 metres northwest and will be further tested by subsequent exploration.

Cuba Zone

Drill cuttings sent for analyses include those from holes PDH-13-114, PDH-13-115, and PDH-13-129. continued on Page 23

PDH-13-114 was drilled near the western margin of the Cuba Zone IP anomaly 175 metres from the main area of previous exploration and encountered elevated copper and gold values within a zone of strong albite-chlorite-pyrite alteration which persisted to the end of the hole. Results are as follows: - 6m of 0.13% Cu and 0.074 g/t Au from 38-44m and 6m of 0.074% Cu and 0.12 g/t Au from 72-78m.

PDH-13-115 drilled upslope and east of PDH 114 but within the same IP anomaly encountered similar alteration and mineralization. Results are as follows: - 40-42m of 0.169% Cu with 0.261 g/t Au.

PDH-13-129 was drilled 100m to the south of the main IP anomaly to test for mineralization under basaltic cap rock. The hole passed through the cap rock at 40m, and into a chlorite-epidote-magnetite altered rock, and bottomed in pervasive albite-potassium feldspar alteration. Mineralization included chalcopyrite and magnetite. Results are as follows: - 36m of 0.1% Cu with 0.25 g/t Au from 42m-76m, including 6m of 0.21% Cu and 0.40 g/t Au between 50 and 56 m.

A New Zone? PDH-13-136 may be indicative of a new zone of mineralization and further exploration is planned to develop this target.

PDH-13-136 drilled 300m to the northwest of the main IP anomaly, was mineralized from top to bot-

tom. However, in contrast to the previous holes this hole encountered primarily oxide mineralization hosted by oxide coated chlorite-epidote altered rock. The style of alteration and mineralization encountered plus the geophysical signature in the area of this hole could be indicative of a new zone of mineralization developing northwest of the Cuba Zone. Results are as follows: - 56m of 0.23% Cu and 0.095 g/t Au from 0-56m (complete drill hole) including 42m of 0.26% and 0.11 g/t Au from 14-56m including from 16-24m 0.29% Cu and 0.19 g/t Au.

Quintana Zone
The Quintana Zone, 500m north-east of the Cuba Zone, is a large zone within which previous trenching encountered leached cap material featuring abundant malachite, a secondary copper mineral. Previous geophysical work outlined a large IP anomaly within a magnetic low and bound by distinct lineaments to the east and west. The zone was tested by 11 percussion holes which encountered intense albite-quartz-chlorite-clay-pyrite alteration plus amythest, chlorite-epidote-albite altered rock and, at the end of one hole (PDH 118), pervasive potassic alteration. Drill cuttings from holes PDH 121 and PDH 124 were submitted for analyses.

PDH 121 was drilled in the eastern part of the geophysical anomaly and intercepted a large zone of albite-chlorite-clay-quartz-pyrite alteration, within chlorite-epidote-albite altered rock, and contains elevated copper and gold values. Results are as follows: - 76-78m 0.233% Cu and 0.206 g/t Au.

PDH 124, drilled 32m east of PDH 121, intersected a similar alteration suite. Results are as follows: - 6m of 0.11% Cu with 0.04 g/t Au from 44-50m.
