## New Year starts with cougar attacks

### Hayes Creek Fire Rescue

Christmas and New Year's has been a very busy time at Osprey and Link Lakes, 40-kilometers east of Princeton with hundreds of folks enjoying the holidays at their homes and cabins with skidoos and ATV's and walking and skiing the Trans-Canada Trail and around the local roads and lakes.

At 2:30 PM on Wednesday, January 1st on Link Lake Kim Rampfl surprised a stalking cougar and had a stand off with her three

dogs.

Kim remembered to "make herself big and yell" by putting her arms over her head and doing just that. The cat ran off with no injuries to her pets.

At 5:30 PM a couple riding a snow machine double on Link Lake Road with their 9-year old son riding another machine were attacked by probably the same cat. The father kicked the cat and it then went after the boy. The father yelled at the boy to "scoot" which he did with the cat in hot pursuit and you can imagine how the parents felt seeing their child rapidly disappear into the dark night with peril close behind.

That was when Hayes Creek Fire was called by a hysterical mother with a tale of a lost child in grave danger being chased by a cougar.

After a search the child was found and no one had suffered any injuries.

RCMP and the BC Conservation Service were then notified but neither responded.

At this time Hayes Creek Fire members began patrols in one of their fire trucks and began notifying neighbors to keep dogs and children indoors.

At 6:00 PM two adult males on snow machines were confronted by cat at Tee Pee Lake Store. Both men kicked the cat in head to try and scare it off. No injuries.

The third attack was at 6:30 PM one kilometre east when Rick Law heard a commotion on his porch and on running out found his dog

## B.C. mining remains strong in 2013, adds new jobs

B.C.'s mining industry continues to grow and expand as new projects, construction starts and expansions drove job creation and investment throughout the mining industry in 2013.

The most important highlight of 2013 was the celebration of a new mine going into production in August. Mt. Milligan mine north of Prince George, a \$1.5-billion project with 350 permanent jobs, shipped its first copper ore in late summer and celebrated its commissioning in October.

Additionally, a number of operating mines made improvements to their operations. Both Gibraltar mine in the Cariboo and Line Creek

in the Kootenays received Mines Act permit amendments that resulted in almost \$400 million in investment and ensured jobs for 650 workers.

Mine construction dominated industry progress in 2013 with a number of large projects well on their way to becoming producing mines. Red Chris mine in the Northeast is well on its way. The \$500-million project is expected to start producing ore in 2014. Roman mine, near Tumbler Ridge, also started construction and the company is working toward production in 2014.

Both industry and the Province continue to work closely with First

Nations on resource development, setting out clear expectations for the consultation process and working toward more revenue-sharing agreements. Mining employs more First Nations than any other industry in B.C.

The Province has signed 10 economic and community development agreements with First Nations to date. In 2013, the first cheques were delivered to First Nations for agreements with New Afton, Copper Mountain and Highland Valley mines.

Mining continues to be one of B.C.'s safest heavy industries and has a lower injury rate than most of the other resource and industrial

sectors.

Since the BC Jobs Plan was released, two new mines are in operation, and five more are under construction or permitted. The Province also has approved seven major expansions of existing mines.

"The B.C. mining industry continues to be a major economic driver in this province. Many new jobs at operating mines were created this past year - these are high-quality jobs that support our families and help build strong communities for many years to come," stated Bill Bennett, Minister of Energy and Mines and Minister Responsible for Core Review.

"I look forward to the coming 2014. It is more important than ever to make sure that British Columbia's mining industry remains well positioned, keeping our economy growing and strong is our government's number one priority."

### Key Facts:

- In 2012, mining was valued at over \$8.3 billion to B.C.'s economy and exploration was recorded at \$680 million, a 47 per cent increase over the previous year and the

### GMOs - No Scientific Consensus - Part 2

In Part I of this column I talked about the motion passed by the Union of BC Municipalities to make BC a GE free area and pre-

sented an overview of GE crops grown in Canada. I noted the potential economic consequences to farmers and the environmental dangers of introducing uncontrollable GE alfalfa and the GE Arctic Apple.

If a GE crop looks tastes and smells the same as its non-GE counterpart, then it is deemed to be 'substantial equivalent' and completely safe. This was a regulatory gift by our government to the biotech industry to help them avoid any need for testing. This approval procedure has been criticized and rejected by many important bodies of scientists including the Royal Society of Canada (RSC).

In their 2001 report 'Elements of Precaution: Recommendations for the Regulation of Food Biotechnology in Canada', the RSC stated that it is scientifically unjustifiable to presume that GM foods are safe without rigorous testing because when new genes are introduced there can be unanticipated changes in the expression of other genes, the pattern of proteins produced and/or metabolic activities.

The RSC report listed 58 regulatory recommendations, one of which included mandatory labeling, but most have been ignored by our government.

This year's World Food Prize, which is meant to recognize individuals who have increased the quality, quantity, or availability of food in the world, was awarded to three biotech scientists. One recipient works for Monsanto (the com-

pany donated \$5 Million to WFP); another who worked for Syngenta (also a company sponsor of the prize) while the third is the president of the lobby group European Federation of Biotechnology.

"We need to make people understand the technology has been tested and the safety has never been compromised," stated the WFP recipient Robb Fraley, Monsanto's executive vice president and chief biotechnology officer.

A flood of articles appeared in newspapers and commentators gushed that the scientific debate about GM food is over and all agree that they are safe.

The conflict of interest in this choice of award recipients and the commentary which followed, prompted 93 world renowned scientists, and other professionals relative to the legal, social and safety aspects of GE crops to counter with 'Statement: No Scientific Consensus on GMO Safety', (easily found on the web).

They note that a literature review on the safety assessment of GE plants found an equal number of studies between those which found harm and those that didn't. And, you guessed it: those that concluded GM foods were as safe and nutritious as any obtained by conventional breeding were performed by the biotech companies responsible for their commercialization.

The Statement also notes the complete absence of epidemiological studies in human populations to determine if health effects might be ..... continued on Page 21

The purpose of the proposed multi-agency Pest Management Plan (PMP) is to manage invasive alien plants and/or noxious weeds on provincial Crown land in the southern interior of B.C.

The PMP applies to areas located within the Thompson Nicola, Cariboo, Central Coast, Squamish Lillooet, Columbia Shuswap, North Okanagan, Central Okanagan, Okanagan Similkameen, Kootenay Boundary, Central Kootenay and East Kootenay Regional Districts.

The PMP applies to areas in the vicinity of the communities of Bella Coola, Alexis Creek, Quesnel, Williams Lake, 100 Mile House, Lillooet, Clinton, Cache Creek, Blue River, Clearwater, Kamloops, Salmon Arm, Revelstoke, Golden, Merritt, Vernon, Kelowna, Penticton, Oliver, Osoyoos, Princeton, Grand Forks, Castlegar, Kaslo, Nakusp, Nelson, Trail, Salmo, Creston, Cranbrook, Invermere, Fernie and Sparwood.

The pest management methods proposed for use include mechanical, cultural and biological control and the use of herbicides within the area to which the PMP applies. The common name and examples of the trade names of the herbicides proposed for use under this plan include aminopyralid (Milestone), clopyralid (Lontrel), dicamba (Vanquish), diflufenopyr (Overdrive), glyphosate (Vantage Plus Max), imazapyr (Arsenal), mecoprop-p (Dyvel DX), metsulfuron methyl (Escort), picloram (Tordon 22K), 2,4-D Amine (2,4-D Amine 600) and triclopyr (Garlon XRT). Selective application methods include wick/wipe-on, injection, squirt bottle, cut surface, and foliar applications using backpack or vehicle mounted sprayer.

The proposed duration of the PMP is from May 1, 2014 to April 30, 2019.

..... continued from Front Page being held by the throat by the cat. Rick went to the aid of "Lucy" and got the cat off her, but not before he and the dog were injured. Rick is also a Hayes Creek firefighter and medical first responder.

Hayes Creek members instantly responded to give medical aid and to search for the cat with firefighter Peter Grizer with radio, light, reflective clothing and a rifle tracking the big cat into the bush with no success.

Neither Rick or Lucy were seriously hurt and it was at this point that RCMP and the BC Conservation Service said they would attend with RCMP on scene at 8:00 PM and the CO at 8:45 PM.

This highlights where small communities are often not as well "serviced" and left to fall back on their own resources, and also the folly of closing the Princeton Conservation Office and leaving thousands of residents and thousands of square kilo-

metres of wildlife resources depending on Conservation Officers stationed two hours away.

This cougar appeared to be a 2-year old cat about 60-pounds. This is common where cats are abandoned by their mothers at this time as the mother is looking for a mate and the young ones must "sink or swim" hunting on their own and are often starving and sometimes with other siblings.

The Conservation Officers searched for the cat with no success and planned to be back the next day with hounds and trackers. They tried predator calls with no luck and were unsuccessful on tracking the cat and a houndsman is on call and ready if any new sightings occur.

And that is where it sits now. Local residents are very nervous delaying or not doing usual outdoor activities or if they are they carry sticks, bear spray or a firearm or are in groups for added security.

## Flip Of The Coyne

I was so excited when I saw that council had finally become concerned with the state of Princeton's downtown. I thought to myself that finally, our leaders down at Town Hall are going to take action to do something to revitalize the downtown core and encourage business growth and development. Maybe they would be announcing tax incentives to owners to spruce up their buildings or maybe they got a grant to fix sidewalks to make it easier for those with mobility issues to get to and from their vehicles to local shops. My mind ran wild with all the things that might be happening.

Then I read the article, and although council was acknowledging that there is a problem, it didn't seem that everyone on council grasps the magnitude of the problem. Let me quote from last week's News Leader, "Business owners in Princeton had not seen the advantage of buying into the Similkameen tourism initiative in which each business can set up a website...They are out of step with modern marketing techniques."

I would like to say that this quote came from someone from the gallery, but instead it came from one of the sitting councillors. Now I understand this councillor may have some frustration since he appears to be the town's representative on the Similkameen Valley Planning Society and the Tourism Advisory Committee, but by trying to simplify the problem down to the lack of buy-in from Princeton on the valley-wide approach to tourism is not really the issue here. The councillor claims that by participating in this tourism website, businesses will get a website. This isn't really true either. They get a business listing page, far different from a website.

There is another problem with the idea that, if local businesses all had websites, the problem would be fixed. This idea does not factor in local market trends. For the record, Princeton has a very active business community on social media. If the councillor who made the remarks above understood current market trends, then he would know that our local businesses (home

based and brick and mortar) do very well in this area. I don't think it would matter what advertising workshops the Chamber of Commerce was to hold. It isn't going to be the silver bullet that is going to save the downtown, nor are hospitality courses.

Since certain members of council want to lay the blame of the failing local economy at the feet of the people who are working day in and day out to keep it afloat, let's take a look at the great leadership coming from Town Hall. Whatever happened to that new signage program that the town had the leisure and cultural services department working on? It had been three years or more since that started. Where is the signage to show people on the highway that there is a downtown? Why has council not seen it as a priority to slow traffic down and get them off the strip along Highway 3 and bring them into town? How much did they spend on a fancy new downtown, library, museum, and now Town Hall when there has been nothing done to bring people off the highway into downtown?

Then there is the issue of a downtown that looks abandoned once everyone has closed up shop. When the lights on the light posts are out, why would anyone want to explore our little town after hours? Lets not even start on basic infrastructure like sidewalks that are like roller coasters, potholes that take out front ends, and so on.

Sure you guys spent a dump truck

full of money on some Similkameen Valley tourism guide where Princeton is tucked away in the back and a website that doesn't lay out correctly in more than half the browsers I have viewed it in, not to mention how little it actually says about Princeton. It doesn't even come up on the first two pages when one googles the word

### White Line Fever

A conversation a few nights ago turned into an interesting rant of sorts about highways.

The main concern was about the condition of the markings on the pavement with Highway 3 the specific target.

The 'more seasoned' drivers remembered highway centre lines being marked in white paint and a quick search online confirms that the switch from white in the centre to yellow took place in the early 1970's in many places in Canada with white being used on the outside to basically indicate where pavement ended and ditch was about to begin.

Interestingly enough, the white 'outside' lines are commonly known as 'fog lines' and a night of driving in thick fog banks just east of Princeton had a lot to do with the start of the conversation on highway markings.

In the conversation it was becoming clear that even in the fog not only are the yellow centerlines invisible, the fog lines were well, lost in the fog.

Two words come to mind: reflective paint.

Even if the pavement is partly covered in snow or slush the reflective lines can still be seen enough to help even the most frightened driver correct their position in the lane while driving well below the posted speed limit to match the conditions, as all of us automatically do, right?

I know there has been a move in the past couple of years to add a 'rumble strip' to enhance the centerlines in and around the area and my guess is that's why the lines we all encountered last week were so hard to see as they probably didn't get painted because they are on that 'get around to it' rumble strip list.

I sort of like and dislike the rumble strips.

I like that they warn me I've crossed the centerline if I've taken a corner a bit too tight. I dislike that once filled with snow and ice they become just about as useless as the invisible fog lines in a heavy fog.

Either way, I would much rather not be on the road in fog, but we don't always get a choice in that matter.

That being said, I need to also remember that putting my trust in the driver ahead of me and following their tail lights isn't such a bad idea at times - providing they can see the lanes and don't suddenly fall off the road with me still using them to navigate my way through the fog.

On behalf of the Support Our Health Care Society, I would like to wish all our members a Happy and Healthy New Year. 2013 has been a very positive and productive year for healthcare in our community. Most notably, we were blessed with the addition of three new doctors to the team of health care practitioners at the Cascade Clinic. The past year also saw the formation of the Princeton Health Care Steering Committee, charged with the responsibility of implementing the Health Care Action Plan.

As we look to the year ahead, we see many exciting projects and several important challenges.

SOHC will be continuing its work with Dr. Barbara Pesut and her team of researchers from UBC Okanagan, as we develop a framework to study chronic illness and end of life care in Princeton. As part of this important work, we will be conducting a Community Asset Mapping project that will provide our team with a complete list of the valuable assets available to the residents of Princeton and Area H.

SOHC will continue its work on the Steering Committee as it develops an improved and sustainable health care model for our community. The Committee has achieved many of the goals identified in the Action Plan, including the recruitment and retention of four family

physicians and one nurse practitioner, the establishment of a telehealth station at Princeton General Hospital, the installation of AED's at Riverside Community Centre and the Princeton Curling Club, and the development of a community plan to address health care transportation issues. Work is now in progress to upgrade and improve the facilities at Cascade Clinic, to meet the needs of the five practitioners and the resulting increase in patient volume. The Steering Committee is committed to achieving its goals by the end of its mandate in September of this year.

At the November meeting of the SOHC executive, it was felt that we had outgrown our old mission statement and needed a new one. Although it's a "work in progress", the following is what we came up with so far:

*"Working together to develop a healthy community where all residents attain a safe and sustainable quality of life."*

We also established the following goals for the coming year:

## Baboons Led The Way To Truth

Thanks to extensive research of the cause and effects of stress, we may have to change how we live if we want to live longer, healthier lives.

A researcher studying baboons in Africa discovered there is a high stress level in baboon society. In case you are not sure what a baboon is, it is a primate, sharing many genetic characteristics with all other primates, including us. Baboon society is very stressful due to a ranking order, or pecking order, affecting every member of the baboon society. The big alpha males are at the top of the society, casually abusing females, lesser males and youngsters. These super-macho males terrorize others, and attack any baboons that do not seem subservient enough. The stress levels are high among the lower ranks, and evidence has shown these downtrodden baboons have health problems related to stress.

Carrying this concept that rank affects well-being, British health researchers studied a large group of

civil servants. These civil servants are ranked based on their particular jobs. In England, civil servants have the same access to health care regardless of rank, so the study was considered only on the basis of rank. The study showed those whose rank was lower experienced higher levels of stress and were ill more often than those at the top. For example, a Level 1 was healthier and had less stress than a Level 2, who was healthier and less stressed than Level 3, and so on.

Another researcher discovered those under stress tend to be more obese, and put on fat around the mid-section of the body, where fat is most dangerous to health. In fact, among the less favored rank of baboons, they too get fat around the mid-section.

Following up on this research into the effects of stress, brain researchers discovered those who are experiencing stress do not produce healthy brain cells in the area of the brain which creates memory. The brain cells in an unstressed person tend to have many branches which store memory. The stressed person produces brain cells with few branches, limiting their memory capacity and their learning capacity. This may change our thinking about dementia in seniors, which is an expanding health concern. Are increasing numbers of seniors under enough stress to cause memory problems? Our thinking may change about children being raised in a stressful environment. Could they perform better in school if they were less stressed?

An expert on the study of telomeres (ends of our chromosomes which determine how long we will live) discovered that stress causes our telomeres to start deteriorating, that is, aging at the cellular level. However, the telomeres can be repaired when a substance called telomerase is released by the body. Telomerase is released when we are happy, when we care for others, and when others care for us. Could we live longer, healthier lives if we were a more caring society?

A strange thing happened to the baboon study group. Most of the alpha males died. Suddenly, the pressure eased for all members of the baboon group. Individuals began treating each other better. They no longer tolerated alpha male behaviour. They were kinder to each other, and when young males from other baboon groups entered the first group, they were soon trained to adopt much more caring behaviours. The new baboon society was healthier and stress hormones had dropped substantially. It is too soon for solid evidence that they will live longer.

One researcher said it is not important what rank the rest of society gives us, but rather the way we rank ourselves, and whether we rank ourselves. How many people compare themselves to others in some way and feel they are 'less than' or 'better than' those with whom they compare themselves? If a person does a comparison and ranks himself or herself as 'less than' others, that person has created his or her own stress. It is the competition for social status that creates stress. Some people are obsessed with a need to be 'top dog' either in terms of money, prestige from what they know or what they can do, or in terms of how physically attractive or how popular they are.

The key to reducing stress is to see each person as valuable, without making comparisons. That seems to be hard to do in our society, particularly when some people make a point of putting down others. If we want to live in a society in which people are healthier and happier, each of us has to give up the notion that we should be ranked.

Changing our society is always difficult, but think of the money we could save, think of the suffering we could prevent, if we down-stressed the way we live.

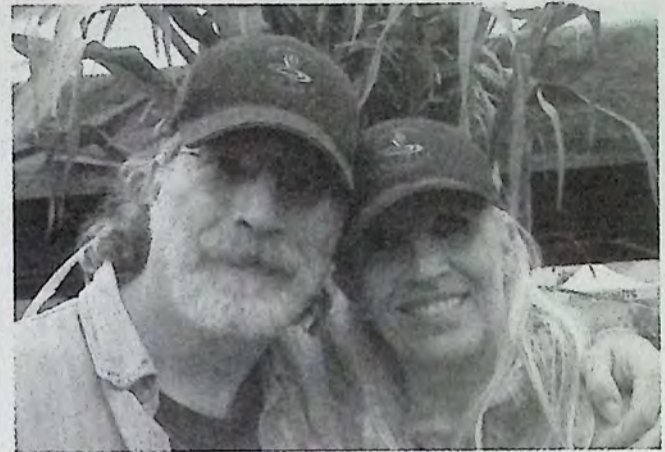
## December weather: Not too cold

The coldest temperatures recorded in December occurred in 1968, when temperatures on December 29 and 30 fell to -42.2C and -42.8C. That is COLD!

The warmest first week of December occurred in 1939, with temperatures up to 7.8C. December 14, 1974 set a record

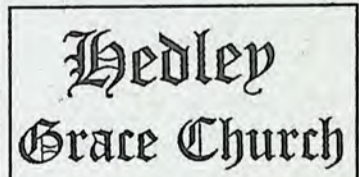

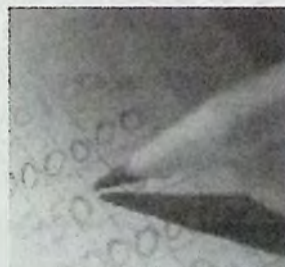

## The Similkameen People

Special Feature by Dawn Johnson

Unless you have lived in the Similkameen Valley for some time, you are probably unaware you drive through Similkameen Indian Reserves as you go to Keremeos and Penticton. Many people living in Princeton are unaware there is Indian Reserve land right in Princeton, nor are they aware of driving through Indian Reserve at two locations along Old Hedley Road.

The Similkameen Indian Bands are part of our physical environment and most certainly part of our economic and political environment.

The Similkameen First Nations people are members of Upper Similkameen Indian Band and Lower Similkameen Indian Band. The Upper Similkameen territory extends from Manning Park and Tulameen to about halfway

between Hedley and Keremeos. From that point to the international border is Lower Similkameen territory. The Upper Similkameen administration offices are on the top floor of Snazist Centre in Hedley, and the Lower Similkameen administration building is on the main street in Keremeos.

Both Upper and Lower Similkameen Indian Bands are part

of the vast Okanagan Nation. Their common language is Interior Salish, and both their language and culture extend south into Washington State and north to Enderby. The network of individual Indian Bands work together on big issues affecting all of them, but each Indian Band is responsible for caring for the needs and aspirations of their own Band. Differences between Bands is largely a matter of location and economics. For example, the Similkameens have been primarily engaged in ranching and logging, while the Osoyoos Band is involved in vineyards and tourism and the West Bank Band is involved in real estate development.

Members of each Indian Bands elect their chief and councillors, and the chiefs become delegates to the Okanagan Nation meetings where one chief is chair of the organization. At these meetings, there is discussion related to cultural, environmental, economic and political matters. The Okanagan Nation is represented in the Council of BC Indian Chiefs and on national councils.

### HISTORY

The Okanagan Nation was among

the last of the First Nations people of Canada to become involved in contact with non-native people. Elders of the Similkameens relate verbal history they learned from their parents and grandparents about what happened before non-native people arrived. They are relating a history that tells of when the non-natives first arrived a little more than 200 years ago.

First contact with non-natives was with the fur traders. While Similkameens and other bands were willing to trade for goods, particularly for rifles, fur traders complained these Indians were not diligent about trapping and hunting for furs. The reason for this lack of enterprise was the fact that they had horses to trade. The Similkameens and many other Okanagan bands had horse ranches long before non-natives arrived, and the fur traders and explorers needed horses as well as furs. The horses brought a better deal, and the Okanagans and Similkameens were good at trade. Why spend a lot of time trapping for furs when you could trade one horse in a good deal?

One thing distinguished the experi-

..... continued from Front Page highest ever. With exploration spending remaining strong in 2013, mining remains one of the province's more important economic drivers.

- Every British Columbian uses almost 23,000 kilograms (about 50,000 pounds) of mined products each year. When you brush your teeth, turn on a light, drive a car,

ride your bike, put on the television, use a camera or telephone - you are supporting the mining industry.

- In 2012, more than 30,000 people were employed in mining, mineral exploration and related sectors. This is significant growth since 2001 when only 14,700 people were employed in mining.

- Mining contributes hundreds of

millions of dollars in revenue that help pay for government services like health care and education.

- Today B.C. has 19 operating mines (nine coal and 10 metal). In 2001, there were 15 operating mines (seven coal and eight metal).

- Mining takes up a very small portion of B.C.'s land - less than one per cent - but it makes a tremendous impact on the B.C. economy.

While I'm talking about my Dad there is another story. We had approx. 35 horses and we were deworming them one day.

We would tie a rope to their halter and over the rafters in the barn to raise the horse's head. We used a steel syringe and a large direx pill in the end of it, about the size of a man's thumb, and then inserted it deep in the horse's throat and eject it and held their head up until they swallowed it.

Generally it was relatively fast and no fuss.

going to do that he would take the horse and be responsible for it.

He had a big heart for animals. We put the horse in a bigger stall and put a sling under him so he could get up and down. Dad had the vet come every day to check on him and to feed him intravenously. It

took months of hard work keeping him clean in the stall and lifting him up and down but the horse finally fully recovered and was ridden for many more years.

I never asked Dad how much it cost.

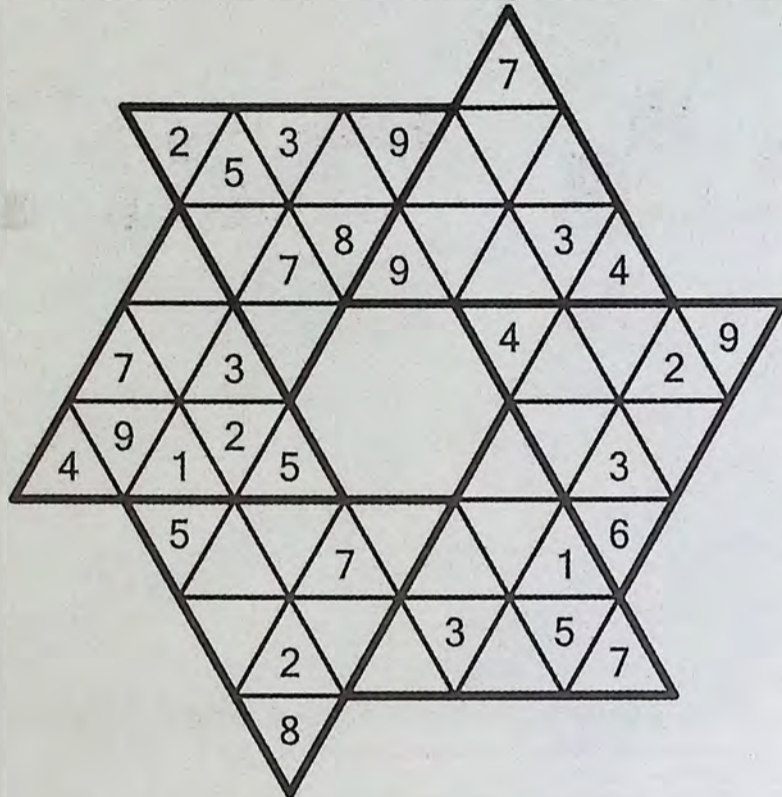

## HOSHI SUDOKU - About The Puzzle

Sudoku - also known as "Number Place" - is a logic-based, combinatorial number-placement puzzle. The aim of Sudoku is to enter a number from 1 through 9 in each cell of a grid, most frequently a 9x9 grid made up of 3x3 subgrids. Each row, column and region must contain only one instance of each number. This Sudoku variant is called "Hoshi Sudoku". It contains six large triangles. The numbers 1 to 9 must be placed into the cells of each large triangle. Every line of any length - even uncontinuous - must contain every number not more than once.

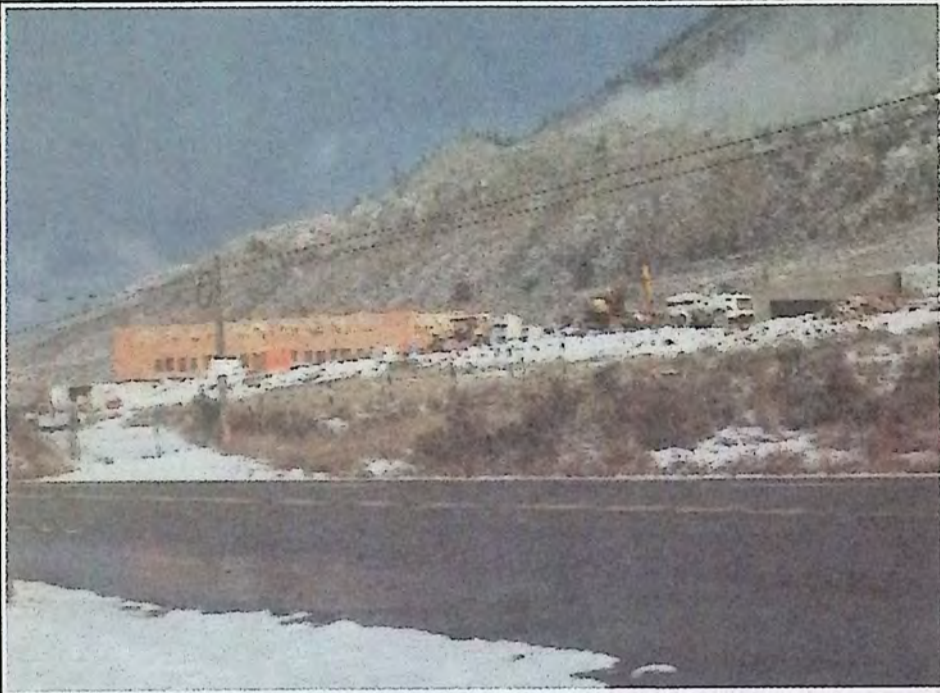

#### Posse clean up past business

By now the Posse story this season is relatively well known. Previous long term coach leaves, new board, new coach, new season. before you know it, Happy New Year!

Going into the Christmas break, on ice the Posse is coming back after having their season best road trip, a positive 5-2 record in December and a solid 4-1 in the last 5 games. The light in the tunnel ahead actually looks like taillights rather than a train coming head on even though the team lost their first two games in 2014 on the road (January 3 6-2 to Summerland and January 4 7-1 to Osoyoos).

Off ice the quest to find the Posse's role in the community continues. Some games the atmosphere is definitely on the right track - the noon game with the elementary schools was enough to make the board reconsider thoughts of discontinuing the annual treat. However, the feeling needs to be generated for every game in order to justify the luxury of junior hockey in such a small community.

Impossible? Absolutely no way. But to be clear one must work hard to afford luxuries, and small town hockey is no different.

To that end the Posse put to rest two issues that remained high on

the priority list of the new board.

Dale Hladun coached here for seven seasons, well over half of the Posse's eleven seasons in Princeton. Much of our community has a 'Duner' story, good or bad. I for one have many more of the good. It has certainly not been a secret that Mr. Hladun left Princeton with disputes over his contract.

Prior to Christmas the organization and Duner officially put to rest all differences and the Posse wishes him well with both his current (Fernie Ghostriders) and future coaching challenges.

The current board endorsed early a position that operation of a junior

hockey club would no longer include operating a bus charter business as a primary source of revenue. Five months later, after much attention to detail by at least one board member, and again right before Christmas, the Posse sold it's second, and older of the two buses.

Patience to wait for a fair offer returned a value near the highest end of pre-sale estimated value.

One by one the organization is knocking down some of the major off ice hurdles identified by community volunteers operating as the Posse board.

Another one that as of yet is an

untold success story, is that of the commitment to success displayed by the 2014 coaching staff. Look for more on this topic later.

The Posse organization wishes a Happy New Year to the town and area around Princeton, to all fans, volunteers, sponsors, billet families, players, and anyone else we have missed.

And here's to supporting our devoted coaching staff and players as they start the relentless hunt of that last playoff spot.

## Slow Cooker Frozen Stuffed Turkey Breast Roast

Perfect for a small turkey dinner with little effort, but great taste!

Prep time: 10 minutes | Cooking time: 5.5 hours | Serves: 6-8.

- 1 Granny's Seasoned Stuffed Turkey Breast\*
- 2 1/2 cups (600 mL) baby potatoes, halved or quartered
- 1 cup (250 mL) peeled baby carrots
- 1/2 cup (125 mL) low sodium turkey or chicken stock
- 1/2 tsp (2 mL) sea salt
- 1/4 tsp (1 mL) freshly ground black pepper
- 2 tbsp (30 mL) mild paprika
- 1 tsp (5 mL) ground coriander seed
- 1/2 tsp (2 mL) dried ground rosemary

Microwave potatoes on high for 4.5 minutes; place in bottom of a 6-7 quart slow cooker. Microwave carrots on high for 2.5 minutes; add to cooker. Mix in stock, salt and pepper. Remove the roast from plastic bag; do not remove netting. Place the roast on its side on top of the vegetables in the slow cooker. Mix paprika with coriander and rosemary and sprinkle over roast.

Cook on high setting for 5.5 hours.

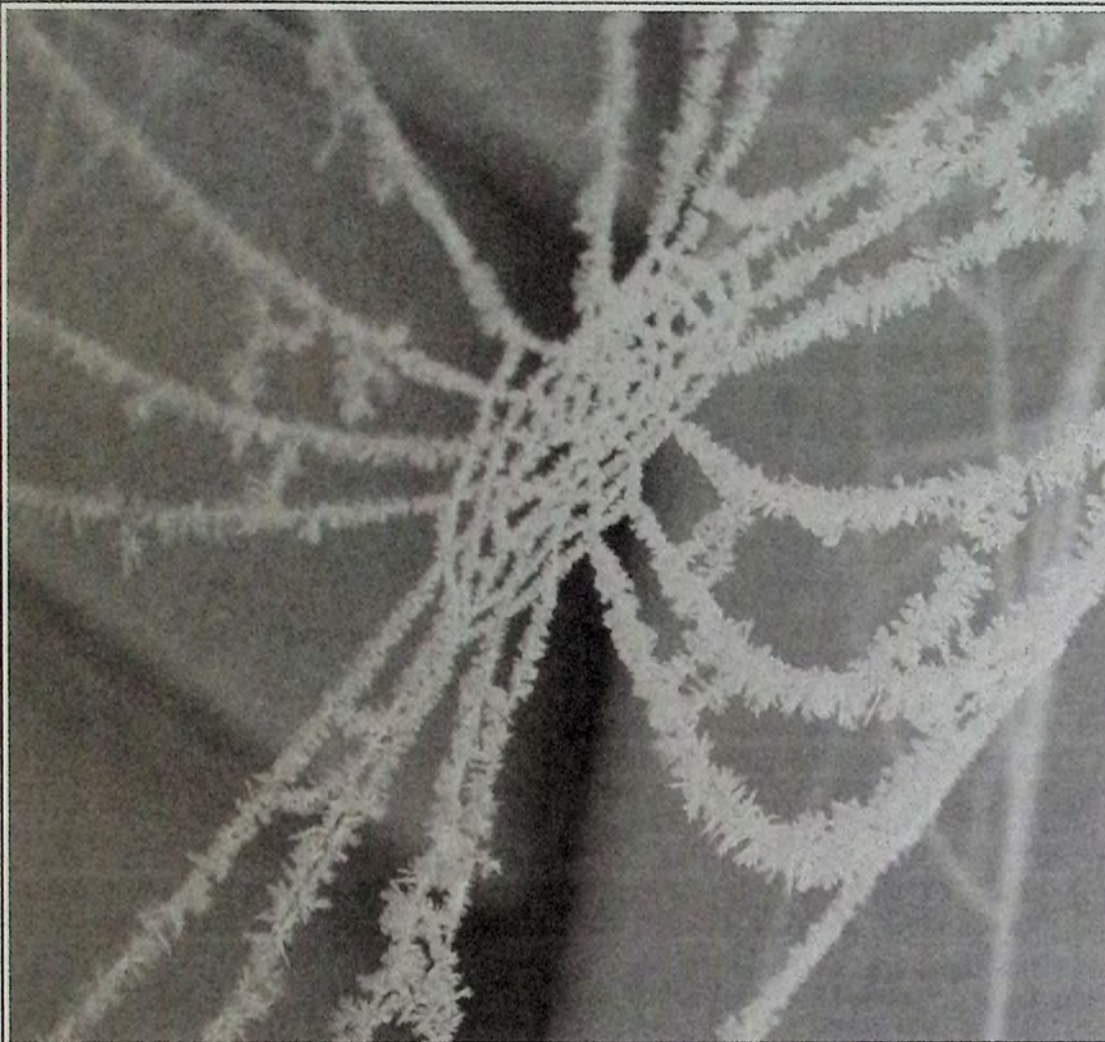

-ence of the Okanagan Nation people from other native people: on contact with non-natives, the Okanagan Nation did not fight them, they learned from them. Within a few short years after the founding of Fort Okanagan in Washington State, the Okanagan Nation had learned how the newcomers did things and were doing them, too. The Okanagans were not surprised by the coming of the non-native people. The Okanagans had been trading with the coastal and Fraser Valley native people as well as native people to the east and south. The Okanagans had had contact with the Spanish explorers who had tried to make slaves of them, and paid the ultimate price for doing so. The Okanagans had learned a great deal about the fur traders from other native people to the east and south who had traded with the newcomers. There was a great advantage to learning how to deal with the new element moving in.

Explorer and trader David Thompson described the people of the Okanagan Nation as scrupulously honest. Despite the fact that the possessions of Thompson's crew were highly valuable to the Okanagan people, no attempt was

made to steal from them. Unlike other native people, the Okanagans did not offer their women to any of the Thompson crew. Thompson was impressed with the dignity and respect shown by the Okanagans. Thompson recorded "... every part of their conduct was with decency and good order."

Fort Okanagan was established in 1811, at the invitation of the Okanagans, at the confluence of the Okanagan and Columbia Rivers. The fur traders from Fort Okanagan began exploring the Okanagan territory and met with Chief N'Kwala at the head of Okanagan Lake (Kelowna). This chief is also known as Nicola and Incola. He was an Okanagan native who showed just how fast the Okanagans learned from the fur traders. He actually managed the fort for two years in the absence of any fur traders from the east to manage the fort and the local fur trade.

The primary goal of the Okanagan Nation in relation to the fur traders was to obtain rifles and ammunition. The goal of those who governed the fur trade was to make the native people totally dependent on the fur trade through selling them goods as well as liquor, but the people of the Okanagan Nation avoid-

ed dependence on the fur traders as soon as they had rifles, ammunition and axes. They were not interested in becoming dependent on white man's goods or his liquor, but they had a keen interest in learning how the white man did things.

Fort Okanagan was guaranteed meat, fish and protection by the Okanagans, but there was little other food. Gardening began, and fields of grain were established. Cattle were brought to the fort. Members of the Okanagans and Similkameens worked at the fort, learned about growing vegetables

and raising cattle. Soon the native people obtained seeds and cattle and were using what they had learned. Chief N'Kwala had made a ploughshare out of wood and planted a field of potatoes. By 1840, N'Kwala grew such an excess of potatoes that he took 600 pounds to the fort for trade.

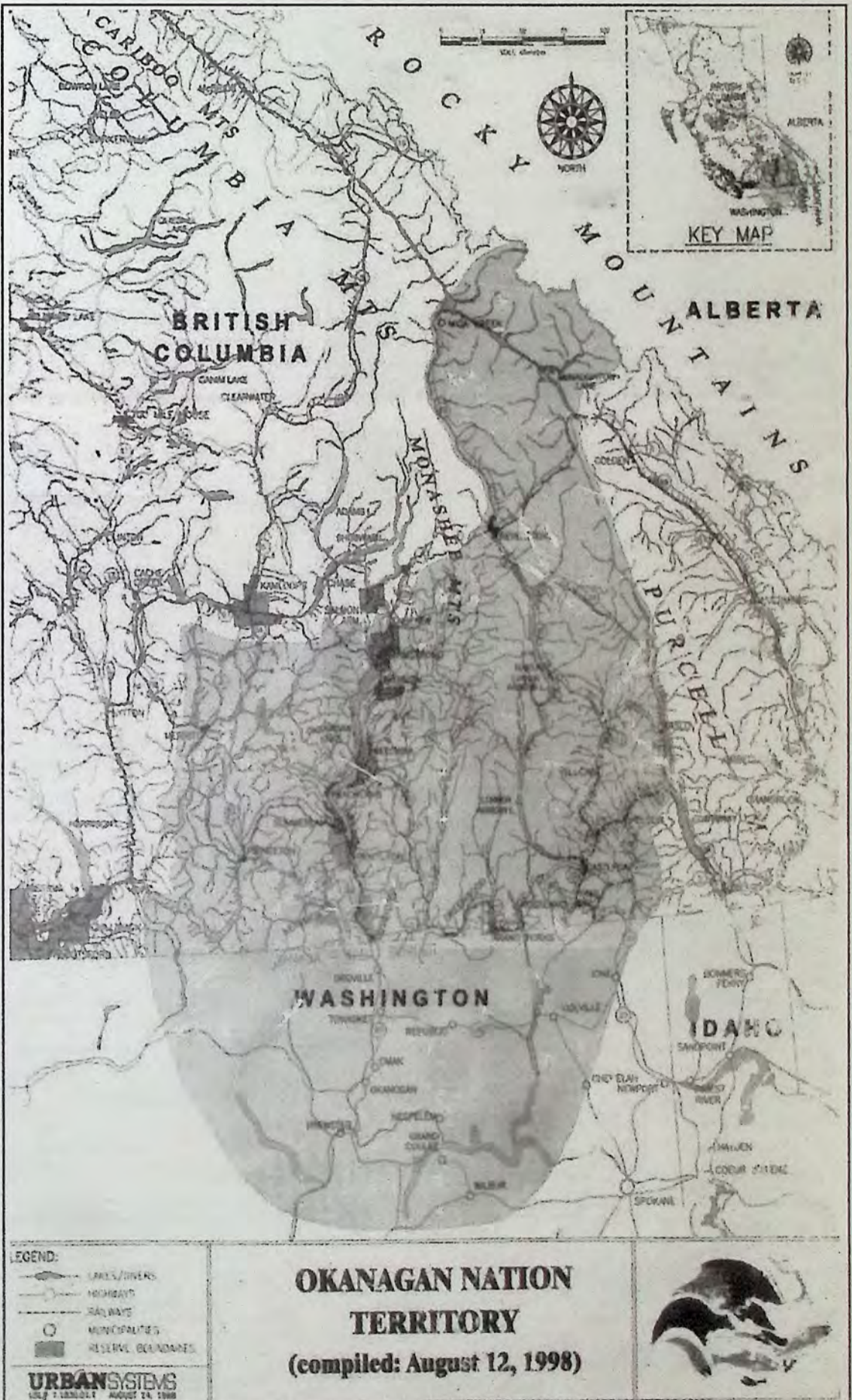
Gardening, farming and ranching were not the only skills the Okanagans and Similkameens were learning from the fur traders. They began using wagons as an addition to the usual method of moving goods via pack trains of horses.

Among the Okanagan Nation, entrepreneurial skills grew rapidly. **THE RESERVE SYSTEM**

Never a conquered people, the Indian Reserve system did more to defeat and subjugate the Okanagan Nation than war might have done.

During the early years of European settlement and the fur trade, British Columbia was a land under dispute as to whether Canada or the United States would own it. The matter was settled in the east, and the land now known as British Columbia became a Crown Colony.

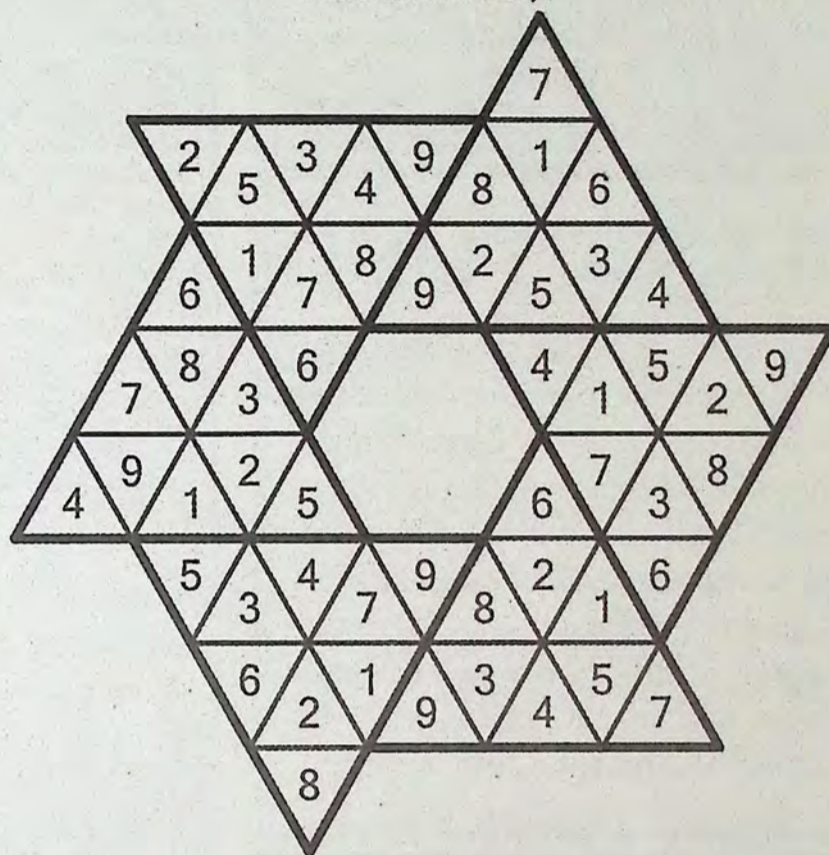

The outstanding weather fact about December 2013 was the lack of snow.

The record amount of snow on the ground in December was on December 30, 1996, when the snow measured 100cm in depth after two major dumps of snow on December 28 and 29 measuring just over 30 cm on each day. A close second was in 1990 with 65

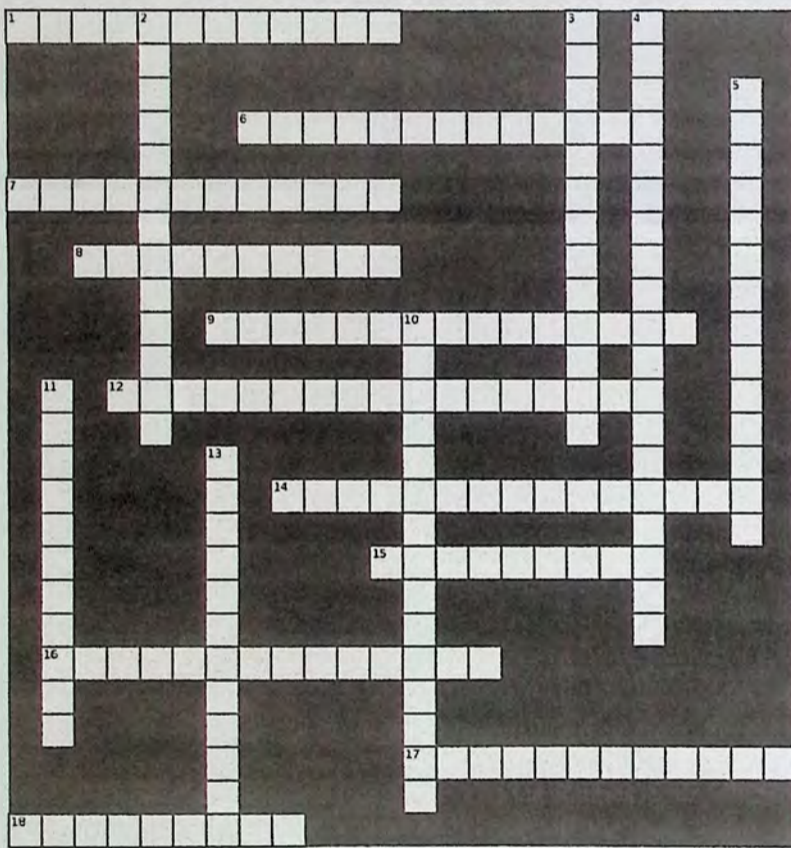
cm, and 60 cm. in 1955.

There are no records for the least amount of snow, but December 1993 would certainly have been a contender. There was little snow all winter, and 1994 proved to be a serious drought year marked by many forest fires and water shortages throughout southern British Columbia and Washington State.

Weather records for Princeton begin in late 1936, 77 years ago.

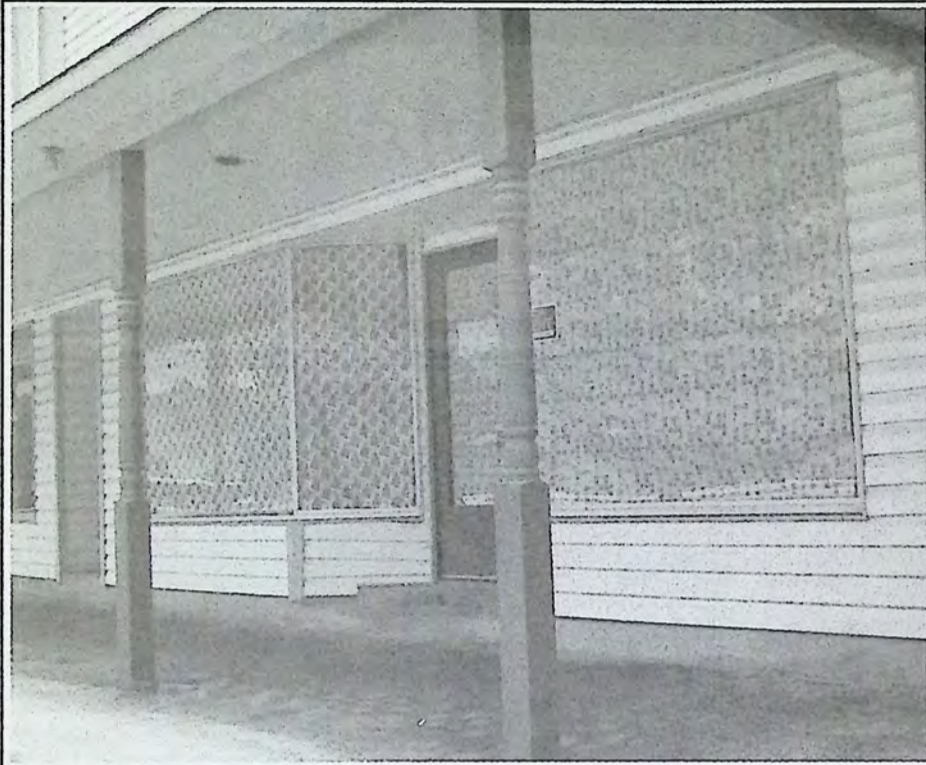

# Saving Downtown Princeton...

...An Ongoing Series by George Elliott



As we continue the series of articles on how to put life back into downtown Princeton we want to remind you the intention of these articles are to get you thinking. We are not proposing any of the ideas presented here will be the perfect fix to a problem that has taken a period of time to get to where it is now.

Also, not all of the ideas shared here are ours. Some of them have come from our customers, who obviously feel the same way we do that something needs to be done to save downtown Princeton.

This week we look at promotion and in particular, signage.

Have you walked or driven down Bridge Street late on a winter afternoon say, around 3:00 PM?

With the exception of a few locations, a lot of downtown businesses look closed just by the way they appear from the street.

It's time for a face-lift.

Even our business doesn't really

say anything about being a newspaper office with the cluttered window dressings. It's an issue we have looked at many times in recent months and intend to solve this year, but what about the rest of the businesses that look dark with the exception of a flashing neon-like 'Open' sign in the front window?

Here's a little bit of history for you: When downtown Princeton went through its most aggressive revitalization back in 1986 the theme chosen for the look of the business core was Edwardian. It was believed at the time that a theme would attract visitors and enhance the local economy much like small towns over the border (Winthrop and Leavenworth, Washington as examples) had done and experienced a great deal of success with.

At the time there were bylaws drawn up that basically dictated everything from permissible exterior colours and acceptable Main

Street facing facades. Some grant money was available to assist businesses that bought into the concept.

On paper it sounded brilliant. In practice however, there has never been a 100% buy-in from downtown businesses and to this day only a small percentage of local businesses have followed those guidelines. As far as we know, they are still in place, but do not appear to be actively enforced.

One of the largest hurdles related to the Edwardian theme was streetlights and exterior business lighting. Neon lights, which were not around in that era, were taboo as were anything bright and flashing. Now you know why downtown Princeton looks so dark at 3:30 PM in late December.

Speaking of signage, there have been questions about the placement of the downtown electronic information sign.

Now that Town Hall has moved to

the former courthouse building on Vermilion Avenue it is a safe bet that the recently vacated 'former' Town Hall building on Bridge Street will be knocked down and become an extension of the parking lot already there.

Extra parking in the downtown core would be a good idea, but why is that sign there?

We feel that electronic sign with all the wonderful local information on it should be located on Highway 3 near the Weyerhaeuser Roundhouse or somewhere along that strip of land on either side of the Bridge Street intersection promoting all that it currently is plus such obvious statements as "Shop Downtown Princeton - Next Intersection" or whatever gets the message across.

The businesses along the Highway 3 corridor already have the visibility but drivers passing by the community often have no clue there's more retail business here, if they only had some warning and knowledge

there's more to Princeton, and even if a small percentage of them chose to take the corner and travel down Bridge Street, it could be part of the puzzle in saving downtown Princeton.

We hear it often in our office when a visitor says, "We had no idea these stores were here, and we've been driving by Princeton for years."

That single statement says it all - they've been driving by the town for years and had no idea there was a downtown.

Sometimes we need to look at our town in ways that others do to understand why some changes are needed to improve our community.

Over the next few weeks we will continue to look at Princeton, downtown in particular, and share with you our thoughts and those of our readers. Together we can come up with ways to direct our elected officials to take control and correct the problems that have turned the downtown core into a virtual ghost town.

 Unfortunately for the native people of the colony, British Columbia joined Canada and the Indian Reserve system came into being. The native people no longer had access to all of their territory, but were confined to Indian Reserves. Native businesses that had flourished before the Reserve system were no longer able to operate and the Okanagan Nation became much poorer. For example, the Antoine family of Merritt lost an excellent

freighting business because they were confined to the Reserve.

Along with the Reserve system came the pressure to send children to residential schools. After a brief experience with that system, the Similkameens pulled their children from the schools and sent them to school at whatever small local schools were established. In Hedley, for example, the Indian Band gave land for a school which their children would be entitled to attend along with the gold miners'

children, one of the first integrated schools in British Columbia.

The Catholic Church had major influence among the Okanagan Nation Indian Bands, and churches were built in many communities. The Similkameens were highly resistant to being converted to Catholicism, and no church was built in the Similkameen Valley until 1894. These two churches are still standing: St. Anne's in Hedley and the old church in Chopaka, near the international border.

## TODAY'S SIMILKAMEENS

There has been an upsurge of the need to preserve the cultural traditions of the Similkameen people, along with the rest of the Okanagan Nation. Although there is little to distinguish the lifestyle of members of the Similkameen Indian Bands from their non-native neighbours, there is a cultural difference based on greater value placed on kinship, and a tradition of respecting and caring for elders and children. Enterprise and economic gain are still important, but caring for and sharing with the community have grown in importance as the cultural tradition has overtaken the culture at large.

Education of Indian Band children takes place within the public school system, but teaching of the Okanagan Salish language and culture is part of the curriculum for First Nations children. Health care

and social services are part of the Band responsibility. Social problems are addressed by the Band and the Okanagan Nation assists with legal matters.

After long years of confinement on Indian Reserves, the Similkameen people lobbied for greater freedom from restrictions imposed by the Reserve system and have made good use of their increased responsibility for their own welfare. The fact that a number of Similkameens fought for Canada during World War II gave added strength for their argument to abolish the restrictions. With the easing of rules and regulations following the end of the war, and increases in funding, the Similkameens add a great deal to the economic, political and cultural values of their valley.
