Koopmans hearing begins

Security was stepped up as a preliminary hearing for the suspect charged in last spring's double murder in Princeton got underway in Penticton provincial court Tuesday. John Ike Koopmans, 49, faces two counts of second-degree murder

and one count of attempted murder in connection with the March 30, 2013 shootings at a property off Old Hedley Road.

Keith Wharton, 44, and Rose Fox, 32, were killed and a 48-year-old Princeton man was wounded in the shooting, news of which rocked the community.

There is a ban on publication of evidence presented during the hearing before Judge Gregory Koturbash, which is expected to last four or five days. Vern Frolick and Nashina Devji are Crown counsels in the case, while Donald Skogstad is Koopmans' defence lawyer.

Last August, Skogstad received court approval to hold the preliminary hearing in Penticton rather than Princeton, due to security concerns. The Princeton courthouse lacks a secure prisoner bay.

Although extra sheriff's department staff were brought in from Kelowna for the opening day of the hearing, there were only half a dozen people, including news media, sitting in the public gallery as witness testimony began.

Tracey Biro, staff sergeant with Penticton sheriff department, said courthouse security will be reassessed as the hearing continues. Unlike some other high-profile cases, there was no "search gate" located outside the courtroom Tuesday.

ber of pieces and must be re-assembled at the copper mine site in Princeton, BC.

The largest piece is the lower main frame which weighs 100 tonnes and measures 5.75m X 5.25m X 2.3m (approximately 19 feet by 17 by 7). Three other main components (the upper main frame, the bowl short head and the adjustment ring) each weigh just over 50 tonnes. The Raptor 2000 is the largest model on the market and is fit for the most demanding high tonnage applications.

The Raptor 2000 is so large it had to be shipped from Italy to the Port of Halifax for offloading on to land. From Halifax the pieces will be transported by rail to arrive in Kamloops BC in mid-February where they will then be loaded onto special trucks and driven south to the mine site near Princeton. The Raptor 2000 will be assembled there and becomes operational in mid-2014.

It will be used by Copper Mountain (www.cumtn.com) to pre-crush rock and increases the mine's daily processing rate from continued on Page 2

Murderer nets life in prison

KAMLOOPS — A long-term sex offender, who admitted shooting his landlady twice in the head near Princeton more than two years ago, has been sentenced to life in prison.

Roger Badour, 65, pleaded guilty to second-degree murder in B.C. Supreme Court in Kamloops on Wednesday, February 12.

He was sentenced by Justice Ian Meiklem to life in prison with no eligibility for parole for 10 years. A number of firearms and other charges were stayed by the Crown.

In December 2012, Badour blurted out in court that he had killed 56-year-old Gisele Duckham and fled the scene.

Police discovered Duckham's body inside her Osprey Lake Road home on November 9, 2011 — the day after Badour had been arrested during a routine police traffic stop in Penticton. RCMP discovered firearms and other evidence allegedly linking him with Duckham.

Badour told court he shot the woman after she threatened to turn him in to authorities for other offences he had allegedly committed.

Crown counsel Lorne Fisher said Badour befriended Duckham, a volunteer community worker, and she allowed him to live in a camper behind her property.

This marks the second time Badour has pleaded guilty to Duckham's murder. An earlier guilty plea was rejected by the court in January 2013, after the accused said he wanted to get past the trial in order to get better treatment for his cancer at a federal prison.

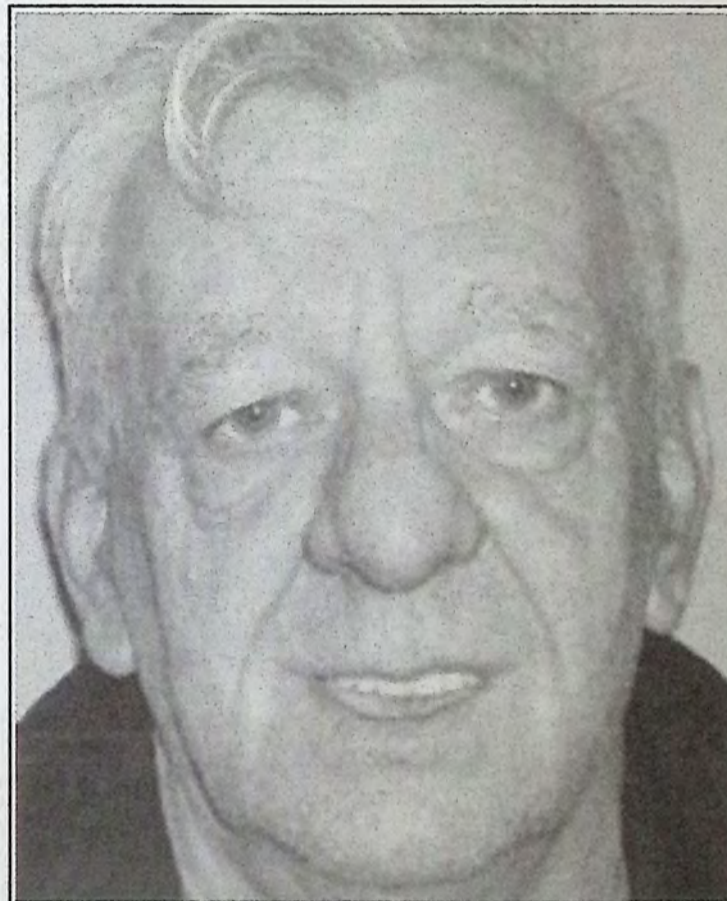
Neil MacKenzie, spokesman for the B.C. Criminal Justice branch, explained Wednesday after a thorough review of the situation it was determined that a voluntary guilty plea would be acceptable.

"It reached the point where Crown was satisfied it was appropriate to accept the guilty plea to the second degree murder charge and proceed to the sentencing," MacKenzie said.

Badour has been in frail health for some time. During a preliminary hearing in Penticton court in September 2012, he suddenly collapsed in the courtroom and was taken by ambulance to hospital.

Badour was wanted on a Canada-wide warrant at the time of the murder, after walking away from a halfway house in Victoria in April 2011.

In 2001, he was sentenced to seven years in prison after pleading guilty to sexually assaulting a 20-year-old Penticton woman on November 1, 1999, in the back of a van on Munson Mountain.

..... continued from Front Page around 32,000 tonnes per day in December 2013, to reach or exceed the planned nameplate 35,000 tonnes per day that was projected when the mine first opened in August 2011.

Management at Copper Mountain is confident that the crusher will

improve mill throughput to nearly 40,000 tonnes per day, which would improve mine profitability and provide a better margin to ensure operation during times of lower metal prices, thereby sustaining employment and stability for the town of Princeton.

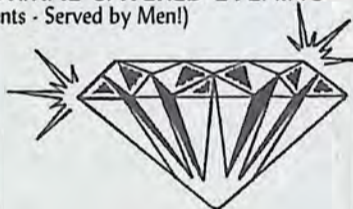

In today's age of the internet it is easy to hide behind the anonymity of the keyboard, but how often do you take those anonymous sources seriously? I know I brush most of them off. How many times have you seen letters to the editor with no name on them? Not very often. If you do, the paper does know who wrote it because they need to be accountable. If you want to send a message to council or the community don't hide behind the dark of night. Come forward and say your piece. There are a number of platforms available to you from the

paper to the internet. People are way more likely to support your message.

The solidly-built Koopmans, wearing red jail-issued overalls, sat quietly in the prisoner's box Tuesday. He was wearing glasses with a dark brown goatee and short-cropped hair.

Koopmans has remained in custody since being taken into custody the

day after the fatal shooting. Police found the suspect inside his truck camper unit which was parked only about 25 metres away from the building where the shootings occurred.

The hearing will determine if there is sufficient evidence for the case to proceed to trial in B.C. Supreme Court.

Stop Whining, Do Something!

The complaints about our local medical clinic on Facebook are rampant, ranging from poor phone service which apparently has not been fixed, to poor physician accommodations which patients find disrespectful. Although complaining on Facebook may provide personal relief of some kind, it does not address the problem. There is an old saying that action speaks louder than words. Complaining on social media is a form of action, but it is ineffective, irresponsible action.

Change demands effective action. Change requires responsible action. If you want change, you must take action that is effective, that is, an action which has an effect. Complaints on social media have no effect on the situation at the clinic. If you want change, you must take responsible action, which means you must accept the responsibility of being an agent for change.

What sort of action is effective, responsible action to create desired change in the situation at the clinic? First, you have a health care steering committee. There are local people on it: Walter Hogg, Ed Staples, and Councillor Marilyn Harkness, to name just three. Put your complaints directly to them, preferably in writing, and have the courage to sign your name. That is effective, responsi-

ble action at the local level.

What else can you do? You can write to Interior Health, your MLA Jackie Tegart, or the Minister for health in Victoria. You can write a letter to the editor of the News Leader and let the whole town know about your complaint.

All of these actions are better than sitting back and whining. If you have the time to whine on Facebook where it does no good, take the time to whine in a way that promotes change.

There is another group doing a lot of whining: the business owners. I have heard their whining, I have heard their complaints about the meeting with Town Council describing it as a "farce" and I have heard the whining about bylaws the business community describes as "ridiculous". Need I remind you that YOU are responsible for the success or failure of your business? Need I remind you that YOU pay property taxes, higher water and sewer rates, and YOU elected Town Council to work for YOU? In addition, most of YOU pay dues to the Chamber of Commerce, in which YOU, as a member, should be doing whatever YOU can to further YOUR best interests?

Why aren't YOU taking effective action? If you think a particular bylaw is ridiculous, why aren't YOU going to Town Council to request that this particular bylaw be changed? Why isn't YOUR business association going to Town Council to demand changes YOU want? Why don't YOU have a plan of action to fix what you see is wrong?

For those of you who do not like what I am saying, and do not know my background, let me enlighten you: I owned a business in Princeton for seven years, and I know just how tough it can be to compete. I know how difficult the stress can be when the income does not meet expenses. I've been there. I was also Secretary of a

business people's association that finally faded because members decided the Chamber of Commerce could do a better job of representing the business community. I have seen this situation before. One of the things I learned was this: if you want action, you have to take the responsibility for initiating the action. In short, every business owner has to become a leader in his or her own cause.

I have lived in Princeton for the past 40 years. I have seen businesses start and succeed, and I have seen them start and fail. I have seen people go out of town to shop during every one of those years. I have seen good economic times and recessions.

Here is something else I have seen: I have seen new businesses start up and only a handful of people knew about it. I have seen businesses put on wonderful sales promotions but the only people who knew about it were those who walked past and saw the foot-square sign in the window. I have seen other businesses start with a Grand Opening and great sales promotions right at the beginning, and big signs in the windows, signs you could read as you drove past. I have seen smart businesses that put flyers in my mailbox or in local newspapers when they had a sale going on. What am I telling you?

I have heard some of the whining about customers, too. Let me assure you I have encountered those kinds of customers too. Let's face it: there are jerks everywhere. There are customers who are rude, demanding, unreasonable, and even impossible to please. On the plus side, that is a customer who has actually come into your store, and every customer who walks through your front door is a person who knows you're in business. The more people who come into your store, the more successful you will be.

After everything else I've said, there is one more thing: I have always been pleased with the service I have received in local businesses. I have nothing to whine about. Yes, I do shop out of town occasionally because there are a few things I want that are simply unavailable in Princeton. If those things were available here, I would not waste a tank or two of gas to go somewhere else.

Keremeos - Cawston - Olalla



Day or night, the vicinity of the recent rock slide west of Keremeos is impossible to miss. The rubble from the slide is still piled along the north shoulder of the highway. At night, a portable spotlight at each end of the slide area lights up the mountain face. Historically, the valley between Keremeos and Hedley has seen many slides due to the fragmented nature of the mountains on either side of the Similkameen Valley. Just before 1:00 AM on January 24, 1939, boulders plunged down Stemwinder Mountain, and tore through five homes in the town of Hedley. Some boulders crashed through walls and went out the other side of the house, leaving frightened children scrambling from their beds. In the carnage, two lives were lost. Community conversation scores!

On February 10, Hedley's Senior Centre was crowded with community leaders and advocates from Princeton to Osoyoos and

Kamloops. They had come to hear Julie Fowler, executive director of the highly successful ArtsWells Festival. It was the first in a series of

"Community Conversations" organized by Angelique Wood, RDOS Director of Area G, and Kim English, a director of the Hedley Heritage Museum Association.

Purpose of the workshop, according to Wood was to "improve existing festivals and also to encourage networking among participants." She said, "this type of meeting will enable us to form lasting bonds and grow our communities." English said she hoped people would hear something of value they could take back to their own community and apply there.

Fowler, who has been in Wells 10 years, told the group her passion is to support artists of all kinds. "I want to bring them together," she said, "and I want to bring their art to

the world."

The Wells festival began small. "In the beginning we gave away a lot of tickets so people would come. And if an artist showed an interest we begged them to come. There was little money to pay them, but we did feed them."

She advised her audience to use existing facilities and look for funding through corporate sponsorships and government grant programs, in addition to selling tickets. "Publicity is important," asserted Fowler. ArtsWells has found the CBC to be helpful.

Fowler said last year the festival sold out and had about 2,000 guests. They require approximately 220 volunteers, most of whom come from outside Wells. Many of

the artists and guests stay in tents during the 4-day festival. It is still "quite grass roots."

Currently the Wells festival features over 100 musical performances on 12 stages. It offers more than 20 different workshops teaching everything from Ukrainian dance to lyric writing, clowning and more. Activities for children include a crafting station, a children's stage and workshops geared towards children. There are also screenings of independent films and local theatre productions. A one minute play festival is always popular. Added to this is a host of inter-genre literary performances and workshops, including story telling/writing, poetry and the unexpected.

Following Julie Fowler's presentation two members of the Princeton community participated in a four person panel discussion. They were Rika Ruebsaat of the Princeton Traditional Music Festival and Robin Lowe representing the Upper Similkameen Spirit Festival. They each discussed their events and successes and challenges they had experienced.

At the end of the workshop there was palpable excitement and enthusiasm as attendees exchanged ideas and contact information. Angelique Wood described the presentations as "inspiring". Another Community Conversation will take place in April at a date to be announced.

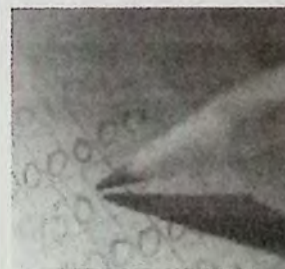

Woman sentenced for B&E

A 24 year old Princeton woman, Katelyn LaFleur, appeared in Provincial Court in Princeton for sentencing on two charges of break and enter. She had previously entered guilty pleas to the charges and a pre-sentence report had been prepared prior to sentencing.

Circumstances presented by Crown Counsel indicated LaFleur had been seen trying doors around Pines Mobile Home Park on the afternoon of June 25, 2013. The police were called and found LaFleur riding her bicycle near the park and stopped her for questioning. As they questioned her, a passing motorist stopped and said LaFleur had been in her home. LaFleur was arrested and denied she had entered any homes, but police found two cold bottles of beer on her. LaFleur claimed she had found them in the

park while she was looking for pop cans to return for money. Further investigation revealed she had entered a home and taken the same brand of beer from a refrigerator.

The pre-sentence report indicated LaFleur had mental health and drug issues. She had a prior record for break and enter in 2012 when she had entered a local restaurant when it was closed and had taken money. She had been given a conditional

discharge on that occasion.

Judge Shaw sentenced LaFleur to six months house arrest to be followed by 12 months probation. There were numerous conditions attached to the sentence, including an order prohibiting LaFleur from going near Pines Mobile Home Park. Judge Shaw warned LaFleur if she appeared in the future on charges of break and enter she would go to jail.

The Growing Case Against Gluten

The controversy raging over the effects of gluten have reached a new level.

Gluten is a protein found in wheat, rye and barley. It is the element in these grains that makes bread light and fluffy. It is the element in flour that makes it stick together so nicely, making cakes, cookies and pastry so manageable. It is the element in wheat, barley and rye flour that wreaks havoc in people with celiac disease.

Whereas few people suffer from celiac conditions, many more people are finding they are not tolerant of gluten, and have learned to avoid products containing gluten, which is really hard to do these days as gluten occurs in so many ready-made products.

A new element of the dangers of gluten has entered the picture with the book "Grain Brain" in which Dr. David Perlmutter states gluten is the primary cause of neurological disorders, including Alzheimer's and dementia. Dr. Perlmutter is a neurologist who deals daily with patients suffering from all kinds of neurological disorders from ADHD to Alzheimer's. One of the first steps in treating these disorders is to screen out gluten from their food, and he has been very successful.

Dr. Perlmutter states we are consuming 50 times more gluten than people have ever eaten before, and it is making us ill. He cites many medical research projects which have shown the effects of adding and subtracting gluten from the diet.

Dr. Perlmutter says the combination of gluten grains and sugar are responsible for most chronic illnesses related to the nervous system. He proposes we begin eating more in the fashion of our hunter-gatherer ancestors, eating more animal protein, fruits, vegetables, seeds and nuts and screening out refined sugars and gluten. This goes along with Dr. Loren Cordain who proposes the paleo diet, often called the cave man diet, for better health and top athletic performance.

While most people who have switched to gluten-free foods have done so to rid themselves of digestive problems, Dr. Perlmutter states these people will be less likely to suffer from disorders of the nervous system, particularly as they enter their elderly years.

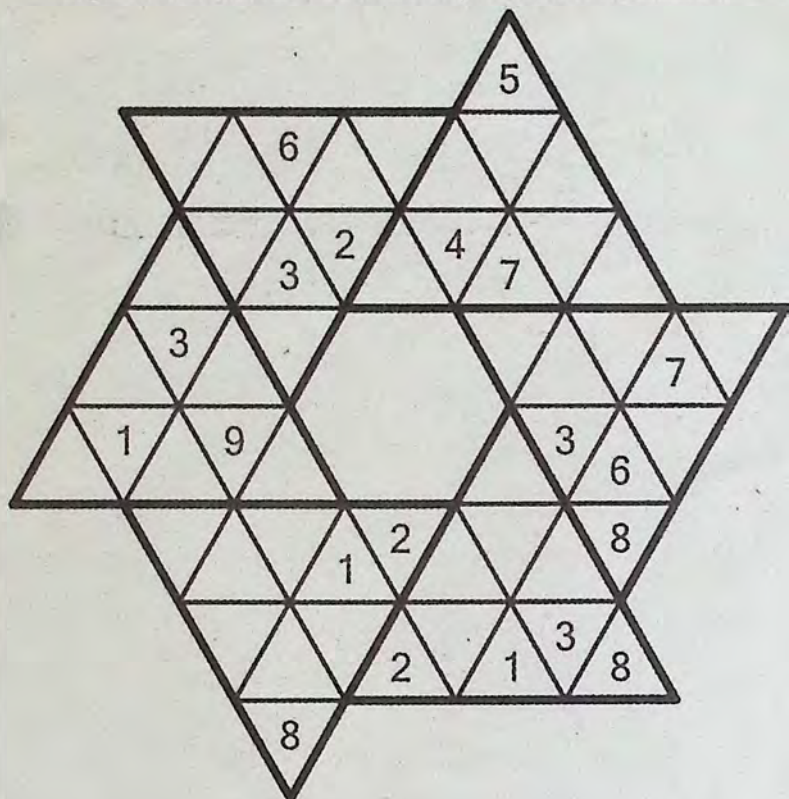

HOSHI SUDOKU - About The Puzzle

Sudoku - also known as "Number Place" - is a logic-based, combinatorial number-placement puzzle. The aim of Sudoku is to enter a number from 1 through 9 in each cell of a grid, most frequently a 9x9 grid made up of 3x3 subgrids. Each row, column and region must contain only one instance of each number. This Sudoku variant is called "Hoshi Sudoku". It contains six large triangles. The numbers 1 to 9 must be placed into the cells of each large triangle. Every line of any length - even uncontinuous - must contain every number not more than once.

Smoked Pulled Pork

(NC) When it comes to authentic 'southern barbecue', low and slow is the name of the game, say grilling specialists at Broil King. Allow yourself plenty of time with this pork shoulder recipe. Use low temperatures and allow the meat to rest before shredding. Additional recipes and grilling tips are available at www.broilkingbbq.com.

Ingredients

- 6-8 pound pork shoulder
- 3 tbsp. yellow mustard
- 2-3 handfuls of wood chips - soaked

Rub

- 1 cup brown sugar
- 1/2 cup chili powder
- 1/3 cup paprika
- 1/4 cup celery salt
- 1/4 cup garlic powder
- 1/4 cup onion salt
- 1/4 cup black pepper
- 1/4 cup white pepper
- 1 tbsp. dry mustard
- 1 tbsp. 5-spice powder
- 1 tbsp. dry ginger

Mop (an authentic basting tool)

- 2 cups apple juice
 - 1 cup apple cider vinegar
 - 1 cup water
 - 4 tbsp. barbecue rub (from above)
- Boil for 3 - 5 minutes, stirring constantly, cool overnight

Finishing Touches

- 2 cups barbecue sauce

Directions

Prepare rub, mop and barbecue sauce the night before. Rub pork shoulder with yellow mustard, cover with rub, and let rest for half an hour before placing on your barbecue. Set your barbecue for indirect grilling at 225°F. In a gas barbecue, use a smoker box for your wood chips; for charcoal barbecues, place a handful of soaked wood chips on the surface of the charcoal. Place the pork shoulder on the barbecue, close the lid. Begin coating with apple juice mop an hour into the cooking process and continue to baste every half hour. Leave pork on grill until the internal temperature of the pork reaches 185°-190° F. This could take from 6 to 10 hours, depending on weather conditions. Monitor the internal temperature of the pork using a meat thermometer. Once it has reached a temperature remove it from the barbecue, wrap it tightly in foil and allow it to rest for at least an hour before pulling. Do not skip this step, as it is the final step in allowing the connective tissue to completely break down, resulting in tender, moist pork. Shred using pork claws or a meat fork. Mix with barbecue sauce and enjoy.

Important Preparation Tips:

- Purchase a pork shoulder with a nice fat cap. There is a lot of flavour and moisture there, so leave it on.
- Keep the cooking temperature inside the barbecue constant at approximately 225°F.
- Take the guess work out of grilling by using a meat thermometer to monitor the internal temperature of the meat.

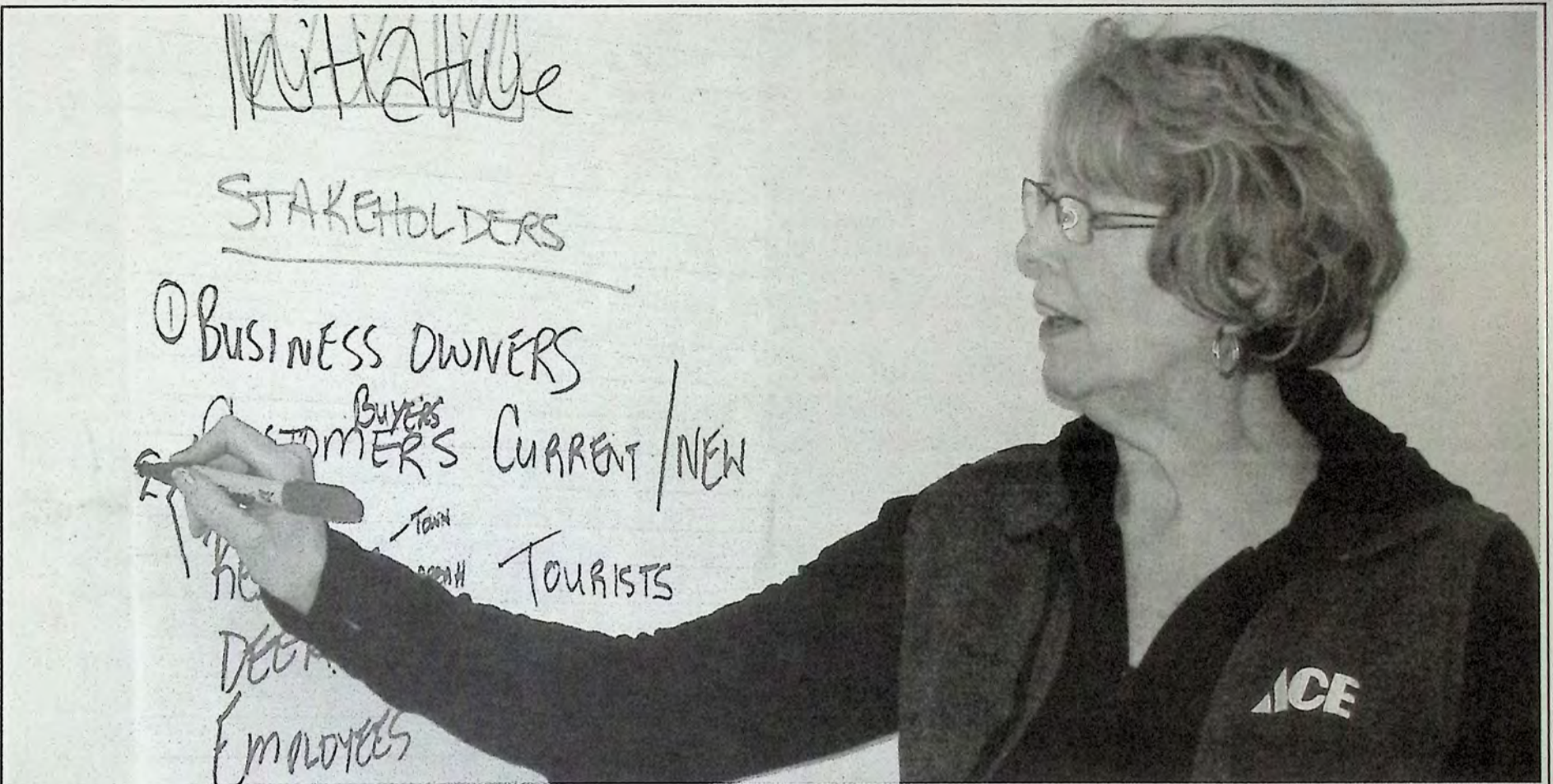

Saving Downtown Princeton...

...An Ongoing Series by George Elliott

The job of saving the downtown core is not the responsibility of Town Council and I have said that many times.

The best way to get things done in a particular situation is to get people who are directly affected by it into the fold so they can provide insight and first-hand knowledge. That is exactly what Town Council did when they organized two separate meetings. One was targeted at the downtown businesses and the other at highway businesses. A joint committee was formed and, with the support of Town Council, they have been left to come up with an action plan.

Susan Robinson was appointed the (in her words) 'temporary chair' and facilitated the first official meeting of the joint committee on February 12th at Riverside Centre.

Solving problems usually requires a process where you identify the

issue, come up with a plan that would ultimately include a solution or at the very least, a mutually agreed upon beneficial resolution.

The first two meetings where downtown businesses and highway businesses got together produced a long list of what was considered issues.

What Robinson attempted to do with the joint committee was to get everyone in the room comfortable with each other and on the same page.

Although the process was viewed by a few as something other than productive, a lot was accomplished in the 90-minutes or so spent together.

Each person in the room identified why they were part of the committee and the reoccurring theme was an interest in seeing local businesses thrive and more new businesses setting up shop in the community.

Regardless of what anyone in the room may actually have said outside the room, I can assure you each of them are struggling to exist in the current economic conditions.

Words used to describe what the business owners/operators viewed as important elements in healthy business included respect, honesty, cohesiveness, leadership, trust, communication, a common goal, cooperation exchange and initiative.

Clearly local business operators are a clever bunch and they want you to know it but when it got time to develop a 'mission statement' things bogged down a little.

I've been in many of these conferences where the mission statement takes far too long to develop and in defense of the process, I will say that the mission statement, although not written in stone, gives a group the focus it requires

to achieve the goals it pursues.

There, I said it.

As much as I'm not personally a fan of daylong sessions to hammer out a mission statement, I understand the reason for one. I think some of the others in the room last week did too, but just wanted to roll up their sleeves and start picking away at the attainable goals. I understand and respect that. I want to see progress as quickly as possible, but you have to trust the process.

The mission statement, following more than one edit, ended up "Assure sustainability and growth of business and economy in Princeton."

The first draft was far too wordy and somewhat redundant, and although I'm not 100-percent in love with the final draft, it does say what needs to be said.

That has been the underlying key to the "Saving Downtown

Princeton" series – to shine a light on what is happening to your local economy and trying to make you understand that in order to keep what's already here, you need to use (support) it and that support actually fosters growth which leads to new business.

The joint committee then went on to the task of identifying stakeholders of local business. You'd be surprised who business people feel have a hand in the life of local business. The short list focuses on business owners, customers (current and new) and residents (town and regional district), tourists, the Town of Princeton and Area H and children (as they are the future).

Those are big accomplishments in a short meeting when you really get down to it, but how does this fix the current economics and save downtown Princeton?

For me, personally, I was continued on Page 22

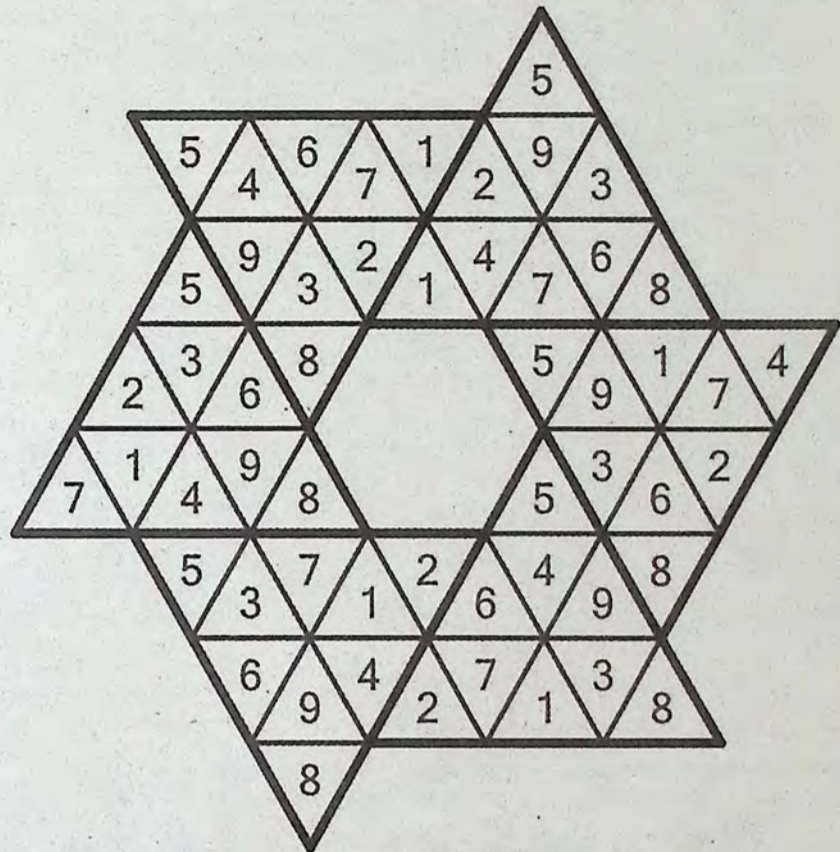

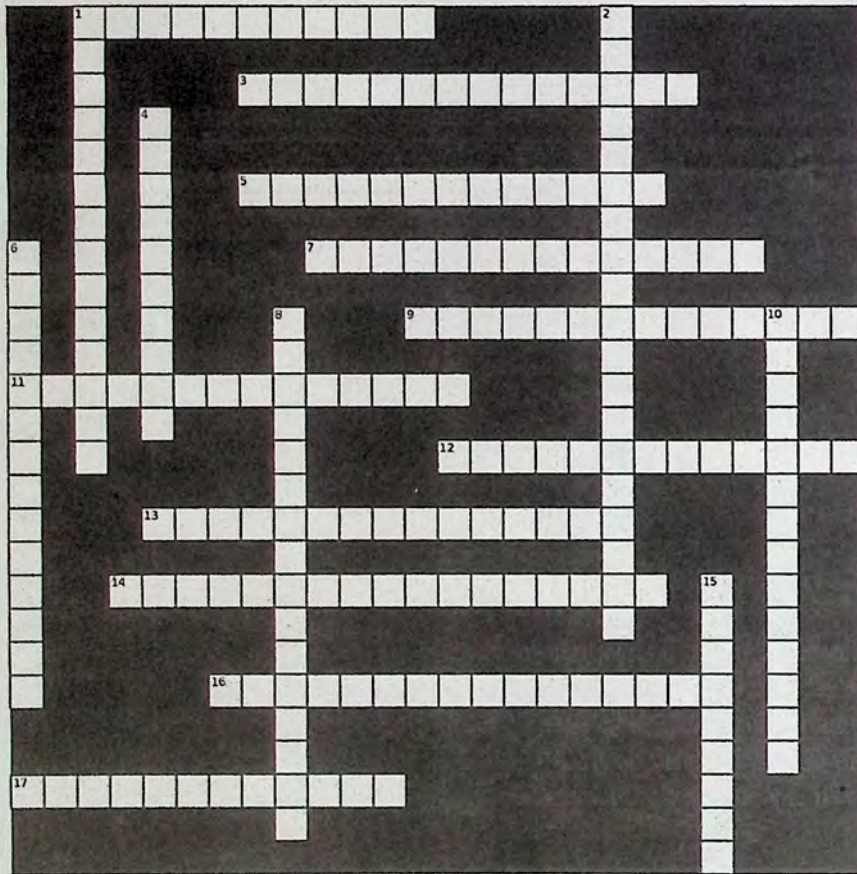

The meeting of the Ratepayers and Electoral Association on Monday night was well attended and marked by the accession of several new members. With the drafting and adoption of a proposed platform the organization will be complete. It is suggested that each member take part in the framing of the platform and offer planks for consideration.

Resolutions were passed asking for further appropriation for the trans-provincial road; that residents and British subjects be employed on public works; that Parker Williams be upheld in his endeavor to amend the Master and Servant Act; that Mr. Shattford be invited to address the association; that the dumping ground is an eyesore and menace to the public health and asking for an incinerator, also an officer to carry out removal of garbage and night soil from proximity to public highway; that a sum of \$30,000 is requested to be placed in the Dominion supplementary estimates for a public building. All the resolutions were carried unanimously after mature deliberation.

The suggestion of an improved fire protection service met with general approval and will take concrete form later on.

The meeting adjourned to the regular monthly night on the third Monday of March.

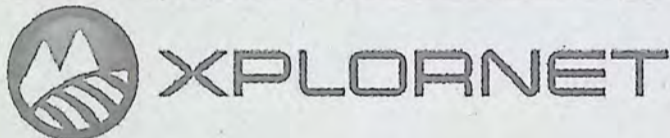
