

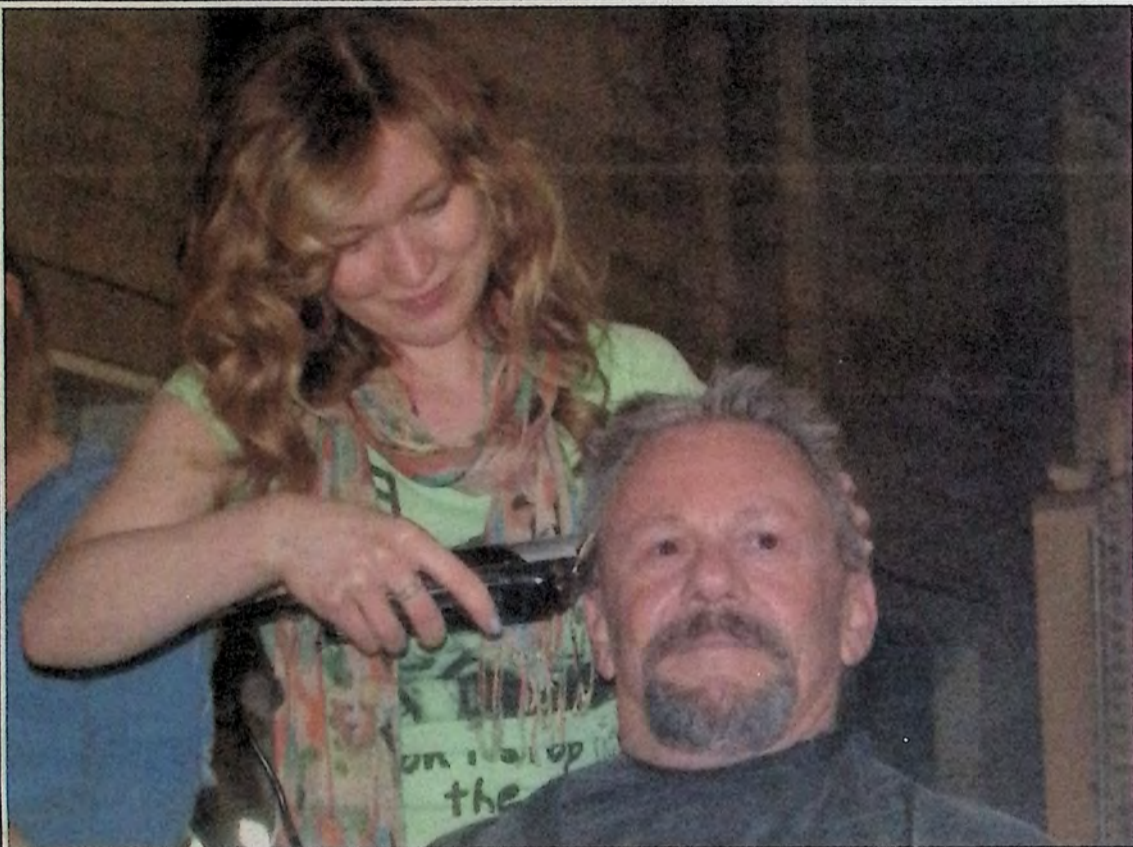

Council sets 2014 priorities

Town Council outlined its 2014 priorities on March 17. These will be implemented or completed during the coming year.

Public access to the dike trail along the Tulameen River in Allison Flats is on the list of priorities, along with Urban Deer Management Program and road improvement, particularly Old Hedley Road. An indoor swimming pool may not be completed this year, but staff will explore options for providing an indoor pool.

Work is already underway for GIS mapping of the Town's infrastructure, that is, the water, sewer and

storm drain systems, and the mapping of the Town Cemetery. Mayor Frank Armitage commented Princeton loses 50 percent of the water it pumps due to leakage from old pipes.

In addition, general infrastructure mapping is needed and there will be costs for survey and data entry. The Town will seek grants to cover the costs of mapping, and is pursuing a cost sharing plan with Regional District.

Mayor Armitage said Council is still working on getting Tax money from the mine directed to Princeton instead of Regional District.

Council activities

At the March 17 meeting of Princeton Town Council, Mayor Frank Armitage gave a report of his activities since the last Council meeting. He attended a Regional District meeting and learned a \$175,000 grant had been received for an organic feasibility study. Registration of off-road vehicles, ATV's, is under study and could result in a provincial law requiring registration, licensing and insuring of such vehicles. Many agricultural business owners object to this idea because they use their vehicles only on private property.

Mayor Armitage praised the Curling Club for the excellent way they organized the Copper Mountain Mining Co. bonspiel. He added praised for Princeton Figure Skating Club for their March 9 public presentation and said, "It is wonderful to see what youth in our community are

doing."

He praised Princeton Community Arts Council for bringing concerts to Princeton. He had attended the Wheat in the Barley concert on March 14 and remarked on the talented musicians.

Mayor Armitage attended a dinner hosted by Princeton Traditional Music Society and mentioned the dedication of its members to bringing the music festival to Princeton each year.

Both Mayor Armitage and Councillor Doug Pateman praised the Chamber of Commerce and local business people for the sales promotion on the third Saturday of each month. The idea is to have local businesses offer sales specials on the third Saturday of the month to attract local shoppers. The first such Saturday was March 15, and both members of Town Council said it had been a good start.

Several local business people had stated they had a good response.

Town Council hears local tourism ideas

Two local citizens attended the March 17 Town Council meeting to present ideas that would encourage tourists to stop in Princeton. The first presenter was Robert Hunt, a mine worker, who sees the potential for making a beach along the Similkameen River at Two Rivers Park. Hunt pointed out this area is visible from the bridge on Highway

3 and would be an attraction to those seeking the beaches of the Okanagan.

He made the point "If they stop, they shop."

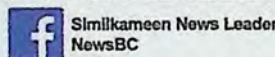
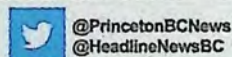
Visibility is the key to an idea presented by John Sandness. He suggested a large plywood structure along the base of the tailings dam on Highway 3. The structure

would depict a prospector and burro and accompanying signs would say "the prospects in Princeton are good". Additional large signs would give information about other attractions in the Princeton area.

Mayor Frank Armitage thanked both presenters and assured them the ideas would be passed on to a committee dealing with tourism.

Zoning Amendment Bylaw No. 887, 2014

Pursuant to the provisions of Section 893 of the *Local Government Act*, notice is hereby given that Town Council will consider amending the Town of Princeton Zoning Bylaw No. 880, 2013.

The proposed Amendment is as follows:

THAT Lot 10, District Lot 706, Yale Division Yale District (formerly Osoyoos), Plan EPP11334, PID 028-575-466 (civic address 105 Copperhead Road), be rezoned from Single Family Residential (RS2 Small Parcel) to Two Family Residential (RD).

The purpose of the zoning amendment is to facilitate the development of a secondary suite at 105 Copperhead Road.

The Council of the Town of Princeton will consider the Bylaw Amendment April 7th, 2014 at 7:30 pm at the Library Meeting Room, 107 Vermilion Avenue.

A public hearing is being waived under the provisions of Section 893 of the *Local Government Act*, as the subject property is consistent with the Town of Princeton Official Community Plan.

MP hosts community forum

BC Southern Interior MP Alex Atamanenko hosted another successful community forum March 19th at Princeton's Legion Hall.

A total of just over forty people attended the meeting which saw four panelists review issues and concerns related to their specific seats of office. A short question period followed.

Atamanenko shared a number of concerns facing him at the national level and stated, "I speak from my perspective" and pointed to the new five-point plan of Canada Post, which could lead to a number of postal employees losing their jobs across the country, as an issue. The concern comes from Canada Post licensing franchise outlets.

"We don't want any changes to our universal postal service."

Atamanenko also commented that he is appalled at the treatment veterans receive in Canada and that he supports the move to develop a national park in the South Okanagan and Lower Similkameen as long as ranchers still have access to grazing land.

As for highlights during his terms in office, Atamanenko commented on how much he enjoys meeting people in his riding. He said he appreciates being able to attend various size functions that allow him to build relationships with residents in BC Southern Interior.

"Meeting people and working with you on issues is the highlight,"

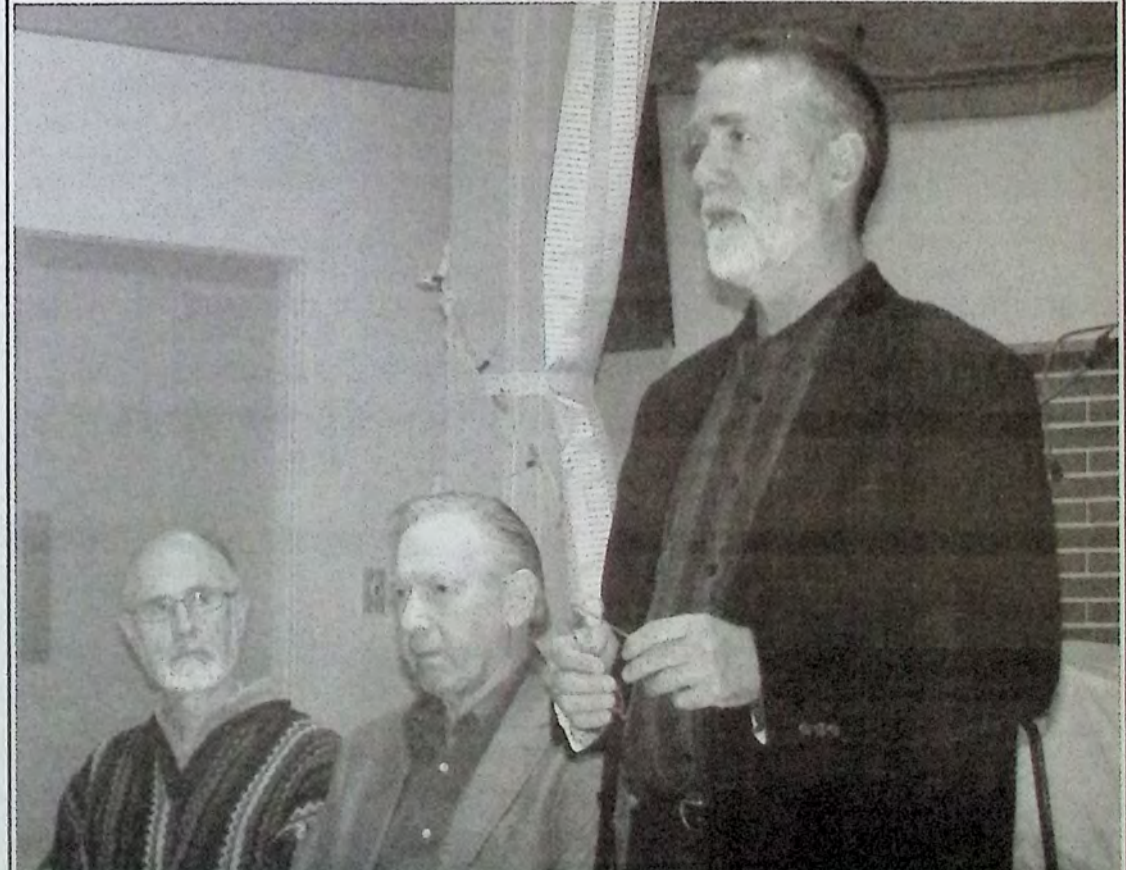
he said.

"That's what keeps me going." Town of Princeton Mayor Frank Armitage reviewed the 2014 priorities set in place for town council. They include improvements to the aging infrastructure (water, sewer and drainage), which included two major projects completed in the past year.

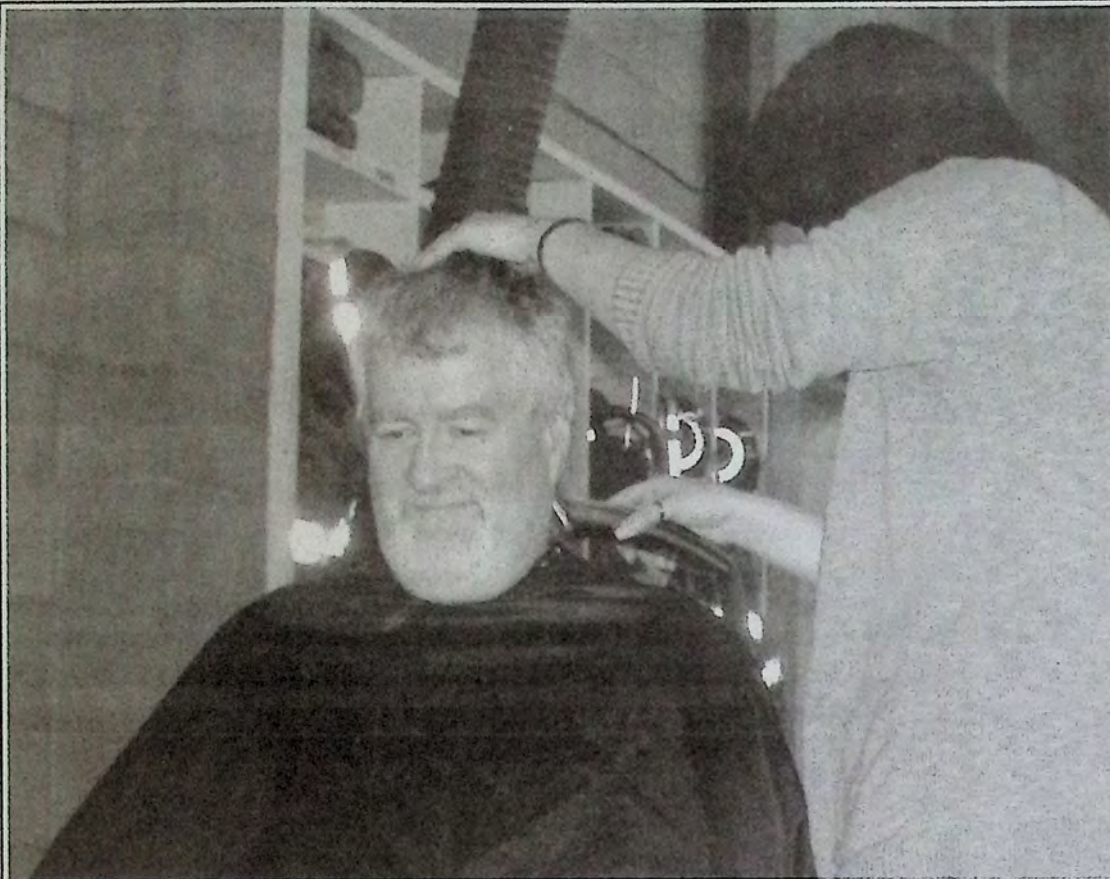
Armitage listed the Mayne Avenue water main replacement, at a cost of \$183,000 and the Ponderosa lift station, which cost \$192,000, as key to meeting that goal.

"We must maintain and enhance the services available in our community."

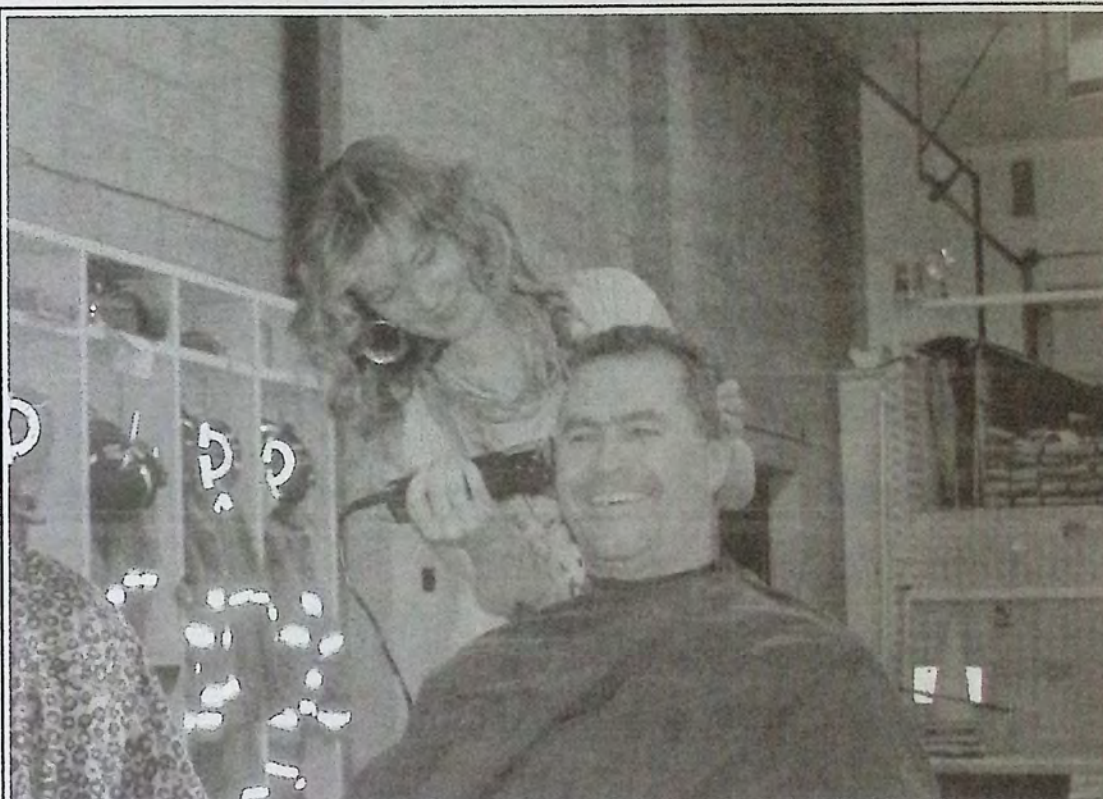

Maybe I've got this all wrong, but with the effort the Town has honestly put into pulling merchants together to come up with ideas, and the support they keep telling us it there, I would have thought saving downtown Princeton would have rated at least a mention on the 2014 priority list.

Being Right Can Be Wrong

About twenty years ago I read a book called *Flawless*. This book described ten common character flaws. At the top of the list was 'being right'. You might wonder why being right is the top character flaw, but actually it is the need to be right that causes problems. Many of the conflicts between people stem from this need to be right about something. Some people need to be right about most things, particularly their own opinions.

There is nothing more closed than a closed mind when the need to be right overrides everything else. We have a history of wars fought over who is right about religion. Jews, Christians and Muslims fight about their own interpretations of what God wants, despite the fact that all three religions are based on the same Old Testament. Among the Jews are sects that they are more informed or more holy because of their religious observances. The Shiites fight with the Sunnis, although they are both Muslim religions. Catholics fight with Protestants. Each group wants to believe their way is the

right way. They need to be right even to the point of killing.

I hear the same sort of thing in regard to the cause of global warming. Popular belief is that humans cause global warming, but there are scientists who say it is not so. People take sides and then back up their positions by citing facts mixed with opinions.

Recently I heard of a woman who wondered if HAARP might have something to do with global warming, as HAARP experiments heat the ionosphere. The people she was speaking to made fun of the fact she believes there is HAARP, despite the fact it is well documented and information about HAARP is readily available on the net. Her listeners did not believe in HAARP, therefore could not entertain the idea anyone else might believe HAARP exists.

I have been through the same kinds of closed minded behaviour when I expressed concern about fallout from Fukushima's nuclear power plant disaster. People said there were no warnings broadcast, therefore we had nothing to worry about. I am always a skeptic, and it was my turn to be right a couple of weeks ago when radioactive fallout from Fukushima was discovered in soils in the Lower Fraser Valley.

I have seen this need to be right cause real problems in a marriage. A couple was entertaining friends, and they began discussing an issue. Everyone was expressing opinions, including the wife of the host. Her opinion was different from his, and after their guests left, he reprimanded her for expressing a different opinion, as if somehow it was an act of dis-

loyalty. At that point, she became offended, feeling he would not allow her to have opinions of her own. He felt she should agree with his opinion to make him look more right in the eyes of their guests, while she felt his need to be right was actually saying her opinions were worthless. That disagreement went deep in both and caused a rift that was never mended.

The need to be right might be justified when dealing with factual materials. For example, the need to be right about how to follow an architect's plans is probably justified because certain dimensions must be accurate. However, whether the finished structure will be attractive is a matter of opinion.

Because of the need to be right, many people guard a mind that is so closed and narrow it cannot make room for a new idea. Worse still about such minds is they are prepared to ridicule and even punish those who embrace the new idea, as in the case of Galileo who was imprisoned because he said Earth revolves around the sun.

The need to be right, when it turns into ridicule of new or different ideas, can stifle the creativity and even delay human progress. Much of the ease we enjoy today through technological advancement was originally ridiculed, and not just in the idea stage. I remember a story of my grandfather who fired a hired hand because the man described harvesting on the prairies with a machine called a combine. My grandfather was sure no such machine could possibly have been invented, therefore the hired hand was lying. I remember telling an elderly couple about a new machine in our office called a fax machine, a machine that sent letters and even pictures over the telephone line. They laughed at me, and told me to stop trying to hoodwink them.

Our world is full of astonishing things. Whenever I think of closed minds, I think of the platypus. It is a mammal that lays eggs, has a body like a beaver and a bill like a duck, and has spurs that will give the sting of a rattlesnake bite. Did the Creator make a platypus just to remind us that those things we consider impossible might just exist? Was the platypus put on earth to remind us to keep an open mind?

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RDOS announces landfill changes

As of May 1, 2014, the Regional District of Okanagan-Similkameen (RDOS) will be changing fees and regulations for garbage, recycling and organics brought to local landfills.

Beginning May 1, regular garbage fees will rise to \$95 per tonne from \$72 at the Campbell Mountain, Oliver, Okanagan Falls and Keremeos Landfills.

Over the last decade, there has been a steady drop in the amount of garbage received due to increased recycling and composting. For several years RDOS landfills have either passed along costs to ratepayers or diverted funds scheduled for reserves.

"Taxing everyone to subsidize the cost of garbage isn't fair or effective," said Regional District Board Chair Mark Pendergraft.

"A user pay system is better as people pay the real price for the garbage they create.

"It also encourages residents to

reduce, reuse, recycle and compost to save money."

While regular garbage fees will increase, tipping fees for recyclable gypsum wall board, concrete and masonry will be reduced. There will also be preferential fees for mixed demolition and renovation waste that has undergone hazard assessment and abatement.

To protect workers, proof of a hazard assessment and abatement for each mixed load will be required. No hazard abatement will be required when materials are separated and brought in as clean and recyclable gypsum, concrete, asphalt, wood and metal.

May 1 will also mark the opening of the Okanagan Falls Landfill Demolition, Renovation and Construction Waste Recycling Facility and the Keremeos Landfill weigh scale.

The Keremeos Landfill weight scale will be operational starting Sunday May 4. The facility will

charge the same rates as other RDOS landfills for garbage and accepted recyclables.

This May, the Okanagan Falls Landfill will open a new recycling sort facility for mixed demolition, renovation and construction (DRC) waste. The facility will sort mixed DRC loads, removing recyclable wood, metal, asphalt and concrete from non-recyclable demolition garbage.

With any fee increase, a critical concern is a potential increase in illegal dumping. RDOS Staff regularly clean up illegal dump sites and have worked with Conservation Officers to identify vehicles suspected of dumping materials.

Residents can report illegal dump sites by phoning 1-866-566-3867.

Anyone considering bringing DRC waste to a RDOS Landfill should contact the RDOS for details of required hazard assessments.

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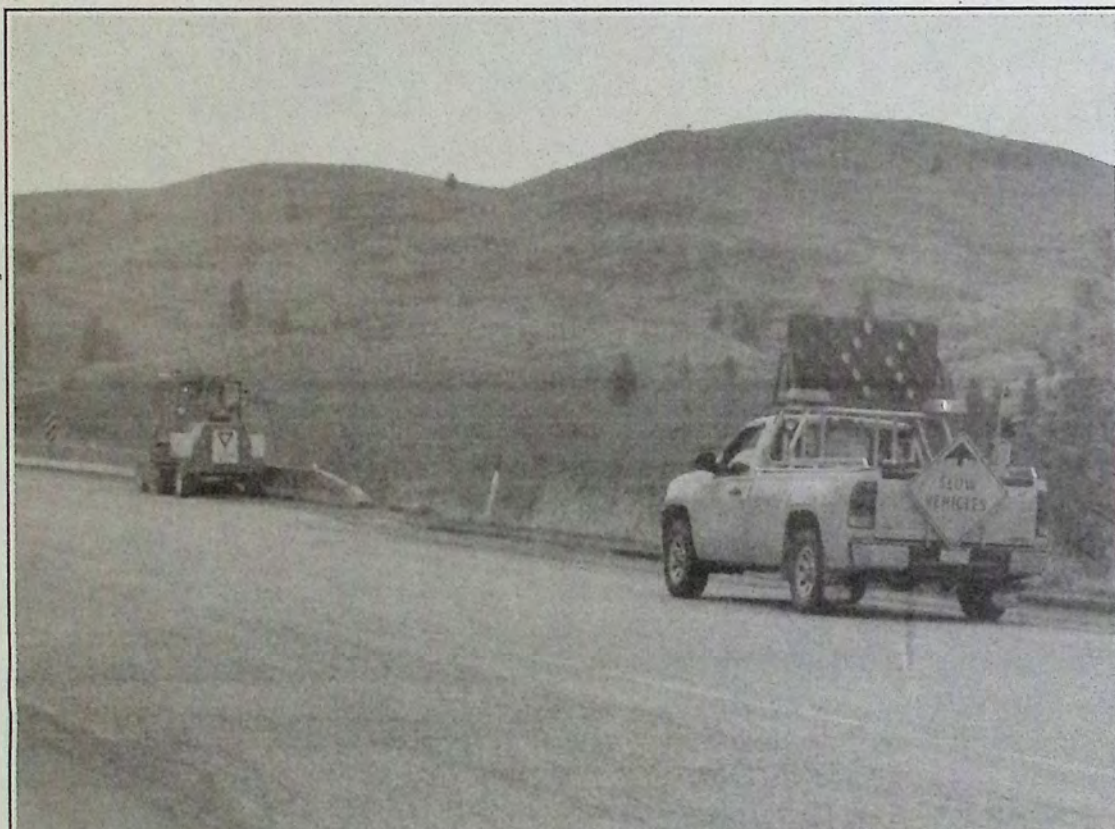

RCMP release report

During the fourth quarter of 2013, Keremeos RCMP responded to 369 calls for service, compared with 366 calls during the third quarter of 2012. This corresponds to an increase of less than 1%. In total, Keremeos RCMP responded to 1,533 calls for service in 2013, compared with 1,567 in 2012. This corresponds to an overall decrease of 2%.

Several property crime subtypes increased this quarter, driven by an increase in mail theft (an 'other theft' subtype), break and enters and thefts from vehicles, both within Keremeos and in the outlying areas of Cawston and Olalla. December was especially busy, with nearly three times as many Criminal Code files reported as there were during the same month in 2012.

On December 8th a 34-year-old male was located and arrested after break-ins to a local pharmacy and church. He was convicted of break and enter x2 and is currently in custody serving a 24 month sentence. However, property crime remains

problematic throughout the detachment area and Keremeos RCMP continues to investigate these ongoing crime trends.

Initiatives and Priority Areas Drug Enforcement

Keremeos RCMP investigated three founded drug files during the fourth quarter of 2013. One of these involved the location and dismantling of a 20-plant outdoor grow operation which was located near Highway 3A on October 5th. The other two files involved drug possession (heroin and cannabis).

Traffic Safety Impaired Driving

Between October and December 2013, three drivers in Keremeos were issued 90-Day Immediate Roadside Prohibitions (IRPs). There were 27 traffic collisions in the Keremeos Detachment area this quarter.

Prolific and Nuisance Offenders

The Penticton South Okanagan Similkameen Regional Detachment is committed to fostering an inter-agency approach when focusing on

prolific and priority offenders within the Detachment boundaries. Relationships with partner agencies have been instrumental in the identification of high-risk individuals and the timely dissemination of critical information such as warrants, address changes, conditions and other compliance measures. RCMP also liaises with other detachments across the province to ensure that warrants are executed in the event that an offender has relocated outside of the detachment area. The Keremeos detachment maintains a prolific offender file listing all offenders with conditions. Curfew checks are expected and conducted on a regular basis, and crime analyst reports are used to target high crime areas. Keremeos Detachment is currently in the process of implementing a loitering bylaw to address residents and businesses concerns in regards to seasonal transient workers.

The second one is even worse. There were two twin girls that rode a lot and they loved the palomino as well. They went up to the door of the stall one day and the stud picked the girl right off the ground by her breast. She was terrified! We were very fortunate that she didn't sue us.

She recovered but was very cautious around him. We had to put bars in the upper half of the stall so he could no longer put his head out to grab anyone else. It became evident that this was a dangerous horse and we sold it to someone in Gibsons.

The horse finally had his own pasture, but one of our friends spotted the horse as he drove by so he thought he would go and see him

and jumped over the fence. It was a good thing the horse was far off because he turned on him, ears flat back, and came after the guy full speed.

Thankfully the fellow was able to

jump back over the fence just in time.

That was the last we heard of our beautiful palomino stud, but we had some of his kids at the barn.

Living Past 100

Live Longer With Home Preserves

Most people want to eat food that is not contaminated in any way, but it is becoming more difficult to do so in a world where pesticides and herbicides are used so frequently on food crops. Pesticides are dangerous to health, but there is more than just pesticides that may be dangerous. The lining used in many commercial tins containing food also contain a substance that leaches a synthetic form of estrogen. The substance is called BPA and has been linked to cancers in females.

How do we avoid these dangers to our health? First, make sure the food you buy is organic, or if it is a form of canned goods, make sure it is in a glass container. You are going to pay more for it, but it will help you avoid many health problems. You can buy frozen foods, too, but read the labels for contents.

Another way to avoid the pesticide problems and BPA problems is to do your own home preserving. Home canning is done using glass jars and when it is done at home, you know exactly what is going into it. You are not going to add chemicals or colorants to make it look prettier.

The second method of preserving food at home is to freeze it. Frozen foods have more nutrients than canned foods, and many of the foods commonly canned at home can be frozen as well. For example, Roma tomatoes can be frozen in a bag in sufficient numbers to be used in the same recipes calling for canned tomatoes. Spaghetti sauce can be prepared in bulk at home then frozen in small containers for future use. Bell peppers can be diced, frozen on cookie sheets, then dumped into small bags for adding to a stir fry or other dish.

Many foods can be stored at room temperature at home: onions, squash, potatoes. If you have a little space in a basement or closet, you can buy these in bulk in autumn when they are least expensive and store them.

One of the best ways to avoid pesticides is to grow your own food. Not all of us have a lot of land to do this, but it is surprising how much you can grow in containers. Lettuce, tomatoes, potatoes, spinach, green onions, and many herbs do very well in containers. If you have a back yard, you could use it to grow food at very little expense. If you have children, a garden is a good way to teach them about where our food comes from and how good it tastes fresh from the garden.

The fewer pesticides and chemical additives you consume, the better your health will be.

PXA looks to spring projects

Princeton Exhibition Association (PXA) members were pleased to learn the main barn has been full this winter, generating income. President Paul Bedard said the heavy snowfall in February followed by rain and fast melt presented challenges, but with the assistance of Dana Stevens, the run-off problems were solved by a ditch.

Power costs for the winter show a decline since the electrical upgrade last summer to improve efficiency.

Both President Bedard and Vice-President Dan Kastor have applied for grants from a variety of sources to assist with costs. A major cost will be the new requirements of the fire marshal for the installation of fireproof walls and ceiling in the pari-mutual area under the grandstand. Another major cost will be the repair of the cultipacker, a machine used to condition the race-track. More work is required to upgrade more barns.

Karrie Crucil and Jennifer Bernard attended the weekend Cowboy Festival in Kamloops to promote Princeton's three major events at Sunflower Downs (the fairgrounds). Bernard reported being

well-received and handing out vendor forms for the upcoming events, as well as having people talk to them about the events.

There are plans to upgrade the infield and plant grass in spring. Several organizations are involved in this project, but it will take a combined effort to carry out the plan.

A concession rental agreement was presented for consideration and will be adopted into policy at the April 15 meeting if there are no alterations. President Bedard said a policy must be written specifically for stallions housed on the property. The policy committee was appointed to review and upgrade existing policies.

Concerns arose from the presence of unauthorized persons on the fairgrounds. People renting stalls complained of a person walking dogs in the barn area, and there have been

problems with persons entering the grounds on bikes. A sign will be posted on the east entrance advising trespassers will be subject to prosecution.

PXA meetings move to the fairgrounds office in April and will continue to be held there until October. Anyone may attend the meetings.

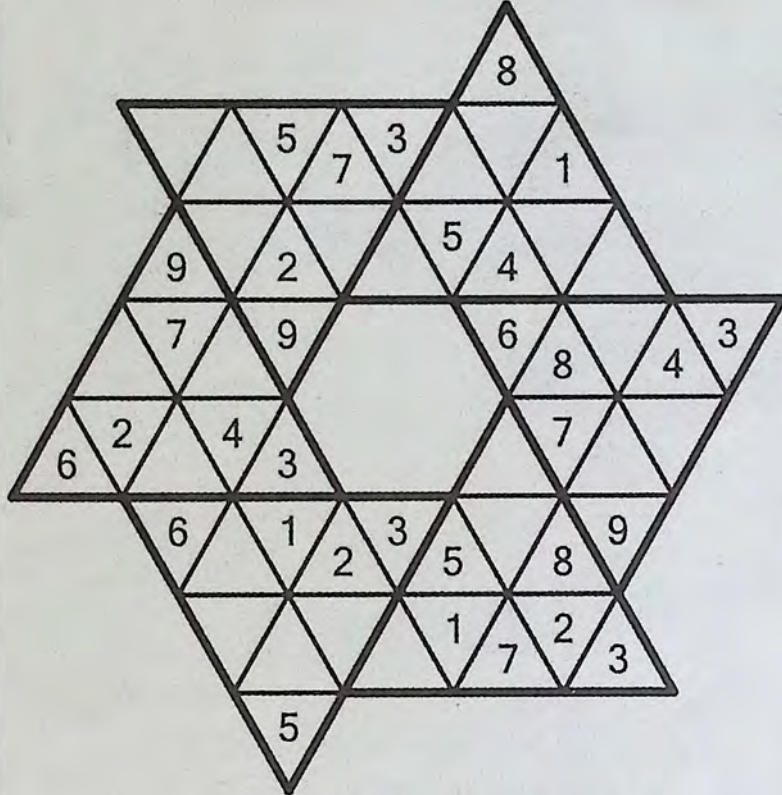

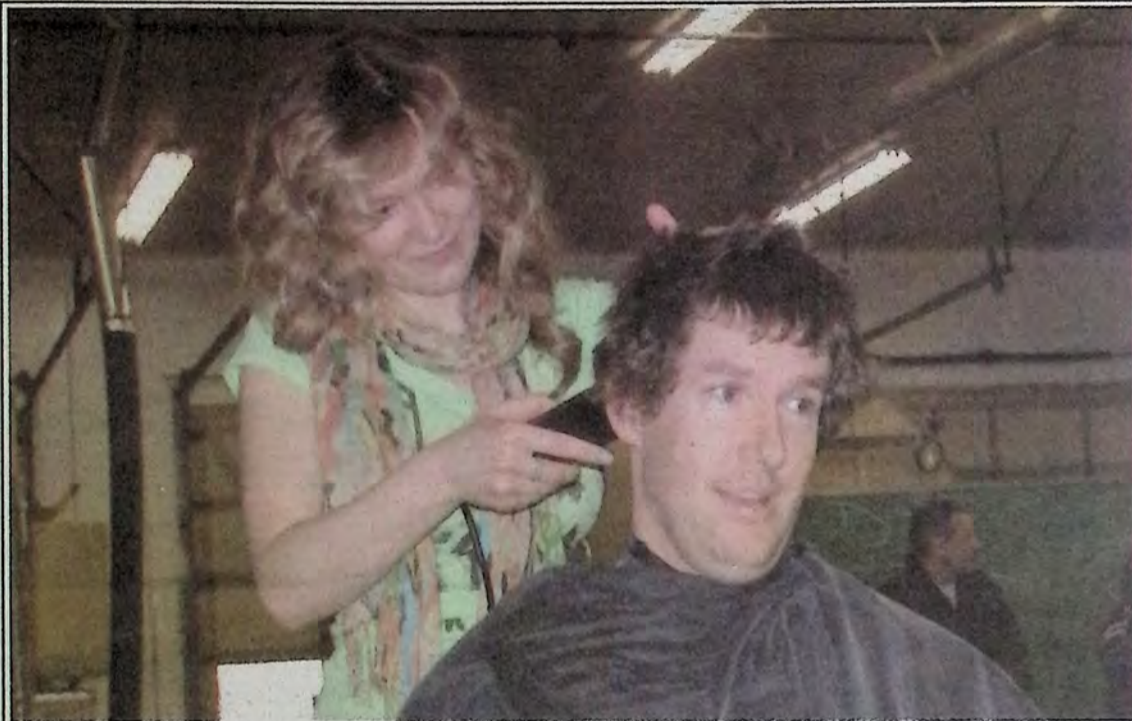

- Ingredients:**
- 2 cups coleslaw blend – 500 mL
 - 1/4 cup chopped green onion – 60 mL
 - 1/4 cup coleslaw dressing – 60 mL
 - 8 oz fresh button mushrooms – 250 g
 - 1 onion chopped
 - 3/4 lb lean ground beef – 375 g
 - 1 tbsp canola oil – 15 mL
 - 1 pkt Mushroom Seasoning Blend – 5 g
 - 3/4 tsp salt – 4 mL
 - 1/2 tsp pepper – 2 mL
 - 1 cup tomato sauce – 250 mL
 - 3 tbsp brown sugar – 45 mL
 - 3 tbsp cider vinegar – 30 mL
 - 2 tbsp Worcestershire sauce – 30 mL
 - 4 whole-wheat hamburger rolls

Method

- Toss the coleslaw with the green onion and dressing until well combined; set aside. Place the mushrooms and onion in a food processor fitted with a metal blade. Pulse until finely chopped. Add the ground beef and pulse until well combined.
 - Heat the oil in a large nonstick skillet set over medium heat. Add the mushroom mixture and seasoning blend. Cook for 10 minutes or until browned and the liquid has evaporated. 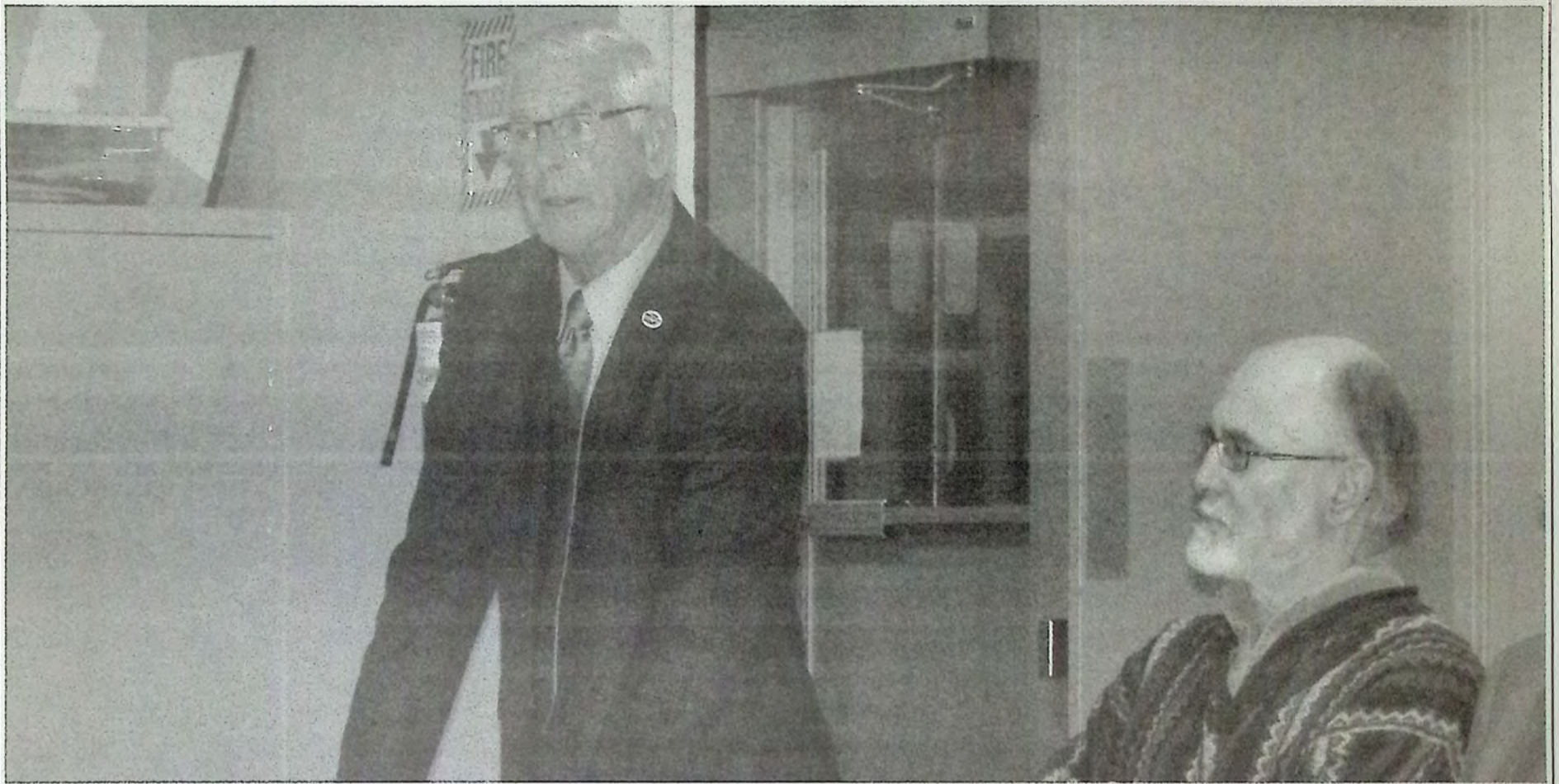

Saving Downtown Princeton...

...An Ongoing Series by George Elliott

The Town of Princeton has announced its 2014 Priority List.

Guess what's missing from it?

There is no mention whatsoever about efforts being made to save downtown Princeton and the local economy.

Days before they made the announcement I asked a question at a sub-committee meeting I was at about how much work we were doing on behalf of the Town of Princeton. The conversation revolved around issues we were working on related to the branding and marketing of the industrial park.

I pointed out that we were saving the Town of Princeton at least ten-thousand dollars which would have been spent to pay a consultant of some kind to come up with the things we were in a small office in downtown Princeton.

Don't get me wrong, as I've stated all along, the smartest thing the Town of Princeton did was to step

in, pull together local business owners and operators and let us work out the problems. After all, those of us directly affected by the sagging local economy should be the most interested in fixing the situation if we want our businesses to thrive.

So I don't really mind that a group of about ten business owners and operators are doing all the work to save the local economy.

What bothers me is that it doesn't rate even a mention as a priority of the Town of Princeton's 2014 plan.

I want to say that upgrading aging infrastructure, going to court over cement blocks on a dike and urban deer concerns are more important than fixing the local economy but I'm having a great deal of trouble finding that place.

I think it may be because I'm a bit frustrated with how long it's taken to get to where we are with all the committee and sub-committee work. Again, I have to state that

from what I've seen and heard out of the sub-committees, a lot of good work is being done.

Part of me wants to say Town Council has done a great job of shutting downtown business owners and operators up by putting us to work while another part of me wants to thank them for putting us to work.

I have such a strong feeling that this will soon become an election issue.

End of rant and time to shift gears.

The Town of Princeton has a document identified as the Official Community Plan, or OCP for short.

In the OCP, Section 2, is something called 'Vision and Guiding Principles' where the vision (Section 2.1) clearly states Town Council's goal is "to ensure ongoing health of the community through fundamentals such as a thriving economy, residents meaningfully engaged in decision making, the availability of medical ser-

vices, environmental sustainability and high quality of life."

It further states that Town Council's intent is to "Foster a Healthy Community."

The document is dated September 2008.

Is the Town of Princeton following this vision?

I have to say I believe they are.

When you consider how lofty a goal it is to shoot for building a healthy community there is no way it can be accomplished in one election term. In fact, it appears to me to be an ongoing project that will take many years to accomplish and will also require continual tweaks along the way to address changes in the community that will have an effect on some of the fundamentals listed.

What has this got to do with saving downtown Princeton?

In defense of the 2014 priorities, upgrading aging infrastructure assists in keeping the community

healthy. Fighting to remove cement blocks on a dike that was once used as a favourite walking path also assists in keeping the community healthy. An urban deer management plan is also a way to keep the community healthy by looking after area residents who have been terrorized by the animals.

These are all important ways to keep the community healthy and I see saving downtown Princeton as such an important part of the equation.

Hopefully you do and in order to do your part in helping us all achieve the goals set out in the Town of Princeton's OCP Vision, I urge you to try to spend a few dollars in local businesses. If you need a really affordable idea, stop into my office. The News Leader only costs a buck and believe it or not, even that loonie assists local business because we'll end up spending it somewhere else downtown.

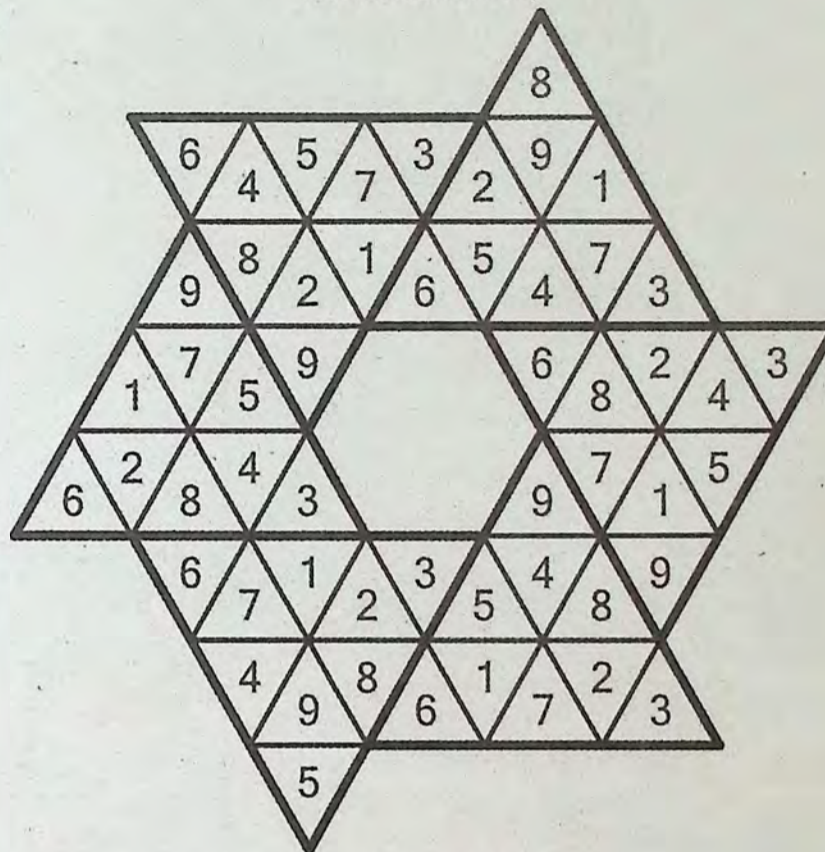

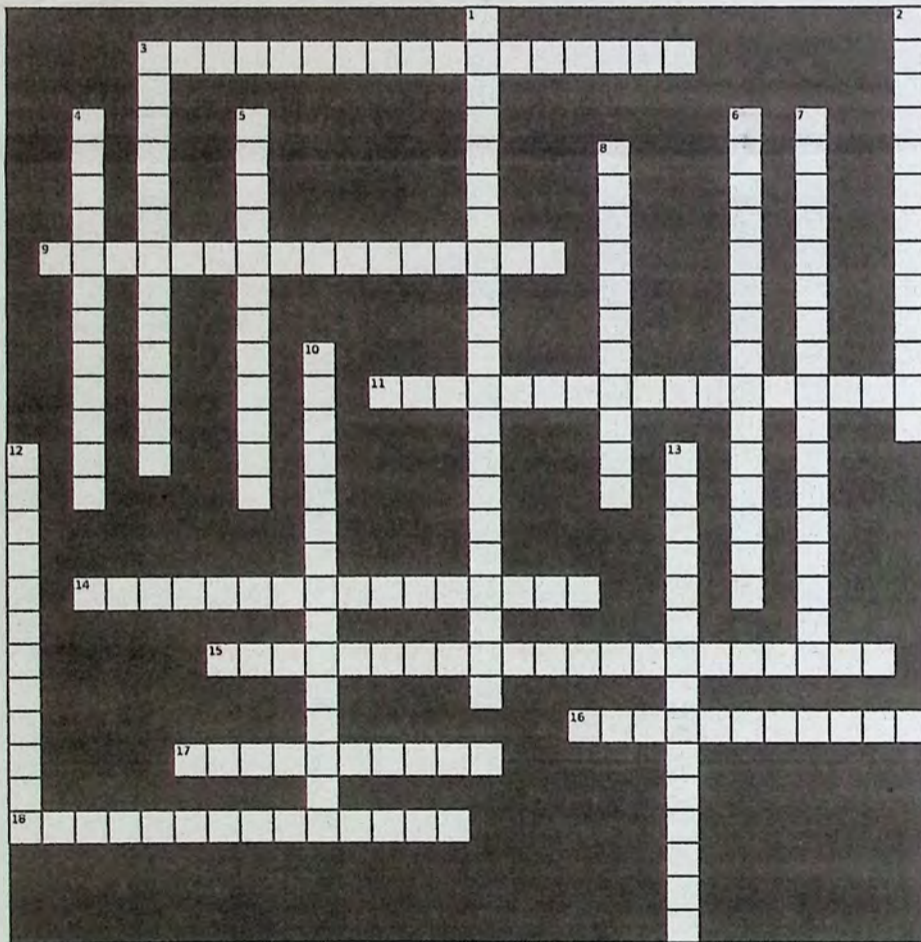

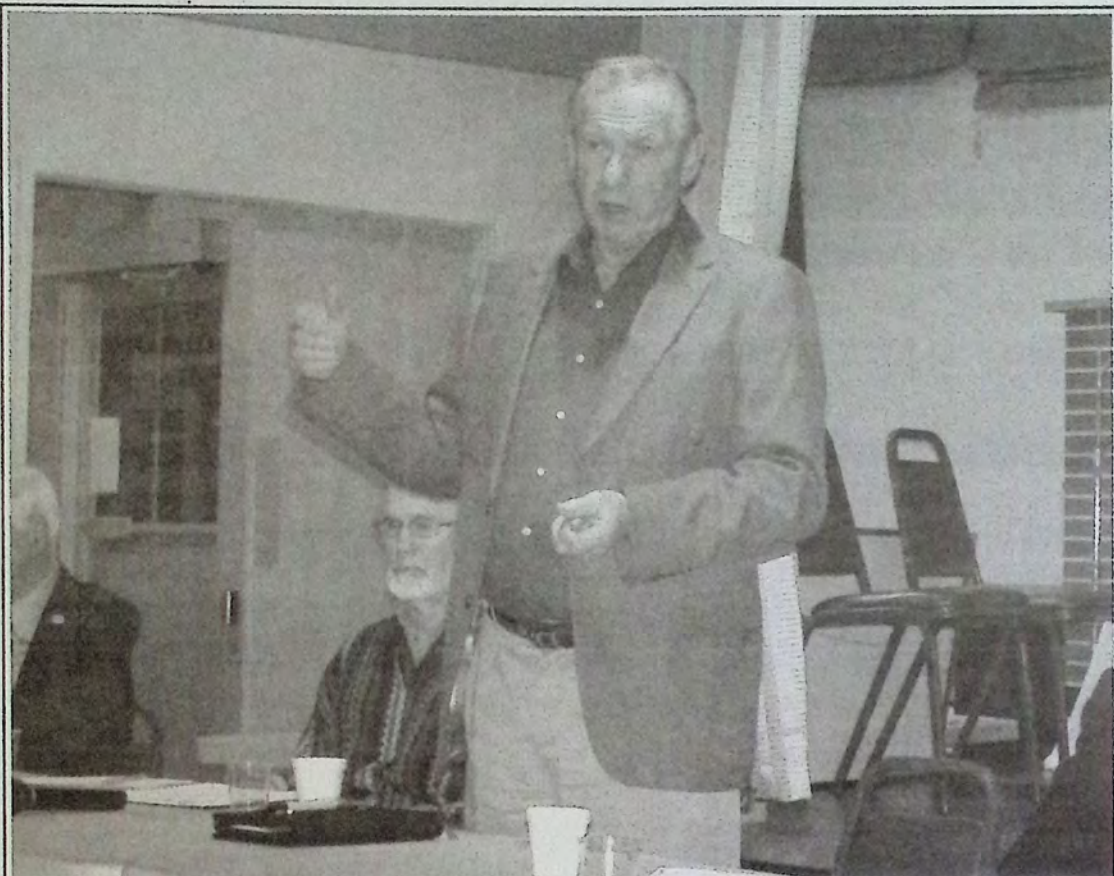

Armitage added that work is planned for Old Hedley Road near the Weyerhaeuser mill and that blocked river dikes have turned into a legal battle the town intends to win for residents. He also touched on the urban deer management plan, pressure to build an indoor aquatic centre and a possible boundary extension to Copper Mountain Mine as upcoming goals.

The mine issue, according to Armitage, could bring another \$400,000 annually to the municipality.

Area H Director Brad Hope reviewed progress made in the past year on a number of projects with a special mention of the local health care situation.

"We were at a major state of

chaos and we have come to a minor state of chaos."

Changes to lighting at the PXA grounds and Princeton Arena along with a pump replacement at Missezula Lake have cut utility bills at each location by about 50% which Hope used as examples of how a small amount of change can return larger benefits.

"So we can start making that small bit of difference."

Other recent projects in Area H include a community hall built above the Osprey Lake Fire Hall, a new Fire Hall at Erris and an addition to the Eastgate Fire Hall with plans for a new Fire Hall at Missezula Lake in the works.

Ed Staples, Chair of the Support Our Health Care group, spoke on the local medical situation.

"Although we are not where we

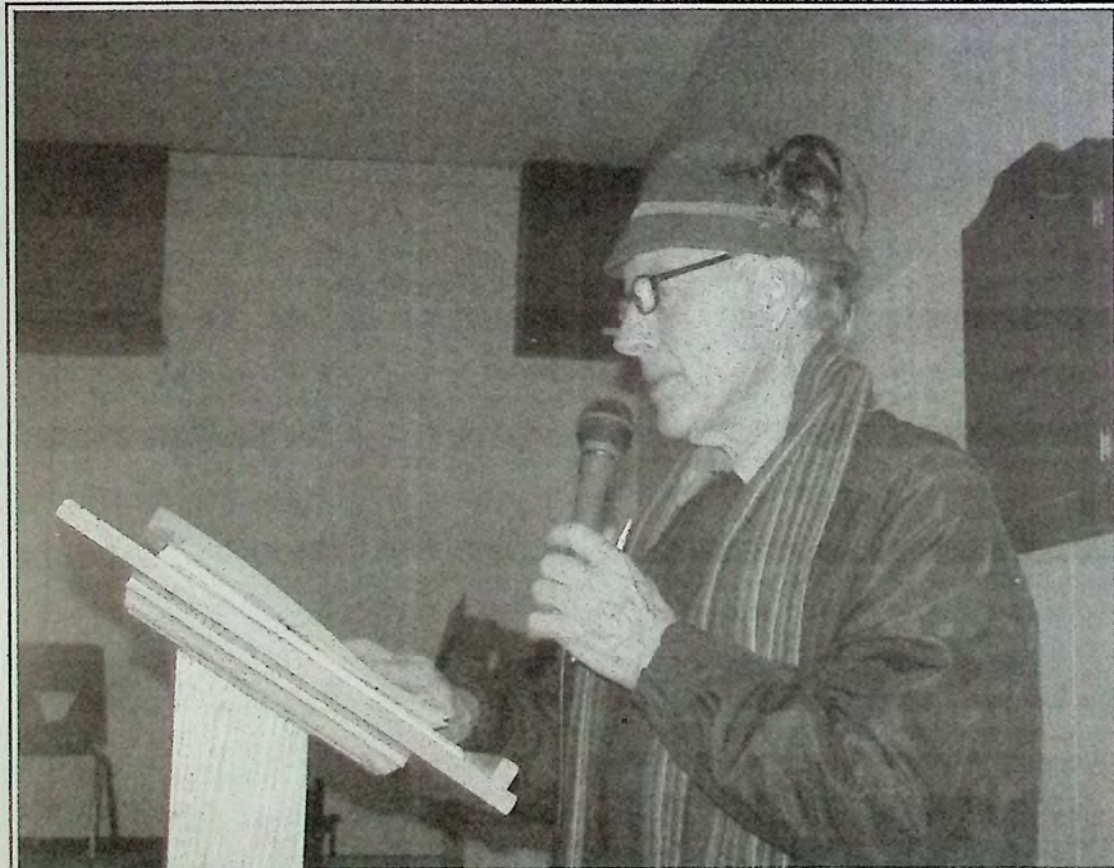
want to be, we have made a lot of progress."

In his review of the past year, Staples said transportation issues are still being addressed to assist those needing to make local and regional medical appointments.

He also used the forum as an opportunity to promote the need for support March 31st at a Rally planned for downtown Princeton. The event, which is part of National Day of Action, is to show residents are concerned about potential changes to medical services in Canada.

"We are concerned that the Canada Health Accord will expire on March 31st with no plan in place to negotiate a new one in the future," Staples explained.

"We all deserve quality health care," he stated.
