Racing Days President Karrie Crucil was enthusiastic and upbeat about what the weekend can become when the News Leader spoke with her.

Little Britches organizing committee member Jamie Payton was as encouraged about how the weekend of events can grow into something bigger to attract families to the area.

Agricultural Fall Fair plans move ahead

The Fair Board met June 24 to solidify plans for the 49th annual Fall Fair to be held September 6 and 7 this year. The exhibitors' booklet should be available next month. Sponsors of the fair have been generous this year, helping to pay for children's activities.

Not many vendors have signed up to date. Anyone wishing a booth or ground space at the fair needs to make arrangements by calling 250-293-1103 for a vendor form. Commercial booths must pay a fee, information booths are available at

no charge.

This year, designated smoking areas will be enforced. Smoking is not permitted in some areas, particularly the grandstand. Persons wishing to smoke will be directed to the refreshment garden.

An "open" stage will be available at the fair. Any individual or group wishing to display their musical talents is invited to participate.

The fair begins with a pancake breakfast on Saturday morning, with an official opening at 11:00 AM. Exhibits buildings will open at

10:00 AM and close at 5:00 PM on Saturday, then open at 9:00 AM on Sunday and close at 3:00 PM followed by the box auction of goods donated by exhibitors.

Shirley Freding, owner of Shirley's Arts & Crafts, has prepared a mural which will be on display on Saturday afternoons at Veterans Square during the summer. This mural is only partially painted. If you would like to add something to the painting, go to the Square and paint an animal into the mural (outlines provided).

A new category has been added: Rose's Crazy Cookies. Use your imagination and come up with some kind of crazy cookie, maybe a monster cookie or a cookie that looks like a fish, or a castle or something you would not normally think of as a cookie.

Another new category is a gift basket contest called "What's in your

Basket?" The idea is to fill a basket with things you created - it could be a basket of baking, jams and jellies, things from your garden, or a mix of things. You do not have to give the basket away, just display it for a chance at a \$50 prize.

Members took time to remember Maryanne Woodford, a great Fall Fair volunteer for decades. Members agreed to honour her memory by naming the award for top exhibitor the Maryanne Woodford Memorial Award.

There are many attractions planned for children, but one attraction will draw people of all ages: the dunk tank. The Fair Board is pleased to announce the Princeton Secondary School Senior Band will be operating the dunk tank during the fair. They are working to earn money for a band trip to be taken next year.

Wayne Hooper Sr. has volunteered

to run a bingo during the fair. He will be using new bingo equipment donated to the fair by the Elks Lodge. This donation is much appreciated. Wayne could use some help during the fair. Volunteers would be appreciated.

The next meeting of the Fair Board is July 22 at 6:30 PM at the fairgrounds office.

PURPOSE: to undertake a number of textual housekeeping amendments to the Electoral Area 'H' Official Community Plan (OCP) Bylaw No. 2497, 2012, and Zoning Bylaw No. 2498, 2012.

Between 2009 and 2012, the Regional District undertook a formal review of the Electoral Area 'H' Official Community Plan (OCP) and Zoning Bylaws and new bylaws were subsequently adopted by the Regional District at its meeting of April 18, 2013.

Through the day-to-day use and application of these bylaws over the preceding year, a number of potential amendments have been identified and which would address and/or clarify such things as typographical errors, omissions, etc.

The amendment bylaws also propose to re-introduce residential and commercial uses at Headwater Lakes in accordance with what is currently permitted by existing Crown land leases.

Amendment Bylaw No. 2497.03, 2014: proposes to amend the Electoral Area 'H' Official Community Plan (OCP) Bylaw No. 2497, 2012.

Amendment Bylaw No. 2498.04, 2014: proposes to amend the Electoral Area 'H' Zoning Bylaw No. 2497, 2012.

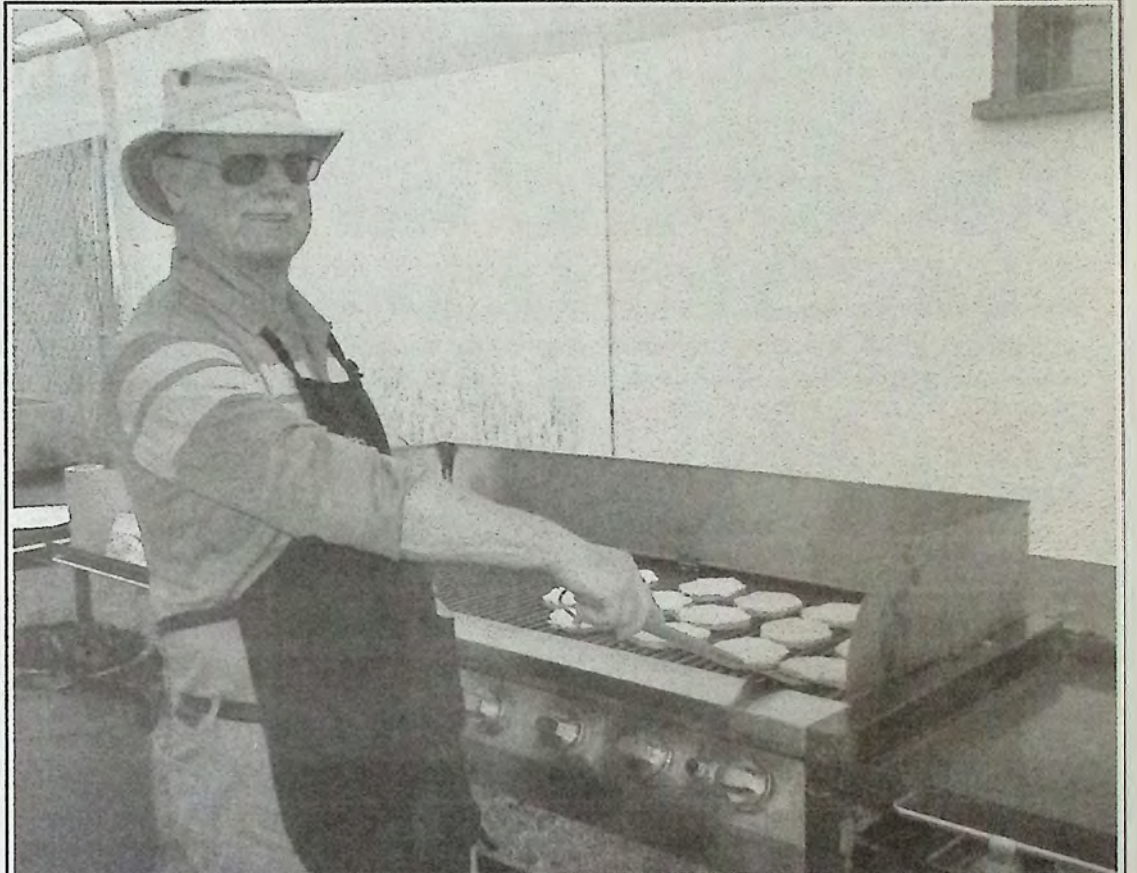

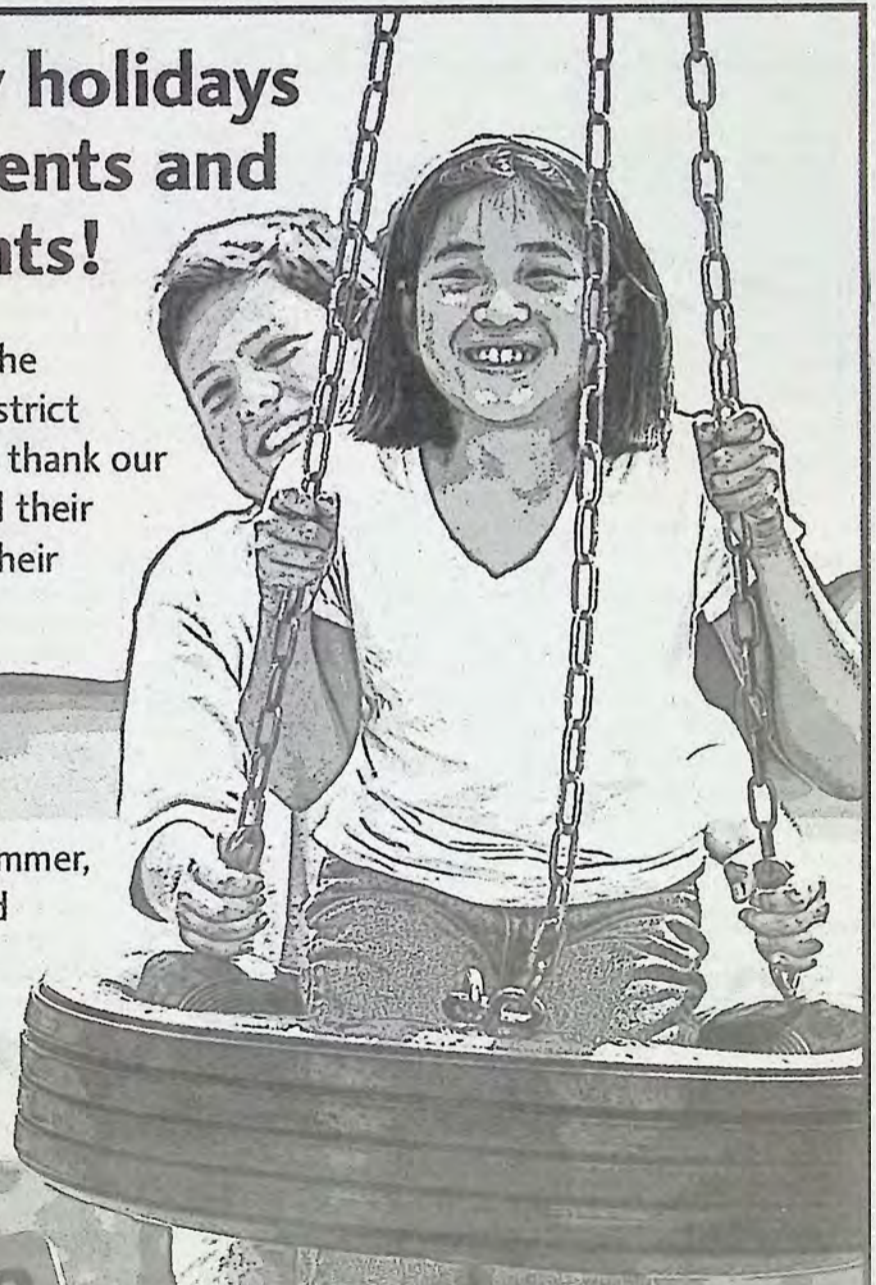

Sir Spamalot?

July 1st not only marked Canada Day this week, it also was the day when Canada's Anti-Spam Legislation kicked into gear. The thrust behind the plan is to protect Canadian consumers from finding their inbox filled with unsolicited e-mail.

I for one am glad to see that.

I wish I was exaggerating when I say this, but between three e-mail addresses I use regularly for work I get anywhere from 200 to 300 e-mails a day. You read that correctly, those figures are daily amounts. On weekends it is higher. Each morning I can spend an hour or so just weeding through e-mails.

The sad part is that the majority of that electronic mail traffic is what would be considered 'spam' or blanket e-mails sent to every single newspaper across Canada with hopes that someone will open it and decide to publish an article on the plight currently faced by sponge fishermen in Newfoundland. You get the idea. Most of what I receive has little, if any significance, to the Similkameen Valley.

I used to try to cut down on the amount of junk I receive in e-mails by 'unsubscribe' to some of it, but I found that some of the sources got wise and carefully hid the unsubscribe option.

Now the Anti-Spam Legislation will solve that problem for me. In the past week I've had a handful of panicky e-mails from places asking me to continue to accept their flood of generic e-mails. For some reason I haven't responded to any of those.

What I find interesting about this whole situation is that the Federal Government will crack down on electronic junk mail but considers the junk mail you receive in your physical mailbox something they like to call AdMail.

C'mon. It's the same thing, unsolicited items targeted at consumers. I see no difference but don't expect to see any changes to the amount of AdMail I receive.

In fact, since some of that junk will no longer fill my inbox on the computer, will that mean it'll start to fill my physical mailbox with junk mail?

I seriously hope not because if that is the case it's time the 'feds' took a look at telemarketing and the businesses that send blanket faxes for a fee. We don't get many of those at our office, but I do expect to see an increase.

In the overall scheme of things I don't mind spam in my inbox. I could do without the high volume, but it isn't hard for me to scroll through them with a finger firmly positioned above the delete button. Sadly, I can't do that with AdMail.

Letters and E-Mails Received This Past Week

To The Editor:

Keep, the Similkameen River Free Flowing!

If you missed the Forum on Rivers on June 5th, then, you missed some very important information. The comments of one of the speakers, Ken Farquharson, are worth repeating and considering. What he had to say is crucial to the survival of the Similkameen River as a free flowing river.

Farquharson is a professional engineer who worked on the construction of the Mica Dam and at the same time he was engaged in the Columbia Treaty Dams. He is the co-founder of ORC (Outdoor Recreation Council of BC) and the Sierra Club of BC. He worked with local interests to oppose the Shanker's Bend Project which would have flooded the lower Similkameen Valley as far as Cawston and worked to stop the flooding of the Skagit Valley.

The Similkameen River is a free

flowing river, one of three in BC. We need to put a high value on our remaining free flowing rivers. The Similkameen is also an international river, two of its tributaries start in the US and it eventually flows into Washington State and joins the Columbia. Hence, it is part of the Columbia River Basin.

Proposals for dams on the Similkameen have been numerous, starting in 1920 until the present. Development never occurred because essentially the idea (power generation) was not feasible, but now the reason is different. It is all about the water storage, and this is how Fortis Generation hopes to make its profit. Forget flood control and power generation, the new focus is DOWNSTREAM BENEFITS!

Fortis has already approached Washington State Department of Ecology for a contract whereby they would conduct a feasibility study on the storage and release of water that

would benefit American interests, and the Department of Ecology has allotted Fortis \$1.6 million dollars to conduct this study.

American agricultural interests stand to gain big time. None of these benefits, however, are for the people of BC. Fortis will control the river and every time Washington or Oregon needs water, it will be released from the dam on the Similkameen working in conjunction with the Enloe Dam located between Nighthawk and Oroville.

What might you ask is the provincial government doing? Apparently, nothing.

It has taken no interest not even on Downstream Benefits! It took no action in the Shanker's Bend Affair and appears to be taking the same sort of attitude toward this project.

The question begs to be asked, "How can a Canadian company control a Canadian River, a CROWN RESOURCE, and negotiate with a foreign country without the provincial government involvement? How can we as citizens allow this to happen? There is a need for action!

What Do You Fear?

An elderly couple living in a local rural area several years ago kept two loaded rifles in their house at all times, and if a stranger came to their door, a loaded rifle was within arms reach. This couple was among my family members, and I thought two old people, one nearly blind and the other needing a cane to walk, were a hazard to themselves and others. I tried to persuade them to leave the rifles unloaded and locked up. They were adamant they had to be alert and protect themselves at all times, but especially after dark.

Why did they fear strangers coming to their door? They told me about home invasions of elderly people. They had seen it more than once on television, and they saw it as a real threat.

I agreed they should be cautious about who they welcomed into their home, but assured them it was highly unlikely they would be assaulted

in their home. Nonetheless, they believed the television news reports, and they were scared.

Television news reports tell us about the rare events. If home invasions of elderly people are reported six times a year, they are likely to be reports from far and wide across our country. To live in an armed camp, afraid of any stranger who comes to your door, is an example of how the major media feeds our fears.

The combined homicide and attempted murder rate last year in Canada was 2 per 100,000 residents. If you live in Nunavut or Northwest Territory, the rate is much higher, 15 per 100,000.

You are more likely to die in a motor vehicle accident than in a homicide, unless you live in Saskatchewan. I don't know why they have a much higher rate of motor vehicle deaths than the rest of Canada. The average rate of motor vehicle deaths was 6.5 per 100,000 in 2010, a fairly consistent rate.

If you have a death in the family from other than old age and disease, it is more likely to be from suicide, if you look at the national average of 11 per 100,000. In other words, if you look at the statistics, you are more likely to kill yourself than be killed by anybody else. This is especially true if you live in Nunavut or Northwest Territory. It is even more likely if you are between the ages of 40 and 49. The highest rate of suicide in Canada is among men over 80 years old.

The reason so few people worry about suicide rather than homicide is due to the fact that suicides are generally not reported on television news unless the suicide victim is famous. Otherwise, it is not reported to the news media by police and is regarded as a family tragedy but is not regarded as news.

If the news media reported the highest rate of suicide was among men over 80 and anybody in their forties, and if the news media reported the highest homicide and suicide rates are in the far north, would our perspective change?

The news media recently reported a few facts about a horrible crime - child sexual exploitation. Those who appear in court, some 34 of them in British Columbia, will have their names made public. When those court appearances flood the television news, will parents become more fearful? I expect they will, and they will be far more vigilant about who associates with their children. However, those people indulging in sexual exploitation of children have been doing this for years, in secret for the most part. Exposing this activity on television news will seem to make it more real, and more to be feared, although it was there all the time.

We have to be careful about what we fear. We need to be cautious of what is likely the greatest threat to us, not the fear generated by a few sensational news reports. Just because a school bus crashed in Wisconsin does not mean your child should not ride in a school bus. Just because 86 people died in a train crash in India does not mean you should never ride on a train. The news media, particularly television news, throws tragedies at us daily, tells us every crime committed, including crimes committed against animals.

Developing a sensible perspective is important. We need to remember that 99,998 out of 100,000 residents were not murdered nor did anyone attempt to murder them. We need to remember that 99,993 out of 100,000 Canadians did not die in a motor vehicle accident. We need to remember that only 34 out of British Columbia's three million residents have been identified as sexual exploiters of children. The fact is this: most Canadians are decent, law-abiding citizens who try hard to do the right thing. We live in a nation where we have little to fear.

PXA reviews situation

The Town of Princeton is working with Princeton Exhibition Association (PXA) to provide funds to meet PXA needs for 2014. Walt Halipchuk was appointed Chair of the Budget Committee to prepare a review of income and expenses in order to prepare a 2015 budget to present to Town Council. This year's expenses include some outstanding commitments for completion of the grandstand project. No new projects will be undertaken this year.

A steel silhouette of John Bey was shown to members. This silhouette was created to join those of Stan Thompson and Peter Ruoss on the Memory Wall at the fairgrounds. The silhouette was unveiled by members of the Bey family on June 28.

PXA President Paul Bedard shared his concerns about problems arising from people placing horses in stalls without informing him. Bedard said the horses simply arrive and leave without notice, and no rental dues have

been paid. He told members how important it is to respect the need to keep the Barn Boss informed.

An ongoing problem has continued, despite notices posted in the barn area: dogs are running loose, and at least one dog has caused a problem with horses. It was noted that it is against the law for a dog to chase or harass livestock. All dogs entering the fairgrounds must be confined or be on a leash.

Reports of ATV's operating within the fairgrounds property is another concern. No unauthorized vehicles are permitted on the grounds and such vehicles are subject to trespass laws.

Princeton Lions Club has had a shipping container on the fairgrounds to be used as a storage facility. The club is folding and has donated the container to the PXA, effective in July. The PXA is pleased to accept the donation and will use it to store Halloween equipment. Another local group has asked to share the storage space and this request is under consideration.

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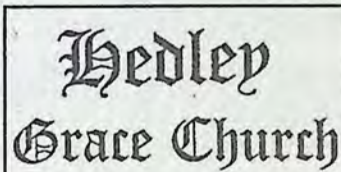

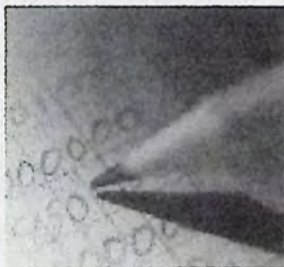
Keremeos - Cawston - Olalla

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Saddles 'n' Spurs

Don was a city cop that I had met some years before moving to 100 Mile House and he was a city man through and through. While visiting me on the ranch we decided to go for a good long walk. It was early evening and we went

beyond our ranch onto the adjacent ranch and came out of the bushes into a huge meadow. We were walking along when we spotted a herd of horses off to our right. There were about fifteen of them but about half mile away.

Don had never had anything to do with horses at all and horses, as curious as they are, spotted us about the same time that we saw them. They all spun around and were watching us as we continued on our way and then took off toward us at a full gallop sending up a dust cloud behind them.

Don was terrified! He ran behind me as quickly as he could, wrapped his arms around my shoulders and tried to jump on my back thinking perhaps I was going to save him.

He said, "They're gonna kill us!" I said, "Just stand here and wait, when they get about fifty yards from us, they'll slam on their brakes and turn away because we're not running away!"

This tough cop walks through the worst dark alleys and ugly places in Vancouver and he's afraid of horses? Mind you, he usually packs a gun! Just as I said, the horses got about one hundred feet from us, came to a full stop snorting and turned away. He felt safe then and headed into the trees and back to the ranch.

It was starting to get dark and I heard a deer take off jumping through the woods and once again, he climbed on my back to rescue and protect him! Would you believe it!

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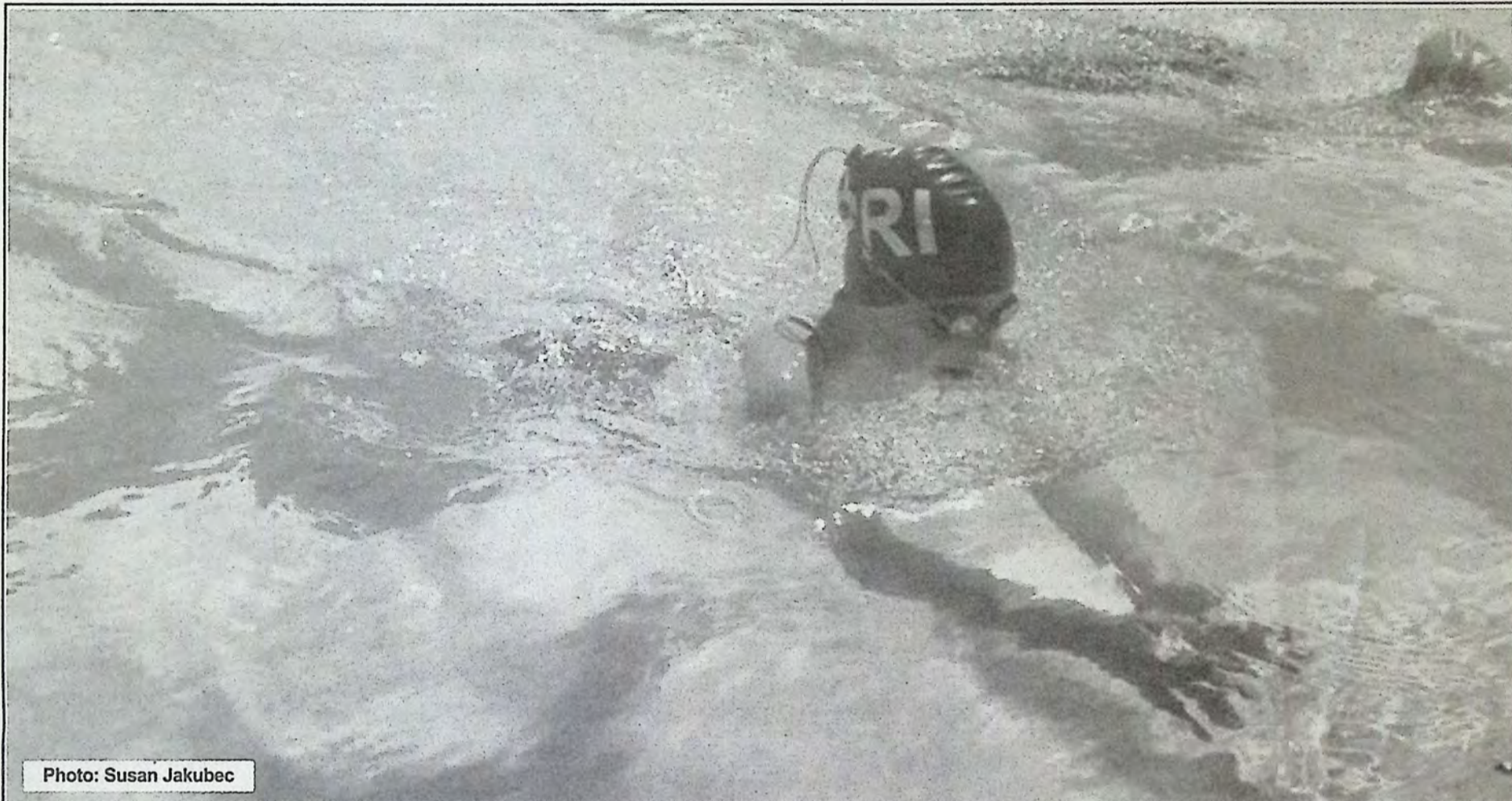

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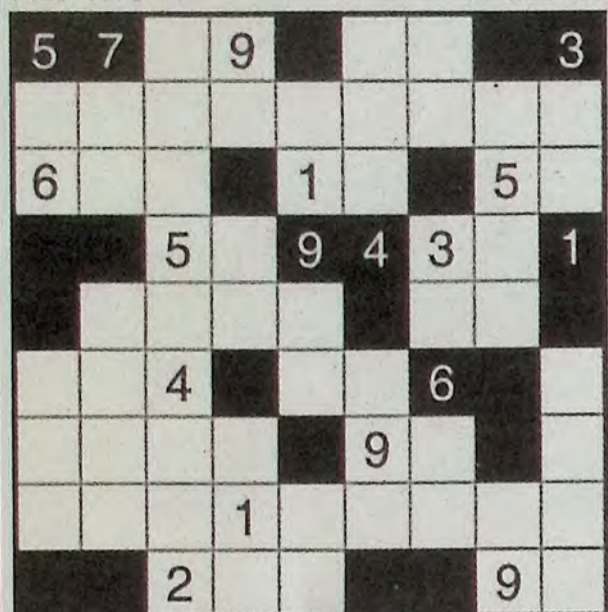

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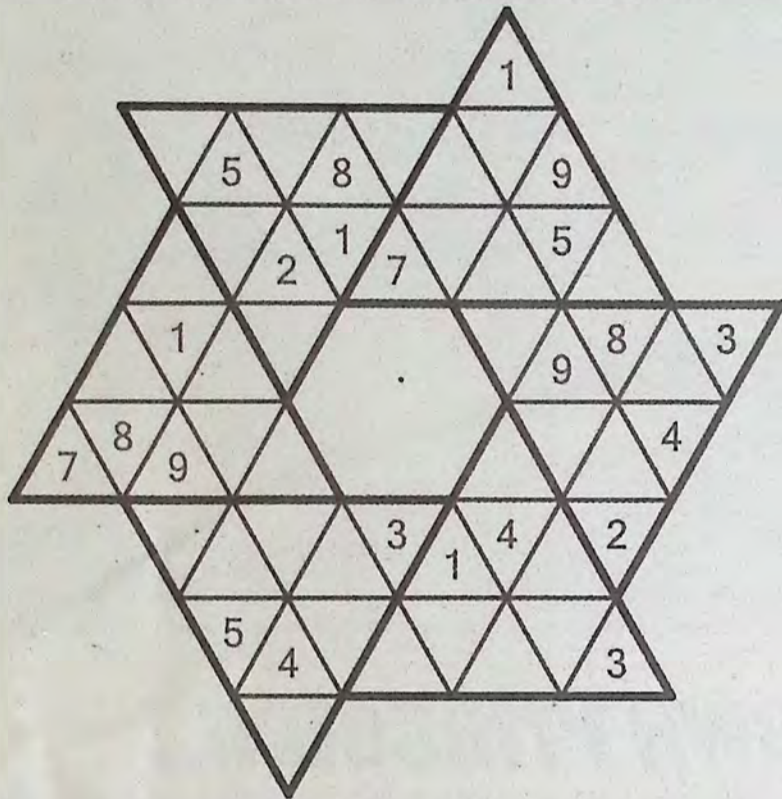

HOSHI SUDOKU - About The Puzzle

Sudoku - also known as "Number Place" - is a logic-based, combinatorial number-placement puzzle. The aim of Sudoku is to enter a number from 1 through 9 in each cell of a grid, most frequently a 9x9 grid made up of 3x3 subgrids. Each row, column and region must contain only one instance of each number. This Sudoku variant is called "Hoshi Sudoku". It contains six large triangles. The numbers 1 to 9 must be placed into the cells of each large triangle. Every line of any length - even uncontinuous - must contain every number not more than once.

The loss of live horse racing with pari-mutuel wagering is a blow to the community. Like it or not, the crowds that swarm Princeton on Racing Days weekend are mostly here to bet some money and consume some alcohol. Sure, there are a number of other activities that piggyback on the main event, but in the years I have lived here the betting at the track magnet has always been the main attraction.

I spent many years as Racing Days President and it was during one of my terms that I had to announce the event was changing from two days of racing to a single afternoon. At the time we thought it was going to kill the local economy and I'm sure those fears were valid but, as we often do in a small town, we adapted the event to a place where one day of live horse racing was still the big draw.

Looking back on it, I'm so glad that the community banded togeth-

er to keep the event alive even though it was cut in half by factors completely out of the hands of local organizers.

This past weekend is not the first time that live horse racing (with organized betting) did not happen at Sunflower Downs. A few years ago there were a couple of summers racing did not occur and local community groups joined forces to try to save the major celebration weekend. It did not attract the crowds it used to, but the events did do reasonably well.

The Racing Days Association has indicated live 'sanctioned' horse racing is likely a thing of the past in the BC Interior. This means there is an excellent opportunity to rebuild the annual Racing Days Weekend and turn it into a new celebration. Most of the elements are already in place with a parade, downtown activities, and events at Princeton Fairgrounds, the annual Mixed Golf

Tournament, school reunions and many other smaller parts of the puzzle.

I have no idea what the big picture is but maybe the parts that do most of the attracting can help. A conversation with a reader in my office last week may have produced an idea worth exploring. When you mix alcohol and betting what have you got?

A casino.

The Princeton Rotary Club used to run a casino for years as part of Racing Days weekend and it was without a doubt their largest fundraising event of their annual calendar of events. With the recent changes to liquor licensing of 'festivals' there could be a door that just opened making it a lot easier for the newly formed (my suggestion) Racing Days Weekend Celebration Committee to provide the access to alcoholic beverages at many venues around the community hosting

events as part of the newly revitalized Racing Days Weekend. The key to this is to have the smaller events downtown.

All you have to do to see how something like this works is watch the Princeton Traditional Music Festival. They are a decidedly non-alcoholic event, but they typically have three venues with hourly activity. Some of the performers provide impromptu 'static' performances in the middle of Vermilion Avenue.

A casino setting in downtown Princeton with tents located at key locations providing various games of chance could satisfy the need for visitors to gamble on that weekend. Two mini beer gardens in the downtown core near those casino tents would address the other main attraction. If the Racing Days Weekend Celebration Committee pooled together volunteer resources, with everyone helping on all events,

including a downtown pancake breakfast, the fundraising opportunities are staggering.

How does this save downtown Princeton?

First, it puts the celebration focus on the retail core of the community. It also puts the onus on downtown businesses to put together special events of their own in the form of sales and in-store specials to capture the 'captive audience' downtown. Second, with the crowd of visitors in the downtown core instead of at Princeton Fairgrounds you eliminate the complaint that once races start the downtown is dead.

As much as I'd rather see something other than alcohol and gambling be the focus of Racing Days weekend, it is foolish to ignore the power those two elements have in attracting people to local events. Since they already work, why not make it work even better to benefit the entire downtown?

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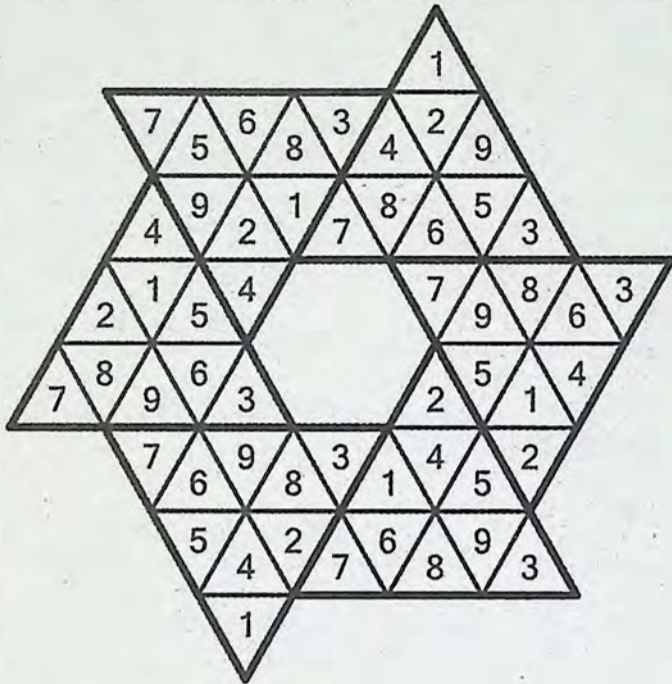

Women Creating Change Project

I had the pleasure of meeting recently with Ann Godderis and Jan Morton, two of the coordinators of the Trail and area Women Creating Change project. Ann and Jan presented me and my staff with an overview of this initiative, a partnership between the Greater Trail Community Skills Centre and the Trail Family and Individual Resource Centre Society (Trail FAIR).

We started out by watching a powerful DVD called Photo Voice that was assembled from photos taken by a group of eight Trail women living in poverty. Each woman's voice gave examples of the kind of barriers that they encounter in their daily lives: lack of affordable child-care, transportation and housing;

provincial social service policies that inhibit personal initiative; and a lack of hope for their and their children's future. The DVD was a bleak reminder of how far we still have to go as a society to ensure access to essential services for all families, regardless of their makeup or income level. Jan and Ann then spoke about the aims of the Women Creating Change project and the work that has been done so far. The goal of the project is not to try to solve societal inequities on a large scale, but rather to address some of the specific conditions that prevent women in the Greater Trail region from entering sustainable, non-traditional employment fields. These include: affordable education, career planning and skills training; living wage employment opportunities; and affordable community services.

The project researchers looked at a variety of topics to gain insights into the realities of women who live in the project region. Their findings gave the Women Creating Change team a snapshot of the social factors that may support or limit economic security. For example, more than half of the women in the region earn less than \$24,000 annually, as compared to one-quarter of men. One-third of the female labour force works in lower-wage occupations. And for every three female lone-parent families there is one male lone-parent family.

The project organizers devised a

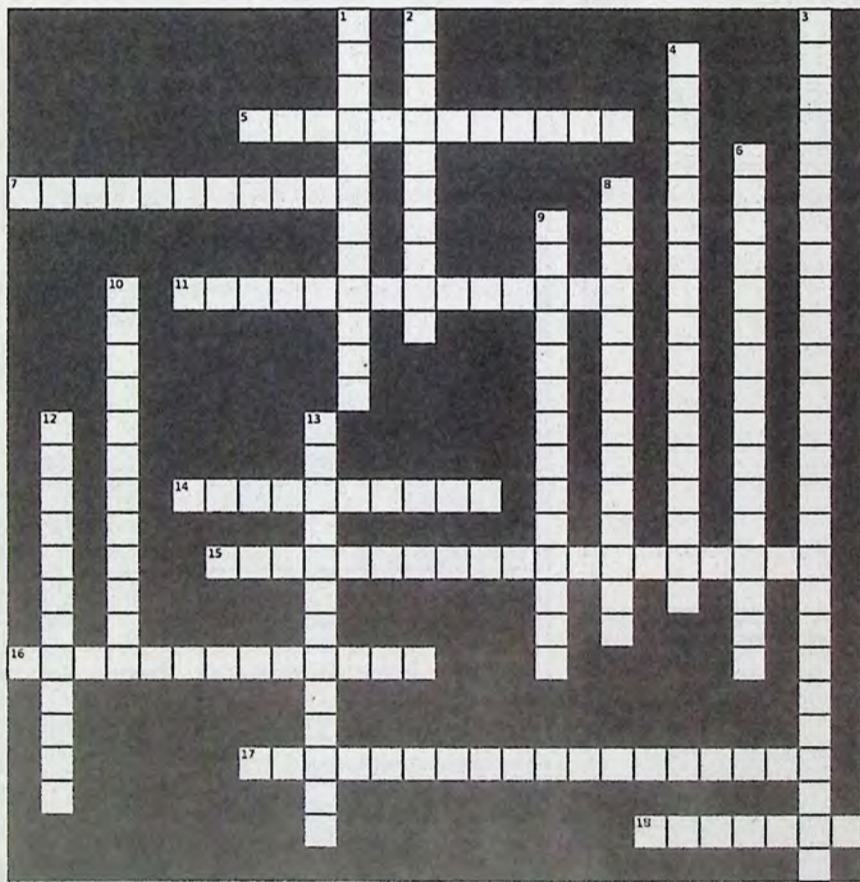
vision statement, the Lower Columbia Community Accord, which articulates the strategies for change that the project hopes to develop and implement. The City of Trail was the first municipality to sign on to the Community Accord, and hopefully others will follow. Building community partnerships with local organizations, businesses and groups is another important step on the path to change. Projecting into the future, the Women Creating Change 20/20 Vision proposes that by the year 2020, "equitable economic opportunities will be available for all women the Lower Columbia region."

There are many small changes that can help to create work environments that better support women. For example, educating employers on the benefits of family-friendly workplaces—flexible working hours, alternate work arrangements, in-house childcare and supportive supervisory staff—will go far to assist women with families to maintain a healthy work-life balance. Many women who enter non-traditional occupations leave them within the first couple of years because of a lack of support. Women Creating Change plans to implement a mentorship program for women in trades and technology that would help to keep women in good-paying jobs longer.

 10-year, \$50 million grant program to support projects dedicated to water conservation, watershed protection, access to clean drinking water, and other fresh water-related issues in Canada and around the world. We are proud and excited this year to be able to present such a significant donation to the Regional District Okanagan Similkameen as the funds will benefit our communities throughout the Okanagan," said Karen Boring-Olsen, Regional Vice President RBC Okanagan.

This multi-agency collaboration insures grant funding will be leveraged to maximize conservation impacts valley-wide, extending the efforts of the existing 'Make Water

Work' campaign delivered by the OBWB's Okanagan WaterWise program. Make Water Work encourages residents to make water work more effectively and efficiently in their yards.
