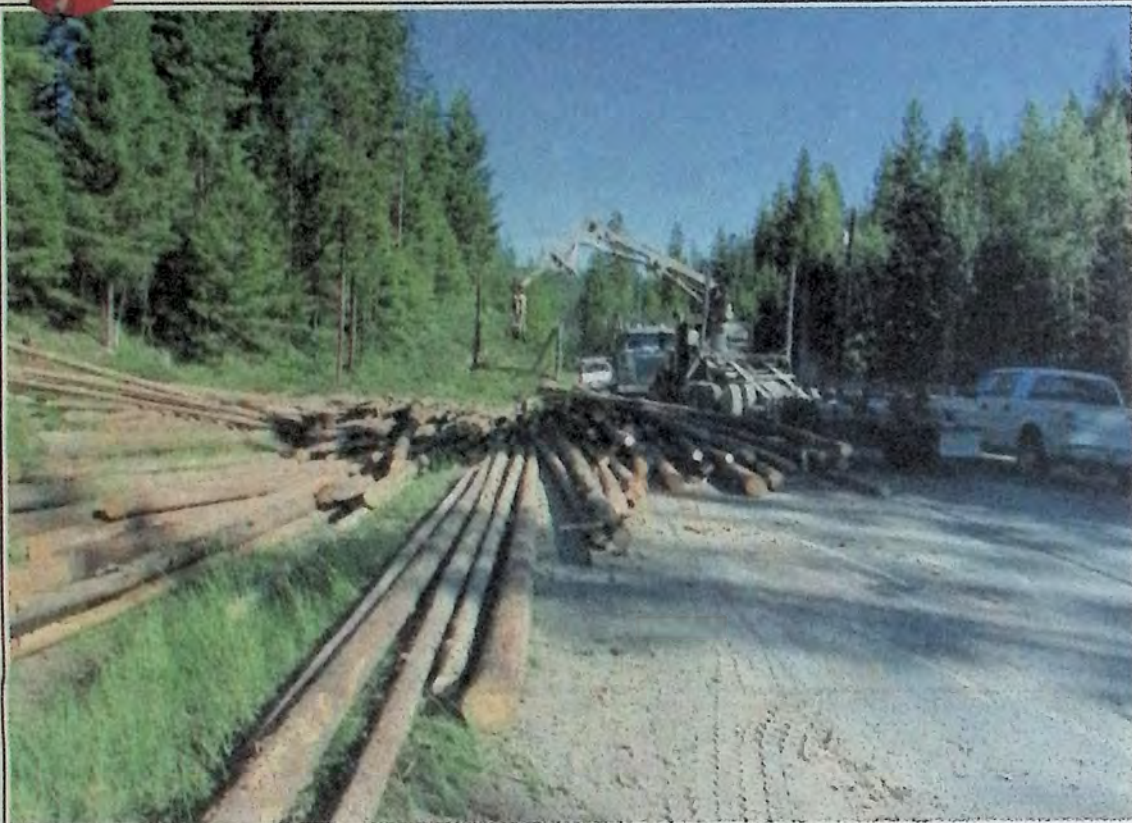

Speeding loggers must slow down

For the past year and a half the residents of the community of Osprey Lake have been trying to get a meeting with the BC Ministry of Forest, BC Highways, Argo Road Maintenance, RDOS Area H Representative, local area lumber companies and contractors that are working the woodlands, Osprey Lake Ratepayers Association and the Hayes Creek Fire Department to discuss the extreme logging and excessive speeding by the Logging Contractors in our area.

On Saturday May 18, 2013 a motion was presented to the Osprey Lake Ratepayers Association's Annual Meeting and was unanimously passed to address the concerns of the residents. I was asked by the Association to meet with BC Highway Representative Dave Swales on Wednesday July 3, 2013 along with Area H Representative Brad Hope.

I traveled with Dave Swales and identified the concerns of the community with regards to the lack of proper road signage along a five kilometre stretch of the Princeton-Summerland Road. We had an agreement in writing to improve the signage and in late July of 2013 Dave Swales and a representative from Argo Maintenance came to Osprey Lake and mark the roadway for these signs to be placed.

Many e-mails and follow up letters have yielded the residents of our community nothing to help the excessive speeding by the logging contractors and no signs have been

placed along this roadway. To date in the past year and a half there have been five logging spills on the road from Osprey Lake to Princeton and two of these have taken place right here at Osprey Lake and we are sure that there have been many more.

This photo (left) only shows half of the problem that we have had to endure over the past seven to eight years. If this accident was to have happened on Highway 3 or Highway 5A we know that there would be a police investigation and a report to the Crown on possible charges. We know that there will be no investigation and we don't know when the excessive speed will cause a more serious situation to happen.

Over the past year we have placed thirty "Slow Down" signs along our roadway and the same story persists that there is no way to slow down these aggressive drivers. Surely there has to be a better way to resolve this situation other than to talk to the logging contractors that will talk to their drivers. This problem will not go away unless we the residents of our area have the information and communications from all of the players including the residents of the area.

148 Old Hedley Road, Princeton**PURPOSE:** to undertake a number of textual housekeeping amendments to the Electoral Area 'H' Official Community Plan (OCP) Bylaw No. 2497, 2012, and Zoning Bylaw No. 2498, 2012.

Between 2009 and 2012, the Regional District undertook a formal review of the Electoral Area 'H' Official Community Plan (OCP) and Zoning Bylaws and new bylaws were subsequently adopted by the Regional District at its meeting of April 18, 2013.

Through the day-to-day use and application of these bylaws over the preceding year, a number of potential amendments have been identified and which would address and/or clarify such things as typographical errors, omissions, etc.

The amendment bylaws also propose to re-introduce residential and commercial uses at Headwater Lakes in accordance with what is currently permitted by existing Crown land leases.

Amendment Bylaw No. 2497.03, 2014: proposes to amend the Electoral Area 'H' Official Community Plan (OCP) Bylaw No. 2497, 2012.

Amendment Bylaw No. 2498.04, 2014: proposes to amend the Electoral Area 'H' Zoning Bylaw No. 2497, 2012.

Fortis meter exchange begins

FortisBC's Advanced Metering Infrastructure (AMI) project will begin this fall in the Trail-Salmo area, and is expected to be complete in all regions by the end of 2015.

"Advanced meters open the door for new and exciting options for our electricity customers," said Tom Loski, FortisBC vice-president, customer service.

"For the first time, our electricity customers will have the ability to move to monthly billing and select their own billing date. Advanced meters also help us better pinpoint power outages, meaning a more efficient response."

Online tools that allow customers to see their energy use will be available in the coming months.

Below is the scheduled timeline for meter exchanges:

- Trail-Salmo area - September 2014 to December 2014
- Kelowna - January 2015 to April

2015

- South Okanagan - May 2015 to July 2015

- Similkameen and Boundary - August 2015 to October 2015

- Kootenays - November 2015 to December 2015

FortisBC will notify customers by mail before their meter is exchanged. Customers do not have to be home for the exchange to take place. However, the exchange will require a brief power outage lasting only a few minutes. FortisBC asks that customers leave safe access to their meter, including keeping dogs and other pets away. Once an advanced meter has been installed, customers will receive an information package.

FortisBC will be using advanced meters supplied by Itron, and Corix has been selected to conduct the meter exchanges. These contractors will be easily identifiable and will

carry FortisBC identification.

Advanced meters provide many benefits for customers, and a radio-off option is available for those who have concerns. This option does require a customer to sign-up and agree to the cost-recovering fees approved by the BC Utilities Commission. Customers who choose the radio-off option will receive an advanced meter with the wireless signal turned off, meaning their meter will be read manually.

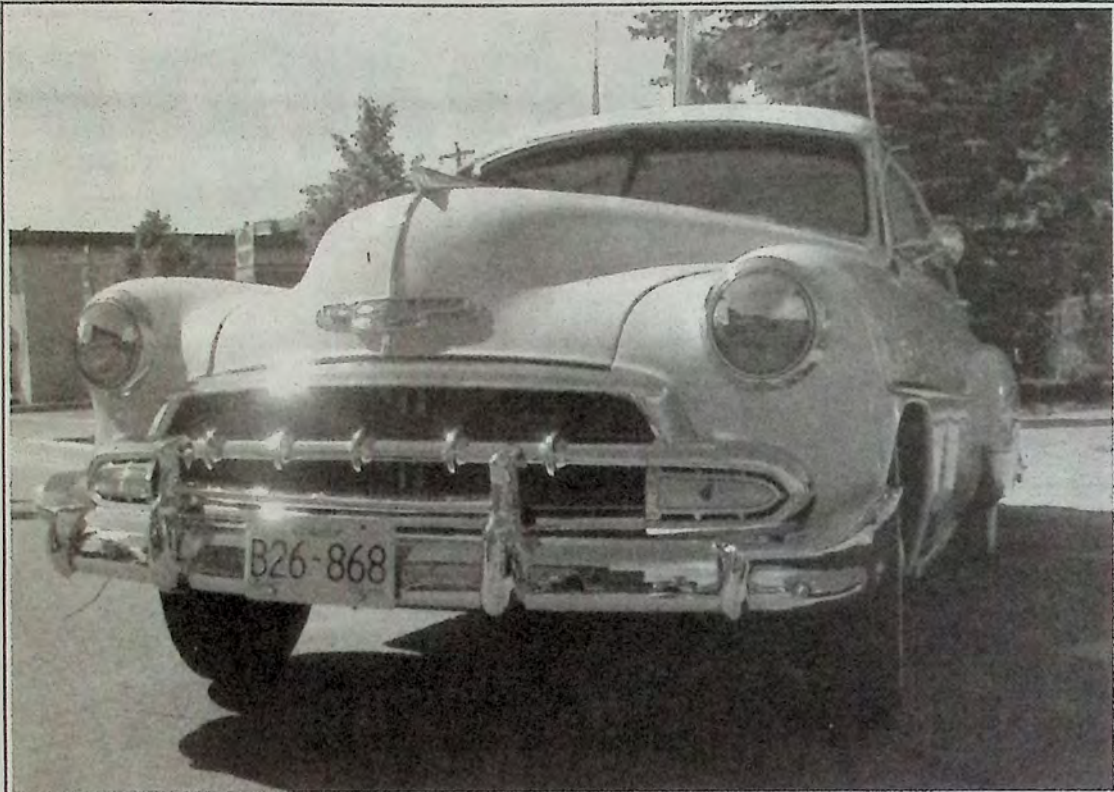

I hope you are as excited and are going to share that hospitality by supporting the new businesses that will come. I also hope you will continue to support the existing local businesses so that we can all move into the future with Princeton full of life and excitement!

We Are Losing People Who Care

Princeton Lions Club is folding. It is a sad thing. After 40 years in operation, there are not enough people to keep it going. What a shame! They did a lot for this community. The Lions built parks, they built the concession building at the fairgrounds, they entertained us with events, and they gave money to many worthy causes.

The Elks Lodge is all but defunct in Princeton after more than 80 years of serving the community. The Elks and Royal Purple joined the war effort 75 years ago and sent comforting things to the men overseas.

The Elks Lodge had a hall they rented for wedding receptions, special occasions, and for a few years, to Community Services for New Beginnings. The Elks Lodge at one time was open most days, had a pool table, sold beer, and put on dances on a regular basis. I remember a Racing Days dance at the Elks Hall. The Elks held a bingo regularly. For years and years, they assisted deaf people and brought a free hearing testing clinic to Princeton nearly every year. Membership dwindled, and those days are gone.

The Rebekah Lodge died out several years ago. This was a group of women affiliated with the

Oddfellows Lodge. The Rebekah Assembly of B.C. provided the funding that clinched the deal to build Vermilion Court. The Rebekahs did a lot in a very quiet way, but as membership dwindled, they had to give up their charter in Princeton.

The Masonic Lodge and Eastern Star are in much the same condition: dying in Princeton.

There used to be a Toastmasters Club in Princeton where people seeking leadership roles or just building self-confidence joined to learn parliamentary procedure and public speaking. Many excellent civic leaders came from that group. Many ambitious people gained stature in a group they belonged to, or on the job, because of the training they received.

People used to say it was the influence of television that caused the decline in membership in these worthwhile organizations. Now people say it is the influence of computers. I disagree with those explanations of why people do not go out to join organizations. I have a television set and a computer, as well as a big house and large yard to care for, and until 10 years ago, I worked full time. I still belong to five active local organizations and donate time and effort to two others.

I still write for the News Leader, although I have been 'retired' for 10 years.

I have come to the conclusion that the reason membership in groups is dying is because people don't care about their community. I know people in my neighbourhood who do not attend any local events. They are simply not interested in being part of a community. I find their attitude quite strange because all of us depend on our community at some time.

I have seen the community rally when a house burned down, or

when a person was ill and needed help not provided by government. There are floods and forest fires and serious snow storms, and we must depend on one another to get through the crisis. That is when being part of a community can not only help, but may save your life.

Recently, I saw a very small group of people put on a weekend of fun for Racing Days. The Racing Days Association has only a handful of members, but they organized a weekend of entertainment for our community. The Chamber of Commerce, Rotarians, Town Council and Princeton Golf Club added to the weekend fun. The Town sponsored the Canada Day celebration with the help of volunteers and talented local musicians.

We will see the Traditional Music Festival take place again, and then the Fall Fair. There are many other local groups, such as the Museum Society, Vermilion Forks Field Naturalists, the Posse and Princeton Minor Hockey, the Figure Skating Club, Crimson Tine Theatre, Kokanee Swim Club, Legion and the Senior Citizens Branch 30 and many others, who contribute their time and energy to enhance the quality of life in our community. I must add local business people, because without their help, many of our events would not be possible.

While all of these things are going on, there is an undercurrent of desperation in many organizations. They lack members, or the members they have are getting on in years and simply do not have the health or energy to carry on. The older members drop out, but are not being replaced, and the few members left are stretched too thin to accomplish very much. As older members drop out, they should be replaced by younger members, but that is not happening.

I fear we are going to lose more of the things that enhance our quality of life if people do not care enough to pitch in and keep our organizations alive and thriving. My cousin in Phoenix, Arizona, is always remarking on all the great things we do in Princeton.

I have not told her these events may not last much longer because there are so few people anymore who care enough about our community to get out and do what it takes.

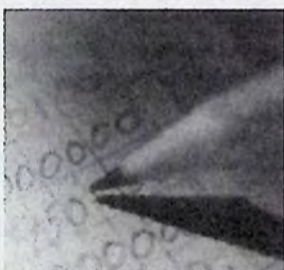

Living Past 100

Which Personality Lives Longer?

Living a long healthy life does not depend solely on eating the right foods, doing the right exercises and taking the right medication. Personality plays a significant role in how long a person lives, and how healthy that person will be even in old age.

People who live the longest tend to be the kind of people who are capable of having loving, trusting relationships, not only with a partner or children, but with friends and relatives. Growing up loved and respected is a foundation for a long life, but even those who have been badly treated can achieve good relationships. They may need counseling, or may find a friend or partner who gives them the support they need, but they can overcome the negative things in their backgrounds.

Research has proven that our immune systems reflect the mental and emotional conditions under which we live. If a person has a positive outlook, is optimistic, and has a group of friends and relatives who offer a measure of love and respect, that person's immune system will be stronger than a person who lives in isolation, is suspicious of everyone, and has no circle of friends and relatives to offer support.

According to a major research project done many years ago, people who are angry and anxious most of the time are likely to suffer from high blood pressure and die of heart disease. The researchers found that people who have an inhibited power drive tend to have high blood pressure. These are power-seekers who are frustrated by not being in a position to exert the power they seek (money, prestige, leadership positions they feel they should have). As these people become older, their anger and anxiety begin to impact their health. The research linked continual hostility, impatience and hard-driving competitiveness to heart attacks.

Hostility was determined to be the core of the problem. Many competitive, impatient people are not hostile, and they live much longer.

Recent research found that a person who has a major temper tantrum, who gets very angry and lashes out at others, is far more likely to have a heart attack. In fact, in those of middle age, the heart attack may occur in just two hours after an angry outburst.

The same research that identified anger and anxiety as unhealthy found that the most healthy individuals are those who are more interested in people than in power. Those who gave priority to relationships, not power, had stronger immune systems and healthier hearts. They maintained relationships that were not full of turmoil, and their lives were not full of drama or chaos.

Those whose need for power is stronger than their need for human connections also suffer more from bouts of every kind of illness, particularly upper respiratory infections such as bronchitis, sore throat and the common cold.

Yes, personality does make quite a difference in health and how long a person lives.

HOSHI SUDOKU - About The Puzzle

Sudoku - also known as "Number Place" - is a logic-based, combinatorial number-placement puzzle. The aim of Sudoku is to enter a number from 1 through 9 in each cell of a grid, most frequently a 9x9 grid made up of 3x3 subgrids. Each row, column and region must contain only one instance of each number. This Sudoku variant is called "Hoshi Sudoku". It contains six large triangles. The numbers 1 to 9 must be placed into the cells of each large triangle. Every line of any length - even uncontinuous - must contain every number not more than once.

Saving Downtown Princeton...

...An Ongoing Series by George Elliott

This week I want to continue with the train of thought I touched on last week.

Last week I mentioned the need for a 'replacement' celebration to fill the Racing Days weekend making use of existing elements.

This time I'd like to expand on why local celebrations are good for the community.

Racing Days is a good example of what a small community can do when times are tough. I seem to

recall that the whole push behind the start of the celebration in the 1960s was to attract visitors to the community, and to foster community pride.

Those are the two main reasons for every single celebration hosted in Princeton and any other community in existence. In the case of much smaller communities there may be one or two events scheduled in a year while medium-sized towns and cities host more with major

centres planning community events monthly and weekly during peak holiday months.

In the case of Princeton, there have always been the 'Big Three', which have for years been the rodeo, Racing Days and fall fair. Other events have come and gone including Snooshing Days, Bill Miner Days as well as some parts of other larger events. Over the years new events came on board including the Show 'n' Shine, Traditional Music Festival and Christmas Light-Up to name a few.

The main reason why you don't see these events getting bigger is manpower. There are only so many volunteers to go around and most of them help organize each of the local celebrations. Another thing that seems to be a problem is a lot of residents either don't go to the events at all or quit going as a result of some issue, conflict or lack of interest after seeing 'the same thing' each

time.

In defense of event organizers, without extra help, you won't likely see much more than you saw the previous year and with the volunteer pool shrinking, chances are more events will be downsized before they are expanded.

If you don't go to local events being hosted in your community, why? When we were in Tonasket for their annual rodeo and parade at the end of May I ended up in a conversation with a local there who asked why we had traveled so far to be in their tiny little town. When I answered his response was, "There was a parade?" I guess he missed all the closures to the main artery downtown that day.

It reminded me of conversations I have had here in Princeton where some residents either don't realize there's a celebration going on or are not interested so it doesn't matter making the road closure or extra

traffic a nuisance.

I do think that there is room for more events and maybe even variations of existing events creating something a little newer from what is already taking place. One example of a variation on a theme was the 'Ginormous Indoor Yard Sale' held at Princeton Arena last month. With the loss of the annual Lions Club Flea Market and Auction an opening was created. The event organizers were also smart enough to survey participants for feedback and will use that to make the event better next time, which I'm sure it will be.

But this takes us back to the problem of manpower. You would think that with the influx of new and younger people moving here, mostly to work at the mine, that many of them would want to give back to the community they are now a part of. I realize that this isn't continued on Page 19

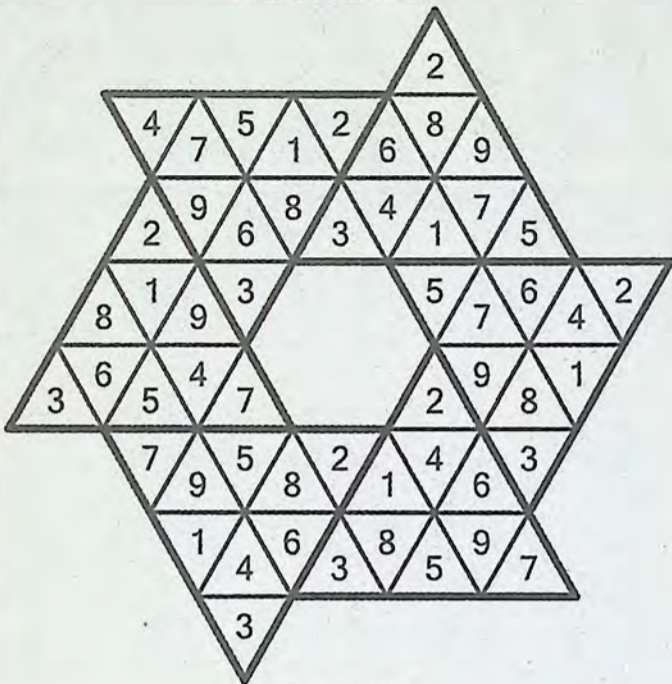

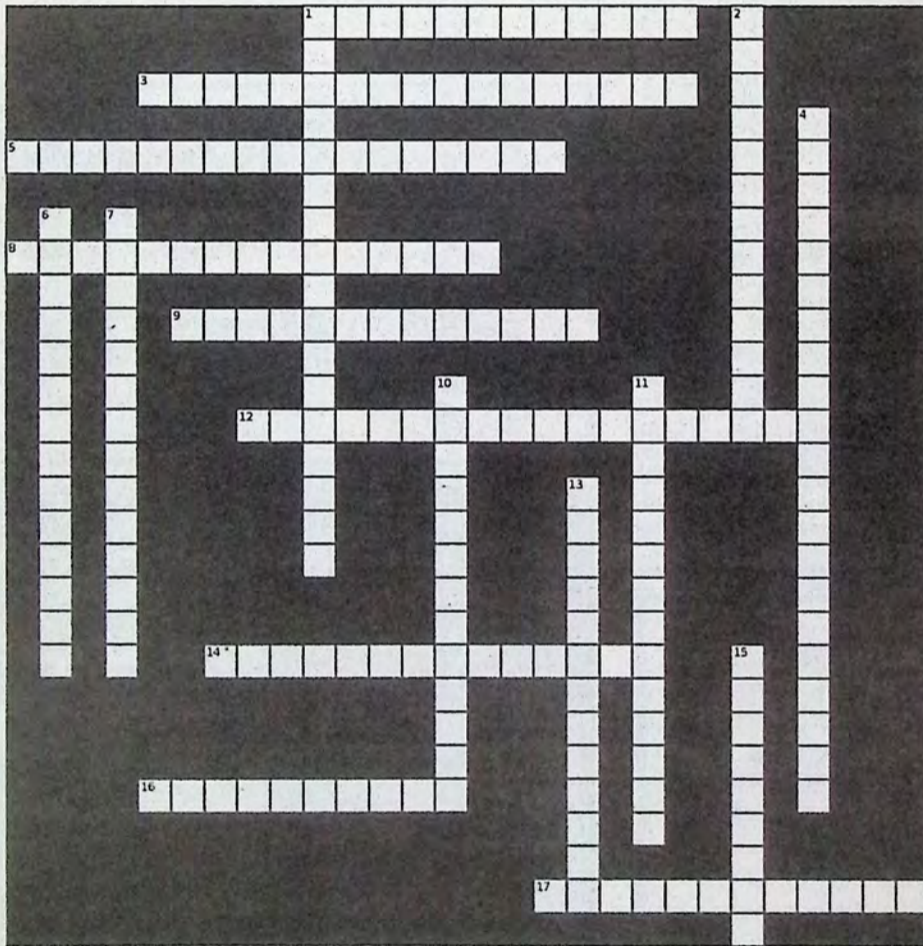

Music Fest next month!

In just five weeks the streets of Princeton will once again be alive with the sound of fiddles, banjos, singing and dancing. The 7th Annual Princeton Traditional Music Festival begins on Friday, August 15th. Come to Veterans' Square at 6:15 PM for the opening ceremony and then kick up your heels to the music of Psycho Acoustic Ceili band and Orkestar S'livovica. On Saturday and Sunday, August 16 and 17 there will be music from 10:00 AM until 6:00 PM right in downtown Princeton. This year features an exciting lineup of new talent together with many familiar faces from past years.

The Traditional Music Festival presents music that comes out of communities where people participate in music-making. The Festival tries to provide this sense of participation by remaining intimate. Performers are close to the audience and invite them to participate by singing along or by dancing. The ultimate participatory experience at the Festival is the Shanty Session under the gazebo in Veterans' Square. Shanties are songs that were sung by sailors on tall ships. The songs helped sailors work in rhythm and gave them extra oomph while raising sails or hauling in the anchor. Shanties were led by a shantymen, an experienced sailor who knew the right

rhythm for each job. Shanties also had simple choruses that were easy to learn and sing so that everyone could join in.

Shanties can be sung only in a group. The Shanty Session at the Festival dispenses with the stage and the microphones and gathers everyone under the gazebo to sing. The gazebo provides almost cathedral-like resonance for all the voices joined together. Each shanty is led by an experienced shantyperson and the choruses are easy to join in on. Being in the middle of so many voices joined together under the gazebo can be a transcendent experience. For many people it is the high point of the Festival.

This year the shanties will be led by many familiar shantypersons from past years as well as some exciting new singers from as far away as New Hampshire and New Zealand. Come and join the singing throng under the gazebo!

The Shanty Session is just one of the events taking place at this year's Princeton Traditional Music Festival. The best thing about is that it's free - no admission is charged. 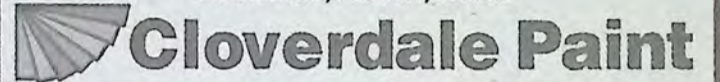

Naturalists hike down by the river

Vermilion Forks Field Naturalists' latest field trip found us down by the riverside, as we traversed the steep slope of Frank and Jean Turner's property, from high hills to valley bottom, alongside the Similkameen River.

Seventeen of us, ranging in age from eight to eighty, made our way down a sandy trail, taking pleasure in the landscape, birds and wildflowers as we walked. We were fortunate enough to have with us Okanagan biologist, Jessica Hobden, an invasive plant special-

ist, and she took the time to identify some of the insidious weeds that have permeated local areas: leafy spurge, sulphur cinquefoil and hound's-tongue are three of these more common plants.

Although their creeping, intertwined, root systems make them

impossible to eliminate by pulling, Jessica showed us specific beetles and fleas that she has introduced to these weeds, insects that feed on and ultimately should eradicate the invasive plants. Another highlight of the morning was spotting a Barrow's Goldeneye with her nine ducklings, swimming single file across a small pond.

Eventually we made our way to the river, viewed the rushing torrent of high, muddy waters, as snow melt continues to contribute to the Similkameen. After trekking back

up the mountainside, we relaxed on bales of hay and were treated to food and beverages - thanks to Frank and Jean for their hospitality!

Our next field trip will take place Saturday, July 12th, when we will hike to the "top of the world" off Hembre Mountain Road, with south Okanagan lepidopterist Dennis St. John, who will educate us on the various butterfly species and their behaviours.

We'll meet at Billy's Restaurant parking lot at 10:00 AM. Please confirm with me at 250-295-7560.



RDOS meeting highlights

Selected highlights from the regular meeting of the Board of Directors of the Regional District of Okanagan-Similkameen held June 5 and June 19.

- The Board of Directors has supported an amendment to the Five Year Financial Plan for the Princeton Riverside Centre roof. After assessment it has been determined that the roof of the Princeton Riverside Centre requires repair.

The Services Partners, being the Town of Princeton and Electoral Area 'H' will contribute \$110,000 for the repairs and School District #58 will fund the remainder.

- The Regional Board adopted Bylaw No. 2664, 2014, the Electoral Area "H" Community Facilities Capital Reserve Fund

Expenditure Bylaw.

In 2009, the Board approved the formation of the Vermilion Forks Community Forest Corporation for the purpose of acquiring and managing the Community Forest Agreement. The Upper Similkameen Indian Band, the Town of Princeton and the Regional District are 1/3 shareholders in the Corporation.

In 2013, the Corporation issued the Regional District \$235,000 in dividends. Prior to the establishment of the Capital Reserve Fund, \$65,000 was distributed.

The Board created the Electoral Area "H" Community Facilities Capital Reserve Fund for the purposes of expenditures for or in respect of capital projects within Electoral Area H.

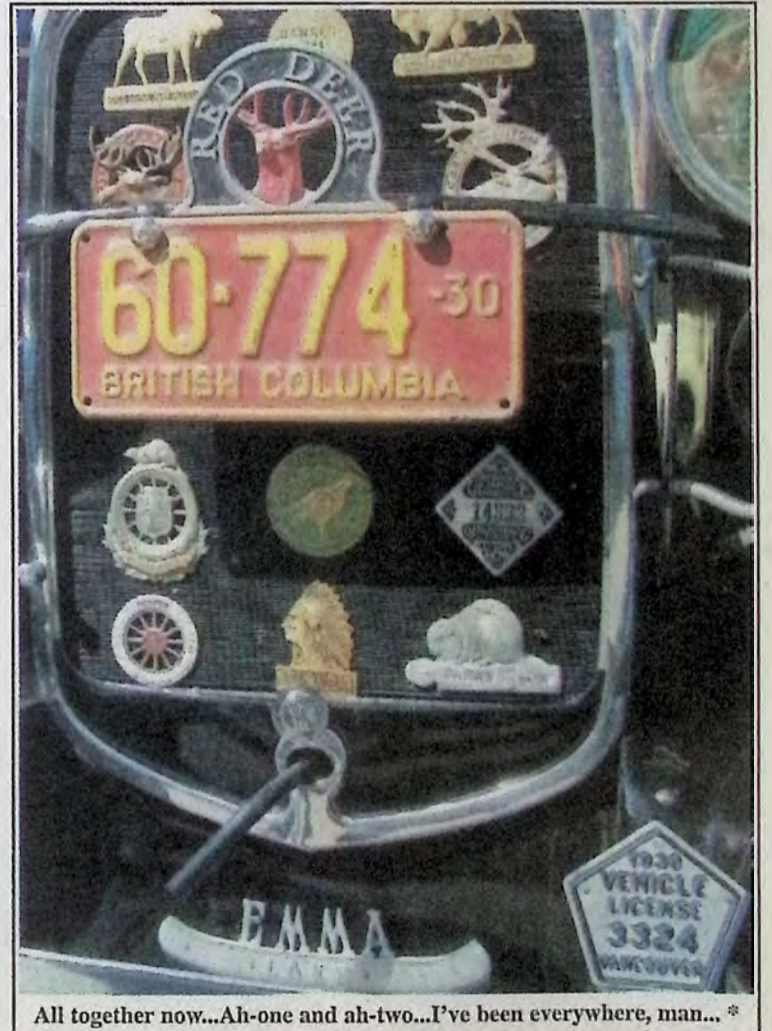
