Town launches program to honour citizens

The News Leader's Dawn Johnson will not be the only person to be recognized by the Town of Princeton for her local contributions.

CAO Rick Zerr told the News Leader last week that Town Council intends to make the act a regular occurrence at public council meetings.

Assuming the Town of Princeton makes a public presentation on a monthly basis they could be hon-

ouring local residents virtually forever and never run out of candidates.

Zerr indicated that a list of potential honourees has been compiled and expects the next person to be recognized for years of community service will take place sometime this month.

The idea of honouring citizen contributions is not a new one in Princeton. For many years in the 1970s and 1980s the Princeton & District Chamber of Commerce hosted an annual 'Citizen of the Year' banquet that celebrated local volunteer contributions.

Over the years many other local organizations have privately celebrated the contributions of volunteers within their organization.

Princeton's Exhibition Association and Fall Fair Association have hosted volunteer dinners in recent years as a way to wrap up the season and thank the many local residents who pitch in and provide assistance in the organizing and operation of the activities hosted annually at Princeton Fairgrounds.

Fair Sunday features horse games

Thanks to Sandi Dixon, a special feature of Sunday at the Fall Fair will be games for young and old on horseback.

The games start at 11:00 AM and riders may use English or western tack. Leadlines with adult help are allowed for Juniors 10 and under. All riders must wear an ASTM approved helmet and boots with heels and must be current Horse Council BC members.

Participation ribbons will be awarded to all, and horses will receive apples and carrots.

Juniors are age 10 and under, Senior riders are age 11 to 100. No entry fee required as this is an event for the fun of it.

Games include the egg and spoon challenge, in which riders must race carrying an egg on a spoon. Egg Stomp race involves racing to the end of the arena where an egg will be placed. The horse must break

the egg with a hoof before the rider can race back to the starting line.

Standard barrel racing will be part of the show, but there will be another race putting a twist on the barrel race. Riders will compete in pairs holding a length of toilet paper between them without breaking the toilet paper during the entire race.

A Rescue Race will be featured. During this race, the rider must dash to a person needing rescue, dismount, help the rescue person into

the saddle, then lead the horse back to the start.

There will be a jumping challenge on a course with six to eight jump obstacles. Juniors will jump low cross poles and Seniors will jump two foot high and above.

All riders, both Junior and Senior, should be at the rodeo arena at least a half hour before the games begin, and should contact Sandi Dixon to let her know they are prepared to enter the games.

Saving Downtown Princeton...

...An Ongoing Series by George Elliott

When I started writing the weekly feature titled 'Saving Downtown Princeton' I had no real timeline on how long I thought I could continue to write it. The whole idea sort of came out of the necessity to fill pages in the newspaper at a traditionally slow time of the year, January and February.

I'm pretty sure I thought that by March there would be nothing more to say about the downtown

core and that things would be back to whatever normal usually is in business at that time of year. The informal Business Advisory Group was born following meetings hosted by the Town of Princeton in an effort to bring local retailers to the same table to discuss common issues and possibly formulate achievable solutions. Those meetings I attended as a member of the media and later as a concerned

business owner, provided extra fuel for this series of articles.

I've been outspoken about that group from the beginning and while I will say some of the exercise was good and key issues were identified, I'm still on the fence on whether or not a lot has been accomplished as a result of those meetings. At the very least, the business owners and operators who attended the meetings discovered

that everyone else in the room was hurting as bad as they were.

The stories have been the same from business owners and operators I've spoken with throughout the Similkameen Valley. It has not been a very good year for any of us.

But what are the reasons and can they be fixed?

It was with this in mind that I started to use 'Saving Downtown

Princeton' as a forum to explore what is being said about the local economy by residents. Feedback in our office and on the street has been encouraging - even the negative - as it tells me we have hit something that has an effect on all of us.

It has been interesting listening to customers tell their stories as to why they won't support local business..... continued on Page 16

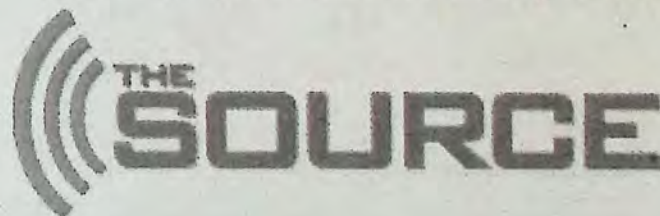

RDOS releases selected highlights

Selected highlights from the regular meeting of the Board of Directors of the Regional District of Okanagan-Similkameen held Thursday, July 17. Complete minutes of the meeting will be made available to the public following adoption at the next scheduled Board meeting August 7, 2014.

The Regional Board adopted bylaw No. 2650.01, 2014 RDOS Fees and Charges Amendment Bylaw. Fee

and charge changes are to Temporary Use Permit applications submitted between July 1, 2014 and July 1, 2015 to be charged a reduced fee of \$350.00. After July 1, 2015 the application fee would go back to \$700.00. Building permit fee changes will be to title and on-line document searches costing \$50.00, and non-electronic documents from Land Titles Office will be \$100.00.

Bylaw 2602, 2014 RDOS Mosquito Control Extended Services Amendment bylaw was adopted by the Regional Board. The Regional Board gave the first three readings of the bylaw in February which would amend the funding formula within the existing bylaw which currently provides a formula for the Mosquito Control program based on the field time spent averaged over the previous three years. With the inclusion of 2011 figures which include Provincial West Nile funding, the 2014 taxation would not represent the intent of the formula. Administration recommended that for 2014 only, the formula for funding the Mosquito Control program based on the 2012 and 2013 field time average.

Should We Cooperate Or Not?

Studies of the human brain through a technique called brain imaging revealed we are hard-wired to cooperate. When we cooperate with others, our brain gives us a reward, stimulating an area that responds to the effects of cocaine. In short, cooperating makes us feel good and ramps up our energy. These positive effects help us enter into cooperative activities. This may be a survival mechanism, because humans must cooperate in order to survive.

Belonging to a group, or even a partnership, calls for cooperation. Our brains react with pleasure at being part of a group, whether it is friends, family or a group engaged in a project or a particular interest. If we are ignored, left out, ridiculed or otherwise shown we are not wanted in a group, it makes us feel bad. This is one of the reasons why it is so difficult to rescue people

from harmful cults. The pleasure derived from feelings of belonging and cooperating becomes addictive, and the fear of withdrawing from that addiction makes clinging to the group far more appealing than leaving the group.

Research reveals the pleasure derived from cooperating with a group can lead a person into situations that are harmful, such as abusive relationships of many kinds. Women have been known to protect husbands who beat them. People cast out of a church have been known to do everything they could to be accepted back into the fold. Young people who become gang members will be loyal to the gang regardless of the potential for violence or being convicted for criminal acts. The addictive quality of the pleasure derived from cooperating with the group may even be part of the reason the Nazis managed to engage an entire nation in pride and pleasure of belonging to the Nazi political party.

Cooperating in a great group effort is not only pleasurable, but can achieve positive results in terms of creating a better society. Working together toward a goal is invigorating, as long as the results are positive. However, clinging to a group can lead to "dumbing down". When everyone is determined to think in terms of the group, individual thinking is often lost. In fact, some people are so pleased by the group they happily

give up thinking their own thoughts. With the wrong kind of leadership, the group can be led down a very negative path, such as the path of those who followed the leader to death at Jonestown.

Some leaders use the 'carrot and stick' technique of keeping the group together. Those who cooperate with the group and remain firmly under the leader's control are given praise and perks. Those who question the principles of the group or its leader are punished in some way, either by being expelled by the leader or group, held up to ridicule, or denied any praise or perks. Those kinds of leaders, and the groups who follow them, are quite destructive to the individual. The one thing such leaders cannot tolerate is independent thinking.

Blind obedience to the group, or to group thinking, leads to the development of 'sheep', or people who flock under a shepherd and conduct themselves like a flock of sheep. Such blind obedience achieves the goal of 'dumbing down' the people involved in the group. Being stupid, not questioning, not doubting, and not using your own head is a truly negative outcome.

Some groups play on the pleasure of cooperating and the fear of not belonging to demand conformity from group members. I can think of more than one religious sect that demands not only conformity of thought and belief, but conformity of clothing and customs. Members must wear the uniform of the group, attend daily or weekly rituals, separate themselves from others who are not part of the sect, and follow all of the rules set down by their leader. Those who do not conform are cast aside.

Those who are cast out of such groups are undoubtedly better off, although they may feel very bad about their situation. They receive the benefits of finally thinking for themselves, questioning to find the truth, and expanding their understanding of the way society functions at a more expansive level. They may again join groups to reinforce the pleasure of cooperating with others, but they will not likely be so easily controlled.

Perhaps the ultimate freedom is the freedom to think what you want, believe what you want, and to derive pleasure from cooperating with others to make a more peaceful, progressive world.

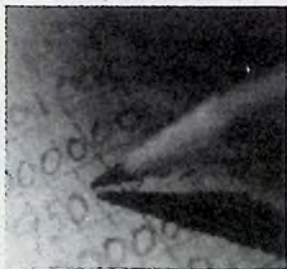

RCMP release crime stats

Cpl. Mike Gallagher of Keremeos RCMP recently release the crime stats for the first quarter of 2014. The detachment responded to a total of 359 calls for service – a 39-percent increase from the same period in 2013.

“Nearly all selected crime types increased in this quarter with the

exception of theft (other) complaints,” Gallagher states in a report from the detachment.

“A large part of this increase came in the form of break and enters, which in total showed a 200-percent increase when compared with the same three months last year.”

Sizzle confirms entertainment

The Similkameen Sizzle organizing committee met July 30th to solidify some of the elements planned for their 13th annual celebration on September 20th.

Entertainment Director Jeff Lakey confirmed at the meeting that all live musical groups have been booked and confirmed.

The schedule of performances was set as follows:

Final details are still being put in place for additional activities including a pancake breakfast, vendors, the chili cook-off and hot pepper eating contest.

The Similkameen Sizzle committee this year is made up of a very small handful of dedicated volunteers who see potential in hosting the annual pepper festival.

Details and entry forms for vendors are available at the Sizzle website located at www.gotpeppers.info.

As for priority categories Cpl. Gallagher says Keremeos RCMP opened a single founded drug file in the first quarter of 2014 which continues to be under investigation and a single 7-day Immediate Roadside Prohibition (IRP) and one impaired charge was laid between January and March of this year. There were a total of five CrimeStoppers tips received in the Keremeos area and particular attention has been focused on prolific and nuisance offenders.

“The Keremeos detachment maintains a prolific offender file listing all offenders with conditions,” Cpl. Gallagher says.

“Curfew checks are expected and conducted on a regular basis, and crime analyst reports are used to target high crime areas.”

The Keremeos Detachment is also in the process of implementing a loitering bylaw to address resident and business concerns in relation to seasonal transient workers.

Applying For Pensions

Recent conversations with constituents who are just starting their application process for Canada Pension and Old Age Security benefits are bringing to light issues that younger members of the Canadian

workforce should keep in mind sooner rather than later, in order to avoid unpleasant surprises when retirement time comes.

Mr. and Ms. Boomer have always been well regarded wherever they

have lived. They even spent some time working in another country for Canadian and foreign employers before they decided to come back home and settle down. When the Boomers applied for their Canada Pension and Old Age Security benefits they had many obstacles to overcome before they saw their first cheque or direct deposit.

Suddenly they had to start a frantic search for the old documents that proved when they left Canada, where they worked, for how long and when they returned. They wished they kept their old passports stamped with all the necessary dates. It would have been helpful if they had kept those old airplane tickets or other documents that showed the dates they entered the foreign country and when they returned to Canada. Keeping old pay stubs or staying in touch with their foreign

employer would have been helpful, too. Now it is crunch time—trying to retrieve any useful documents from 35 to 40 years ago, especially from a foreign country, before their savings run out (if they still have some left).

This scenario should come as a warning to all Canadians who are travelling abroad for work and still plan to retire in Canada in some distant future. Predicting what regulations will be in force 30 years from now is impossible but it is always better to plan ahead. If you immigrated to Canada as a child on your parents' passport or visa, you might want to start looking for that old passport. Even if you obtained Canadian citizenship in the meantime, you will still be required to submit the document showing when you first landed in Canada with your pension applications. If you do not have your original landing docu-

ment, you will need to request a Verification of Entry from Citizenship and Immigration Canada. It might take some time to get the document, especially if Immigration is required to do a manual search through its records—if you arrived to Canada before computers were put to official use for record keeping.

Service Canada advises people to apply for their Old Age Security benefits and the Guaranteed Income Supplement up to 11 months before they turn 65. In April 2013 Service Canada implemented a process to automatically enroll seniors who are eligible to receive the OAS pension. If you can be automatically enrolled, Service Canada will send you a notification letter the month after you turn 64. If you do not receive this letter, you must apply for your OAS. If you have always lived in Canada and have kept your personal records in a safe place, no problem. Otherwise, you might want to start looking for those old immigration documents and get a head start on what can be a lengthy process.

HOSHI SUDOKU - About The Puzzle

Sudoku - also known as "Number Place" - is a logic-based, combinatorial number-placement puzzle. The aim of Sudoku is to enter a number from 1 through 9 in each cell of a grid, most frequently a 9x9 grid made up of 3x3 subgrids. Each row, column and region must contain only one instance of each number. This Sudoku variant is called "Hoshi Sudoku". It contains six large triangles. The numbers 1 to 9 must be placed into the cells of each large triangle. Every line of any length - even uncontinuous - must contain every number not more than once.

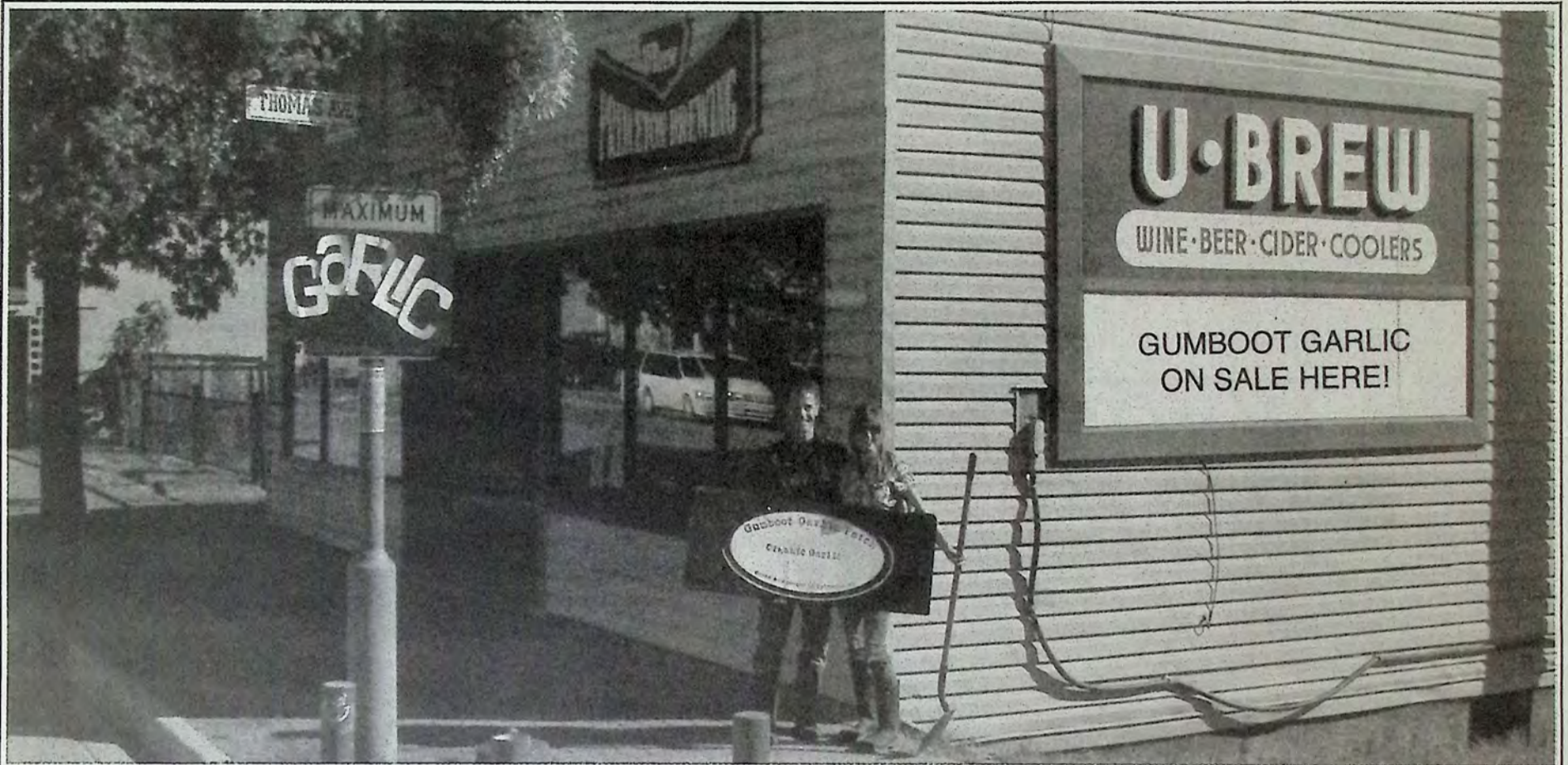

..... continued from Page 2 -nesses, and it's not always due to cost. It's also been interesting to listen to business owners who are still struggling and can't seem to figure out what the magic pill is that will save 2014 for them.

I have been encouraged by the many 'anonymous' readers who have quietly fed me suggestions and ideas to keep this ongoing series continuing into the future

and I also thank those of you who have sent e-mails or phoned to say that you agreed with or gained a slightly better understanding of a particular issue related to the local economy after reading about it in this article series.

It has been an interesting journey so far trying to figure out why the downtown core has turned into what it is today. As has been stated here many times over the past

seven months is that there are a lot of elements in play. Not all of it is controlled by local merchants or shoppers, either. When the economy gets soft across the province, it affects small towns as much as it does big cities only it hurts more in a smaller community.

It's also been noted here that when you don't support your local retailers it affects what support they put back into the community. If you are

involved in a local non-profit organization you will completely understand what that can mean.

We quit providing cash donations years ago opting to give discounts on advertising to local non-profits. I know that for many of the smaller groups the 'deals' we give them allow them to promote their event in ways they may not have been able to before because of budgets. Those budgets often are the result

of donations collected from local business. If revenue is low for local businesses, their ability to donate to local groups is affected.

It's really that simple and it's not hard to see that the ten bucks you spend somewhere in town will be spent over and over again making your contribution to the local economy more valuable each time it gets recycled.

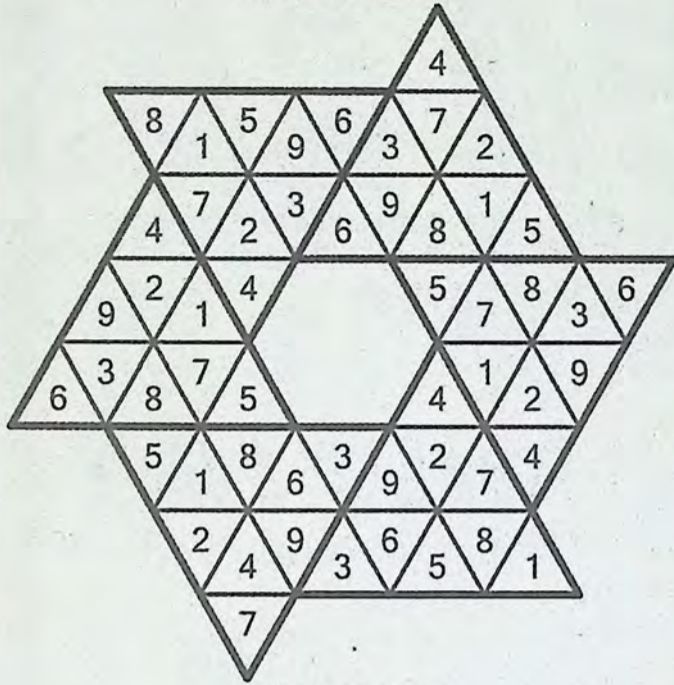

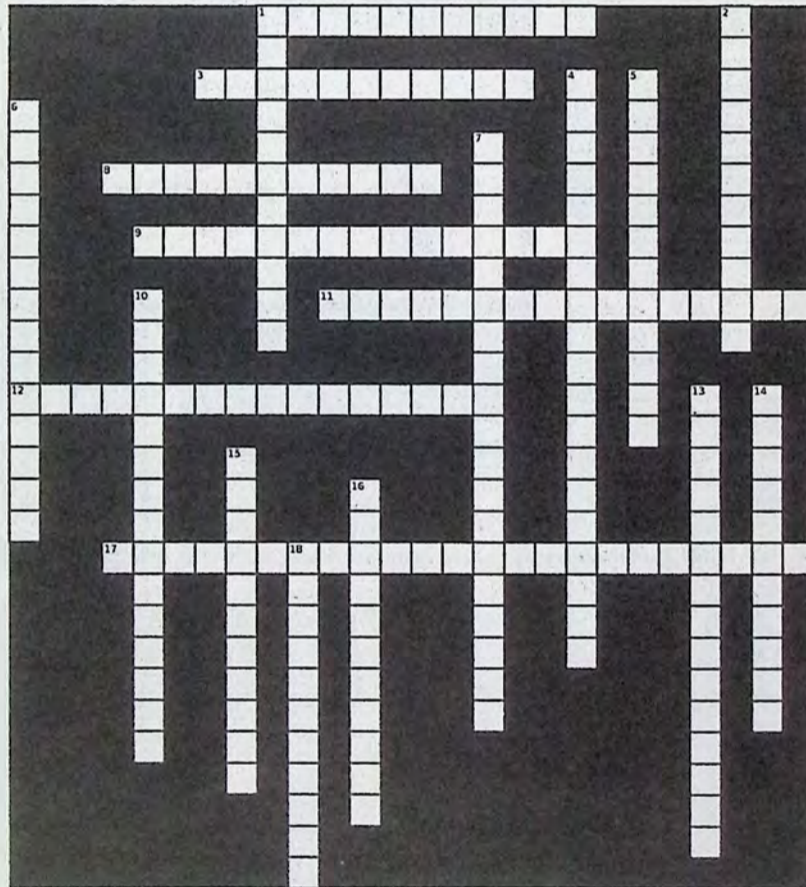

Orkestar returns!

The Traditional Music Festival is delighted to have Orkestar S'livovica performing once again. This large group of in-your-face musicians can be found playing music almost anywhere besides on the stage. Two years ago they were standing in the Tulameen River playing music when a dramatic torrential thunderstorm erupted. Undeterred, they just kept on playing. Last year they played in the Tulameen again under much friendlier skies.

Orkestar S'livovica plays the music of Balkan Roma ("Gypsy") wedding bands. These bands are the heart of any celebration in that part of the world. Rika Ruebsaat, Music Festival organizer, describes how this works:

"We've been to several parties hosted by Orkestar S'livovica in Vancouver and have always come away being high for three days afterwards. What typically happens is that at the beginning of the party people are milling around and socializing when suddenly music is heard from outside getting gradually louder. It is Orkestar S'livovica making its way into the hall. Finally they burst loudly into the room with everyone cheering, clapping or dancing. They play their way to the stage and the room erupts with joy. There are always a large group of Serbians at these parties who know exactly how to dance to this music. They form long lines and snake their way around the room doing their fancy footwork. Before the party begins some Balkan dances have been taught so that novice non-Serbians can join in. The line of dancers gets longer as more and more people join in. Others do free-form dancing in the spaces between the lines of dancers. There are people of all ages from children to dread-locked

youths gyrating around to well-dressed seniors carefully and gracefully 'stepping Serbian'."

Oliver Schneider, the bandleader has kindly sent the following background information on the kind of music Orkestar S'livovica plays.

"Balkan countries are famous for their elaborate weddings with live music. Throughout Serbia this music is regarded as a strong part of national identity, and is performed at many other occasions as well such as festivals, civic events, house-warmings, and any other important moment in people's lives.

"The music tells stories of joy and happiness as well as deep sorrow and longing. Instrumentation includes trumpets, powerful driving rhythms of low and mid-brass; the eastern double-headed drum; and beautiful ornamentation on saxophone, clarinet or accordion and powerful vocals. It is most often performed by Roma ("Gypsy") musicians. Tunes vary from ballads that reveal the eastern influences of the Ottoman Empire, to folk, pop, or even jazz-inspired interpretation with full Balkan brass orchestration, depending on the needs of the occasion. The Guca festival in central Serbia draws hundreds of thousands of visitors from around the world to listen as twenty competing bands vie for the titles of best trumpet and best orchestra, while dozens more perform on the street and in temporary restaurants for tips.

"While Europe and USA are being swept up in the Balkan Brass band craze, Vancouver's Orkestar S'livovica is eager to introduce this beautiful musical tradition to British Columbians."

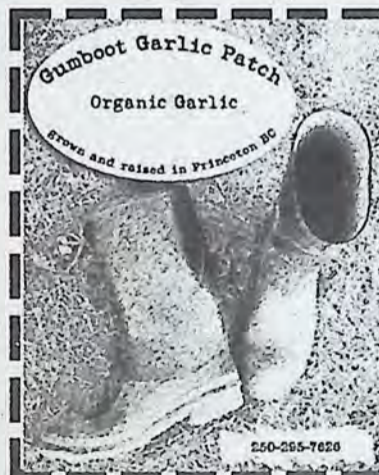
