## PWP expansion brings more local jobs

Princeton Wood Preservers Ltd (PWP) announced last week that on June 17th, 2014 an agreement was signed with Ledcor Resources & Transportation for the acquisition of the Princeton Post and Rail (PPR) plant site. The agreement also includes wood supply for both mills for the next eight years. Both mills

will now be operating under the name Princeton Wood Preservers Ltd.

The acquisition of the PPR facility is a nice fit with PWP's current production and treating plant 18-km east of Princeton. This expansion will raise the profile of the company as an employer in Princeton and a supplier in the Pacific Northwest. PWP will be investing in upgrading fixed and mobile equipment at both sites to help boost production and adhere to a high standard of safety.

Elizabeth Marion, president and owner of PWP said, "this is the most significant expansion of PWP's business in its 41-year history. With the production power of two plants and a guaranteed wood supply, we will be able to expand to meet the demands of our Canadian and American customers."

"With the equipment in place, and wood supply secured, we plan on creating more full time permanent jobs," said Marion. Since the takeover PWP has hired 8 new employees for a total of 37 between the two mills, and are looking for at least 8 more. Loader and maintenance experience is definitely an asset, but not required.

Marion bought the business in 2005 and has been dreaming of expanding ever since. With the recession in ..... continued on Page 18

## Crusher project meets deadline

Copper Mountain Mining Corporation (TSX: CUM) (the "Company" or "Copper Mountain") announced August 7th that construction of the new permanent secondary crusher at the Copper Mountain mine located near Princeton is now complete and the crusher is being commissioned. The project was completed on schedule and at the \$40 million budget. The

secondary crusher was tested with ore at the beginning of last week and since then the commissioning of the crusher is progressing smoothly.

The tie in of the new secondary crusher into the existing one kilometer overland conveyor that transfers ore from the primary crusher to the new secondary crusher and mill feed stockpile was successfully completed without any operational interrup-

tions to the SAG mill. With the new secondary crusher in operation, 100% of the ore feed going into the SAG mill is minus 2 inches in size. Operations are steadily improving as the live crushed ore stockpile transitions from minus 5.5 inches to the new reduced ore feed size of minus 2 inches. With the new secondary crusher now in operation, the Company intends to dismantle the

temporary portable crushing units that were put in place over the past twelve months; this change will reduce operating costs at the site.

Jim O'Rourke, President and CEO commented: "We are extremely pleased with everyone's efforts that have allowed us to bring the addition of this new secondary crusher into operation within our timeframe and budget. Our team has successfully met and overcome all the challenges to complete the project in the seven month construction schedule. The benefits to the mine will be immediate. By reducing the size of the SAG Mill feed down to minus 2 inches we are confident that the mine will achieve our production expectations."

Copper Mountain's flagship asset is the Copper Mountain mine located near the town of Princeton. The Company has a strategic alliance with Mitsubishi Materials Corporation who owns 25% of the mine. 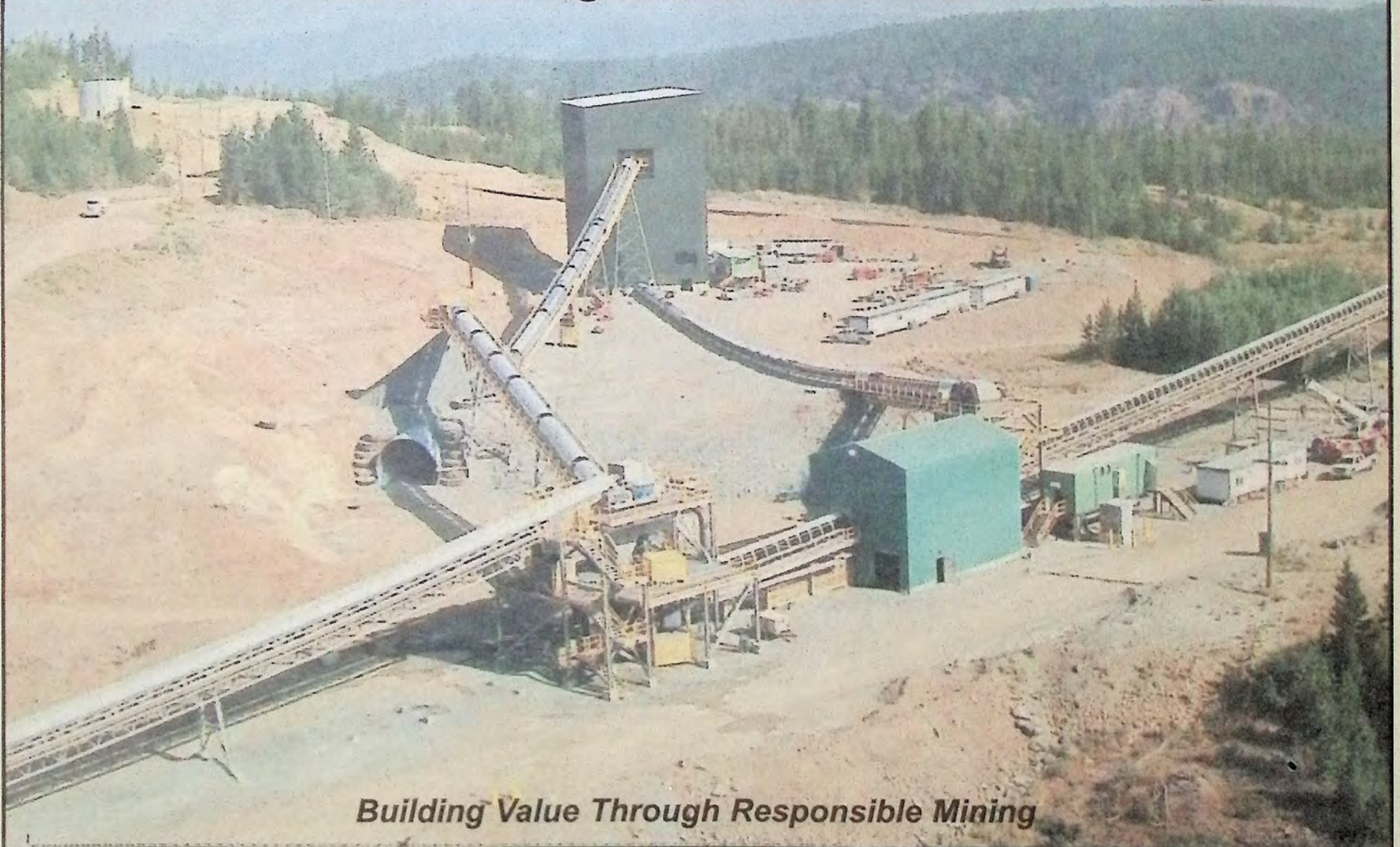

## Flip Of The Coyne

## Who Hates Beef? Why?

Last week I read an article reproduced by CBC on all of the things wrong with the beef industry and why this industry should be abolished. The people who promote this hatred of the beef industry need to get down to basics and learn a few things.

The reasons for hating the beef industry may stem from ignorance in a large part, or it could be a reflection of the promotion of vegetarianism. There is another possible source of this hatred of beef: my cousin went vegetarian because her spiritual leader said meat eaters could not gain in spiritual depth. As we are both descendants of native Americans, among whom are some of the great spiritual visionaries, I do not believe she thought that one through.

Most people who live in the city feel really bad about animal slaughter and do not really want to know where their roast beef comes from. They do not want to

recognize that their nice leather jacket and expensive leather shoes were once the skin of a cow. They do not want to know about the medicines made from cattle, or that the bone meal that helps their flowers grow once held up the body of a cow. Most of all, they do not want to think of the animal being killed.

Out in the country, we know who we are: we are eaters of meat. We humans are predators who have hunted for millions of years, and we thrive on red meat, white meat, fish meat, and just about any kind of meat. I watched a cooking show about what people along the Mekong River eat, and I would say they would eat almost anything. They eat bats and mice, birds and snakes. They do not eat beef because the climate is unfavorable for beef ranching.

Beef is an excellent food for humans. It contains superior quality protein for building muscle tissue. Beef contains L-lysine, essential for proper growth and bone development in children. Beef contains L-arginine, another amino acid that causes retardation of tumors and cancer, aids in detoxification of the liver, assists in the release of growth hormones, helps in the maintenance of the immune system, detoxifies ammonia, increases sperm count in males, and helps the kidneys function. Further, it is essential in the healing of wounds, and is essential for the digestion of proteins. A person who has plenty of L-arginine sees muscle mass increase and body fat reduction.

L-arginine helps increase the production of collagen, that special fat under the skin that prevents wrinkles. That's a lot for one food to do!

There are environmentalists who speak out against the beef industry. They complain about the land space used for ranching, the manure produced by the cattle and have even complained the beef are adding methane gas to the atmosphere. (If the manure is so rich in methane, why aren't gas companies using manure instead of fracking?) They complain that the land used for growing hay could be used for growing grain and vegetables for humans.

This is where ignorance really shows itself. The vast majority of beef ranches are in western North America. The reason for this is that the land is so poor about the only agriculture that can be done is beef ranching or raising sheep. If you look around at the kind of land available in our area, you will see there is very little good soil. Grass is a natural crop, and raising beef the natural form of agriculture. This land grows grass naturally, so raising hay is a logical crop. This is true for most areas of western North America.

I have seen the ranches in the Dakotas, Montana, Idaho and Washington and they share the same characteristics - low-grade soil, low rain, natural grass. This land is like the Russian Steppes - it is grazing land.

To prove the truth of this, consider North America before Europeans invaded. Millions of buffalo roamed the west, eating the grass that grew naturally. The buffalo provided a living for around 60 native American nations, providing meat, shelter, bedding, clothing, thread, bone needles and other bone tools. Cattle have replaced buffalo, and we now raise beef on those lands unsuitable for other forms of agriculture.

In western lands, our beef provide another benefit when we put them out to range. The range beef keep the grasses down, helping to prevent forest fires. Cattle and sheep help the forest by keeping down the grass and underbrush.

If you hear somebody complaining about beef ranching, ask what their beef is and why, then tell them how great it is that we have beef.

# Fair features bike stunts

The Beshano Bike Trials Team is coming to the Fall Fair September 6. This team specializes in doing stunts while riding a mountain bike.

This is the largest bike trial team in Canada and puts on one of the best shows in North America.

Using perfect balance to control the bike, the riders go over obsta-

cles, such as climbing from one table top to another, or balancing on a pillar on one wheel only. These moves are part of the competition of bike trials, and if a rider touches the ground or one of the obstacles, points are lost.

This is a show for anyone who rides a bicycle and loves to see expert riders perform stunts.

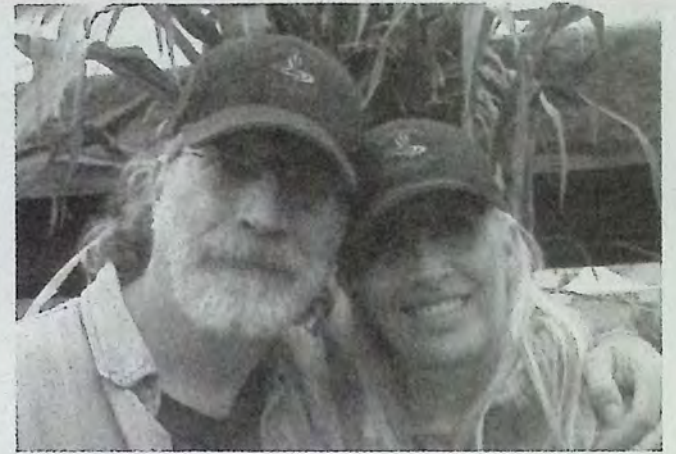

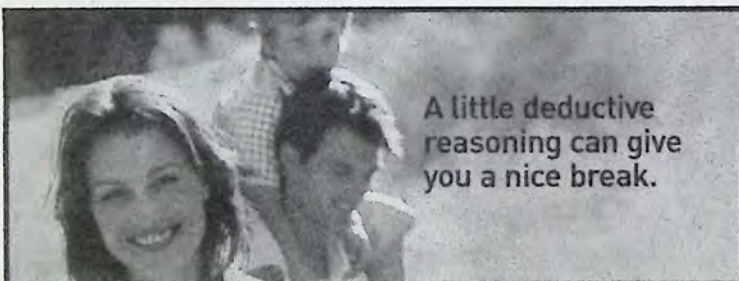
"The lone male driver who was

river it was flowing hard but the temperature had dropped tremendously to about -20 degrees F. We stood on the wooden bridge trying to decide if it was worth going or not because the next bridge was several miles down the river where we planned to finish and meet up. One of the vehicles was dropped off at the second bridge and we all went back to where we planned to start down the river canoeing and looking for game.

I was the most experienced canoeist so we made an agreement that I would go ahead with one of the guys in the river for about 15 - 20 minutes and if it wasn't safe and was too rough for the other guys I would fire my rifle and they would know not to get into the river and to drive down to the second bridge and meet us there.

We headed out and came to an extremely dangerous log jam shortly in, we had to get out of the canoe into the frigid water and carry the canoe out, through the snow banks along the edge of the river and around the other side of the log jam. I fired my rifle to warn the others not to come and we carried on down the river. We had to get out of the canoe several times as we went along, we were getting wet and cold but kept moving. We saw no game, couldn't have got it out anyway but arrived at the bridge safely expecting to see John and his friend waiting for us.

When we arrived there was a pick-up with a camper sitting at the bridge. Inside was my brother John and his friend, wet and very cold getting warmed up with the heater going. They hadn't heard my rifle warning shot because the river was

## Living Past 100

For The Love of Peaches!

Peach season is in full swing and those who love peaches will be eating all of the fresh peaches they can afford. Peaches are delectable fruit, favourites of the summer.

People have eaten peaches for thousands of years. Peaches, a member of the prune family of plants, were first grown and cultivated in China several thousand years ago. The Chinese considered them fruit of immortality.

The tree-ripened fruit should be eaten fresh, but the almost ripe fruit is superior for canning, as they tend to soften a great deal when cooked.

A peach smoothie is a great way to start the day. It will clean out the old stuff stuck in your system. Just chop up a peach or two, put the chopped fruit in a blender with some water, and turn the peaches into a smoothie.

Peaches are loaded with Vitamin A, the vitamin that protects skin, mucus membranes and keeps eyes healthy. The ancient Chinese recognized its value for the skin and used pureed fresh peaches as a facial mask.

The skin on peaches is fuzzy and should be removed to prevent itching around the mouth. Peach fuzz tends to irritate the skin. To easily remove the skin, drop the peach into boiling water for half a minute or less. Then immerse in cold water and rapidly remove the skin, which should slip off easily. Peaches, when raw, react to oxygen and soon begin to turn brown after being peeled. To prevent this discoloration, dip freshly peeled peaches into cold water containing a small amount of lemon juice.

Peaches can be preserved through canning, which actually is the best way to preserve peaches to retain the best flavour. Peaches can be turned into jam as well.

There are a number of different species of peaches, but most peaches are rated according to whether the flesh separates easily from the pit. Freestone peaches are those that separate easily, and the others are called 'cling' peaches, meaning the stone and flesh of the peach cling together. When buying peaches, ask the vendor whether the peaches are freestone or not. The freestone peaches are ideal for canning, but the cling peaches are softer, sweeter and better for eating raw.

The season for peaches in southern British Columbia begins about mid-July and ends around Labour Day. Cling peaches mature first, followed a couple of weeks later by the freestone peaches.

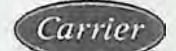

## Saving Downtown Princeton...

One of the most interesting things about downtown Princeton is the ownership of the majority of the retail outlets located on either Bridge Street or Vermilion Avenue.

Without doing an actual head count, I would estimate that over 75-percent of the retail and service businesses based in Princeton, including those on Highway 3 within the town limits, are owner operated.

That should be an indication of some kind that means there is something attracting entrepreneurs to the area. Even a number of long-time local businesses have local owners but what attracts them to Princeton?

In my case, it was an interesting journey for me to get to where I am as the owner/publisher of one of the last few remaining independent weekly newspapers left in all of

For me it made sense to purchase a business that was already established and operating with a solid track record. There was no way I would have ever started the business on my own and that is one reason why I secretly hold a great deal of admiration for anyone who starts their own business from nothing.

If you look around town there

have been many businesses that have been bought by a new generation of entrepreneur. They hope to find freedom in owning their own business and getting away from the daily drudgery of being just another employee for a faceless management located somewhere in a different community.

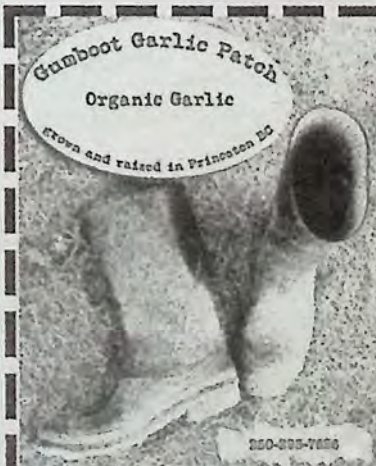

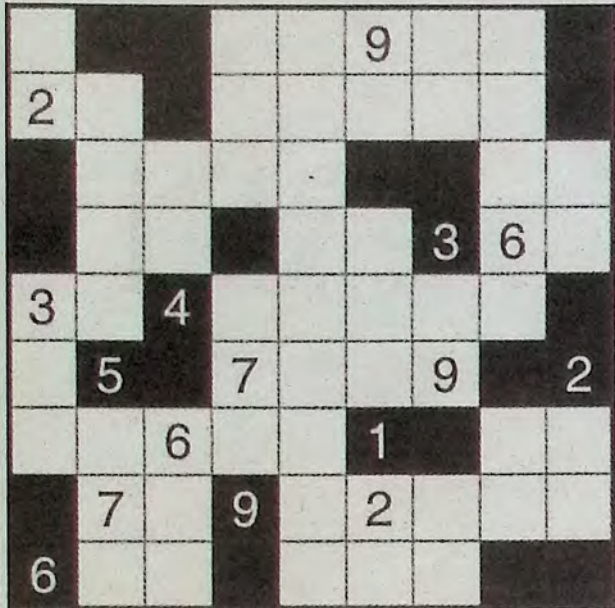

# Princeton's Specialist Care Project

## Giving Residents Access and Gaining Momentum

Merv La Brash and his wife Frances couldn't be happier with Princeton's health care services, especially with the increased specialist care that's now available. For the past few years, Frances has been seeing a specialist that came to Princeton once or twice a year. Now, through a project designed to improve access to specialist care in Princeton, she can arrange to see her specialist more often without leaving Princeton.

In 1975, Merv and Frances made the decision to get away from their busy, crowded life in Langley and move to a small town. They chose Princeton area somewhat by chance. On their way to Penticton they stopped along the highway near the Sterling Creek Bridge to help a rancher put out a fire in his garage. After the fire was contained, the rancher told them about a piece of property that was for sale on Old Hedley Road which they

ended up buying. Merv and Frances recently celebrated their 60th wedding anniversary and are now living in Vermilion Court.

Access to specialist care can be a concern for people like Merv and Frances who live in rural BC communities. Seniors who no longer drive are strongly affected because they often rely on family or friends for rides or spend a full day getting to and from Penticton on the HandiDart bus. Travel can be even more challenging if their appointment is in Kelowna.

The Princeton Health Care Steering Committee, which includes physicians, community and Interior Health representatives, was formed in September 2013 with the goal of supporting improved care in the region. The committee has been working with the South Okanagan Similkameen Division of Family Practice on a Princeton Access to Specialist Care

project funded by the Shared Care Committee, a joint collaborative committee of the Doctors of BC and the Ministry of Health.

The goal of the project, which began last November, is to improve and sustain access to specialist care and to support Princeton physicians in providing optimal care. With appointments made by their family doctor, the first phase is providing local access to specialties in higher demand through outreach clinics where specialists see their patients at Princeton General Hospital. Specialty areas presently being covered include nephrology, respiratory, rheumatology, cardiology, pediatrics, and psychiatry, with more specialty areas being explored.

Since January, there have been 14 specialist outreach clinics and 135 appointments in association with the project. Everyone surveyed has rated their overall satisfaction with the visit as excellent or good. For patients who have missed specialist

appointments in the past because of transportation difficulties, the clinics provide much improved access. Numerous patients have stated their great appreciation for the clinics being held in Princeton.

Instrumental to the success of the program is the commitment of staff, in particular, the Princeton General Hospital Registration Clerk, Darla Biagioni. Darla's organization of the clinics and support of the patients ensure the clinics run smoothly and patients feel comfortable. Because of her position, Biagioni has heard many positive comments about the program, including one person who told her that she was thinking of moving from Princeton to be closer to specialist services, but will now remain because of this program.

Dr. Brian Forzley, a Nephrologist who sits on the Project Advisory Committee, states: "It's been refreshing to do these outreach clinics, to get to know the Princeton physicians better, and to try and

help people that have a hard time getting to Penticton for appointments. It's easy as a doctor to forget what people go through for a 'routine' visit when they are coming from out of town. I hope there's more yet that we can accomplish with our existing resources to make our care even better for people living in Princeton."

Dr. Ella Munro, Merv and Frances' family physician, also serves on the committee overseeing the project. Dr. Munro says it's a privilege to be involved in the project and finds the association with the visiting specialists to be professionally stimulating. In addition to taking care of patients, specialists provide professional development opportunities for local health care providers through lunch and learn sessions.

Merv La Brash sums it up for all involved, "This is a real blessing to have the specialists coming to Princeton and I hope the program will continue well into the future."

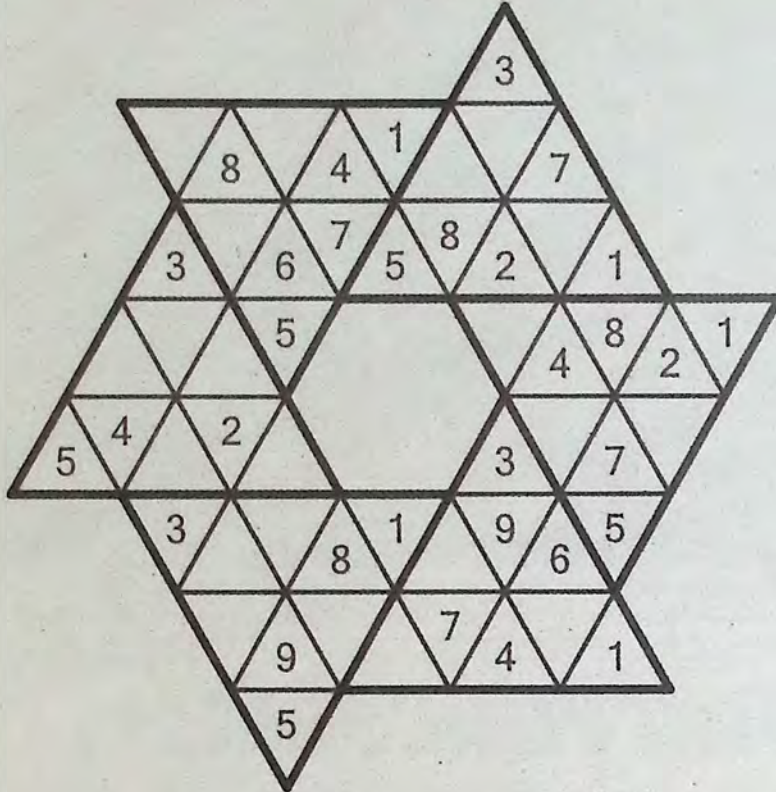

## HOSHI SUDOKU - About The Puzzle

Sudoku - also known as "Number Place" - is a logic-based, combinatorial number-placement puzzle. The aim of Sudoku is to enter a number from 1 through 9 in each cell of a grid, most frequently a 9x9 grid made up of 3x3 subgrids. Each row, column and region must contain only one instance of each number. This Sudoku variant is called "Hoshi Sudoku". It contains six large triangles. The numbers 1 to 9 must be placed into the cells of each large triangle. Every line of any length - even uncontinuous - must contain every number not more than once.

..... continued from Page 8 as just as many disadvantages but still people come to Princeton and start a new life within the community with a business.

For some, the option of buying an existing business is not there as their entrepreneurial spirit pushes them beyond that to step into the pool of establishing a new business.

In the case of Susan MacDonald who opened Suzie's Shoppe on

Bridge Street she saw a need and filled it with her business.

"There was not a place to buy good quality clothing, including plus sizes, at a reasonable price in Princeton," she told me last week when I asked why she went into business in Princeton.

I had not known she and her family were familiar with Princeton having had a twenty-five year "weekend warrior" relationship

with the area as cabin owners in Coalmont. The plan was to retire there following a cabin upgrade to a home and a full-time move to the Similkameen.

There are many stories like that including TamAirah Campbell who opened The Style Chamber that is tucked just behind the News Leader office. She had been coming to the area for years and always had a plan to set up shop in the community.

When the opportunity was right, she jumped in with both feet and hasn't slowed down since. That's one of the great things about the energy of entrepreneurs who fill our town. These are people who see something that attracts them to the area and often they see something the rest of us take for granted.

I think it's basically got to do with the lifestyle. I know my first few days here back in early 1986 made

my decision to move here for work later that year much easier than if I hadn't had some sort of exposure to the character of the community. It's partly due to that character that I'm still here.

How does this save downtown Princeton?

Well, I think we still need to be reminded that most of the businesses operating in the community are ..... continued on Page 19

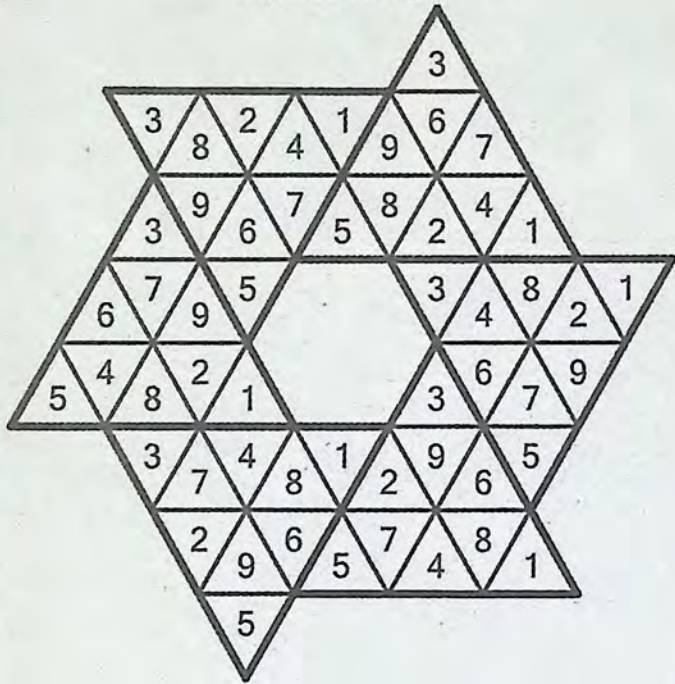

# Traditional Music Fest

## Event celebrates mining

At this year's Traditional Music Festival there is going to be a one-hour session of mining songs. The session is in honour of Princeton's mining history; in fact Princeton became a town because of mining. The early settlers burned coal they had picked up from the riverbanks. Eventually coal was mined commercially both in Princeton and northwest of town in Blakeburn. The ground underneath Princeton still has abandoned coalmines and occasionally houses begin to sag or driveways collapse because of a caved-in tunnel in the ground underneath. Early settlers panned for gold along the rivers and the 1885 Granite Creek gold rush brought in an influx of would-be miners.

Copper claims were also being worked on Copper Mountain beginning in 1902.

At the time that Princeton became a town there were, of course, no radios or recording devices so people made their own entertainment. They sang songs and recited poems that they had learned at school, in church or at home. They also made up their own songs about their lives. One that is known by some the descendants of early settlers is:

There's gold up in the Tulameen,  
There's platinum in the sand,  
Berries for the picking,  
Why wander o'er the land?  
Grouse upon the mountain  
And deer come to the door;  
You're welcome, dear old-timer -  
Don't wander anymore.

Songs like this and others made up by early Princeton miners will be sung at the Mining Songs session at the Festival.

There are, of course, mining communities in other parts of the world and they all have songs that speak of the mining life. In the Mining Songs session you will hear songs from the coalmines of Vancouver Island and from the Appalachians in the US. That part of the world has a rich tradition of songs about the overworked impoverished lives of mining families.

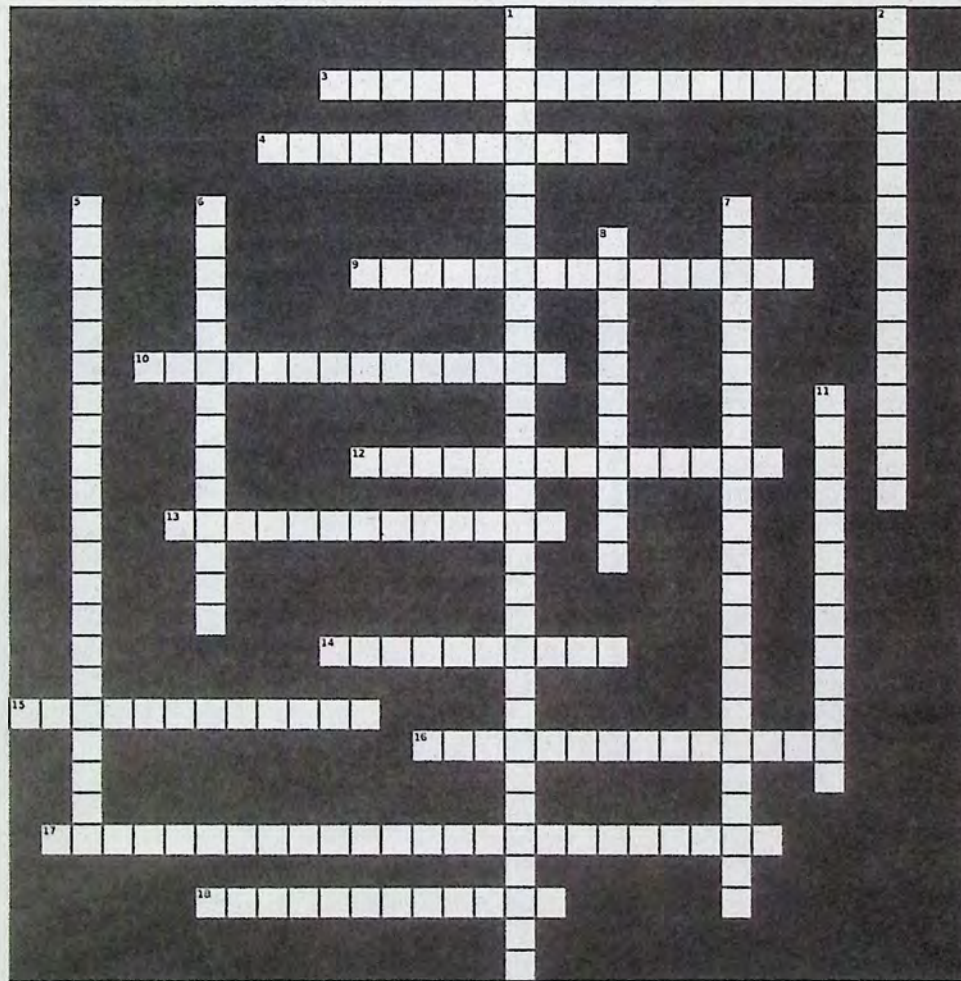
Songs such as "Coalmining Blues"

and "Prayer of a Miner's Child" have become anthems in the struggles for safety and fairness for working miners. The British Isles also has a wealth of mining songs, particularly from the coalmines of northeastern England. Songs such as "The Gresford Disaster" and "The Coal Owner and the Pitman's Wife" portray the dangers and injustices that British coal miners were subjected to. The Mining Songs session will thus be a historical-musical journey exploring the lives of miners and their families both in Princeton and in other parts of the world.

The Mining Songs session is just one item on the rich menu of music available at the Princeton Traditional Music Festival. The Festival begins at 6:15 PM on Friday, August 15th with an opening ceremony and a participatory dance on Veterans' Way. On Saturday and Sunday there is music from 10:00 AM until 6:00 PM right in downtown Princeton. It's all free and everyone is welcome. 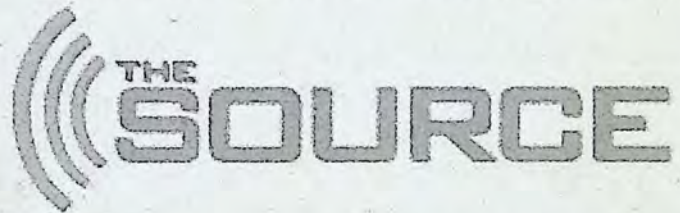

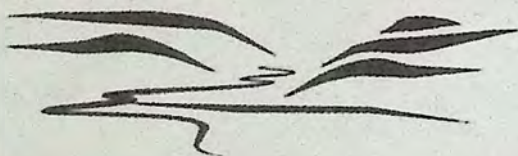

# Local family proud of military son's charity swim

Once again, Capt. Daniel Davidson (Ret.) and his wife Andrea are beaming with pride and anticipation as Davidson's son, Cpl. Jeremy Davidson (pictured at right), prepares to swim across the Northumberland Strait, separating Prince Edward Island from New Brunswick. However, a few things about this year's swim, on the morning of August 22nd, will be just a little different from his successful swim last year while raising money for the 'Give to Live' foundation (See News Leader Issue: Vol. 16 Issue 31 Page 9).

For one, he will be swimming to raise funds for the Canada wide non-profit Neil Squire Society. The Neil Squire Society, established in 1984, offers programs and opportunities for people with disabilities to develop computer skills, build their employment skills and help re-enter or enter the work force. As it happens, they were also instrumental in helping Davidson Sr. (at one time himself a Rescue Swimmer with the Canadian Coast Guard) deal with the crippling effects and severe pain of arthritis after his diagnosis in April of 2012.

One other difference this year will be that Jeremy will be swimming across the Northumberland Strait,

and BACK! Last year while swimming with the "Big Swim" event, Cpl. Davidson and the other swimmers participating swam one way; an exhausting distance of some 15 kilometres. However, to really bring attention to people who suffer from physical disabilities, Davidson wants to double his efforts this time; Hence the name of his event: "The Bigger Swim". Also, he will be swimming alone this time. For a lot of reasons the two events could not be held at the same time; Therefore, other than the company of his support team and Stand-By rescue boat, Davidson will be alone in the water for the entire 30 K.

"There have been scores of Jellyfish stings, and even a Harbour Seal that swam across with me during a practice lap on August 2nd, so I guess I won't really be alone after all," Jeremy chuckled when going over the details last week with his dad on one of their many video chats. Putting his 30+ years on the water to good use, Davidson senior is doing all the tide and current calculations for the swim from his home in the beautiful Similkameen Valley at Princeton.

"It's been awhile since I've had to plot a course, but I'd like to help

him make as much of the swim 'downhill' as possible."

Having earned his Captain's Ticket at the early age of 25 in 1982, the year Jeremy was born, Davidson senior served as captain for just under 20 years before 'pulling the plug' and moving to Princeton in 2003.

In preparation for a 30 k swim in a river near his home, where he and his wife Sherise serve as members of the Canadian Armed Forces at CFB Galetown, Cpl. Davidson seems more humble than hero.

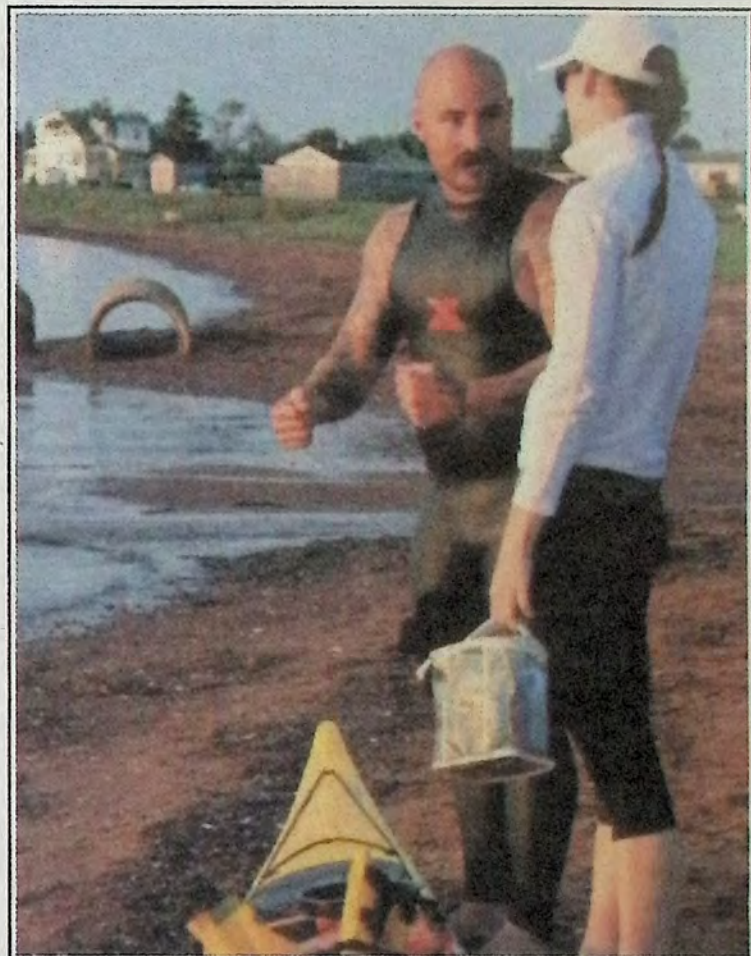
"As tough as this challenge is going to be, it's really nothing compared to the challenges that some folks face every day, and when all is said and done, this swim is about raising awareness and financial support for people who really need it, and for those folks who are there to lend a helping hand when it's needed most. Garbage. Everybody's got some and if you are a resident of the Town of Princeton you are allowed a two bag/can limit per week. The Town defines a standard size garbage bag as 90-litres and if your household generates more garbage than the limit per week you have a couple of options. You can purchase "Tag-A-Bag" stickers at the town office on Vermilion Avenue for \$2 each and are allowed a maximum of two extra garbage bags a week for curbside collection providing they have 'Tag-A-Bag' stickers on them. The other option is to start separating your garbage removing the recyclables and either leaving them for pick up or taking them to the recycle depot yourself. The Town of Princeton will pick up the following recyclables at your curb: plastic, paper, cardboard and tin but there are some restrictions and you can learn about them by visiting [www.princeton.ca](http://www.princeton.ca) and looking for the Garbage and Recycling Brochure under Municipal Services. Keep in mind that garbage/recyclable pick up days move on weeks that contain a statutory holiday. Your regular pick up day will be a day later in that case.
