Councillors toss hats in ring

Councillors Kim Maynard and Doug Pateman stated at the August 18 Town Council meeting that they will seek re-election in the November civic elections. Councillor Marilyn Harkness said she is undecided at this time. Mayor Frank Armitage told the News Leader he will make his decision in September.

In addition to seats held by the mayor and councillors mentioned, there is a fourth seat on Town Council open in November. This is the seat vacated by the resignation of

former Councillor Jason Earle.

At this time, Council has not appointed an Elections Officer. Until an Elections Officer is appointed for the civic elections, no nomination papers will be issued, as the Elections Officer is the person designated to be responsible for all aspects of the election.

A official call for nominations will appear in local newspapers after the Elections Officer is appointed. Polling stations will be selected by the Elections Officer.

Ball players request upgrades

Reuben Parker and Kesa Holland attended the August 18 Town Council meeting to request improvements to the ball diamonds at Memorial Park. They represented Princeton Slo Pitch Association, and justified their request by pointing out their association now has grown from 10 teams to 12 teams. There are 240 adults and 50 minors registered with the association. They are considering joining SloPitch National to enhance benefits to members.

They presented a list of improvements to the grounds, with priority given to those improvements related to greater safety.

All of their plans for the future are aimed at holding more tournaments, bringing more people to Princeton, and encouraging young people to

learn and participate in the sport. A number of members of the association coach minor ball.

Council appreciated the manner in which the ball players' concerns were presented. Mayor Frank Armitage praised association members for the excellent tournament they hosted this summer. He inquired about their budget, and advised them to meet with Lyle Thomas and Kevin Huey to discuss what improvements are most important and the cost of specific items.

Changes hit PXA

Paul Bedard, President of Princeton Exhibition Association (PXA), told Board members he is tired. At the August 19 meeting of the management board for the fair grounds, he expressed his concerns for the future of PXA. There have been a number of problems this summer, and with little money to hire people, and few volunteers to help out, much of the work has fallen on a few people.

One of the 'problems' was actually the emergency situation that arose when an evacuation order was issued due to the wildfire near Chain Lake in July. The horse accommodation at the fairgrounds became an animal evacuation center as those living in the Chain Lake area moved their horses to the fairgrounds. PXA Board member Karrie Crucil said the evacuated residents were grateful for the emergency accommodation. This was a free service in an emergency. PXA Board members were sorry

to accept the resignation of Secretary Odell Simmons, who has an opportunity in Calgary and sold her home. They wish her well in her future. Dawn Johnson, former PXA Secretary, will fill the position until the November annual general meeting.

There was some good news regarding the money situation. FortisBC sent a cheque for \$3,745, a rebate for the electrical upgrade undertaken last year. The Town stepped in to cover the cost of panels which were installed in the rodeo arena this spring. The panels are steel and were required for conduct of a safe rodeo.

Councillor Doug Pateman attended the meeting and briefly referred to a new agreement between Regional District and the Town of Princeton regarding recreational facilities. He asked that Lyle Thomas, Town Director for Recreation attend PXA meetings in the future. PXA Board members

were happy to welcome Thomas to the meetings.

Horse pens are in desperate need of repairs. Paul Bedard and Karrie Crucil are going to work on the repairs, but said they could use some help. There was a problem with a draught horse boarded this summer, and the pens proved inadequate for such a powerful horse. A great deal of damage was done. As a result of this experience, Board members passed a motion that only light horses be accommodated at the fairgrounds except in case of emergency.

The annual Halloween Party has required a change of venue for the next PXA meeting, which will be held at the library September 16 at 7:00 PM.

The Halloween Party needs a lot of advance work and Jennifer Bernard told the Board she hopes some volunteers will come forward to help at the grounds and on the evening of continued on Page 19

I mentioned last week that there is a varied assortment of businesses in Princeton. If you go up and down the main streets you'll know what I mean as there are some specialty shops sitting alongside larger corporate businesses.

You've probably heard the old saying that goes, "Location! Location! Location!" even in a small town with just two streets of retail/service space and a row on the

highway, this is very true. You would think that without a giant shopping centre just about anywhere in Princeton would be a good place to open a business. Depending on what your business is, location is not essential because if you offer a unique service, customers should be hunting you down. In the case of some other businesses, you need a spot where traffic is constant in order to be noticed.

When I purchased the News Leader in 2004 I had a plan. My wife, Brenda had spent a year in a storefront location downtown offering various office services. She shared the space with another business.

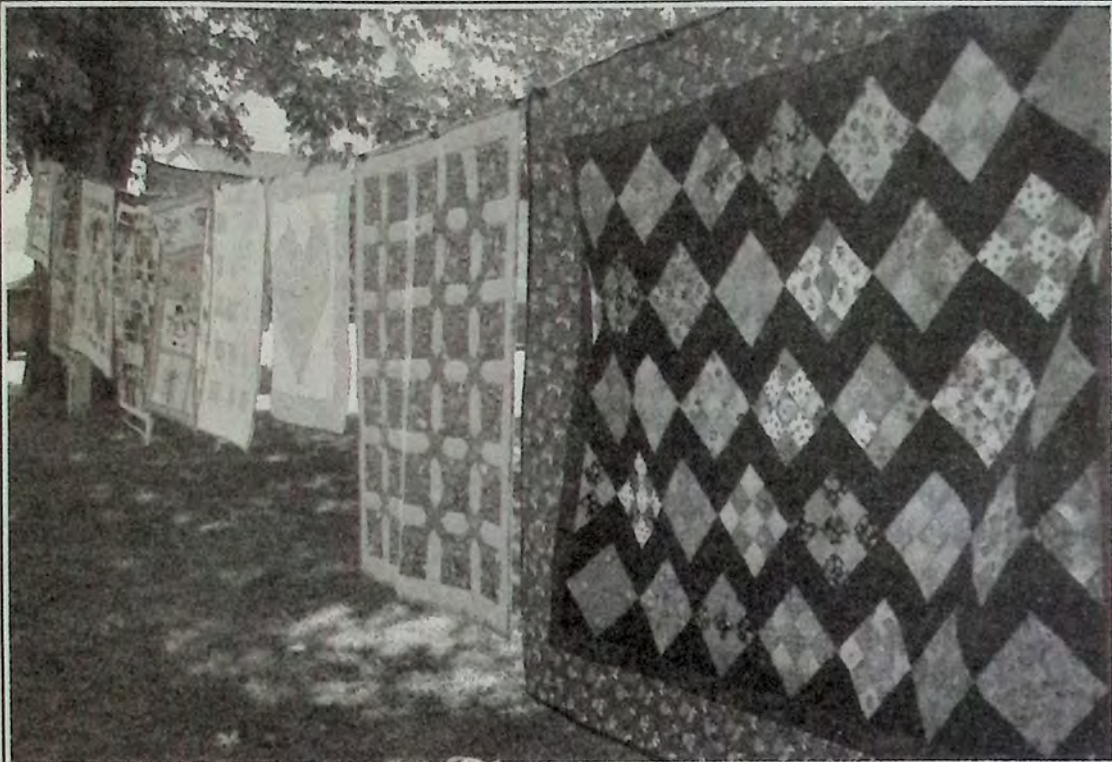

Flip Of The Coyne

If you haven't heard yet, we had a small accident at our local airport last week. Although it may have been a lot worse for the deer that the jet hit, the incident could have been much worse. To some a jet hitting a deer is about the never-ending debate about the urban deer population, but to others the problem isn't about the deer but about what could have been. This could have been a once in a lifetime accident and let's hope it is, but what if it isn't? The Town has put a lot of money into the airport to get it to where it is today with projects such as the fueling station, the pilots building the cars that are available for pilots to get into town, the air shows to promote that the airport is open for business, and so on. So the question is, has it been enough or is the safety of the air strip and the aircraft that use it at risk?

Now I would like to think that this was a fluke and that it will never happen again but let's be honest, the fence that surrounds the airport has seen better days and the grass that is waist high or more in some places hasn't been cut in years. I know that maintenance or replacement of the fence is a rather large expense and a

mower to keep the field around the airstrip mowed isn't free either, but if we are going to have an operational airstrip that will see regular air traffic, shouldn't we have a certain level of maintenance to ensure the safety of the aircraft coming and going from our airport?

Since we are on the subject of the airport, I have to wonder what is going on up there. At one time council was going gangbusters with promotion and development, but it seems to have taken a backseat to other things in the last few years.

The airport like the deer has been one of those ongoing issues in Princeton for years. When I was a kid there was the Air Cadet camp here with the gliders. When that left

town things up there sort of died off then over the last decade things were starting to pick up again, but like I mentioned, it seems to have hit a brick wall. Development stopped and attention was diverted. Unfortunately the full potential of the airport has never truly been seen. I guess the question is do we even want an airport in Princeton? If the answer is yes, then should council be ready to invest the money into the facility to make sure that it has proper fencing and maintenance or should we just say time to cut our losses and close it down?

Whatever the answer is, keep it or close it, we have an operational airport that is accepting air traffic, and continued on Page 19

Three doctors work too hard

Councillor Marilyn Harkness announced at the August 18 Town Council meeting that Interior Health Authority (IHA) has decided three physicians are not enough to serve Princeton area. IHA is seeking two more physicians to serve Princeton.

Councillor Harkness told Council the present three physicians will

burn out if something is not done to improve the current situation. Locums are in short supply, and keeping the Emergency Room open is a heavy burden. Although there is no indication at this time that the Emergency service will close, she made it clear the ongoing situation does not guarantee the ER will remain open indefinitely.

Electoral Area "G" Community Parks Service Establishment Bylaw
BYLAW NO. 2662, 2014
Notice of Alternative Approval Process

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN pursuant to Section 86 of the Community Charter, that the Board of Directors of the Regional District of Okanagan-Similkameen seeks the approval of the electors within the boundaries of Electoral Area "G" for the adoption of the Electoral Area "G" Community Parks Service Establishment Bylaw No. 2662, 2014.

In general terms, the bylaw is to establish a service for the purpose of operating and maintaining parks within Electoral Area "G".

The alternative approval process applies to qualified electors within the service area, which is Electoral Area "G" (Keremeos Rural/Hedley) in its entirety.

The annual maximum amount that may be requisitioned under the Local Government Act for the Electoral Area "G" Community Parks Service is \$10,000 or \$0.04 per thousand dollars of net taxable value of land and improvements in the service area.

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE THAT the Regional District may proceed to adopt Electoral Area "G" Community Parks Service Establishment Bylaw No. 2662, 2014 unless at least ten percent (10%) of the qualified electors (those meeting the criteria below) indicate their opposition to the bylaw by signing the Elector Response Form.

The Regional District has estimated the total number of qualified electors in the service area of Electoral Area "G" to be 2029 and that 10% of that number, or 203 qualified electors, must submit signed Elector Response Forms to prevent the Regional District from adopting the bylaw without the full assent of the electors by referendum.

An elector response form must be in the form established by the Regional District. Elector Response Forms are available from the Regional District office, including by mail, fax, or e-mail, on request or on the Regional District website at www.rdos.bc.ca.

The deadline for delivering the original signed Elector Response Form to the Regional District is 4:30 PM on Monday, October 6, 2014.

The only persons entitled to sign an Elector Response Form are qualified electors within the Electoral Area "G" Community Parks Service Area and must meet the following criteria:

Resident electors must:

- (a) be 18 years of age or older;
- (b) be a Canadian citizen;
- (c) be a resident of British Columbia, for at least 6 months;
- (d) be a resident of the Service Area for at least 30 days; and
- (e) not be disqualified by an Provincial enactment, or otherwise disqualified by law, from voting in an election.

Non-Resident property electors must:

- (a) not be entitled to register as a resident elector of the Service Area
- (b) be 18 years of age or older;
- (c) be a Canadian citizen;
- (d) be a resident of British Columbia, for at least 6 months;
- (e) be a registered owner of real property in the jurisdiction for at least 30 days;
- (f) not be disqualified by any Provincial enactment or otherwise disqualified by law, from voting in an election; and
- (g) only register as a non-resident property elector in relation to one parcel of real property in a jurisdiction.

The bylaw is available for public inspection at the Regional District Office 101 Martin Street, Penticton, BC V2A 5J9, during regular office hours, or alternatively, on our website at www.rdos.bc.ca.

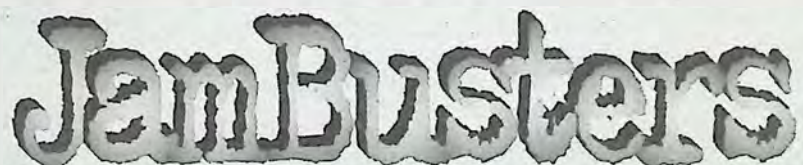

How To Save Canada's Economy

Have you noticed the number of people from China and India who are buying properties in Canada? They are not doing it merely in Canada, but all over the world. They have money to invest. Do you know why?

The reason they have money to invest is because they have been saving money while the rest of the developed world is deep in consumer debt. While we are buying every damn thing they can make on their cheap wages, they are saving money and buying our properties, investing in our companies and in our industries.

As nations, their banks have enough invested savings to go out and lend money to other countries. India and China are becoming financiers of foreign governments and the big debt loads. All because their people save money.

In Britain, ordinary household saving has dropped to near zero. In Canada, we are not doing much better because everybody is living on credit cards. We are buying things we cannot afford, and what's worse, we are buying things we do not need.

If what we want is not in the cate-

gory of food, shelter, clothing and heating in winter, then it is not something we really NEED to buy. We may think we need that car and gasoline, but we could walk, ride a bicycle, or take a bus. (This from somebody who loves her wheels!)

When we talk about need versus want, we want too much. Financial advisors do a great business these days helping people get out of debt. They are not telling people so much about investments, but instead thousands of them are making arrangements to help people wipe out credit card debt. I realize there are times when using a credit card makes sense. There are times when going into debt is part of surviving. However, one of the reasons this happens is because we are without any savings in the bank.

I suspect the hippies had it right. If you are somebody under the age of 50, you probably do not know much about the hippie generation. The hippies were people who dropped out of the mainstream society, turned away from consumerism and tried to live on as little as possible. Many went back to basic survival ways of living. They were about peace, loving your fellow man, and refusing to join "the Establishment". In short, their goal was not to keep up with the Joneses but to ignore the Joneses and the Joneses' values.

They wore funny clothes and grew long hair and eventually joined the mainstream and cut their hair, put on regular clothing and got jobs. This does not mean their ideals were wrong, simply that they did not know how to overthrow the way things were. They were young, inexperienced and did not recognize their own power, but they had the right idea.

Those people in India and China

have been living as cheaply as possible and putting money in the bank. The average worker in India saves 25 percent of his income. In China, the average worker saves 27 percent. The average Canadian worker might save five percent, but this generally works out to be zero because it is offset by debt.

What does this tell you about how we are living? Are we paying attention when our government tells us to stop running up credit card debt?

Look at what we buy in grocery stores, because even in a grocery store, we buy things we do not need. For example, we buy paper towels, when an old piece of cotton toweling would work as well and is reusable. We buy expensive boxes of dry cereal when we could make a pot of porridge for a lot less, and with no additives. We buy prepared foods when we could cook healthier meals from scratch. We buy bottles of soda drinks which are not needed at all and we buy snack foods which are probably not good for us. We even buy bottled water when the water from our taps is monitored weekly and perfectly safe to drink.

Those are just small examples of things we buy that we do not need. I have not even mentioned alcohol or tobacco or all those patent medicines we seem to store in our medicine chests. Yet all of these things are a drop in the bucket when we compare them to the amount we spend on having the latest electronic devices, or the brand name jeans, or the latest model vehicle we crave.

While we are spending on what we do not need, people who learned to save their money and make it work for them are busy buying businesses, land, corporations and industries in our country. How do you like it?

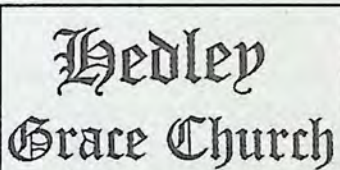

"Is there something we should know?!" Don't panic, the military presence in the Similkameen is only temporary: the 39th Canadian Brigade Group is on its way to exercise "Kootenay Cougar." The week-long camp tests our Canadian Reserve members in all things important to being a good soldier. More than 450 Army Reserve soldiers from across BC will be testing their mettle near Trail between August 22nd and August 27th. Each "FOB" (Foreign Observation Staging Area) provides an opportunity to improve on skills such as live fire drills (shooting), water assault crossings (includes shooting), ground search and rescue and decontamination. Captain Chris Poulton, Brigade Public Affairs Officer said that the annual boot camp is the culmination for BC's Reserve members. The 39th Canadian Brigade Group is headquartered in Vancouver, BC. There are 11 units of the brigade in BC, some of which have been active since 1883. Members of the brigade engage in training both in Canada and the United States. Since 2006 the brigade has been contributing officers and soldiers to active duty in Afghanistan. For those interested in being a part of the Canadian Reserves, the Canadian Forces website at www.forces.ca is a good place to start. At the September 21 meeting the Directors decided to move actively and positively. The Society will meet with local elected representa-

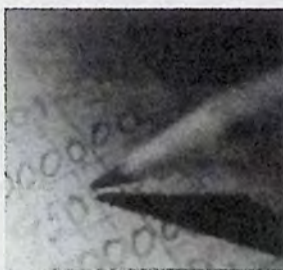
tives at the provincial level.

Saddles 'n' Spurs

Advantages of 'Do It Yourself'

At this time of year, many Canadian families are harvesting food from their gardens, or buying fruit in bulk, and canning and freezing the produce. This is a growing trend across Canada, but is particularly strong in the Fraser Valley area of British Columbia, where church groups have been endorsing a return to growing and preserving one's own food. The goal is a form of environmental protection, avoiding pesticides, herbicides, and eating 'cleaner' food for the protection of people.

The question arises: is this the way to go, or is it a food fad?

If food is grown without toxic substances, it is the best quality food. This does not mean to say it looks like the best, as every organic grower will tell you there is always the risk of invasion by insects whenever pesticides are not used. Growers who avoid pesticides and herbicides do produce food that is healthier to eat.

Using a foundation of pesticide-free food for home canning and freezing is a good start toward eating better food, but as in every preserving process, there is a loss of nutrients. It is always better to eat fresh, but in comparing commercial processes with home processes, there is little difference between the quality of foods frozen at home and those frozen commercially, providing the home freezing process is done correctly. There are fewer nutrients lost through freezing than through home canning.

Some foods do not freeze well, so home canning is the alternative. Home canning is done in glass jars, and this is a distinct advantage over commercially canned foods which come in tins lined with a substance that emits artificial estrogens. The other advantage of home preserves over tinned commercial foods is that the person doing the preserving knows exactly what is going into the jars with the food. Home preserves generally contain no artificial colours or substances.

There are people who distrust home preserves, but if home preserving is done correctly, there is no danger to the people who eat it. The key is a good vacuum seal, whether the product is done at home or commercially. Everybody knows how to listen for that hiss on opening a tin or breaking the seal on a jar of home preserves. If there is no hiss, the contents are not good and should be disposed of. Generally, the contents will be discolored and smell 'off'.

Pickles made at home may lack the eye appeal of commercial pickles, but there is a small advantage to pickling at home: no artificial coloring agents have been used.

For some who do home preserving, the biggest advantage is price. The product, whether frozen or canned, pickled or made into jam or jelly, will cost less than buying off the shelf at the grocery store.

However, the initial cost of the equipment for home canning may offset the first year's savings. If the produce to be preserved must be purchased rather than grown at home, there is likely no real saving, and no certainty that pesticides and herbicides have not contaminated the produce. Some consumers go to specific growers to buy produce because those growers give guarantees that toxic substances have not been used on the produce.

The other factor home preservers may not take into account is the overhead cost of processing. Home canning requires electricity or gas, the purchase of lids and jar rings, and a cool dark place to store the jars. Some of the ingredients for home preserves add to the cost, such as sugar for fruits and vinegar for pickles.

The trend toward eating 'cleaner' is good in itself, but it is part of a larger picture involving an appreciation for what we can produce for ourselves.

 Vermilion Avenue and now occupy what I consider one of the prime locations on Bridge Street.

Nancy told me last week they have seen a huge difference in business since they relocated.

"The visibility of Bridge Street is a plus," she said. She explained that when people park downtown they tend to wander the main street as they shop or run errands and their

new storefront puts them in the action.

I like to refer to the location of the News Leader, right next to the CIBC, as Ground Zero. The ATM machine is virtually on the other side of the wall I sit facing when writing news on my work computer. I can hear each and every deposit made in the night deposit slot outside the bank.

Trust me, there are a lot of them,

which tells me that there is a lot of foot traffic in this general area. I'm quite happy for the newer local businesses as they have identified a niche and are going after it in our community. 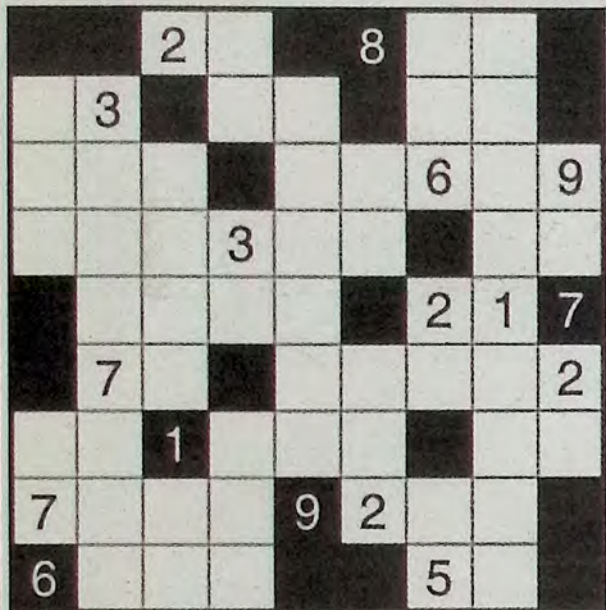

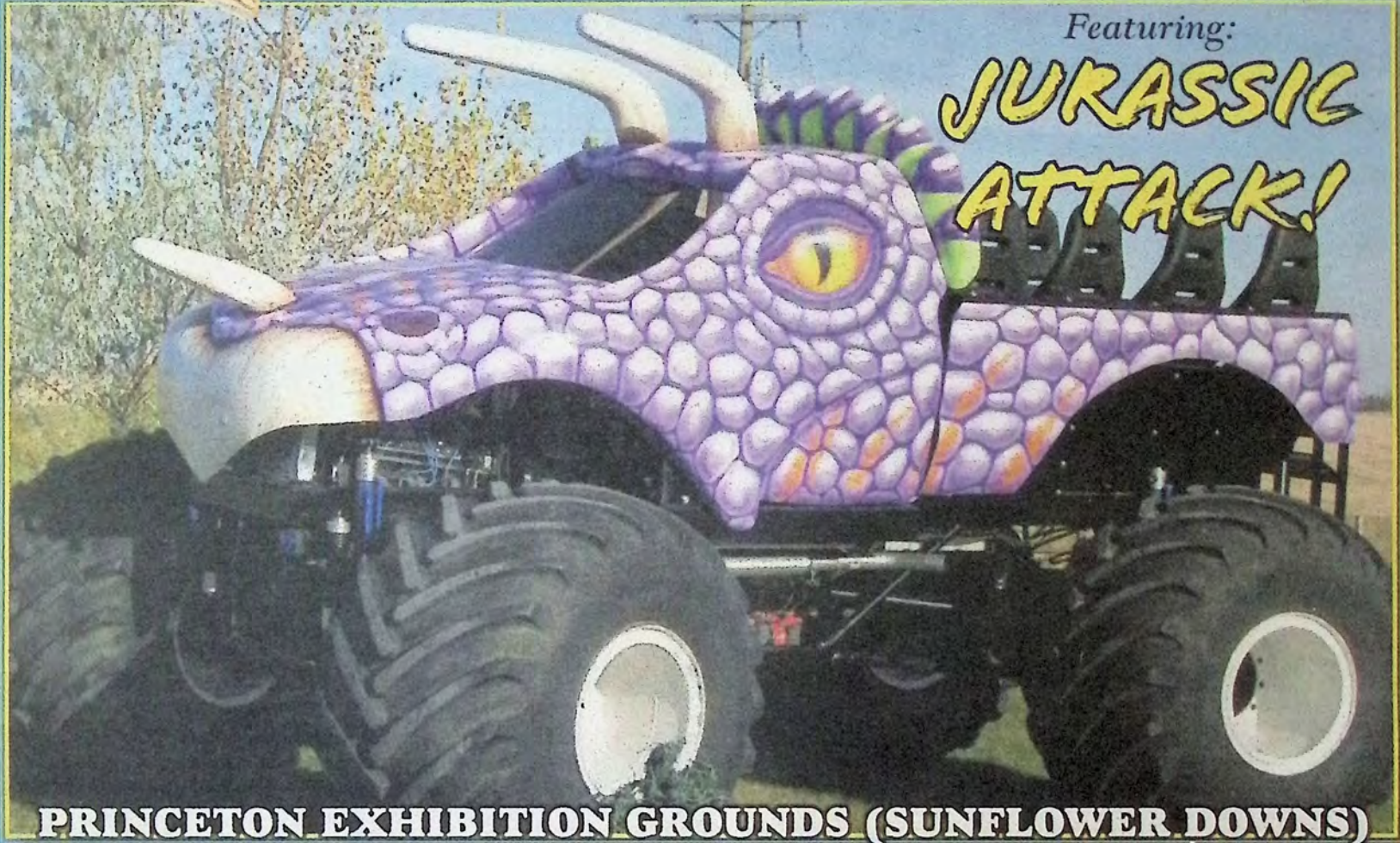

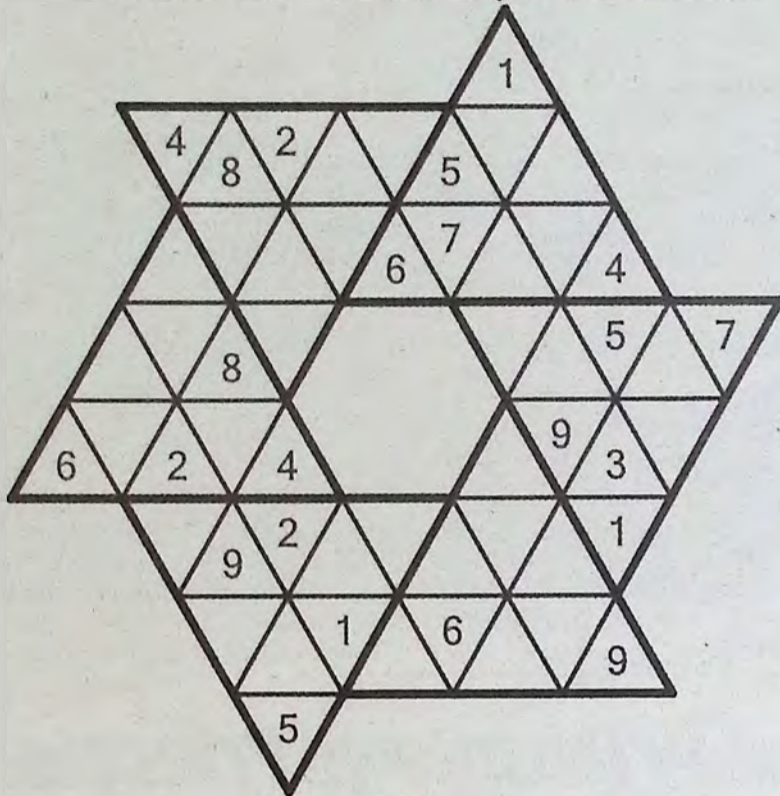

HOSHI SUDOKU - About The Puzzle

Sudoku - also known as "Number Place" - is a logic-based, combinatorial number-placement puzzle. The aim of Sudoku is to enter a number from 1 through 9 in each cell of a grid, most frequently a 9x9 grid made up of 3x3 subgrids. Each row, column and region must contain only one instance of each number. This Sudoku variant is called "Hoshi Sudoku". It contains six large triangles. The numbers 1 to 9 must be placed into the cells of each large triangle. Every line of any length - even uncontinuous - must contain every number not more than once.

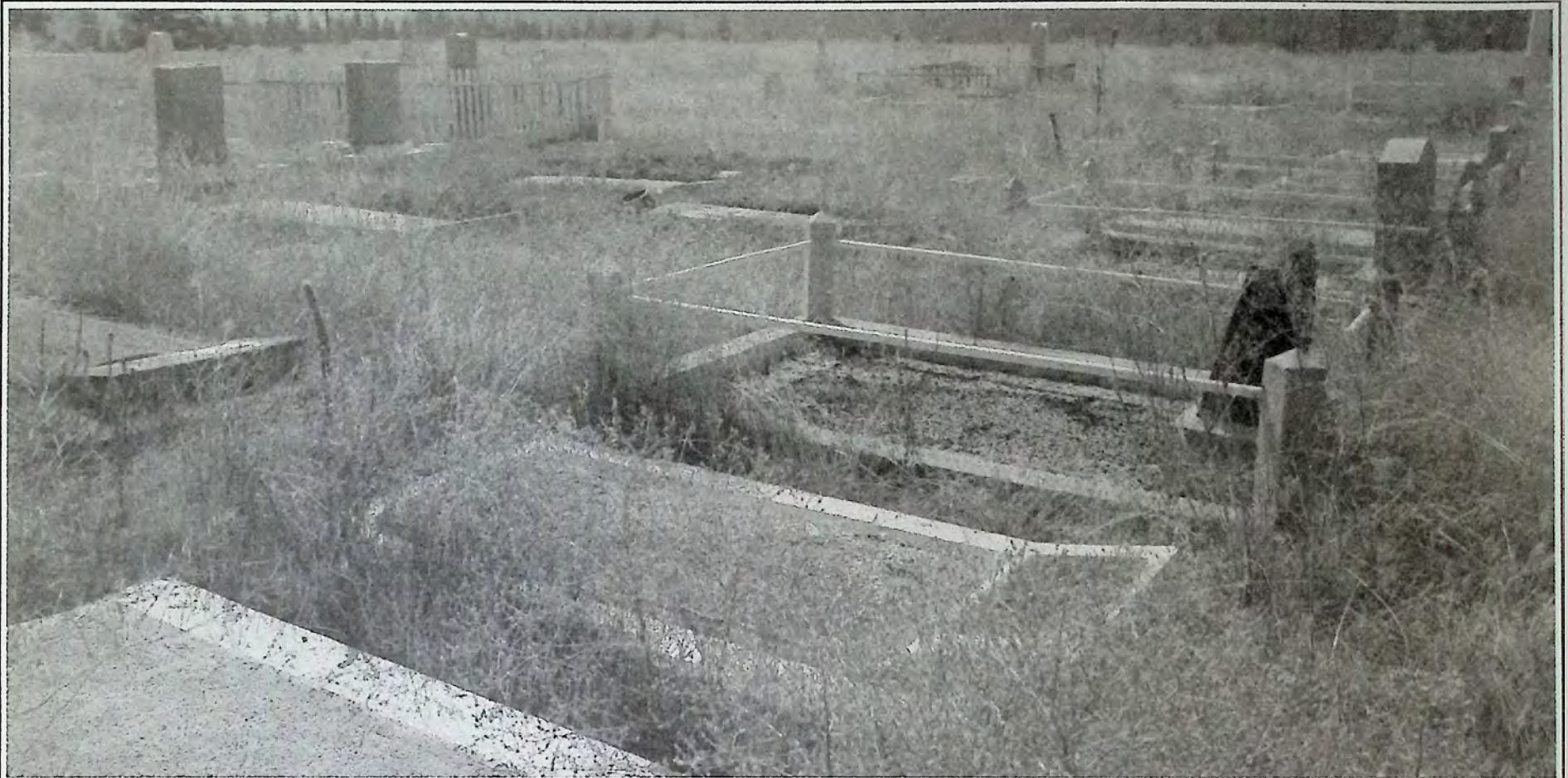

Princeton Kokanees finish strong at Provincials

The Princeton Kokanees had a fantastic provincial swim meet August 15, 16, and 17th. Thirteen swimmers traveled to Kamloops: eight qualified swimmers and five alternates. To qualify for a provincial event Princeton swimmers placed as one of the top three fastest swimmers in their age category in the Okanagan region or one of the top two fastest relay teams. The Okanagan region includes Kamloops, Kelowna, Penticton, Salmon Arm, Revelstoke, Merritt,

Lumby, Keremeos, and Golden. Attending provincials means Princeton swimmers face top competitors from every region throughout the province. Kokanees competed against larger communities with indoor and winter training facilities, many with high school swim teams, such as Richmond, Victoria, and Vancouver. Princeton made an exceptional showing, a testament to the hard work of swimmers and coaches. Provincial level swimming is excit-

ing to watch as the fastest summer swimmers in the province come together, often finishing hundredths of a second apart. Morning preliminary races determine the top 8 swimmers in each age division qualifying for afternoon finals and an additional 8 swimmers for consolations. Finals and consolations are electrifying high adrenaline events for swimmers and spectators.

The Princeton team was thrilled to add two relatively new team members to the 2014 Provincial qualifiers. In just their second season both Kyle Baird and Nathan Silbermagel attended provincials. Both boys swam division 5 butterfly, a difficult stroke to master in just two short seasons.

Nathan Silbermagel muscled a new best time of 36.09 seconds in the 50-metre fly placing 22nd in the province.

Kyle Baird placed 23rd in a longer 100-metre fly event. Both boys also swam on the division eight medley and freestyle relay teams.

Nicholas Cimbaro had an outstanding weekend competing in division 5 200-Individual Medley (IM); 50-freestyle; and 100-freestyle. Nick placed 12th in 50-free with 27.62 seconds setting a new personal best time, club record, and the "Top Dog" award for being the fastest Princeton Kokanee. Nicholas placed 18th in 200-IM with a time of 2:51.25, a personal best and club record. Dropping a huge two seconds in an event where swimmers are hundredths of a second apart,

Nicholas raced in 100-free and placed 18th with a personal best and club record of 1:02.37.

Owen Bartlett in his second consecutive provincial swim meet placed 15th in division 7 100-breaststroke.

Aidan Neilson division 4 broke the half minute barrier and placed 9th with a new personal best in 50-free of 29.34 seconds. Aidan swam to a 10th place finish in 100-backstroke.

Norm Anderson division 4 placed 7th overall in the province in 50-fly A-finals with a personal best time and club record of 32.09 seconds.

Boys division 5 medley relay made it to A-finals and placed 8th overall with Colton Heron swimming backstroke, Aidan Neilson breaststroke, Norm Anderson fly, and-hammer Nicholas Cimbaro freestyle. Division 5 free relay, comprised of the same boys, set a new personal best with a time of 2:00.07.

Boys division 8 relay team (Owen Bartlett, Kyle Baird, Nathan Silbermagel, Pete van Genne) swam hard and placed 13th in the medley relay. They placed 12th overall in the freestyle relay race dropping an amazing 4.99 seconds.

Addy van Genne, Gilly van Genne, Abbey Fulton, and Kiaira Anderson placed third in girls division 3 relay at regionals and traveled to Kamloops as alternates.

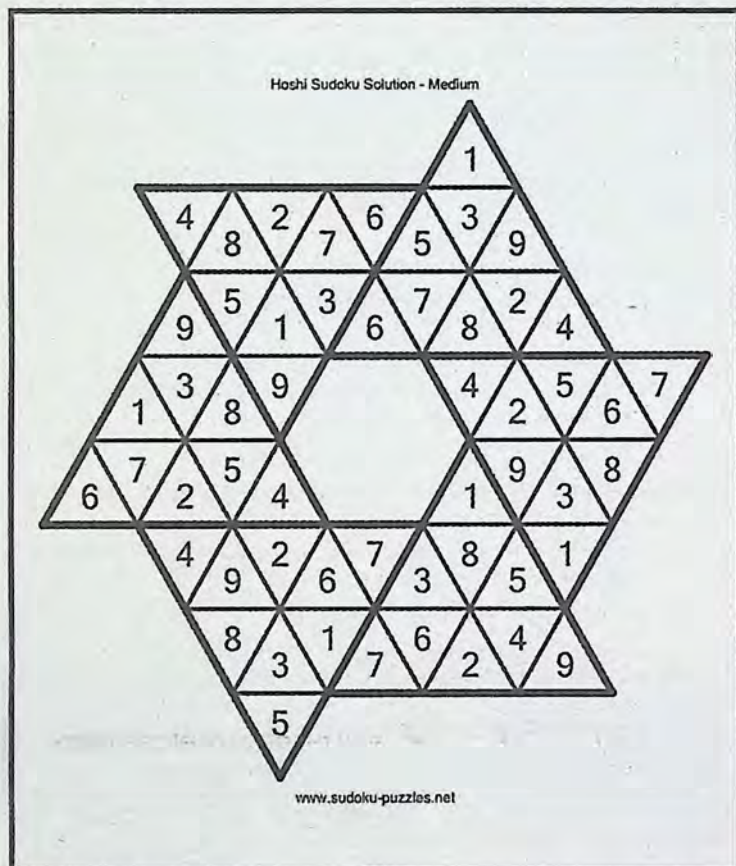
Madison Fulton attended as alternate for division 2 50-breaststroke.

We cannot have aircraft hitting deer on our airstrip and we cannot have pilots worried about what might come darting out of the grass when they are taking off or landing. It falls on Town Council to make sure that the airport is safe for the air traffic, and if this means fixing the fence or mowing the grass or coming up with a wildlife policy around the airport, it is their responsibility.

I know some people say this is the first time this has ever happened at our airport, but let's be honest, this is the busiest our airport has been in decades. If the traffic increases at the airport then the chances of an accident will increase with that increased traffic. If the fences allow deer onto the airstrip then there is an increased chance of this happening again. Let's all hope it doesn't and that this was a one time thing but I wouldn't want to put money on it.

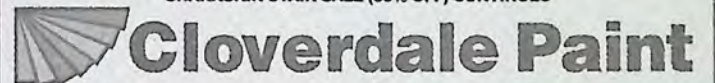
