## Posse KIJHL season begins

Preparations are underway at the Regional District of Okanagan-Similkameen for the November 15, 2014 Local Government Elections.

For those interested in running for office as an Electoral Area Director, nomination packages will be available at the Regional District of Okanagan-Similkameen (RDOS) office starting Friday, August 22.

"Anyone interested in running for office in any of the 8 Electoral Areas is invited to come and pick up a nomination package," says Christy Malden, RDOS Chief Election Officer.

"The packages include necessary forms for nominations and information which will assist potential candidates, such as important dates, Regional Board processes, and the RDOS Strategic Plan."

A nomination deposit is not required in order to run for an Electoral Area Director position however candidates are required to have 2 qualified nominators sign their nomination.

The nomination package along with additional information will also be available on the RDOS website at [www.rdos.bc.ca](http://www.rdos.bc.ca).

The nomination period begins 9:00

AM Tuesday, September 30 and ends Friday, October 10 at 4:00 PM, and nomination forms can be returned during that time.

Eligible voters will go to the polls in the Regional District of Okanagan-Similkameen on November 15 from 8:00 AM to 8:00 PM.

Local government elections are an excellent opportunity for people to contribute to, and be involved in their local community by having a say in local decision making.

## Grist Mill leasing out update

Directors Marilyn Bergen and Dave Cursons of the Grist Mill Foundation met in Keremeos on August 28th with Boundary-Similkameen MLA, Linda Larson.

There is no change in the province's current move to lease out the Provincial Historic Site at the Keremeos Grist Mill and Gardens. The lands are available for bid through to September 26th, 2014.

The Grist Mill Foundation that advances values associated with the restored and running 1877 water driven flour mill is determined that the Keremeos Grist Mill and Gardens remain intact as a social and economic asset for the Lower Similkameen and for the larger region.

A successful bid on the Grist Mill offering from BC Heritage will need to propose a cessation or else a

decrease in Provincial Government costs over time.

Whatever the outcome of the bidding process, the Grist Mill Foundation expects the government to see to the business of operating their designated Provincial Historic Site at the Keremeos Grist Mill and Gardens.

MLA Larson and the Foundation Directors agree that the site is best operated as a heritage business concern as it is with the present operator, Chris Mathieson.

The Grist Mill Foundation, formed in 2010 and lately seeking Charitable Status with the Charities Directorate of Customs and Revenue Canada will consider adding to their present goals that of growing into a capable business manager for the heritage property. The Directors of the Foundation meet next on September 18th.

Electoral Area "G" Community Parks Service Establishment Bylaw  
BYLAW NO. 2662, 2014  
Notice of Alternative Approval Process

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN pursuant to Section 86 of the Community Charter, that the Board of Directors of the Regional District of Okanagan-Similkameen seeks the approval of the electors within the boundaries of Electoral Area "G" for the adoption of the Electoral Area "G" Community Parks Service Establishment Bylaw No. 2662, 2014.

In general terms, the bylaw is to establish a service for the purpose of operating and maintaining parks within Electoral Area "G",

The alternative approval process applies to qualified electors within the service area, which is Electoral Area "G" (Keremeos Rural/Hedley) in its entirety.

The annual maximum amount that may be requisitioned under the Local Government Act for the Electoral Area "G" Community Parks Service is \$10,000 or \$0.04 per thousand dollars of net taxable value of land and improvements in the service area.

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE THAT the Regional District may proceed to adopt Electoral Area "G" Community Parks Service Establishment Bylaw No. 2662, 2014 unless at least ten percent (10%) of the qualified electors (those meeting the criteria below) indicate their opposition to the bylaw by signing the Elector Response Form.

The Regional District has estimated the total number of qualified electors in the service area of Electoral Area "G" to be 2029 and that 10% of that number, or 203 qualified electors, must submit signed Elector Response Forms to prevent the Regional District from adopting the bylaw without the full assent of the electors by referendum.

An elector response form must be in the form established by the Regional District. Elector Response Forms are available from the Regional District office, including by mail, fax, or e-mail, on request or on the Regional District website at [www.rdos.bc.ca](http://www.rdos.bc.ca).

The deadline for delivering the original signed Elector Response Form to the Regional District is 4:30 PM on Monday, October 6, 2014.

The only persons entitled to sign an Elector Response Form are qualified electors within the Electoral Area "G" Community Parks Service Area and must meet the following criteria:

**Resident electors must:**

- (a) be 18 years of age or older;
- (b) be a Canadian citizen;
- (c) be a resident of British Columbia, for at least 6 months;
- (d) be a resident of the Service Area for at least 30 days; and
- (e) not be disqualified by a Provincial enactment, or otherwise disqualified by law, from voting in an election.

**Non-Resident property electors must:**

- (a) not be entitled to register as a resident elector of the Service Area
- (b) be 18 years of age or older;
- (c) be a Canadian citizen;
- (d) be a resident of British Columbia, for at least 6 months;
- (e) be a registered owner of real property in the jurisdiction for at least 30 days;
- (f) not be disqualified by any Provincial enactment or otherwise disqualified by law, from voting in an election; and
- (g) only register as a non-resident property elector in relation to one parcel of real property in a jurisdiction.

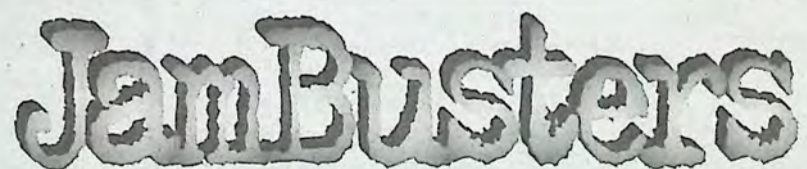

*We get asked frequently in our office about the Trans-Canada Trail and what can and can't be used on it for transportation purposes. This recent letter from the Ministry of Forests shared with us helps to clear up some of the confusion.*

Dear Bill Allinott:

As a partner in the management and development of BC's rail trails, I am writing to inform you of a revised strategic approach to rail trail management by the Ministry of Forests, Lands and Natural Resource Operations.

As you know, BC began acquiring abandoned rail corridors in the early to mid 1990s for development as recreation trails. In 2007, Recreation Sites and Trails BC assumed responsibility for the management of approximately 550 km of former rail corridors.

These trails include the Crown-owned portions of the Kettle Valley Rail Trail outside of provincial parks (from Brookmere to Midway), the Columbia and Western Rail Trail (from Midway to Castlegar), and the Slokan Valley Rail Trail.

Despite significant capital invest-

ment from the Province, federal government, Trans Canada Trail and dedicated stewardship groups, it has been very difficult to achieve the vision for a world-class network of primarily non-motorized rail trails. Limited operational resources combined with the length and remoteness of the trails, extensive infrastructure maintenance, ongoing use conflicts, and varying community support have presented many complex challenges.

The ministry sees the need to adopt a more realistic approach to rail trails management, one that represents the geographic and demographic variability across the landscape and supports the multiple interests of the communities that the trails pass through. Available funding needs to be prioritized to specific trail segments using a risk management strategy based on community support, use levels, type of use, and tourism potential.

In many communities along the trails, non-motorized use provides residents and visitors with exceptional, high quality recreational opportunities.

Centered around developed areas where use is highest, non-motorized designations protect public safety, ensure an enjoyable recreation experience, and minimize conflicts. Non-motorized trails also

offer a great opportunity for the development of destination tourism.

In the more rural and wilderness portions of the trails, non-motorized designations are impractical to implement and not always supported by local residents. Due to higher ORV use in these areas, trail surface conditions tend to deteriorate and cycling use is lower. Managing these types of areas for non-motorized use does not justify the exceptional costs required to maintain high quality tread surfaces.

The ministry's revised strategic management approach will implement an effective governance model that will vary along the length of the rail trails. Such an approach will acknowledge summer motorized use that currently exists along many portions of the trails. In these cases, we will support local efforts to manage existing uses to maximize user safety and enjoyment. It is our intention that these sections of the Trans Canada Trail will continue to serve as important components that link TCT Greenway segments across the province.

Available funding will be allocated to ensure that minimum maintenance standards are applied along the length of the trails to protect public safety and minimize environmental impacts and liabilities. Additional provincial investments will be prioritized to focus on collaborating with interested local governments and community groups to develop and manage sections of the trails where the potential for tourism development is high.

This strategic allocation of resources will provide opportunities to demonstrate the exceptional potential of BC's rail trails and hopefully foster increased community engagement along the trail network. In this manner, we can continue to work toward our vision of developing a world-class rail trail system in BC over time. We trust that you will continue to support us in achieving this goal.

Winston Churchill, Prime Minister of England during World War II, said, "You make a living by what you get. You make a life by what you give."

Famous English philosopher and writer George Bernard Shaw said, "I am of the opinion that my life belongs to the whole community and as long as I live it is my privilege to do for it whatever I can. .... Life is no brief candle to me. It is a sort of splendid torch which I've got to hold up for the moment, and I want to make it burn as brightly as possible before handing it on to future generations."

Another George, actor George Burns who lived almost 100 years, had this to say: "When you stop giving and offering something to the rest of the world, it's time to turn out the lights."

Martin Luther King said, "Life's most persistent and urgent question is 'What are you doing for others?'" Gandhi, the great spiritual leader of India said, "If you want to change the world, be that change."

St. Francis of Assisi said, "It is in the giving of oneself that one receives."

All of them were talking about contributing to one's community, and not for money.

I will quote one more source, the Talmud, a spiritual guidebook for Jews. It says "My father planted before me for my benefit, and I plant now for generations to come."

What that means is that somebody put in effort before we came along in order to make this a good place to live. Our museum was created and is maintained by volunteers. Right now they are looking for people to help keep it open on weekends during September and October. They are looking for volunteers who will greet the public.

When we do not nurture those things we were given, then those things will die.

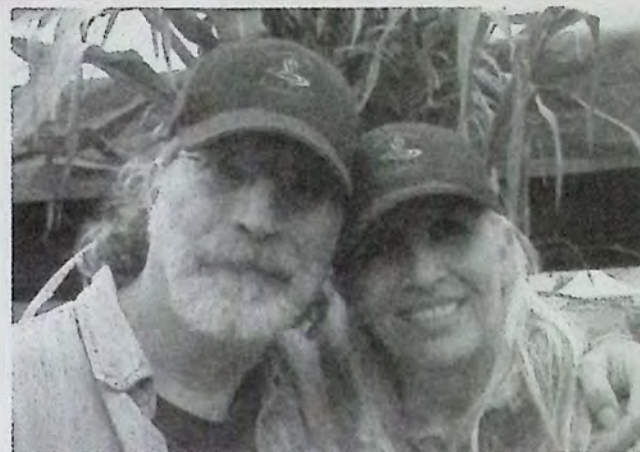

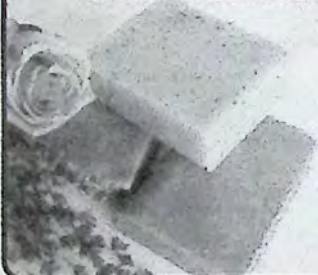
Keremeos - Cawston - Olalla

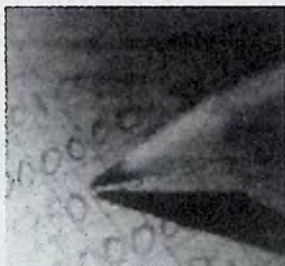

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# Saddles 'n' Spurs

My friend, Brian and I decided we wanted to go on a canoe trip so we headed out for Alexis Creek on the Chilcotin River. Brian had little or no canoe experience but he was a tremendous swimmer so I figured it would be safe for us.

It was June and the river was extremely high. We took the canoe down to the river and looked for a quiet back eddy where we could get settled in the canoe and I gave him some instructions on how to handle the paddle from the front seat.

We knew it was rough and would probably have to pull over now and again and empty the canoe but we were expecting a great trip down the river.

So off we went.

After going a mile or so we did pull over and emptied the canoe, got back in again. It was a beautiful sunny day so we had our shirts off and were enjoying the sunshine, scenery and fast water and having lots of yahoos!

We should have taken time out at Alexis Creek to get more information about the river condition. One of the things I told Brian when we started was that if we tip over was to hang onto the paddle and the front handle on the canoe and we could work it over to the side of the river, and start again. What we didn't know was that we were heading into a canyon where the water

boiled through with extremely high waves and currents! As we approached we knew we were in trouble.

I yelled, "paddle hard! And remember what I told you!" A big wave came over the back end of the canoe and pushed it into the raging river straight up and down. I had no intention of hanging on as I was sitting in the back! When I made it to the surface Brian was hanging onto the canoe and his paddle as instructed. He turned around and saw me and thought there was no way he was going to keep hanging on. He let the canoe go and both of us had to swim for our life.

I made it to shore and climbed up from the water but found myself on the wrong side of the river. I couldn't see Brian so I stayed where I was and eventually he came up on the same side.

So there we were - no canoe - no shirts - and only one moccasin between the two of us and no way to cross the river. We started making our way through the bush in the direction of Alexis Creek and found another large back eddy from the flooding waters. In it were several short logs that had been caught in a whirlpool so we had a plan. The river at this point was fast but not particularly dangerous so I had the bright idea of taking our two belts, tying enough

logs together to make a raft and we could hold it together with our legs hanging over the side. We had some smaller sticks that we could use for paddles and as we went down the river we could work our way over to the other side. Once we got our raft made and into the current we were on our way, but it was faster than we expected. We were almost to the other side where some trees were hanging over the river when our belts broke and we grabbed the trees and managed to get ourselves out of the river.

Now we had no belts - no shirts - one moccasin and started walking back towards Alexis Creek. When we got out of the heavy bush we thought it would be easier because it was grassland but there was lots of small cactus and picking our way through was really tough. We could see where the road was but getting there was really slow.

I would hop about twenty feet with my moccasin and throw it back to Brian, then he would hop to me. We did this a number of times to get to the road, our feet were sore and bleeding.

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## Living Past 100

### Vitamin D Demands Magnesium

Are you suffering from leg cramps this summer, or have you been constipated? Maybe both? You may be lacking in magnesium. Your supply of magnesium can become more depleted in summer due to your body manufacturing Vitamin D from your being out in the sunshine.

Magnesium is an essential mineral in your body. Magnesium is associated with bone development when combined with calcium. Magnesium controls nerve and muscle impulses and proper pH balance. A deficiency of magnesium not only causes muscle cramps and constipation, it can contribute to depression, muscle weakness, twitching, heart disease and high blood pressure. Magnesium has a role in digesting and absorbing carbohydrates and minerals. In combination with Vitamin B6, magnesium helps dissolve 'stones' that can form in the body.

Magnesium is found in many foods. Dairy products, fish, meat and seafood are rich in magnesium. This is why having nice cold dairy treats such as milkshakes may be good for you in summer. Other good sources of magnesium are apples, apricots, avocados, bananas, beans, nuts, green leafy vegetables and whole grains.

What can cause lack of magnesium? Taking diuretics, fluoride, diarrhea, high amounts of zinc and Vitamin D require a greater intake of magnesium. Some foods prevent magnesium from being absorbed such as drinking a lot of tea, taking cod liver oil, eating almonds, Swiss chard, spinach, chocolate, rhubarb and almonds.

Magnesium supplements can be taken to alleviate the symptoms of deficiency. Magnesium tablets are available, and if constipation is a problem, a product known as milk of magnesia will do the trick. The only warning is this: a little bit of magnesium goes a long way. Too large a dose will cause the opposite of constipation. To avoid loose bowels, take a small amount daily until the muscle cramps and/or constipation disappear. Then eat more foods rich in magnesium.

### Towards A Nuclear Weapons Free World - Part 1

Last May, I had the opportunity of attending a meeting in Ottawa of Parliamentarians for Nuclear Non Proliferation and Disarmament (PNND). The meeting was chaired by my colleague, Helène Laverdière, our NDP Deputy Foreign Affairs critic.

In addition to MPs from the Conservative, Liberal and New Democratic parties, a few distinguished guests were present. I had the pleasure of meeting Bev DeLong of the Canadian Network to Abolish Nuclear Weapons as well as two former Canadian Ambassadors for Disarmament, Paul Meyer and Douglas Roche (both had just returned from the third Preparatory meeting of the 2015 Non-Proliferation Treaty Review Conference in New York.)

The consensus at the meeting was that Canada could be doing more to promote a nuclear free world. For example, we could be working with other countries to implement the 5 Point Proposal on Nuclear Disarmament as outlined by United Nations Secretary General, Ban Ki Moon:

1. Pursue negotiations in good faith - as required by the NPT - on nuclear disarmament, either through a new convention or through a series of mutually reinforcing instruments backed by a credible system of verification.
2. Strengthen security in the disarmament process, and ...assure non-nuclear weapon states against nuclear weapons threats.
3. Ensure that disarmament is rooted in legal obligations through universal membership in multilateral treaties, regional nuclear-weapon-free zones, a new treaty on fissile materials, and ratification and entry into force of the comprehensive nuclear test ban treaty.

4. Ensure disarmament is visible to the public through greater accountability and transparency - thus countries with nuclear weapons should publish more information about what they are doing to fulfill their disarmament commitments.

5. Recognize that nuclear disarmament also requires eliminating other weapons of mass destruction and limiting missiles, space weapons and conventional arms.

Former Ambassador Meyer stated that Canada needs to undertake more proactive measures towards the goal of nuclear disarmament. For example, Canada could launch a major diplomatic initiative, champion measures of risk reduction prevention and encourage NATO to wean itself off the attachment to nuclear weapons. We could also reinvigorate our leadership position on outer space security. Mr. Roche talked about the pressure of the military industrial complex to not move anti-nuclear initiatives forward and the need to resolve con-

flicts without war. Our goal, according to him, should be a 21st century without nuclear weapons.

As the International Committee of the Red Cross states, "Humanity is at a crossroads: either a credible process or processes will be put in place leading to the prohibition and elimination of nuclear weapons or the number of States and other actors able and willing to use nuclear weapons will continue to increase."

The more nuclear weapons we have, the greater probability that they will be used either accidentally or intentionally. We only have to remember the Cuban Missile Crisis of 1962 to see how close the world came to nuclear destruction. Ultimately, all our concerns about quality of life, poverty, hunger and climate change will be meaningless, if our planet experiences a nuclear catastrophe.

Canada needs to step up to the plate in order to make a nuclear-free world happen. We can do better.

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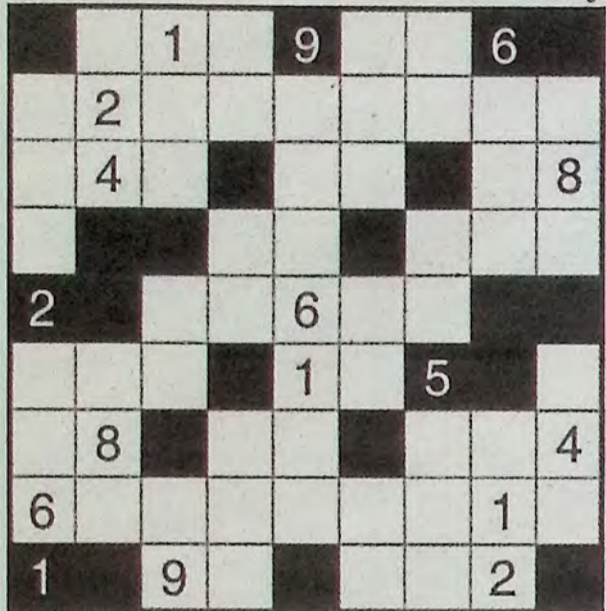

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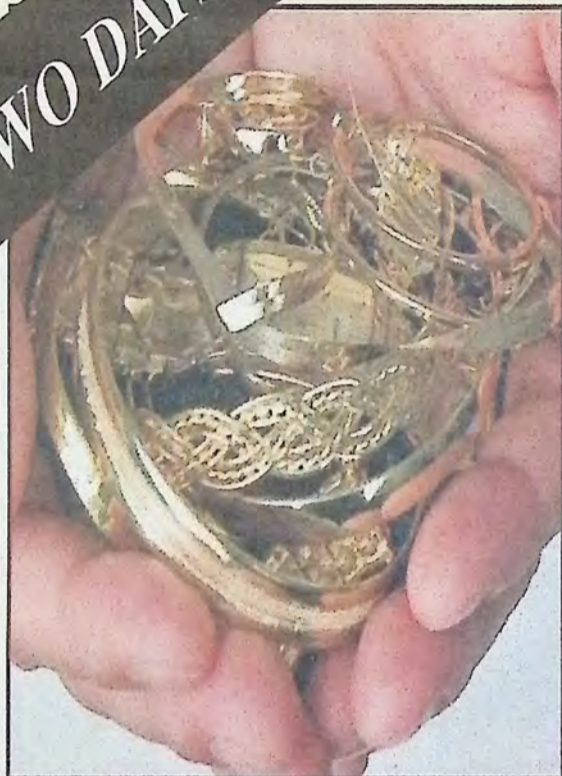

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Barry Dick is a precious metals buyer and President of Ursa Major Gold, Silver & Coin.

"Ursa Major has the unique advantage of dealing direct with a smelter" said Dick.

"Better Business Bureau complaints about mail in gold companies are extremely high, but it is hard to regulate. My advice is that you do NOT mail your precious metals to anyone you haven't met or spoken with at length" says Dick.

Ursa Major analyzes your gold, silver and coins while you watch, with the process explained to you in detail. Coins with numismatic value are set aside from those with a 'melt' value. Silver items such as jewellery and flatware are analyzed for hallmark identification. Items thought to contain gold will also be analyzed for hallmarks, and then confirmed using precise testing that is done while you watch. Then a cash offer is made and you decide to sell or not.

Dick took out his first gold claim when he turned 16 in the 1970's and has been involved with precious metals ever since. An ardent gold panner, he was a regular at the world championship gold panning competition with a personal best of 3rd place in 1984. Now he concentrates on building the wholesale business with jewellers and brokers while taking the roadshow out one or two times a month across Western Canada.

"People bring in all kinds of interesting items, but for the most part it is a broken or old chain, unloved jewelry, a single earring, and out of fashion items like charm bracelets. We also accept dental gold but it should be clean. Lately I see more and more silver flatware sets, but before you bring those in please make sure it says 'Sterling' on the handle. There is a lot of silver plated flatware that we can't buy due to the low silver content," says Dick.

Another valuable item is coin with silver content. Dimes, Quarters, Half Dollars and Dollars from Canada and America can be sorted and the silver content determined in no time at all. People are encouraged to bring in any and all coins for assessment.

Ursa Major also assesses and purchases Canadian and Dominion of Canada Paper Money. Ursa Major has extensive experience working with estate sales, executors, widows and widowers in a respectful and caring manner.

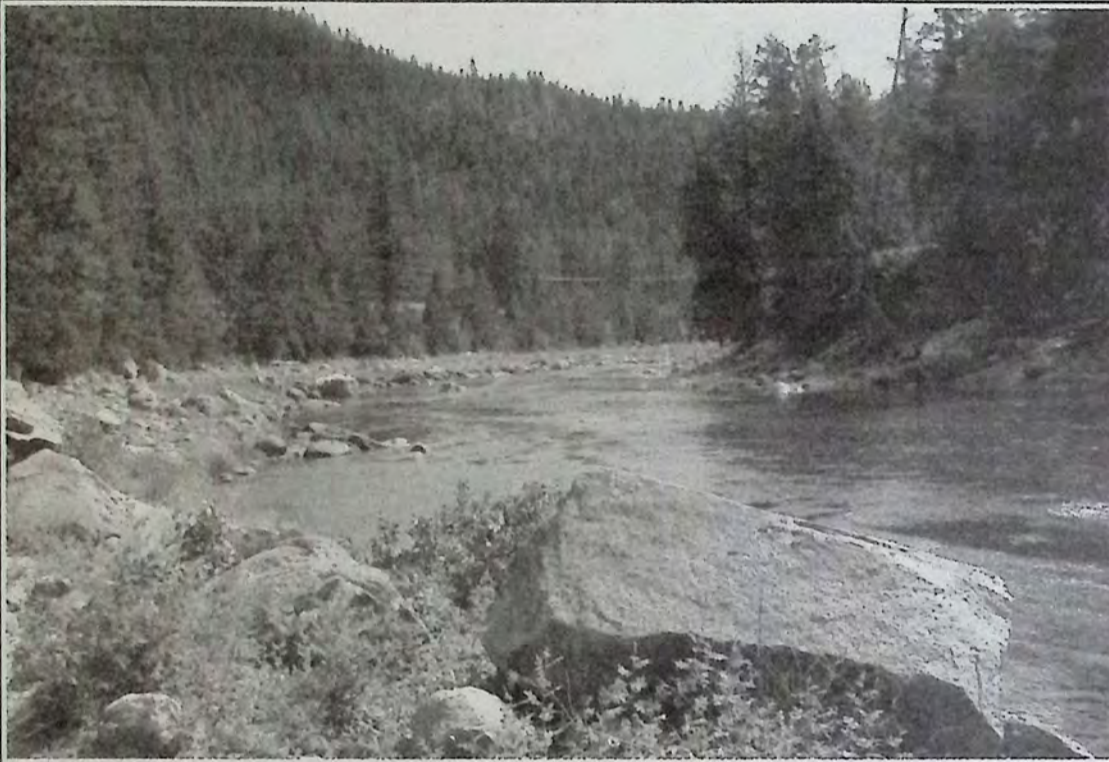

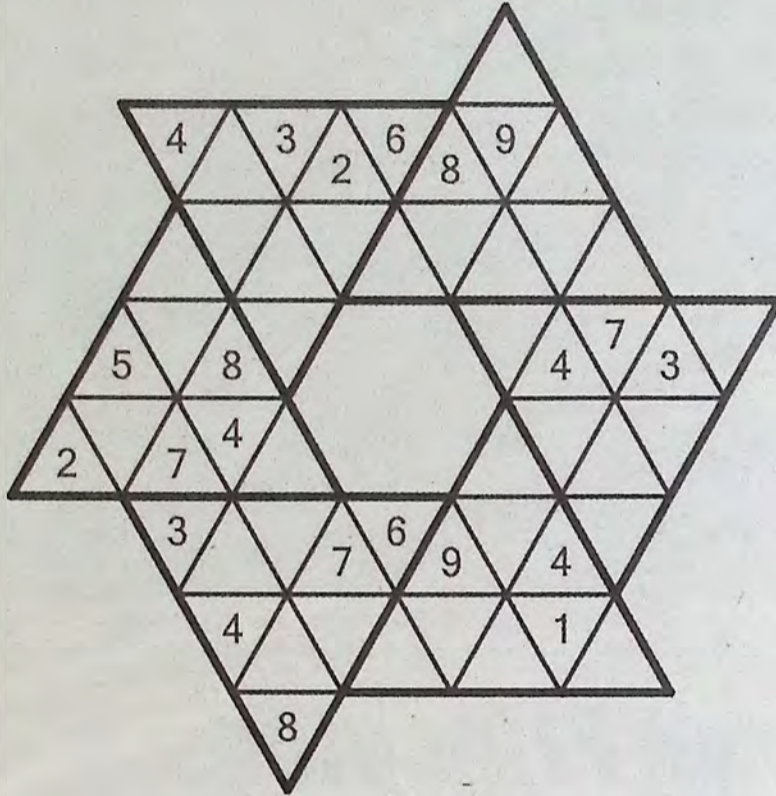

Sudoku - also known as "Number Place" - is a logic-based, combinatorial number-placement puzzle. The aim of Sudoku is to enter a number from 1 through 9 in each cell of a grid, most frequently a 9x9 grid made up of 3x3 subgrids. Each row, column and region must contain only one instance of each number. This Sudoku variant is called "Hoshi Sudoku". It contains six large triangles. The numbers 1 to 9 must be placed into the cells of each large triangle. Every line of any length - even uncontinuous - must contain every number not more than once.

## Saving Downtown Princeton...

Recent postings on Facebook have nudged me to go back to a topic I discussed earlier this year about the dangers of social media and small business.

It's not restricted to just small towns, either. I have Facebook, Twitter, LinkedIn, Pinterest, Instagram, Foursquare and Google+ accounts. I also monitor what is being said about my business with periodic searches online. There are a lot of ways to make these tools work for you in promoting your business or the activities of your business in your community but they take a lot of work. I don't even want to guess how much time I spend posting and checking what people are saying about the News Leader online but I can tell you that there are only a couple of those accounts I use many times a day to keep the appearance of updated activity.

The other side of the social media coin is what can be said and done about a business by an upset customer. A fine example is Foursquare where users are encouraged to leave 'tips' about places/businesses they have visited. Some of the comments posted online about Princeton at this site are not very good, and regardless of whether or not the experience is an accurate account of a situation, others finding it online will use it as a guideline. TripAdvisor is another spot where users can complain or compliment.

While I agree that these tips and comments may have some kind of value for travelers, I don't use them to make any decisions as I know there is a possibility that whoever posted the bad review of Fred's Diner may have been in a bad mood when they posted it. That also means that if I was in Fred's Diner

and thought the service was poor, there could be another reason for it. I'm certainly not going to pull out my handheld device and post a tip online saying something like, "The food sucks as bad as the service at Fred's Diner - avoid like the plague!"

I would not want to be either the employee or owner of Fred's Diner once that gem gets shared across the universe, and you know it will. In fact, because of human nature, that message will end up being viewed and shared far more than one saying, "The menu was great, prices fair and such clean bathrooms at Fred's Diner - I highly recommend it!" ever will.

The tendency for customers to expect five-star service everywhere they shop and the immediacy of online activity has made how many businesses do business even more difficult than before. Don't get me

wrong, every customer should be treated as if they are spending a million dollars at the counter. But some are just a bit more difficult to please than others and if their expectations aren't met, out comes the smart phone and faster than you can say "have a nice day" there's photos of your storefront posted online with a message warning all others in the same area code to beware.

Okay, I agree. Some business owners need to smarten up. Clean up their act and get it together. That's not just in Princeton, either. Some business owners have obviously forgotten why they are in business in the first place.

Conversely, some customers have forgotten that abusing store clerks and complaining online about service, products, pricing and whatever doesn't always ensure a better customer service experience the next time they happen to find them-

selves in that store.

The last time a clerk 'ignored' me I got over it. I considered the possibility that they were already having a bad day or the customer ahead of me already tore them a new one. Maybe the store clerk was quietly dealing with a private family or personal issue. Possibly they were stuck at work after receiving bad news and were just not focused on the job. I know, easy to say they should have taken the rest of the day off but I doubt it's all that easy to do in some of the retail outlets you and I frequent in Princeton and the South Okanagan/Similkameen.

My general rule of thumb is to allow for the possibility that I'm not the reason why the clerk or store owner is acting the way they are when I'm at the counter with money in hand about to put it into their till. Hey, trust me when I say ..... continued on Page 19
