Town announces cemetery improvements

The Town of Princeton adopted a proposed Cemetery Improvement Plan at their September 2nd regular meeting.

The plan includes two parts. One will see improvements to the road to the site, which will be the responsibility of the Ministry of

Transportation along with upgrades to existing signage. The second part of the plan involves some major improvements to the cemetery itself.

"It has always been difficult to keep the Cemetery lawn green particularly in the heat of the summer due to a lack of adequate water supply and staff time," explains Director of Infrastructure and Parks Kevin Huey in his report to council.

"A large amount of resources have been expended over the years with an unsatisfactory result," Huey adds.

The cost of connecting the cemetery to the town water supply is estimated to be in the range of \$250,000 that would include a booster pump installation with the cost of water and annual maintenance costs extra.

"Currently the town spends \$15,000 to \$20,000 per year on maintenance which would be expected to increase by at least fifty percent," according to Huey.

"In staff's opinion, it would be prudent and cost effective to pursue continued on Page 19

Fortis scraps dam project

Fortis Generation Similkameen LP, which is indirectly, wholly owned by Fortis Inc., announced September 4th it will not move forward with the proposed Similkameen River water management and hydroelectric project at this time.

The company made the decision based on the results of its most recent project feasibility studies.

"We believe that building a water storage hydroelectric facility on the Similkameen River would create

many benefits for the area," said project manager Joseph Sukhnandan.

"However, based on the results of our latest engineering and economic studies, we determined the project is not financially viable at this time."

The proposed 165 metre (541 foot) concrete facility was expected to have useable water storage and deliver between 45 to 65 megawatts of electrical capacity along with the associated water management benefits.

Various groups have investigated the feasibility of a water storage and hydroelectric facility in the area since the 1990s.

Fortis Generation Similkameen LP may re-evaluate the viability of the project in the future based on customer demand and market conditions.

Fortis Inc. is the largest investor-owned electric and gas distribution utility in Canada, with total assets approaching \$25 billion and fiscal 2013 revenue exceeding \$4 billion.

Its regulated utilities account for approximately 93 per cent of total assets and serve more than 3 million customers across Canada and in the United States and the Caribbean.

Fortis owns non-regulated hydroelectric generation assets in Canada, Belize and Upstate New York. The Corporation's non-utility investments are comprised of hotels and commercial real estate in Canada.

Canada is sending Special Operations troops into Iraq to help with training. The Prime Minister has said that the Canadian military personnel on the ground will not be openly engaging in a combat capacity. Something else that we need to make a note of is that this is a thirty day mission. Why would Canada be sending in our elite troops for thirty days? You are not going to accomplish a lot of training in a month and if they are only sending 100 soldiers you really have to wonder how many people will be trained. The term observer has been given to the force that will be sent and I think this is a more important point.

Although Canada's military is taxed at the moment our forces have been effective in fighting against the Taliban in Afghanistan and this is most likely one of the reasons our forces are deploying. I would not be surprised if we see British, Australian, French and German forces begin to do the same as Canada. As the coalition builds so will the troop buildup. The American population will be leery of yet another war in Iraq and the Obama administration will use its air power as much as possible before actively deploying troops to the region.

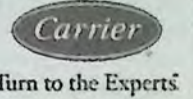

My Turn...

The Stuff of Legends

I had an interesting opportunity last week.

I sat down in the stands at Princeton Arena and recorded a short video interview with Ivan McLelland. A week before the interview I had never heard of him, but knew a bit about his history. He was the goalie who played for the Penticton Vees and went all the way to represent Canada in 1955 and returned as World Champions.

As you could imagine, he is a grey-haired senior but full of energy and stories. I could have recorded hours of video but I'd still be uploading it as you read about it here.

In my career I have crossed paths with many individuals others consider stars and heroes. That sort of thing has never really had an affect on me. What I liked most about Ivan was that he was still telling the stories of hockey in the 1950s as if it all happened last month. His vivid recall was amazing to me but not as amazing as his interesting explanation on why he and his teammates played the game when television was still in its infancy and the NHL only had the 'Original Six' teams.

They all had full-time jobs in Penticton and hockey was more of a game between friends rather than a sport built around huge salaries and drawing a crowd to help the franchise owners with their bottom line.

He said they played the game for the love of hockey.

I saw innocence, a purity of sorts with that realization.

I see it with the approach I've taken in my business and have continued following the same premise without actually putting it into words.

I never imagined buying a business in Princeton would make me rich, so that was never my incentive. I did see getting into business in Princeton as a way to continue doing something I really enjoy – and sometimes think I'm not all that bad at – doing.

I often think I was born fifty to one hundred years too late.

There's so many things I think I would have loved doing for the sheer enjoyment of doing them at a time where the demands on life and success weren't as prominent as they are in today's world.

I think I would have been a good fit in the world of the 1955 Penticton Vees when hockey was still just a game. A game that was played for fun because it was just that – fun. Long before league expansion and the need to draft players and entice them with fat contracts.

That doesn't mean there's anything wrong with having a dream of bigger and better things. The best part is that each of us still has access to a local hockey rink and team that can make those dreams come true or at the very least allow us to keep dreaming them.

Are You One of These?

Canadian author Margaret Atwood wrote a trilogy about people recovering from catastrophic earth changes. These three books tell the story of people struggling to survive and re-create a society and an environment in which there is some positive outlook for the future. The people doing the job are called God's gardeners.

There really are God's gardeners, they exist now, and they are trying in their own way to prevent deterioration of our food supply and our environment. They are in no way part of the stories written by Margaret Atwood, but they are the frontrunners of a movement by Christian church groups who are trying to make our world a better, safer place to live. They do their gardening in the Fraser Valley in a number of locations.

When they started out, they were just a few people committed to getting back to raising food the natural way, without a lot of pesticides, herbicides and artificial fertilizers, all of which contain toxins. They began by planting vegetable gardens for themselves and

to share with others. Ten years ago, just a few seemed interested. Today there are many more people who have joined this small crusade to make food healthier. Their first principle is to know where your food comes from.

Food is just one aspect of what these gardeners believe in. They are concerned with the basic wild environment, as all gardeners must be. One of these gardeners is a biologist, and he urges all of us to know the natural vegetation of the area in which we live, and to respect the plants that have made our environment livable, not only for us, but for the wildlife sustained by the plants around us. He would like us to know the plants, what they are good for, and how to protect them as well as utilize them.

At first, church congregations were not particularly interested in gardening, but more and more are persuaded that natural organic gardens fit well with Christian principles. Providing for ourselves, sharing with others, giving value to the earth and all its life, fit into the concept of caring about what has been created by a higher power.

Beyond gardening, the principles of these groups discuss social issues such as over consumption and rabid consumerism. Their second principle is to know where your garbage goes. When you know where your garbage goes, you may think twice about buying things that will surely contribute a great deal to your local landfill. Gardeners take garden waste and put it back into the soil in the form of compost and/or manure. Gardeners do not fill their soil

with plastics, tin cans, and anything that might contaminate the soil. Making compost is the gardener's first method of recycling.

Addressing rampant consumerism may seem like an odd thing for a gardener to do but it makes sense. What we do not buy does not need to be disposed of by recycling nor by dumping in the landfill. A gardener is well aware of how a small thing can become big and have to be dealt with eventually. A gardener plants a tiny seed, watches it grow to a large plant, and after harvest, disposes of the remains of the plant by recycling it as compost. To paraphrase the Las Vegas saying, "What grows in a gardener's backyard stays in a gardener's backyard."

When we buy things we do not need, or when we buy things requiring a lot of packaging, or when we buy stuff that can't be recycled, we are not among God's gardeners.

Another thing these gardeners promote is setting aside one day each week as a day to buy nothing. It does not seem like a big chore to me to avoid shopping for one day a week. The main reason for setting aside one day a week is to make us think of how quickly we rush out to buy things.

Ten days ago, news media reported it is our purchasing that gave our economy a boost in July. Pardon me, we do not have much of an economy if we have to depend on consumer spending to hold our economy together! We continue to go shopping, which is not a bad thing, but every week we hear about too much. Are these Christian gardeners on the right track? Will they contribute something better to our way of life? I tend to think so, but I am a gardener. I have had a garden any time I have had access to some soil in which to plant seeds. I tend the wild bushes in my yard and I grow vegetables and berries in my garden. I often harvest wild fruit, too. My gardening pays me in food, in exercise, in health, both mental and physical. So that is a great thing. Obviously, I consider gardening a worthwhile endeavour, but I don't know if it makes much difference in our world as it is. However, what might our world be like if everyone who had access to some soil planted a vegetable garden?

Town second quarter books look good

The Town of Princeton Second Quarter financial statement was released at the September 2nd regular meeting of Town Council.

Director of Finance for the town Shirley McMahon stated at the meeting that the statement showed the finances as of June 30, 2014.

"It's pretty much on track and as expected," she said.

"And slightly under budget."

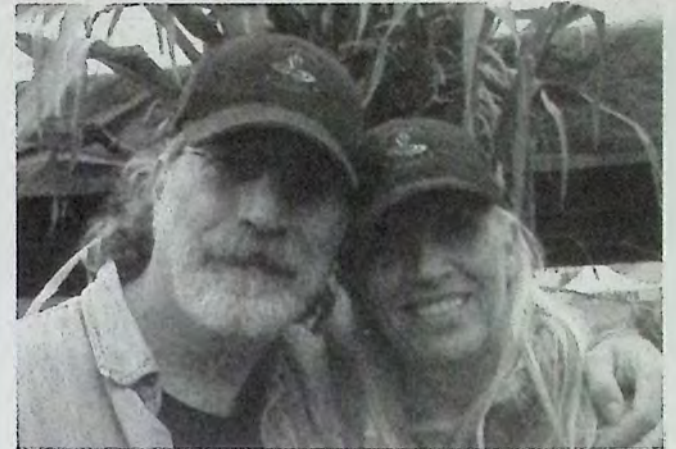
A closer look at the numbers verifies that statement with a surplus of \$667,574. The Statement of

Operations shows total expenditures totaling \$2,567,315 with the largest amount of that (\$958,355) going to capital expenses followed by (\$440,157) for general government services and \$315,992 for transportation services.

Total revenues amounted to \$3,234,889 with the bulk of that (\$1,614,919) coming from taxation followed by water and sewer users fees (\$595,174 - Water, \$281,818 - sewer).

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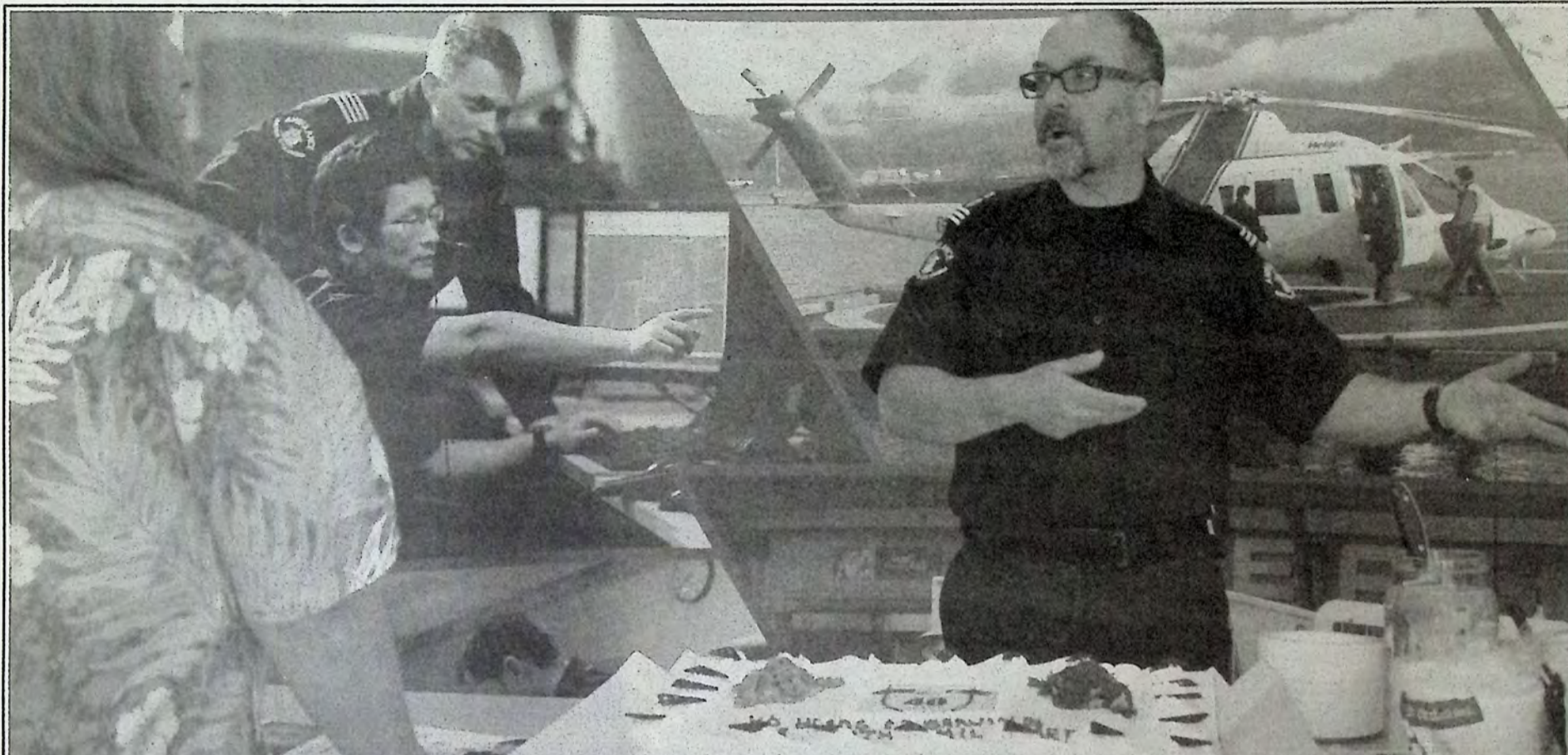

We had a colt born on the ranch. It was a beautiful bay and we enjoyed watching all the horses and the foal growing up. I was quite busy building log houses at the time so I had-

n't given the colt a lot of attention. When he was about 2 years old he knew what he was and he loved those mares! I had to keep him separate from the girls so we wouldn't

have any more babies. One day he got in with the other mares so I caught him and put him in a stall in the barn. He had never been in a stall before and the door was about my chest height. I stood there looking at him to make sure he calmed down and suddenly he reared up and I thought to myself "Oh, no - he's going to try and jump out!"

He leapt over as I jumped out of the way and got hung up on his belly on the door. He finally kicked his way out and took after the mares!

The battle was on! I quickly grabbed a sturdy horse, one that had been ridden a lot and was in good shape. I threw a saddle on and jumped on, not even setting the stirrups and away we went with my lariat.

Our ranch was 160 acres with no cross fencing so it was a ride! I knew that the two year old wouldn't have the stamina that the horse I was riding on did. He was fast but soon tired out and slowed up so I got a lasso around his neck and dallied the lariat around the saddle horn. I jumped off my horse, undid the rope and tied it to a tree. The stud was sweating and trembling when I went up to him he took off in the other direction - hit the end of the lariat and flipped over on his back.

He got up and I decided to leave him tied there and let him settle down. Then I remembered Dempsey Collison really wanted this stud so I phoned him and told him he needed to get right out and pick up this little guy while he was tired. He came as fast as he could and we winched him into the horse trailer, fighting all the way! Closed the doors on him and Dempsey took him home, loved the horse, trained it and rode him for years in his outfit-fitter business.

Living Past 100

Make The Most of Autumn Foods

Autumn is the season of harvesting. In early September, many of the summer foods still linger in field production in Canada, foods such as cucumbers, tomatoes and summer squash such as zucchini. As this season gradually becomes colder, winter squash, pumpkin and root crops such as onions, carrots, potatoes, parsnips and beets are harvested. Often, the price of these vegetables is reduced, and buying in bulk can save you money if you have storage space or if you do home preserving. Carrots can be stored in a refrigerator for months.

Home gardeners know all the tricks of storing and preserving the vegetables of autumn. Green tomatoes can be wrapped in newspaper and left to ripen, or they can be turned into relish or pickles. Ripe tomatoes can be frozen whole, canned or turned into sauce. Cucumbers can become relish. Zucchini can be grated and frozen to be used in cakes or soup. Onions are stored in a cool dry spot, carrots are washed and stored in plastic bags in the refrigerator, winter squash and pumpkins can be stored at room temperature for months, and potatoes can be stored in boxes in a cool, dark dry place. Beets can be preserved in jars as is, or turned into pickled beets.

Autumn fruit, such as pears, prunes and apples, can be preserved through canning. Apples can be stored a long time in a cool dry place or in a refrigerator.

Herbs, such as parsley, sweet basil, sage, thyme and oregano can be picked (no roots) and tied together at the stem and hung to dry. When dry, the leaves can be crumbled and placed in jars to be used throughout the year. Just hang the herb bundles upside down tied to a line or even a clothes hanger and hang them at room temperature until dry enough to crumble.

There are lots of ways to preserve the abundance of the autumn harvest. It is nice to be able to buy at lower cost and have food stored for winter use when grocery store prices are higher.

One of the great things about internet is being able to find recipes for use of the many vegetables and fruits, and for tips and techniques on home preserving and storage of vegetables at home.

Often, people do not preserve many of the fruits and vegetables of autumn because they do not know how to utilize them. For example, many people do not know how to make their own pumpkin pie filling or apple sauce. Many people do not buy a big winter squash because they do not know that cooked squash can be frozen and used later in squash soup. Many people do not like turnips but do not know turnips are wonderful when mixed with carrots and mashed with a little butter, salt and pepper.

The cost of buying food is going to continue to increase. There are more people on this planet every year, and there are environmental disasters, loss of crop land and many other factors that cause decreased food production every year. Making the most of what is available in abundance is just good sense.

Posse opening weekend features fundraiser

This weekend it's hockey, hockey, hockey!

Princeton Posse start their 2014/15 KIJHL regular season hosting Golden Rockets on Friday, September 12th and Chase Heat Sunday, September 14th with a special event in the middle that has been promoted as an 'Evening of Champions.'

Starting at 7:00 PM on Saturday, September 13th with a meet and greet at Riverside Centre, 1955 World Champion Penticton Vees goalie Ivan McLelland will make a presentation based on his book "Gold Mine to Gold Medal and Beyond."

McLelland's book was the result of requests from family and friends to have documentation of the old days of hockey and the stories revolving the road to the World Championship series against Russia.

McLelland told the News Leader last week that the game of hockey was very different at that time. Not only was the game not as fast as it

is today, nor built around huge player contracts, the NHL only had six teams. For fans in smaller communities around the country it was a bigger deal to have a nearby team play in, and possibly win, the Allan Cup, awarded to the Canadian National Championship hockey team, as opposed to the Stanley Cup.

McLelland says it was because of that, and because all players on teams such as the Penticton Vees had full-time regular jobs to keep them going, the game of hockey was more a fun activity than a carefully calculated sporting event scheduled to generate big bucks for team owners.

At the time of the Vees successful run to the World Championships, the team played in the Okanagan Senior League. That hockey league was formed in 1951 and played interlocking games with a neighbouring league based in the Kootenays. Players were in their early to late twenties, which would put them in an age category outside

of the current Junior B requirements.

McLelland financed the printing of his book "Gold Mine to Gold Medal and Beyond" with an initial press run of 1,000 copies, which sold quickly. He used the profits to support charities close to his heart including the Alzheimer's Society but the event planned for this weekend is all for the Princeton Posse.

Tickets to the 'Evening of Champions', which will also honour the late Pro Rodeo Hall of Famer Kenny McLean, of whom McLelland was a fan of, are just \$10 each and are available at the Posse home game Saturday night, online at princetonposse.org or from Auto Tac Signs and Embroidery on Bridge Street, Princeton.

Weekend passes are also available for \$25 each and they will allow access to both Posse home games and the "Evening of Champions."

The evening will feature auctions and draws with the main prizes being a replica jersey from the 1955 World Champion Penticton Vees autographed by McLelland and donated by Game Time Sports and a matte finish ready to frame print of McLelland, NHL referee Steve Kozari and Norris Trophy Winner Duncan Keith. Only three of these exist in the entire world.

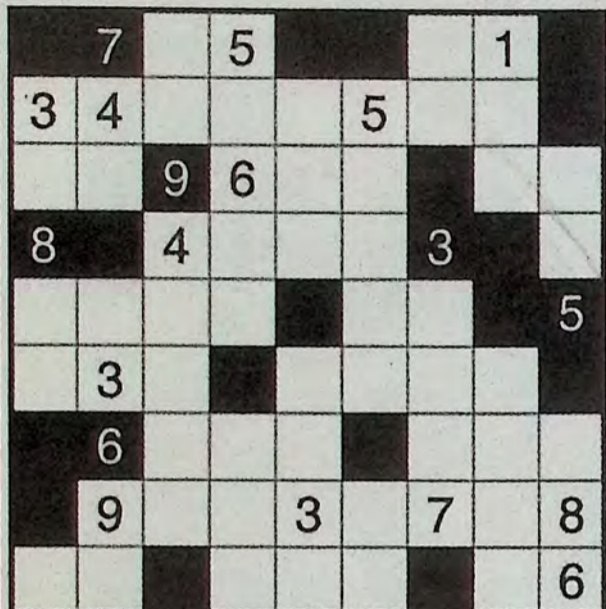

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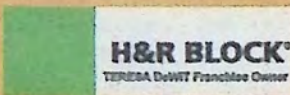

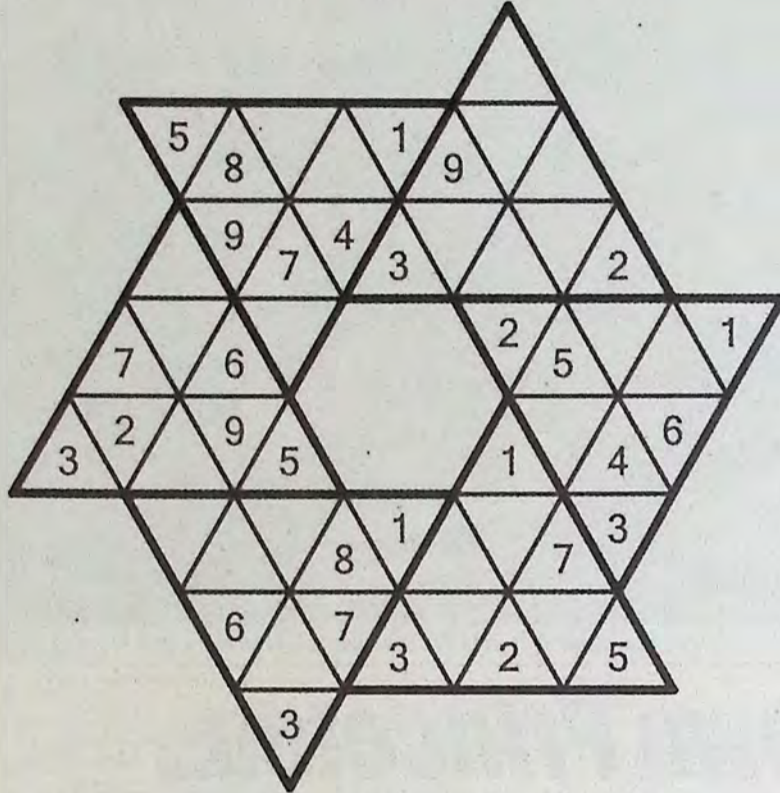

HOSHI SUDOKU - About The Puzzle

Sudoku - also known as "Number Place" - is a logic-based, combinatorial number-placement puzzle. The aim of Sudoku is to enter a number from 1 through 9 in each cell of a grid, most frequently a 9x9 grid made up of 3x3 subgrids. Each row, column and region must contain only one instance of each number. This Sudoku variant is called "Hoshi Sudoku". It contains six large triangles. The numbers 1 to 9 must be placed into the cells of each large triangle. Every line of any length - even uncontinuous - must contain every number not more than once.

Did you attend the Fall Fair?

Local celebrations have a lot to do with the life of any community. I remember growing up in Kelowna where the annual Regatta was the big event. When I moved to Penticton it was Peach Festival.

When I moved to Princeton there were what was fondly referred to as the 'Big Three' and that was the Rodeo, Racing Days and the Fall Fair.

I have been on the board of both the Rodeo and Racing Days as well as the management group of the Princeton Fairgrounds and still to this day I am amazed at how much effort is put into these local events that only a fraction of the community bothers to attend.

I understand that not being a fan of the sports or activities being hosted means having little interest but I think as residents of a small community we need to show our sup-

port of local events in order to keep them happening.

I look to other nearby communities, such as Hedley and Keremeos, who also host a small calendar of events and it's clear to me why small towns put on things like Stamp Mill Days or Similkameen Sizzle.

These events are essential to tourism and for fostering goodwill within the community.

The interesting thing about the Fall Fair is that it is the longest running event in the area having been held a total of forty-nine uninterrupted years. That says a lot about the belief within the organizing committee of the importance of the event to the community.

So if the committee that hosts the event is so keen on the celebration, why isn't it a much bigger event?

It comes down to man (or woman) power. The majority of the organi-

zations in the Similkameen Valley who plan and host local celebrations are very small committees. For example, I sit on the planning committee for the annual pepper festival in Keremeos. Later this month they will host their 13th celebration. This year's planning committee meetings attract between five and seven volunteers who are putting together the entire day long celebration.

Last year someone commented to me at the pepper festival how disappointed he was in the event.

I guess they were expecting some sort of huge midway with flashing lights and thousands of people milling about in the centre of town buying up all kinds of spicy foods.

Earlier this year someone else described to me their disappointment in what they felt the Fall Fair had turned into citing a lack of scheduled activities during the day

and hardly any entries in the exhibit buildings. I had to shake my head as I seemed to remember last year's Fall Fair had something going on at all times and that there was a lot of produce and preserves on display.

This was obviously a comment from someone who had been to much bigger fairs and made a comparison to the local one.

I think this is why many residents don't support local activities as they are comparing what they find at Princeton Fairgrounds or Keremeos Memorial Park with what they've experienced elsewhere.

I can tell you that when Brenda and I went to the Kamloopa Pow Wow in Kamloops a few years ago we knew we were at a major event but we didn't look at the Ashnola or Upper Similkameen Pow Wows as anything less because we take into consideration the size of the venue

and approximate size of the organizing committee when we go to these things.

Myself, personally, I am thankful for our 'small town' scaled-down events because I would hate to see an attempt at a 'big-city' celebration and have it flop miserably as a result. We've already seen that happen a few times already in Princeton which is why I believe it is important to keep our small town celebrations in tune with the size of the community. Besides, smaller events are more intimate which keeps them friendly and welcoming to strangers. The best part of a smaller 'small town' event is that the charm that attracts visitors remains intact.

How does this save downtown Princeton?

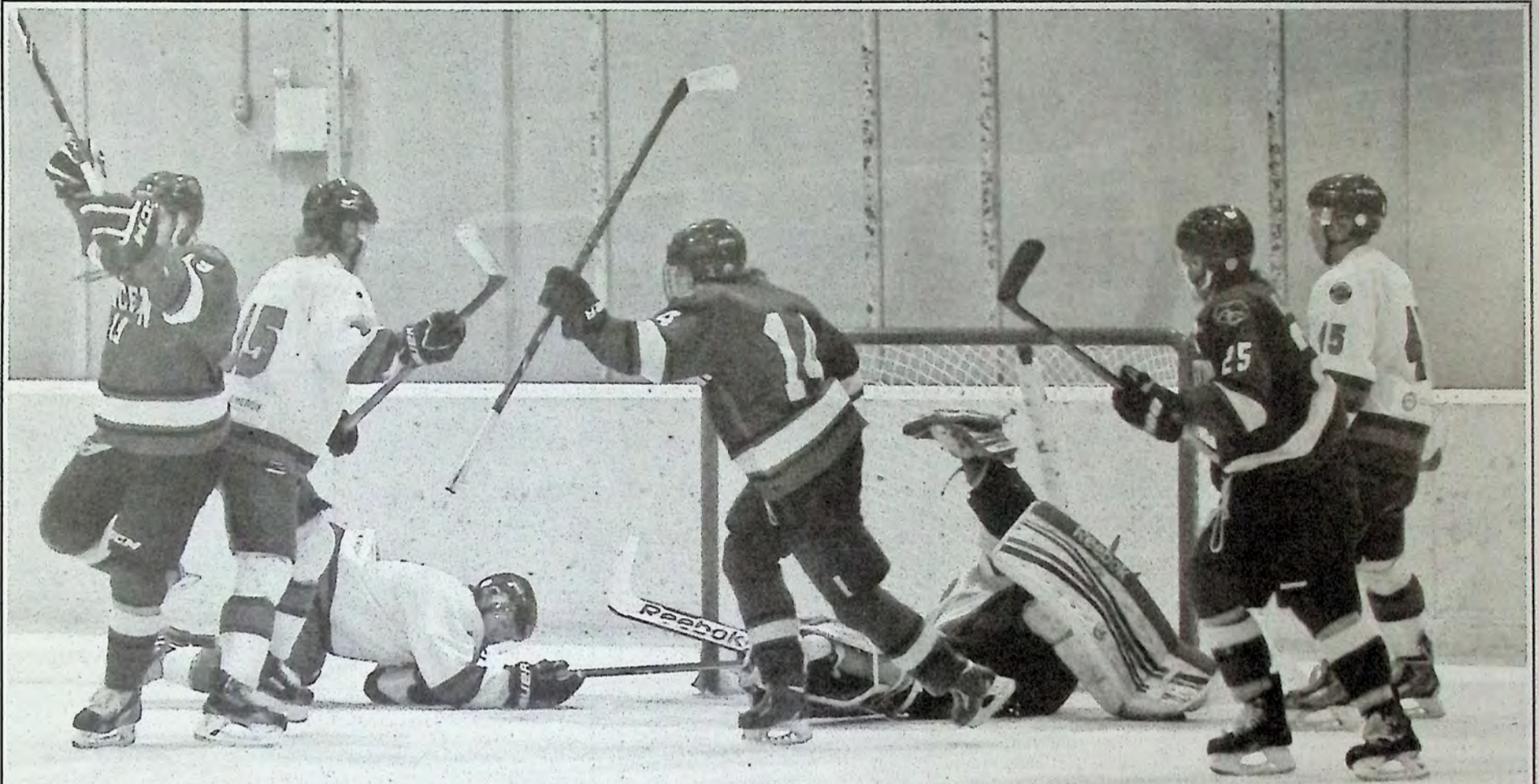
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Princeton Posse celebrate a goal last week in an exhibition road game played in Kamloops against the Storm. Photo: Bob Marsh Photography

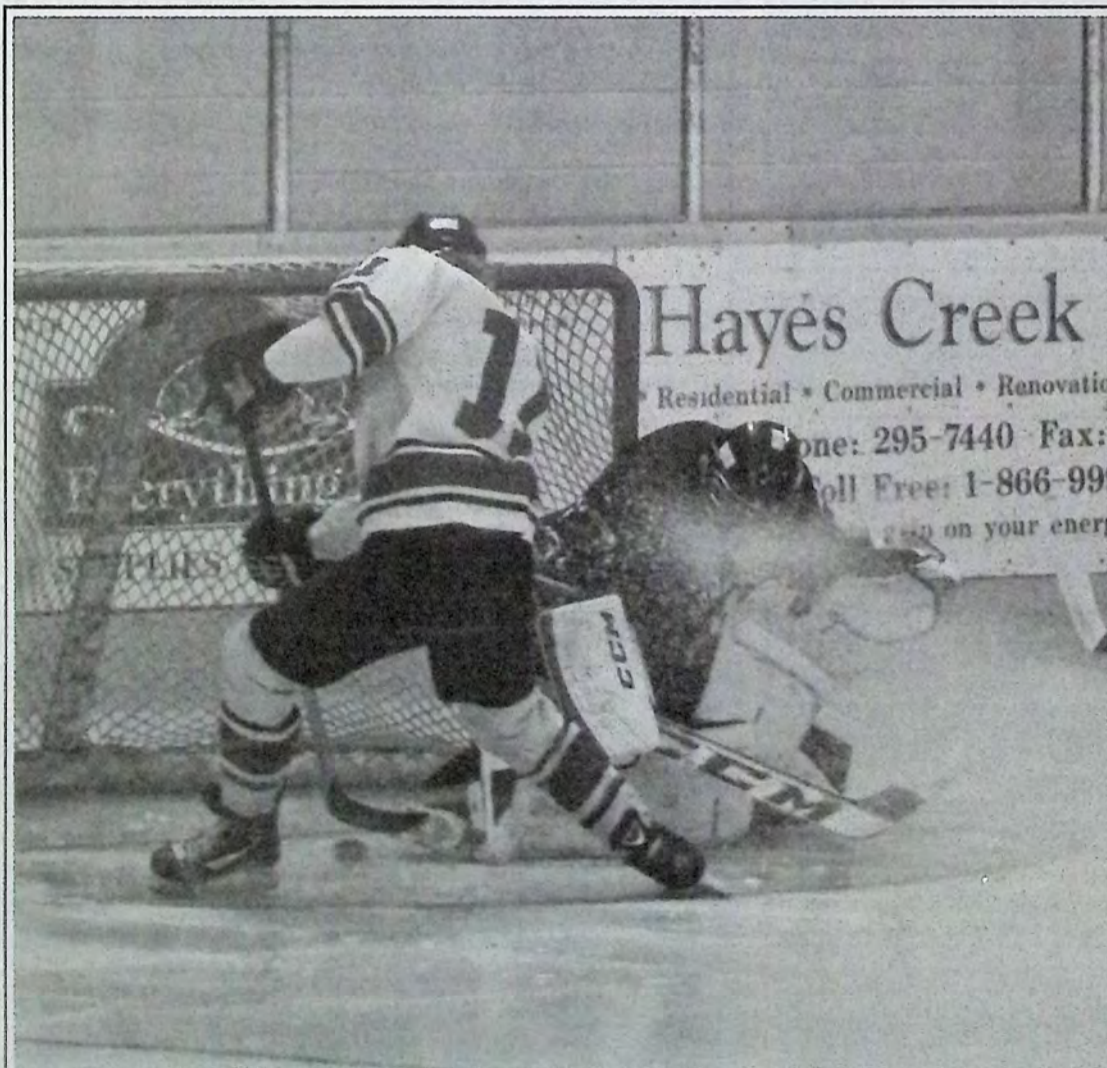
The Posse take this strong pre-season start into their regular season opening weekend September 12th hosting Golden Rockets and September 14th hosting Chase Heat.

Osprey and Link Lakes cleanup coming soon

Imagine crossing Canada three times end to end – between Vancouver, B.C. to St. John's, N.L. That distance – 21,775 kilometers – is about the length of shorelines in this country cleaned throughout the 20-year history of the Great Canadian Shoreline Cleanup, presented by Loblaw Companies Limited.

..... continued from Front Page an approach to cemetery maintenance that is aesthetically pleasing and promotes water conservation."

The plan includes new landscaping areas in much the same manner as is outside the Town Hall at a cost of \$20,000 plus the construction of a Reflection Area which would provide an overall view of the cemetery and would include the construction of a gazebo with seating at a cost of \$15,000.

The final part of the plan is the establishment of an area designated for the spreading of ashes known commonly in other communities with this as a Garden of Remembrance at a cost of \$10,000. "This would provide an economical alternative to the burial of ashes in grave plots."

The total cost of the Cemetery Improvement Plan is \$45,000 and Town Council placed the project under their 2015 budget.
