Community Services renews accreditation

At the September 10 annual general meeting, Board Chair Joann Gabriel was happy to announce Princeton & District Community Services Society has passed the accreditation process and will remain in good standing for three years until the next accreditation evaluation. In her annual report, she commented on the expansion of opportunities for New Beginnings clients after the Society received a grant for equipment. The clients now have iPads, which they have learned to use with great skill. Bicycles and art supplies have opened new avenues for them as they move toward greater self-sufficiency as well as greater participation in the community. They are learning skills which help them find employment.

Last year, Community Services took over administration and maintenance of Silvercrest Housing at the request of BC Housing. There are two buildings with a total of 23 low cost units available for the elderly and disabled. Revenue increased as a result of acquiring responsibility for Silvercrest, but maintenance, repairs and improvements offset the revenue. Community Services does not regret taking over Silvercrest as it is needed by Princeton residents. In total, Community Services is responsible for 61 housing units, including Aspen Court and Vermilion Court as well as special

accommodation for some disabled clients.

Executive Director Lynn Pelly thanked the community in her report for the donations. Money is needed to replace the walk-in bath tub at Vermilion Court. It is used by both the Court residents and by members of the community unable to access safe bathing at home. Princeton Fish and Game Association and the Hospital Auxiliary have given generous donations but more is needed. The Town provides support through tax exemptions and private individuals have made small donations. Donations to Adult Day program and New Beginnings go to funding outings for those groups as part of an ongoing effort to provide "extras" such as trips for picnics or a luncheon at a restaurant, or other excursions. Vermilion Court residents and friends have small fundraising events to fund outings and extras. The next Vermilion Court event will be the Christmas bazaar held in late October or early November.

Community Fund hits \$10,000

Thanks to a few local donors and the Princeton Rotary Club the Princeton Community Fund sits at \$10,000.

The local donors and Rotary donated the initial \$5,000 to establish the Fund and the Community Foundation of the South Okanagan Similkameen matched the contributions with an additional \$5,000.

In 2013, the Community Foundation embarked on the Smart & Caring Communities initiative to help communities establish a sustainable source of funding that will support their community forever.

A few local individuals, business and organizations have been working with the Foundation to build a local endowment fund that would

provide perpetual funding for the community.

"Community Funds are a great way for local citizens to help build a legacy for the community they care passionately about," said Sarah Trudeau, Regional Development Coordinator for the Community Foundation of the South Okanagan Similkameen.

"The Princeton Community Fund ensures that all grants made from the fund will be used to support projects in Princeton," added Trudeau.

Any donations made to the Princeton Community Fund will stay in the community and continue to provide support, forever," said Trudeau.

In 2014, the Community Foundation received over \$30,000 in

grant applications from the Princeton area and granted over \$6,000 to local organizations.

In its 22 year history, the Community Foundation has granted over \$15,000 to local Princeton organizations in the form of grants and scholarships. Although Princeton did not have a community fund to directly support these organizations grants were made possible from a regional pool of funds.

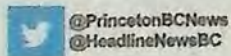
"With the establishment the Princeton Community Fund, we are building a sustainable source of funding for Princeton," said Trudeau.

"There is a legacy in place to support the programs and services that make Princeton a great place to live and work," said Trudeau.

The municipal election is quickly coming and people are starting to talk. People want to know who is running. We know that at least two of the sitting councillors are planning on running again. Some of the things I would expect to see candidates talking about during the upcoming municipal campaign are how do they plan on attracting new businesses to the community. We do need some changes when it comes to how council deals with new businesses, so I would like to know how would-be councillors and mayor would deal with attracting business. I also want to know what they plan to do with the industrial park. They will have a four year term. I want to see a four year plan to go along with their term. I want to see whoever gets elected set out a four year plan and I want to see that council stick to that plan. I want to see them deal with certain issues like zoning for business. This next council in my opinion needs to be about one thing, economics. They need to be looking at ways to attract new business and industry to the community to provide jobs and a secure tax base. Council has spent a lot of money on making the town look good, now it is time to start bringing in some cash flow.

Another thing I want to see discussed is this idea that the Town should be bringing the mine into the town boundaries. What is this going to cost the community? From what I understand, the RDOS does not collect a lot in taxes from the mine. What was reported in the paper some time ago was that the Town was going to use the increased tax base to help pay for projects. So if the RDOS isn't collecting a pile of

money, how does the Town plan on getting a big payday from the mine? Are they going to change the taxing structure on the mine? How is this going to impact the mine? Wouldn't we be better having a larger residential tax base paying into local taxes than trying to tax local industry extra?

I hope candidates come prepared to answer some tough questions because this election needs leaders who are willing to pull up their sleeves and get the work that is needed done. We don't need councillors who are going to sit on the side lines, and expect staff to do their work for them.

The Chamber Board and Manager are preparing to grow and increase our presence and interactions in the business community.

2. What can be done to beautify the downtown and Highway 3 to increase visitors stopping in Princeton versus driving right through?
3. What is the Town doing to make it easier to do business with and to provide amenities and services to attract and grow the population, including doctors, nurses, and other professionals, and skilled workers?

The Chamber Manager is creating a promotional package which will

be provided to Interior Health members attending a Medical Conference in Whistler later in the month.

This same package will be made available to all businesses in Princeton, and to anyone who drops into the Chamber offices on Hwy 3. This is a useful tool in the marketing of our community.

A member of the Chamber also sits on the Support Our Health Services business group. This group is working together to assist in the recruitment and retention of doctors and nurses in order to alleviate the work load on our doctors. The goal is to increase the number of doctors in Princeton, and to attract doctors for locums as needed.

How Much Stuff Do You Need?

There was a television show about hoarders. I watched it a few times and it bothered me that so many people feel comforted by having lots of stuff, even if it isn't good stuff. Hoarders are something like people who can't stop shopping even when in debt up to their eyebrows.

All of the above are symptoms of a disease called consumerism. We are encouraged to buy. Advertising encourages us to spend on this, that and the other, whether we need it or not. The images of wealthy people encourage us to aspire to being wealthy, if not as wealthy as those on television, at least as wealthy as the neighbours.

This sickness tells us we are "Somebody" if we own all the "in" things.

I recall a woman I worked with whose husband was out of work. She said, "It's awful to be poor. You can't buy anything new!"

The best spending advice I ever heard was from a financial advisor who had been both poor and pretty well off during his career. He said most people would be better off living off the hump. When a camel drinks at an oasis, so the story goes, he stores extra water in his hump and then lives off that water during the dry stretch to the next oasis.

This financial advisor said we spend too much on new things when we could make do with what we have. He suggested we should never buy anything new until we had done with or worn out the old. Even our kitchen cupboard were not exempt from living off the hump. If you eat only the food stored in your cupboards, freezer and refrigerator until there is no more, you will probably not need more food (except for milk and bread) for two or more weeks.

This financial advisor said the average family could set up a savings account and watch it grow if the family members could be persuaded to buy nothing new until whatever it was wore out. That is really difficult if you have a teenager in the house because they seem to be in com-

petition with each other to see who can have the most new things.

The sickness called consumerism is really an addiction to "stuff". The more stuff we have, the more we feel we are worthy people. Of course, when you have too much stuff, you have to buy storage equipment in order to avoid tripping over all the stuff.

What most of us forget until the bills come is that we are consumers every day, even if we do not leave home. We are spending money on electricity, telephones, heating, laundry, taxes and television feed. I am sure most families need to be reminded of this more than once a month. We do not need to go shopping to spend our money.

If you have a bad case of consumerism, here's some medicine to cure it: imagine you are spending the hours it took you to earn that money. If you worked eight hours to earn \$100, and then you go out and buy something for \$100, you have given away eight hours of your life. If you spent that \$100 on something you did not need, then you wasted eight hours of your life. Was your power bill \$100?

If so, you worked for the power company for eight hours of your life. If you spent \$100 at a casino, you just gave the casino owners eight hours of your life.

There is one way of paying yourself back for the eight hours it took you to earn \$100. If you save that \$100 for your old age, then you are giving the eight hours back to yourself.

A good exercise is to do an inventory of what you own and give each item a price. Add up the total and divide it by the amount you earn per day.

That is how many hours of your life you have sunk into your "stuff".

Now ask yourself, "How much stuff do I really need?"

I watched a show on television about how the rich people live. Most of it was not about how they live, it was mostly about how they spend.

One man in Hollywood liked his new Mercedes so much that he bought five more. What person needs six cars? Two young television stars went shopping on Rodeo Drive and one spent \$6,000 that day on clothing and shoes, the other spent \$8,000.

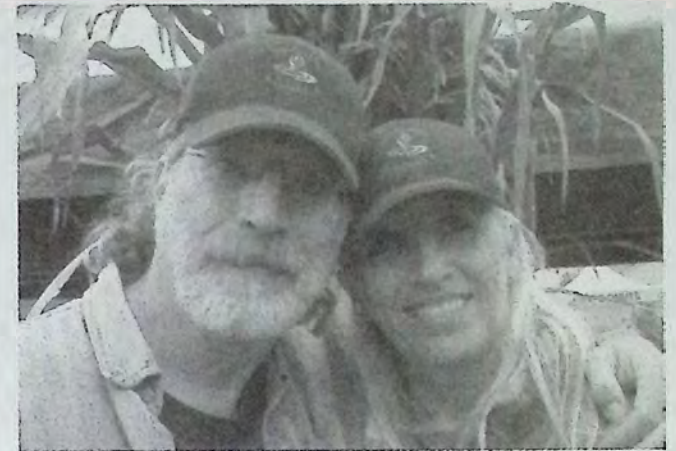

The Benefits of Squash

Squash, including pumpkins, are plants originating in North and South America. These foods were first introduced to Spanish invaders who took the seeds to Europe. During the past 500 years since the invasion of North America, cultivation of squash and pumpkins has spread throughout the world.

Summer squash is thin-skinned and generally eaten immature, such as zucchini and patty-pan squash. The hard-skinned winter squash, such as pumpkin and Hubbard, are larger and far more nutritious than summer squash. Winter squash were prized by the native Americans not only for their food value, but for their keeping quality. Pumpkin flesh could be dried and crushed to make flour for flatbread. Winter squash can be stored for months. The seeds can be lightly roasted and eaten. This made winter squash a highly prized crop. Along with corn and beans, squash formed the third of the three sacred foods of native Americans.

The seeds of squash and pumpkins were used to treat kidney disorders such as water retention, burning urine, kidney stones and other urinary problems. The seeds were crushed and added to boiling water, about half a cup of seeds to one liter of water, then simmered for about 20 minutes, then steeped. A few cups of the resulting tea were drunk daily until the problem eased.

The leaves of pumpkin and squash were used to make a tea for treating fever and diarrhea. The leaves were also used to make a poultice to treat sprains and bruises. Men ate squash and pumpkin seeds to prevent prostate problems.

Squash are rich in Vitamin A. One cup (500 ml) of Hubbard squash will give you 9,600 units of Vitamin A, and one cup of butternut squash will give you 13,000 units of Vitamin A. Pumpkin will give you 16,000 units of Vitamin A per cup. Acorn squash has the least Vitamin A, but is richer than most vegetables in Vitamin A.

Why is Vitamin A so important? This vitamin prevents cancer, and keeps the mucous membranes healthy. Mucous membranes are key parts of the respiratory system and the skin. Eating a serving of winter squash or pumpkin two or three times a week will help keep colds and lung infections away.

Pumpkins and squash are rich in potassium, a mineral needed to keep blood pressure normal.

Winter squash and pumpkins can be baked in the skin after removing the seeds. A little butter mixed with the cooked flesh make it delectable. The cooked flesh can be preserved by freezing or by canning. The cooked pumpkin or squash can be used in delicious soups and casseroles. Everybody knows the flavour of pumpkin pie! Recipes for pumpkin and squash are easily obtained on internet.

The most challenging part of cooking winter squash is cutting it open. Use a meat saw or heavily serrated knife, or a meat cleaver. For a really stubborn Hubbard squash, use a hatchet to make the first cut. Whatever works! Then scoop out the seeds, cut into manageable sections, and bake in a covered pan until the flesh is tender. Scoop the flesh away from the skin and serve, or save for other uses.

Winter squash and pumpkin can be stored at room temperature for months.

Hikers hit meadows

On Saturday, September 6th nine hikers from the Vermilion Forks Field Naturalists visited Illal Meadows just below Jim Kelly Peak. It was a perfect day for hiking with blue skies, unlimited visibility and cool air in the morning when you're sweating uphill. The drive to Illal Creek was a scenic tour of the hundreds of miles of logging roads that snake through the Cascades northwest of Princeton. The last three kilometres along the creek to the trailhead demanded high clearance and seasick pills as we dipped and dove through the culverts dug into the road.

The first hour of the hike was through forest on a trail cushioned by coniferous needles. The forest here is almost coastal in character with Douglas fir and cedar trees and a complete absence of pine trees. After about an hour and a half we emerged onto the sub-alpine Illal Meadows festooned with picturesque stands of krummholz and moss- and flower-lined rivulets. It was like a celestially designed Japanese garden. Views to the south and east included the Thompson Plateau and the mountains of

Cathedral Park. We had lunch next to one of the many lakes that festoon the meadows. Jim Kelly Peak loomed over the lake providing satisfying echoes to our yodels.

After lunch we headed along the western escarpment of Illal Meadows with stunning views of the Cascade Mountains and glimpses of the Coast Mountains beyond. Below us in the valley lay a turquoise alpine lake surrounded by inviting rich green meadows. We continued meandering through Illal meadows treading on heather and low-bush blueberries whose leaves glowed red in the sunlight. We encountered another lake where four of the sweeter hikers dove into the ice-cold water. As we looped around heading back towards the downward trail we lingered on the Meadows to fill zip-lok bags and yogurt tubs with blueberries. We all got purple blotches on our bums from sitting on the three-inch high berry bushes. On the way back through the forest we added huckleberries to our stashes.

It was a glorious, happy day and with the profusion of berries to add to the enjoyment we plan to make it an annual event.

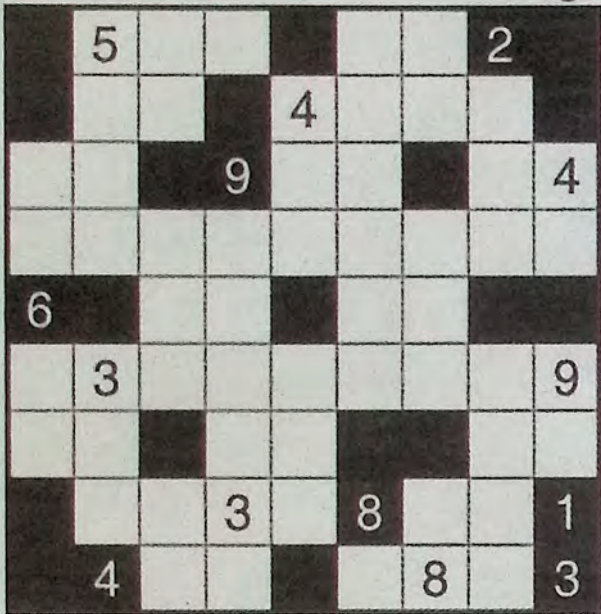

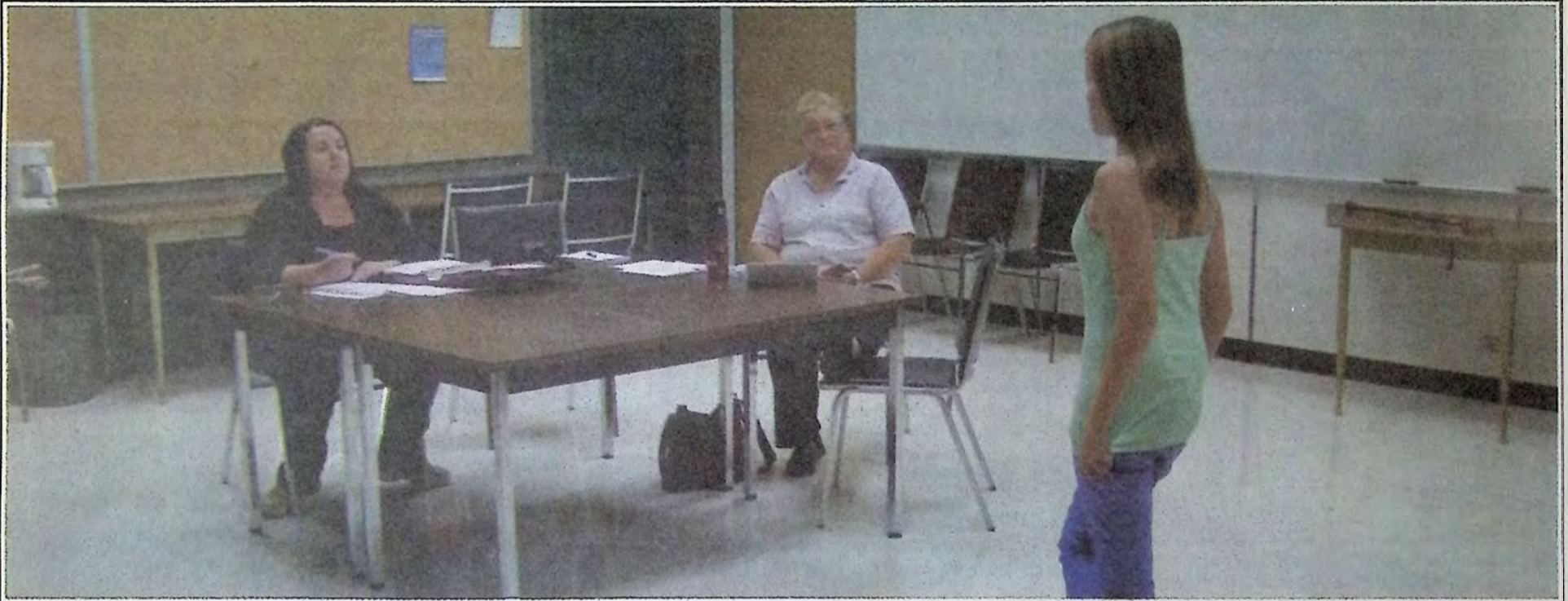

Scallywags and Swashbuckling

How to Put on a Pirate Show in Princeton...in Ten Weeks

There's something about pirates. Like them or not, we've all heard of at least one of them made famous in either literature or movies. The Crimson Tine Players' are embarking on a journey into uncharted waters with their upcoming production, "Yo Ho Ho! A Pirate Christmas" being directed by Rhianfa Riel.

My first question to her last week prior to a second evening of auditions was simply, why pirates?

Aside from having a longtime fondness for pirates, Riel told me this particular play fits a number of different points in a criteria she had in mind for a Christmas production in Princeton. Aside from being off the chart from traditional Christmas productions, "Yo Ho Ho!" requires a small cast (fifteen parts in total, with most of them small), which is impor-

tant considering the pool of available acting talent in the area is not large. The play is also adaptable where male characters can be changed to female depending on the final casting results. The play is also "really funny and silly, includes children, has good sets and good costumes."

These are things that need to be considered when planning a production for a community that has a limited number of volunteers able to fill not just the acting roles but also various other roles behind the scenes.

The subject matter of the play is also important as Riel wanted a show that would be attractive enough to interest residents in attending. This is also where some future actors and volunteers come from using the premise of if they like what they see, they'll tell their friends and maybe even want to get involved.

"...And who doesn't like a pirate?"

That's a hard one to argue considering I've been known to spout off gibberish of a pirate flavour in the privacy of my home.

So we now know the reason behind a pirate-themed Christmas show, where each part contains singing but let's back up a bit to long before the call for auditions.

Once the play has been selected there are other legal and financial hurdles to clear before scheduling auditions and rehearsals.

In the case of "Yo Ho Ho!" the licensing fee was set at \$1,750.00 in US Funds (roughly \$1,930.00 Canadian) but Riel managed to get that reduced somewhat. What she saved will be spent on music royalties and the cost of printed scripts, as photocopying is a no-no.

Other expenses before the play starts include the rental fees associated with Riverside Theatre (generally 25% of the cost of each purchased

ticket), the cost of costumes and props and set construction. The Crimson Tine Players' have spent money in local thrift shops and hardware stores and local businesses have been generous in providing deals on everything from nails and lumber to paint and supplies.

Then there's the cost of advertising and promotion through posters and newspaper ads (the News Leader has given the group a 25% discount on advertising dating back to their very first play) and programs. Advertising is sold in the programs to help cover that cost.

Now let's fast-forward to auditions.

Less than twenty people came out over two nights and auditioned in front of Riel, line prompter 'Lou' Terryberry and myself (on the second night). The majority of them were children or teens (the play calls for seven teen/child actors, but all roles can be adapted) and of those,

most of them were female (the play has ten female roles, but is adaptable).

Having never sat through a two-hour auditioning process before, I was impressed with the quality of emerging talent in our community. Some of the hopefuls have been in Crimson Tine productions while others had not.

Final casting decisions were made the following day or two with rehearsals set to start this week. Considering there is just ten weeks before "Yo Ho Ho!" hits the stage, the quicker actors get into their roles and memorizing lines, the better.

I intend to follow this process right up to show time so if you've ever wondered what it takes to put together a play to perform in Princeton, I'll show you the details and maybe we'll all learn to love pirates just a little bit more.

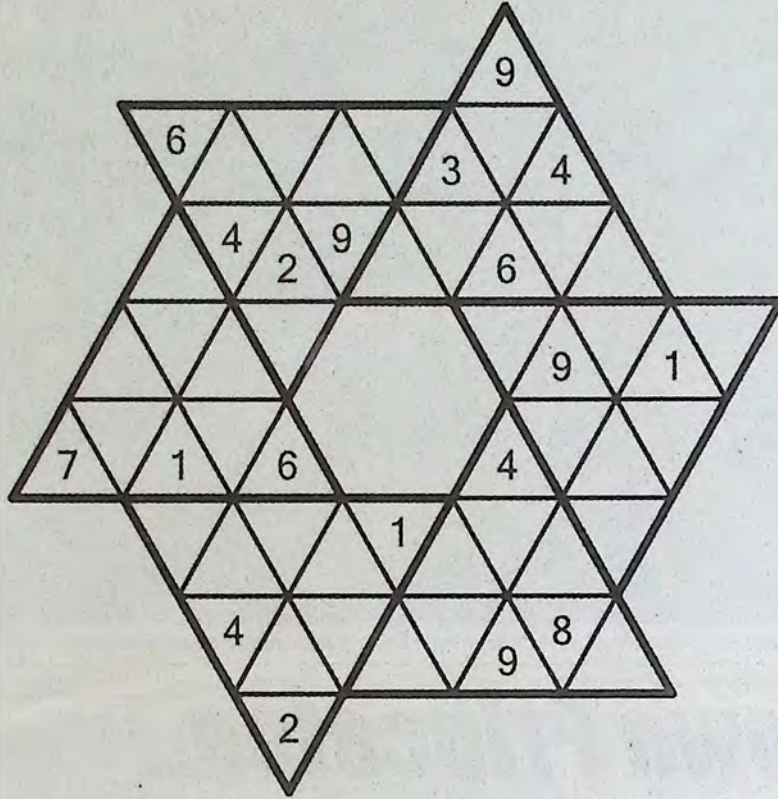

HOSHI SUDOKU - About The Puzzle

Sudoku - also known as "Number Place" - is a logic-based, combinatorial number-placement puzzle. The aim of Sudoku is to enter a number from 1 through 9 in each cell of a grid, most frequently a 9x9 grid made up of 3x3 subgrids. Each row, column and region must contain only one instance of each number. This Sudoku variant is called "Hoshi Sudoku". It contains six large triangles. The numbers 1 to 9 must be placed into the cells of each large triangle. Every line of any length - even uncontinuous - must contain every number not more than once.

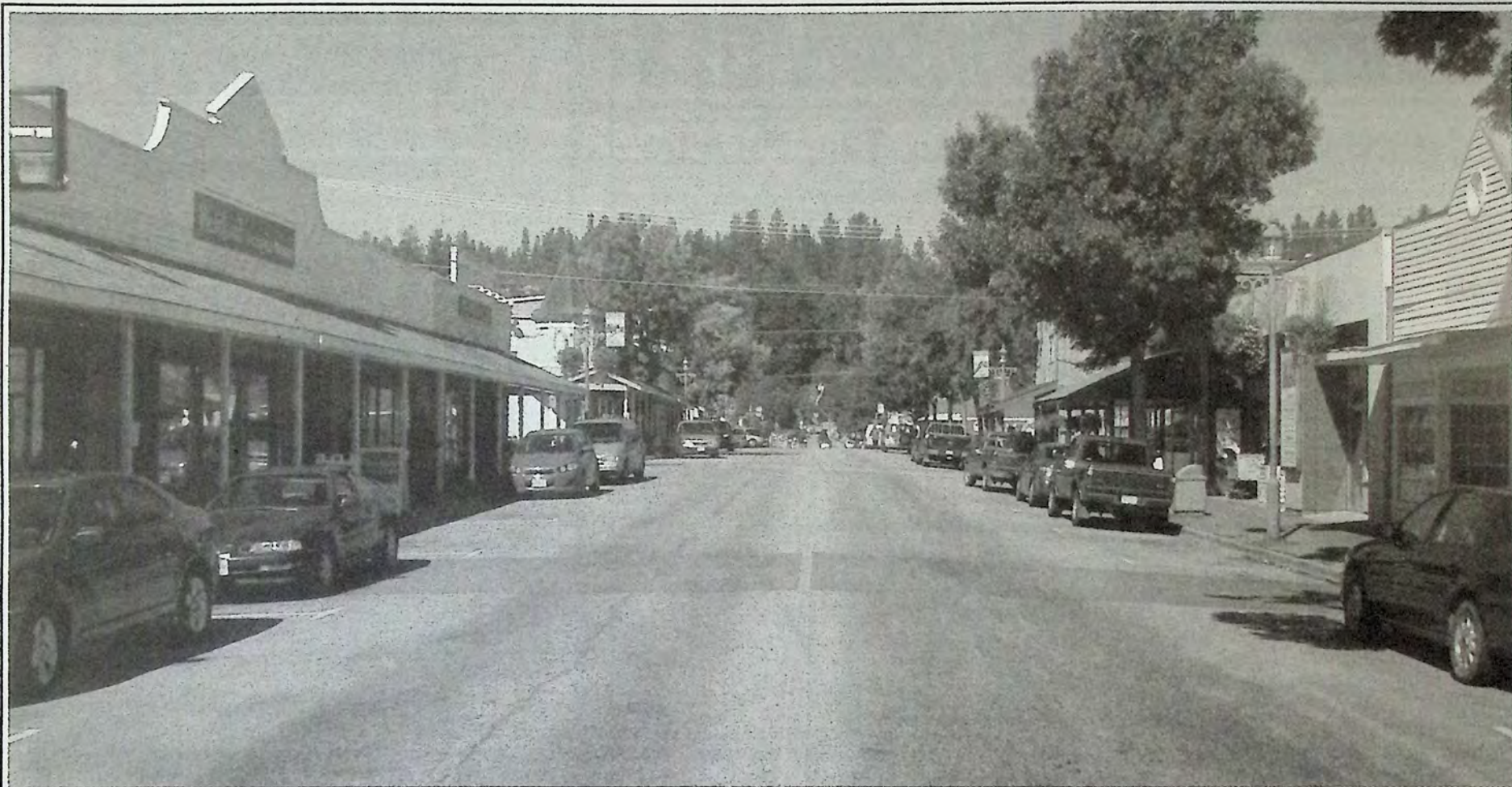

Saving Downtown Princeton...

True story.

I was visiting with a client of mine somewhere in the Similkameen Valley last week. He and his family own and operate a business that provides a couple of different specialty items that could be considered a bit high scale in comparison to similar products.

While we were chatting out in the front parking lot of this business about how we've both noticed a positive shift in the economy, a giant recreational vehicle slowly pulled in beside us.

My client looks to me and said something about the monstrous size of this small house on wheels. We watched it slowly come to a stop and noted the rear of the unit had a giant door that appeared to be designed to flop down and become a ramp. As one of the occupants exited the vehicle my client asked what the rear door did. We were told

it was to load and store ATV's and other 'toys' and I quietly noted that it could easily fit the News Leader car if it was parked on its front bumper.

Another occupant came over to us and said they had just picked this giant unit up in Idaho. They live on Vancouver Island and proudly announced that the trip they made to Idaho saved them \$20,000.00 on the purchase price of the unit now filling up most of the parking lot and blocking out the sun in the front of my client's business.

We both looked at each other and tried not to burst out laughing.

"Wow, \$20,000," I thought quietly calculating the cost of fuel, duties, taxes, meals and overnight stays between Idaho and Vancouver Island. I was interrupted when the second occupant started complaining about the price of a product they were trying to purchase in Osoyoos

just prior to stopping in front of us. She made it sound as if all businesses in Osoyoos are owned by crooks - in fact, she was much more graphic than that. She made it clear they would never stop in Osoyoos ever again to shop and proceeded to enter my client's business.

Remember, I said his product is a bit high end and my client actually called out to them warning that they may find his prices a bit high as well. Then he looked at me and we started to chuckle. After all, they did save \$20,000.

Only a few moments passed and the group, now numbering four, quickly filed back into the giant cab of the giant wheeled piece of property parked nearby.

"See?" My client said as he nodded in their direction.

By the time I turned around to get a good look of this fabulous RV pulling away and heading into the

distance, all four occupants hopped out of the cab carrying wallets and purses and proceeded to buy armfuls of my client's product.

The point I'm making here is that someone from the 'Big City' found a medium-sized city too expensive, but did not feel the same way when it came to 'high-end' product sold in the Similkameen Valley.

I think this is what frustrates me most about our local economy.

There seems to be a mind set that prevails that believes small town prices are out of line and that the majority of us in business in a small town are greedy and price gougers.

Sure, my story is probably not the norm, but how hard do you look around Princeton for something you choose to buy out of town? Do you view downtown Princeton as a bunch of greedy price gougers? If you do, you really need to compare prices.

Yes, there are a lot of examples where it may be a bit cheaper to shop out of town, but when you compare prices, you need to use a fair comparison. For example, stating you can buy EVERYTHING cheaper in a giant box store is very likely true but if you compared chain stores in Princeton to Penticton you may not see such a price difference.

How does this save downtown Princeton?

Comparison-shopping is good for everyone. For consumers who actually take the time to do it, it educates them on possible savings in Princeton they were either not aware of or assumed did not exist. For the store owners, it helps them get more in line with the introduction, or promotion, of competitive prices. They may even match the price you find out of town to keep your spending at the local level.

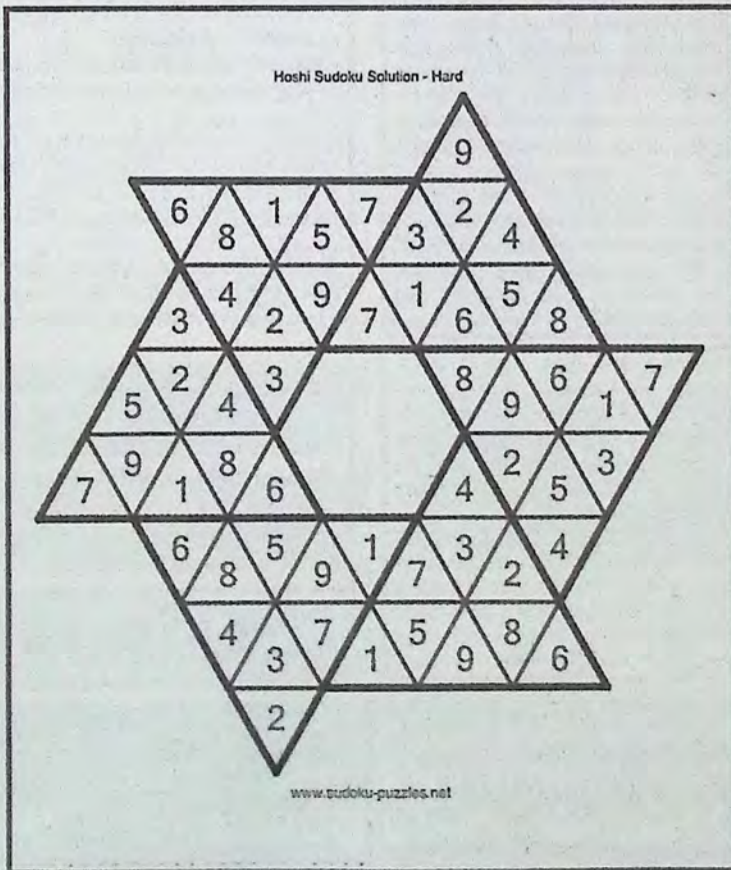

..... continued from Front Page concern regarding transportation services, particularly in regard to access to regional health care services. She stated Community Services continues to work with the Town, Regional District and IHA Steering Committee to address these needs and gaps in service. When questioned by the News Leader on possible progress toward regular transportation to Kelowna, Pelly said there is nothing definite yet. She commented that the situation has improved slightly with specialists coming to Princeton, which saves people having to travel to Penticton. Lack of service to Kelowna remains a problem, and Pelly noted it can be very expensive for those people forced to stay overnight in a motel

and purchase meals. Although it is rumored in the community that there is a long waiting list for Vermilion Court, this is not fact, and Community Services has no expectation of expanding Vermilion Court in the near future unless a specific opportunity arises providing an attractive funding structure.

Financially, Community Services is in good shape, and able to put a small amount into reserves for future repairs and replacements required for buildings.

Although funding from the government offers no frills, good management of funds has kept Community Services in sound financial condition, "in the black".

Two Directors have resigned: Ray

Jarvis, who was absent from the AGM due to being in hospital, and Ken Carlson, who feels he can no longer work as a Director. A card was circulated for Jarvis, who has served on the Board for 16 years. Keremeos man pays big fine

Lorne Boehmer, a Keremeos resident, appeared in Provincial Court in Princeton on Friday, September 13, to plead guilty to an impaired driving charge. On December 4, 2013, Boehmer had been driving

eastbound from Princeton toward Hedley. A highway patrol officer observed Boehmer's vehicle going very slowly, 50 kmph in a 100 kmph zone. The officer saw the vehicle drift over the fog line and

then drift over the center line. This poor driving led the officer to be concerned there was something wrong with the driver, and decided to check. While approaching the vehicle on the highway, the officer saw the vehicle do a 360 degree turn and immediately switched on the siren and emergency lights to pull the vehicle to the roadside.

When Boehmer left the vehicle, he was swaying and slurred speech. He was arrested. The officer noted a strong odour of liquor on Boehmer and found a nearly empty vodka bottle under the driver's seat. Boehmer had no prior impaired driving convictions, so received the minimum penalty, a \$1,000 fine with \$300 surcharge, and a 12 month driving prohibition.
