Group addresses logging truck accidents

According to Dustin Meierhofer of the Trucking Advisory Group (TAG) something has to be done about the sudden increase in accidents involving logging trucks.

"Forest Industry leaders have been paying close attention to the recent log trucking incidences in the southern interior as part of a recent increased focus on log hauling safety within the Province," he said in a release to the News Leader last week.

"The type and frequency of log hauling incidents is seen as unacceptable particularly those that occur in areas frequented by the public."

Meierhofer says, in general, safety performance within the industry has improved significantly throughout British Columbia since 2005 due to the efforts of industry and the Province.

"Log hauling specifically has had a reasonably good safety record with the number of incidents reported in 2012 for both on and off highways hauling resulting in 133 short term disability, long term disability and fatality claims to WorkSafeBC."

This means that of the approximately 1.4 million loads of logs hauled in 2012, 99.99% were hauled without a short term disability, long term disability or fatality claim.

"However, those within the industry also recognized that more work is needed in order to further improve Log Hauling Safety by eliminating injuries and fatalities," Meierhofer adds.

The objective is to ensure every load is delivered incident-free. One of the many actions being taken by industry to address log hauling safe-

ty is the establishment of the Trucking Advisory Group (TAG). TAG was established in 2014 in response to a cluster of log trucking incidents that occurred in the late summer/fall 2013.

TAG members include senior representatives from Canfor, Gorman Bros., Interfor, Tolko, West Fraser, BCTS, LoBar Log Transport, the Log Truck Technical Advisory Committee and association representatives from the Truck Loggers Association, Interior Loggers Association, and the BC Forest Safety Council (BCFSC).

TAG is currently focused on the following issues:

- Reduction of log truck rollovers,
- Safety data collection and analysis,
- Managing log truck overweights,
- Training of log haulers, loadermen and supervisors,
- Mechanisms to improve driver behaviours and safety performance, and
- Improving communications within and outside the industry.

"Through the actions of the TAG and other safety related initiatives, those within the industry are committed to continue to work at ensuring every load of logs is delivered efficiently and safely."

Meierhofer concludes, "Safety isn't just the right thing to do, safety is good business."

canning prize, a set of three dozen canning jars. Gina Mullin won the quilting kit draw, and the gate prize was a pack from Doug's Homestead, won by a Hedley resident (name lost). Olivia Holloway won the Root Bear donated by A&W, and Wendy Bentley won the \$25 gift certificate from Don & Anna's Greenhouses in Keremeos. Home Hardware, Winking Pedlar, Cool Beanz and Shirley's Arts and Crafts donated gate prizes, but the winners names were not recorded. Wayne Hooper won the draw for the chainsaw carving.

A great deal of praise was given to the teens who volunteered to help during the set-up before the fair and during the fair, and the Posse team who helped with the set-up before the fair and clean-up after the fair. They were hard-working and courteous.

Fair categories during the coming year, particularly in the Junior Fair division. This year, 380 booklets were distributed, most of them were picked up, but this did not result in an increase in the number of exhibitors. Lisa Carleton will be asking for nominations for various positions on the Board. Anyone with ideas about how to celebrate this milestone is welcome to join in the planning. More members are always welcome.

Local entrepreneur becomes jam buster

There's no secret that the Similkameen Valley is home to many entrepreneurs. This week the News Leader takes a look at one who happens to be pretty close to our operation as she is probably better known as our Office Manager.

Brenda Engel started her jam and preserves part-time business a few months ago using the name JamBusters.

"JamBusters had a strange start," she says.

"It wasn't a long time dream of mine or even a fleeting thought. Two springs ago someone came into our yard and stole all of our rhubarb."

So to avoid the same thing happening again, Engel took action. "This spring I thought I should use it up before it gets stolen again. So

in a way, I should thank whoever took it as they really inspired the birth of JamBusters."

With a large harvest of rhubarb from her backyard, Engel wanted to create something other than just the typical jams made with the fruit.

"I looked for an unusual recipe for the rhubarb and it was fun to make and fun to market and was quite popular to my surprise."

The first product produced by JamBusters was a Gingered-Citrus Rhubarb Jam. Before she knew it, offers starting arriving of other fruit and vegetables for Engel to use.

"I kept looking for unusual recipes as I'm not one for being in the norm and much of the fun was finding the recipes and even more fun was coming up with the creative names for the products."

Other products that have been released under the JamBusters name include Bananarama Honey, Raz-Very Berry Nice Jam and Ooo-La-Lla Cherry Chutney named after Olalla, where the cherries came from. In fact, each JamBusters item has contained one or more items grown either in Princeton, Keremeos, Cawston or Olalla.

"I grew up canning pickles, sauerkraut, tomatoes, and jams and freezing vegetables from our farm garden in Saskatchewan so I knew how to do it already."

This made the production of Engel's creative kitchen items easy and fun for her to work on.

"Safety concerns me so I recently took the MarketSafe course which

The program focuses on hygiene, safe food handling, safe food transport and safe food display out of the sun and heat and storage in between vending.

She made a selection of spicy and not-so-spicy products just for that event and was convinced to enter her 'Hellish Relish' in the Hot Sauce Contest held during the pepper festival. Engel was not prepared for the results.

"To my delight my relish got first in the 'specialty' then 'best overall' categories. I was so excited."

Once news of her win was released

on social media there has been a steady flow of customers picking up JamBusters products from the News Leader office where Engel has a window display.

"I will be making more of my Hellish Relish as the main ingredient is seasonal and I try to keep as many ingredients as possible from the Similkameen Valley."

Engel sums up her success with this statement: "From making rhubarb jam so it wouldn't get stolen again to winning a hot sauce contest at the Similkameen Sizzle is kind of an interesting story. It's funny how things come to be."

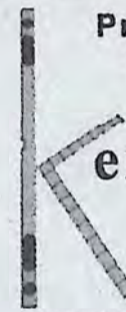

The Toughest Job In The World

The Town of Princeton has a new Bylaw Enforcement Officer. His name is Bob Riley and we'd have a photo of him over to the right of this column but he wouldn't let us take one.

While I believe the reason he gave me was to wait until the town actually made an official announcement, if I were him I'd probably not want anyone to be able to identify me in public either.

Being a Bylaw Enforcement Officer in Princeton is very likely the most difficult job ever created on the face of the earth. It's only a 25-hour per week job which is primarily complaint driven. What this means is that although there is a whole volume of bylaws related to parking and general lifestyle issues the only ones that get attention are the ones you and I phone in to complain about.

Let me clarify that statement.

The only bylaws enforced are the ones you phone in as the ones we call about can't be very high on the complaint list.

My proof rests in the last year-end report from the Bylaw Enforcement Department where the majority of the time allotted per week was spent on barking dog and noisy neighbour complaints. That's why parking in the yellow zone outside the post office continues to take place because the Bylaw Enforcement Officer is standing on the deck of your neighbour's trailer discussing the barking dog you keep phoning about.

To be fair, there are also a lot of bylaws that are best left alone.

Myself personally I'd like to see some teeth put into the enforcement to cut down the number of bicycles zipping past our office on the sidewalk. Open burning within town limits and overnight parking in residential areas is two pet peeves of mine. If I didn't have a deadline to meet in order to get this Editorial in this issue I'm sure I could come up with more. However, I've sort of given up on seeing them resolved knowing that by the time I call one in the Bylaw Enforcement Officer has reached the weekly limit of 25-hours.

Don't get me wrong, I'm trying to support the position but from where I'm sitting it appears to be more of a juggling act than an actual job that anyone can fill to make a difference.

What the next Town Council needs to look at is changing the Bylaw Enforcement Officer from a part-time to full-time position. That would make me a bit happier.

There also needs to be an overall plan for enforcement. Sure, there is a bylaw that lists the many fines one can receive from non-compliance. What I think needs to be done is regular enforcement blitzes.

Once we start to get fined for watering our yards when we aren't supposed to and for parking in yellow zones that are clearly marked, maybe we can start fearing the Bylaw Enforcement Department by giving it the respect it deserves instead of wasting their time on barking dogs.

UBCM Report

RDOS Area G Director Angelique Wood

My fiancé Travis Barck and I drove down to Vancouver and then up to Whistler on Sunday, September 21 in order to attend this year's Union of British Columbia Municipalities Conference held from September 22 to 26. This conference represents every local government in the province of British Columbia, from Municipalities to Regional Districts, and it offers educational workshops as well as opportunities to meet with Cabinet Ministers, the Premier, and staff to address issues which we need resolved in our communities.

It is always a challenge to attend workshops and the Ministerial meetings, and this year I am representing both the Regional District Okanagan-Similkameen and sit as the 2nd Vice President of the Southern Interior Local Government Association, so I have been attending twice as many meetings as previous years. I will recap some of the content of our meetings below:

Minister of Health, Terry Lake

As SILGA representatives we take the messages of the local governments in the Southern Interior and speak with a united voice asking for the things we need in common. Throughout the province, the issues of doctor recruitment and retention are an ongoing challenge, particularly in smaller communities. Add to this an emphasis on trades training for 2022 in our high schools and we are not encouraging our young people to consider careers in medicine. Minister Lake agreed that a "road show" with younger doctors talking about their experiences could encourage students to consider medical careers could be an effective tool for students to imagine the possibilities and as a group, we offered to work with the province to deliver such an initiative to our interior communities. Minister Lake also announced a series of grants to develop Age-Friendly communities, with a late October application deadline.

Minister of Highways, Todd Stone

An ongoing complaint throughout our province is the disappearing road lines which do not last a season and make driving a challenge, par-

ticularly in bad weather. Unfortunately the Provincial government is mandated by the Federal government to use ecologically safe paints in order to prevent the environmental degradation which happens with the longer lasting paints. We were assured that the province continues to work to try new strategies and this year the lines were getting painted three weeks earlier than usual in a bid to make the roads safer, sooner.

I was also privileged to join the Mayor's Coalition for Highway #3, a group representing every municipality from Princeton to the Alberta border. This group has consistently brought forward a few points about the Crowsnest Highway which they feel need to be addressed. The group was very well received by the Premier, Minister Stone and Minister Bond. The main requests were for better signage and a tourism "branding" strategy which would identify for people the beauty and charm of Highway #3. It is well understood that an increase of traffic to Highway #3 will lead to economic development opportunities for every community along this route.

Minister of Forests, Lands and Natural Resource Operations, Steve Thomson

I met with Steve Thomson and his staff on two occasions, along with Director Bush and Mayor Bauer.

We met first to talk about our Lower Similkameen Community Forest and the limited supply of economically viable timber within our Timber Supply Area (TSA). Much of the terrain around the Similkameen requires cable harvesting to be viable, and much of the remaining timber has been so ravaged by the Pine and Spruce beetle that it is "standing pulp". Being some distance from the processing source means that the gas and harvesting costs are just at a break-even point which keeps our Community Forest from being profitable. The Minister and staff want to see the Community Forest succeed and committed to working with our Foresters to try to develop our opportunities.

Our other meeting with FLNRO was focussed on the Grist Mill, a

Heritage site housed within the Ministry. The Province has been trying to devolve its responsibilities while seeking an operator who will make it a self-sustaining site. We had our MLA Linda Larson's support at the meeting where we asked that consideration be given to the present operator, Chris Mathieson, who has been instrumental in garnering community support and really turning the Grist Mill around. We pointed out that without a 5-year commitment, it is not possible for Mathieson to create rational business plans or even seek local partnerships or loans. Further, with the issues of deferred maintenance to the tune of \$1.2million, it is not reasonable to expect a commitment from anyone until an agreement is worked out as to the government's role in this restoration work.

Could Your Needs Make You Depressed?

Research by the World Health Organization found there is a relationship between mental health and where you live. If you live in an industrialized nation in which there is a big spread in income between the top earners and the poor, you are more likely to suffer from anxiety and depression.

The United States has the highest level of emotionally distressed people. One out of four Americans is treated for anxiety and/or depression. It is in the United States where the rich are hugely better off than the poor.

The number of Canadians suffering from emotional distress is one in five. The number is slightly higher in the UK.

The number of emotionally distressed people is less than one in ten in the following countries: Spain, Italy, Japan, Nigeria, and Germany. In France, the number is slightly higher, just over one in ten. In Shanghai, China, the number is one in 20, but it is one in 10 in Beijing (political center of China).

What makes the difference?

Part of the problem is the pressure to constantly upgrade one's self or one's possessions. We call it "keeping up with the Joneses", but it goes deeper than just looking good on the surface. Somehow too many people relate what they own or how they look with self-worth and self-esteem.

We are bombarded with mes-

sages that tell us we fall in value as a person if we do not own the newest, biggest, most expensive whatever. Teenage boys are told they must buy mints to freshen their breath or they won't get a girlfriend. We are told to buy a particular toothpaste because our teeth will turn whiter, despite the fact that darker skinned people tend to have yellower teeth naturally. The messages come from television advertising, magazine advertising, in-store advertising, ads on computers, and flyers in the mail.

The hidden message is this: if we don't go out and buy these products, we are lesser than others.

The fashion industry is all about wearing the latest fashion, whether it makes you look good or look silly. The automobile industry sells pick-up trucks meant to emphasize masculinity, while cars are sold to make the owner look either rich or smarter than the next person. Manufacturers of dry cereals tell you to buy their brand because you will be healthier (regardless of sugar content, of course!) The cosmetics industry promises beauty and romance as a result of buying thousands of dollars worth of oils, eye make-up, shampoos, deodorants, perfumes, and hair removal products.

If people become distressed because of these pressures, it is because they measure self-worth in terms of what they own and how they look. If you have not enough money to go out and buy all of these things to make you look good in the eyes of others, then you may start to look bad in your own eyes.

The whole thing is such a crock!

I have more than a couple of bugbears about the more subtle form of making people look bad. In those home renovation shows on television, they constantly upgrade to stone countertops in renovated kitchens. I lived for four years in Europe, where wood is very expensive and stone is

cheap. I had marble countertops and I would not give two cents for them. Drop a glass or plate on the stone countertop and it shatters. Bump a corner and you are seriously bruised. Bump a plate and it's chipped, drop a pot and it's dented. Acid and oils eat away at the surface, and that's not something they advertise, is it?

Another bugbear is found in the ladies shoe department. There was a time when I could find a comfortable pair of soft leather shoes with medium heels and some flexibility. I have tried on around 100 pairs of shoes in the past two years and tried to walk in shoes with no flex, poorly shaped heels, and awful structure. They are stylish, but that's all you can say for them. To add insult to injury, the price was around \$100 a pair.

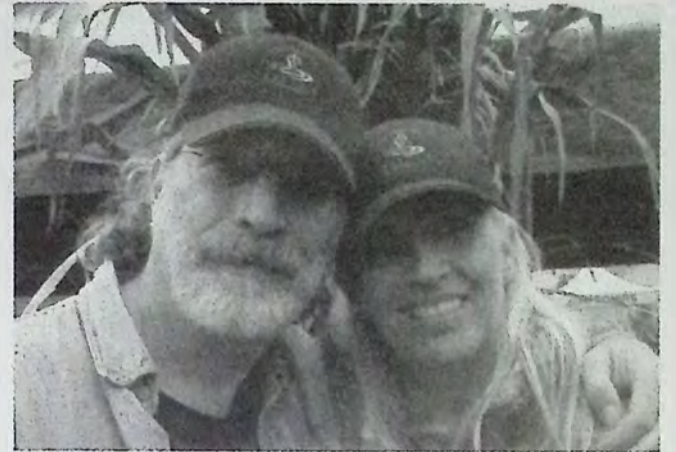
Cooking shows are another bugbear. They are designed to get you to go out and buy expensive food. I like to eat good food, but I see no reason to go to a specialty grocer to buy lemon grass or coconut milk or fresh saffron, or any number of other expensive items promoted on these shows. There is a subtle kick in the teeth, too, which says "how sophisticated are you if you don't cook like a chef?" The most important thing for cooks to know is the nutritional value of the foods they serve, not which wine goes best with it, nor whether it is exotic enough to serve to company. The best foods nutritionally are simple foods, often raw foods.

No wonder people become distressed and depressed in so many industrialized nations. They are hit with so many messages that tell them they don't measure up!

The artificial need for the latest fashion, the newest gismo or the finest house is created by advertising that tells you that you could be better. In the meantime, your real human needs go unmet. These needs are emotional and material security, to feel part of a community, to feel competent and useful, and we need to feel authentic (being who we are rather than pretending to be something else). Every one of the advertising messages we hear and see tend to undermine our sense of security, competence, and authenticity, and drive us into needless competition with the rest of the people around us.

How to Put on a Pirate Show in Princeton...in Ten Weeks

Last week I revealed the complete cast and their roles. This week I am going to share with you the names and roles of the crew. These are the people you may not see on stage but play an important part of the upcoming Christmas production.

A Pirate Christmas' include Sylvia Bailey (Producer), Patty Harrower (Assistant Producer), Dianne Rainer (Stage Manager), Leanne Atkinson (Music Director), Dayton Wales (Lighting), Martin Riel (Set Builder), Greg Anderson (Metalwork), Grace Truesdell (Set Painter), Sue Alton (Costumes), Layne Robillard (Choreographer), Victoria Gibb (Director's Assistant), Karen Fulton and Graham Atkinson (Backstage),

Guadalupe Gutierrez (Make-up), Paul Huycke (Promotion), Lou Terryberry and Danika Whelpton (Prompters).

Last Thursday night's rehearsal was filled with a touch of good and bad news. On the bad news side, the role of Noel/Mrs. Claus was once again open as school sports commitments forced the person playing that role to step down. According to Director Rhianfa Riel, "This happens all the time. Each play we lose one or two actors to other commitments."

The other bit of bad news was that a few more actors were not present for last week's rehearsal because of health conditions. Clearly cold season has kicked into full gear kicking away at the pirate play. Perhaps Black-Eyed Johnny will need to send this virus out to walk the plank before show time.

In addition, the music required for the songs that are a good chunk of the play had yet to arrive.

"That's disappointing," was how Riel described it but she was upbeat and positive that this minor set back would be resolved by the next day.

The good news was that last Thursday night's rehearsal was going to take place on the stage at Riverside Theatre rather than in one of the classrooms, as has been the case.

Before the rehearsal could start, tall curtained risers had to be

moved back opening up the main stage. I pitched right in and assisted and then gave Stage Manager Dianne Rainer a hand with putting out sawhorses and small stage platforms that were going to be used to represent the pirate ship and other elements of the play. The point of this was to assist the actors and Choreography Layne Robillard in visualizing placement and movements of actors in scenes.

As the rehearsal progressed, a few minor changes were made to accommodate what was suddenly a

very small space on stage for actors to maneuver around keeping in mind there would be pieces of scenery sharing space with them. Without music the songs in the play were read through quickly with emphasis placed more on trying to visually capture the best place for each actor to stand on stage and where or how to move during a scene.

Saddles 'n' Spurs

As a log house builder I would often take my crew into remote places to put up cabins and we were asked to go to Spruce Lake, in the mountains west of Lillooet.

There was no road to the place so the owner flew us in with our tools, etc. and we were to build a log cabin

for him out of the trees in the surrounding area. It was a beautiful spot, the weather was great and I was right in my element. The big problem was I wasn't able to do any of the work and could only supervise because I was on crutches due to an injury.

One of the things I did was to keep the mixed gas for the chain saws going so my crew could keep working. There was an existing lodge that had been there for many years and a small log shed where the tools and supplies were kept.

When we flew in we had a 20-gallon steel drum of gasoline and some 5-gallon plastic bottles stored in the shed. I went into the shed to make up a 5-gallon bottle of mixed gas and oil. There were no funnels so I picked up the 20-gallon drum and tried to pour it into the 5-gallon bottle. I was getting 90% of it in the bottle but some was running all over the floor.

One thing I didn't know was that the fridge in the shed was running on propane and the gas went under the fridge and exploded! It was fortunate I had my back to the door and it was open because it blew me right out of the shed and I landed several feet away thinking I was on fire and prepared to run into the lake, bum leg or not!

On my way to the lake I realized that I wasn't on fire and turned back to see the shed was fully engulfed in flames. The woman that was our cook was in the kitchen and saw it happen, ran out yelling at the crew to come and help. For some reason the flames all localized and the 20-gallon drum was standing upright with flames coming out of the opening like an Aladdin's lamp.

One of the crew walked into the shed, screwed the cap on the drum and the flames quit. I had fears that I would have to build another building for free but everything turned out to be pretty good except for the owner's fishing tackle.

Living Past 100

Write For Health

Researchers have discovered you can live longer and healthier by writing about your life and experiences. This does not mean writing your memoirs, exactly, but rather writing about your feelings about things that have happened to you.

The research was conducted involving people who had experienced traumatic events causing emotional upheaval, distress or post traumatic distress. Those who wrote about what happened to them were much better psychologically than those who did not.

Writing about your feelings demands finding the words to express yourself. Finding the right words to express how you felt and how you feel calls for looking into yourself and being able to view what happened from a more objective point of view. Often, people become 'stuck' in an emotional state because they cannot find the words to describe the emotions they feel.

Most people can describe what happened because the facts are obvious. In an incident like a car crash, a person might say, "The car came out of nowhere on our side of the road and we couldn't stop in time." That does not describe the terror or anger they felt at that moment.

The person might go on to say, "When we hit, I blacked out. When I came to, my friend was groaning and I could hear people screaming."

None of those words describe feelings.

Writing about the crash several times may bring those feelings to conscious memory so they can be discussed and disposed of. Researchers found the more often traumatized people wrote about their experience, the better they felt. Writing appears to clear some of the tension from the traumatized person.

Perhaps this explains why abused children frequently are unable to describe what happened to them at the time, but when they are older they can describe the event accurately. Perhaps they cannot find the right words when they are young children, but know more words when they are older. Perhaps when they learn to write, they can bring the words they need to the surface where the traumatic event can be seen and recognized for what it was.

Better Late Than Never!

A slightly shorter school year

Students went back to school in British Columbia just about three full weeks later than originally scheduled.

In the Princeton area that reduced the school calendar from 192 days in session to 178 but it didn't cause a huge disruption in the complete 2014/15 school calendar.

The first official 'non-instructional day' this school year will be Monday, October 13th when schools are closed to observe Thanksgiving. The next non-instructional day is scheduled for Friday, October 24th.

School will close Tuesday, November 11th in observance of

Remembrance Day and Winter Break is scheduled to take place from Monday, December 22nd to Friday, January 2nd with the first day of school in the new year set for Monday, January 5th.

There will be two days in February without classes and they are Monday, February 9th (Family Day) and Friday, February 20th with Spring Break scheduled to take place from March 16th to 27th.

As Easter falls in early April in 2015 schools will close to observe Good Friday on April 3rd and Easter Monday on April 6th.

The Victoria Day holiday Monday is May 18th and schools will be closed with Provincial Exams set to take place during the month of June with precise dates to be determined by each individual school.

The final day of classes for students in Princeton is Thursday June 25th followed by an Administrative Day.

The revised report card schedule is as follows: First Term Report Cards for Princeton Secondary School students are scheduled to go home November 7th with Elementary School Report Cards set to be distributed November 21st.

Second Term PSS Report Cards are to be released January 30th with Elementary School Report Cards scheduled to be distributed on March 6th.

Third Term Report Cards will go home with Princeton Secondary School students on April 17th.

Each of the schools in Princeton also have individual activity days that include sporting activities and other related social dates.

These are normally passed on to students and parents through newsletters and e-mails.

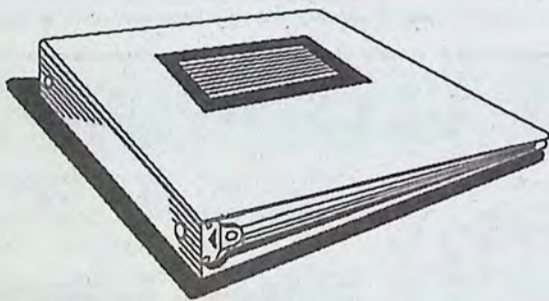

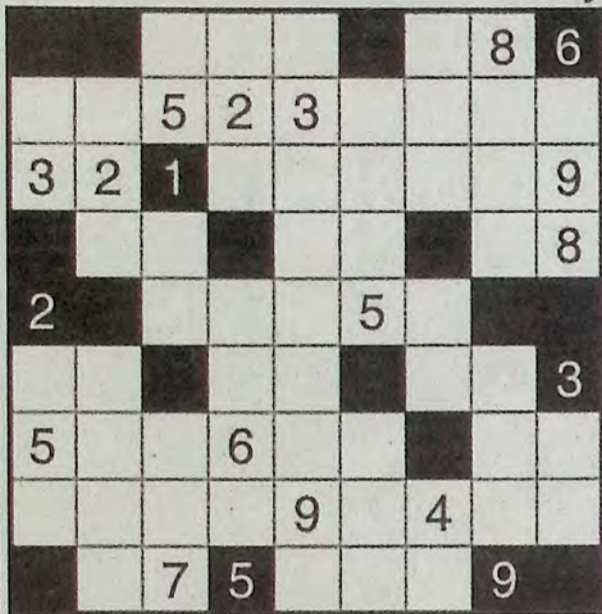

Vermilion Forks Field Naturalists were blessed with yet another gloriously sunny day for our field trip on Saturday, September 20th, as Ida Larson led a group of seven on a hike to the KVR trestle which lies between

Princeton and Osprey Lake.

Members parked off Highway 40 and hiked for half an hour up a steep hill until they reached the level trail of the Kettle Valley Railway bed, and then walked another one and a half kilometers to the trestle, which sits over a

deep canyon.

At this point, the landscape opens up to reveal spectacular vistas of vast bald mountainsides, endless green of the healthy coniferous forest, and colourful, deciduous undergrowth in the canyon itself, with the glistening creek snaking far below. Trains along

this section of the KVR visited Jellicoe, Erris, Jura and Belfort many years ago, and the trestle itself is an incredible work of engineering. It has been restored to include high, sturdy sides and bottom planking, to entice hikers and cyclists with acrophobia!

The group lingered in the area to

explore, and spotted a young black bear in the distance, to the delight of all. After a light lunch, the return journey was made, but everyone agreed this is an intriguing area to investigate further. A tunnel lies another 10 kilometres from this point, a destination we may reach on a subsequent outing!

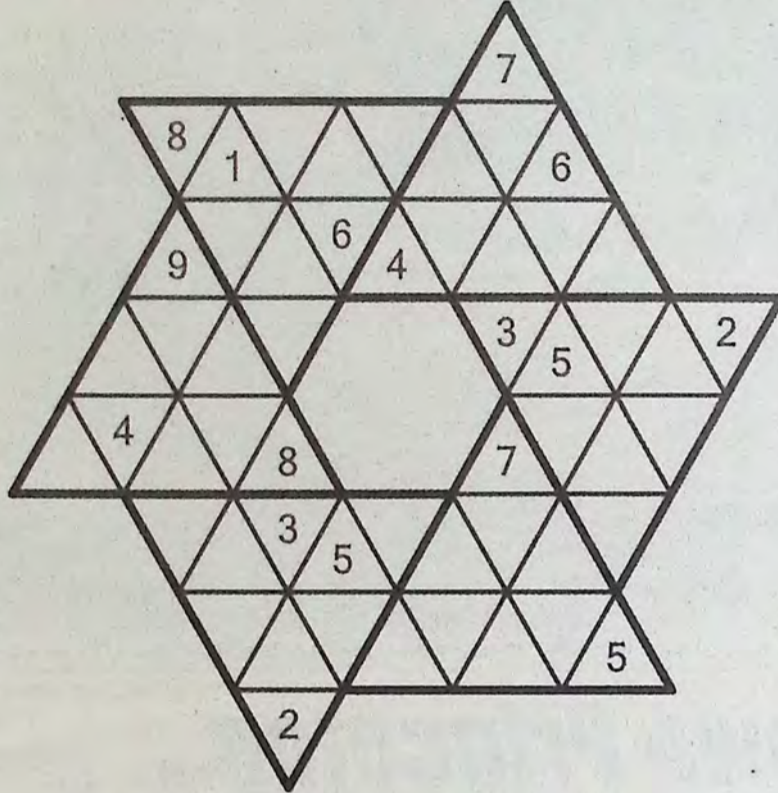

HOSHI SUDOKU - About The Puzzle

Sudoku - also known as "Number Place" - is a logic-based, combinatorial number-placement puzzle. The aim of Sudoku is to enter a number from 1 through 9 in each cell of a grid, most frequently a 9x9 grid made up of 3x3 subgrids. Each row, column and region must contain only one instance of each number. This Sudoku variant is called "Hoshi Sudoku". It contains six large triangles. The numbers 1 to 9 must be placed into the cells of each large triangle. Every line of any length - even uncontinuous - must contain every number not more than once.

Saving Downtown Princeton...

...An Ongoing Series by George Elliott

This past week we have seen a slightly unusual increase in the number of tourists who have stopped by our office.

We know they are tourists from the questions they ask us which almost always include a recommendation for a good place to eat. I have been tempted on more than one occasion to respond with, "How about just an 'okay' place to eat?" but I think some foreign travelers would not understand my sense of humour.

That being said, we find ourselves providing a fair amount of tourist information from our downtown location. I've mentioned this once before and in the case of one set of visitors last week, they also asked us whether or not there was a Tourist InfoCentre in Princeton. When asked where they had come from it made sense. They had arrived in Princeton from the west so they

would not have seen the Chamber of Commerce building as they hadn't gone that far down Highway 3.

This set of tourists got me thinking about a lot of things.

First off, regardless of signage and online directories, some people still don't see those things when it comes to finding a Tourist InfoCentre. This verifies another thing I've written about here in the past few months is that not every person coming to your town researches the community online before arriving.

I have to admit that last week I did some research myself online looking for information on a place we visited this past weekend. The information I found online of this destination I haven't been to for easily a dozen years was vague at best. If I was basing our trip solely on the reviews I could find I would never have gone there but since I recall

having a good experience once myself I wanted to revisit and take Brenda for her first visit to this place.

The tourists in our office last week also taught me a second important point.

They didn't know anything about us, but since we operate a newspaper office in the core of the retail section of town they probably reasoned that we could help them find a good place to eat.

I'll give them credit as that sort of logic makes sense.

Brenda sent them to a place that was not near our office, but back the way they came into Princeton. After the tourists left I asked her why she didn't refer them to one of a handful of places that are within a block or two of our office.

Her answer was pretty good. She sent them to a place that (in Brenda's opinion) serves good food

in large portions, is reasonably priced, has easy access and a lot of parking (in case they were driving an RV) and has good service.

Brenda said she wanted the tourists to get a good first impression of Princeton and decided the restaurant she sent them to would provide that and a lot more.

Again, sensible logic.

We can't be the only business people visit looking for information when they can't find the 'tourist booth' so what do you do if you are stopped on the street by a visitor looking for directions somewhere?

I've been in local businesses and have seen some pretty helpful and some pretty horrible examples of how to help a visitor find their way around our community. Sure, a lot of them stop in Princeton long enough for gas, coffee and a bathroom break but for those who choose to wander deeper in the

downtown core we all need to work together to help.

How does this save downtown Princeton?

It wasn't long ago I heard someone tell a visitor that they would have to go out of town for something because they didn't have it. While this was true, it sent the wrong message. We have to look at visitors in our community as strangers and offer our help just as we would expect when we are visiting a strange town.

If we make it easier for tourists to find what they need they will leave our community with a good impression, which means they may even come back.

If we send them away without at least trying to suggest options to their request, they will never come back and they won't talk very highly of the experience, which ends up affecting the community as a whole.

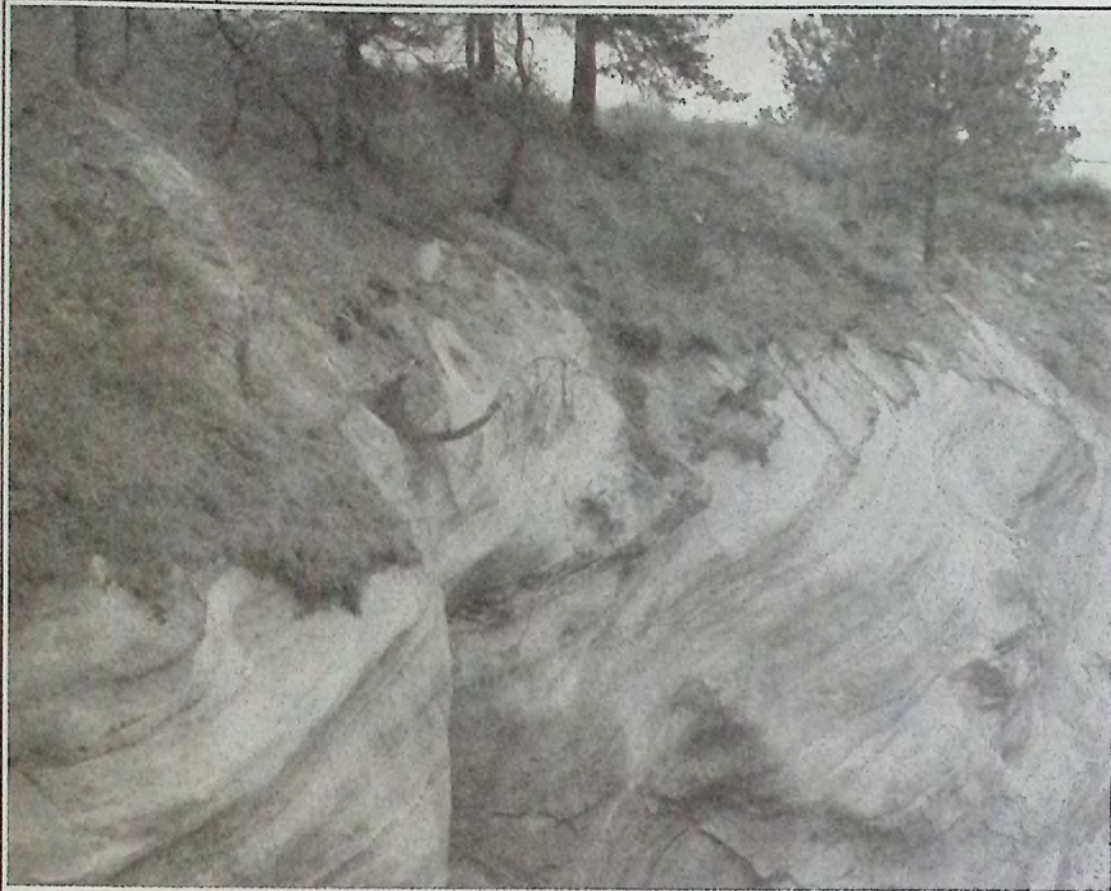

RDOS receives recognition

As part of the Regional Districts commitment to developing environmentally sustainable communities, a carbon accounting has been completed for 2012 and 2013 calendar years which measures carbon emissions stemming from corporate activities. Additionally the RDOS has demonstrated familiarity with the Community Energy and Emission Inventory (CEEI) which measures carbon emissions in the community, which has led to the accomplishment of receiving a Level 2: Measurement rating.

Looking to the future, the RDOS is striving toward continuing implementation of both Corporate and a Community Action Plans to reduce energy use and carbon emissions. The Corporate Climate Action Plan is

a priority which will show leadership in the region, leading by example prior to focusing on implementation of community climate action initiatives.

The Regional District's goal is to achieve Carbon Neutrality and reduce its greenhouse gas emissions by 10% from 2009 levels by 2020. Half of British Columbia municipalities have a climate action plan, which

helps to save energy, emissions and money. 75% of BC residents live in a community with a climate action plan. 31 of approximately 190 Local Governments achieved carbon neutrality by 2012.

Climate change is global change, and the Regional District is working hard to be a climate leader by setting the stage for broader climate action in the region. - submitted


