## Similkameen watershed plan needs your input

Direction from residents on priorities for the Similkameen Valley's rivers, streams and lakes is required following the release of an interim report detailing the state of the Valley's watershed.

"A big part of our strategy is to ensure our efforts are in line with what Similkameen residents believe should be done," explained Similkameen Valley Planning Society (SVPS) chairman Manfred Bauer.

"We want to confirm that our vision is shared with that of residents within our communities."

The SVPS will host open houses in Keremeos and Princeton in October to answer those questions as the Society reports on the first phase of the watershed management plan, which was delivered to the SVPS earlier this year.

The report details available information on the scope, health and sustainability of the region's rivers, streams and lakes.

The report also identifies information gaps and recommended immediate action.

*Open houses will be held:*

**In Keremeos**—October 7 at Victory Hall (6:30 PM to 8:30 PM with presentation at 7:00 PM).

**In Princeton**—October 9 at Princeton Skills Centre (6:30 PM to 8:30 PM with presentation at 7:00 PM).

"We all have responsibility in sustaining our watershed," Bauer said. "It's important we hear from residents about the Similkameen River and its tributaries."

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## Similkameen River celebration looks at dam

I recently attended a "Similkameen River Celebration" September 21st near Enloe Dam just south of the Canada/US Border.

The celebration began at Similkameen Falls, just downstream from the dam where Birdie Nelson offered a prayer to the Similkameen River. Afterwards, in a standing circle, some people spoke about the river and what they wanted to see. In attendance were members of the LSIB, Okanagan and Colville Tribes, people sympathetic to FOSR (Friends of the Similkameen River), Rick Gillespie founder of FOSR, and other spectators. There were a total of fifteen people present.

The consensus of the First Nations people was that they did not want installation of fish ladders on the Similkameen Falls because they did not want salmon beyond there. They had concerns about the effect of an introduced species on existing fish stocks.

As far as the abandoned Enloe Dam

was concerned, they didn't care whether it was dismantled or allowed to collapse on its own accord. It was pointed out that PUD (Public Utility Districts) owned the dam on land leased from BLM (Bureau of Land Management).

On July 9, 2013 the FERC (Federal Energy Regulatory Commission) issued a new licence to the PUD No. 1 of Okanogan County for the Enloe Dam Hydroelectric Project.

After the ceremony, everyone continued to Tonasket, Washington (Princeton's Sister City) where more people were waiting at the Cultural Centre. It was at this point a wonderful luncheon was served to all in attendance. It was a delicious meal of salmon, stew (a tasty combination of venison, chicken, beef and veggies), salads, and dessert. FOSR is to be congratulated on the wonderful job its volunteers did.

The lunch was followed by live entertainment. A local band played and sang "Similkameen, River of Gold," a video of Butch Lemery described "What Salmon Means to

Us," Terry Terbasket, member of the LSIB, gave a brief history of her surname, Elder Andrew Joseph, Sr. spoke about his book, followed by Wendell George who gave a delightful narration of one of his short stories, "Peshastin Pinnacles" from his book *Coyote Finishes His People*, second edition.

A question was asked from the audience what the word Similkameen meant. There was a brief consultation and I went up to the front and said that I didn't know for sure, but either Similkameen or Tulameen meant "Gathering of Eagles." I also spoke about FOS-W (Friends of the Similkameen-West) what we were for and what our goals were.

Jere Gillespie, co-founder of FOSR, spoke about the work done regarding the Enloe Dam. PUD wanted to divert water from the Enloe Dam which means only a trickle of water would have come down the falls. FOSR fought a court battle against this and won. The day came to end with drumming from a group called the Gold Eagle Drum.

There are so many stories circulating about the Enloe Dam that it is difficult to determine what is real and what is gossip. The problem remains unresolved, especially with what to do with the dam. It costs money to dismantle and costs money to upgrade. The fact that the dam can just be left alone, as is, does not enter the picture.

First Nations are worried that fish ladders will be added to the scenario and they are vehemently opposed to this. It appears that government fish biologists want to introduce salmon to the Similkameen River beyond the falls. First Nations say that there were never any salmon beyond the falls, and the other side says that there is historical recording of salmon in the Similkameen. The two sides are at an impasse.

It would be to our advantage if the Enloe Dam was left alone and just allowed to disintegrate of its own accord. The important thing, however, is all sides work together to achieve protection for the Similkameen River.

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# Princeton Seniors get a \$25,000 boost

Princeton Leaders for Literacy is always looking for ways to assist the people of Princeton with their literacy needs. Sometimes that means just connecting community members to the right agencies and other times it means finding ways to provide literacy services where demand arises. One need that has surfaced for seniors is the need to gain and/or improve computer skills. Seniors have approached the Princeton and District Community

Skills Centre repeatedly looking for help and courses.

"At times we have had waiting lists for computer assistance," stated Skills Centre Manager Sharan Jung.

Seniors have come to the Skills Centre with all sorts of requests. Some grandparents are just interested in surfing the net and/or sending e-mails to their children and grandchildren, while other seniors want to construct documents, organize

files, manage photos and much more. They are asking for courses that cover all the basics, make sure that their questions are answered and that they can leave feeling ready to take on this next phase of their life with confidence.

Jung also feels it is important to make sure seniors know that there are online predators out there, looking for someone to fool with banking schemes, inheritance stories, and other fraudulent actions. Information is the key to avoiding fraud and Jung tries her best to ensure seniors that a computer can be safe as long as it is used with caution.

"Today, the use of technology, and more specifically the internet, requires more of the user than point and click," admitted Jung.

"There is a greater requirement for problem solving and critical thinking to avoid traps and pitfalls that can increase risk and expose vulner-

ability. For seniors, a class is that place to build the awareness and create the starting point at developing these key skills."

Grants have become a very viable option for communities to scout out funding. Literacy Outreach Coordinator, Dierra Maynard, felt it was extremely necessary that she find a grant for this high need senior computer program.

"I had this one grant in mind that seemed like a perfect fit for us and working with Sharan Jung from the Skills Centre, we came up with a solid plan to get ready for the Government of Canada's New Horizons for Seniors grant application period. Both Sharan and I did surveys with the seniors, reaching out to those who had taken a past program and those who might be interested in taking a future program," stated Maynard.

"The Royal Canadian Legion worked with us to get the one sur-

vey filled out and sent us a letter of recommendation. It was the surveys, senior success stories and community support and partnering that made our grant a solid one."

Maynard said that right from the day she submitted the Government of Canada's New Horizons for Seniors grant, she had a good feeling that they would be in the running for some funding from the federal government.

"We asked for \$25,000 to purchase computer equipment for the Skills Centre and to administer the program and I honestly felt that we had a strong fighting chance. Who wouldn't want to give funding to a program that has need and value?"

Earlier this year, Maynard got the call she was waiting for, with instructions to make no official announcement until the cheque arrived.

"I rushed down to the Skills Centre and told Sharan quietly, 'We did it Sharan. We got the money.'"

Maynard recalled, "I was just thrilled. Now we could get busy planning four two-week long sessions and get the much-needed computer equipment necessary to start helping our seniors. We were pretty stoked."

Jung and Maynard got busy requesting quotes, sifting through prices and reading computer reviews. Ten Toshiba Pro laptops, 10 wireless mice, 50 flash drives, one Dragon Naturally Speaking program and one printer and cartridges were delivered to the Skills Centre for Jung to begin preparations for the year ahead.

"We have been partnering with Princeton Leaders for Literacy for a couple of years now delivering a one week computer skills class for seniors," stated Jung.

"We heard seniors say they wanted more time to learn and solidify their learning with practice. This New Horizons for Seniors federal government grant now provides us with modern operating systems and the ability to extend our work with the senior population to develop this essential literacy for today. We are thrilled that the Skills Centre is able to use this technology to deliver future computer classes to the general community."

When Program Officer, Paul Myers from the Government of Canada's New Horizons for Seniors Kelowna office called to confirm that Princeton Leaders for Literacy was going to receive the full grant request, Maynard told him she was delighted and Myers responded, "I kind of feel like Santa Claus today."

Maynard's response, "You are like Santa Claus."

The Senior Computer Classes are completely free to seniors and run on the upcoming dates: November 17 - 28 and February 9 - 20, 2015.

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Princeton Leaders for Literacy is pleased to announce the release of \$25,000 in funding from the Government of Canada's New Horizons for Seniors Grant. This funding has enabled the purchase of 10 Toshiba laptops, 10 wireless mice, 1 printer, 1 Dragon Naturally Speaking Program and 50 flash drives. ## Why Should We Be Thankful?

To most Canadians, the annual celebration of Thanksgiving means the last long weekend when the weather is decent enough to take a road trip to visit family. It is a time to get together before the long cold winter keeps us penned up in a dark world. For many, it is a time to go to church and give thanks for the abundance of the harvest.

Many nations do not have a Thanksgiving celebration. I remember my Australian cousins visiting here one autumn. I cooked a traditional Thanksgiving dinner for them as a novelty. They do not have a Thanksgiving holiday. In fact, they do not have a turkey dinner with cranberry sauce and pumpkin pie. Turkey is terribly expensive in Australia. At the time my cousin was visiting, turkey cost \$25 a kilo. As for pumpkin, they eat it as a vegetable, and had never eaten it as a pie. They decided pumpkin pie was a treat.

Canadians first celebrated Thanksgiving in Nova Scotia, when a party of French settlers sat down to a dinner of roast venison, preserved wild fruit, and a few vegetables. It was not a fancy dinner, but it was one of the best dinners they had had. They were thankful to have enough to eat as they had struggled to survive in this new land.

They gave thanks for their first harvest and for the good hunting and fishing. They could see great potential to survive the winter and build homes for themselves in what would become our nation.

While we are being thankful for the abundance of food we have now, we should be looking ahead to a time when being able to afford such abundance will be a struggle. The day is coming, the experts warn, when we will be hard pressed to pay the high cost of food. They predict only six years from now, we will face much higher food costs unless we start producing more food locally.

The cost of food will rise primarily due to the cost of industrialized farming and its need for gasoline and diesel fuel to produce the food and to transport it to our grocery stores. As the world's supply of petroleum decreases, the cost of fuel to run farm equipment and transport trucks will increase. Those two costs will be passed on to consumers. We have seen a huge increase in the cost of food during the past two years, and the cost will continue to rise.

Processing some foods will price these foods into a luxury class. Those dry cereals like corn flakes require a lot of fuel to produce. Any processed foods will rise in price, and we will have to find alternatives. Actually, this might be good for our health. The less processing involved in creating a food, the less it will cost and the healthier it will be.

The key to having abundant food at reasonable prices, according to the experts studying the coming food crisis, is to grow more food locally. Your own garden is about as local as you can get, and you might think about utilizing your own property to grow food, or you might think about making a deal with a local landowner to help with

the cost of producing food in order to share in the crop.

Let me give an example from my own garden of the savings you can make by a small investment. It cost me around \$250 to fence my garden so the deer don't eat my crops. I paid \$50 to have my soil tilled, and every three or four years, I spend around \$100 on manure to replenish the soil. That amounts to about \$100 a year, plus the cost of seed. This sounds like a lot, but there is a plus side to this picture. I spent \$10 on potato seed to yield \$100 worth of potatoes at grocery store prices. I spent \$2 on corn seed to yield \$10 worth of corn. I spent \$2 on squash seed two years ago and saved the seed, so I got about \$60 worth of squash over two years. Two hundred dollars worth of organic carrots came from one packet of seed. I have about \$30 worth of tomatoes from \$5 worth of seedlings. A \$1.60 packet of beet seed has yielded about 50 kilos of beets, which become beet relish, pickled beets and beets for the table. I do not plant spinach anymore, I just let it go to seed and it comes up first thing in spring, then continues all summer. I save my own pea seed and freeze about five kilos of peas each summer. Five dollars worth of onion sets has produced 25 kilos of onions, which I store for the winter.

I am sure you get the picture: a small investment provides a lot of food.

People remark on how big my garden is. They mention how much work it must be. After the initial tilling, I spent around eight hours planting. For a couple of weeks, there isn't anything to do but see that the garden is irrigated. Then the weeds come up and I hoe them, which takes about four hours a day for two days. After the first weeding, I spend perhaps two hours a week getting rid of weeds. I spend more time harvesting in September than I do in tending the garden during the summer. There is no big cost to harvesting except the cost of canning or freezing.

At this time of year, I am truly thankful for a good harvest tucked away in my canning cupboard, my freezer and my vegetable storage area. You might want to think about what a garden would be worth in six years. Mine has fed me and my family for 40 years, and it is worth more every year in the money I save.

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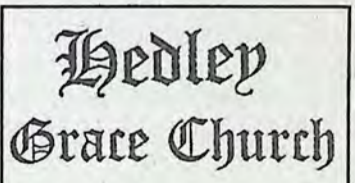

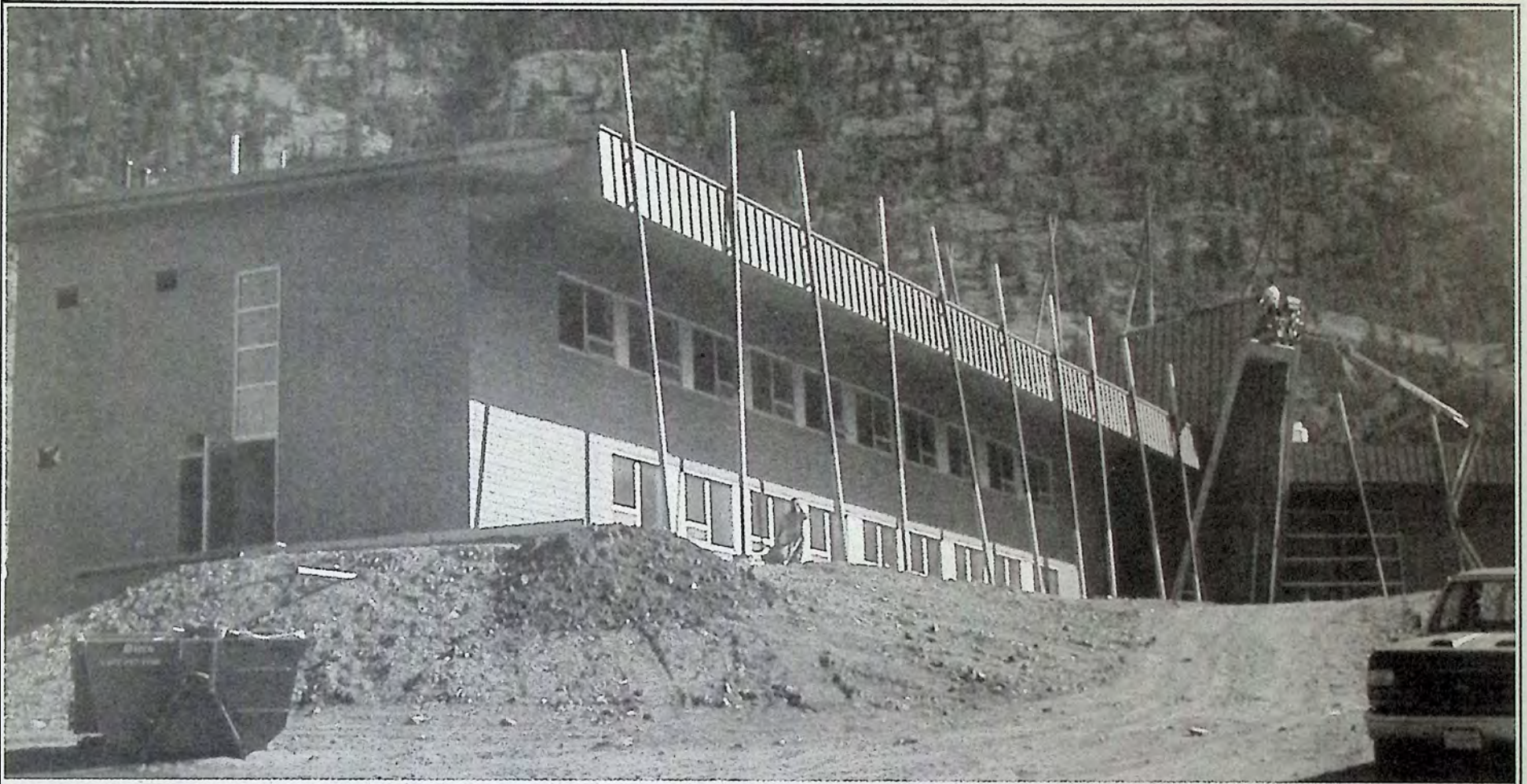

## ORL looks at imbalances

The Okanagan Regional Library is working through a series of changes to restore fiscal balance between its member communities. The ORL Board periodically conducts targeted reviews of different aspects of the library operation, and, in 2013, the board contracted the auditing firm Grant Thornton to take a look at expenditures versus revenue for each individual member community across the ORL. The report found that spending in some communities was out of alignment with tax revenue received, and the board directed management to create a plan to address this.

CEO Stephanie Hall drafted a staffing level plan for branches where spending needed to be

reduced, and has created a process where both unions and individual branches can provide input into the plan. In many cases, this input will result in modifications to the plan. Once this work is complete, a finalized plan for each of those communities will be shared with local government, a press release issued, and then the ORL will be hoping to hear from all interested parties about their views and library service needs.

Changes in staffing level under the plan would be implemented over multiple years, as opportunities arise. In addition to local and centralized staffing, ORL is also reviewing other spending areas, including facilities costs and cen-

tralized services.

Hall acknowledges that this is a difficult process. "There is no doubt that these are tough questions. Public libraries and our incredible staff are hugely valued in communities. With over a hundred and fifty thousand library members, our service is one of the most-used public services communities offer. At the same time, the ORL is committed to fiscal transparency and

fairness, and by moving pro-actively to align costs with revenue across communities, we're living up to our commitments to local government, who are our major funders."

The Okanagan Regional Library stretches from Golden to Osoyoos, serving 25 member jurisdictions at 29 service locations. Membership in the Okanagan Regional Library provides access to over 750,000 items and a robust array of online

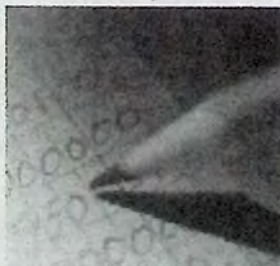
and in person services.

Public interest in library offerings appears to be on the rise, with the ORL noting a 12% increase in program attendance and a 56% increase in free downloads of ebooks, audiobooks, music and magazines in 2013.

ized benchmarks and authentic learning experiences," concluded Holm.

We used a 60 lb. hammer to tighten the logs in the notches. We would stand on the log, lift the hammer straight up and slam it down

over and over until it was tight. This seemed like a low tech job for the guy with the sore head so we gave him that job.

He climbed up on the log, wasn't all that steady but picked the hammer up high, slammed it down, pulled it up again - right into his mouth! There was enamel and blood all over the place. This time it was a WCB problem. They said we couldn't ever hire him back again, not that I thought it was a good idea anyway!

## Scallywags and Swashbuckling

How to Put on a Pirate Show in Princeton...in Ten Weeks

Last Thursday night I walked in on the first musical rehearsal for the Crimson Tine Players' production of 'Yo Ho Ho! A Pirate Christmas.' The music had only arrived that Monday according to Director Rhianfa Riel and everyone was getting their first taste of the sound of the songs they would be singing.

Music Director Leanne Atkinson

was alternating between a small electronic keyboard and a CD player to familiarize cast members with the timing and how some singing lines fit into lines that were just read as everyone followed with their scripts.

It looked like a lot of work and I was glad the cast was busy on this part of the play so I could chat with Riel and Stage Manager Dianne Rainer about more behind-the-

scenes details.

If you have sat in the audience for any of the plays in Riverside Theatre you may not be aware of the space behind and below the stage. The door to the right of the stage, if you are sitting facing the main stage, leads down a few stairs to two dressing rooms and a make up room. The rest of the large area holds a vast collection of props and costumes.

While most of the items have been donated, some have been borrowed and others have been purchased. Riel says local residents have been generous in donating items for use in productions but space is running out and many props need to be removed. What has been happening in the past couple of weeks is Riel has been purging the basement of items that are no longer needed. This means tracking down original donors to either take the items back or to seek permission to sell off items. Anything that is sold assists in generating funds for Crimson Tine Players' to be used in future productions.

In addition to purging, Riel was

picking props and costumes that can stay and be used in upcoming plays. Her husband, Martin, was given the task on constructing storage shelves and functional spaces to keep the collection orderly. His 'official' title is Set Builder.

Speaking of sets, the pirate play will be simple in some respects as there will not be any costume changes and really just one set with a few moveable elements. Set Painter Grace Truesdell has been working on creating visuals to go along with the play and discussed some set ideas while I was there last week.

Riel simplified the process for me stating the Directors essentially "reads the play and figures out the look and plans from there with the set designer."

Stage Manager Dianne Rainer was also part of the discussion where one large prop was appearing problematic so a decision was made to improvise with something smaller but representative of the original prop.

In my words, in order to create the illusion of the original prop.

Riel emphasized that since Crimson Tine Players' are not a professional performance company, and is run entirely by volunteers, improvisation is a common tool and clearly one she enjoys using.

I was still having trouble visualizing the way the main props (a pirate ship, for example) was going to fit on stage with actors jumping in and out of it, swimming and floating around and eventually getting back on board.

It had to have had something to do with a long day at work as I still couldn't see the same vision as Riel and that's probably why she's the Director and I'm not.

Aside from that, Riel was very upbeat about the progress being made to this point, "I'm really happy where we are already and that I have such a super cast."

The role of Noel/Mrs. Claus was filled last week by Isabella Brodie and Riel was confident that now the musical parts are being worked on, the casts would be able to push progress along much quicker in the next few weeks.

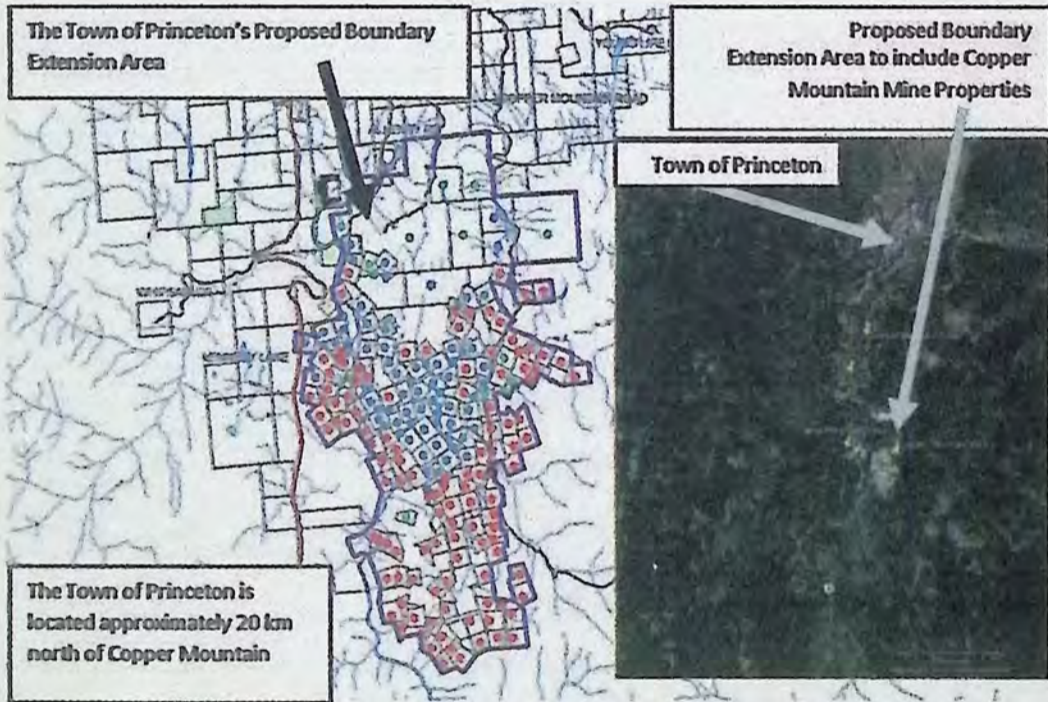

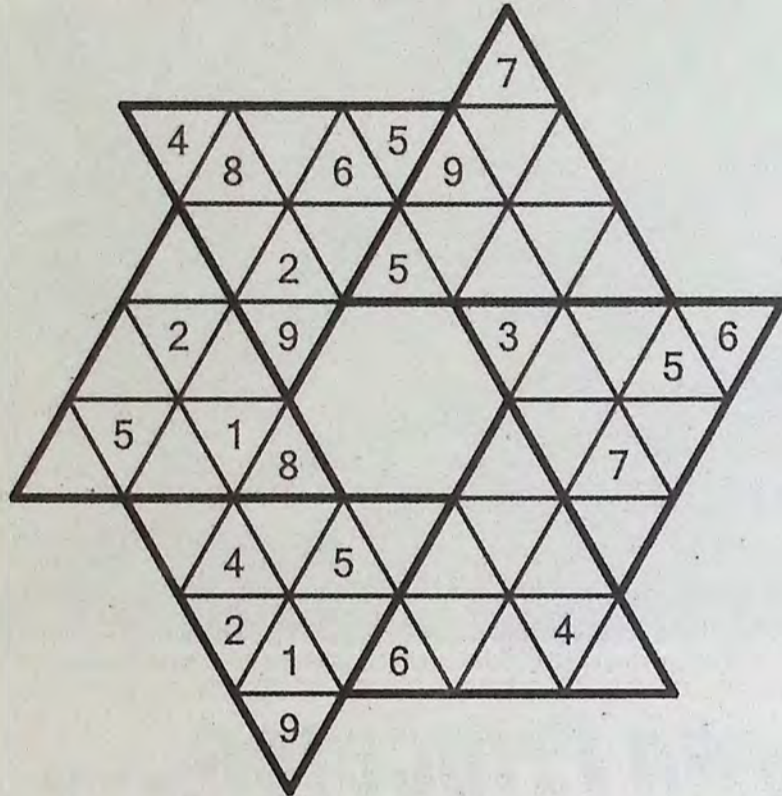

The aim of Sudoku is to enter a number from 1 through 9 in each cell of a grid, most frequently a 9x9 grid made up of 3x3 subgrids. Each row, column and region must contain only one instance of each number. This Sudoku variant is called "Hoshi Sudoku". It contains six large triangles. The numbers 1 to 9 must be placed into the cells of each large triangle. Every line of any length - even uncontinuous - must contain every number not more than once.

## ***Saving Downtown Princeton...***

**...An Ongoing Series by George Elliott**

A couple weekends ago we went to Tonasket, Washington for a night.

There was no special celebration and no big event happening. We decided to go down during a 'non-event' weekend for a relaxing couple of days sightseeing in the area. On the night we were there we got together with a couple of 'Sister City' friends and their wives and had an enjoyable time over dinner.

The next morning Brenda and I scoured the two main grocery stores.

My goal was to try to figure out what the big deal is about shopping out of town and why I hear some people rave about regular trips over the border to stock up on various items.

With this in mind I checked meat and cheese prices.

While they seemed competitive to what we currently pay in local gro-

cery stores I quickly calculated the difference in price adding the exchange rate. There was no deal to be found in the coolers lining the walls of the two places I checked prices.

I'm not sure if I was really expecting to see rock bottom pricing in the first place.

I did discover that there were a few things that were priced a bit lower than what we've paid locally but not enough of a difference to warrant a spending spree.

One very good example was canning jars.

Considering there has been a lot of canning going on in our house the past few months, this was where I thought we'd see a sizeable price difference. Brenda has been buying her jars and lids at wholesale prices at a location out of town, which has been cheaper than the local sale prices. She has also had a number

of jars given to her. However, she has also bought a lot in Princeton through yard sales and thrift stores.

The prices in Tonasket for canning jars were considerably higher than the lowest sale price in downtown Princeton. Adding the exchange rate, gas and time and it became very clear that making a special trip over the border just for canning supplies would not be worth it.

When it was time to come home, we gathered our receipts for when we got to the border and aside from meals and the cost of our hotel room we were claiming less than \$50 in items we were bringing home.

Part of that was what I like to call 'road food' but was snacks we were enjoying along the way. Our travel medical insurance cost more than that. Even our hotel room cost more than what we brought back.

It made me wonder why people insist on shopping out of town and many prefer to shop over the border. I know there are deals to be had in both instances, but not considering our personal shopping habits.

On our way back to Nighthawk we passed through bumper crops of apples. We admired them but did not buy any as we knew we wouldn't be allowed to bring them over the border although the majority of apples available for sale in Princeton were grown exactly where we were. We prefer to support the growers in the Lower Similkameen anyway but to me, it adds to the mystery of out of town shopping.

Since I started writing this series of articles I've asked a lot of people a lot of the same questions about shopping out of town.

While there are some very valid reasons, comparing big 'box store

prices' in Penticton and Kelowna to Princeton, or to buy products not available locally are fair reasons.

Shopping out of town 'just because' does not make sense to me. It has a lot to do with something I have mentioned before and that is the belief that small towns charge more. That is not exactly true if you actually compare items in a fair comparison.

How does this save downtown Princeton?

Comparing Princeton prices to a Wal Mart or Super Store of some kind it not a fair comparison and I think that is where the 'small towns are expensive' belief comes from. I have said this many times and I will continue to do so: when you compare prices, shop during sales and use points cards for discounts you will find local prices are competitive and in many cases, quite cheaper than out of town.

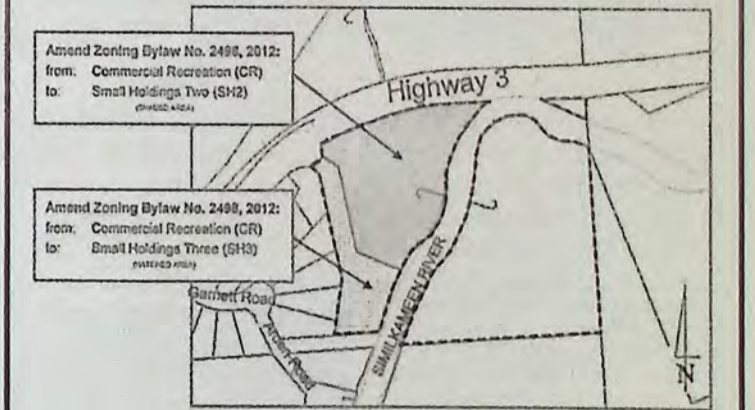

### Towards A Nuclear Weapons Free World - Pt. 2

In Part I of this column I mentioned some of the initiatives outlined by former Ambassadors Douglas Roche and Paul Meyer as to the contributions Canada could make towards a nuclear-free world. It should be noted that both the Senate and the House of Commons unanimously passed the following Motion in 2010:

That the House of Commons:

- (a) Recognize the danger posed by the proliferation of nuclear materials and technology to peace and security;
- (b) Endorse the statement, signed by 500 members, officers and companions of the Order of Canada, underlining the importance of addressing the challenge of more intense nuclear proliferation and the progress of and opportunity for nuclear disarmament;
- (c) Endorse the 2008 five point plan for nuclear disarmament of Mr. Ban Ki-Moon, Secretary-General of the United Nations and encourage the Government of Canada to engage in negotiations for a nuclear weapons convention as proposed by the United Nations Secretary-General;
- (d) Support the initiatives for nuclear disarmament of President Obama of the United States of America;
- (e) Commend the decision of the Government of Canada to participate in the landmark Nuclear Security Summit and encourage the Government of Canada to deploy a major world-wide Canadian diplomatic initiative in support of preventing nuclear proliferation and increasing the rate of nuclear disarmament.

The Canadians for a Nuclear Weapons Convention held their Third Parliamentary Forum in Ottawa in December 2013. In their message to those present, a number

of prominent Australians, including former PM Malcolm Fraser congratulated this organization on showing outstanding leadership in global efforts to advance a treaty banning and eliminating nuclear weapons. In their letter, they state that, "the existence of more than 17,000 nuclear weapons in the world today represents a unique existential threat to all current and future generations". In fact, they go on to say that the detonation of just one nuclear bomb could kill more than a million people and that no matter the scale of the attack, no adequate humanitarian response would be possible. "A global ban on nuclear weapons is long overdue. It is patently unacceptable that nuclear weapons should continue to be the only weapons of mass destruction not subject to a clear international prohibition."

The point the prominent Australians are making is that a ban on nuclear weapons makes them illegal and therefore paves the way to their complete elimination. In reading these words of wisdom, one begins to sense the urgency of this situation. As I write these words, PM Harper is cranking up his cold war rhetoric against Russia. It would appear that this does not position us very well to act as a mediator between the major powers to encourage them to work towards nuclear disarmament.

How do we also convince countries suspected of having nuclear weapons who have not yet signed the nuclear proliferation treaty to give up their arsenal, if the major nuclear powers are not prepared to do so themselves?

The Inter-Parliamentary Union (IPU) held its 130th Assembly in Geneva earlier this year in March

and came up with a draft resolution: Towards a Nuclear-Weapons-Free World: the contribution of Parliaments.

Among other points, the IPU recommends that parliaments urge their governments "to start multi-lateral negotiations on a verifiable, robust, non-discriminatory and multi-lateral treaty banning the production of fissile material for nuclear weapons or other nuclear explosive devices." The IPU also calls for a conference dealing with a Middle East free of weapons of mass destruction to be attended by countries of this region.

In reading all these documents, it is certainly clear that there is a strong international consensus to rid the world of nuclear weapons. However, the question that remains is how to put these words into action? As General Lee Butler, US Air Force (Retired) former Commander-in-Chief of the United States Strategic Air Command states, "We have no greater responsibility than to bring the nuclear era to a close. We cannot at once keep sacred the miracle of existence and hold sacrosanct the capacity to destroy it....It is time to reassert the primacy of individual conscience, the voice of reason and the rightful interests of humanity."

Interestingly, it was a former General and President of the US, Dwight Eisenhower who warned the world of the "military industrial complex". And now, we have a former General responsible for US nuclear forces pleading for a nuclear-free world. Those who understand this technology know how dangerous it is to our survival as a species.

It is time for Canada to play a leading role towards the abolishment of nuclear weapons. Let's make this an election issue in 2015.

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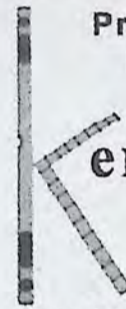
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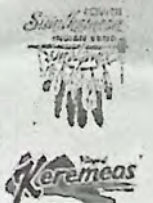
