Chief Election Officer Shirley McMahon made it official at the close of nominations at 4:00 PM Friday, October 10th that residents in the Town of Princeton would not be going to the polls for the 2014 round of Municipal Elections.

A total of five candidates had filed nomination papers to fill the required five seats on Princeton Town Council along with the three required to fill three seats to represent Princeton on the Nicola-

Similkameen School Board.
The candidates elected by acclamation are:
Mayor - Frank Armitage
Councillors - Doug Pateman, Jerome Tjerkstra, Rosemary Doughty and Kim Maynard
School Board Trustees - Gordon Comeau, David Rainer and Leah Ward
Rural residents will be voting for a Director to fill the Area H seat

Town reports on UBCM meetings

The Town of Princeton update from Union of BC Municipalities Annual Convention September 22- 26, 2014
The Town of Princeton booked several meetings with Government Ministries to discuss issues pertinent

to the needs of our community. The following is a brief summary of the topics Mayor and Council discussed with the Ministries.
September 24th, 2014
Premier Christy Clark, Minister of

Social Development and Social Innovation, Honourable Don McRae and Minister of Community, Sport and Cultural Development Honourable Coralee Oakes.
Satellite Boundary Extension

Discussed the Town's application to incorporate Copper Mountain Mine properties into the Town of Princeton. The Premier and Minister Oakes are in support of the initiative and will endeavour to complete the approval process by the end of 2014.

The approximate size of the current rural tax forgone by the province if a boundary extension is approved is approximately \$350K. This funding would help us implement our unfunded capital renewal program which includes walk and curb, roads, parks, administrative/recreation facilities and major equipment replacement.

Aquatic Wellness Centre
The discussions centered around the demonstrated need for an indoor facility to replace our aging outdoor pool which is at the end of its useful life. The goal is to provide a place that is central to the social, physical and recreational wellbeing of our Community, and an attractant to residents of all ages and walks of life. Council asked that the Provincial

Government partner with the Town to secure the necessary funding from the Federal and Provincial Governments. The Premier committed to work with us in 2015 to facilitate making this important community project a reality.

Riverside Community Centre
The Town has requested that the Province allow School District #58 to transfer ownership of the Riverside Community Centre for \$1.00 as the Town will be operating and maintaining the facility for Town programs and activities. Ownership would allow the Town to make investment and improve the facility for the residents of Princeton in perpetuity. Premier Clarke

Town Hall Accessibility

Requested funding for wheelchair access to the second floor of the Town Hall. The Province agreed to assist with making the Provincial Court on the second floor of the Town Hall handicapped accessible by installing an elevator. We will be working with the Ministry of Social Development and Social Innovation on the project to provide barrier free

access.

September 23rd, 2014

Minister of Health, Honourable Terry Lake

Mayor and Council discussed three items that will help us sustain adequate health care in Princeton, and which the Provincial Government can assist with:

Nurse Practitioner Program

Mayor and Council asked the Minister to consider increasing enrolment in the nurse practitioner program, and expanding the duties to include emergency room first call,

with a physician as second on call. This would enable our hospital to operate more effectively and efficiently in response to patient care demands.

Shared Care

One of the community's very successful experiences has been with the Shared Care program whereby specialists are visiting our local hospital thereby eliminating for some the necessity of travelling long distances to referral centres such as Kelowna and Penticton. The program is funded through Shared Care and the Northern and Isolation Travel Assistance Outreach Program (NITAOP), and we requested that these programs be maintained. Our Health Steering Committee has heard personal accounts from both patients and physicians about how the Shared Care program has been invaluable in responding to the needs of patients in our community.

Family Physician Recruitment

Princeton, like many rural communities, have an ongoing need for family physicians. We currently have a Health Steering Committee that has a renewed mandate for another year to oversee and work with our Health Authority in regard to all our health care issues. Part of the larger committee, is a retention and recruitment subcommittee that is currently working with the business and industrial community to take some of the stresses off our current three physicians. We know that one of these physicians will be leaving once her rural posting mandate is completed, and it will be quite impossible for two physicians to keep our ER open. We have two major employers: Copper Mountain Mining and Weyerhaeuser who need the Town of Princeton to have a 24/7 emergency room. Our current physician manpower plan calls for 5 physicians. We realize our community is not alone in this dilemma, but

our industrial and business leaders will be requesting a special meeting with the Minister sometime in the near future - hopefully in Kamloops, to express their concerns to him. We confirmed that the large financial incentive extended under the Rural Recruitment Incentive Program to our community for attracting physicians two years ago was the main reason Princeton has the physicians we have today. The Minister was asked to consider continuing to support the Rural Recruitment Incentive Program.

September 23rd, 2014

Minister of Education, Honourable Peter Fassbender

Riverside Community Centre

Discussed the acquisition of Riverside Community Centre from School District #58.

..... continued from Front Page vacated by Brad Hope. Their choices are Bob Coyne, Jamie Frandsen and Charles Weber.

Elsewhere in the Similkameen, the Village of Keremeos has a total of nine candidates to choose from for five seats. Incumbent Mayor Manfred Bauer is being contested by Martin Menzies while only two incumbent Councillors, Arlene Arlow and Jeremy Evans, are joined on the ballot by Ted Douglas, Gary Johnson, Sherry

Philpott-Adhikary, Bob Thurston and Jason Weibe.

In Area G (Keremeos/Rural Hedley) incumbent Angelique Wood is being challenged by former Area G Director Elf Christensen. In Cawston (Area B) George Bush was elected by acclamation.

The term of office for this election is four years, changing from the traditional three years. The four year term will now be the standard in the province.

Town approves final phase of project

Town Council awarded a contract to Kaeser Compressors Limited at their October 6th regular meeting. The contract, worth \$34,960, is for the replacement of the blowers on the wastewater lagoon aeration system.

Director of Infrastructure and Parks Kevin Huey explained to Council in his report that the existing blowers are several years old and that the new ones are more efficient and the "last phase of a multi phase project."

Huey says the existing aeration

blowers were originally installed in 1985 and require updating.

"These new blowers would be installed in place of the two existing blowers and would run parallel configuration to meet the aeration requirement of 1,200 cfm."

A total of three different quotes were received for this part of the project. Although the winning bid was the lowest, the highest bid was just over \$52,000.

The project is funded entirely through the Gas Tax Regionally Significant Projects Program 2013.

Council awards water main replacement contract

Town Council awarded a contract to Grizzly Excavating at their October 6th regular meeting. The project, worth a total of \$73,495, will see the replacement of steel water mains on Tulameen Avenue and Third Street.

According to Director of Infrastructure and Parks Kevin Huey, the project is required as the existing water mains "have exceeded their life expectancy and are subject to leakage."

The project will start this week and is expected to be completed within a two-week time frame.

Huey says, "It was determined in the TRUE Consulting Water System Capacity Report and fur-

ther in 2013 that the Town water distribution system contained steel water mains that were over their life expectancy."

There were a total of four bids submitted for the contract with quite a span of prices with Grizzly Excavating having the lowest. The highest bid was just under \$160,000.

Councillor Marilyn Harkness asked why there was such a price difference in the quotes and Huey explained all of the companies that submitted bids were using the very same specifications. He responded with a comment that he didn't expect such a price difference either.



Notice is hereby given that under section 86 (Alternative Approval Process) of the *Community Charter* and Section 20 of the *Local Government Act*, the Council of the Town of Princeton intends to petition the Minister of Community, Sport and Cultural Development requesting an extension of the area of the municipality to include the described land on the map below.

ALTERNATIVE APPROVAL PROCESS AND ELIGIBILITY

AND FURTHER TAKE NOTICE THAT the municipality may proceed with the satellite boundary extension request unless at least ten percent of municipal electors indicate that a referendum must be held by submitting a signed *Elector Response Form* to Town Hall no later than 4:30 p.m. on Friday, November 14th, 2014. *Elector Response Forms* must be in the form established by the Town of Princeton, and only those persons who qualify as electors of the municipality are entitled to sign *Elector Response Forms*.

If less than ten percent of municipal electors submit an *Elector Response Form*, the satellite boundary extension request will be deemed to have the approval of the electors and the Town of Princeton may proceed. For the purpose of conducting the alternative approval opportunity, the number of electors is calculated as 275.

The rationale for the proposed boundary extension is to enable the Town of Princeton to better manage the effects of mine operations that directly affect road, park, recreation and other infrastructure. The addition of mine assessment to the Town's tax base will help to provide support for infrastructure and programs to keep Princeton vibrant and desirable as a community to continue to attract and retain residents.

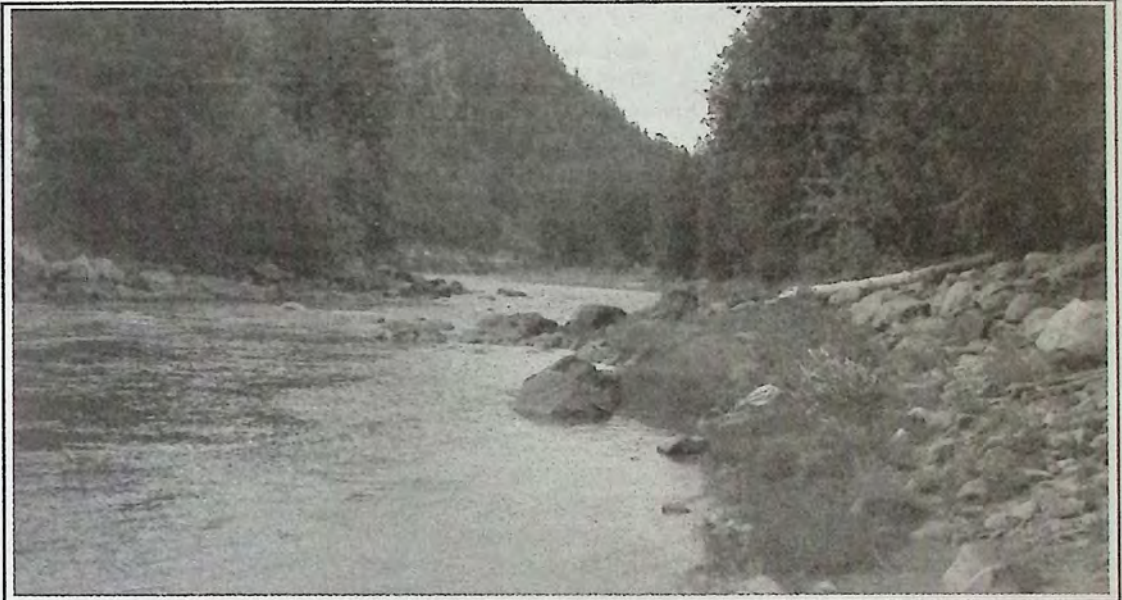

Lifeblood of the Valley

Similkameen Valley Planning Society

A public information meeting was held October 9th at the Princeton Skills Centre to present and review the *SVPS Sustainable Similkameen Strategy*. If you missed it, here is the report.

Lifeblood of the Valley
An Interim Report on the Similkameen Watershed Plan Phase One — June 2014

The Similkameen River is a tributary of the Okanogan River, joining it just south of the Canada-United States border at Oroville, Washington.

With headwaters in Manning Park, it is 196 km long and is supplied

mainly by snowmelt. Annual peak flows on the Similkameen commonly occur during May to July.

Flowing past Princeton, Hedley, Keremeos and Cawston, the Similkameen is a prominent reflection of the valley as community, a major artery that gives life to a region of aromatic grassland and bountiful farmland.

The Similkameen Watershed Plan

The Sustainable Similkameen Strategy includes an intention to significantly improve water management in the Similkameen watershed, emphasizing an integrative,

holistic approach that links water quality, water quantity, wetlands, riparian habitat and biodiversity with the economic and social priorities for the watershed and developing an ability to adapt the plan to climate change.

The plan is intended to foster collaborative water management and make water conservation a permanent ethic.

The plan would also:

- Become a Guidance Document for decision-making authorities, resource managers, water users and residents;
- Provide for more informed and integrated decisions regarding watershed;
- Be Integrated into other local planning documents, bylaws, policies and Best Management Practices;
- Ensure decision-making remains with local, First Nations, Regional and federal governments within their respective jurisdictions.

Phase 1 work included:

- Development of a searchable information data base that will be accessible for local agencies, industry and other interested parties;
- Assessment of information gaps and setting priorities for action to address the gaps;
- Development of a communication plan to support the planned public consultation process;
- Preparation of Background Reports on water issues to support public and partner engagement.

To the new council, I want to let you know that people will be

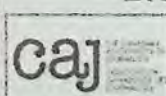

How Should Women Look?

The fashion industry tells us we women should be skinny, heavy with make-up, and should wear clothing that the industry dictates. In Islamic countries, women must cover up everything. Those are the extremes of what women should wear. In many societies, women are criticized for not wearing what is expected of them. I have a friend whose family is Sikh, and she is criticized because she loves to wear blue jeans. A Jewish woman of the Orthodox sect must wear a head scarf in public.

Who decides how a woman should look? I believe the answer to that question is church and government, both of which are run primarily by men. The next question is: what's in it for men when they dictate what women wear and how they should look in public?

Look in any fashion magazine, or even in any magazine aimed at women, and there are all kinds of instructions on how a woman should look. She should wear a lot of make-up, especially around the eyes. She should dye her hair to make it look astonishing. She should be slim, stay slim and should look young. She should wear a long gown to formal occasions and next to nothing at the beach. She should look sexually appealing at all times.

Women are told they need to remove hair from their armpits, legs, groin, and if their arms are hairy, to remove that hair too. Women are great consumers of hair removal products which may or may not be good for their skin, and most certainly can be painful.

Why should women fall for this? The answer to that is training. Girls the world over are trained to please men, mothers, mothers-in-law, and on and on. Girls are being trained early to wear make-up, look sexy, look like miniature

women. Not only have adult women fallen for the dictates of how a woman should look, they cooperate by training their daughters.

Even among gay women, there is a kind of 'right' way to look. Butch women do all they can to look masculine. Who dictated this trend?

Very rarely, women question why they should do so many things to follow the dictates of church, government and the fashion industry. The question they need to ask is this: why should anyone dictate how a woman should look?

The latest trend in women's fashion is to wear dresses with a fake waistline at the level of the lower ribs, and short skirts that expose the knees. This is the sort of dress little girls wear. For the most part, these dresses are unflattering, distorting the natural shape of adult women, and frankly, there are damned few attractive knees. Is this fashion designed to appeal to men who might be pedophiles?

Occasionally, I look at haute couture fashion shows. These consist of a lot of skinny women walking down a raised platform called a runway. They walk in a particular way, an artificial gait that would hardly be called efficient. They wear some of the most god-awful clothing ever devised by anyone. Some of the clothing is beautiful, but a lot of it would not be worn by any woman whose life is normal.

For most women, high heels are a must. They will pay in pain in their older years for every hour they wore those high heels. However, most men will say they like the look of a woman's legs in high heels. What does that tell you?

Poor women have to work. Most women are poor women. They may work around the home, out in the garden or the field, or they may put in many hours working for a wage. The majority of women drive cars or other vehicles, carry heavy bags of groceries, lift heavy children from shopping carts to car seats, spend time cooking, cleaning, doing laundry, mowing lawns, taking out garbage, and trying to find a little "me" time in peace and quiet. The fashion industry does not cater to women who are poor, so why bother paying any attention to what the fashion industry dictates?

In a survey done many years ago, men were asked about what they find most attractive in women. The top response was "she looks healthy". The second response was "she has a good personality". What does that tell you about trying to look like what is dictated by fashion?

Justin Trudeau has raised the whole issue of government control over women's bodies by his stance on abortion. A woman in Canada has a choice as to whether or not she should bear a child, yet even in such a personal matter, there are religious people who would dictate what a woman is permitted to do, even if the woman does not belong to that religion.

Women on the job are expected to put the work first and not be a distraction to men trying to do their work.

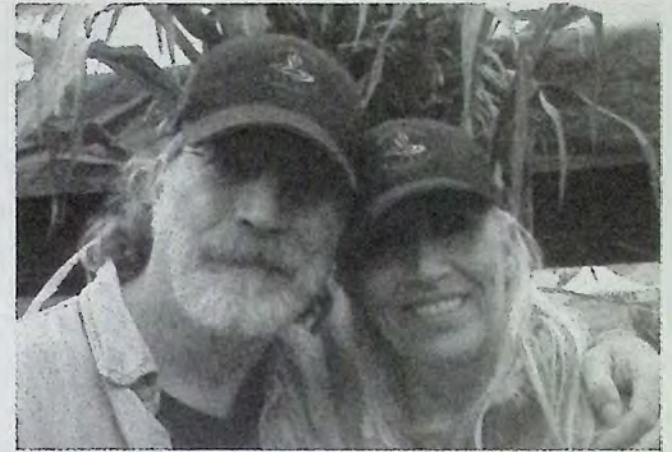

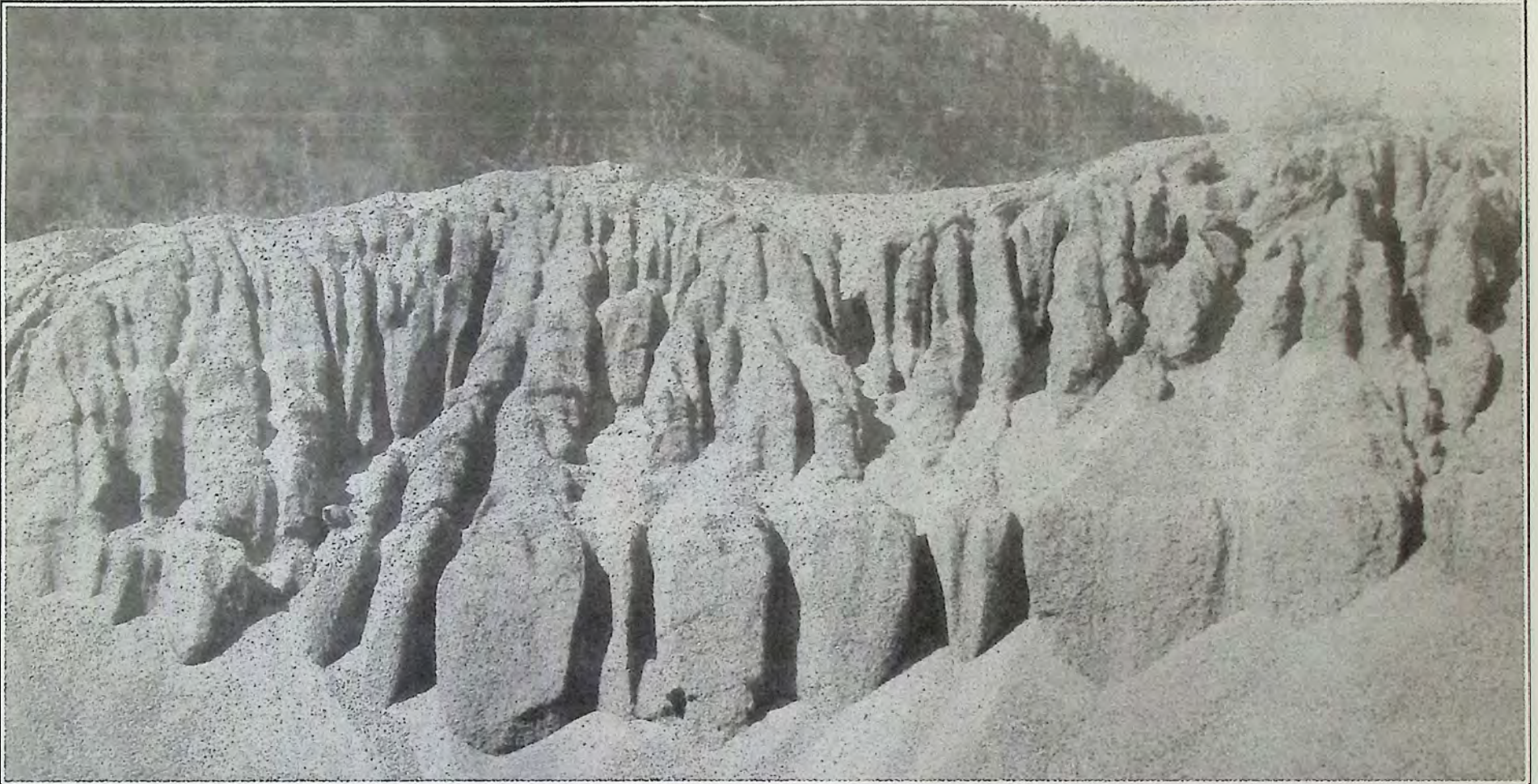

Electoral Area 'G' Report

You spoke - we listened!

The Alternative Approval Process and Parks Service Establishment Bylaw for Area G.

Area G will NOT be adopting a

bylaw for the establishment of parks.

This fall, residents of Area G were asked to weigh in on whether or not to create a Parks

Service Bylaw for the entire region.

The process used to guide our decision making is known as an "AAP" or Alternative Approval Process. This form of citizen engagement is regularly used by local governments when we think we know the direction most citizens want to go.

It is the least expensive way to decide whether to move ahead with a bylaw. If 10% of the citizens DO NOT want the service, and they indicate it before a given deadline, then the bylaw will be abandoned.

You told us that you DO NOT support the creation of parks in Area G, and we will abide by that. It is important to realize that your voice drives the decisions we make in government, and the opportunity you have exercised is

an important part of our civic process in Canada. Thank you for taking the time to provide your input.

Regional Districts are complicated forms of government and many people misunderstand the possibilities when they have lived in Municipalities before moving to Electoral Areas.

The fact is, unless a Regional District has a service/bylaw and a tax for that service, it is not able to participate in that service. What that means for Area G is that we now have an obligation to abandon any parks service and not undertake any further parks development.

For the residents in Olalla who wanted a park, it will take renewed efforts to get further community buy-in before we can make headway.

For the residents of Hedley who want to take their park back from the RDOS, we will work with you to make sure that you are able to achieve your goals. We know that the Executive of the Community's Club is adamant about wanting to have control of their park again without interference from the RDOS. We want you to know that we are listening and responsive.

In Rural Keremeos, we will continue to be challenged by transients camping in areas beyond Regional District and Municipal authority. Without a parks bylaw, the Regional District continues to be unable to move forward in a proactive manner. At best, tax dollars will be spent cleaning up the mess but not preventing it.

We faced many questions "Why not a referendum?" and the answer is that a legal referendum is an expensive process. The tax dollars we were proposing to raise were only going to total \$10,000 for the entire region. To spend \$4,000 to \$8,000 to conduct a referendum outside an election would eat into it and be fiscally irresponsible.

Again, we thank all of you who took the time to let us know your thoughts.

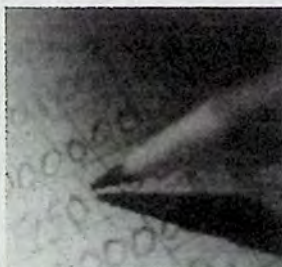

How to Put on a Pirate Show in Princeton...in Ten Weeks

Last Thursday night's rehearsal for Crimson Tine Players' production of 'Yo Ho Ho! A Pirate Christmas' involved a lot more physical activity than has been part of the process to date.

Thanks to the skillful work of Set Builder Martin Riel, a rope was now hanging from the rafters, a wooden frame was being used to represent a bed, a window frame was being used as a prop along with a balcony railing, an outline on the stage floor to indicate land versus water and the largest prop so far, an island had materialized.

Trust me, all of this will eventually make sense and while we all got to see Riel's handiwork, he admitted to me that the real artwork comes from Set Painter Grace Truesdell who weaves her artistic magic on the rough stuff and makes it look real.

There was an 'a-ha' moment for me once the giant island was set in place and pirates swung on the rope from it to the stage. I can finally say I can now visualize what the sets are all about. I have a feeling I wasn't the only per-

son in the room who had it suddenly hit them that the play was really starting to take a physical shape and presence.

Thursday night's rehearsal was two complete run throughs of the entire script, minus the singing parts. I was impressed to see so many of the actors had most of their lines memorized. A few even had lines memorized from other cast mates!

I have a pretty good idea what the play is about and could easily explain it to anyone, but now that each actor is putting their own stamp on their individual characters, the lines that were funny in the first couple of rehearsals are even funnier now. I found myself enjoying the way expressions and body language enhanced the jokes.

During the first complete run through, minus two key players absent for various reasons, Director Rhianfa Riel was writing down a lot of notes. She went through many more pages of notes than I did. I kept getting distracted by the activities on stage and found myself switching back and forth from 'reporter' to

'spectator' too many times than I want to admit to.

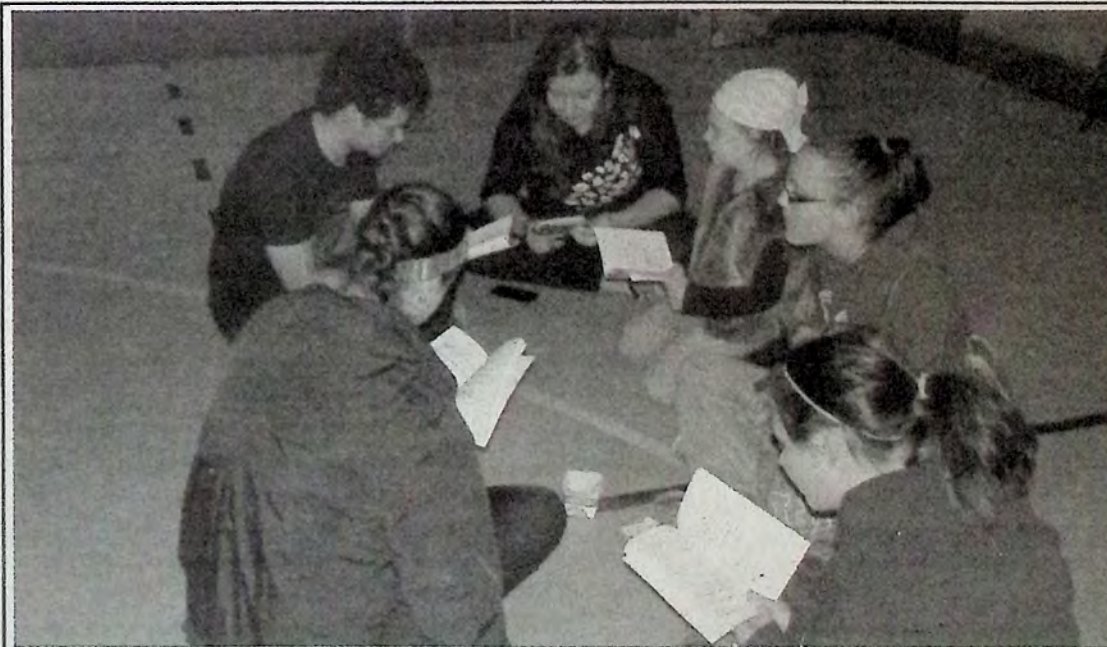
Riel told me her notes were to serve many purposes. In addition to notes for the Set Builder to consider for prop placement and improvement, she was also taking notes for herself regarding small, but important, changes to the

script and things that the cast members were doing. Following the run through, Riel shared her cast notes, which included many positive mentions of how a line was delivered or how an actor stood during the delivery of a line.

Clearly the critique was meant to be

positive and constructive and the Director was obviously pleased with the progress being made as she pointed out, "I'm really, really happy with tonight."

I have to agree. I am amazed with how far this production has gone in such a short period of time.

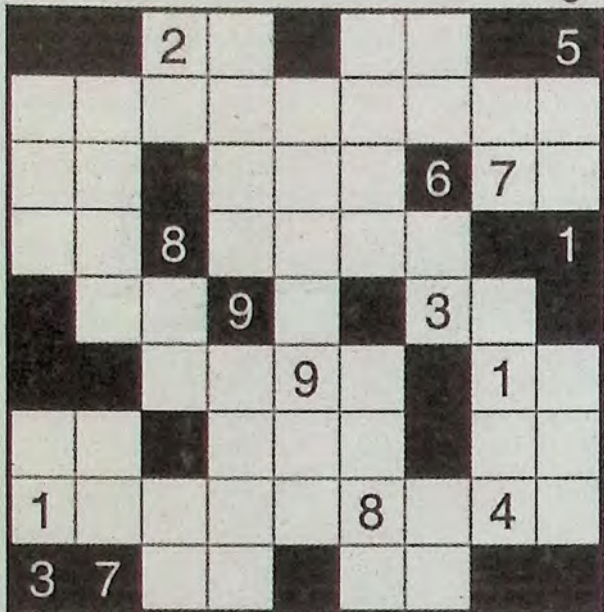

Keremeos Columns Hike

On Saturday October 4th, Blaine Marsel led eight Vermilion Forks Field Naturalists on a hike up to the Keremeos Columns. The columns consist of a cliff resembling huge organ pipes. The "pipes" are hexagonal columns of basalt that were formed when magma from beneath

the earth's crust cooled and crystallized. Although they don't resemble what we usually think of as crystals, their hexagonal shape with its five faces qualifies them as crystals.

To get to the Columns we turned east off Highway 3A to Penticton on Liddicoat Road that runs along the Keremeos Cemetery and drove

about three kilometres up a dirt road. From there we hiked the remaining distance to the Columns.

The first thing that struck us when we opened the truck doors was a powerful waft of sagebrush – the smell was intoxicating! The uphill hike to the Columns took us 1 1/2 hours. Along the way we caught spectacular views of the Similkameen River meandering its way down to the US border.

Along the way we encountered the singing of crickets and some very tame cows that didn't budge an inch as we passed close by. A highlight was the head of a coyote peering

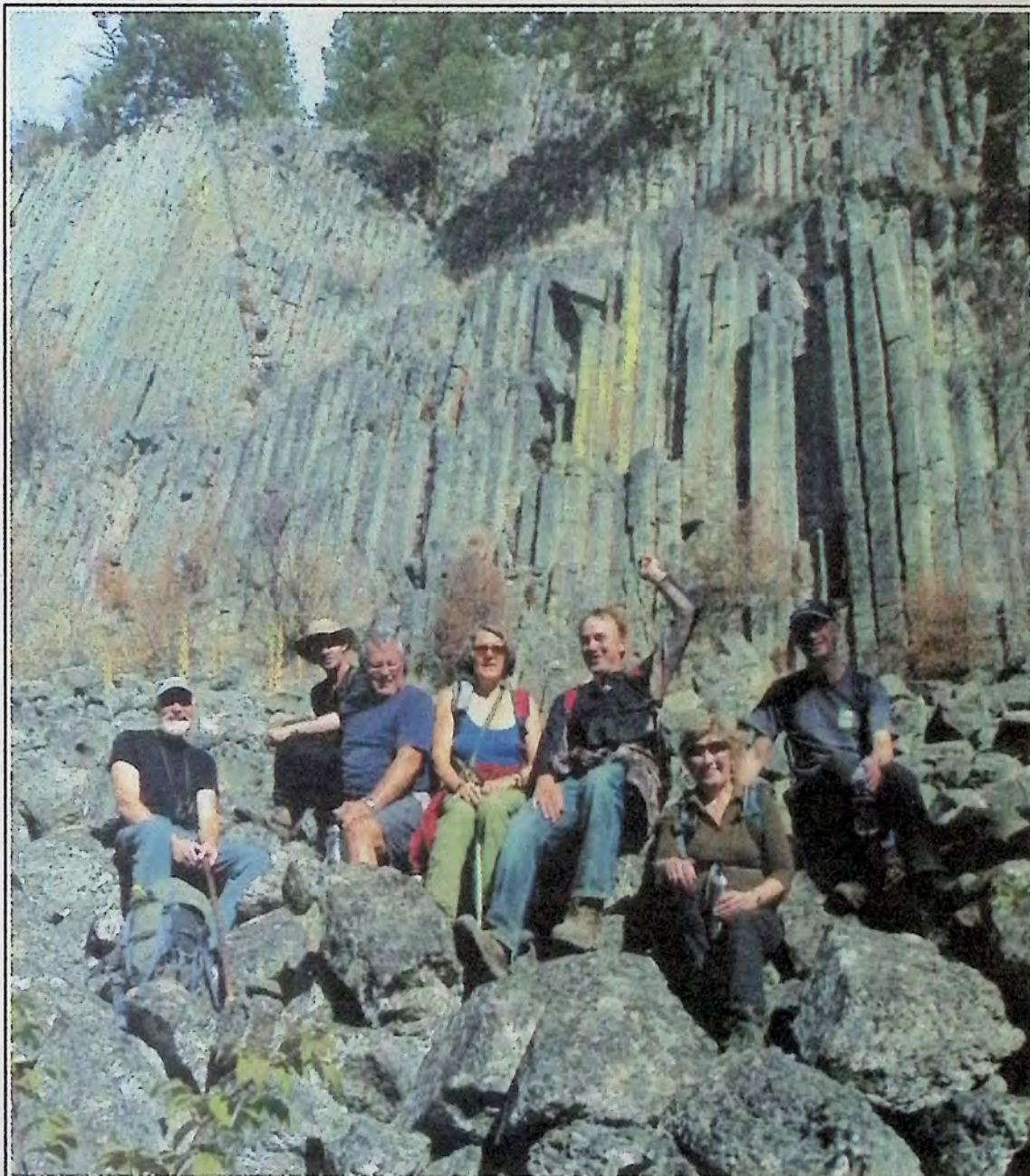
above the hill ahead who watched us for at least a minute before scampering off.

The Columns themselves are very impressive close up and we lingered in their presence soaking up the summer-like sunshine and eating our lunches. John Henry gave us some lessons in the geology of the Columns as well as that of the Similkameen Valley. Younger and more energetic members of the group climbed the Columns to the first ledge, about ten meters above us. On the way back down we were treated to further spectacular views enhanced by the ever-changing

light and cloud formations over K Mountain.

Our next hike will be Saturday, October 18th, when John Henry will lead us on a moderate hike at China Ridge. You can confirm your attendance with John by calling 250-295-7154. We'll meet at Billy's Restaurant parking lot at 9:00 AM.

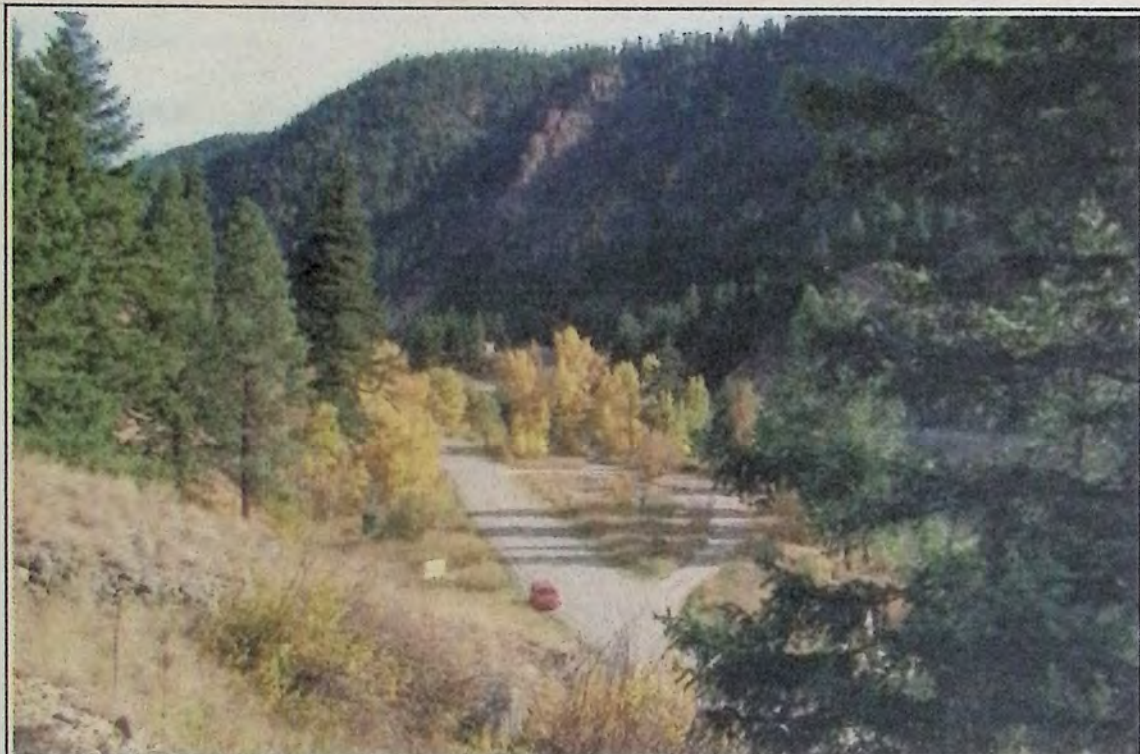

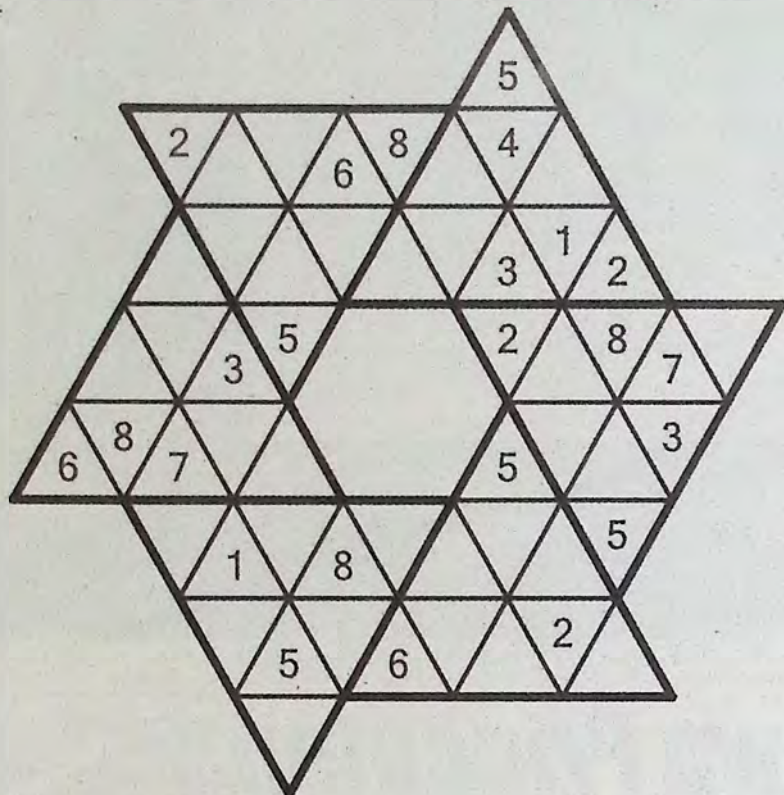

HOSHI SUDOKU - About The Puzzle

Sudoku - also known as "Number Place" - is a logic-based, combinatorial number-placement puzzle. The aim of Sudoku is to enter a number from 1 through 9 in each cell of a grid, most frequently a 9x9 grid made up of 3x3 subgrids. Each row, column and region must contain only one instance of each number. This Sudoku variant is called "Hoshi Sudoku". It contains six large triangles. The numbers 1 to 9 must be placed into the cells of each large triangle. Every line of any length - even uncontinuous - must contain every number not more than once.

Saving Downtown Princeton...

...An Ongoing Series by George Elliott

The fact that residents in the Town of Princeton won't be going to the polls to elect a new Town Council is an interesting one. Even though we didn't get a chance to vote for them, we ended up with a Town Council with two new members.

I certainly hope this is the start of something big and a giant push for progress gets underway. I also hope that this time next year I won't be writing about saving the downtown core because by then it expanded to be three streets offering business, service and retail opportunities.

The movement of the current Town Council (the new council does not officially take office until December) to include Copper Mountain Mine as part of a Boundary Extension can be viewed by many as a stroke of genius. According to Town Hall, the move would put about \$350,000 extra cash into the Town of Princeton bank account. I'm not sure how Area

H residents feel about losing that much from their tax base and I suspect they will let the rest of us know in any future referendums the Town decides to share with them.

The whole plan, if I've understood what Town Council has indicated, is to use that extra \$350,000 on infrastructure improvements. I think that can mean a number of different things. Considering a provincial grant program covers improvements to the sewer lagoon, and reserve funds have paid for other infrastructure improvements I think we will be hearing talk about an aquatic centre again.

In order for me to support it, it needs to be a realistic plan and not one that even the largest municipality in British Columbia could not afford. I have been assured by at least one member of Town Council that this would be the approach, but at the time of that conversation we were on

the edge of an election campaign and my 'politicking radar' gets a good workout usually around that time. But assuming this is all part of the plan, and considering Town Hall is trying to work out a deal with the School District to take over complete control of Riverside Centre (see the UBCM report elsewhere in this issue) it isn't hard to see where this is going.

For those of you who need a hint, think Riverside Aquatic Centre and you are caught up to where I am with this.

I'm not going to get into a debate on whether or not we need or deserve a pool at this point. But I will say that in order for our town to attract new residents and grow there needs to be something to attract them. I am fully aware of the tremendous amount of artistic, cultural, sport and recreational opportunities that exist in our area. For many that

is enough reason to be here. For a lot of other people, especially those who do not have interests that fall under the categories of art, culture, sport or recreation, they need something else to bring them here.

I know, an aquatic centre is actually sport and recreation related, but let's pretend we don't know that. If an aquatic centre leads the movement of growth in our community, then it should be followed by a sold out business park, a bustling downtown with the need for rezoning of another street or two to allow for expanded retail business and a waiting list for doctors wanting to set up shop instead of a waiting list of patients in need of a local doctor.

I'll be the first to tell you I do see the big picture and I do see all these things happening to Princeton eventually. I'm just a little tired of waiting.

How does this save downtown

Princeton?

Well, if you followed the rough formula I outlined here you basically have infrastructure + development = growth. What this means is that if we had all been paying attention ten or twenty years ago our community wouldn't be in the place it is today with so many empty storefronts, a virtually empty industrial park and people moving away due to a lack of services or whatever they like to use as a reason to get away from here.

The upside to the equation is that it is a situation that can still be fixed.

I think we need to give our Town Council the chance to prove to us they have this plan in place and are working on it on a regular basis instead of making us guess what they are doing.

Maybe if there was a touch more transparency and information sharing there would be more support from within the community.

 Band is also providing input to the project, actively accumulating a body of knowledge on traditional use and value of the Similkameen and its watershed. This important addition to the study continues at the time of preparation of this document and is not included as part of this presentation.

Phase 1 Findings

Streamflow (Water Quantity)

Twelve Water Survey of Canada hydrometric stations are active in the Similkameen River watershed. That's above average for B.C. Stations are well distributed throughout the watershed. These stations include four on the Similkameen River, two on the Tulameen River, and one each on the Ashnola River and Ewart, Hedley, Keremeos, Pasayten and Siwash creeks.

With exception of Ewart Creek, active stations have more than 35 years of data and four have more than 60 years of data.

For specific investigations (i.e. Groundwater-surface water interaction investigations and aquatic resource assessments) some additional monitoring at site specific locations may be necessary.

Water Quality

There is a good set of water quality data for the main-stem of the Similkameen River and Hedley Creek and a reasonable amount of information for the Tulameen River and Ashnola Creek. Less is known about tributary streams and lakes.

Water Demand and Use

There are 831 current licenses and 690 points-of-diversion issued on streams, springs and lakes within the

Canadian portion of the Similkameen River Watershed.

Uses include domestic water supply, irrigation, waterworks, stock-watering, enterprise, mining and processing purposes, and for storage, power and conservation purposes.

Groundwater

The B.C. government monitors three active groundwater level observation wells (Cawston, Mt. Kobau and Keremeos). No valley-wide assessment of groundwater-surface interaction has been completed.

Lakes, Wetlands and Riparian Areas

There is a good set of information on fish stocking, fish populations and fish habitat for key angling lakes.

Information on water quality in lakes and wetlands areas is quite limited. What information is available focuses on the warmer and drier parts of the watershed. Information on higher elevation areas is lacking.

Climate and Climate Change

The current climate and snowpack monitoring network provides a relatively good understanding of the climate throughout and adjacent to the SRW, although there is a considerable bias towards lower elevations (where most development is concentrated).

- Currently 10 active climate stations and six snow survey stations in operation within the SRW;
- Recent work by UVic, University of Washington and Agriculture and Agri-Foods Canada directly applicable to SRW;
- Region is predicted to warm and annual precipitation is predicted to

increase;

- Flows during late fall, winter and early spring thaws are forecast to be greater, while late spring, summer and early fall flows will be smaller.

Fish, Fish Habitat and Instream Flows

Most streams in the SRW are considered flow-sensitive for fish.

Species at Risk

There is a reasonable amount of information regarding evaluation of important habitats to species at risk, habitat inventory and ecosystem mapping. However, there is no single document that addresses the Similkameen watershed in its entirety.

Land Use and Economic Development

A Database constructed as part of Phase 1 work details provincial, local government and First Nations Watershed planning documents, including primers and toolkits relating to water conservation and management.

Planning for flood and drought

MOE has published floodplain maps for the Keremeos-Cawston and Princeton areas. Floodplain mapping not completed outside of these areas.

International Waters and Treaty Obligations

Variety of documents address international waters and treaties, but few have direct application to the Similkameen River.

The Similkameen Valley Planning Society is a not-for-profit society founded by the seven governing bodies of the Similkameen Valley, which includes Municipal, Regional, and First Nations government. The society administers the

Sustainable Similkameen Strategy. Sustainable Similkameen Strategy (2011-2020)

Valley residents maintain and rehabilitate the Similkameen's key attributes — beauty, high quality natural environment and resources and rural, small town lifestyle — while building on existing sustainability values and practices, and adding greater knowledge and innovation.

This demands an increase in participation by residents in local affairs to strengthen and solidify the Valley socially, culturally and economically, relying heavily on volunteers working through informal and formal organizations. In addition, the Valley attracts and keeps especially environmentally responsible

and economically active immigrants. This includes special attention to developing a range in housing type and cost.

The power of a region is harnessed, wherein the Valley's communities take advantage of the social, political and economic strengths that come from their collaboration.

CMMC achieves another record

Copper Mountain Mining Corporation (TSX: CUM) (the "Company" or "Copper Mountain") announced October 8th production results for the third quarter of 2014 from the Copper Mountain mine located near Princeton.

Copper production for the third quarter of 2014 totaled 21.7 million pounds of copper, a 9% increase as compared to the second quarter of 2014, setting another new production record for the mine. The concentrate also included 6,100 ounces of gold and 124,100 ounces of silver. During the quarter the mill processed a total of 2.8 million tonnes of ore at an average grade of

0.421 % Copper. During the quarter the mill achieved 90.5% availability and averaged a total of 30,700 tpd throughput.

The Company continues to optimize the newly installed secondary crusher which averaged 35,900 tpd crushed during the last week of September, with a high day achievement of 43,500 tonnes of ore.

Jim O'Rourke, President and CEO commented: "We are extremely pleased with our construction and operating team's efforts on bringing the new \$40 million secondary crusher into production on schedule and on budget. Minor modifica-

tions to the circuits are ongoing, but finer SAG mill feed has confirmed throughput forecasts. Current production rates in the 35,000 tpd range are being achieved."

Mining activities continued to be split between Pit 3 and the southwest end of Pit 2. During the quarter a total of 15.3 million tonnes of material was mined, including 4.5 million tonnes of ore and 10.8 million tonnes of waste. The projected life of mine strip ratio is 2 to 1 but higher in the early years. The mine has moved an average of approximately 178,600 tonnes of material per day during the third quarter.

Copper production during the

quarter was in line with guidance; however a ship loading error reduced sales during the quarter as the port mistakenly loaded a portion of CMMC's concentrate while loading another company's concentrate onto the ship. The port is conducting an investigation into this mistaken loading and the Company has made an insurance claim for the missing concentrate that has an estimated value of \$3.6 million. During the third quarter of 2014 the mine shipped 37,300 wmt of concentrate containing approximately 18.2 million pounds of copper, 5,900 ounces of gold, and 89,700 ounces of silver generating an estimated US \$66.9 million in gross revenue.

About Copper Mountain Mining Corporation:

Copper Mountain's flagship asset is the Copper Mountain mine located in southern British Columbia near the town of Princeton. The Company has a strategic alliance with Mitsubishi Materials Corporation who owns 25% of the mine. The Copper Mountain mine commenced production in the summer of 2011 and has continued to improve its operations since start-up. The 18,000 acre site has a large resource of copper that remains open laterally and at depth. The mine has significant exploration potential that will need to be explored over the next few years to fully appreciate the properties full development potential. RDOS releases meeting highlights

Selected highlights from the regular meeting of the Board of Directors of the Regional District of Okanagan-Similkameen held Thursday, October 2.

Complete minutes of the meeting will be made available to the public following adoption at the next scheduled Board meeting October 16, 2014.

The Regional Board adopted Bylaw No. 2674, Electoral Area

"H" Community Facilities Capital Reserve Fund Expenditure Bylaw. The Board approved the formation of the Vermillion Forks Community Forest Corporation in 2009 for the purpose of acquiring and managing a Community Forest Agreement.

The Upper Similkameen Indian Band, the Town of Princeton and the Regional District are 1/3 shareholders in the Corporation. In May

2014 a reserve fund for the purposes of expenditures for or in respect of capital projects within Electoral Area "H" was created.

The Missezula Lake Water Improvement District Pump upgrade project is expected to cost \$20,670. \$15,000 is to be funded by the Community Facilities Capital Reserve and the remainder will be funded through the Missezula Lake Water District.

Princeton's Weisskopf takes top five finishes

Princeton's Marion Weisskopf has been participating since April in the American Horsewoman's Challenge.

The Challenge is a six-month contest to train a young horse for a cross-discipline competition held this year at the Lazy E Arena in Guthrie, Oklahoma. The competition combines the equestrian skills of Cowboy Dressage, Ranch/Trail Versatility and Liberty.

The top ten finishers split a purse worth \$28,000. The Challenge Finals culminated with an exciting Freestyle event demonstrating the horse-human partnership, lightness, music interpretation and creativity.

A panel of celebrity judges critiqued and scored the freestyle performances in front of a live audience between October 3rd and 5th.

While three Canadian competitors began the challenge in April, only one made the journey to the finals.

It was Marion Weisskopf of Princeton, who was at the top of the pack, with a preliminary combined score of 376.45 good for second place (Liberty - 67; Cowboy Dressage - 216.25; Ranch/Trail - 93.2), and she scored 25 points in the Freestyle which firmly positioned her in fifth place overall in that category.
