Rescue lights up the night

Flares and a circling plane near Princeton kept many residents occupied the evening of October 20th trying to figure out what was happening.

What had actually occurred was that a female hiker was being rescued from Johnny's Hat Mountain, located near RockRidge Canyon.

Princeton SAR first responded to the call around 4:00 PM after being contacted by BC Ambulance Service when a female hiker in her 20s was injured by a falling rock. She had been out on a trip with a much larger group at the time of the incident.

Search and Rescue responded with nine people. They located the injured woman who was found in serious condition. With daylight quickly disappearing other SAR teams in the region and the Canadian Air Forces were contact-

ed for additional assistance. A helicopter rescue was planned but could not take place as a CAF Cormorant Helicopter was not available. With the injured hiker located in a remote area, crews from Penticton and Oliver/Osoyoos SAR joined Princeton's initial team and started preparing for a rope rescue at 8:00 PM.

The following eight hours saw SAR members hauling equipment and setting up a series of rope stations to slowly transport the injured hiker off the mountain.

A Buffalo Search Aircraft arrived on scene from CFB Comox and dropped flares down the mountain-side for three hours. At 2:00 AM the rope rescue started and the injured hiker was in an ambulance two hours later where she was taken to Princeton Hospital for treatment and was recovering there.

Town adopts parcel tax bylaw

The Town of Princeton adopted a parcel tax bylaw following fourth and final reading of the document at the October 20th regular meeting of Town Council.

The parcel tax is being used to finance a portion of the recently upgraded Old Hedley Road and will be imposed on the property owners (Weyerhaeuser and Princeton Co-Gen) who front the

portion of the road that was upgraded.

In her report to council, Director of Finance Shirley McMahon explains, "Parcel taxes are often used to recover the costs of providing local government services. They can be levied on any property that has the opportunity to be provided with a service regardless of whether or not the service is being

used." She adds, "If the property cannot be serviced by service, the charge cannot be applied."

The upgrades to Old Hedley Road included realigning the intersection with the Princeton-Summerland Road, widening and paving the road and construction of 25 metre aprons on the driveway access points.

The cost of the project was \$328,495.00 with \$150,000.00 of which was included in the 2014 Financial Plan for the project. A total of \$28,495.00 of the Town of Princeton paving budget will go towards the overall cost with the remaining \$150,000.00 to be paid through the parcel tax.

"The property owners can choose to pay the parcel tax in full or

finance it over ten years at 3.18%, the current MFA rate, paying \$8,873.24 per year," McMahon explains.

The affected property owners were consulted and agreed to the parcel tax prior to the road construction and on September 25th a formal letter went to each property owner explaining the parcel tax and outlining payment options.

Town ratifies landfill agreement

The Town of Princeton has entered into a renewal agreement with the Regional District of Okanagan Similkameen for the provision of landfill and recycling services for Area H property owners.

The agreement was ratified at the October 20th regular meeting of Princeton Town Council. It was set to expire December 31, 2014. The RDOS had originally established a local services bylaw for Area H in 1999 and have contracted with the town for landfill and recycling ser-

vices since then. The agreement states the RDOS shares fifty percent of the operating and annual capital expenses for the operation of Princeton's landfill and recycling centre.

The club put \$3,000 in their bank account and could proudly say they were in the black between that and their other sponsorship initiatives. ELECTOR QUALIFICATIONS

There is no need to pre-register to vote as the registration of all electors for this election will take place at the time of voting. You will be required to make a declaration that you meet the following requirements:

- 18 years of age or older on general voting day
- Canadian Citizen
- Resident of BC for at least 6 months immediately preceding voting day
- Resident of OR registered owner of real property in the electoral area for at least 30 days immediately preceding voting day, and
- Not otherwise disqualified by law from voting.

Resident electors will need two (2) pieces of identification that together prove who you are and where you live. One of them must have your signature on it (i.e. Driver's License). Photo identification is not required.

Non-resident property electors may register in advance or at the voting place. However, if you choose to register at the time you vote, you must produce proof that you are the registered owner of the property. If you are one of two or more owners, you must also demonstrate – in writing – that you have the consent of the majority of all owners to vote as the non-resident property elector. Applicants must provide two (2) pieces of identification that together prove who you are and where you live. One of them must have your signature on it (i.e. Driver's License). Photo identification is not required. Check with the Regional District for a more detailed explanation of the registration procedures.

MAIL IN BALLOT VOTING

- Voters in the Regional District of Okanagan-Similkameen are eligible to vote using a mail-in ballot if they:
- Have a physical disability, illness or injury that affects their ability to vote at another voting opportunity.
 - If voters expect to be absent from the Regional District on voting day and at the times of all advance voting opportunities.
 - Voters who reside in East Gate Manning Park of Electoral Area "H" are eligible to use mail-in ballot, without meeting the above two requirements, as it is remote from the voting places.

To receive a mail-in ballot package you must first submit a mail-in ballot application to the Regional District office between October 20, 2014 and November 7, 2014. To obtain the application please go to the website, www.rdos.bc.ca, Popular Links, choose 2014 Local Elections, click on Mail-in Ballot Voting and submit to the Regional District. If there is no challenge to registering you as an eligible elector, we will put your name on a list to receive a mail-in ballot package. The mail-in ballot package contains instructions, a ballot and the necessary return envelopes that will protect the secrecy of your vote.

Non-Resident Property Electors must also complete the Non-Resident Property Elector Application and if applicable a Non-Resident Property Elector Consent form to accompany the mail-in ballot application. These forms are available on our website under 2014 Local Election. Please contact the Regional District Office for further clarification.

In order for your ballot to be counted in the election, it is your responsibility to return the mail-in ballot package to the Chief Election Officer no later than 8:00 p.m. on General Voting Day - November 15, 2014.

Flip Of The Coyne

The entire nation stood in shock as we turned on our televisions on October 22nd. Only days after the murder of Warrant Officer Patrice Vincent, the nation was coming to terms with the idea that a radicalized Canadian citizen may be to blame for senseless act of violence. The capital seemed to be under siege. As a nation we helplessly watched as they tried to resuscitate Corporal Nathan Cirillo on national television after he was gunned down by the unknown assailant that was now inside the Parliament building. Through the day, information, images and video trickled out and we watched as a gunfight inside the Parliament erupted bringing the gunman to his end.

By the end of the day the violence was over and our national leaders came out to address the nation. Our nation had survived this brutal attack on the most sacred symbols

of our democracy. The next day, the nation had two new heroes: Corporal Cirillo and the House of Commons Sergeant-at-Arms Kevin Vickers had gained the respect and love of the nation.

Canada is seen around the world as a polite and quiet nation and the world watched on in shock as events in Ottawa unfolded. Americans seem more shocked at our response to it. The media for the most part took a calm and professional approach to the reporting of the attack, waiting to know the facts rather than jumping to conclusions. The next day, when Justin Trudeau spoke, Americans passed his speech around on social media in awe that we had just seen an attack on our capital, a gunfight inside the very building that they were meeting in, and as the upworthy.com captain states, "Instead of getting engulfed with fear and sen-

sationalism, they remain who they are. They won't allow such an attack to shake them up or change them."

This may be one of the most important things about this attack, that we do not allow these acts of violence to shake or change us. Yes Parliament Hill will need some new security precautions but this does not mean that the House of Commons is no longer accessible to the commons in which it serves. Before we go making new laws to fight this new internal threat, let's fund the RCMP, CSIS and Canadian Forces so that they have the funds needed to do their jobs in the most effective manner possible. Do we have a threat internally? Yes we do. We have known this for some time as our disgruntled youth seem to be lured into the ideology of ISIS just as youth in the pastcontinued on Page 6

Rodeo Club explores new date

The annual general meeting of Princeton Rodeo Club was held October 23. There was a poor turnout to the meeting, but the former Board of Directors was returned with Ken Crompton as President again.

The year end financial statement showed a loss for the year of just over \$5,000, \$3,000 of which was a loss for the rodeo itself. This is not to say the rodeo was not well done: the rodeo show was good, but revenues were down and

expenses were more than anticipated. Sponsors were as generous as usual. Some money owed to the Rodeo Club has not yet been paid.

The concession made a good profit of \$1,773, and the beer garden brought in a profit of \$1,914. This amount would have been higher, but the costs associated with the band were paid from beer garden revenues. Admission charges brought in \$7,427, with over \$6,000 on Saturday, indicating once again that the Saturday is the favourite day to attend.

The problem of poor attendance on the Sunday is attributed to it being on Mother's Day. The club

Ebola: Part of A Web of Evil

Invention of State Sponsored programs to Contemporary Bioterrorism. She is quoted as saying a Dr. Wouter Basson undertook a project which developed biological agents such as "anthrax, cholera, Marburg and Ebola viruses"!

I promptly looked up Wouter Basson and got a lot more than I bargained for. Basson was hired by the South African government during apartheid under President Botha to find out what kinds of chemical and biological weapons other countries had. His search morphed into setting up a project to produce such weapons, in violation of an international agreement not to produce such weapons. To avoid discovery, Basson set up dummy companies: Delta G. Scientific C., Roodeplaat Research Laboratories, Protechik and Infadel. Infadel was split into D. John Truter Financial Consultants and Sefmed Information Services.

In 1990, under President de Klerk, Basson was ordered to cease the project and destroy all products of the project, including the illegal drugs Ecstasy and Mandrax. In 2013, Basson was found guilty of "unprofessional conduct" following a five year investigation. According to witnesses at the trial, Basson had been involved in drugging and poisoning anti-apartheid activist prisoners.

Daan Goossen, Director of Roodeplatt Research, testified that the company had been involved in research to find a way to introduce

contraceptive medication into blacks without their being aware of it. It was all part of a way to maintain white supremacy in South Africa.

In my research, I came across a connection with an American, Dr. Larry Ford, an American alleged to have connections to Project Coast, the biological warfare project headed by Dr. Wouter Basson. Ford, who was a physician working in Irvine, California, was under investigation for alleged improprieties with female patients. He committed suicide rather than being arrested, but left information stating there were things in his house that would be interesting. Detective Victor Ray and a team of police clothed in HAZMAT suits went to Ford's home and found buried assault weapons, vials of pathogens (tetanus and C. Difficile) and documents linking Ford to neo-Nazi groups. In addition, they learned Ford had been funded by Wouter Basson at one point.

I went to a site called FTR #324 and read a transcript of a radio show called For The Record, an independent radio broadcast in California. You should read it.

There are a number of leaders of African countries and a few journalists around the world who are convinced the outbreak of Ebola fever in Sierra Leone and Liberia are connected to some kind of sick underground neo-Nazi bioterrorism organization. They say the Ebola strain in West Africa now is the same strain that emerged in continued on Page 7

With all of the talk about Ebola, I decided I should find out more about it. I discovered it is closely related to HIV and a fever called Marburg. Marburg is a hemorrhagic fever which was named after an outbreak of the disease in Marburg, Germany at the CSL Behring plant. Employees of this bio pharmaceutical company were accidentally exposed to infected grivets. Out of 31 people infected, seven died.

Ebola is much more deadly. Until 1976, nobody had ever heard of it. An outbreak in a village along the Ebola River in Zaire left medical experts without any treatment solutions. Even traditional African healers and herbalists in the Ebola River area had never seen nor heard of this hemorrhagic fever.

What I found out next just blew my mind.

Bioweapons expert Jeanne Guillemin, who is a Senior Fellow at MIT, wrote a book called Biological Weapons: From the

Princeton's domination extended into the third period with Goal #5 at 18:11 scored by Thomas Cankovic. Kyle Bergh earned a point for helping.

North Okanagan managed to capitalize on a power play with Thomas Cankovic serving an Interference call. The Knights score their second goal of the night while Cankovic's penalty was just about finished.

Austin Garrington was credited with the marker with Dryden Profeit earning an assist.

The Knights fought back scoring again at 12:30 (Logan Geefs from

Ryan Pereverzoff) but could not mount a complete comeback.

By this point emotions were running high and at 11:47 North Okanagan's Mitchell Lukacs and Princeton's Craig Thompson went toe-to-toe. Both left the game with five-minute fighting penalties and Game Misconducts.

Final score: Princeton 5, North Okanagan 3. Shots on Goal: Princeton 27, North Okanagan 22. Penalties in Minutes: Princeton 7 for 25-minutes, North Okanagan 6 for 23-minutes. Princeton went 1 for 3 (33.3%) on the power play while North Okanagan earned a 25% stat going 1 for 4 in the same category.

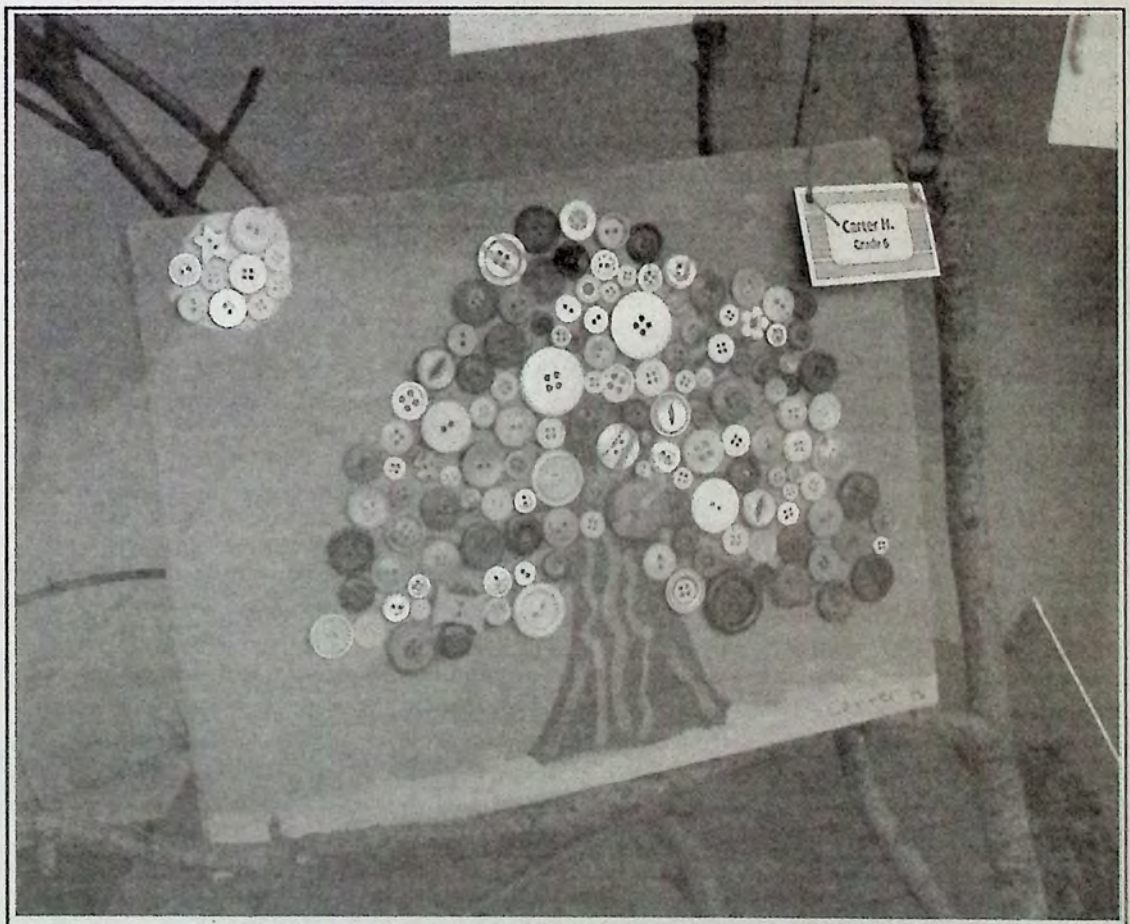

Think Turnip When You Catch A Cold

The lowly Swede turnip (rutabaga) was once considered a food fit only for European peasants and livestock. It was a staple food of farmers and of their cattle and pigs, largely due to it being one of the easier crops to grow in a cool, moist climate. Had the richer folks known the nutritional value of turnips, they may have stopped looking down their noses at it and started enjoying it themselves.

The yellow flesh of the Swede turnip is loaded with Vitamin A, the vitamin that protects the mucus membranes, such as those in the nose, mouth and throat (there are loads of such membranes in the body).

Vitamin A can be found in all red, orange and yellow vegetables and fruits. Turnips also contain Vitamin C, a known anti-virus agent.

Many people do not like the taste of a Swede turnip, but this may be due to the way it is cooked. Just boiling it and serving it 'as is' will not be appealing. Sprinkle cooked turnips with a little brown sugar and stir in some butter and you have a very tasty vegetable. Mash together cooked carrots and turnips with some butter, salt and pepper, and you may find this dish becomes a family favourite.

In the New York City area, turnips are prized as a way to stop the common cold. At the first sign of sniffles, old-fashioned mothers feed their families a special turnip soup. Here is the recipe: One box of chicken broth, 1 unpeeled Swede turnip, 3 unpeeled carrots, one red onion, 3 cloves of garlic. Chop vegetables fine, boil until soft, and serve. This should get rid of the cold with one serving, but if it does not work in 12 hours, give another serving.

Serve Swede turnips at least once a week to help reduce cholesterol and prevent constipation. To reduce the colour of a bruise, apply a poultice of grated raw turnip. Eating chunks of raw turnip once a week is believed to be a good old-fashioned way to clean teeth and massage gums.

How to Put on a Pirate Show in Princeton...in Ten Weeks

I am continuing to see great strides of progress being made in regard to the Crimson Tine Players' upcoming pirate Christmas production. The October 23rd rehearsal started with light stretching and vocal exercises conducted by Music Director Leanne Atkinson of which I participated in just to get a sense of what was going on.

The warm-ups were necessary as the evening's rehearsal was targeted at parts of the play that had dancing and singing in them.

Director Rhianfa Riel made the cast go over two different scenes repeatedly making suggestions

along the way to assist with the flow of movement and positioning of each actor in the scenes.

I asked why the back-to-back repeats and Riel told me it was so the cast could "get the blocking down."

For those who don't know what that means, it's a general term used to describe the small hand and body gestures, actions and placement of everyone in a scene. For example, for a part of a scene that involves saying good night to an actor playing the role of a child, Riel fine tuned where each participant in the scene stood, where they moved and

if they were leaving the scene, where and how to do that after interaction with the 'child' actor. In this case, kissing the actor goodnight, tucking them into their bed, sitting on the side of the bed for conversation and any other natural activity that would happen in any other family home.

All of this was worked out with timing meant to hit particular lines and statements. It's no wonder the three minute scene was repeated several times as there was a lot for everyone to remember in addition to lines.

In Riel's words, "Practice makes perfect," and clearly the little nuances were being picked up each time the scene was redone.

The bulk of the evening rehearsal was a big step for actors and first-time Choreographer Layne Robillard. Robillard had put together a series of dance moves for the 'pirates' to follow during their big song and dance routine. Everyone on stage paid attention to her every word and when a couple of the moves proved to be a bit more com-

plicated for some of the actors, a lot of collaboration took place and Robillard was able to improve changes that will make this part of the play look quite professional and polished.

Meanwhile, I became a target.

Riel left the Director's chair to "test some props" with Stage Manager Dianne Rainer, which piqued my interest. Without giving away the details of why a couple of props were being tested, I was the 'test dummy' used to verify that the prop indeed did as advertised. I was also part of a discussion that revolved around fake snow which reminded me of the conversation I had prior to this rehearsal with Brazilian Rotary Exchange Student Rui Ferreira da Silva who had told me he has never seen snow other than up in the hills as it doesn't snow in Brazil.

If you were to ask me what stands out most about the progress I have seen since following this production I would have to say I'm most impressed with the passion each and every member of the cast and

crew is showing for this event.

We are truly blessed to have so many people willing to be a part of such a small theatre group and volunteer their talents to entertain the rest of us. No one gets paid for anything related to this or any other production but still plays are produced and still there are some people in the community who continue to complain that there is nothing to see or do in Princeton.

I understand that live theatre may not be your thing. It isn't really something we rush out to see ourselves in our home, either but we have a great deal of respect for the driving force of volunteers in Princeton and support as many as we can through discounts on advertising in our business.

Back to the play. There still is no Santa Claus.

And, no, it won't be me although they keep trying to convince me I'd be perfect for the role. They have no clue that I am naturally not a jolly fellow. By the end of rehearsal it sounded like I may have succeeded in dodging that bullet.

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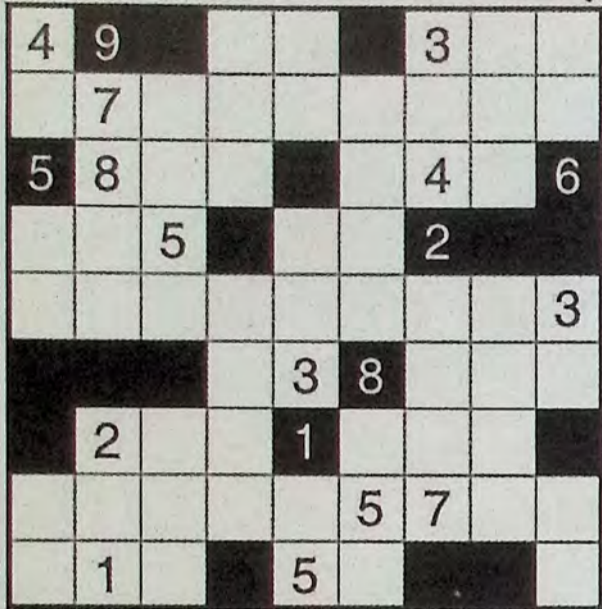

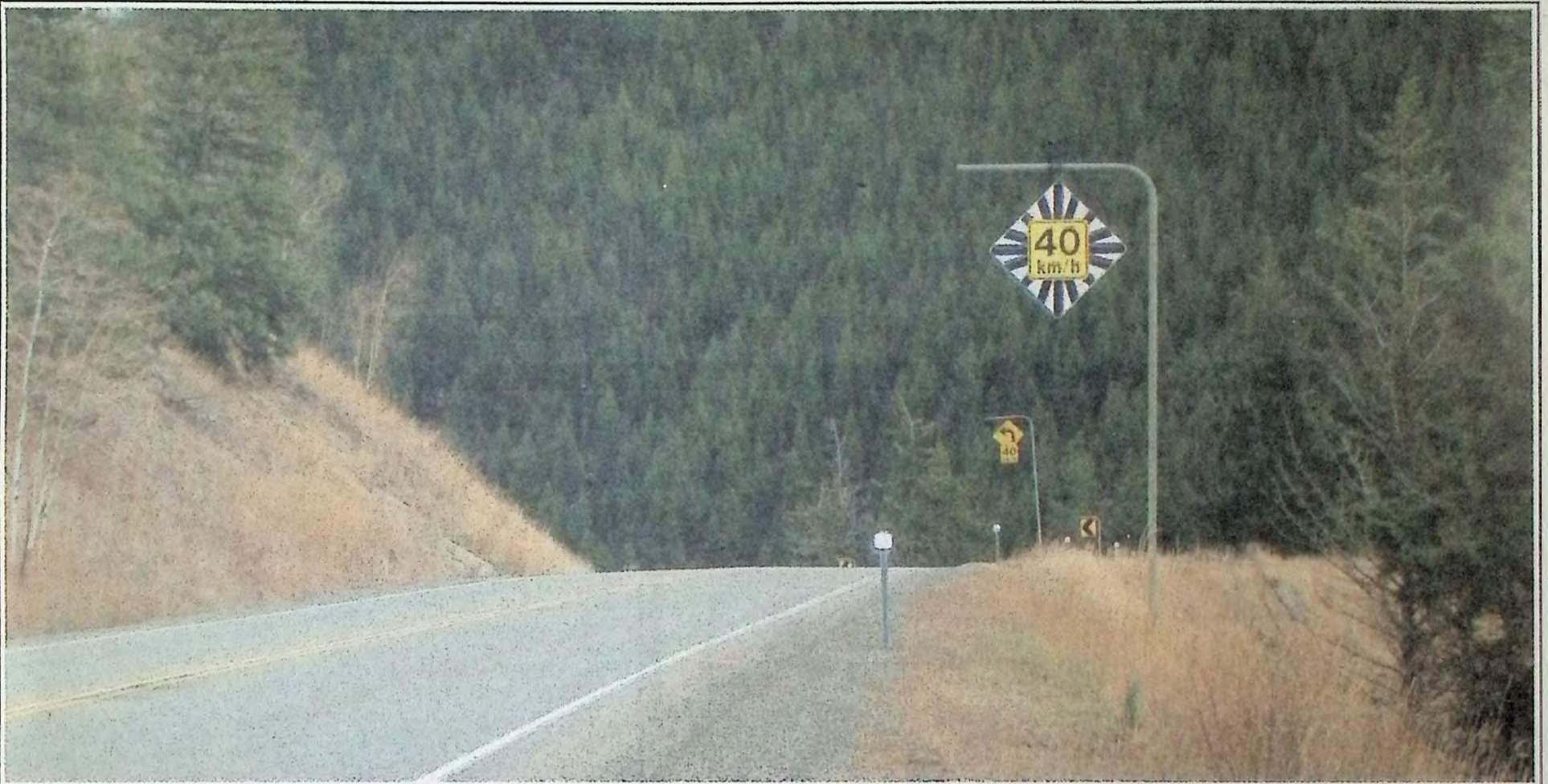

Highway 3 Improvements

ICBC Says Fatalities Dropped 50%

Fatalities on Highway 3 have been reduced by approximately 50 per cent from a decade ago, thanks to ICBC's road improvement program, in partnership with Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure and RCMP.

In the five-year period after ICBC's High Risk Corridor program for Highway 3 (Hope to Princeton) was established (2008-2012), eleven people were killed in crashes, compared to the previous five-year period (2003-2007) when

twenty people were killed in crashes, according to police data.

The High Risk Corridor program—part of ICBC's road improvement program—was established for Highway 3 between Hope and Princeton to address fatal crashes and consists of representatives from ICBC, Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure, RCMP, BC Coroner's Office and road maintenance contractors.

ICBC's Paul de Leur and Mike

Weightman received the 2014 Transportation Association of Canada (TAC) Road Safety Engineering Award for their work on reducing crashes on Highway 3 (the Hope-Princeton Highway), as well as their work on another high-risk corridor, Highway 1 (Fraser Canyon).

Key improvements on Highway 3

- *Engineering* – centerline and shoulder rumble strips, new passing lanes, improved passing lanes, LED

chevrons and speed warning signs, speed reader boards at high-risk locations and curve delineation.

- *Enforcement* – increased enforcement targeting speeding, additional resources for alcohol and drug checks, and focused enforcement on aggressive driving in high-crash locations. Enforcement signage also added.

- *Education* – all agencies communicated the hazards of the corridor to general public.

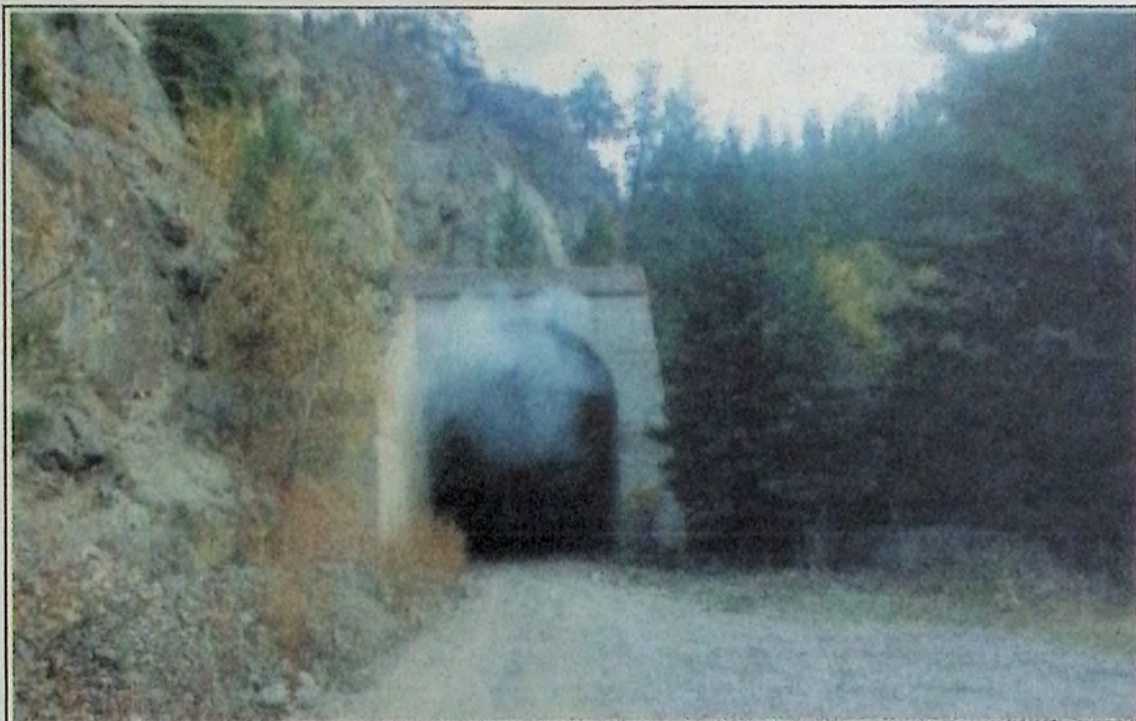

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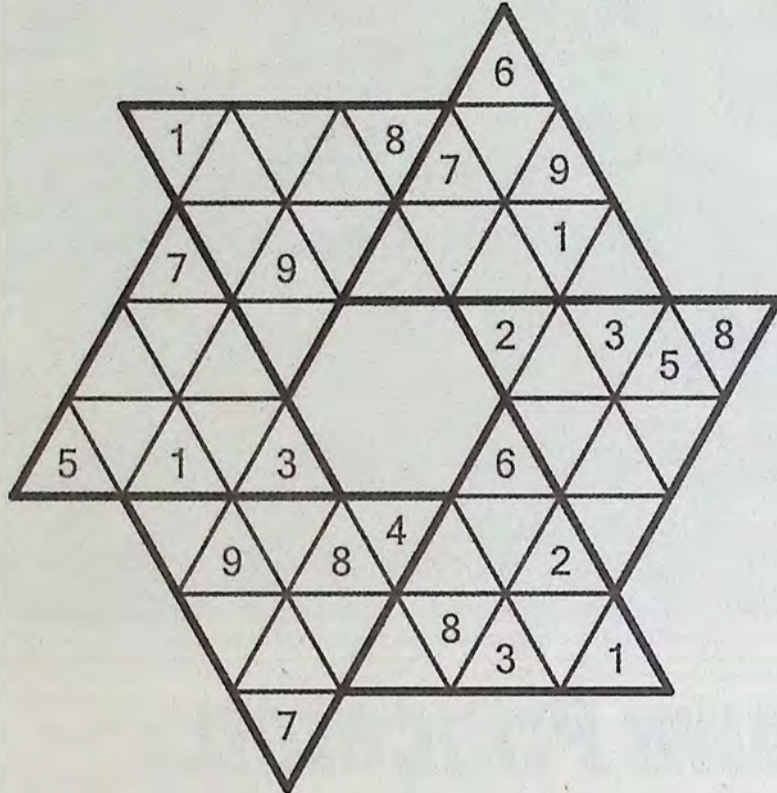

HOSHI SUDOKU - About The Puzzle

Sudoku - also known as "Number Place" - is a logic-based, combinatorial number-placement puzzle. The aim of Sudoku is to enter a number from 1 through 9 in each cell of a grid, most frequently a 9x9 grid made up of 3x3 subgrids. Each row, column and region must contain only one instance of each number. This Sudoku variant is called "Hoshi Sudoku". It contains six large triangles. The numbers 1 to 9 must be placed into the cells of each large triangle. Every line of any length - even uncontinuous - must contain every number not more than once.

Council teaches anatomy of a rollover

Weyerhaeuser with the support of the Logging Contractor Safety Committee is sponsoring a course called Anatomy of a Rollover through the B.C. Forest Safety Council.

If you drive for a company or organization as part of or all of your occupation, the law considers you to have a greater standard of care to drive safely and defensively. Criminal courts have established that professional drivers have a greater standard of care when oper-

ating vehicles. Bill C-45 has created corporate criminal liability.

Organizations have always had to deal with civil liability (fault) and the tort process in civil courts. Bill C-45 has established a specific section within criminal negligence that imposes criminal liability upon an organization. As a result, directors, managers, supervisors and other persons in authority within an organization can be charged criminally. An organization must take reasonable steps to prevent bodily harm to

employees and/or any other persons arising from work conducted by the organization.

Anatomy of a Rollover (AOR) is a dynamic presentation designed specifically for any driver who operates a heavy commercial vehicle, as well as for supervisors and fleet managers. The presentation focuses on the dynamics of a rollover and the five specific causes. Each contributing factor is discussed and drivers are given the tools/knowledge to prevent rollover

type incidents from happening to them.

Advantage Fleet Services Inc. (AFSI) has developed the AOR presentation to deal specifically with logging truck rollovers.

Rollover incidents are very costly and often involve serious injuries and/or death. These incidents also become very high profile in the media due to their seriousness andcontinued on Page 19

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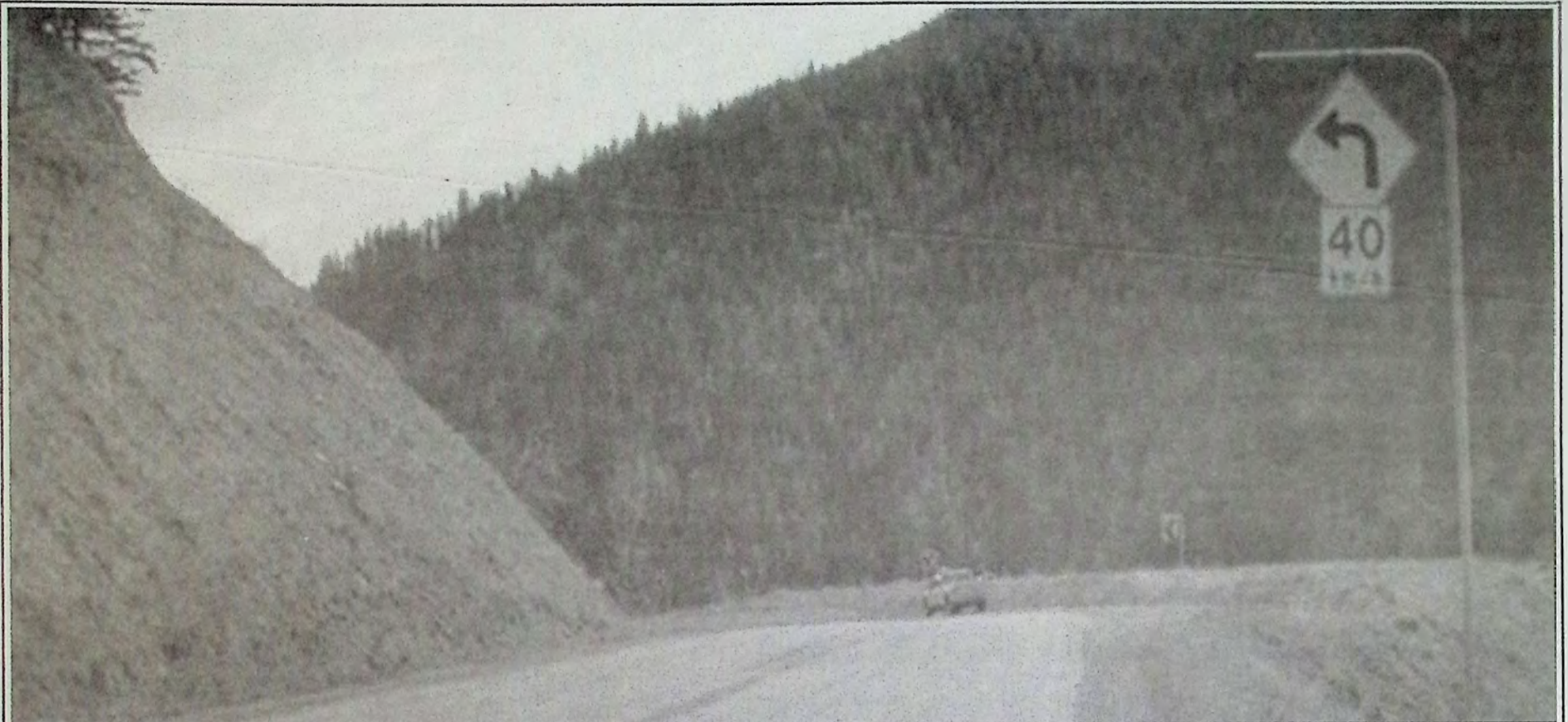

..... continued from Page 18 the disruption to traffic. Large commercial vehicles are not designed to be on their sides and offer limited protection to the driver when not on their wheels.

The saying "keep the rubber part down and the metal part up" came from the transportation industry and was specific to rollover-type incidents.

There are many different configurations of trucks that have been approved over the years and are still currently being used in the transportation of both long and short logs.

It has been shown through detailed

analysis that a log haul professional driver with 30 years' experience will never haul the same load (dynamically) twice. It is critical that the loader man and the driver work together to build the best load possible to improve overall stability during the transportation process.

Topics include:

- Dynamics of a rollover
- The five causes of rollover
- Specific case studies with supporting physical evidence
- Importance of load securement and the dynamics of various loads
- Tire and road surface considerations
- Incident examples

Town Council meetings will continue to flow without a lot of delays and by the time everyone is comfortable with the new faces on Town Council progress will have still taken place and the four year term will be just about over.

While I am stunned that more people did not seek election to Princeton Town Council, and those of you who complained so bitterly in my office, on the street

and online about the apparent ineptness of town council are the ones who dropped the ball - not our elected officials.

Like them or not, we are going to have to accept them and work with them.

How does this save downtown Princeton?

The best thing about not having an actual election campaign means none of us had to listen to election promises and try to sort out fact from fiction. The new

Clocks fall back this Sunday

Before going to bed on Saturday, November 1, remember to "fall back" by setting your clocks back one hour. (The exceptions to DST are Arizona, Hawaii, Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands, and American Samoa.)

Credit for Daylight Saving Time belongs to Benjamin Franklin, who first suggested the idea in 1784. The idea was revived in 1907, when William Willett, an Englishman, proposed a similar system in the pamphlet *The Waste of Daylight*.

The Germans were the first to officially adopt the light-extending system in 1915 as a fuel-saving measure during World War I. The British switched one year later, and the United States followed in 1918, when Congress passed the Standard

Time Act, which established our time zones. This experiment lasted only until 1920, when the law was repealed due to opposition from dairy farmers (cows don't pay attention to clocks).

During World War II, Daylight Saving Time was imposed once again (this time year-round) to save fuel. Since then, Daylight Saving Time has been used on and off, with different start and end dates. Currently, Daylight Saving Time begins at 2:00 A.M. on the second Sunday of March and ends at 2:00 A.M. on the first Sunday in November.

Clock 'spring ahead' again 2:00 AM on Sunday, March 8, 2015 and 'fall back' at 2:00 AM Sunday, November 1, 2015.

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Remember hearing the story about the kid who found a lump of coal in the bottom of his Christmas Stocking? Sure, for a long time you didn't believe it could be true but then one year you were quite certain you were going to be that kid. You did just about anything possible to avoid the dreaded lump of coal. You went to bed early. You did all your homework. You cleaned up your room. You took out the garbage. You washed your dishes. You even washed behind your ears at bath time. There was no way Santa's spies were going to be able to pin that 'Naughty' label on you and leave you with nothing but a lump of coal in your Christmas Stocking.

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
