ORL reduces local hours

As a follow up to the Okanagan Regional Library Board meeting on October 15th, the following information about staffing level plans for the Princeton Branch were released to the News Leader:

STAFFING LEVELS

For Princeton, as a result of a system-wide staffing level review, the following target for reduced staffing levels was set:

- Reduction of 9.5 hours of Assistant Community Librarian time
- Reduction of 3 hours of Community Librarian time

At present, it is anticipated that these changes will be achieved as a result of attrition, rather than layoffs.

IMPACT

For Princeton, the impact on branch service will be that staff will be very busy, and the hours of opening will be reduced. Because a retirement did happen in Princeton's branch, the

reduction of the 9.5 hours of ACL time has been planned for and will likely occur by the end of 2015. In preparation for this, the ORL will conduct an open hours survey and look at hourly circulation to determine the most important open hours in the community, and will advertise the pending changes in advance.

In addition to these branch changes, the ORL will also look to find centralized savings to help offset the imbalance.

One other important factor in the Princeton calculation is the non-participation of Area H.

The following branches remain at status quo: Hedley, Oyama, Armstrong.

This means that for these branches, no changes to staff levels or hours are required at this time, nor are there any expected additions to service.

Chamber hosts Area H all-candidates forum

Around fifty people attended the Area H All-Candidates Forum hosted October 29th in Princeton Legion Hall by the Princeton & District Chamber of Commerce.

The trio had gathered for another forum the previous night in

Coalmont (see article on Page 20) and was well prepared for the Princeton event.

In their opening statements each candidate provided a brief outline of their past and their connections to the area. Jamie Frandsen has been

coming to the Similkameen Valley annually since 1969 and became a full time resident at Allison Lake last year. He is the President of the Allison Lake Ratepayers Association.

Frandsen says issues concerning

him include the hospital and doctors as well as highway safety. He said he has an environmental background and while he supports industry, he is against fracking.

Bob Coyne was born in Princeton and has worked his entire life in the area first at the mine then for the Town of Princeton. He is semi-retired and the President of the China Ridge Cross-Country Ski Association.

"I do not have an agenda going into this," Coyne stated.

"I just want all the communities in Area H to have fair representation at the RDOS."

He is concerned about where Community Forest revenue is going and wants to see continued improvement to local health care.

Charles Weber was raised in Ontario and moved to the area in 2003 from the Fraser Valley. He has a 25-year history in Education and is currently a full-time farmer. Weber is the only candidate of the three who has run in a previous election for the

Area H Director's seat.

"That was a humbling lesson and a valuable lesson."

Weber says he wants to promote rural livability as a way to attract people to the area, as he wants to promote growth.

"We need to bring an excitement back to this town."

The question and answer period of the program went quickly as there weren't a flood of questions.

The first one asked what the candidates thought was the most important Area H health care issue.

Weber pointed to the need for health care professionals to service the community and stated, "I think retaining them is a very important

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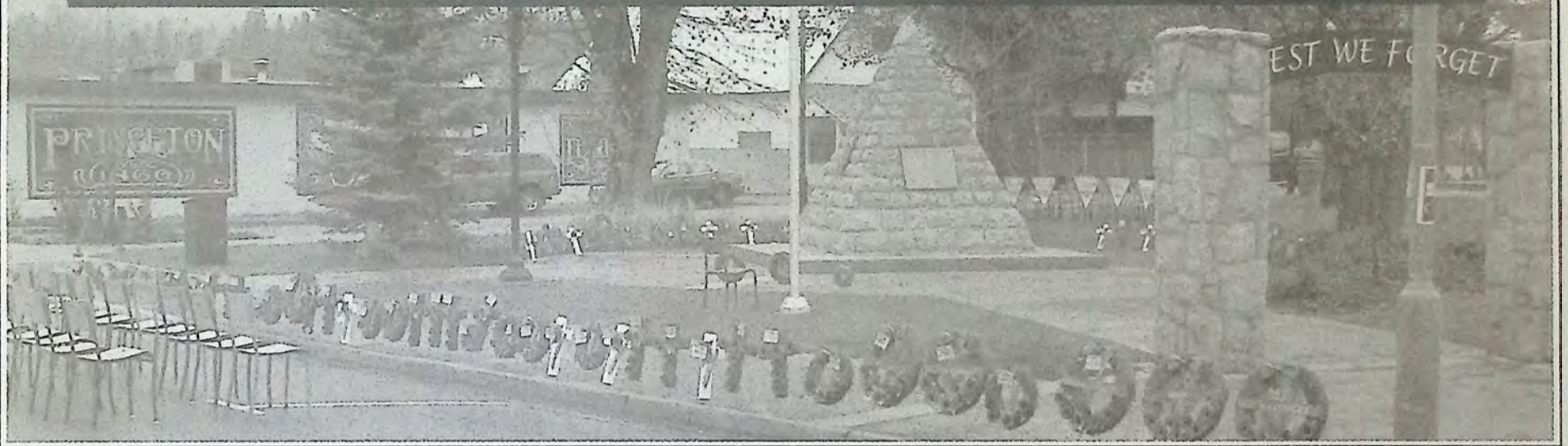

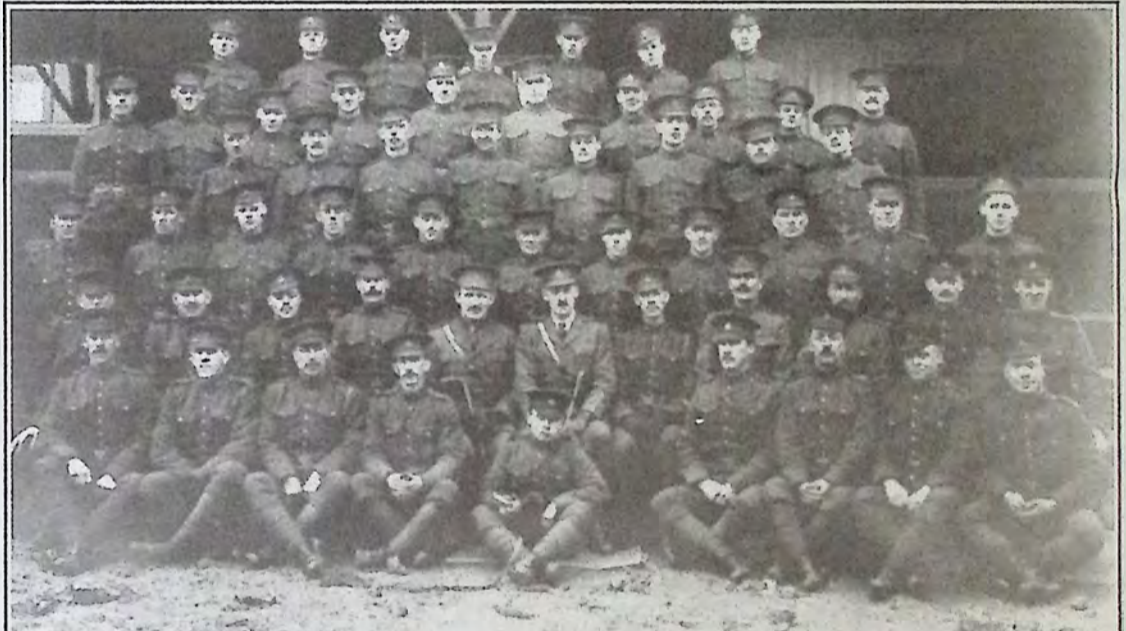
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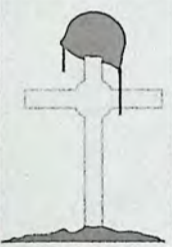

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In 1915 Canada was still clinging to the skirts of Mother England. During times of war, the young must fight and only one year previ-

ous, the British Empire had joined World War I bringing with it, fledgling Canada.

Life in remote Granite Creek in 1915 was not blind to the battles on far-off shores. Stories of war had reached the residents. Those who couldn't join the fight did what they could to help the cause. A meeting in Princeton organized by Lieutenant-Colonel William Norman Winsby roused the locals and it was decided that Princeton and the surrounding towns would begin a "Machine Gun Fund" for the 47th Battalion. Two weeks would be allowed for subscriptions to be collected.

Lieutenant-Colonel Winsby was the commander of the 47th which was mobilized in New Westminster with recruitments made in New Westminster, Victoria and Vancouver. The 47th Battalion which was -formed in February,continued on Page 19

I Still Remember

Remembrance Day, or as my dad always called it, Armistice Day, was a somber event in our household when I was growing up in Kelowna. Dad never spoke much about his military career nor did he share very much about the details of what he experienced during wartime.

There was always an air of mystery around those events in his past that he never unlocked. In fact, I had no idea how extensive his experience was until I found a copy of his war records. This was years after he had passed away so I was left then, and still have, a number of unanswered questions.

What I do have is a tremendous respect for the meaning of Remembrance Day. I am fully aware of how fortunate I am to be able to live the life I live so freely. I know that the only reason for that is the sacrifices made by the soldiers who fought years before, alongside and years after my father.

For many years we would gather around the television in our home and stand and watch the Remembrance Day service from Ottawa and from Vancouver. We stood in silence for two minutes along with everyone else. Dad always made sure we followed the protocol and observed the Two Minutes of Silence.

When we were older we would all travel as a family to the Kelowna Cenotaph and be part of the live ceremonies. It was barely two hours out of our lives each year but it left such a huge impact on me. I thank my father for showing me the true meaning of freedom and to not take it for granted.

In the over twenty-five years I've been in Princeton there have been few Remembrance Days ceremonies I have missed. I'm typically there representing the News Leader, doing newspaper-related chores on site but I always stand in silence for two minutes. I normally think of my dad. I think about how war split families, destroyed lives and changed the world. I also think about how lucky I am to write about it without worry but mostly think about my dad. Standing in Veterans Square in downtown Princeton sometimes brings back memories of standing in the livingroom in Kelowna forty years ago.

I have no idea what he thought we would get out of doing this annual ritual but I know I got a lot out of it. I also remember that back then November 11th was a day where most everything was closed up tight in Kelowna. Maybe the odd gas station and most certainly the Legion were open. For some it was a day off. For many it was a day to stop and reflect, to be thankful for what we have, even if we have little.

In a way, it's hard to believe so much can come from just two minutes once a year, but for me it did. Standing in the livingroom or at a Cenotaph, two minutes is not much to ask for.

I will never forget why we do it.

He went on to point out that if the community grows, it should be easier to attract and keep doctors although he feels there is a need to actively advocate for the community to change the way IHA spends their funds in the region.

He concluded with the statement, "Nobody should be waiting six to eight weeks for a doctor's appointment."

Bob Coyne was blunt in his response.

"We have to have a stable, sustainable hospital with doctors," and pointed to the need to recruit and retain all kinds of health care professional and support staff.

"Health care is never going to be

a simple issue," Coyne added.

"We need to get doctors and keep them. We need to get nurses and keep them."

Frandsen referred to the act of recruiting doctors as "a competition" with close to forty other communities doing the same thing as Princeton as they are faced with the same health care problems.

He feels that the addition of helipads in various key locations within Area H will be able to assist in some way and although he feels the local hospital needs upgrades, he is happy with the facility we have.

Regarding the Health Care Action Plan designed for the community, each candidate was asked which item in the document was the highest priority in their view.

Coyne pointed to recruitment and retention of new health care workers but added that the recently implemented program of rotating doctors and specialists to the area is "an awesome start."

Frandsen viewed mental health care issues, transportation and education for continued senior care as priorities.

Weber stated, "We need some impetus. There's a framework that needs a push" and added recruitment and retention to his priority list.

Cutbacks to Princeton's library was the next subject with a question suggesting that Area H could help with the situation with the addition of a Library Tax, which currently continued on Page 10

Remember The Torch They Threw

Each Remembrance Day, speeches are made and somebody says, "They fought for our freedom."

This statement is made casually, as if everybody knows just what freedoms our allied forces fought for, but I wonder how many people could describe what those freedoms are. Until you can put what you 'know' into words, you are not really conscious of what you know.

When Britain declared war on the Nazi regime that would sweep across Europe, Britain was the British Empire. It was an empire on which the sun never set, an empire of English-speaking peoples that included Canada, New Zealand, Australia, Burma, India, Caribbean islands, Hongkong and parts of Africa. Those members of the British Empire shared something fundamental to their way of life: British law.

Today we bemoan many of the wrongs inflicted by the British imperialists, but it is worth noting that we bemoan it because we value 'fair play', which is one of the fundamental values of British law. For nearly 1,000 years, English people had refined the ideal of 'fair play' into not only law, but a code of public and

private conduct that guaranteed people greater respect than other systems of government bestowed on their citizens. Even the United States adopted much of British common law despite having fought a battle for independence from British rule.

Citizens of the British Empire went to war in 1939 with armies made up primarily of volunteers. This is highly significant: hundreds of thousands of men and women willingly went to war, knowing they would be asked to sacrifice their lives if need be. Unlike today's armies which are often well paid, and often mercenaries, the volunteers of World War II were ordinary citizens who believed in the rightness of what they were doing. They were not fighting to clear the path for some corporation, nor were they being aggressors to claim new territory. They went to war not for religion, but to protect freedom as they knew it.

Those freedoms for which they fought are freedoms we take for granted, and often we cannot rapidly express them when asked, but we should be able to say them without thinking. We have the freedom to say what we think, even of our government. We have the freedom to belong to any religion we choose, or none at all. We have the freedom to enjoy the privacy of our homes without fear of unprovoked search and seizure. We have the right to form groups and gather together for common causes without fear of reprisals. We have the right to vote for who should make our laws.

There are those who take a very juvenile view of the word 'freedom' and think it means they can do what they please, when they please and how they please, but that is not the freedom of British law. The freedom of British law is for everyone

and it is based on respect for everyone. Every citizen is expected to keep the peace and be of good behaviour. British law requires responsible behaviour from all citizens, regardless of wealth, status or religious belief.

The code of conduct that accompanied British law were identified in a book titled *The Road to Serfdom* (Hayek) who noted the qualities of people of the British Empire: self-reliance, independence, individual initiative, local responsibility, respect for one's neighbour, respect for custom and tradition, and a 'healthy suspicion of power and authority.'

Each Remembrance Day, we hear the ritualized words of the poem *In Flanders Fields*. It speaks of the 'torch' thrown by the dead soldiers to the living, and asks that the living not break faith with those who have sacrificed their lives. We go to the Cenotaph and see the words "Lest We Forget", and we go through the ritualized ceremony of remembrance. The problem with ritual is it becomes so familiar we no longer remember what the words mean, what the ceremony means. Do we remember the torch we were thrown? Do we remember it is the torch of freedom, the law that has kept us strong, and protected individual rights? Do we remember there is to be nobody above the law? Do we remember we have a responsibility to be citizens of good behaviour? Do we remember we are to respect others and be respected in return, and be the watchdogs over those who have power and authority?

Freedom such as ours never comes cheap. We have to remember why those soldiers fought, and keep faith with them. We have to carry that torch, and hold it high.

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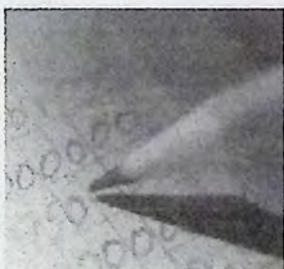


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Rock slide repairs are coming!

The rock slide January 27th that closed Highway 3 for days 9-kilometres West of Keremeos left that part of the road reduced to two-lane traffic since it re-opened.

On October 30th Henry Boschman, Project Manager for C.A.P. Ventures Ltd announced that repairs to the area will begin

this week.

"Our firm has been contracted to clean-up and do remediation work at the Highway 3 rock slide area," Boschman stated last week.

"The work will begin effect November 3rd and will last approximately four weeks."

Boschman says that while construction is under way, there should be no change to the traffic flow as it currently exists (one lane of traffic flowing each way). However, infrequent minor delays may be necessary to facilitate equipment and truck movements.

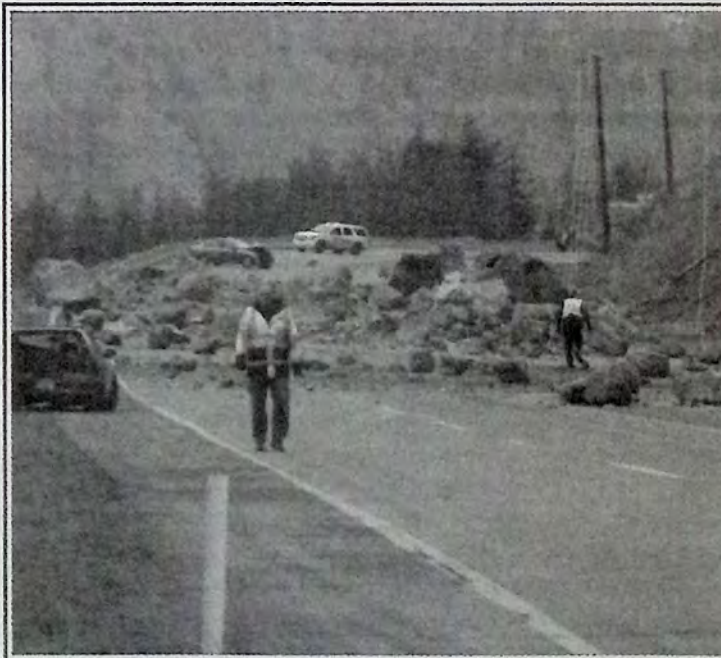

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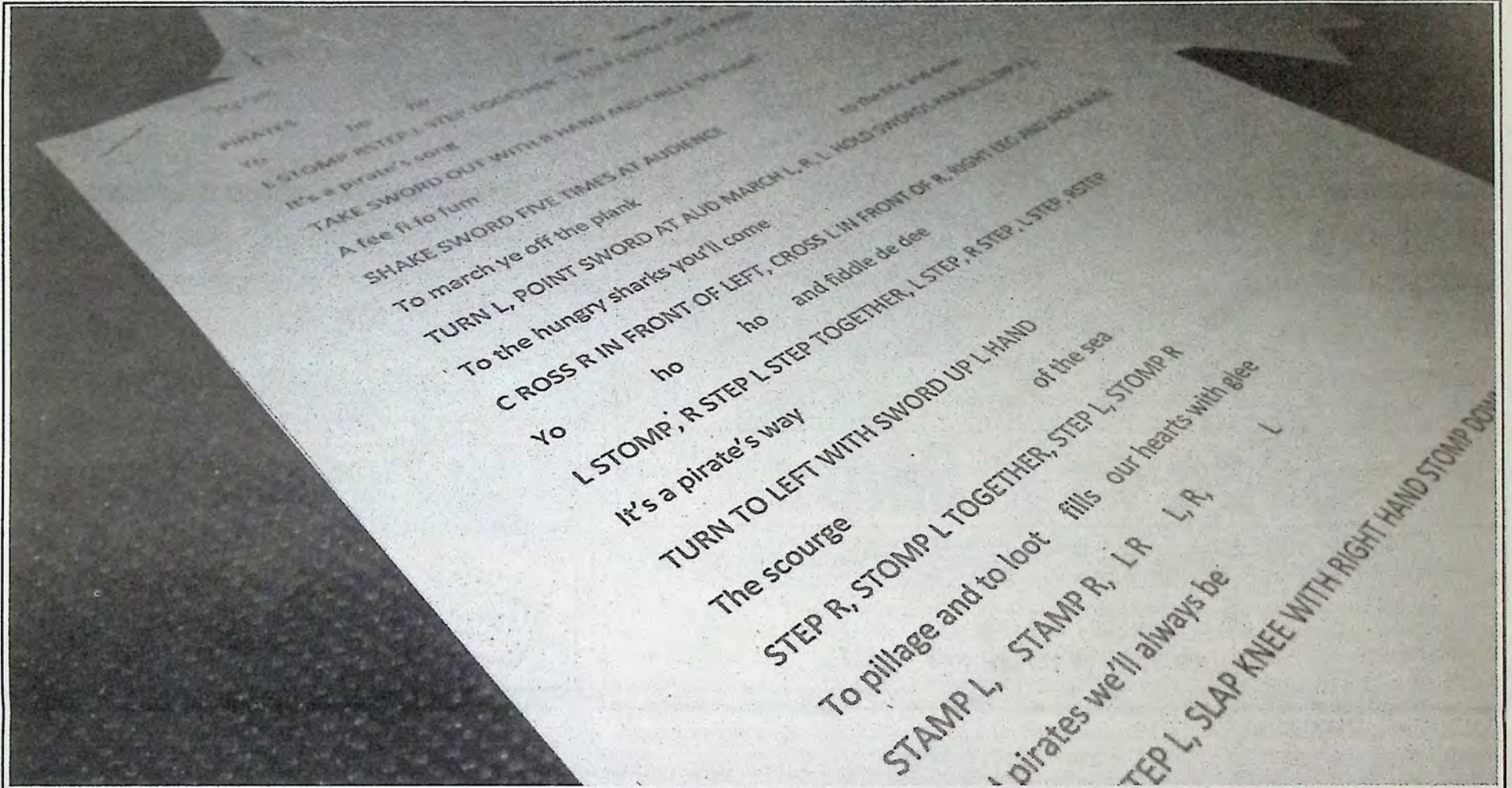

According to my schedule there are only eight more rehearsals left before Crimson Tine Players present their

"Yo Ho Ho! A Pirate Christmas!" play with three of those being strictly music rehearsals.

Something must be happening as there are two songs that keep popping into my head these days and one of them is from this play.

The October 30th rehearsal at Riverside Theatre focused on getting down the dance moves that are a big part of one scene in the play. It was obvious to me that each member of the cast had been putting in some extra effort in their own time as they knew most of their lines, sang through the songs and made the dance moves. By no way were they polished, but they were certainly all coming together quite well.

A member of the cast (who I'll not identify, just because) casually mentioned to me that "...they had me at pirate" but admitted there was a lot more singing and dancing than expected.

Choreographer Layne Robillard provided each cast member with a com-

plete, written out step-by-step break down of the dance moves along with where in the script the moves were to take place in the major scene. She put a lot of effort into it and made it clear to the cast when they were going through them that "if you feel there should be any changes it won't hurt my feelings" as she wanted to make the actors comfortable and during the run through of the dance moves everyone participated in making suggestions with Robillard making minor adjustments to the moves to accommodate the requests.

At one point Director Rhianfa Riel turned to me and said, "I just love this point."

I asked her to explain.

Riel pointed out that instead of standing around and waiting their turn, or just killing time, members of the cast are now all working together to assist others with everything

from lines to making suggestions that may be helpful in some other way.

"Which means they have taken ownership and they want this to work."

She was right as even I was tossing in the odd suggestion.

The problem with the missing Santa Claus has also been remedied. Dayton Wales has been convinced to come down from the Sound Booth this time around to take on the role of the Jolly One. Danika Whelpton who typically assists with prompting on the plays will fill his place upstairs.

With a full cast and few group rehearsals left, it's now up to the individual cast members to continue to work at home on their lines and music.

Riel's next big hurdle is related to sound. There has been a lot of talk about whether or not to use microphones to assist with sound projection into the audience with the volume required to be heard over the music.

The solution has yet to be found.

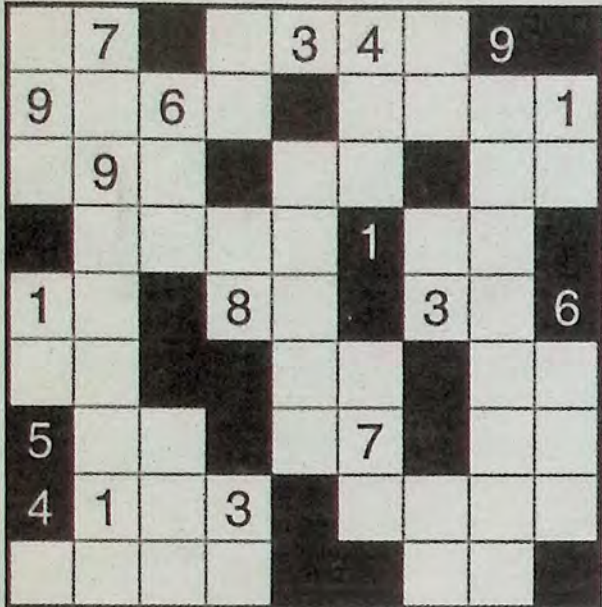

Frandsen was in favour of Area H chipping in to the ORL cash flow.

"We use it, it's only fair that we support it."

Weber agreed and stated, "I think it's time to have a look at that."

Coyne also agreed and said fringe residents would likely agree but did not see residents in the further parts of Area H being interested. He did suggest that Community Forest funds could possibly pick up any shortfall.

On the issue of an aquatic centre Coyne admitted, "People are still very emotional about the last referendum" and stated that if a new plan were drawn up it would still need to go to referendum.

Frandsen supports a pool and feels

it would attract doctors and families to the area.

"We need a facility that is family-friendly and top notch but not over the top."

Weber responded with, "The pool is a monster," but added that an affordable concept would be easier to support.

"The last pool referendum was poorly conceived."

As for fracking, all three candidates were clearly against it.

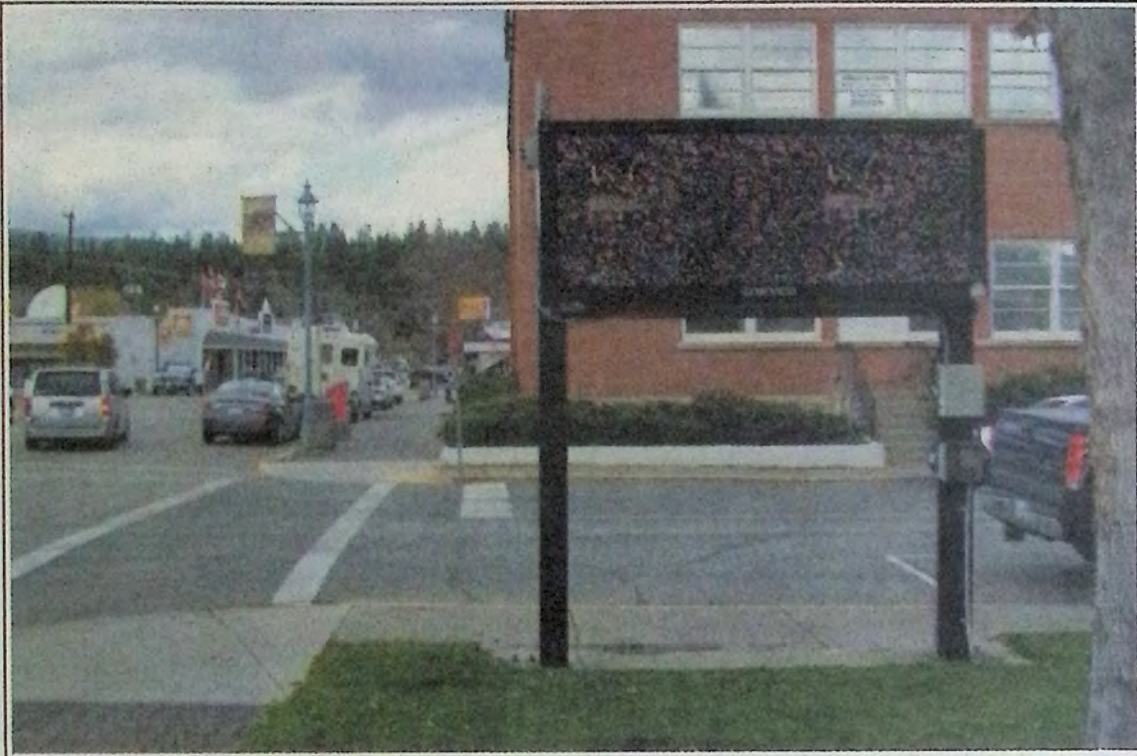

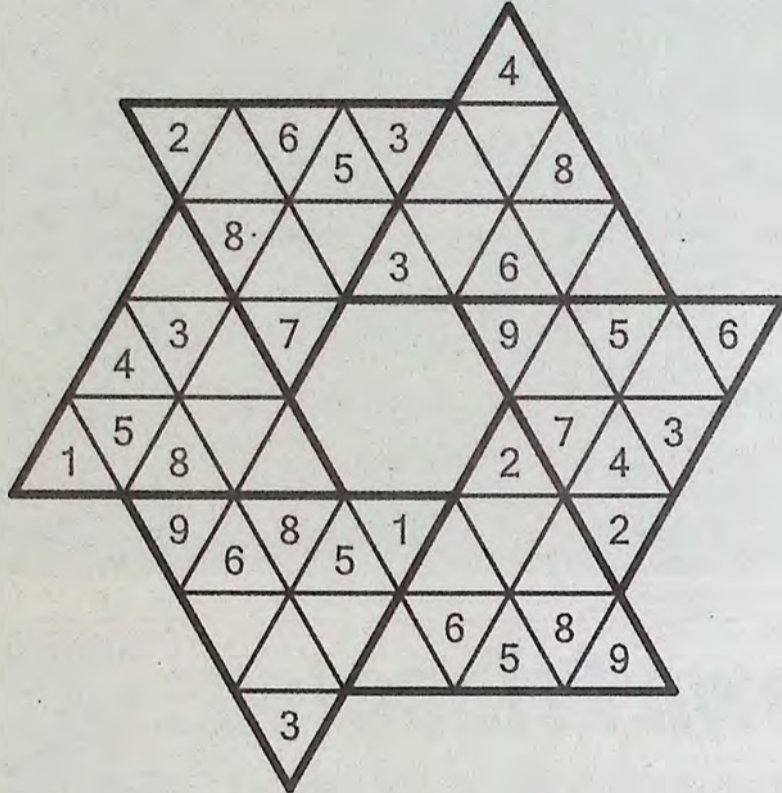

Sudoku - also known as "Number Place" - is a logic-based, combinatorial number-placement puzzle. The aim of Sudoku is to enter a number from 1 through 9 in each cell of a grid, most frequently a 9x9 grid made up of 3x3 subgrids. Each row, column and region must contain only one instance of each number. This Sudoku variant is called "Hoshi Sudoku". It contains six large triangles. The numbers 1 to 9 must be placed into the cells of each large triangle. Every line of any length - even uncontinuous - must contain every number not more than once.

This week I'm going to do something different here.

As Remembrance Day is approaching I want to look at some of the freedoms we have that are ours thanks entirely to the sacrifices of the many soldiers who gave their lives in the fight for freedom.

As a small town businessman I sometimes forget how lucky we are to live in Canada. There are some countries I would not be able to own a downtown business as I

wouldn't have the right 'connections' and I wouldn't be allowed to come and go as I please from the downtown core without having to pass checkpoints where my ID would be examined and processed. I may be fine one day, but because of something I may not have done, but got accused of doing, I may not be allowed back into my business.

In some countries I would be subject to constant scrutiny and may one day have my business seized and find myself tossed out on the

street because the dictatorship in place felt like it.

There are some countries in the world that even if I had the freedom to work in the media business, each and every word I publish would be carefully looked over and chances are most of each issue of the paper would be censored to the point that it would not contain anything of substance related to the local, regional or federal government. I would very likely not be allowed to attend meetings of any of these levels of government, as they would not have 'open' meetings.

Add to that the point that all my e-mails, text messages and phone calls would be monitored with many blocked to prevent any real news from being released to the public.

I am free of all of those restrictions and I am forever grateful for the fact that none of that would be possible without the efforts of the

many soldiers who fought in the big wars and continue to fight to protect our freedom.

As for what this means to the rest of us, take a look at Princeton.

We have the freedom to come and go as we please, shop in or out of town, gather in public places, host various activities in and around the community, own our own property, buy things we want to buy and earn income in places we choose to work.

These are all freedoms we have been given thanks to our veterans, believe it or not.

It continues to amaze me the number of people who seem to have a real disconnect from what you gain when your country goes to war. I think it may have to do with the fact that there are fewer and fewer veterans left from the two great wars who represent those freedoms. I don't talk about it often, but my father was in both World Wars. He never talked about

the experience but hinted that it was the right thing to do.

Considering where we are in the world today, as far as our basic freedoms and rights, including the right to vote for whomever we want to run our town, province and country, I think he was right.

How does this save downtown Princeton?

Imagine shopping in a situation with such restrictions you have to wait in line for a loaf of bread and may not get the one rationed to your house this month. Forget about a downtown core with various specialty shops, as they would not be allowed to open for business. Imagine gas costing two or three times what it does now and only enough for the very rich in the community.

Like Princeton or not, choose to support it or not. You have the freedom to do that only because of what Remembrance Day is all about.

One scientific body that reviews climate change literature is the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC). The IPCC is composed of over 2,000 atmospheric scientists from every major country. IPCC members are volunteers appointed by the United Nations to review scientific literature regarding global climatic change. As scientists, they are by nature, very conservative in their conclusions.

By 1995, the IPCC concluded there was strong scientific evidence that human activities were affecting global climate, a position affirmed more strongly in subsequent IPCC reports. In 2001, the panel stated unequivocally that human activities are having detectable effects on Earth's climate, on the atmosphere and the Earth's water. It said that most of the observed warming of the last 50 years is likely to have been due to the increase in greenhouse-gas concentrations. The 5th IPCC report, released earlier this year, was even more forceful in concluding that human activities and specifically the emission of greenhouse gases, in particular carbon dioxide, are causing a rise in atmospheric temperature, a rise in ocean temperature, and a rise in ocean activity.

In 2001, the US National Academy of Sciences confirmed, "greenhouse gases are accumulating in Earth's

atmosphere as a result of human activities, causing surface air temperatures and subsurface ocean temperatures to rise... The IPCC's conclusion that most of the observed warming of the last 50 years is likely to have been due to this increase in greenhouse-gas concentrations accurately reflects the current thinking of the scientific community on this issue."

There was another climate change skeptic, Naomi Oreskes, a University of California scientist. She examined a major database maintained by the Institute for Scientific Information which indexes scientific articles published globally in more than 8,500 scientific journals. She found that between 1993 and 2003 there were 928 articles on global climatic change published by scientists with academic credentials in atmospheric physics, climatology, meteorology or related disciplines. None of the articles disagreed with the existence of global climate change, nor its cause being an increase in atmospheric greenhouse gases, including carbon dioxide, primarily from the combustion

of fossil fuels. In scientific circles, there is no debate on the reality of global climate change. Needless to say, she is no longer a skeptic.

The economist, Sir Nicholas Stern, was commissioned by the British Prime Minister to review the scientific literature on global climatic change and consider its economic consequences. His findings were published in 2006. He too supported the IPCC and every other scientific body that studies atmospheric physics, climatology and meteorology. Stern warned of the consequences to human health, the risk to human life, property and the environment, if we do not act to minimize the effects of global climatic change.

In light of the urgency, it is extremely disappointing to see that Prime Minister Harper chose not to attend the Summit on Climate Change that took place in September in New York.

It would seem to me that Canada should be engaged at every possible level to combat the effects of climate change. The fact that our Prime Minister was not among the 125

world leaders present at the Summit sends a message that Canada is not really interested in this issue.

Of course, this begs the question, could it be that the Prime Minister really is a Climate Change skeptic?

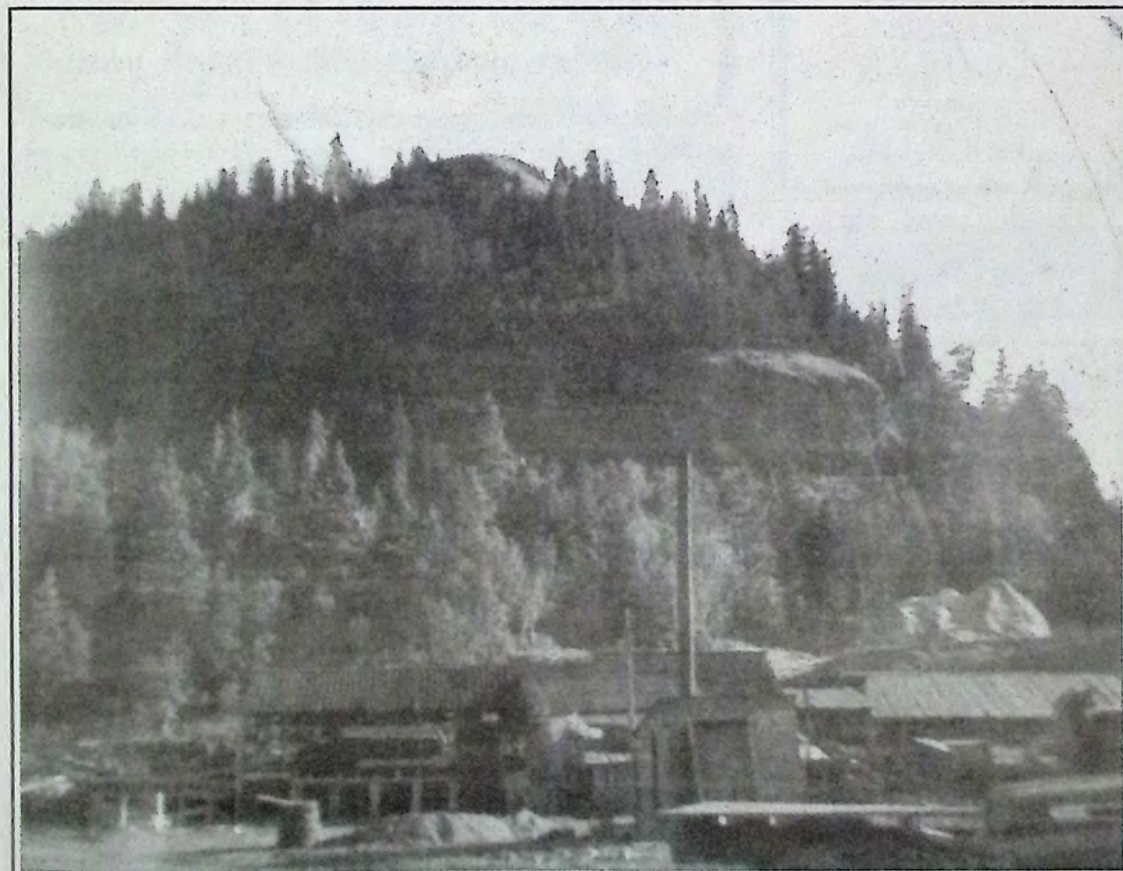

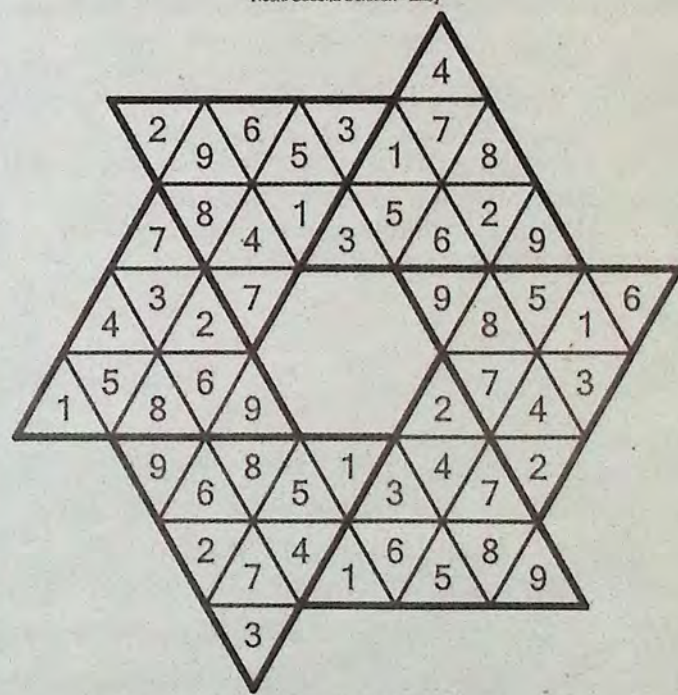

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1915 served in France and Flanders. The Battalion was disbanded in 1920.

Foxcrowle Percival Cook was in charge of collecting money in Granite Creek and Louis Napoleon Marcotte canvassed nearby Coalmont. Men, women, teens, shopkeepers, Chinese, and prospectors gave what they could. Donations ranged from 50¢ to a whopping \$30 (about \$697 today) by F.P. Cook. Even Madam Hattie McBride donated \$5 (about \$116 today). An Ice Cream Social held at the Granite Creek Hotel raised \$12.30 and a "lucky dollar" was thrown into the pot. In all, \$116.30 was raised by the locals in Granite Creek and Coalmont. To put this amount in perspective, in 2014 dollars that would be approximately \$2,704.00!

During WW1, 620,000 Canadian troops were mobilized. 58,990

were killed and missing (9.5%). 149,710 were injured (24.1%). 2,820 were taken as prisoners of war (.5%). May we never forget the sacrifices these brave men and women made for our country.

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Area H candidates attend forum in Coalmont

The "Meet The Candidates" evening at the Coalmont Hotel was well attended. In fact it looked like a full house. People came from Missezula, Erris, Eastgate, and other communities.

The evening started out with a welcome from Chris Berringer who managed the whole event with skill and sensitivity. The three candidates each gave a short description of their platform and point of view. The incumbent Area 'H' director, Brad Hope, was also on hand to answer questions.

Charles Weber described the life he and his wife live on their farm. "We have been rural people all our lives." He touched on his more basic philosophy when he said "Destiny is not a matter of chance, but a matter of choice." Then he went on to list a lot of the things to do in this area, including many in Princeton. He thinks that we need to increase the tax base, but when he says "we're open to positive ideas for sustainable growth" it is not clear how he distinguishes between Princeton and Area 'H', which he hopes to represent. Centralization comes to mind when he says "we're a hub, not a backwater".

Bob Coyne presented next. He recognizes the importance of our diversity in Area 'H'. "I count about 8 communities" and "I'm impressed with what Brad has done here in the

last years". "We're all together in Area 'H' and we need a strong voice. He also spoke about the Forest Corporation and "what are we going to do? . . . I need answers from you". Regarding doctors and the hospital: "We have to work with the big employers to get health care here". "That's one of the things we need to work together on."

Jamie Frandsen spoke next. Many years of him and his family visiting the Area makes him well connected here. He considers safety on the highways important and a pressing reason to improve the hospital. About himself he said: "I've got business sense" and mentions his history with the printing business. "I've got environmental sense" and mentions that his company was a pioneer in the use of environmentally friendly ink. He mostly considers what Weber said to be his platform too.

The meeting continued with more statements from candidates and some questions from the floor.

Two people asked about Charles Weber's slogan "Time To Grow" but again his answers did not clarify whether he meant Princeton or the communities, or what kind of growth he is referring to. He did say that he thinks "we need more revenue" and we can achieve that by getting more people to move into the area which will lead to more industry.

Jamie Frandsen said that there is revenue from Weyerhaeuser coming

in, but Bob Coyne corrected him, saying that this is the Forest Corp money we've been talking about.

Regarding the Forest Corporation (community forest) money, someone asked how it is to be divided up. Brad Hope said "we've looked at the tax base to determine percentages". Weber said "I guess it comes down to each director's personal vision."

Coalmont resident Bob Sterne asked about the supposed \$350,000 that Princeton expects (according to Princeton mayor Frank Armitage in a recent newspaper article) from the merging of Copper Mountain as a satellite to their town and how the candidates viewed that, or planned to get that money back to area 'H'.

Bob Coyne said "what was in the paper may, or may not, be happening. There's 160 properties involved, but where the town (Princeton) got the numbers from is not known."

Weber said "I think that's still a work in progress". Regarding the general idea of a municipality annexing a community as a satellite, and specifically Princeton getting Copper Mountain, Brad Hope commented, "I doubt it's going to happen here"

The situation at Kennedy Lake was mentioned. Charles said he had been up to Kennedy Lake for a visit but was not clear on where to go with that yet. Frandsen said "I just heard about this; I can't comment."

The subject then moved to the seemingly ever present Princeton pool discussion.

Frandsen said "they're going ahead" and when asked if we (Area 'H') would get to vote, said "I hope so". Bob Coyne was more specific and said "there would have to be a referendum".

A question from the floor for Charles Weber: "What is your position on a pool in Princeton and if your view is different than your constituents wishes, are you willing to follow their lead?" Weber replied simply, "Of course".

But the pool questions continued: "The reason I'm asking is that three years ago, over 900 taxpayers signed a petition asking for a separate vote in the referendum. However, you spoke at the public RDOS meeting and tried to convince the board to force area 'H' to a combined vote with Princeton. My question is, would you again go against the wishes of the majority of area 'H' residents about any issues arising." Weber's reply was, "That was a different situation".

Weber went on to say that "it split the community" and put a lot of pressure on him. Who put that pressure on you, someone asked. He replied, "Some people would say I did, some people would say Brad did." He was also asked "Are you for the regional district or are you for Princeton?". His response was "I'm for the regional district".

Regarding the last pool vote, someone from Eastgate asked why we couldn't have one vote per property instead of one per person. There was no clear answer, though there was a general deferral to the BC elections laws. Bob Coyne asked the person if he thought that his neighbour who had 60 properties, should get 60 votes.

The discussion then moved on with another question from the floor. "What are the priority questions about health care". Jamie Frandsen said "doctors, doctors, doctors - and we could use a heli-pad", and added "the golf course is all set up."

Bob Coyne was more specific: "we need a stable hospital with enough staff to operate in a sustainable manner" suggesting too that doctor retention is a priority.

Weber added some more: "doctors

should be at the table" and "this is part of what growth is all about". He also thought that "we need to insist that paramedics are upgraded" and "we need a walk-in clinic".

Getting back to the talk of communities, Weber said "A big part of what Brad has done in the last years is build these communities". But, someone asked, "all the communities have different priorities, how do you differentiate?". Weber's response was, "I would like to see the APC (Advisory Planning Commission) have an expanded role" but added "I think you need representation from the different communities".

At this point a break was called. People chatted and enjoyed the warm and colourful atmosphere at The Coalmont. The conversation with the candidates then resumed with some miscellaneous questions.

A woman mentioned the Missezula lake road and their special situation with something like 80% part time residents. When it comes to election issues, "it's hard to get them going". Also "nothing gets done with the road". It's such an issue that people who haven't been there in years still ask "what's the road like now?". Bob Coyne was able to add some clarity to that issue and said that "The government doesn't own that road. It is on private land and they only maintain the running surface". The main questions having been discussed, and the audience seemingly satisfied that they got what they came for, Berringer asked the candidates for closing remarks.

Jamie Frandsen: "Thanks very much for coming".

Bob Coyne: "Awesome experience" and "it doesn't matter who you elect, but please get out and vote".

Charles Weber: "Thank you for coming. This is a pretty unique forum ... sitting in a 100 year old pub."

It was indeed a special night and perhaps one of the most friendly and social political discussions that one is likely to see. Having people from the different Area 'H' communities come to Coalmont made this a particularly special event for us here.
