Coyne cashes in with victory

Before the night was over November 15th it became obvious that there were going to be some changes in the political landscape throughout the Similkameen Valley.

Probably the most anticipated of the races left to be decided by vote was in the Regional District.

Area H (Princeton Rural) elected Bob Coyne to represent them with a strong 354-vote count. Charles Weber ended the night with 193 with Jamie Frandsen collecting 37 votes for his effort.

In Area G (Keremeos Rural/Hedley) a much closer race

saw former Director Elef Christensen returned to the seat with 234 votes. He had edged past incumbent Angelique Wood who finished the night 32 votes behind at 202.

In the Village Council race in Keremeos Manfred Bauer will continue as Mayor with a 304-212 victory over Martin Menzies. Elected to Council are Jason Wiebe (347), Jeremy Evans (300), Sherry Philpott-Adhikary (296) and Arlene Arlow (240). The remaining results saw Gary Johnson finish with 207 votes, Bob Thurston had 197 and Ted Douglas earned 132.

CMMC releases 2014 Q4 highlights

Copper Mountain Mining Corporation (TSX: CUM) (the "Company" or "Copper Mountain") announced November 12th sales of 25.3 million pounds of copper, 7,800 ounces of gold and 133,800 ounces of silver to generate revenues of \$82.5 million net of pricing adjustments and treatment charges, an increase of 51% over the third quarter of 2013. Third quarter sales of 25.3 million pounds of copper include the recovery from the ship loading error which occurred during the quarter. **Third Quarter 2014 Highlights (100% Basis):**

- The Company achieved record production for the 2014 third quarter at Copper Mountain Mine with 21.7 million pounds of copper, 6,100 ounces of gold and 124,100 ounces of silver being produced. This represents a 22% increase in copper production above the same period last year.
- Revenues for the quarter were \$82.5 million net of pricing adjustments, an increase of 51% over the third quarter of 2013.
- Cash flow from operating activities was \$17.8 million for the 2014 third quarter.
- EBITDA[1] was \$12.3 million for

- the three months ended September 30th, 2014.
- Gross profit totaled \$18.8 for the three months ended September 30th, 2014.
- Site cash costs for the 2014 third quarter were US\$1.19 per pound of copper produced net of precious metal credits, a reduction of 29% as compared to the 2013 third quarter.
- Total cash costs for the period were US\$1.73 per pound of copper sold net of precious metal credits and after all off-site charges, a reduction of 22% as compared to the 2013 third quarter.
- Realized prices on metal sales were \$3.17 per pound of copper, \$1,283 per ounce of gold and \$19.73 per ounce of silver.
- Secondary crusher installation was completed on budget and on schedule and processed its first ore on August 4th, 2014. The 2014 third quarter reflects two months of commissioning. The main site priority is to continue tuning the secondary crusher circuit to produce a consistent

fine mill feed to support higher mill tonnage rates.

Jim O'Rourke, President and CEO of Copper Mountain, remarked, "This quarter marks our 8th consecutive quarter of improved copper production. Year to date copper production remains on track to meet guidance levels of 80-90 million pound of copper for the 2014 fiscal year. Commissioning of the new secondary crusher has gone well and it is operating at rates that allow the mill to reach its design capacity of 35,000 tpd. Additional fine tuning of the crusher and SAG mill is the top mine site priority to reach higher tonnage levels. Post quarter end, we have started to see the mill operate in the 35,000 to 40,000 tpd range."

O'Rourke continued, "Focus at the mine site continues on identifying and capturing cost savings while supporting continued production

increases. During this quarter, site cash costs were reduced because of discontinuation of the temporary measures of contract crushing and portable crushing. In addition, record production of 21.7 million pounds of copper and a favourable average head grade of 0.42% Cu helped to decrease the unit operating costs significantly during the quarter."

Copper Mountain Mine

During the third quarter, the mine shipped a total 45,800 DMT of copper concentrate containing approximately 25.3 million pounds of copper to Japan for smelting and recorded revenues, net of smelter charges and pricing adjustments, of

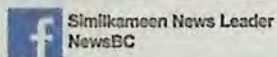
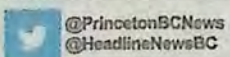

CMMC releases 2014 Q4 highlights

.....continued from Front Page \$82.5 million, realizing a gross profit of \$18.8 million. The total cash cost of copper sold for the three months ended September 30, 2014 was US\$1.73 per pound after gold and silver by-product credits.

During the third quarter, the mine achieved record copper production. Total production for the three months ended September 30, 2014

was 21.7 million pounds of copper, 6,100 ounces of gold and 124,100 ounces of silver. This represents a 23% growth in copper production from the same period last year.

SAG Mill throughput improved during the quarter with a total of 2.8 million tonnes of ore being milled at an average grade of 0.42% copper, as compared to 2.7 million tonnes of ore being milled at an average grade

of 0.34% copper in the third quarter of 2013. The mill achieved a 90.5% operating time during the quarter and copper production was in line with guidance.

Construction of the new permanent secondary crusher facility was completed on schedule and on budget. Commissioning of the new secondary crusher commenced in early August and the crusher has been operating well. The supplier of the crusher has a few modifications to make in order for the crusher to operate at its optimum performance level. With the contribution of the new crusher, the SAG mill throughput had a weighted average of 37,294 tpd during the first week of November.

Mining activities continued on the completion of mining ore from the stage two pushback of Pit 3 and the start of the stage three pushback of Pit 3. Mining activities are also pro-

gressing in the Pit 2 area on the southwest pushback. During the quarter, a total of 15.3 million tonnes of material was mined, including 4.5 million tonnes of ore and 10.8 million tonnes of waste. The projected life of mine strip ratio is 2 to 1 but higher in the early years. The mine moved an average of approximately 178,000 tonnes of material per day during the quarter. The mining fleet continues to have favourable mechanical availability.

About Copper Mountain Mining Corporation:

Copper Mountain's flagship asset is the Copper Mountain mine located in southern British Columbia near

the town of Princeton. The Company has a strategic alliance with Mitsubishi Materials Corporation who owns 25% of the mine. The Copper Mountain mine commenced production in the summer of 2011 and has continued to improve its operations since start-up. The 18,000 acre site has a large resource of copper that remains open laterally and at depth. The mine has significant exploration potential that will need to be explored over the next few years to fully appreciate the properties full development potential. actually see people participate in the democratic process. I think I can speak for the majority of people in Area H when I say let's put the election behind us and get back to work we have come so far in the past few years let's keep moving forward.

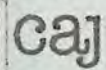

What's Your Goal For Canada?

It is that time of year when we are supposed to think of the needs of the less fortunate people in our community. Like most people, I receive cards and notebooks from charities asking me to give. I reserve my donations for two charities who sent stuff. The rest of what I give is to our local Christmas hamper fund. Princeton is my home, and charity begins at home, doesn't it?

Forty years ago, I lived in an affluent country. I never dreamed I would see the day when our local credit union had a food cart asking for food donations year round. Forty years ago, I would never have dreamed we would have 842,000 Canadians depending on food banks. I never dreamed we would have 200,000 Canadians homeless on any given day of the year.

I think food banks are wonderful. I think homeless shelters are wonderful.

What I do not think is wonderful is the fact that we need so many food banks because so many people need them or go hungry. One in every six people using a food bank is a working person. They likely work at a minimum wage and often it is a couple with chil-

dren, both parents working at minimum wage jobs. Often the people who use food banks are single mothers. I remember one who was so grateful to get diapers and baby food. Many of the regular users of food banks are old age pensioners or people on disability pensions, whose monthly stipend does not cover the basics.

These are the facts of what Canada has become. This is not the Canada I envisioned in my youth. This is not the Canada the Fathers of Confederation dreamed of, I am sure.

Food bank users jumped 25 percent after 2008. Remember the financial collapse? Remember the bail-outs for corporations, banks and insurance companies? Remember how our government found billions of dollars for them? Remember how some of those corporations who survived on taxpayer charity rewarded their incompetent CEOs with million-dollar bonuses? We didn't see any of them needing food banks, did we?

There is a tendency to see the homeless as drug addicts and alcoholics, and some are. Most are not. They are people who cannot find a place to rent because the rent is too high. They might be women fleeing from an abusive relationship. They might be people with mental health problems, and they might be young people unable to find work. They might be older people nobody wants to hire. They are all people who have fallen through the social safety net.

In Ft. Lauderdale, Florida, a 90 year old man has been arrested more than once for feeding homeless people. He runs a non-profit agency called Love Thy Neighbor. He persists in feeding homeless people from his home

despite a civic bylaw forbidding such activity within a residential area. More cities in the U.S. are passing bylaws stating when and where and how the homeless are to be treated. The trend is something like "not in my back yard". They would rather arrest a true Christian than deal with the real problem. Is this what Canadians will do?

In Princeton area, we give Christmas hampers. Actually, they are not hampers, they are boxes, and generally, they are more than one box per family. People in our area are generous. Needy families receive a lot more than just enough for a Christmas dinner. This is as it should be.

However, as the number of needy and homeless increases across our nation, I believe we should be looking at causes and looking for solutions. The Canada in which I grew up was a nation whose goal was to care for every citizen. We developed national welfare programs such as Workers Compensation, Employment Insurance, Canada pensions, minimum wage laws, and universal medicare. Being a Canadian was meant to be living in the greatest, most caring nation in the world.

Now, we no longer have a Health Accord, but we have a government willing to bargain for billions of dollars worth of stealth fighter planes behind the backs of Canadian citizens. We have sent fighter planes to the Middle East to kill people who have never harmed us. We have money for armaments and war, but not for health care, poverty relief and homelessness.

I thought this is the kind of tinpot government you find only in banana republics where the government will buy expensive military equipment while the citizens starve. This is not my personal vision of what my Canada is supposed to be.

While you give a few dollars, or some groceries, to the Christmas hamper fund, will you please ask yourself what kind of Canada you envision? Will you please ask yourself what our national goals should be? There is a national election coming in a few months, and we ordinary citizens need to decide what kind of Canada we want and who will do the best job of fulfilling our vision of what our Canada should be.

Keremeos RCMP release third quarter stats

During the third quarter of 2014 Keremeos RCMP responded to 578 calls for service compared with 505 calls received during the third quarter of 2013.

"This corresponds to an increase of 14-percent," explained Area Commander Cpl. Mike Gallagher in his report to Keremeos Village Council.

"Keremeos RCMP responded to 49-percent more Criminal Code files throughout the detachment area during the third quarter of 2014 than during the same quarter last year."

Cpl. Gallagher's report goes on to state that CrimeStoppers responded to three tips and conducted a single tip follow-up between July

and September for a total of four tips related to events in the Keremeos area in the third quarter.

To assist the Keremeos Detachment in realizing the goal of contributing to Safer Youth, three initiatives have been identified for the year. They are the continued support of the Restorative Justice Program, High Risk youth programming and an ongoing commitment to the School Liaison Program.

"Cst. Scheidl and A/Cst. Beglaw are school liaisons and DARE teachers for the schools in Keremeos," states Cpl. Gallagher.

"This quarter there was one file referred to the Restorative Justice Program involving three individuals."

On the subject of prolific offenders, Cpl. Gallagher explains they are defined as a small percentage of individuals who are responsible for a disproportionate amount of

crime.

"The POM (Prolific Offender Management) Program is based on an inter-agency collaborative effort involving various agencies represented in the area."

Once an offender has been identified, Crime Reduction Unit members meet with him/her and advise them verbally and in writing that they have been designated as one. There are none in Keremeos.

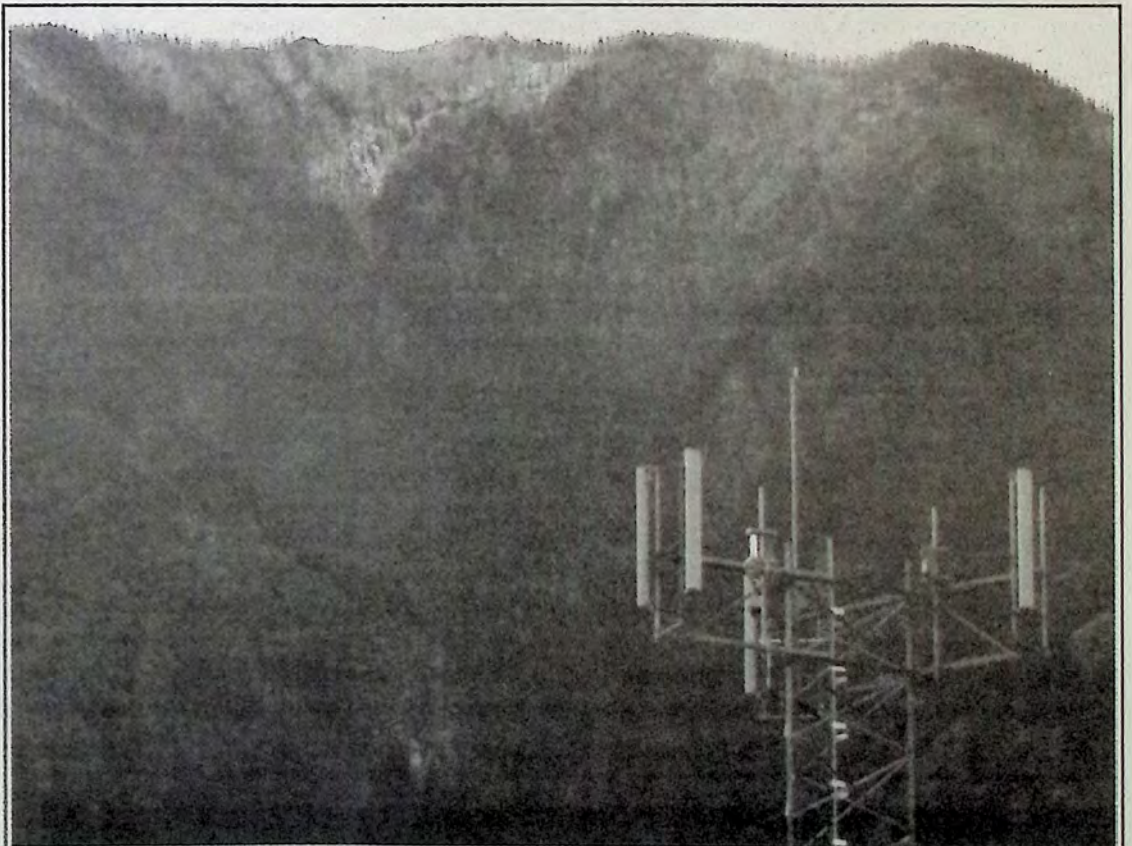

How to Put on a Pirate Show in Princeton...in Ten Weeks

I was starting to wonder partway through the November 13th rehearsal for Crimson Tine Players'

production of Yo Ho Ho A Pirate Christmas! if a freezing theatre was part of the script.

I'll be honest with you, I have never really taken much of a look at any of the scripts. Partly because I haven't needed to and partly because each member of the cast guards their copy as if it were made of gold or held secrets of some kind.

I was starting to wonder if the fact that the play takes place in winter and in one of the coldest places on the planet, that a chilly theatre was part of the interactive element with the audience I wasn't told about.

Okay, I'm due to be sent walking the plank for such an exaggeration, but it was freakin' cold!

After the cast were told to do a full run through from the opening scene, skipping the musical parts with strange noises and an ongoing buzz coming from the speakers did it all start to make sense. A phone call was made, Town of Princeton Parks, Recreation, Cultural Theatre and All-Around Go-To Guy Lyle Thomas did an inspection and the news was shared.

An electrical problem rendered the sound system inoperable taking with it some stage lighting and the

heaters. It should all be fixed by the time you read this.

I took the opportunity to wander around backstage, ever mindful of the locations of dangling sandbags overhead, snapping photos throughout this rehearsal. I said it was so I could share a different perspective in photos. The truth was, I needed to move around in order to stay warm.

I even saw my selfish side emerge when I was standing next to a shivering Stage Manager Dianne Rainer during the rehearsal and I talked myself out of offering her my coat. Cold temperatures can do strange things to the mind.

I think the cold venue was also having an effect on the cast as I had never seen as many missed lines at any rehearsal prior to this one. Trust me, they are much better than that. In fact, even the lead characters were in need of prompts to get through scenes. It was most definitely an off night and I'm sure they happen.

Regardless, there were a number of triumphs just the same. The

props all looked great and aside from a few costume alterations, the majority of that part of the production is done. A decision to not use microphones will become a challenge for some of the quieter cast members but even I noticed they had showed improvement over a couple weeks ago in projection.

The cost of 'micing' the stage and all actors would be in the \$5,000 range, which is way over budget for this production. There may be three cast members who will end up wearing microphones, but even that wasn't firmly decided.

The set painting and stage painting looked close to complete and some of that is credited to Bob Marsh who had the right tools for the job and came to the rescue of Set Painter Grace Truesdell. This is just another example of how locals pull together to make things work.

The play is still funny, regardless of how many times I've seen it now and as far as I'm concerned, that tells me they still picked a winner for this holiday season.

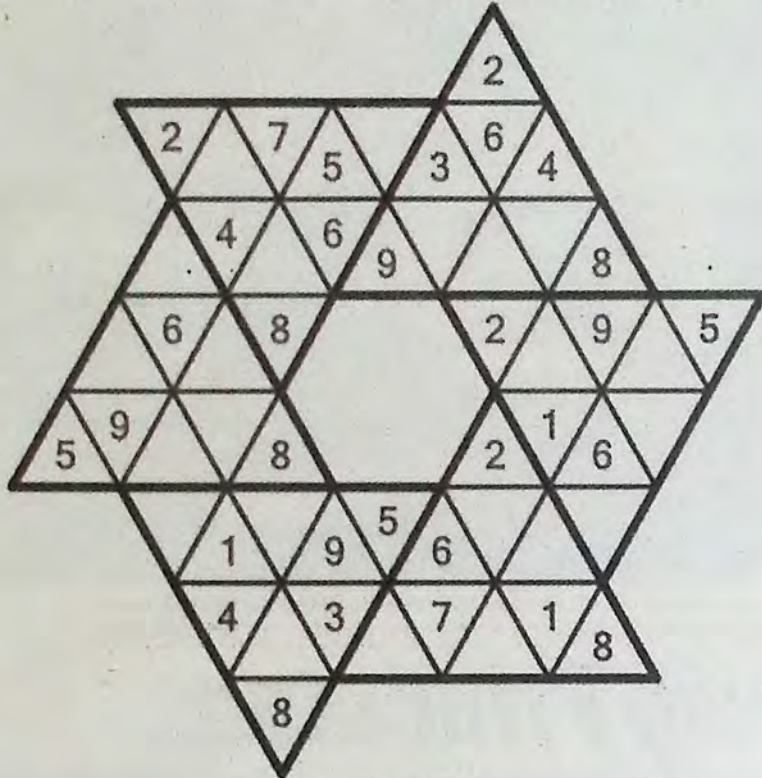

HOSHI SUDOKU - About The Puzzle

Sudoku - also known as "Number Place" - is a logic-based, combinatorial number-placement puzzle. The aim of Sudoku is to enter a number from 1 through 9 in each cell of a grid, most frequently a 9x9 grid made up of 3x3 subgrids. Each row, column and region must contain only one instance of each number. This Sudoku variant is called "Hoshi Sudoku". It contains six large triangles. Saving Downtown Princeton...

It's not easy owning a business.

In addition to all the usual costs associated with any storefront including rent, utilities and insurance, there's always the risk of not being able to make enough money each month to cover these expenses and still be able to afford to draw a wage from your business.

As we approach holiday season you start to hear more and more about the importance of supporting your local economy and all kinds of reasons why you should.

One of the things that have always

amazed me about Princeton is the incredible amount of talented people who live in and around the area. I'm not just talking about those who are artistic in the arts and cultural aspects of the community, either.

There are a number of local residents who have started small home-based businesses and continue to do business in the community. If you think shopping in downtown Princeton is restrictive and are still looking for something unique as a gift for the holiday or as a gift for

any special occasion, there are many different options available to you.

I know I am going to forget someone, so instead of naming names I'm going to just go through a list of products I am aware of being available here from a variety of home-based businesses. There are homemade soaps, candles, and toys. There are many kinds of canning and preserving businesses that offer garlic, jams, jellies, relishes and various other preserves. There's pepper, baking and candy. There's also cosmetics and specialty products.

With just that short list alone you can probably find what you are looking for that has a homemade connection to it if that is the kind of shopper you are. The importance of supporting small home-based businesses should be obvious, but the point is that if you support them, they grow and some eventually expand to become small business in

the retail section of the downtown core.

When that happens, everyone wins.

The small home-based businesses are not all that hard to find, either. Some share storefront space in existing downtown businesses, other will become obvious during the "Christmas Craft Fair" Season and others have an online presence with websites, social media pages and blogs.

When you stop and look at the many different home-based businesses that function in and around our community you start to see that there is far more available for consumers than just two main streets in downtown Princeton.

I haven't even said much about the artists, writers and photographers in the area who all have a number of different products and services available from within the community.

I guess what I am trying to do here

is remind you that what you may see – or not see – downtown is not all that is available to you. There are many other kinds of small businesses in operation with so many different products that you really don't need to venture out of town to do all your holiday shopping.

How does this help downtown Princeton?

In the big picture, as I've already stated, if some of the larger home-based businesses gain enough local support to expand and move into a storefront location as part of their growth, it fills up space in the downtown core. Anytime a new business opens their doors we owe it to them to at least check them out to see what they are offering. If it's a new business that used to be a small home-based business, they grew because of that support.

Hopefully they continue to receive support so they can keep functioning in the downtown core and contribute to the community.

Posse double division leading Coyotes

The Princeton Posse hosted Osoyoos Coyotes November 12th in the only mid-week game scheduled in the KIJHL. The Okanagan Division leading Coyotes came to the Similkameen Valley with a 19-3-0-1 record worth 39 points. Measured up against Princeton's second place 10-6-2-2 (24-point)

record it looked clear on paper that the game could have a slight lean in favour of the visiting team.

Add to that the deep rivalry between the teams that dates back to before the Coyote franchise was born - and into the KIJHL history books when the Storm still called Osoyoos their home - and you had

the makings of a great match. In fact, any time Osoyoos comes to Princeton Arena there is an electric snap in the air and the sound of excitement.

Osoyoos set the pace scoring first at 16:41 of the first period. The goal went to Jackson DeMatos with Blake Holowaty earning an

assist.

The Posse tied the game at 10:29 of the second on a power play. Credit for the goal went to Brandon Workun with assists going to Connor Sloan and Destin Robinson.

The home team took the lead with another power play marker with just 3-seconds left in the period when Eden Dubchak popped one in from a pass slipped to him by Tyler Ehlers. Cooper Prechel took the second assist.

The third period saw the Coyotes tie the game at 2-all when Luc Gradisar scored a goal off a pass from Jackson DeMatos.

Then Princeton responded with another go-ahead goal at 8:20.

Kurtis Klinger got the marker with help from Trevor Pereverzoff and Colton St. John.

The Coyotes pulled goalie Lawrence Langan with just less than two-minutes to play for an extra man in an attempt at tying the game. It didn't work as Princeton's Kurtis Klinger scored an unassisted goal in the empty net with 8-seconds left to play to seal the win.

Final score: Princeton 4, Osoyoos 2. Shots on Goal: Osoyoos 37, Princeton 21. Princeton had a 50.0% success rate on the power play scoring twice on four while Osoyoos was 0 for 3 (00.0%). Penalties in Minutes: Osoyoos 4 for 8-minutes, Princeton 3 for 6-minutes.
