## What now for Racing Days?

November 2014 marks the fiftieth anniversary of the founding of Princeton Racing Days Association. The November 20, 2014 meeting of the Association was a far cry from the enthusiastic group of local business people who came together 50 years ago.

At last week's meeting, there were only five paid members present and one promptly resigned. The main topic of discussion was the upcoming annual general meeting, which will determine the future of Racing Days. In fact, the annual general meeting will determine whether there is any future for the Association.

Total income last year was \$6,500. Losses are near \$20,000. There were no horse races this year. Instead, the few volunteers sponsored a rodeo, logger sports, ATV training for youngsters, and a variety of other attractions. The public did not respond. Attendance was poor. With horse racing, income would normally have been around \$40,000.

There were other problems. Even

if the Association could have found enough horses to hold a race, the Town declined providing a \$20,000 guarantee for start-up, and the government funding was eaten up by Hastings Park, leaving only \$11,000 for Princeton. The Interior Horse Racing Association is all but defunct.

The upcoming annual general meeting, scheduled for Tuesday, December 16, will call for election of a Board of Directors. President Karrie Crucil will not take that position again for health reasons. A treasurer will be needed, and two additional directors. If these positions cannot be filled, another annual general meeting will be scheduled, as required by law. If that meeting fails to elect a new Board of Directors, and fails to attract enough members to provide a good volunteer base, the present Board will begin the process of dissolving the Association.

During the past 50 years, Princeton Racing Days was the top community celebration for the first ..... continued on Page 3

## Mayor reviews three years

As the November 17 meeting was the last public meeting of the current Town Council, Mayor Frank Armitage reviewed projects and priorities of the past three years. He noted many projects were completed and some are in progress. He said the Town of Princeton is in good financial condition and pointed out it is one of the few B.C. municipalities that is debt-free.

Mayor Armitage listed a number of achievements during this term in office, such as the new Parks and Recreation plan, the new engine for the antique fire truck, the paving of numerous streets and Old Hedley Road, improvements

to water and sewer infrastructure, and the acquisition of the airport property.

He specifically mention the application for a satellite boundary expansion to include Copper Mountain Mine and stated there would be no liability to Princeton if there were a tailings spill like Mt. Polley, as such situations come under legislation governed by two provincial ministries. This application is under review by Cabinet at this time.

A linear park was created along Burton Avenue by closing one end of the street, and a new Town Hall is in place, among many lesser

projects.

Mayor Armitage thanked Town Hall staff for all of their help.

## PXA begins new year

The annual general meeting of Princeton Exhibition Association on November 18 resulted in the election of a new Board of Directors for the coming year. Lyle Thomas conducted the election which saw Paul Bedard returned as President, with a new Vice-President, Karrie Crucil. Directors elected for two-year terms were Stephanie Antonick, Jennifer Bernard, Odelle Simmons and Chloe Littlejohn. President Bedard appointed Walt Halipchuk as Treasurer and Dawn Johnson as Secretary.

A financial committee was put in

place and a number of motions were made regarding the conduct of business during the December recess.

Following the annual meeting, a business meeting was held to deal with ongoing matters regarding the activities at the exhibition facility. Princeton Riding Club reserved dates for use of the indoor arena: December 7 - jumping lessons; December 14 - open trail obstacle practice.

On December 21, Princeton Riding Club plans a Christmas Carol Ride during the afternoon. The riders will tour residential areas and go to Ridgewood to sing carols from horseback. This will be the second year for this event.

There was some discussion regarding the motor sports proposal

as it pertained to the facility. There was discussion, too, about changing wooden horse pens to pens surrounded by steel panels. Members agreed this should be an ongoing project as finances permit.

Two members agreed to attend a grant writing workshop in Keremeos on December 4.

The PXA traditionally takes a break from meetings during December. The next meeting will be January 20 at the public library conference room.

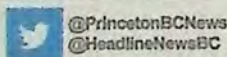

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# Lung Month includes radon test reminder

Exposure to colourless, odourless radon gas is the leading cause of lung cancer after smoking. Radon is a radioactive gas that comes from the breakdown of uranium in the ground.

It can seep undetected into homes, schools, workplaces and other buildings through cracks in the walls or foundation.

"Radon gas is accountable for up to 16 per cent of lung cancers. We suggest all BC homeowners test their home's radon levels," says Marilyn Lawrence, Volunteer BC Lung Association Director for Princeton.

When radon is released into the atmosphere, it gets diluted. But if it finds its way into your home it can accumulate to high levels, and that's when it can become dangerous. Being exposed to high doses of radon over a long period of time is a serious lung cancer risk.

"Should British Columbians be concerned about radon exposure?

Yes, absolutely. Should they panic? No," says Britt Swoveland, Provincial RadonAware Coordinator for the BC Lung Association.

"Virtually every house in BC contains some radon. The question is, how much? The only way to know for certain, is to test."

Measured in becquerels per cubic metre (Bq/m3), Health Canada recommends home radon levels not exceed a safety threshold of 200 (Bq/m3).

As there is no known safe level of exposure, the BC Lung Association recommends making every effort to minimize home radon levels.

"One house can have radon levels

next to zero while the house next door can be off the charts," continued Swoveland.

"And if your radon levels are high, it's not hard to fix. A certified radon mitigation professional can reduce radon levels in most homes by more than 80 per cent for about the same cost as other common home repairs, rarely more than \$1,500 to \$3,000."

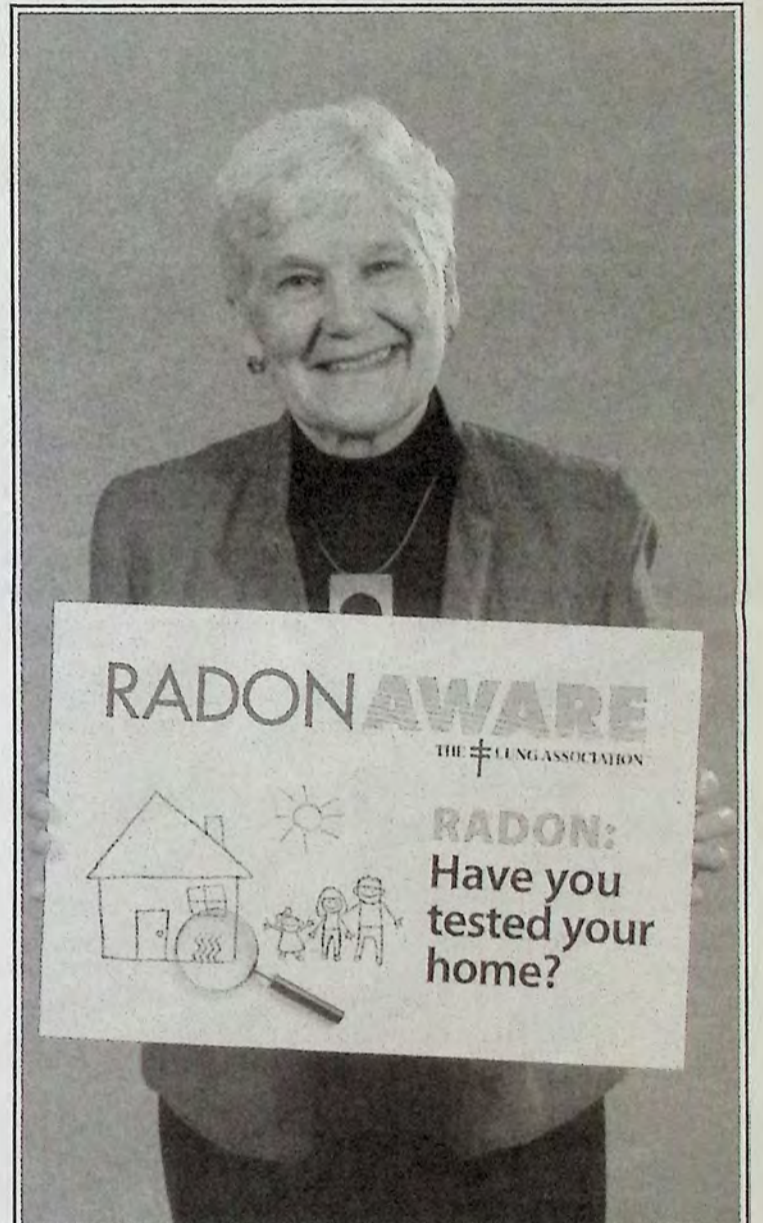

Last year I did about 98 percent of my Christmas shopping here in Princeton. This year I plan on doing the same if not more.

Most of the stores will try to get items in for you that are not in their regular inventory so you might not get that instant feeling of gratification from buying something, but you can still get it in time for Christmas, and what better time than during great holiday sales?

The Chamber of Commerce is hosting the light up again with events at Veterans' Square starting around 3:30 in the afternoon. The shopping passport will be taking place again so get your stamp on with your favorite retailers, and let's not forget that Copper Mountain Mine is sponsoring the Horse and Wagon rides this year. There will be lots to see and do and I am sure there will be more in the paper about it. Check for ads from local retailers to see what kind of deals might be happening and get out and shop, but more importantly show some community spirit.

It might sound like a lot but if we all tried to Think Local this Christmas. I bet everyone in town could get at least 50 percent of their shopping list completed in town. It would be one heck of a way to end 2014, and a great way to kick off 2015 for our local economy.

There were dances, a pancake breakfast, a big parade and numerous class reunions.

The past few years, have seen Racing Days shrink to a shadow of its former glory. The Lions Club dropped the raft race years ago due

to insurance costs, but there is no Lions Club now to put on the pancake breakfast. The softball tournament is gone, although the golf tournament continues. The Youth Ambassador pageant is still in place, so is the parade, but a tourist coming to town would never guess by the store fronts that there was a community celebration in progress.

The business community abandoned Racing Days.

Is there a future for Racing Days? Princeton will make its decision next month.

## My Turn...

### Running Wild In The Back Stretch

This month marks the fiftieth anniversary of the founding of Princeton Racing Days. There is no celebration, nor is there a cake. There is no parade or pages of historic photos in this paper.

The last general meeting held last week attracted only five members.

There was no live horse racing last July at Sunflower Downs and still the organization lost money.

Has technology killed Racing Days or has it got to do with the focus on racing in the Lower Mainland as opposed to in the Interior?

I was the second President in the history of the organization and ended up being the second longest serving President of Princeton Racing Days. Even during my string of terms we knew the day would come when racing horses in Princeton could come to an end. In fact, while I was President the event dropped from a two-day event to a single afternoon of racing.

The problem has little to do with the dedicated volunteers who participated then or now. The problem revolves around money and always has. Horse owners typically chase the big money races. We thought we were really going places when we raised the minimum purses in the races to \$1,000 per race when I was involved. Even that was a hard sell to many horse owners who chose to either race in Vancouver or travel to Alberta. We lost a lot of horses to bigger tracks.

When I was involved the BC Interior Horse Racing Association had four member tracks with Princeton being the smallest. The BCIHRA worked hard not to compete against the big tracks on the West Coast but it eventually was the big tracks that succeeded.

Televised horse racing is a big deal in a lot of places.

The BCIHRA looked at it years ago. It just didn't make sense then to try to get people at your own event to bet on a race they were watching on an outdoor television screen. But the big tracks built large, fancy temperature-controlled viewing lounges and starting putting much of their effort on those kinds of bettors.

Live small town horse racing was dealt another blow with that.

I have always been amazed with the number of years live racing continued in our community based on the insurmountable odds against any significant success. Part of the local success has to go to local horse owners over the years who did not abandon their roots and raced at their hometown track as a way of giving back to their community.

Instead of celebrating fifty years of community pride, another local event is close to the end of their final race.

Sadly, there may not be any more luck in the horseshoe hanging over the doorway in the Princeton Racing Days office, either.

## Community Services

### Transportation Challenges in Rural Settings

Community Services provides transportation services on behalf of the Town of Princeton, the Village of Keremeos, BC Transit, Interior Health and the Regional Districts. Service options have increased over the years and service is available in Princeton on Tuesday, Thursday and Friday, between 8:30 and 4:00; to Penticton (via Hedley, Keremeos, Cawston and Olalla) on Monday, Wednesday and Friday (leaving Princeton at 8:00 AM). Fares in town are \$1.50 one way; fares to Penticton are \$8.00 return. This is an excellent, low cost service and available to all residents of Princeton and the other areas we serve.

However, there are many times when residents have appointments that do not fit within the current bus schedules. We are aware that there are many people in Princeton who are unable to attend out of town appointments because

they do not have a vehicle or are not comfortable driving out of town. Many of these appointments are for medical reasons. It is of grave concern that anyone needing medical care outside of the community may not receive it because they have no way to get to their appointment. The Save Our Health Care and IH Steering Committees are aware of the need and have attempted to collect names of individuals who can provide transportation to those in need. Unfortunately, the few volunteer drivers we had were quickly exhausted by the high volume of requests.

Community Services has agreed to maintain a list of people who would be willing to periodically transport others to medical appointments, primarily in the Okanagan area. We envision a "friendly neighbor" program, where a person could indicate the times they would be available to assist their "neighbours" in getting to their appointments. Details regarding compensation for things such as gas and parking would be

determined by the two parties involved. Community Services would only be the "connecting" service, providing names of those willing to transport individuals to appointments to those needing to get to an appointment.

We are aware that Keremeos operates a more formalized and very successful "volunteer driver program" and our hope is that this may be something Princeton will eventually have in place. Until then, we are hoping concerned community members will come forward to assist their neighbors. Volunteers could limit their availability by destination points, days, times or seasons, to better suit their needs and preferences. The more "friendly neighbors", the less demand there would be on any one individual.

## What Putin Said In October

On October 24, 2014, Russian President Vladimir Putin made a speech at the Valdai International Discussion Club in Sochi, Russia. The point of this conference is the open and honest discussion of matters of international concern. Unlike some meetings of world significance, this meeting was open to the world press (a Canadian journalist was there), and the journalists were free to ask questions of the speakers.

Putin's speech emphasized the need to have honest negotiations between nations in order to resolve matters that can create conflict. He spoke of the need to understand a world increasingly unpredictable and therefore unsafe. He frequently referred to the partnership formed by the three world powers after World War II, and the need to retain a responsible balance of power in order to avoid more conflict between and within nations.

"Objectivity and justice have been sacrificed on the altar of political expediency," he stated.

He did not mince words in criticizing the United States and its 'satellites' (count Canada here) for violations of Article 2 of the United Nations Charter, which states each nation shall have the

right of self-determination. This means nations should not interfere in other nations' internal politics. He refers to American interference in Libya, Iraq, and Syria.

Putin lashes out at the way people are informed about what is going on.

"Total control of the global mass media has made it possible when desired to portray white as black and black as white."

Putin wants a return to international consultation as outlined in international law before any nation takes action against another, whether for humanitarian, political or economic reasons. He uses the ongoing problems between Israel and Palestine as an example, saying Russia has an interest in both nations, and every effort should be made by all parties to find a resolution to the problems.

The U.S. involvement in the creation of terrorist groups was criticized by Putin as he reminded his audience it was the support of the Taliban in the Soviet-Afghan war that led to the formation of Al-Qaeda and now ISIL in Syria.

Putin is critical of globalization when it means the supremacy of one super-power nation. He advocates for economic prosperity for all nations in a spirit of economic cooperation and lawful trade agreements. He stated Russia's goal is to be economically self-sufficient (the fewer imports, the stronger the economy).

At the end of his speech, he was questioned about the military action in Crimea and in Ukraine. He stated the people of Crimea went to vote on whether or not to join Russia, and there was no effort to prevent anyone from voting. In fact, voter turnout was over 95 percent, and the majority voted to join Russia. As to the overthrow of the legitimate Ukraine govern-

ment, Putin said he advised the Ukraine President Yanukovich against leaving Kiev for fear of dissident groups seizing power. Putin and Obama had discussed the situation. Yanukovich assured Putin nothing would happen as he and the opposition had signed an agreement. As soon as Yanukovich left Kiev, the opposition went into action and seized government buildings.

Putin told his audience how dangerous the world has become in terms of weaponry, and says there must be international negotiations once again to disarm nations. He commented on the U.S. ignoring previous disarmament agreements, but also mentioned the danger of terrorists and unstable nations having the type of armaments which can inflict major damage.

The United States saw Putin's speech as an attack on the American government and particularly on its foreign policy, but one of the things Putin said was a warning to the Americans that their interference will lead their country into serious difficulties just from trying to control politics through intervention. Putin's speech was lengthy, but worth reading. If you want to read it for yourself, Google Putin speech Valdai 2014. It will give you the Russian President's view of what is going on in our world.

### Update

I have been a 'global warming' doubter for several years. Recent statements (November 2, 2014) on CNN by John Coleman, co-founder of Weather Channel, calls global warming a hoax and the biggest scam in history. Coleman says the government paid only those researchers prepared to say there is global warming. In Russia and Denmark, scientists are warning of 15 years of global cooling, ending in 2030. Recent NASA satellite photos show the Arctic Sea freezing at a faster rate than normal, and Siberia had its shortest summer on record. The ice mass in Antarctica grew considerably this year, and Australia broke records for low temperatures this past winter. If you Google global cooling, you will discover a number of sites on this topic. One site states bluntly the earth has not risen an average one degree in the past decade as forecast by the International Panel on Climate Change (IPCC).

# Town builds crazy tree

Town Council was invited to enter a Crazy Christmas Tree in the contest sponsored by Princeton Community Arts Council. Mayor Frank Armitage said Council members did not take up the challenge, but the public works staff is going to enter the contest.

Kevin Huey, Works Manager, stated their tree design "looks like Charlie Brown meets the Jetsons".

The Crazy Christmas Trees must be constructed using only recycled

materials, although it may have lights. The tree must be able to pass through a standard door opening. It will be displayed in the store at the junction of Vermilion Avenue and Bridge Street from November 28 to December 19th. The public will judge the trees and a prize will be awarded for "Most Popular" and "Most Original". Trees are registered by phoning 250-295-6718, Marjorie Holland, President of the Arts Council.

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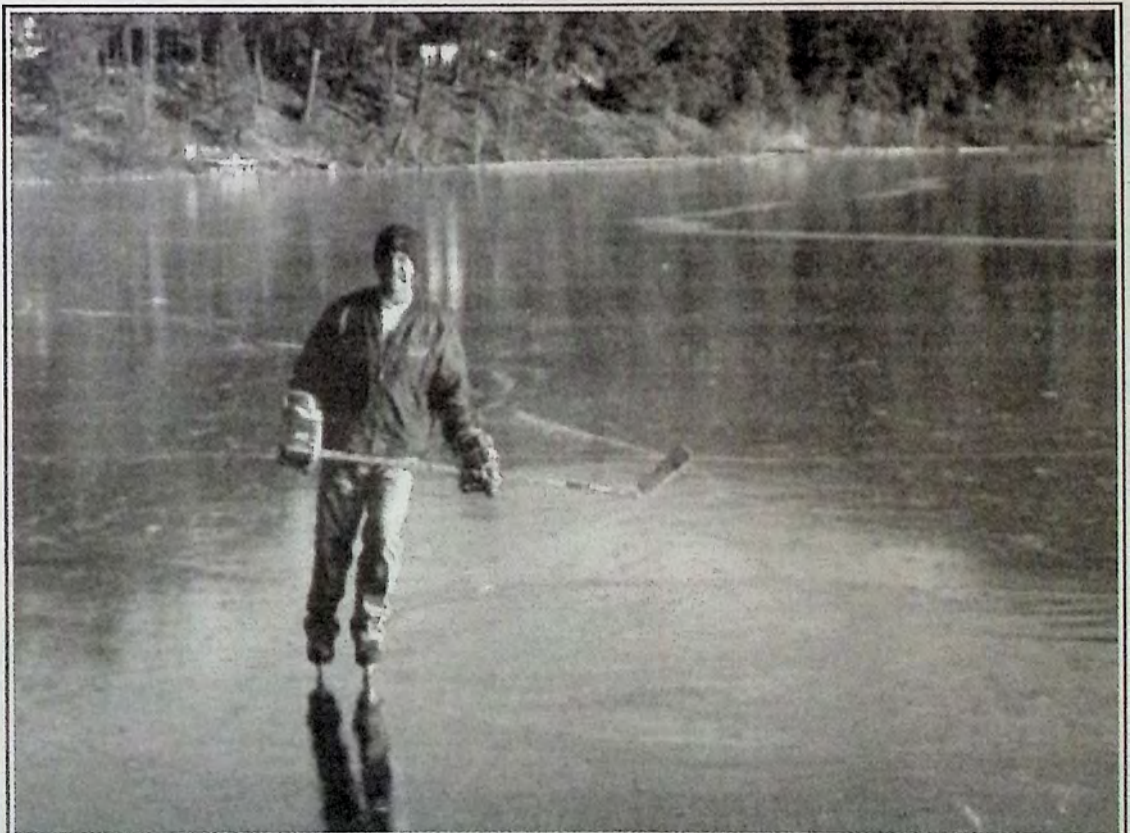

## Living Past 100

### How S.A.D. Are You?

As we come to the end of November, many Canadians will begin to suffer from Seasonal Affective Disorder, commonly called SAD. This is a form of depression that comes as a result of lack of sunshine. Some people are affected more than others.

People suffering from SAD show the following symptoms: lack of energy, need for more sleep, greater appetite (often leading to weight gain). They may also experience difficulty in concentrating and complain of fatigue. Some people may become irritable and unable to go to sleep, and some become anxious.

The best treatment for SAD is bright light, lots of light. It does not have to be a daylight lamp, but it should be a bright light, much brighter than the average light bulb. Turning on bright lights in the morning and evening are recommended. Anyone with bipolar disorder should not follow this recommendation, as very bright lights agitate their condition.

Taking Vitamin D does help most people in winter, regardless of whether or not they have SAD. Vitamin D is a substitute for sunshine.

Going out in the sunshine is good therapy for SAD. The sun shining brightly on the snow is soothing treatment for SAD.

Some medical professionals have treated SAD the same way they treat depression, but some physicians have found there can be unpleasant side effects to this treatment, and recommend light as the best treatment.

Some physicians recommend psychotherapy to help people find ways to cope with SAD.

SAD can affect anyone of any age. If you are a parent and notice SAD symptoms in your child, make every effort to keep your home brightly lit, and encourage your child to go outdoors in the sunlight. An elderly parent may need the same treatment.

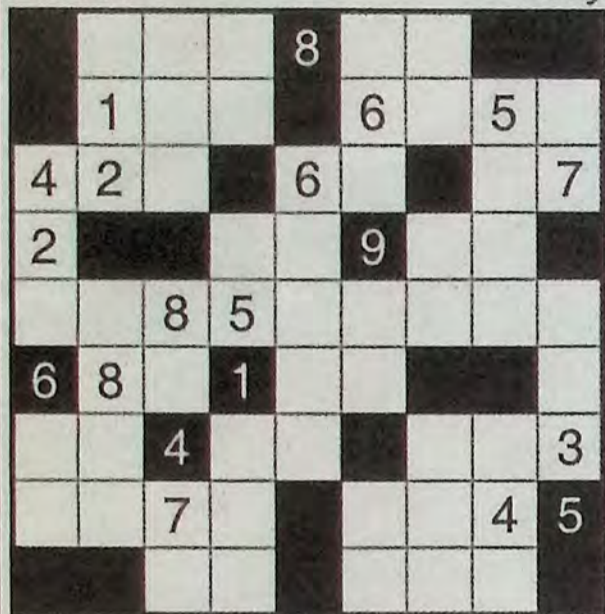

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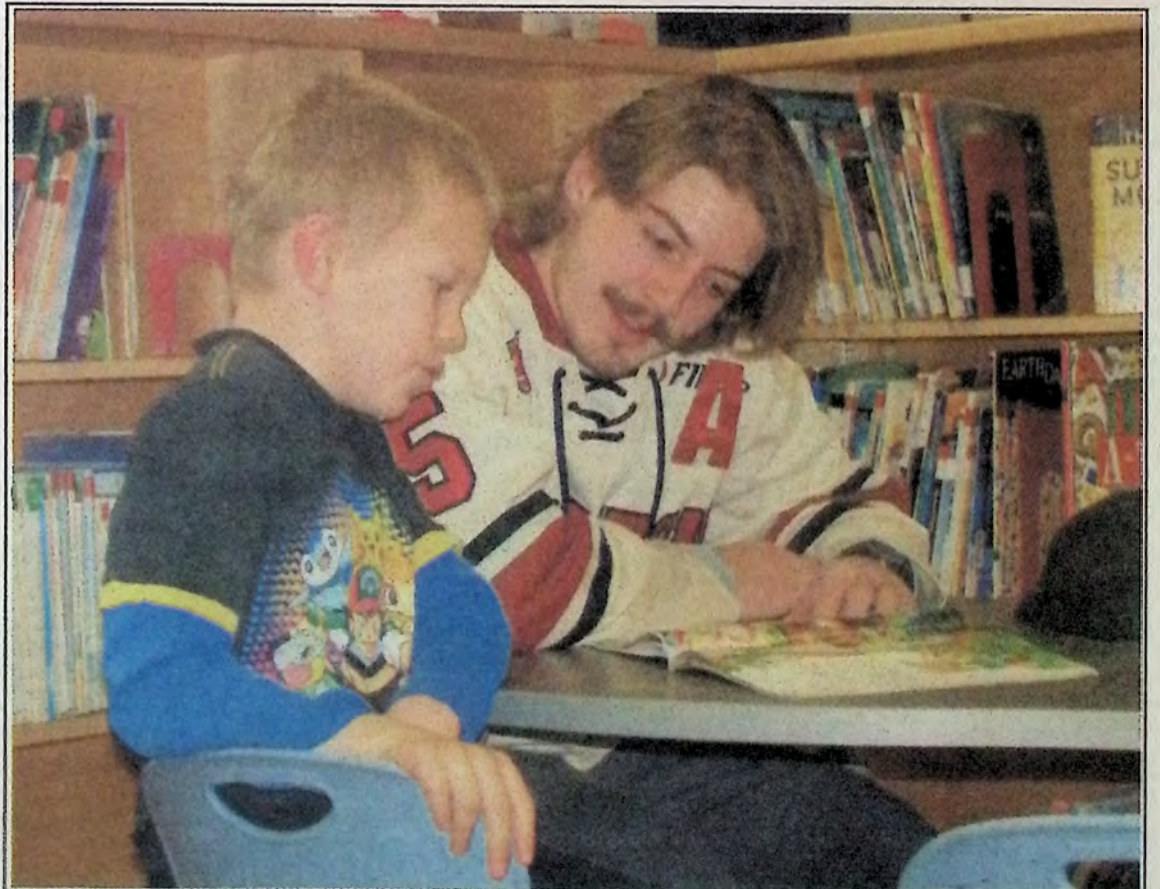

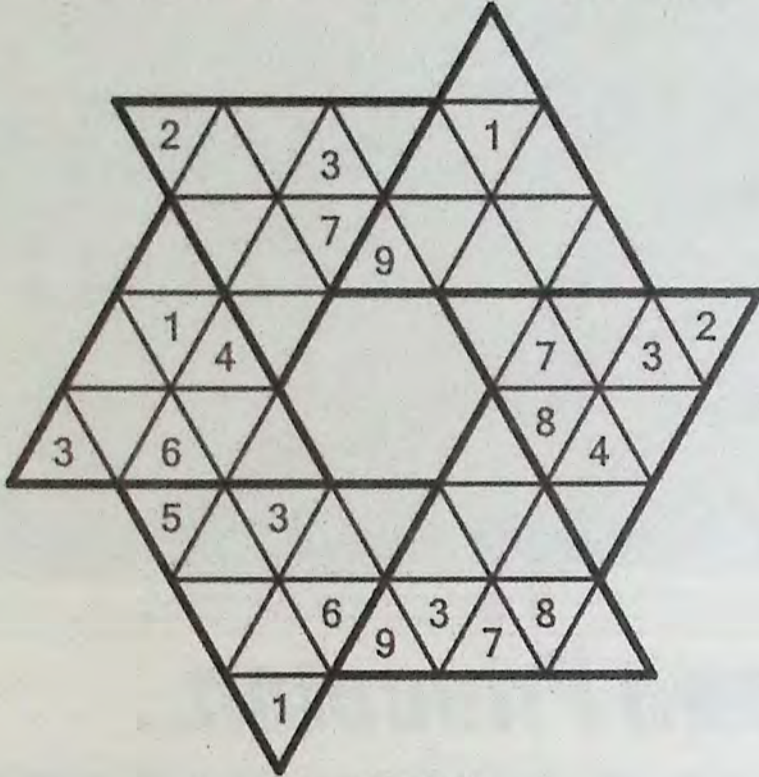

## HOSHI SUDOKU - About The Puzzle

Sudoku - also known as "Number Place" - is a logic-based, combinatorial number-placement puzzle. The aim of Sudoku is to enter a number from 1 through 9 in each cell of a grid, most frequently a 9x9 grid made up of 3x3 subgrids. ## ***Saving Downtown Princeton...***

**...An Ongoing Series by George Elliott**

What has the holidays got to do with saving downtown Princeton?

Well, for most of the retailers serving your community it is their single busiest time of the year. While Boxing Day sales are not typically fashionable in Princeton, the weeks leading up to Christmas are in many cases an opportunity for some local businesses to salvage an otherwise slow or dismal year.

I would be lying if I didn't say our Christmas Issue wasn't one of our biggest papers of the year. In fact, the way it works for us our two biggest papers are exactly six months apart – Christmas and Grad.

I will have to give the Princeton

& District Chamber of Commerce a great deal of credit when it comes to putting a focus on the need to support local business. Spencer Coyne has put a ton of effort into the monthly 'Shop Local' program and I see it as an extension of the annual Light-Up Celebration.

If you are new to the area, or usually ignore this sort of activity, the Chamber of Commerce has hosted an annual Light-Up Celebration for as long as I've lived here. I seem to recall I was Vice President of that group the year I moved here (1986) and they were doing it back then and have been ever since.

At the time of my initial involvement there was a giant prize of a trip to somewhere exotic with a cash

prize and participating merchants had draw boxes in their stores collecting entries. I am so glad that the Chamber eventually looked at the message that they were using at the time which was along the lines of "shop local to win a trip away from town and we'll give you money to spend there" and changed it to a completely "support your local economy" focus.

It has not been an easy trip for the Chamber of Commerce I'm sure, but when you look at what they try to do to get residents to spend money in town you can't help but think they are trying to do something good.

But the Light-Up Celebration is really just a part of the puzzle.

I think the Passport Program they use is not an entirely bad idea, either. However, those merchants who may not participate because all they see are people just collecting passport stamps are really missing the point.

Here's where I shift into advertising mode.

There have been a few of my clients over the years that debate the value of advertising in a small town. My argument is very simple. "My job is to get them to your door. What happens after that is entirely up to you."

This goes back to articles I've already written here about customer service. I've pointed out that we attempt to make contact with each and every customer who comes into our office. Even if they enter our door by accident we at least try to share a pleasant greeting and wish everyone a good day. We consider that good public relations.

If a Passport Program funnels people into a business they don't normally visit I would consider them "potential new customers" as opposed to "stamp nuts" or whatever.

When you consider the difficult year many local businesses have

had you'd think anything that sent traffic through the door would be welcomed with open arms. It is with this in mind that I remind you to take note of the participating businesses in programs like the Passport or Shop Local campaign, as they are the ones who really want your business.

If you prefer to do all of your holiday shopping out of town you really owe it to your local storeowners, some of which may be your neighbours, to at least check out what they offer. You may be somewhat surprised with what you find available in your community.

How does this save downtown Princeton?

Again, it's simple. If you don't support your local business community, especially when they participate in programs meant for you to be a part of, you miss out on contributing to your community. Without supporting local businesses more of them disappear.

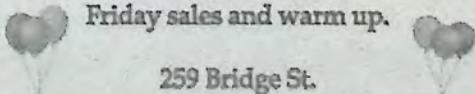

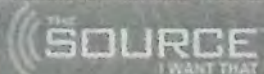
