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Gaming grants assist local groups

Parent Advisory Committees (PACs) that provide support for extracurricular sports, arts, class trips and other school activities will share \$11,334,300 in community gaming grants this year, funded by the B.C. government, Community, Sport and Cultural Development Minister Coralee Oakes said December 5th.

B.C. community gaming grants will provide a total of \$11,216,800 to 1,435 PACs and \$117,500 to 47 District Parent Advisory Committees (DPACs) in communities throughout the province. Working in partnership with school staff, PACs and DPACs

strive to enhance the educational experience for students at B.C.'s public and independent schools.

Community gaming grants help schools purchase items such as sports equipment and musical instruments to provide additional learning opportunities for students.

Gaming grant applicants must be the PAC or DPAC for a school that delivers the K-12 curriculum. There must be at least two parents willing to be accountable for the funds. Applicants can contact Gaming Policy and Enforcement Branch at 250 387-5311 for advice about applications.

"Schools in British Columbia provide an excellent quality of education for children and youth in communities throughout the province. Community gaming grants help enrich the school experience with appropriate extra-curricular opportunities that parents can support through PACs and DPACs working together with teachers and school administrators," states Community, Sport and Cultural Development Minister Coralee Oakes.

"We know parents contribute directly to the success of their children, and their involvement in the education system plays a pivotal role in each community. These B.C. Gaming grants provide funding to local parent advisory committees so they can purchase playground and sports equipment, musical instruments and also support other opportunities for students," added Education Minister Peter Fassbender.

Quick Facts:
- The Province distributes \$135 million in community gaming

grants to benefit over 5,000 local organizations representing virtually every community in the province.

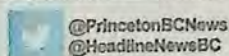
- Agricultural fairs, local festivals and celebrations, heritage associations and museums, arts and culture, sports, environmental organizations, human and social services, public safety, parent advisory councils and district parent advisory councils are all eligible for community gaming grants.

- There are more than 1,900 public and independent schools in 60 school districts throughout British Columbia. Most are served by PACs and DPACs.

Gaming grants received in the Similkameen Valley during the 2014/15 fiscal year include: Kokanee Summer Swim Club (\$11,500), Princeton Posse Junior Hockey Club (\$15,000), Princeton Skating Club Society (\$75,000), Princeton Traditional Music Society (\$5,500) and Hedley Heritage Museum Society (\$10,000).

Adult low-income learners receive program grants

Improvements to upfront, non-repayable grants will support low-income students enrolling in post-secondary adult upgrading courses, including English as a Second Language (ESL).

longer provide funding to school districts for tuition-free upgrading courses for adults who already hold a high school diploma.

These changes are in anticipation of increased demand for financial support following a number of changes to prioritize K-12 funding on those working toward a high school diploma while ensuring the equitable and sustainable delivery of other adult upgrading courses in post-secondary and K-12 sectors.

Starting April 1, 2015, the annual budget for Adult Upgrading Grants will increase 33% to \$7.6 million. The grants will cover all, or a portion, of the costs of tuition, textbooks, supplies, transportation and child care depending on the adult student's income.

High school courses in the K-12 sector will remain tuition-free for anyone working toward an Adult Dogwood Diploma or for adults looking to take basic, introductory courses.

Previously, students above the income threshold were not eligible for the grant. However, a more flexible approach means students who are 10% above the income threshold are eligible for a grant to cover half of their tuition.

However, students with the means to do so will be expected to contribute to the cost of courses at post-secondary institutions. Beginning January 1, 2015, public post-secondary institutions in British Columbia will be allowed to charge tuition fees for all adult upgrading courses, including ESL programs.

"If you are an adult, and you are looking to finish high school and get your diploma, nothing changes in the K-12 sector. Taxpayers will bear the entire cost, and you won't be charged tuition," states Peter Fassbender, Minister of Education.

Careful What You Wish For

The high price of fuel in Princeton has been a subject of much debate. I've heard about it in many places I go around the community and read about it often online.

The reoccurring theme appears to be a belief that since we live in Princeton, we are being gouged by the local gas stations.

I know enough about the situation to say the people working at local gas stations have little to do with the cost, although some of them have to put up with various forms of verbal abuse. As far as I can tell, most local customers are aware of this and are quite polite to those working at these businesses.

From what I can tell from my contacts is that station managers do not control pricing, either. Apparently, the pricing is dictated by someone (normally a district manager) who does not live in the Similkameen and makes the decision based on a number of different variables ranging from the current price of crude oil, the day of the week, what they had for lunch and how much fuel remains in the underground tanks you drive over to get to the pumps.

What got my attention last week was a semi-organized effort online to boycott local gas stations in a rotating basis to send a message to those in charge.

What a great idea just before Christmas!

That smells like vigilante justice to me and I can't help but wonder how much thought was really put into such a plan. How were they going to get the word out about which gas station was NOT being boycotted and which ones were? How were they going to stop the flow of traffic to the targeted stations from out of towners?

There is a way to get your message across and although e-mails and letters take longer, when mailboxes and inboxes get flooded on a daily basis, it's hard to ignore why that is happening. I think the energy focused on 'sending a message' would be best used in actually sending those messages the old-fashioned way.

Besides, if a boycott of local gas stations actually takes place, what's next? I don't like the prices of some of the local restaurants in town. Let's start boycotting them on a rotating basis.

Oh, there are a couple of local business owners I hear are trying to run the town. Let's start boycotting them, too.

While we're at it, let's quit supporting some local charities because they want too much and school programs because we get taxed too much for them already.

That's why it is so important to be careful what you wish for, especially if you are in business in the community and are supporting any form of vigilante justice as it has a way of coming back to bite you.

Letters and E-Mails Received This Past Week

To The Editor,

My constituency office in Castlegar has recently heard from many concerned seniors who did not receive their pension cheques as usual in October and November. When my assistant followed up with Service Canada, she was told that the SC regional offices had received thousands of complaints from seniors who found themselves in the same situation.

Service Canada explained that they suspended the pension payments of individuals who have not updated their mailing addresses, whose T-4 pension slips had been returned to Service Canada as "undeliverable," and who Service Canada could not get hold of in any other way. Unfortunately, this heavy-handed approach has meant

hardship for many seniors who rely on their pension cheques for the basic necessities of life. It can take Service Canada upward of seven business days to release a cheque once they are able to make contact with a pensioner. In the meantime, rent cheques are late, cupboards are empty, and people are panicked because of money shortages.

When my assistant questioned the need for such extreme action, she was told that this "T-4 return policy" was implemented for "security reasons," so that cheques did not continue to be sent to an individual who was deceased, or had moved away. This may sound reasonable, but the reality is that some of the seniors my office has spoken to have had no such changes. They

are being punished because of an administrative situation that could have been handled much more simply.

One constituent wrote to me about her experience when she contacted Service Canada: "I spoke with a very polite man but the only reason he could give me for the 'glitch' was that I could not be found because they had no physical address—really. I was born in this country, I have lived my whole life in BC, I have worked from the age of 18 years in BC. I retired in 2001 and have been receiving my pension cheques uninterrupted. The last time I moved was 1981."

Germ Warfare: They Infected Us

became crystallized, it became impossible for our bodies to fight off.

This toxic crystal was developed following work done by Nazi researchers who were brought to the United States after World War II. Like many Nazi scientists, these researchers were spared conviction as war criminals by agreeing to share their knowledge with the American government. Crystalline Brucellosis was first manufactured in late 1945, and first reported to the U.S. government in a document dated January 3, 1946. The development of the crystalline invader is well documented in a book by Garth and Nancy Nicholson called Project Day Lily. Further information can be found in a book titled The Trillion-Dollar Conspiracy page 109 by Jim Marrs, a book called the Brucellosis Triangle and on the net under godlike productions, Origin of Chronic Disease in America.

There are around 200 different strains of mycoplasma, most of them harmless, but this manufactured crystalline mycoplasma is extremely infectious and was meant to be a bio-weapon. Unfortunately, the military was enthusiastic about this bio-weapon and began doing human tests both in the United States and Canada,

with the cooperation of both governments. It is estimated that now, 75 years later, all of us have this infection somewhere in our bodies.

The crystalline Brucellosis mycoplasma hides inside cells where it does incredible damage leading to symptoms of chronic fatigue syndrome, rheumatoid arthritis, fibromyalgia, multiple sclerosis, and Lyme disease. Some strains of HIV have been linked to crystalline Brucellosis mycoplasma. The Gulf War syndrome is believed to be this type of infection, released by Saddam Hussein who had been given it by the American military (yup, weapons of mass destruction). The nasty little crystal has also been linked to Alzheimer's, diabetes, Parkinson's, bipolar disorder, Crohn's colitis, lupus, and myalgic encephalitis.

Not everyone will suffer immediately after contact from carrying the crystalline Brucellosis. Expert researchers say the infection can 'sleep' for 10, 20, or even 30 years, then suddenly emerge due to trauma, poor health from another infection, or through poor lifestyle.

Because the nasty little invader mimics the symptoms of so many other diseases, the average physician rarely suspects crystalline Brucellosis as the source of a patient's disease. The best clue to diagnose the invasion of this bio-weapon is the absence of any disease pathogen in lab tests, blood chemistry and tissue cultures.

There is no cure for the crystalline invader, but there is treatment. The treatment is vitamin therapy combined with eating very clean food containing no pesticides or hormones, and eating a diet that does not allow any preservatives, additives, or refined products, no drugs and no alcohol. This is a detoxification program.

A great deal has been written about this mycoplasma pathogen, but you are not going to read about it unless you know where to look for it. I knew nothing about this until I began to research Ebola as a bio-weapon. The reason we do not know about these bio-weapons is that we were never intended to know. Crystalline Brucellosis production was a top secret military operation and we can thank only the whistle blowers for finally telling us what we have paid for in tax dollars and poor health.

Recently I wrote about germ warfare (bioterrorism) as related to Ebola. There is another aspect to bio-weapons (biological weapons) most of us have never heard of, but I ran across it while researching bioterrorism. I am sorry to say you are probably already infected, but there is a way to fight the infection.

The infection is caused by a crystalline agent that was manufactured from Brucellosis, a disease common to cattle, which is generally prevented in humans by pasteurizing milk. In its natural state, Brucellosis is a cell much like other cells, except it is now a crystalline mycoplasma cell, meaning it has no cell walls and feeds off host cells it invades. When it

Polar bears are safe

This is the season to talk about the North Pole. NASA satellites fly over it every day and NASA is pleased to report that Arctic ice is growing in size this year, right on schedule. NASA stated the Arctic ice is following an average pattern, and there is more ice this year than in the years 2006 and 2012 when the ice was at minimum expanse.

To date, only two relatively small areas are still open, one near the Bering Strait and one on the Hudson Bay side. Ice is forming at an average rate between the Arctic islands and ice is filling in

between Baffin Island and Greenland at an average rate. There is little open water on the east side of the Arctic, most of it located to the north of Hudson Bay.

In the Antarctic, the penguins had farther to walk on their trek to the sea this year as Antarctic ice expanded a great deal. Now that summer has arrived in the southern hemisphere, much of this ice should melt, but scientists are watching it carefully to see just how much melts and whether the ice will expand even more when winter sets in next May.

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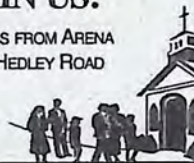

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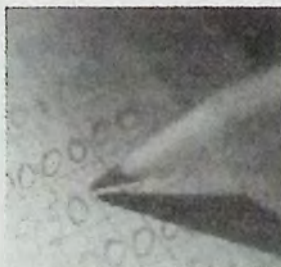
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RDOS seeks quotes

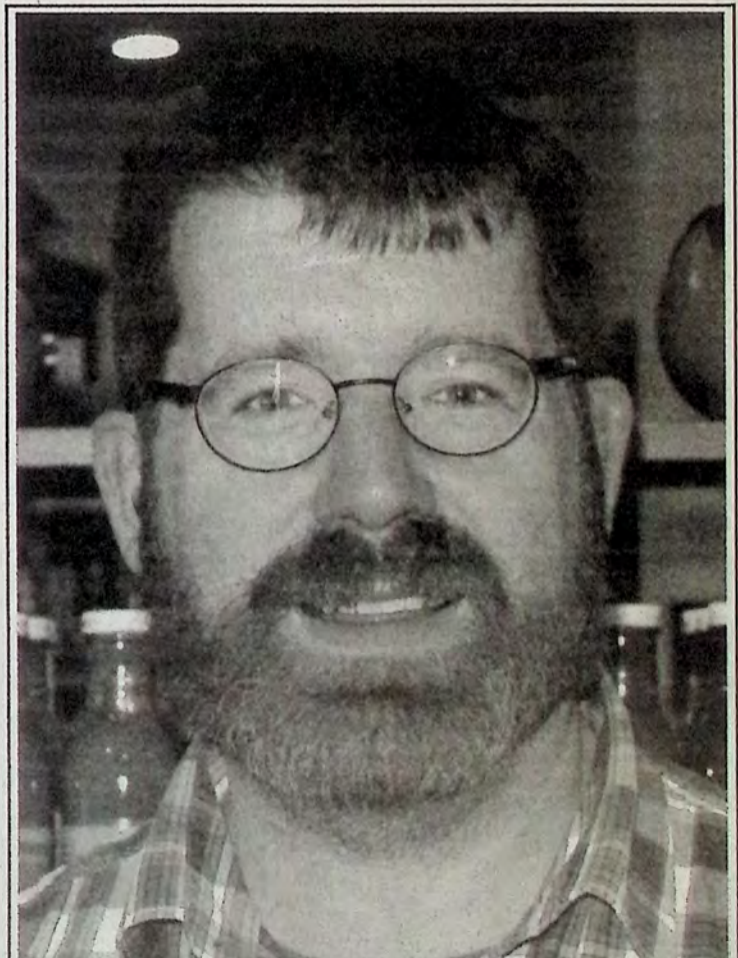

Beat Christmas Guilt

The Black Friday shopping day may have caused depression in some people. Some people feel guilty that they cannot give big luxurious presents, and others feel guilty about spending too much on a credit card, knowing, deep down, the bargain price will be eaten up in credit card interest rates.

There is a growing movement in North America to change Black Friday to Green Friday, in the interest of health and well-being. Green Friday does not mean you should not go shopping if you want to, but you should shop for only those things you really need, or for those Christmas gifts that will make a real difference in the life of the person receiving the gift. Plan ahead to how you will feel in January. Will you feel guilty and depressed about too much debt, or will you feel happy that you made others happy?



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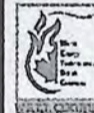

Posse split weekend games

.....continued from Page 2 in the K-12 and postsecondary sectors. And third, it improves adult upgrading grants to support those in need of assistance."

The Minister adds, "High school is free, but further upgrading is not. I think it is reasonable to expect adults who've already graduated to contribute to these costs."

BACKGROUND

Keeping adult upgrading courses sustainable; supporting low-income students Grants: Upfront, non-repayable grants are available for low-income students attending adult upgrading courses, including ESL, at public post-secondary institutions. Funding applications are available online at StudentAid BC or through public post-secondary institutions. Applications are made directly to the institution.

High school: The program changes will allow the Ministry of Education to refocus \$9 million toward its primary objectives: protecting and improving educational programs for school-aged students and adults working toward a B.C. Dogwood Diploma. The ministry will continue to provide funding for the delivery of 26 basic, introductory courses. Districts report that graduated adults enrolled in these basic courses are often non-English speaking immigrants seeking a path to further training or better integration into the B.C. workforce.

There was no funding for graduated adults prior to 2008. School districts

may continue to deliver upgrading courses to graduated adults on a cost-recovery basis. In 2013-14, 58 school districts delivered 18,100 upgrading courses to 15,000 graduated adults and 31 districts delivered 6,800 basic, introductory courses to 6,000 graduated adults.

Post-secondary: In 2008, the Ministry of Advanced Education provided \$6.9 million in base funding to the public post-secondary system for tuition-free delivery of upgrading courses. Over the past six years, delivery costs have increased and institutions are indicating it is no longer sustainable to deliver these

courses on a tuition-free basis.

ESL has been tuition-free only since April 1, 2012. This was made possible through funding from the Canada-BC Immigration Agreement. Since then, Citizenship and Immigration Canada announced it would move to a new model for the delivery of ESL training effective April 1, 2014, and it would no longer support the tuition-free policy at B.C. public post-secondary institutions. In 2013-14, 18 public post-secondary institutions delivered adult upgrading courses to 25,000 students and 17 public post-secondary institutions delivered ESL to about 10,000 students. - submitted

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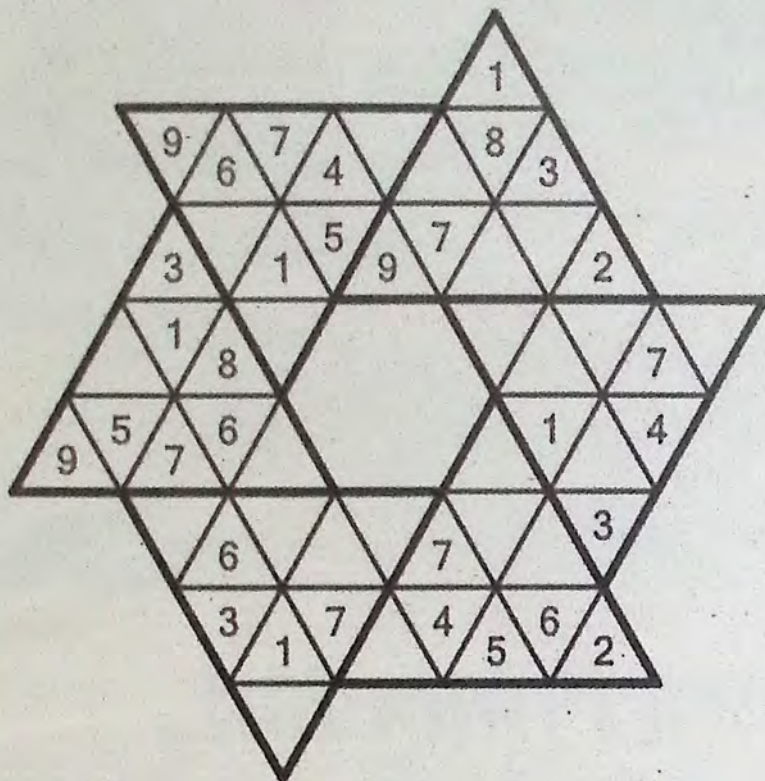

HOSHI SUDOKU - About The Puzzle

Sudoku - also known as "Number Place" - is a logic-based, combinatorial number-placement puzzle. The aim of Sudoku is to enter a number from 1 through 9 in each cell of a grid, most frequently a 9x9 grid made up of 3x3 subgrids. Each row, column and region must contain only one instance of each number. This Sudoku variant is called "Hoshi Sudoku". It contains six large triangles. The numbers 1 to 9 must be placed into the cells of each large triangle. Every line of any length - even uncontinuous - must contain every number not more than once.

Saving Downtown Princeton...

...An Ongoing Series by George Elliott

This week I am going to shift gears a bit and take a look at one local service that is vital to the community.

You may not know it but the Town of Princeton landfill site is a very important factor in keeping the local economy humming. Imagine dirty streets filled with blowing trash and garbage cans overflowing on streets and in local neighbourhoods. We are so lucky to have regular garbage and recycle pick up at the curb in our community. In addition to that, we have an extremely well organized landfill site that accepts recycled material. Add to that the local bottle depot that also takes recyclables of what I would

call office-related products (light bulbs, computers and a lot more) and you start to get the picture that there exists a team of operators that have done a lot to keep our environment cleaner than many other communities far larger than Princeton.

When I first moved here in 1986 I was impressed with the efforts of a very small group of dedicated residents who were operating the Princeton Recycling Depot and smile when I see that their original building still stands at the current landfill site.

What has also impressed me is how careful many of my neighbours are in separating their

garbage from recyclables weekly for curbside pick up. I'll admit that I have never really considered myself 'green' having been raised in an era where we used a backyard burn barrel for a lot of things in Kelowna and I carried that tradition on to my home here the first few years I had my own home.

I give Brenda credit for all the separating but I do notice a difference. We barely have a half full garbage bag of garbage a week and that's not because we eat out all the time (we rarely eat anywhere but at home or work) but because of the act of separating for recycle.

Let me get back to the Princeton Landfill Site.

If the last free dump day weekend is any indication, we aren't the only ones recycling in the area. Stats released by the landfill operator indicated 347 vehicles passed through their gates on the Saturday with another 302 vehicles the following day.

Out of those loads there were 52 refrigerators, 98 mattresses, 9 hide-a-beds, four 100-pound propane tanks and 37 ten-pound propane tanks delivered to the site.

We took advantage of the no fee weekend and made a few trips with items that the garbage man would not pick up and were slowly filling up a corner of our yard. Just like us, you were probably doing the same thing and since we don't own a pickup truck, free dump days are valuable to us as we gather up whatever we've collected for such an occasion and get rid of it all in a single afternoon.

What I like about it is that when almost 650 other vehicle loads are combined with ours, it does a lot to clean up the streets and yards of our cute little town.

How does this save downtown Princeton?

I'm not sure about you, but when I travel to a different community I see certain things. One of my obser-

vations is usually how neat and tidy the downtown core is. Sure, there's going to be some flying paper but how clean the streets are says a bit about the civic pride of the community.

You can argue that town crews are hired to take care of those things, but what about garbage bins behind businesses and on private property? If you see a lot of junk lying around, that should be a sign of bigger problems.

With the combined efforts of Princeton Town Crew and private contractors picking up or collecting garbage and all things recyclable, it's a sign that we care about our community and hopefully visitors to the area pick up on that.

It must be working, as whenever a tourist stops in our office the usual comment is something about how cute or quaint our town is. Never have I heard someone say that the downtown looked dirty - because it rarely does.

Climate Change And Skeptics - Part 2

In Part I of this column, I attempted to present overwhelming evidence that human activities are affecting global climate. The inter-governmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) is composed of over 2,000 atmospheric scientists from every major country. In 2001, the IPCC stated unequivocally that human activities are having detectable effects on the Earth's climate, on the atmosphere and the Earth's water.

Robin M. Mills is a graduate of Cambridge University and has worked for more than a decade in the fossil fuel industry, in petroleum geology and economics for Shell and for the Dubai government. Mills published Capturing Carbon: The New Weapon in the War against Climate Change? Columbia University Press, New York. 2011. In it he states, "Vested interests, certain big businesses, right-wing ideologues, self-appointed 'experts' in the media, ignorant or self-interested politicians, and scientists willing to prostitute themselves to the highest bidder, continue to repeat egregious falsehoods, objections to the idea of anthropogenic global warming that have been repeatedly demolished by science. They cloud the issue, literally, with propaganda masquerading as research. Many in the media, always in search of a

controversy, help to fan the flames."

However, whether global climatic change is real or is a hoax is proving to be immaterial. If global climatic change is caused primarily by the combustion of fossil fuels and fossil fuels are finite resources, then at some point fossil fuel depletion will render further fossil fuel consumption uneconomic. In other words, and we see this every day at the gas pumps, the price of fossil fuels is going to rise as the cost of recovering what remains of this finite resource declines. At the same time that fossil fuel prices have risen, the cost of renewable energy has declined to the point where many types of renewable energy cost less than fossil fuels.

A report published in Science in 2001 compared the capital cost of building a coal-fired and a wind-powered electric plant of equal output. Capital costs were equal. However, the operating cost for a wind-powered plant was substantially lower because no coal mining, no coal crushing, no coal cleaning, no coal transportation, and no air pollution control is required for a wind-power plant. Since 2001, the efficiency and economies of scale have significantly further lowered the cost of wind energy. Since 2001, what has happened to the price of fossil fuels?

A paper published in Scientific American in November, 2009 described how solar, wind and hydro electricity could supply all the world's energy needs within thirty years at a lower cost and with more reliability than conventional energy sources.

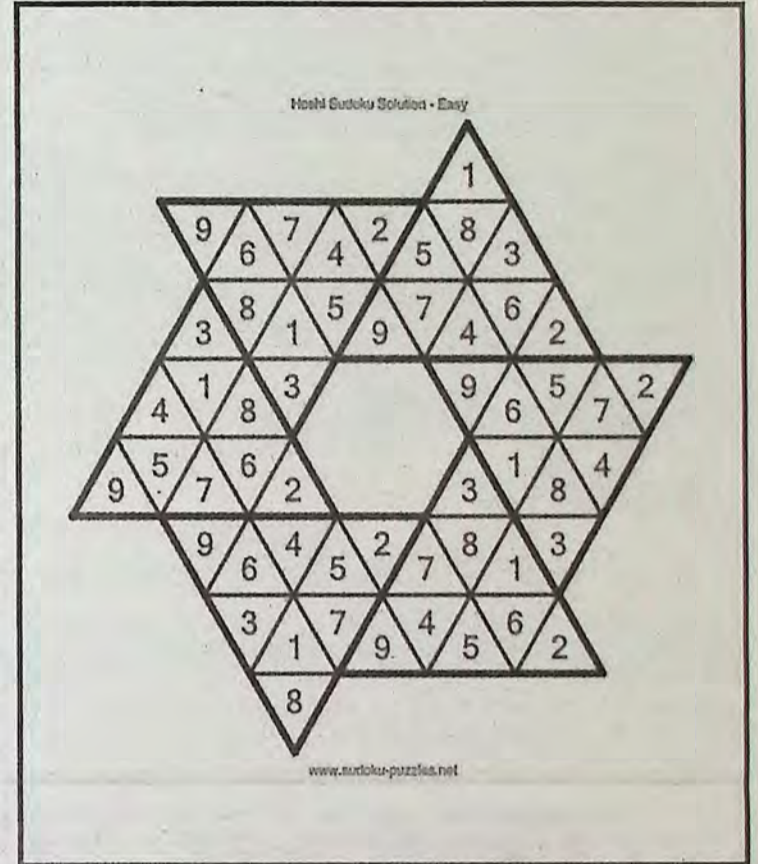
The transition to renewable energy has started. Investing in fossil fuels or fossil fuel technologies today is as wise as it was to invest in clipper ships in the early days of steamers or in typewriters in the early days of computers. The fossil fuel era is winding down. If we build those pipelines, what will they be used for ten years from now?

The NDP rejects the claim of a fundamental contradiction between environmental health and economic growth. Developing green energy industries is an opportunity for a dynamic new era of job creation, building a competitive advantage for Canada in environmental technologies and practices, which in turn help foster innovations in manufacturing. Reshaping energy policy for the 21st century means moving away from fossil-fuel dependence toward a green energy future by investing in solar, wind, wave, and geothermal sources, working with provinces and territories to share clean energy; and ensuring energy conservation in transportation and building methods.

We can make Canada an environmental leader on the world stage by honouring treaty obligations, incorporating strong environmental standards in trade agreements and

ensuring Canadian companies operating here at home and abroad are held to standards and practices that reduce their footprint and leave local ecosystems in good health.

Own the seed, own the world

There has been a debate raging in Canada's Parliament over Bill C-18. It is a Bill presented by the Conservatives in 2013, and was debated on second reading. Bill C-18 has received little major media coverage despite the fact it affects all of us and runs counter to the environmental and social thinking of the majority of aware people in our nation and the rest of the world. The reason this Bill is not headline news is because it is the future of agriculture under discussion, and agricul-

ture is not considered 'hot' news.

The BC Cattlemen's Association produced bumper stickers years ago that stated, "If you eat, you're involved in agriculture." Bill C-18, if passed as it is, will affect what you and your children will eat in the future.

All Members of Parliament agree most of the Bill is good. However, there are two parts of Bill C-18 that have received serious opposition from not only MPs, but from farmers themselves.

Bill C-18 says farmers have the 'privilege' of saving and storing

seed. The New Democrats want it amended to make it a right of farmers. This is critically important because Bill C-18 is about who can own and sell seed. Seed companies are in business to sell seed, and what they want to do is own the genetic make-up of particular seeds. It is like a patent on seeds. Anyone wanting to use that seed must buy from the owner, and anyone who is found to have produced crops containing that particular gene combination can be fined. This has gone on in the United States for several years and has resulted in the bankruptcy of many

farmers.

This Bill would enable big seed producers to 'patent' seeds as intellectual property based on some process that altered the genetic make-up of seeds produced by that company and to be used exclusively by those who bought the seed from that company. This is what genetic modification leads to: control of the seeds and who uses the seeds. If farmers cannot save their own seeds, then they are a captive market, and seed producers can charge what they like for seeds. That kind of monopoly will affect not only what farmers pay for

seed, but what everyone will pay for food.

There is another part of Bill C-18 regarding advance payment to farmers, and it has the potential of causing bankruptcy through a clawback clause if crops fail. What happens when a farmer cannot pay his debts? He declares bankruptcy, and his assets are sold. Who buys these assets? Today most of these farms are bought by major agricultural corporations, thereby causing a decrease in family farm operations.

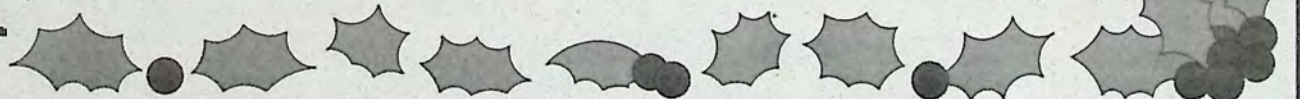

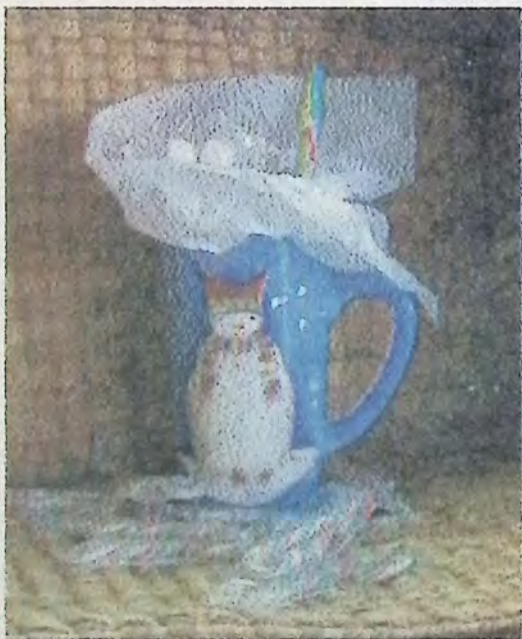
Santa was in Princeton to celebrate the annual Light-Up.
