

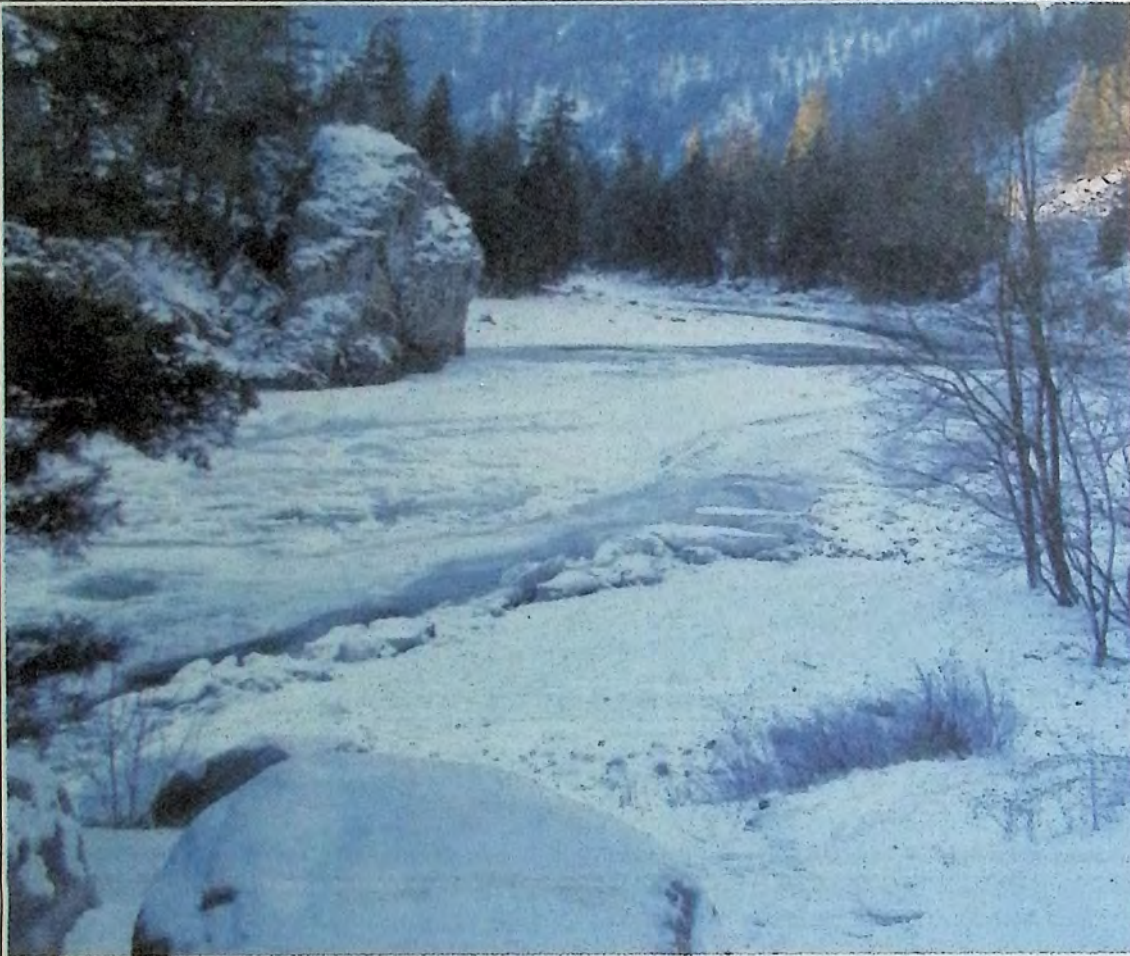

Council approves schedule

The Town of Princeton follows a schedule of convening Regular Meetings on the first and third Monday of each month, however, a few changes were recently proposed to address a series of date conflicts.

The first meeting of 2015 will not be until January 19th due to the Christmas/New Year's Holiday Break. The first meetings in July and August have been cancelled and to accommodate the 2015 UBCM Convention the September 21st

meeting will be moved to September 28th.

Committee of the Whole meetings will now be scheduled "as needed" except where notice of a special meeting is waived by unanimous vote of all Council members (in accordance with the Community Charter).

The Regular Meetings of Town Council start at 7:30 PM and are held in the Conference Room of the Princeton Regional Library on Vermilion Avenue. They are scheduled for the following dates: January 19, February 2 and 16, March 2 and 16, April 7 and 20, May 4 and 19, June 1 and 15, July 20, August 17, September 8 and 28, October 5 and 19, November 2 and 16, December 7 and 21.

Airport Select Committee Meetings are held at the Princeton Regional Airport Terminal at 4:00 PM on the last Tuesday of every second month. The 2015 meeting schedule is as follows: January 27, March 31, May 26, July 28, September 29 and November 24.

Although the regular monthly meetings of Town Council are open to the public, presentations to elected officials must be prearranged in order to be included in the agenda of an upcoming meeting. Details can be found at the Town of Princeton website www.princeton.ca.

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2014 - A Year In Review

The big news last January was attacks by cougars at Osprey and Link Lakes during the Christmas holidays. The other news was what a mild December we had enjoyed. There was little snow on the ground in Princeton. A snowstorm arrived on January 3, but was gone in a day. Nobody complained. We waited until mid-February for a real snowfall, and we had our customary win-

ter snow in the last two weeks of that month. Everybody complained.

Concern about store closures in downtown Princeton began, and continued throughout the year. It seemed nothing could bring downtown Princeton to life. In January, the News Leader began a series called Saving Downtown Princeton, but the downtown

remained unsaved by the end of the year.

Princeton Hospital Auxiliary paid off the Highway Rescue truck, a much appreciated donation and a tribute to the work done by the women who maintain the Thrift Store.

Health care in Princeton remained a top concern of the public. Nationwide, medicare was a top concern

when, in April, the Harper government turned its back on renewing the Canada Health Accord. Rallies and protests were seen in Princeton, and the rest of Canada, but the Health Accord was ignored in the House of Commons. The matter remains unresolved, despite the fact that a survey showed 86 percent of Canadians want the Health Accord in place, and a guarantee of medicare remaining a Canadian institution.

The Princeton Posse had a very good season last year, although they did not win the play-offs.

In January, a Coalmont resident, well-known in the Princeton area, received the Governor General's Caring Canadian Award. Jody Woodford, Tulameen Fire Chief, qualified as a citizen who "made a significant, sustained, unpaid contribution to their community". Those who know her recognize she has done more than her share of

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RCMP 2014 Year in Review

RCMP Sgt. Barry Kennedy of the Princeton Detachment presented a year in review at the December 15th regular meeting of Princeton Town Council.

There was a total of 1,939 calls for service between January 1st to December 1st which is up 61 calls, or 5 calls per month from the 1,878 recorded for the same time frame in 2013.

"We've been quite busy," Sgt. Kennedy stated.

"Our overall charges have gone from 80 in 2013 to 88 in 2014 and our Criminal Code charges have decreased from 67 to 56 respectively, a decrease of 19%."

As for calls within the Town of Princeton there were 897, up from 883 the previous year with "a total of 31 Criminal Code charges within the Town limits for this year."

Sgt. Kennedy pointed out that the Victim Services Unit has been in operation since September 2014.

"In that time, 18 files were generated for which a service was provided."

Sgt. Kennedy went on to praise the program stating, "They have been

vital in providing support to victims of crime, providing a presence in court in a measure of support and are a huge asset to the community."

The community priorities of Traffic Safety, Community Safety and Substance Abuse have been addressed over the past year with a combination of education and enforcement where Sgt. Kennedy pointed out that, "If we can educate first and enforce later" results will continue to be positive.

"We continue to have a presence on our highways and school zones and we continue to utilize South Okanagan District Traffic Services to assist in providing a police presence."

Over the past year there has been one vehicle impounded for excessive speeding with a total of 141 collisions reported with 45 resulting in personal injury and two of which were fatal accidents. This is up from 2013 that saw 117 accidents with 50 injuries and two fatalities.

Sgt. Kennedy added, "This year, we were diligent in targeting drug related offences and impaired driving."

Stats show a total of three check stop programs conducted over the year, which resulted in 17 impaired

drivers being removed from the streets during those campaigns. There were also 13 drug related

offences identified with a large marijuana grow-op identified and investigated.

Property values increase for 2015

Owners of more than 68,000 properties throughout the South Okanagan and Similkameen can expect to receive their 2015 assessment notices in the next few days.

"Most homes in the South Okanagan are worth more in value compared to last year's assessment roll," said Jason Sowinski, Deputy Assessor.

"Most home owners in the South Okanagan and Similkameen will see modest changes in the -5% to +5% range."

Overall, the South Okanagan and Similkameen Assessment Roll increased from \$19,516,491,502 last year to \$19,773,585,279 this year. Of note, a total of almost \$235,000,000 was added through subdivisions, rezoning and new construction.

The examples below demonstrate local market trends for residential properties by a geographic area; trends are affected by many variables.

In addition, owners of commercial and industrial properties in the South Okanagan and Similkameen will see changes ranging from -5% to +10%.

"Property owners who feel that their property assessment does not reflect market value as of July 1, 2014 or see incorrect information on their notice should contact BC Assessment as indicated on their notice as soon as possible in January," said Sowinski.

"If a property owner is still concerned about their assessment after speaking to one of our appraisers, they may submit a Notice of Complaint (Appeal) by February 2, for an independent review by a Property Assessment Review Panel," added Sowinski.

The Property Assessment Review Panels, independent of BC Assessment, are appointed annually by the Ministry of Community, Sport and Cultural Development, and typically meet between February 1 and March 15 to hear formal complaints.

The Okanagan and Similkameen Region assessment office is located at 300-1631 Dickson Avenue in Kelowna. During the month of January, office hours are 8:30 AM to 5:00 PM, Monday to Friday. Town renews golf course lease

The Town of Princeton renewed the five-year agreement with Princeton Golf Club Society for the lands known as the Princeton Golf Course at the December 16th regular monthly meeting of Town Council. The existing lease expired May 31, 2014.

The Golf Club Society has operated the facility since its inception,

and leased the land from the Town since its title was granted to the Town in 1993.

"The lease yields an annual payment of five dollars," states Director of Finance Shirley McMahon in her report to Council.

Town Council agreed to renew the five-year lease "in accordance with the terms of the agreement."

The perceived lack of action by our elected officials led to the formation of two distinct deer committee action groups in Princeton's online social network. One is in favour of a deer cull stating they are trying to find a solution to what they are identifying as an "overpopulation issue plaguing the Town" with a goal of finding balance between people pushing for an "economical kill cull" and other looking for a "humane relocation program."

Another group is flat out against a cull but is in place stating, "as a community we need to come up with a better solution."

If membership is any indication, the cull group is trailing the "deer protection" group 452 to 150.

I did consider starting my own "Save the Marmots" group at one time but I figured it would go sideways as most online groups do when those in favour of something start fighting with those against something else and I didn't want to stress out about marmots any more than I already do. Nor did I want to have to police the online bullying that I thought would result from those who love the cute little marmots getting ganged up on by those who would rather poison or drown the chubby little things.

It's the same thing that has happened with just about any issue that draws together people who are passionate about the subject but then starts tearing apart at the seams when a handful of people start to push to get their way.

Assessment Roll

- Total number of properties on the 2015 roll is 1,974,120, an approximate 0.98% increase from 2014.
- Total value of real estate on the 2015 roll is \$1,206,152,088,777 (\$1.2 trillion), a 5.84% increase from 2014.
- Total amount of 'non-market change', including new construction and development: approximately \$18.69 billion, an increase of 6.54% from the 2014 roll of \$17.54 billion.
- In B.C., approximately 87.74% of all properties are classified with some residential (Class 1) component. This equates to over \$912 billion (\$912,653,565,545) of the value on the total provincial roll.
- Over 98% (99.1% in 2014) of property owners typically accept their property assessment without proceeding to a formal, independent

review of their assessment.

- Assessments are the estimate of a property's market value as of July 1, 2014 and physical condition as of October 31, 2014. This common valuation date ensures there is an equitable property assessment base for property taxation.
- Changes in property assessments reflect movement in the local real estate market and can vary greatly from property to property. When estimating a property's market value, BC Assessment's professional appraisers analyze current sales in the area, as well as considering other characteristics such as size, age, quality, condition, view and location.
- Real estate sales determine a property's value which is reported annually by BC Assessment. Local governments and other taxing authorities are responsible for property taxation and, after determining their

own budget needs this spring, will calculate property tax rates based on the assessment roll for their jurisdiction.

• BC Assessment's assessment roll provides the foundation for local and provincial taxing authorities to raise more than \$6.8 billion in property taxes each year. This revenue funds the many community services provided by local governments around the province, including the public school system.

• BC Assessment's website provides a listing of property assessments and sales to help property owners understand their property's market value and provide comparable sales information. When Did We Become Human?

About seven million years ago, our ancestors were taking their first genetic steps toward being human. At that time, they were neither ape nor us, but something in between. They walked on two legs, used primitive tools, but could not be classified as human in the way we now separate ourselves from the apes. It seems it took another six million years before genetic changes caused the first real humans to emerge.

I have been reading Richard Leakey's book *The Origins of Humankind*. I was surprised to learn what really distinguished us from the rest of the primate family was not the fact we walked on our hind legs. It was the fact that we could run! Apparently there was a skeletal change required before man could run, and that happened about 1.5 million years ago.

Two other things changed. We humans developed bigger brains.

The brain of modern man is three times larger than that of the ancient fossil ape type creatures who were our ancestors. The second change was in the way our heads sat on our necks. This change allowed the larynx and pharynx to develop in a way that gave us our ability to speak.

Imagine my surprise when I read that the 'experts' decided we did not have language until a mere 40,000 years ago! According to that reasoning, we ran around Africa, hunting, fishing, building shelters, mating, raising children, and all of those regular activities, without a language. To confuse matters more, some experts say the big brain developed because of communication skills and our increased supply of meat protein. So, if all this was going on, how were we communicating? Were we relying on body signals, grunts and other non-verbal forms of communication? Did we do this for more than a million years before we had language? I doubt it.

One of my doubts is based on the development of speech organs. That development would have been the result of efforts to communicate. The speech organs would have become increasingly refined due to the need to communicate in more specific ways than hand signals and grunts. The body adapts to change as it is required. I am sure we did not run around for a million years with the equipment for speech before we developed

language.

The examination of fossil records leaves a lot to speculation and conjecture. While the human fossils can tell us about bone structure, you cannot fossilize things such as speech.

There is a group that says humans did not develop real language until they developed real art. The oldest art is found in caves in France and Spain and dates back 40,000 years. The highly refined images of animals were done during an ice age. There is no way I can be convinced some Ice Age artist suddenly developed the artistic skills necessary to draw and paint the walls and ceilings of those caves. Artistic skills take time to develop, and I believe those skills were probably under development a long time before people retreated into deep caves during the Ice Age.

There are all kinds of theories as to why the paintings and sculptures were made. I would not be surprised to discover they were made because the artist was bored. Spend a long, cold winter indoors in the dark with nothing to do for hours, and anybody with any skills will find a way to use them just to relieve the boredom. To say it was this form of creativity that finally proves language had developed is a frivolous concept to my way of thinking.

Anyone who has worked with teaching a child to talk, or teaching a dog or horse to recognize verbal commands, knows it takes a long period of daily repetition of one or two words before the meaning of the word sinks in. Furthermore, the same word or words must be repeated. You cannot say "Come here" one day and change it to "advance to me" the next day. The key to developing a language is to have all concerned in agreement as to what a particular word or group of words means, and it has to mean the same thing every day. I believe our ancestors would not have taken a million or more years to figure out how to agree on a particular name for a particular thing or a particular action.

Our ancestors of 1.5 million years ago would have been able to figure out words to express run, eat, a location, a food source such as a plant or animal, and numerous other daily language requirements. As soon as a word was repeated, a thing was named. How we string

December weather: a look at records

December 2014 was not a record-making month for either warm or cold temperatures, nor for snow levels. For the most snow, we need to look back to 1949, when 60 cm. fell in one day, 1955 and 1990. For warmest temperatures, Christmas 1980 set the record for three days at 11.5 degrees. Those who remember that Christmas will remember flooding all over British Columbia and travelers stranded due to washed out roads and bridges. Earlier records for higher temperatures in December were set in 1936 and 1939 at 6 and 9, and in 1942 at 11 degrees.

Records for cold in December were set in 1990 at -34.8, and in 1964 at -33.9, but the coldest temperature on record was -42.8 on December 30 in 1968, with a close second at -35.9 in 1983, when

there were several days in a row at -35 degrees. In 1971, there was a day at -35 degrees between Christmas and New Year's day.

Generally, this past December was moderate. The unusual feature for much of the month was recurring rain showers during a 10 day period before Christmas.

The Christmas holiday season hit Europe hard. Although snow in England was just around 8 cm., people were without power and highway traffic came to a standstill. It was much the same in France, but worse in southern Germany and Switzerland, where more snow fell.

Moscow's traffic crawled along slowly as snow fell there all one day, but Russians are accustomed to snow and simply coped with it as usual.

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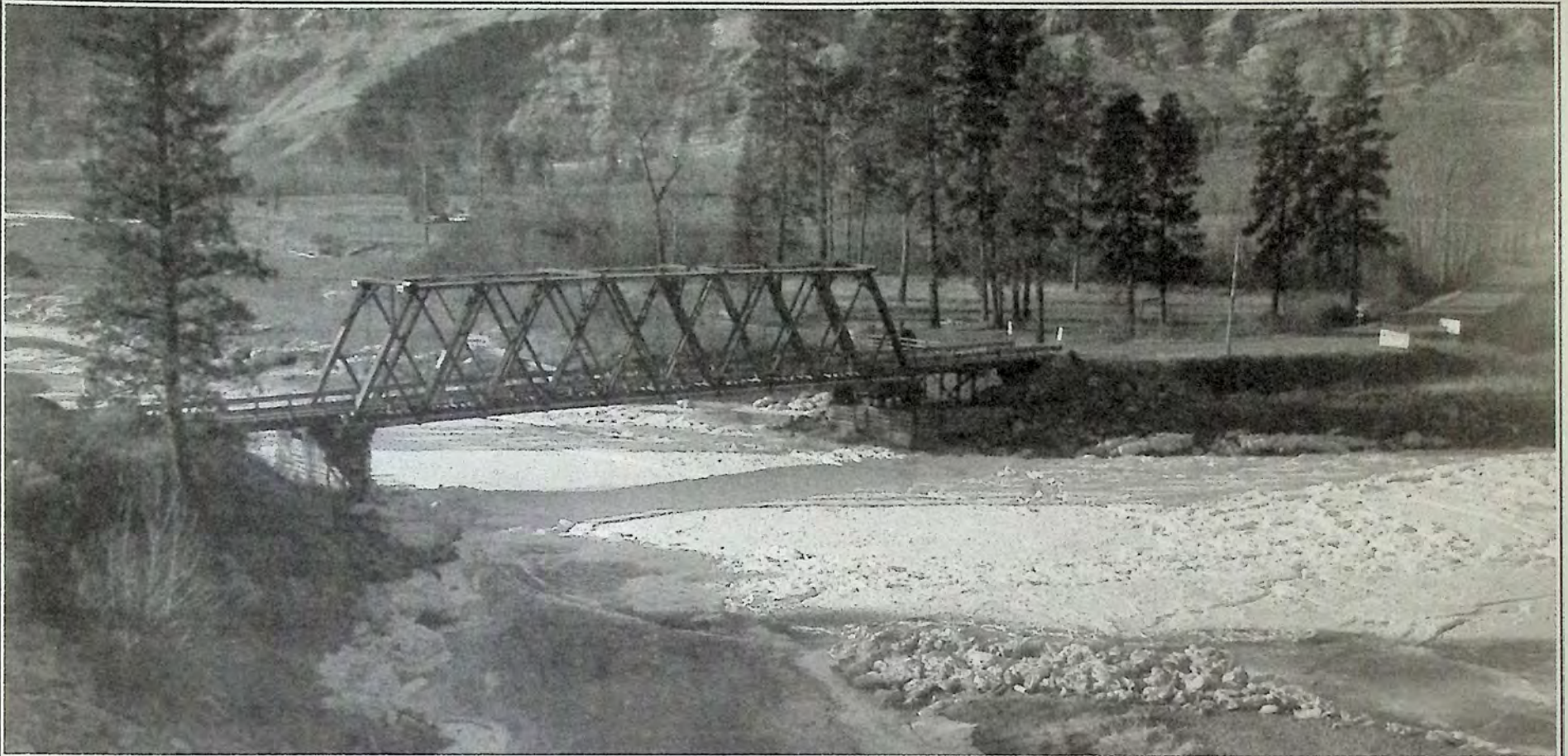

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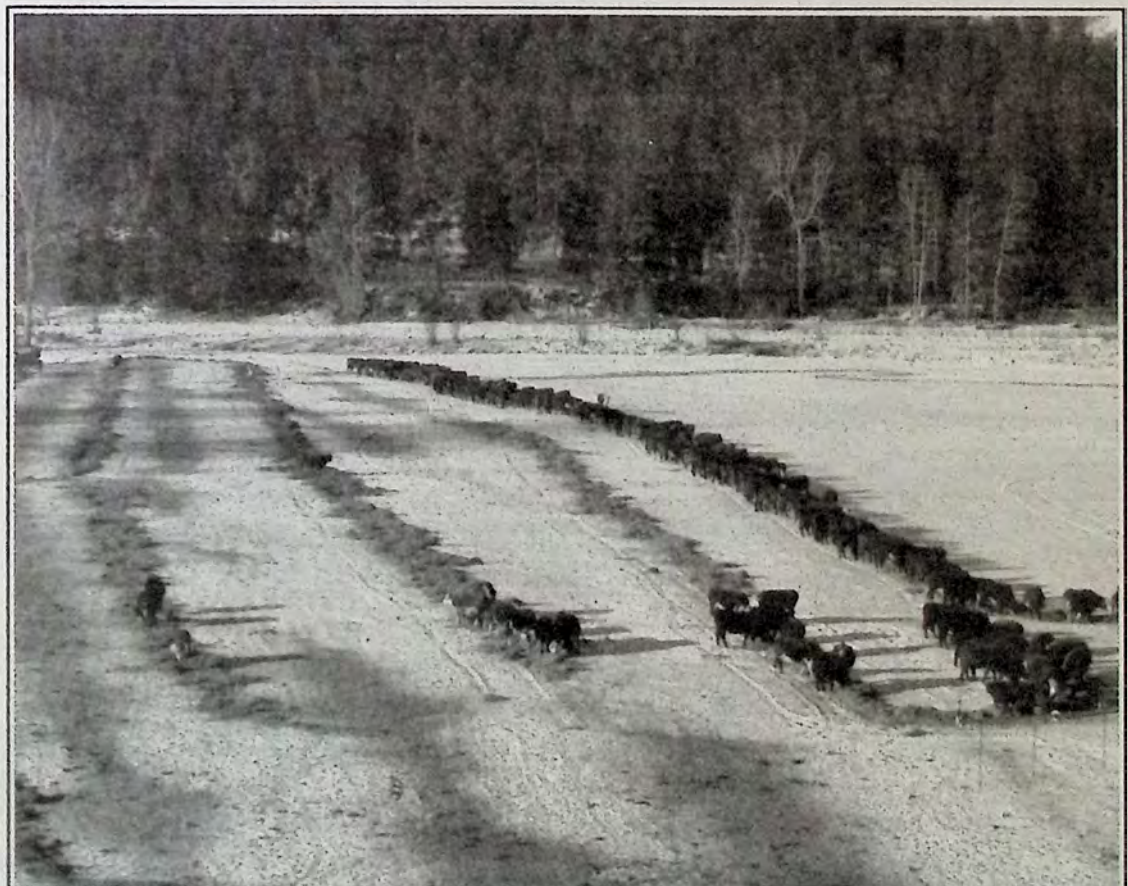
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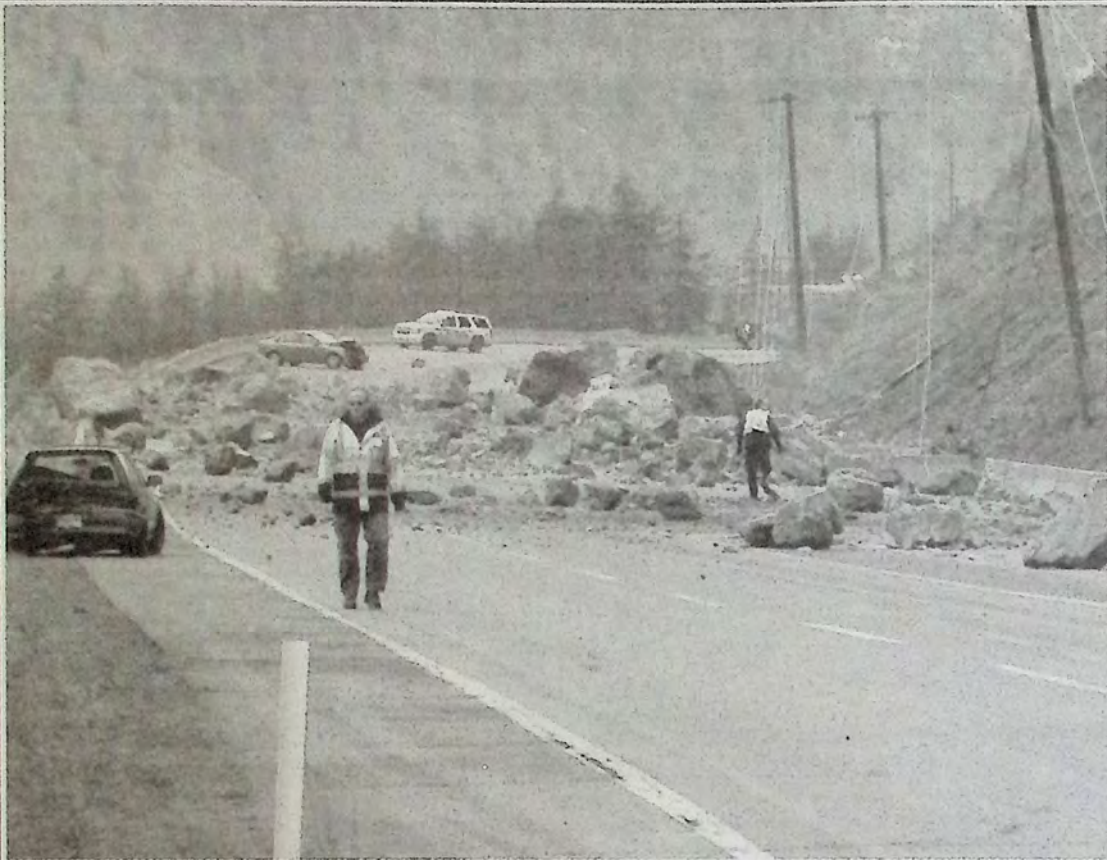

January ended with a major news story for the Similkameen: on January 27, a slide near Keremeos closed highway 3. Although three

motorists were caught in the slide, nobody was killed. In December, a second slide in the same location closed the road again. Again, vehicles were damaged but nobody was killed. Local residents want BC Highways department to fix the

problem in 2015.

Princeton area residents celebrated Family Day in early February. The theme was 'fun in the snow' at China Ridge.

Jason Earle resigned his position on Town Council at the end of January. Council agreed to leave the position open until the 2014 municipal elections. This saved taxpayers money, but the remaining members of Town Council had to shoulder Earle's responsibilities for the rest of the year. One of the matters Earle had been responsible for was to find a solution to the deer problem. That problem remained unsolved.

Murder is an infrequent event in Princeton, but murders hit the headlines in the News Leader in 2014. Roger Badour, who shot and killed Gisele Duckham in her Osprey Lake area home in 2012, was sentenced to life in prison. In the same edition of the News Leader, February 18, front page headlines noted the upcoming preliminary hearing for John Koopmans charged with the second degree murder of Keith Wharton and Rose Fox and attempted murder of another person in shootings on March 20, 2013, at a property located on Old Hedley Road. We will hear about Koopmans again.

There was another shocking crime in a local fast food restaurant in February when a man wielding a knife stabbed two women, not fatally, and then tried to cut his own throat.

Princeton Curling Club continued its tradition of hosting successful tournaments, and the figure skating club continued to train young people to perform on the ice. Minor hockey coaches and parents worked hard to teach youngsters the skills required for hockey. At Princeton

Living Past 100

Eating Real Food Makes Sense

A great many things we eat today are not 'real' food. Candy is just a lump of sugar, highly refined, and manufactured in a complex process. It is not a food found in nature. Compare a candy with an orange, and you see the difference immediately. An orange is just picked from a tree and eaten as is, no refinement, no processing, nothing added. An orange is 'real' food.

Most of us do not think about digestion. We swallow food at one end and waste comes out the other, and unless we suffer from acid reflux or indigestion, we just trust our digestive systems to take out the good stuff and get rid of what we cannot use. What we forget is the fact that our digestive tract is ancient. It is a system developed over a million years. We also forget it has adapted to very few changes.

Cooked food is one of the few changes our digestive systems have adapted to. Increasingly refined foods resulting from the development of agriculture is another change most of the people of the world have adapted to. Fermentation is another very old process to which our digestive tracts have adapted.

What we do not think about is the highly complex digestive processes taking place at a molecular level. Within the digestive tract, countless enzymes, hormones and bacteria are analyzing what we swallowed and deciding what to do with it. Imagine what is going on when we offer food those enzymes, hormones and bacteria have never contacted before. What do they do with nitrites? Artificial sweeteners? Excessive sugar or too much gluten? What do they do with soybeans if they have never met soybeans before? What do they do with any number of foods they have not adapted to?

Even many 'real' foods are indigestible to many people. Peanuts, soybeans, shellfish and corn are common examples. Usually, the body rejects the food through diarrhea or vomiting, but in many cases, there is a severe allergic reaction or a serious case of indigestion.

Eating what your ancestors ate is one of the safe ways to eat well and get the best nutrition. Avoiding highly refined foods, or foods loaded with additives or toxins is good sense. Many people avoid eating genetically modified foods because our digestive tracts have not learned to recognize the altered genetic structure of the foods. Feeding the ancient digestive tract means eating real foods, foods that occur naturally and to which our digestive system has adapted.

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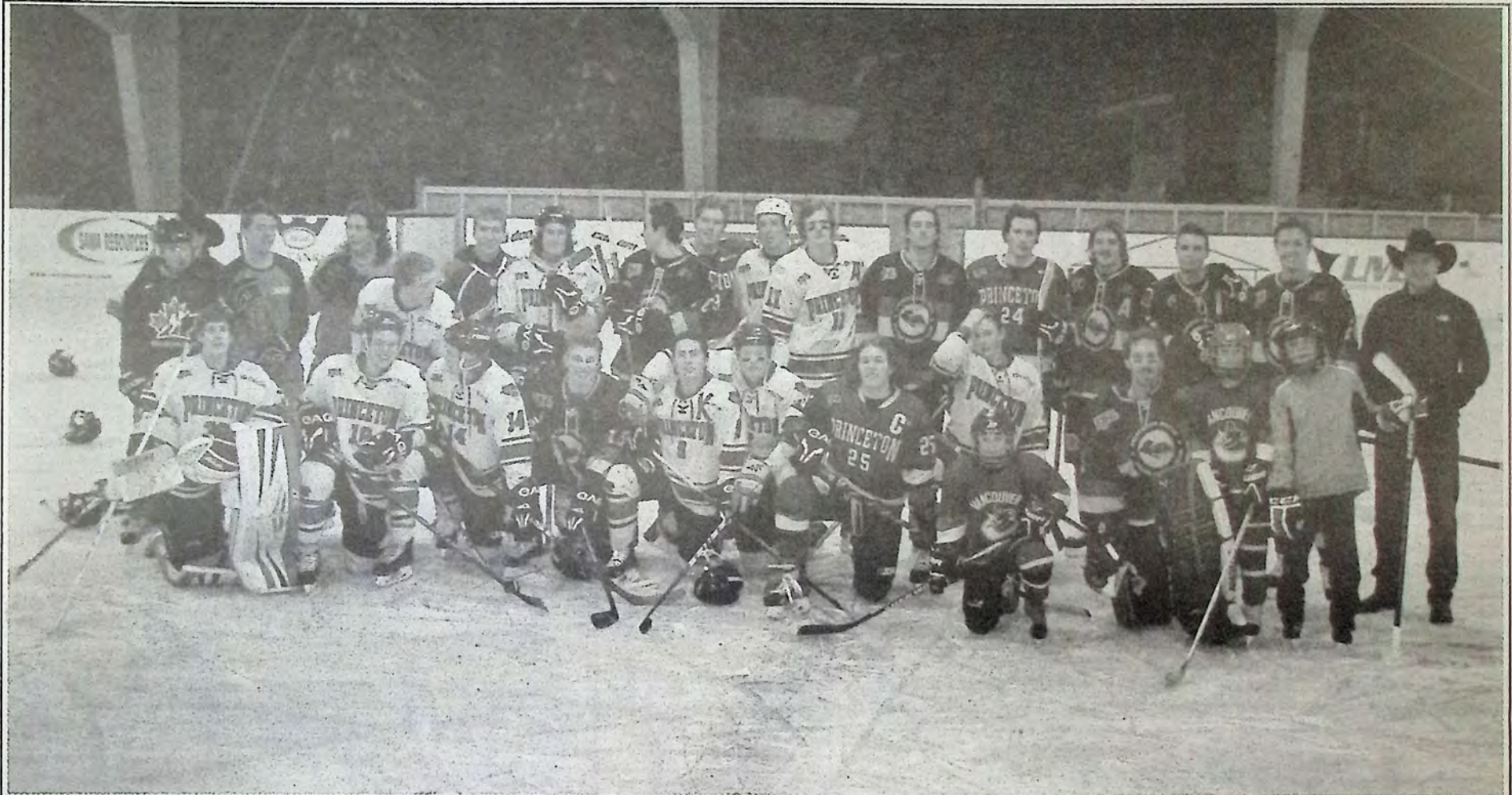

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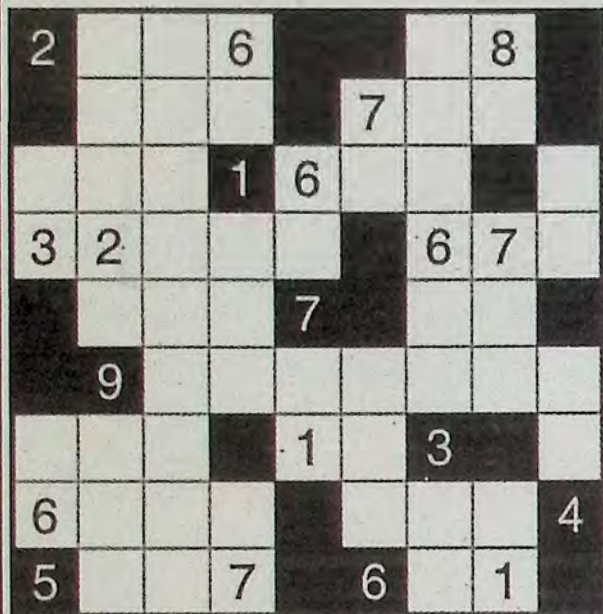

Saving Downtown Princeton...

...An Ongoing Series by George Elliott

For over a year I've been telling you how you can benefit yourself and your community by supporting local business. There are just as many reasons to support the locally owned and operated businesses that make up your downtown core as there are excuses not to.

I will be honest and state that some of those excuses are valid and truthful.

They range from lack of selection and pricing concerns to poor ser-

vice and attitude.

While I know these are not always the issues present in each and every local business, I agree that they do exist in some and that is a problem when you are trying to educate residents on the good reasons for shopping local.

So this week I want to take the information from the Princeton Chamber of Commerce I discussed before Christmas and use it as a starting point for a program I want you to consider.

To review, the Chamber says about \$72,000 was spent in local businesses according to their Passport Program that ran for only part of December. It doesn't matter how you slice it, that's a lot of local money staying in town.

There was a movement spearheading in the eastern part of the United States a few years ago. The program, which was identified as the Ten Percent Shift, came about in response to residents shopping in out-of-town communities or online for things they could have bought nearby.

The guideline is very simple and not hard to calculate as it is built around the idea that if you typically spend \$250 in groceries out of

town per month, you should try to take \$25 out of that total and spend it in a local grocery store. You aren't increasing what you spend as you will still be buying \$250 worth of groceries a month. The difference is that you will be buying just a portion of that in your own community.

The Ten Percent Shift would also apply to all your other out of town monthly purchases.

So, in other words, if your total spending for an average month is \$500 for gas, food, clothing, meals and supplies you should purposely spend \$50 of that in Princeton.

I know, many of you are already supporting local business where you can and I admit it isn't always

easy if there's an item you need but can't get in town.

In our household I would put our monthly out of town spending at under \$200 with all the rest of our monthly purchases focused on Princeton and the Similkameen. I should point out that all of these numbers would be out of disposable income and income used for staple items not counting rent, utilities and other services required to live and function.

Based on our shopping habits, it would be very easy for us to shift \$20 of our monthly \$200 out of town spending into Princeton.

It would also be very easy for you to do regardless of what your spending level is and reasons for not supporting Princeton. When you look at it, ten percent is not that much and imagine how that could help local business if we all started 'shifting' some of our spending in 2015?

Secondary School, the big sports were volleyball and basketball. Cross-country skiers had another good winter and Vermilion Forks Field Naturalists enjoyed several winter outings.

Princeton's Arts Council entertained throughout the year, beginning in February with a magic show. Their next special event was a Wheat in the Barley concert. Aboriginal Day events led into the Traditional Music Festival in August. During the spring and autumn, there were theatrical productions, and a concert in December by Foothills Brass. Princeton Community Band gave spring and winter concerts, and played on Canada Day and

Remembrance Day.

The Upper Similkameen Indian Band elected a new Band Council. Charlotte Mitchell was returned as Chief, with Mason Squakin and Carmilita Holmes as Councillors.

The long-awaited new crusher arrived at Copper Mountain Mine in March. This monster machine was the reason for highway closures on Highway 5A as the load was too wide to allow for oncoming traffic to pass.

Fire was newsworthy in the valley last year. Fire destroyed three homes in Princeton in March. A restaurant in Keremeos was seriously damaged by fire in February, and later, the old hotel and pub burned to the ground.

The former Santo's Greek restau-

rant underwent a facelift and became the new Little Creek Grill when Nick and Renee Goreas returned to Princeton. The Belaire Restaurant underwent renovations after being purchased by new owners, who changed the name to Vermilion Fork.

The Family Fair, a long tradition in Princeton, raised money once again for bursaries for students. The Grads of 2014 benefited from this event as well as from the generosity of various organizations and businesses in Princeton who gave scholarships and bursaries.

Most of Princeton's organizations carried on their activities in 2014, but there were two major losses to the community. Last spring, Princeton Lions Club folded. The Lions left a legacy of parks, structures, and great memories of raft races, duck races and pancake breakfasts. Princeton Racing Days ended the year unable to carry on due to lack of money and lack of horses. Due to cutbacks to provin-

cial support for horse racing, the horse racing industry in British Columbia has become almost a thing of the past. With the loss of these two organizations, both very much involved in making Princeton Racing Days a success, the town is left with the problem of planning a replacement event for the traditional July 1 weekend.

The Elks Lodge shut down its premises and the old Elks Hall sits with its doors locked.

A dam on the Similkameen was brought forward again by FortisBC. It was a controversial topic, with Washington State very much desiring a dam and some environmentalists opposed. However, the plan fell through before the end of the year.

The school district saw a major change as Dr. Robert Peacock retired and Steve McNiven was hired to fill his shoes. In the autumn elections, Princeton's trustees were re-elected by acclamation, with Gordon Comeau once again elected as Chair.

Fire Chief Eric Gregson was presented with Long Service Awards from the Ministry of Justice, the Governor General and the Town of Princeton. Awards for community service were presented to Dawn Johnson, Evelyn McCallum, and to the late Carol Ruoss. These volunteers had served in a variety of local organizations.

Princeton Rodeo Club hosted its annual rodeo in May, with rain once again spoiling the after-rodeo fun and cool winds spoiling the comfort of the spectators. The Rodeo Club decided to seek warmer weather and chose June 13 and 14 for the 2015 rodeo.

Dyke improvements were an ongoing project last spring. The snow pack was high last spring, but there was a slow spring run-off and the valley escaped major flooding.

Princeton Garden Club published a book about gardening in Princeton, the first of its kind. The project was a major achievement for the club,continued on Page 19

Princeton-Summerland Road. People rushed to evacuate livestock from the area, and to prepare to leave their homes. Fortunately, the fire was contained without any property or livestock destroyed. A second fire broke out slightly north

of Princeton on the flanks of Miner Mountain. It was predominantly a grass fire and did little damage. In fact, it may have done some good as new grass soon provided a startling green landscape alongside the grass burned by summer sun.

The annual Fall Fair was 49 years old in 2014. Successful for so many years, it now faces its fiftieth anniversary.

Autumn brought elections. Bob Coyne replaced Brad Hope as Area H Director, after winning over two others. .....continued from Page 16 How does this save downtown Princeton?

Based on a minor adjustment in personal spending, using the ten percent rule, there is no reason why this can't help local business.

If we use round figures of a trading area population of 5,000 people and if each of them spent an average ten percent of their out of town spending in Princeton, it becomes a significant change.

Assuming the area population

spends \$250 monthly per person outside the local economy, ten percent of that would be \$25 a month. Multiply that by 5,000 and there could be an additional \$125,000 spent in downtown Princeton PER MONTH! That's on top of what local residents are already putting into the economy by their normal downtown shopping habits.

If you don't think that won't change things in the community, as well as attract new business, than I have no idea what will.
