## Grant writers take note!

Alex Atamanenko, MP for BC Southern Interior reminds eligible local employers and organizations that the deadline for submitting applications to Canada Summer Jobs 2015 (CSJ) is January 30, 2015.

"The deadline is approaching," said Atamanenko.

"I encourage eligible employers to consider applying for CSJ funding and hire a student for next summer."

The CSJ initiative helps to create job opportunities for students aged 15 to 30 years in their communities. Funding is provided to not-for-profit organizations, public sector employers and small businesses to assist with hiring students who will be returning to full-time studies in the next school year. Assessment of the BC Southern Interior applica-

tions are guided by local priorities, employment factors within the constituency, on the job mentoring and career related experience provided, provision of sufficient salary and other criteria.

This year Canada Summer Jobs application forms were available online as of December 1, 2014 and must be submitted by January 30, 2015.

## Policy changes may hurt resident hunters

Sweeping changes to B.C.'s Wildlife Allocation Policy proposed by the Guide-Outfitters Association of B.C. would dramatically reduce residents' access to wild game and increase the number of licences sold to foreign big game trophy hunters, according to the B.C. Wildlife Federation (BCWF). This proposed change could result in 5,000 fewer hunting licences going to B.C. residents.

Most jurisdictions across North America give foreign hunters 5-10 percent of the harvestable surplus of wildlife. The changes proposed by the Guide-Outfitters Association of B.C., which represents 210 outfitters who have exclusive rights to guide trophy hunters, would give foreign hunters up to 40 percent of specific game species such as mountain sheep, goat and bear, and up to 25

percent of moose and elk.

In 2007 a new Wildlife Allocation Policy was established in B.C. in an attempt to fairly determine the number of hunting licences allocated, which gave foreign hunters the best share of the available hunting licences. Even then, the Guide-Outfitters Association of B.C. started vigorously lobbying the government to amend or scrap the new wildlife policy.

"Proposed changes to the Wildlife Allocation Policy are inconsistent with standard practices in other jurisdictions across Canada and in the United States," said George Wilson, President of the B.C. Wildlife Federation, which represents 45,000 conservationists.

"There is no justification for these changes and they are not supported by B.C.'s resident hunters."

The process is explained by Ken Sward of Keremeos who is the BC Wildlife Federation Okanagan Region President, "In British Columbia, Resident Hunters often rely on a Limited Entry Hunting style, which means a hunter puts in their name to a 'pot' and if their number is drawn, they are then eligible to hunt for a specific animal, be it a moose, sheep, goat or other big game animal."

He says, "There are many reasons for this with the primary one being conservation. It is something that Resident Hunters often wait many years for. For many, the biggest, or

worst, day of the year is when the letter comes in the mail and one discovers if you have been 'drawn' for a hunt, or not."

Sward adds, "The odds of receiving a 'draw' for a hunt will go down for nearly every Resident Hunter who applies for a Limited Entry Hunt in light of the Provincial Government's recent decision."

Over the last 10 years, the number of B.C. hunters has grown by 20 percent, increasing from 84,000 to over 102,000.

Over the same period, the number of foreign trophy hunters coming to B.C. has dropped from 6,500 to 4,500, a decline of 30 percent.

"The initiative to further limit

# New committee forms for Similkameen

Okanagan and Similkameen.

The Council is made up of 50 representatives from community organizations that provide services to or have an interest in the integration of newcomers. Members have been drawn from all levels of government, immigrant serving agencies, public institutions, regional employment networks, employers, local associations and key community stakeholders.

The Council is currently developing a coordinated, comprehensive and strategic approach to immigration and integration for the South Okanagan and Similkameen. Their objectives will support communi-

ty-level research and strategic planning; and the coordination of effective services that facilitate immigrant settlement and integration.

"At our meeting on January 7th we worked together on the first draft of our strategic plan. There was great energy and enthusiasm from all the members. It is great to come together regionally to acknowledge the value of newcomers and how we all play a role in their integration," commented Nora Hunt-Haft, Co-Chair for the LIP Council.

The Local Immigration Partnership Council meets again in

March to finalize the regional plan and to establish a collective approach for delivery.

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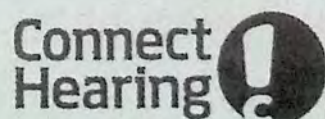

# Flip Of The Coyne

Last week I suggested that Town Council start to look for new industries outside our traditional industrial base. Princeton has always been a boom or bust community going all the way back to the gold rush. We have watched as mines come and go as mills opened and closed and we still watch the dollar and the market to see if we will have slowdowns in the current mill and mine operations. This is not a criticism of either the mill or the mine. It is the uneasy reality of living in a resource community. When everything hinges on one or two industries and nearly every job in that community is either part of those industries, a spin off of them, or services from them, the workforce or facility itself, the reality is that when fortunes change it impacts not just the people working there but the entire region. Anyone living here in the 1990s can tell you how hard the last mine closure was on this community.

We are fortunate right now that as the price of oil is falling so is the Canadian dollar which is

great for anyone else in resource extraction since the market is based not on Canadian dollars but on the US dollar. Now that the dollar is at its lowest point in years, we need to be taking full advantage of it and focusing our efforts on ways to bring outside dollars into our community. Tourism comes to mind. We are very close to the US border and can attract Americans but we can also attract tourists from around the globe. As our dollar is lower, the dollar of the traveller goes further and when it goes further they spend more of it. British Columbia is a tourism destination for people around the world because of our natural beauty and our rich history.

Princeton is one of the oldest communities in British Columbia. It is only natural that we would be able to benefit from an influx of tourists to the Province. Council should be working with all partners from the Chamber to hotel owners to attract those would be travellers to our community. At one time tourism was a major focus of

council and now that the dollar is dropping and those tourists start to flow through the area again hopefully town council will focus on the local tourism industry once again.

We need a diverse economy. Everyone needs a diverse economy. Events at a national level show how important it is to "not put all your eggs in one basket" so to speak. Nationally the Harper government has put all its economic plans on the back of the oil industry. Although it should be a short downturn it is going to ripple through every community in the country in one way or another. Alberta is scrambling because everything they do is based on the oil. Like I said, Princeton has seen this happen here more than once and although no one ever wants to think about the 'what if' scenario we know better and we should be planning for that 'what if' now while we have the chance.

Take what I am saying as you will. I write this not to ruffle feathers but to hopefully make people think. Make the people who are in a position to make

things happen think about more than today. Make them think what about 5 or 10 years down the road. What about then? What will Princeton do when the market changes or the price of the dollar goes up or whatever the scenario may be? Diversifying the local

economy isn't even about the mine or the mill. It is about looking at what the local economy is made up of and how it can be expanded to change the composition of the industrial base so that during uncertain or hard times the community still moves forward.

### A Quiet Anniversary

January 9th marked the 50th anniversary of Canada's largest landslide.

Had a reader not pointed it out to me last week I would probably have missed it completely as I didn't want to let on that I have had held a strange fascination of that site for many, many years.

In fact, I remember as a young boy snaking along the temporary road that was built shortly after the slide. I'm not sure how long after the incident our Greyhound bus was weaving its way around towards Hope but I can still see the giant boulders poking mysteriously in the dark at the windows as we passed.

I suspect our family went through the Hope Slide area just months after the incident as I would imagine there was a great deal of political pressure at the time to get the Hope-Princeton Highway/Highway 3 open as soon as possible.

I have been past that location a handful of times in the past two years and although I rarely visit the rest stop there, I am always looking at the hillside. The reduced debris field interests me as I recall that late night bus ride on a very rough stretch of road cut through piles of rock.

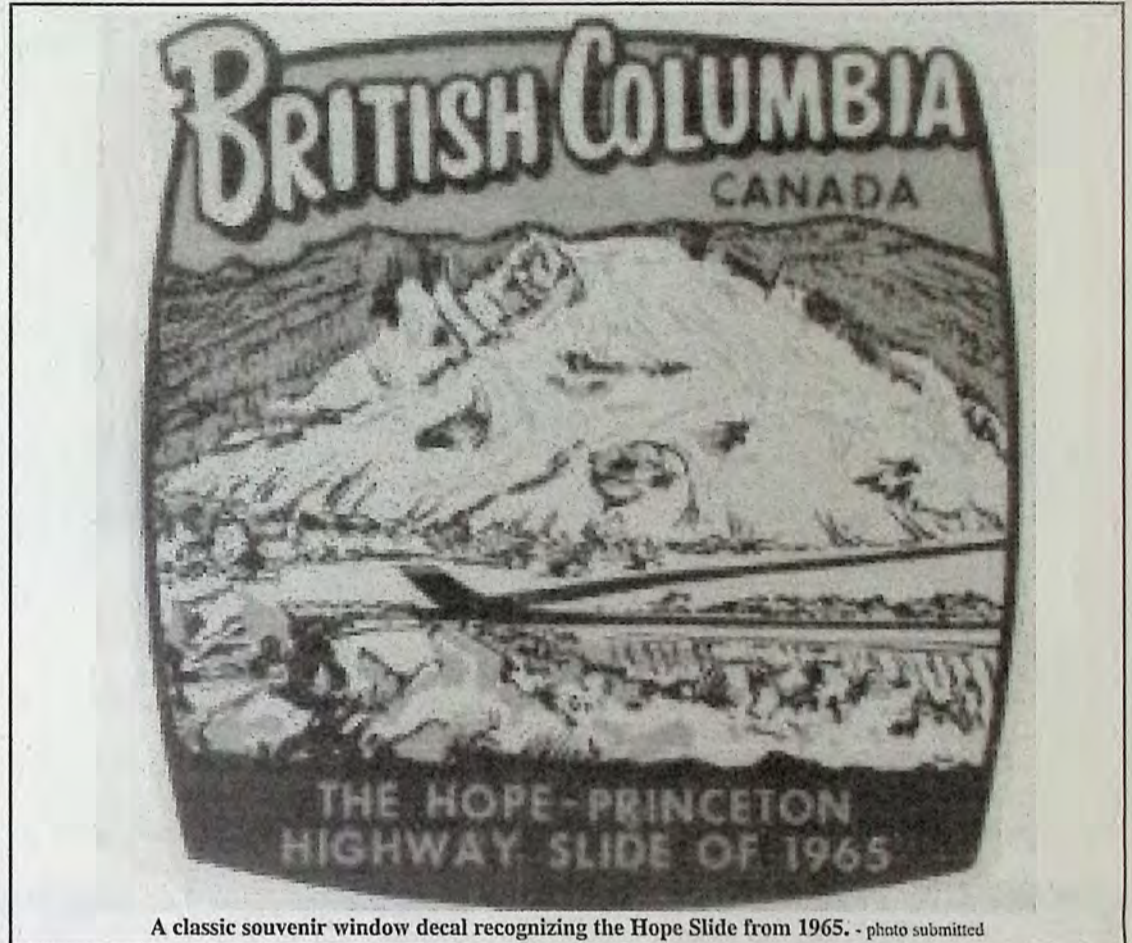
Each time I travel that section of Highway 3 I think about taking a side trip and driving the old highway to as far as it will go before the slide but I have yet to have done that. If I had such a thing as a Bucket List that short trip would go on it.

I am not sure why I am drawn to the Hope Slide. My family lived in Edmonton, Alberta at the time it happened so there is not direct connection I am aware of. The only possibility I can think of was that my father was a geologist. Possibly I overheard him talking about it at great length on occasion.

Whatever the connection, I do have an eerie feeling whenever I am near the area. Part of me wants to get to the other side quickly and part of me wants to stop and explore. Last year I actually did spend some time in the debris field, which was a first for me. I probably could have spent hours there, as it was a bright, sunny day. The only one I had seen there that I could remember but we had an appointment in Chilliwack and had to move along.

One interesting piece of trivia I discovered last week about the Hope Slide was related to the business I am in. The first news reporter to 'break' the story of the massive landslide happened to be someone I am still in contact with to this day. He was working at a Chilliwack radio station in 1965. We crossed paths in 1981 when I worked for him at a radio station in Penticton. I had no idea he had any connection to the Hope Slide until I did some reading about it last Friday.

So, for me, the 50th anniversary of the Hope Slide slipped away virtually unnoticed although the location of that incident has been on my personal radar since the day it happened.

### Letters and E-Mails Received This Past Week

To The Editor;

This story is about a lost puppy and concerned residents of the Osprey Lake area working together for a good cause.

The puppy was a black six month old standard poodle. It was a new arrival on a Friday to a loving family. The dog was agitated from the journey to a new home and somehow bolted away from the new owners while they were trying to console it.

The dog escaped at 11:30 PM into the darkness of the night. The owners followed it as best they could but it disappeared near the former Teepee Lakes store. Frantically they searched all night in deep snow and below freezing temperatures but were unsuccessful in finding it.

Saturday morning (January 10) the Hayes Creek volunteer fire department received a call about the lost puppy. The owners were tired and distraught and needed help locating

the pup.

Approximately 12 residents and volunteers scoured that day however no one was able to locate the dog.

Sunday morning a homeowner on Agur Road saw a dog matching the description of the pup. Hayes Creek fire department announced the sighting and requested assistance to search that area. About 25 people gathered to look for the dog. People were on foot, using automobiles, sleds, skis and snowshoes. The situation was becoming urgent since this would be the third night for the animal without food, water or shelter from the elements. By chance a passing motorist spotted the dog near the Hayes Creek fire hall on the Princeton-Summerland Road at 8:30 PM that dark night.

On Monday morning he identified the exact place the pup had been seen. Searchers were then able to follow the fresh tracks to determine where the dog went and where it

had slept. Unfortunately the dog was not found and remained elusive, likely frightened and hiding from good intentioned people.

Late Monday afternoon the breeder from central B.C. arrived with the mother of the dog and two litter-mates. It had been three days since the puppy went missing and it was facing the fourth night in the cold forest. The breeder and her three other dogs combed the area along Agur Road and the KVR for the missing dog but to no avail. Later that evening about 8:00 PM using a flashlight, the breeder and her dogs returned to the main search area along Agur Road. After a few moments of calling the frightened puppy came out of the forest to her and its siblings.

This was a black dog which stayed out of sight in two feet of white snow for three days and nights. Having only been spotted twice in that time we respectfully refer to it now as "Black Magic." This is truly a good story with a happy ending!

## Downsizing Rural Canada Has Effects

Here we are in 2015, and things are no better than they were last year. They may become worse.

Last year, I wrote about Agenda 21 and what it was doing to places in the United States, and what a biodiversity proposal to RDOS might do to us. I had almost no feedback. So, now, I am going to tell you what Agenda 21 is and what it could have done already to Princeton.

Agenda 21 was adopted by the United Nations in 1992 and it was supported by most nations. Agenda 21 was designed "to encourage nations to use fewer resources and conserve open land by steering development to already dense areas."

Think about that statement I highlighted in bold print. Part of Agenda 21 is to steer development to areas of greater population in order to conserve open land. Do you see any way that might have affected Princeton?

I thought about it. I thought of BC Forest Service moving its personnel to Merritt when the majority of timber in this area is at the Princeton end. Regardless of the fact that Forest Service personnel now spend more time driving from Merritt to the forests in our area, the move was made to Merritt. Was that inspired by Agenda 21 being implemented at high levels of government?

Since 1992, we have seen our

hospital turn into a long term care facility attached to a clinic and so-called emergency room. We were told there is a shortage of physicians who would come here, but on the other hand, why would they come here if there is no real hospital. Instead, we drive to Penticton for nearly every treatment greater than band-aids and pills. Is this a way to "encourage" us to move to Penticton? It certainly is the effect in Washington State, where they are shutting down rural hospitals despite the independent study that showed rural hospitals are more efficient (cost less to operate).

Not having a proper hospital has been a factor in having some people move away, but it could be a factor in people choosing not to live in Princeton. Certainly, the people in real estate have seen a decline in the number of people who want to move here.

There is another effect to reduction in government and health care personnel: population reduction. Those jobs are gone, and the people who might have raised families here are gone, too. This impacts our school population, therefore, fewer teachers, and a little more loss of population.

In the United States, the Republican National Committee passed a resolution that states "The United States Agenda 21 is a plan of radical so-called sustainable development that views the American way of life of private property ownership, single family houses, private car ownership, individual travel choices and privately owned farms as destructive to the environment." That is the opening statement in the Republican opposition to Agenda 21.

Who belongs to organizations implementing Agenda 21? Right now, your Town Council is a member, through Regional

District, which is a member of an alliance group which is a member of the International Council for Local Environmental Initiatives (ICLEI), which is the UN organization designated to implement Agenda 21. ICLEI carries out the plans of the Following UN Conventions: Framework Convention on Climate Change, on Biological Diversity, to Combat Desertification. Yes, Agenda 21 is here, now, but its influence is subtle. You need to be aware of it.

I asked myself who benefits from Agenda 21, considering it is so unpopular in rural areas. I may be wrong, but it occurred to me that bigger communities would benefit most by having larger centralized services located there, bringing more jobs and therefore more people to buy from businesses.

In the United States, small towns and privately owned farms are disappearing because of Agenda 21. In some cities, the impact of Agenda 21 has been felt as older homes are being condemned, eradicated and replaced with apartment buildings which have smaller and smaller floor space at the same rental cost as they would have paid for one of the older houses.

Another feature of ICLEI activity is the amount of money available for things like walking paths and bike routes. The Ecomobility Alliance gives grants for bicycle routes to encourage people to give up motorized vehicles. This is not terribly practical in most of Canada.

Agenda 21 planning can influence a lot of aspects of a community and citizens have to understand the goal of Agenda 21 is to move people out of the countryside and into small apartments in a city. Some of the actions of government may be "encouraging" us to move in accordance with that plan.

When it comes to moving farm owners off their land, there are a number of methods, but the outcome in the United States has been the increasing numbers of farms owned by big food corporations like Cargill.

The environmental rules and regulations can be so expensive as to force smaller farm owners to sell, paving the way for corporations to move in.

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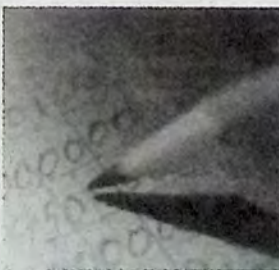

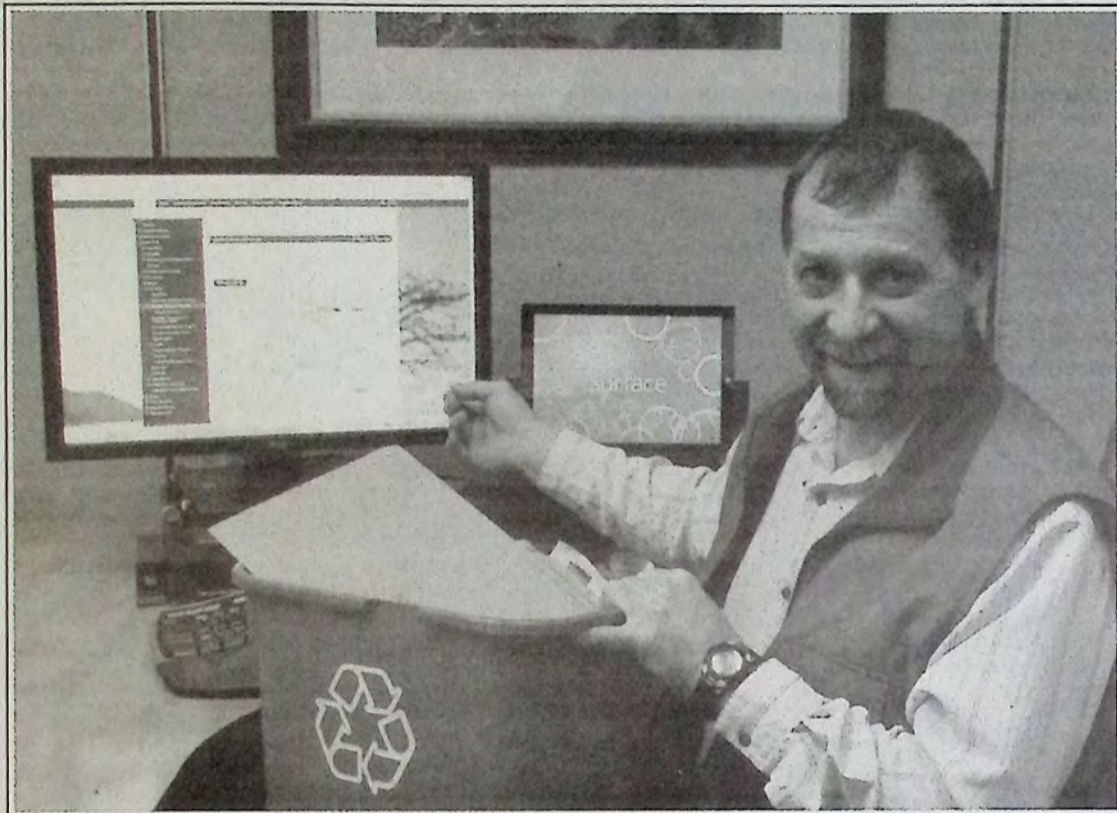

Resident hunters also contribute through donations to conservation organizations such as The Nature Trust, and Ducks Unlimited as well as volunteer for conservation activities. B.C. Wildlife Federation members alone dedicate more than 300,000 hours annually to fish, wildlife and habitat conservation projects across the province.

Hunting has become increasingly popular in B.C. as more families shy away from industrially produced meats in favour of organic wild game. This sustainable food movement is particularly popular in northern communities, central B.C. and even the Lower Mainland where people are depending on hunting to fill their freezers and feed their families.

Moose is the most sought after species by B.C.'s resident hunters. In many areas, demand exceeds supply and hunters are placed on a Limited Entry Hunt (LEH) lottery .....continued on Page 19

## RDOS releases ReCollect program schedule

Residents throughout the Regional District of Okanagan-Similkameen (RDOS), in municipalities and Rural Areas have a new way to get information regarding their curbside garbage and recycling services. A newly launched web ser-

vice allows anyone to type in their home address to access information on garbage and recycling services specific to their property.

Each municipality and Rural Area within the RDOS has slightly different garbage and recycling pro-

grams including separate collection days and modified services. In 2014 the RDOS became a part of ReCollect, a web based service. Anyone can now visit the RDOS website and type in their home address to view a unique collection calendar for their property. The application provides links on what can be recycled and the location of nearby recycling depots. Residents can also sign up for free e-mail or text reminders advising them when to place out refuse each week.

RDOS Chair Mark Pendergraft feels simplifying how people get government information helps residents.

"I know there have been a few evenings I've wondered if it is recycling week or when the landfill closes," explains Pendergraft.

"Simplifying how people get information saves time and helps people place out the right stuff."

To access the ReCollect application visit [www.rdos.bc.ca](http://www.rdos.bc.ca) and click on 'Curbside Calendar' on the right hand side. The application is also available through the City of Penticton, Town of Oliver and Town of Osoyoos websites. The RDOS and member municipalities will continue to provide paper calendars to their residents each year and this service only enhances existing programs. Residents can always contact their local government if they have any questions about curbside or landfill services.

Many innovations, inventions and social changes have come about as a result of some individual "dreaming" of what could be, even if it appeared to be impossible in the social or scientific environment of the time. By freeing the mind to explore the endless possibilities the world offers, many people have been able to make great changes in their own environment and in the world at large.

Allow yourself about twenty minutes of quiet time in which to form your dream. Set aside that time daily. With practice, you can learn to visualize something different every day. In a short time, a week or two, you are supposed to feel an increase in energy.

For those who feel really burdened by personal limitations of poor health, perhaps the best thing to visualize in each dream is a vision of yourself healed and vigorous! Such a vision would make you feel better right away!

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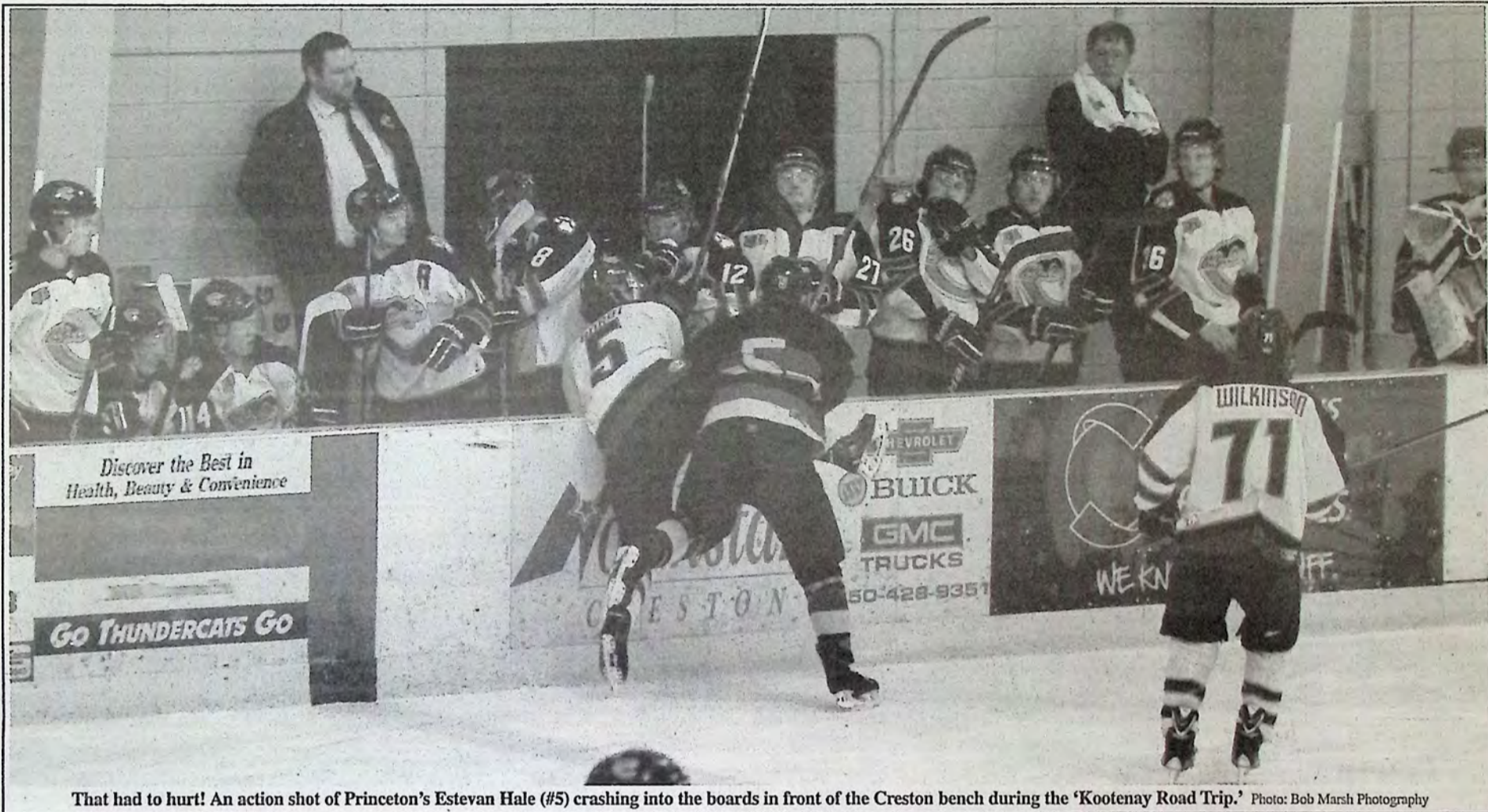

## Eagles claw victory from Posse

Princeton Posse hosted Sicamous Eagles January 16th.

Both teams have had an interesting start to 2015. The Eagles came to the Similkameen Valley with a 44-point 21-18-1 record hot off the heels of two losses. 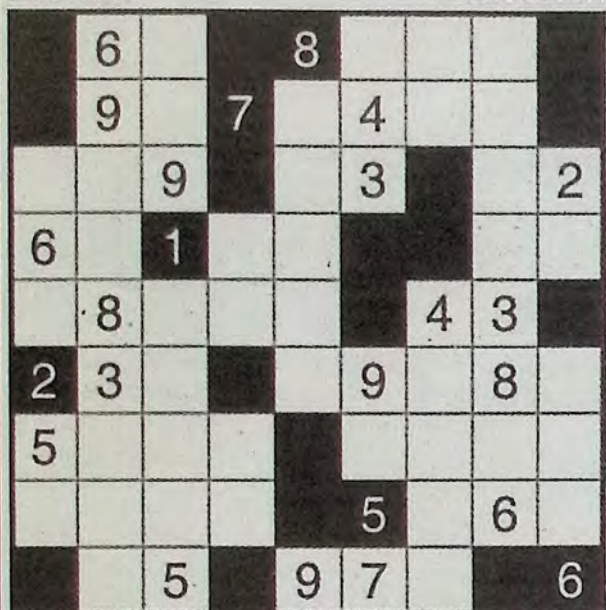

# Saving Downtown Princeton...

...An Ongoing Series by George Elliott

Economic development.

Two words that have had a very rocky history in the Similkameen Valley because it has never seemed to work. There have been many attempts at establishing an economic development officer position in Princeton and each time it fizzled. The most recent attempt was a handful of years ago when Keremeos and Princeton jointly funded such a position sharing the benefits of the efforts made by the person holding that position.

To say it was a tough sell to have

someone 'shared' by two ends of the valley would be an understatement. Sure, there was some good to come out of the exercise but I think what will be remembered most from that experience is that the two ends of the valley are very different with diverse opportunities that don't translate well from one end to the other.

There are some real pretty highway signs though telling you when you have entered the Similkameen Valley, which are supposed to be replaced soon with new ones.

There needs to be a lot more than just pretty signs to encourage economic development in the region. Based on what I have seen happen over the past twenty-some years with that goal, I have some observations.

While I understand that in the early years there was no internet and budgets were tight, having someone sitting in an office in Town Hall waiting for the phone to ring is probably not the way to go this time around.

My argument over the years is a simple one and I will explain with a little story.

Little Johnny and Little Bobby are looking for summer jobs. Johnny has absolutely zip in work experience but he is eager, a quick learner and is banging on doors looking for a job from anyone who'll hire him. He has targeted his calls to focus primarily on businesses he may have some interest in, but has not ruled out those he thinks he may

find interesting.

On the other hand, Bobby has a long list of experience and has handed out a few resumes but only at the handful of places he thinks will pay him a lot for the least amount of work. He spends his days watching videos and in case the phone rings he has it nearby.

Who do you think stands a better chance of getting noticed and possibly hired?

When it comes to economic development I have always thought that the Princeton/Similkameen Valley EDO office should be located in the middle of all the action. That, by the way, is not downtown Princeton. However, trade shows and office space in downtown Vancouver gets to be expensive. There has to be a better way and I think that there can be something done with a 'virtual office' setting somewhere.

I also believe there needs to be a shift from the conventional way of thinking in the Upper Similkameen

Valley. Spencer even touched on it last week.

One of my beefs with economic development attempts in the area is that there has been too much emphasis on forestry/value-added wood products and mining. Don't get me wrong, these has been very good job creators and have generated their fair share of revenue to the local economy.

But there will be a day when we either run out of sticks or there's too many holes in the ground and costs of producing or manufacturing these products gets to a point where it's just not feasible to continue. When the marketplace prices your commodity, there's always a risk of a crash. We've seen it happen too often in our valley.

So I think before we start sending flyers out to attract more wood manufacturers and mining companies we need to take a look at what we want our valley to look like in .....continued on Page 18

.....continued from Page 16 twenty, fifty and one-hundred years from now. There are some pretty smart people wandering the streets of Princeton who can help with some of that. I think there needs to be a committee made up of a cross section of the community and to me that includes age and income level. This committee should be putting together the future vision of what we need to do to attract new industry.

Yes, I know there is a business committee in place under the Chamber of Commerce umbrella but I see that committee as primarily focused on attracting new business. Attracting new industry is slightly different although there will be some overlap.

I also believe that through this 'economic development commit-

tee' there should be decisions made first on what kinds of industries we DON'T want in our community and then the formation of a 'hit list' of industries to target.

This committee would also have the horsepower to push for change to whatever hurdles exist at the business/industrial park that has so far prevented it from filling to capacity the first year it opened. Town Council keeps saying they are 'business friendly' or trying to make our community more business friendly but they can only do so much. The fact that they recognize there needs to be change is huge and clearly they are in the mood to work together on making Princeton more attractive.

And that is what makes the timing of an 'economic development committee' so important right now to the

future of our community.

How does this save downtown Princeton?

There is a lot of vacant land at the Princeton business/industrial park. It's in not a bad location for transportation purposes and could be very attractive to industries other than what already exists in our area. A committee representing a generous cross section of the community could be useful as consultants in formulating a game plan on what we want to see our community look like in the future and what industries would fit into that puzzle.

Town Council is trying to attract new business and industry but can only do so much and representation from the community can assist them in discovering opportunities that may not have been considered.

When the business/industrial park starts attracting development it adds to the tax base, creates jobs and feeds the local economy. This attracts new businesses to the downtown core as the opportunities arise.

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You never know what you'll find at Princeton Museum if you don't wander around. This historic event from 1937 in Copper Mountain will forever be remembered thanks to this framed poster. \*

## Policy changes may hurt resident hunters

.....continued from Page 7 to ensure sustainability.

Approximately 70,000 BC hunters apply for 13,000 LEH licenses each year, meaning only 1 in 5 hunters get to hunt moose annually. Foreign hunters do not need to apply for a LEH license, and can hunt annually, taking moose licenses from approximately 3,000 B.C. hunters each year. The proposed changes would see even more British Columbians go without an opportunity to hunt moose.

"B.C. residents who depend on hunting to help sustain their families should be supported by provincial government policy," said Jesse Zeman, a BCWF director, who hunts with his whole family.

"The overriding priority for all hunters is conservation, ensuring there is enough game available for First Nations, and then fulfilling the hunting needs of B.C. families. Any changes to the Wildlife Allocation Policy should meet the needs of the majority of British Columbians who enjoy the outdoors, spend time with friends and family, and hunt for food."

Over the past two decades, there has been a steady erosion of hunt-

ing licences available to B.C. resident hunters in favour of foreign hunters. For example, non-resident hunting licences for moose in the Kootenay Region have gone from 6 percent in 1991 to 21 percent in 2012, leaving hundreds of Kootenay residents without the opportunity to hunt moose.

The B.C. Wildlife Federation is calling on the BC government to fairly legislate wildlife allocations. The organization does not support giving away more than 10 percent for moose and elk, and 25 percent of mountain goat, sheep, and bears to foreign trophy hunters. Ironically, this gives non-resident hunters the best deal in North America. Several jurisdictions across North America have already set wildlife allocation in law. Saskatchewan limits non-resident moose hunters to 4 percent of the harvestable surplus. Alberta sets non-resident allocations between 2-7percent with a maximum of 10 percent.

Washington State has limited non-resident wildlife allocations to approximately 5 percent.

"Resident hunters firmly believe any policy changes should reflect

the best interests of the majority of British Columbians who depend on hunting as a sustainable, healthy food source," said BCWF President George Wilson.

"Our organization is committed to working with the government to protect wildlife and ensure equitable distribution of this resource."


Sward adds, "As a Resident Hunter, it is imperative to write your local MLA and voice your displeasure. Also, please take note of the add elsewhere in this paper, regarding a community meeting that will be held in Oliver on January 25th. Gather your friends and carpool - be informed and recognize how your resident hunting opportunity continues to be eroded from you, by the Provincial Government's recent decision. 

# RDOS issues request for proposals

The Regional District is requesting submission of Proposals from qualified Proponents to complete, in two (2) phases, a district-wide Regional Water Use Regulation and Conservation Bylaw (Bylaw).

This Request for Proposals relates to both Phase 1 and Phase 2 of the project, however, the initial award will be for Phase 1 work. If budget and timing is appropriate, Phase 2 will proceed after Phase 1 is completed.

The Regional District covers the

southern portion of the Okanagan Valley and the entire Similkameen Valley. Larger communities within the RDOS include Penticton, Summerland, Princeton, Okanagan Falls, Naramata, Oliver, Osoyoos and Keremeos.

The Regional District intends to create a district-wide Regional Water Use Regulation and Conservation Bylaw that is specific for the Okanagan-Similkameen. This Bylaw is intended to unify water use standards within the

Regional District owned and operated water systems. This project will focus on water conservation/efficiency and sustainable water management, integration of extreme weather (e.g. drought and flooding) management recommendations, inclusion of Cross Connection Control (CCC) requirements, climate change and consistent interpretation of the appropriate regulations.

The Regional District is currently drafting a new Subdivision Servicing Bylaw. The Regional

Water Use Bylaw must be consistent with the draft Subdivision Servicing Bylaw.

In 2008 the Regional District had a Cross Connection Control Program produced, including a draft Cross Connection Control Bylaw. This draft bylaw is to be reviewed and included within the Regional Bylaw.

This Bylaw is to be completed in two (2) phases:

- Phase 1: All the work to develop a bylaw up to and including a first draft of the Bylaw,

- Phase 2: All the work to develop and bring into implementation the final Bylaw.

The Regional District owns and operates the Faulder, Naramata, Olalla, Gallagher Lake, Loose Bay and West Bench Water Systems. The Regional District also operates the Sage Mesa Water System and is in discussions with other water systems regarding their future ownership and management.
