Town to hire deer manager

In the spring of 2013 the Princeton Deer Committee conducted a deer survey and by late fall the results were available.

The majority of comments call for something to be done. Relocation, Euthanization and Education were the three most requested courses of action.

Town of Princeton Councillor Rosemary Doughty, with help from volunteers conducted six deer counts in a 13 month period to get a

consistent estimate of the deer population within the Town of Princeton's boundaries.

Recently, Councillors Doug Pateman and Doughty attended a UBCM sponsored Urban Deer Seminar that explored the strategies necessary for controlling urban deer populations. The Seminar provided municipal representatives with ideas to address urban deer populations.

Hired Equipment Registration Final Notice Okanagan Shuswap District

The Okanagan Shuswap District of the Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure is creating its list of registered Equipment for Hire for the fiscal year of 2015/2016, which begins April 1, 2015. This district geographically covers the area from the United States border, east to Osoyoos, west of Princeton and north of Salmon Arm.

All individuals or companies registered in 2014 will have received invitations by mail to re-register hired equipment for 2015. If you have new equipment to be added to your profile, you can register online at www.bcbid.ca or contact the District Office in Kelowna to obtain the appropriate forms. Any individuals who were not registered in 2014, but wish to have equipment listed are hereby invited to contact the District Office, either in person or by phone, to obtain the appropriate registration forms.

Note that while you do not need to have Commercial (Comprehensive) General Liability Insurance or up-to-date WorkSafe BC coverage to register, you will have to meet these requirements prior to working on any ministry projects.

Only owned or lease-to-own equipment is eligible for registration. Equipment may only be registered in one area in any given year. Seniority is not transferable from area to area.

The deadline for new registrations is midnight on Wednesday, March 18, 2015. Late registrations will be accepted, but may appear at the bottom of the open list. Note that there is no charge for registering new equipment, or for changing or deleting equipment information already listed.

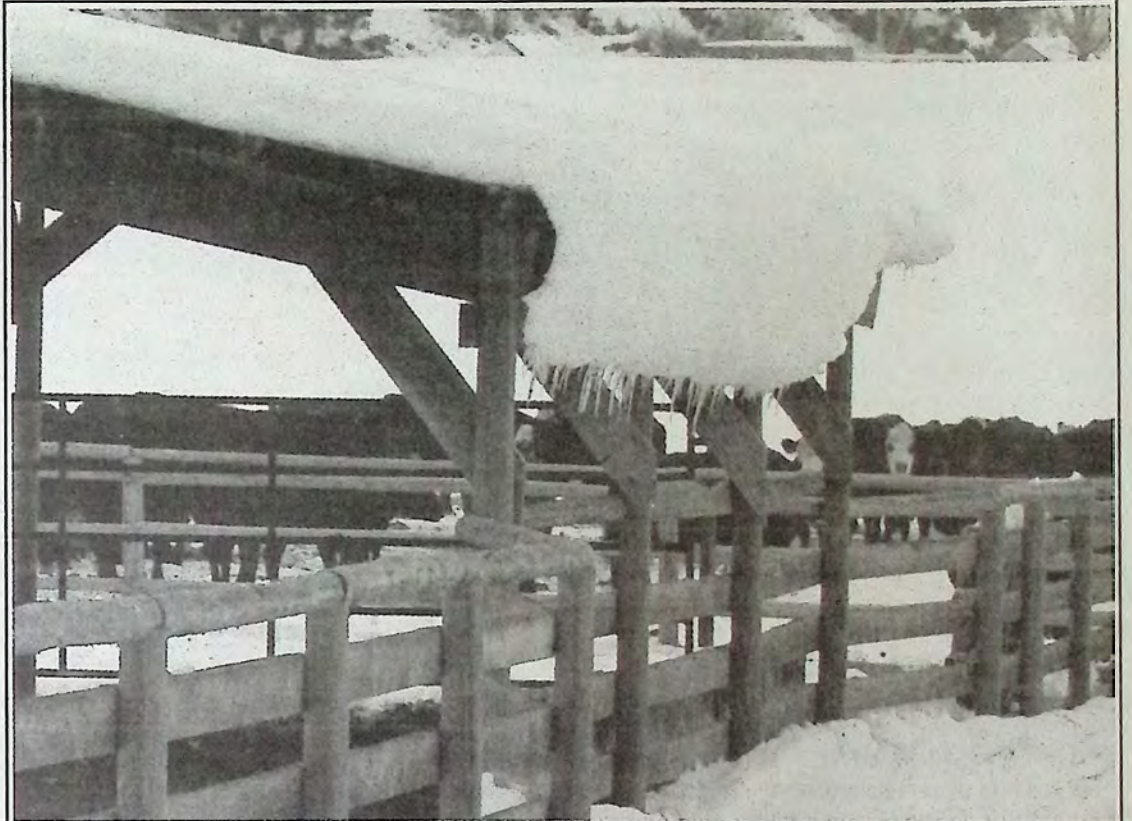
Talk about a win-win solution.

Corporations And Capitalism: Not Bad

Many people who read my column may have the impression I am a socialist who hates corporations and capitalism. This is not true.

In our world of corporations and capital investment, people are living better and longer than ever before in recorded history. World population grew four times larger during the 20th century, yet lifespan increased by 30 years in developed countries. Infant mortality declined, heart disease killed fewer people, and people earned seven times more (adjusted for inflation) between 1900 and 2000. During that time, in developed countries, people consumed one-third more calories (often to their detriment).

Most of this improvement has been due to corporations and capital investment. I give credit where it is due.

When I criticize corporations, I am criticizing corporation behaviours. There are millions of corporations. Most of them are small,

like the News Leader. Some are giants. Most corporations behave well, do a good job, maintain worker safety and decent levels of income. Some contribute to pension funds. Most give to charities or help with civic projects. The majority of corporations are good citizens.

Then there are the bad corporations who deliberately pollute water because it is cheaper to dump wastes than to isolate and properly dispose of them. There are bad corporations engaged in finance who ignore the safeguards and throw money to the winds, always our money, and we lose money we invested for retirement, and many people lose their livelihoods. Remember the 2008 financial crisis, when people lost their homes and lived in tent villages and had to go to food banks? That is what corporation bad behaviour leads to.

We often hear about "the free market" and "free market policy". This is what most corporations demand and what they lobby government to support. An awful lot quote and misquote the father of economics, Adam Smith. Any politician worth voting for should know who Adam Smith was and what he really said in his seminal work, *The Wealth of Nations*.

A corporation is an entity. Government grants a corporation permission to operate to conduct a particular form of business. It is understood that the corporation will abide by all of the rules pertaining to lawful conduct of business, and all of the rules applying to that particular business. This is

known as operating under the rule of law. Most corporations do exactly that. Some corporations abide by the letter of the law, but their ethics are questionable, such as occurred when the Bush family bought up all of the land for their banana plantation and required the people living on that land to move off it. Working hand in glove with government, the Chiquita Banana company displaced hundreds of families who lost not only their homes, but the crops and livestock that fed them.

There are many such examples of poor ethical behaviour by corporations, but absolute criminal behaviour has been proven against far too many corporations. It has taken the heavy hand of the law to finally take them to court and have them judged. This is why we need to watch corporation behaviour very carefully and why we need laws limiting corporate behaviour. This is why there can never be a truly "free" market.

Adam Smith wrote: "Little else is required to carry a state to the highest degree of affluence from the lowest barbarism but peace, easy taxes, and a tolerable administration of justice."

Today, we see one of the things Smith most abhorred: the collusion of government and industry to pursue particular goals. We see corporations profiteering from wars backed by several governments, while Adam Smith advocated peace to raise us to the highest degree of affluence. We see "easy taxes" on the richest people and harsher taxes on poorer folk. When a billionaire pays 20 percent of his income in taxes, he is still a billionaire. When a poor man pays 20 percent, he is much poorer and doing the economy little good.

We have seen the administration of justice thrown to the winds in pursuit of "terrorist" confessions. We have witnessed "terrorist" incidents become an excuse for limiting the freedom of the majority who have no intention of becoming terrorists.

I am of the opinion that Adam Smith, wherever he is, flies into a rage every time he hears one of the heads of ill-behaved corporations and their political cronies quote him.

RCMP nab serial robber

On January 30th, 2015, at approximately 2:30 PM, RCMP serious crimes branch - general investigation section, with the assistance of the RCMP Grande Prairie Detachment and K Division Emergency Response Team arrested a 26 year old male at a motel located in the area of 109th Street and 100th Avenue, in Grande Prairie, Alberta. No one was injured during the arrest.

RCMP issued a request for assistance in identifying a serial robbery suspect.

The RCMP from Alberta, British Columbia and Saskatchewan, as well as the Lethbridge Regional Police Service, requested the public's assistance in identifying the suspect who was believed to have committed eight armed robberies across the three provinces.

The robberies occurred on/at the following dates and locations:

- December 1st, 2014 at 2:42 PM at a financial institution in Princeton, British Columbia.
- December 9th, 2014 at 4:37 PM at a financial institution in Vernon, BC.
- December 19th, 2014 at 4:55 PM at a financial institution in High River, Alberta.
- December 23rd, 2014 at 4:54 PM a financial institution in Merritt, British Columbia.
- January 8th, 2015 at 7:16 PM at a financial institution in Swift Current, Saskatchewan.
- January 13th, 2015 at 5:55 PM a financial institution in Lethbridge, Alberta.
- January 16th, 2015 at 3:30 PM at a financial institution in Claresholm, Alberta.
- January 21st, 2015 at 5:55 PM at a financial institution in Aldergrove, British Columbia.

He hit his ninth spot the day after RCMP issued their joint release on January 28th, 2015 at 4:00 PM at a financial institution in Dawson Creek, British Columbia.

- The suspect was described as:
- Caucasian male;
 - Between 25 to 35 years old;
 - Slim build;
 - 5'6 to 6' tall;
 - Unshaven, brown goatee/beard;
 - Seen wearing a black toque and dark sunglasses;
 - Dressed in dark clothing, and wearing gloves.

All robberies involved a weapon; either being produced or mentioned. In all instances, the suspect exited the financial institutions with an undisclosed amount of cash and fled on foot. No employees or customers present in the financial institutions at the time of the incidents were physically injured.

Living Past 100

Blueberries Fight Heart Disease

An article published recently in the American Journal for Nutrition describes a six-week study done using blueberries as a treatment for high blood pressure and hardening of the arteries. Post-menopausal women were given blueberry powder, the equivalent of 500 grams of raw blueberries, daily. At the end of the study, blood pressure had dropped significantly, and arterial stiffness had declined. If you want to try this yourself, eat one measuring cup full of blueberries each day for as long as you want. Blueberries are good for more than your circulatory system.

Blueberries are used in Sweden as a treatment for colds and flu. Blueberry syrup is given at the onset of symptoms and the patient is generally much better in 24 hours after treatment begins.

Blueberries are good for the digestive system, contain elements that prevent old-age blindness, and improve the immune system. Blueberries improve memory.

The native American people used wild blueberries to mix with meat to produce a dried meat patty called pemmican. This was a valuable winter food which was easily transported. To make a meal, it was immersed in water and cooked until tender.

Wild blueberries grow in northern climates where water is abundant, and are much smaller than cultivated blueberries such as we see in supermarkets. The wild blueberries are smaller but much more potent than domesticated blueberries because the water content of the berry is much less.

Blueberries may be frozen, canned, juiced, or made into jam with very little of their nutritional value lost. The blueberry powder used in the study mentioned above would have been highly processed but it was still effective. Including blueberries in your diet in any form will probably do you good, but fresh or frozen will have the greatest nutritional value.

100 Mile House out-wrangles the Posse

Princeton Posse hosted 100 Mile House Wranglers January 25th in an afternoon match at Princeton Arena. Despite the distance between the teams there is a history they share which has turned into a bit of a rivalry.

Although the teams have only met three times in regular season play in the past two seasons, the Wranglers are made up of a former Posse coach and general manager and built around a few former Posse players. This adds some excitement to any pairing of the two teams on ice.

On paper, prior to the January 25th game, both teams were also very evenly matched. The Wranglers were bringing with them a 19-19-0 record worth 45-points into the Similkameen. The Posse had 41-

Add to that the 3-6 win-loss record both teams carried so far in 2015 and Princeton Arena should have been the place to be on that Sunday afternoon.

Play on ice was intense at times with solid hits and great moments of playmaking occurring on both sides of the rink.

The first period ended with no scoring and only two penalties, one per side. Even the shots on goal were close with the Posse edging the Wranglers 13-11.

The bulk of the stat action centred on the second period when 100 Mile House scored the first goal of the game at 18:38 (Tyler Garcia from

Nick McCabe). The Wranglers also made their mark in the penalty box with two minor calls before scoring again at 6:58 (Nick McCabe from Tavis Roch).

Princeton needed a power play in the final minute of the frame to get on the scoreboard. Trevor Pereverzoff got credit for the marker scored with one second left in the period. An assist went to Kyle Bergh. The Posse dominated shots on goal 13-6 in the 20-minutes of the second.

The third period was much like the first with no further scoring and just a single infraction although there was no shortage of physical play on the ice. However, that also reduced the scoring opportunities for both teams with Princeton managing only nine shots on goal to seven for the Wranglers.

Princeton 1. Shots on Goal: Princeton 35, 100 Mile House 24. Penalties in Minutes: 100 Mile House four for 10-minutes,

Princeton three for 6-minutes. The Posse went 1 for 5 (20.0%) on the power play while the Wranglers were unsuccessful in three tries.

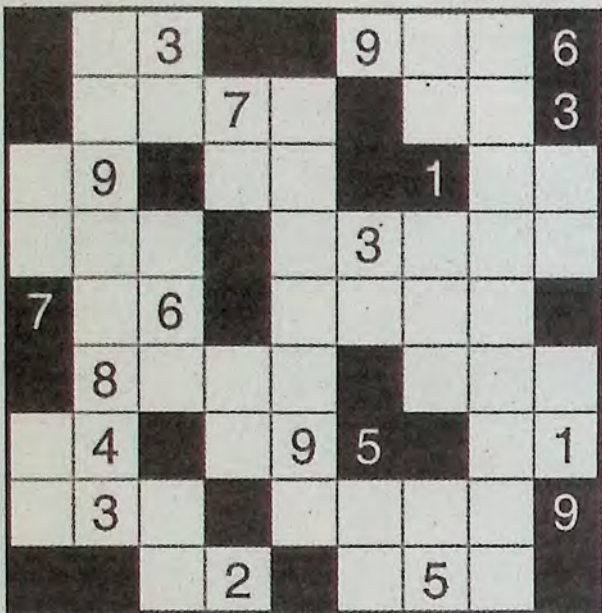

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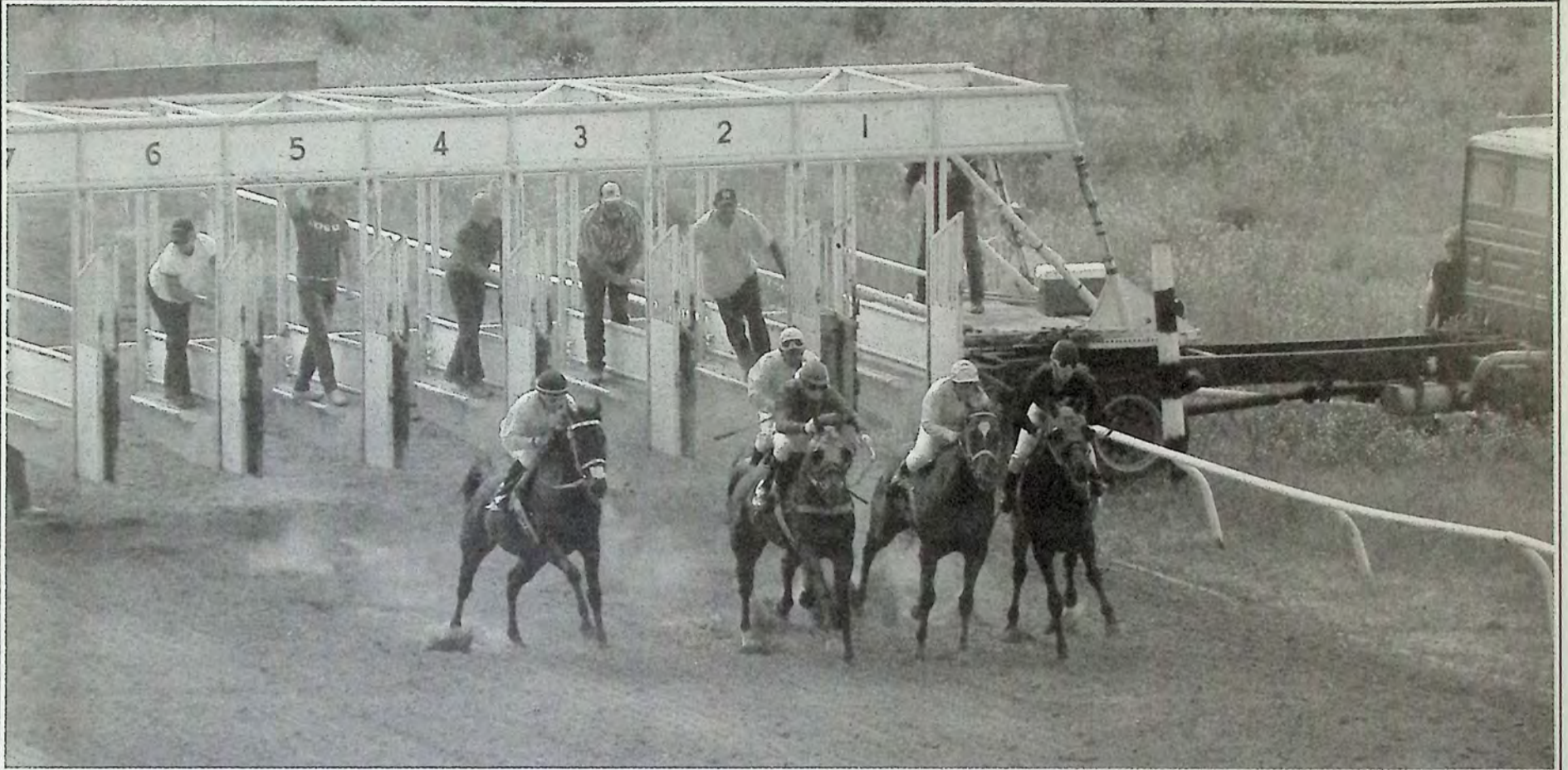

With the loss of live horse racing at Sunflower Downs a huge hole will need to be filled on a major holiday weekend in Princeton.*

Whether or not you are going to miss live horse racing this summer in Princeton there will be an impact on the community.

Without the draw of the activity at Sunflower Downs there will be a drop in tourist traffic to the area. Last year should be a reminder for locals that although there was a parade, golf tournament and Canada Day celebration, the town was much quieter than it was the previous year when there was horse racing.

I sat as President of the Racing Days Association from 1990 to 1999. It was a pretty exciting time in the history of the event as there were so many other 'extra' activities being held along with the races. In addition to the Lions Club Pancake Breakfast they had a raft race that eventually turned into a rubber duck race down Tulameen River. The Rotary Club not only put on the Parade but they also hosted a Casino Night at the Princeton Arena. The Golf Course Mixed Golf Tournament was in full swing, the Chamber of Commerce organized a Sidewalk Sale and some-

where in the mix was two afternoons of live horse racing.

Add to that school and family reunions and the place to be on the weekend closest to Canada Day for many was Princeton.

As the years progressed and volunteers started aging a few things happened. Some of the extra activities held as part of the Racing Days celebration started to reduce in size and a few disappeared altogether. The anchor that held the weekend together, live horse racing, even dropped from two days to a single afternoon of races. That eventually dwindled down to no races for a couple of years then came back as a result of hard working volunteers.

In fact, there is nothing that happens in the Similkameen Valley aimed at community celebration that isn't put together by a number of volunteers.

Princeton Racing Days is no different with the exception of a lack of horses causing most of the reason

why you will probably never see another provincially sanctioned race at Sunflower Downs. Without a product to build upon, there is no anchor for the annual celebration we have known for years as simply Racing Days.

The point I am making here is that in order for the community to maintain it's tourism draw on a prime summer weekend another major event is required. With most of the other key elements still in place (parade, golf tournament, reunions) there is still over five months to put something in the place of live horse racing.


