## Dog owners obey enforcement

Town of Princeton Bylaw Enforcement Officer Bob Riley met a lot of dog owners recently.

During the February 2 to 25 Dog Awareness Blitz Riley spoke to 104 people walking 90 dogs. His goal was to educate dog owners on bylaws related to licensing and cleaning up after pets.

The program resulted in only six tickets issued and a total of 89 dog licenses sold at Town Hall (including annual renewals).

Riley told the News Leader on February 26th that up to that date in 2014 there were a total of 105 dog licenses issued. Over the same peri-

od so far this year the number had climbed to 250.

The Awareness Blitz centred on five fines outlined in Animal Control Bylaw No. 782-2006 ranging from \$75 for an unlicensed dog to \$100 for excessive barking/howling, dogs running loose in a public place and not cleaning up after a dog.

The stiffest fine is \$500 for having an unmuzzled vicious dog in a public place.

Riley credits Everything Pets and Similkameen News Leader for helping with the awareness campaign and providing free doggie bags.

## Fair Board welcomes Riding Club

Princeton Riding Club proposes to hold an equestrian event in conjunction with the fair this year. The proposal was heard at the February 24 Fall Fair meeting, and the Riding Club was welcomed. Plans and scheduling will be fine-tuned in

coming months.

Fair members received a congratulatory letter from Alex Atamanenko, Member of Parliament for BC Southern Interior. He congratulated the Board on the election, and on the

celebration of the 50th Fall Fair this year, saying he liked the idea of 1960's music being featured at the fair. Members enjoyed the letter.

Photographs of past fairs are being collected. As many as possible will be on display at the fair. Keith Olsen

brought a 1965 newspaper showing the devastation of the Hope Slide, which occurred in January, 1965. These photos will be copied and put on display. Shirley Freding hopes to round up photos of families who were involved in the early fairs. Her parents' beef ranch will be featured in a display.

PSS student Alexia Boyd has agreed to assist with the flower exhibits again this year. A new location for the flower exhibits is under consideration.

The 50th anniversary of the Fall Fair will be featured in pamphlets to be distributed in Kamloops at the BC Cowboy Festival this month. Princeton Exhibition Association,

Princeton Riding Club, and Princeton Rodeo are also in the pamphlet, along with dates of all events. Rayleen Brewer and Jennifer Bernard will man the booth, and costs are covered by PXA and Rodeo.

Princeton Community Band will play O Canada to open the fair, and will play a number of selections after the opening ceremony.

An Oliver producer has asked to be included in the fair this year, bringing alpacas and alpaca products to display at the fair. They will be most welcome. Vince Milligan and Keith Olsen are in charge of livestock displays, and have asked that the fair booklet specify that all

## Flip Of The Coyne

Have you ever watched that Hollywood blockbuster where the government rammed through some vague anti-terrorism legislation despite the opposition from former national leaders, lawyers, professors, even former security personnel? It was in that country with politicians who dodge the media and experts from around the world were concerned and all spoke out against their regression towards a repressive state. Does this ring any bells? Maybe I am mixing up Hollywood with the CBC and I am mistaking some third world totalitarian upstart with what is happening in Ottawa today.

We have four former prime ministers, one being a conservative, telling the country that Harper's anti-terrorism legislation is a worrisome piece of work that could take us down a slippery slope, yet people still sit idly by worried that ISIS bombers will attack them on their way to get the morning paper. Bill C-51 is a very worrisome piece of

work and the Harper government's attitude towards debating and amending it is even more so. Not only are former prime ministers worried, but a former CSIS officer is speaking out calling it a threat to Canadians' rights. Lawyers, professors and experts are lining up asking Canadians to beware of this bill. The vagueness of the legislation can put anyone who opposes the government on the wrong side of the legislation, from an anti-pipeline protest to a health care rally that didn't get the proper permits. I know these may be extreme examples but they are similar to the ones some lawyers are using to explain how far reaching and dangerous the law will be.

Tom Mulcair has called on the government to explain what this bill covers that is not already covered by current laws. They dodged the question, just like when Peter MacKay was asked by journalists what the definition of terrorism is and he replied, "look it up," and kept on walking. This is the problem. It is

not that we don't have laws to fight terrorism, it's that this new legislation is vague and could be used to

stifle free speech, shut down government opposition, environmental protest, First Nations' protests or

anything that the government deems unfavorable. No one is .....continued on Page 18

### Hired Equipment Registration Final Notice Okanagan Shuswap District

The Okanagan Shuswap District of the Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure is creating its list of registered Equipment for Hire for the fiscal year of 2015/2016, which begins April 1, 2015. This district geographically covers the area from the United States border, east to Osoyoos, west of Princeton and north of Salmon Arm.

All individuals or companies registered in 2014 will have received invitations by mail to re-register hired equipment for 2015. If you have new equipment to be added to your profile, you can register online at [www.bcbid.ca](http://www.bcbid.ca) or contact the District Office in Kelowna to obtain the appropriate forms. Any individuals who were not registered in 2014, but wish to have equipment listed are hereby invited to contact the District Office, either in person or by phone, to obtain the appropriate registration forms.

Note that while you do not need to have Commercial (Comprehensive) General Liability Insurance or up-to-date WorkSafe BC coverage to register, you will have to meet these requirements prior to working on any ministry projects.

Only owned or lease-to-own equipment is eligible for registration. Equipment may only be registered in one area in any given year. Seniority is not transferable from area to area.

The deadline for new registrations is midnight on Wednesday, March 18, 2015. Late registrations will be accepted, but may appear at the bottom of the open list. Note that there is no charge for registering new equipment, or for changing or deleting equipment information already listed.

One of the things I discovered early on as a local business owner is that you can't please everyone. It's not unique to the newspaper business, but I seem to notice it more as we are often targets due to what we choose to write and publish.

The interesting thing about this is that I find it extremely difficult to hold a grudge. I have a hard time coming up with an example of the last one I managed to form and keep in place.

Yes, I have my share of what I would call 'difficult' customers and clients, but we all know someone in our lives who fits that category. When you're in business, especially in a small town, those kinds of people make a typical workday interesting.

The Bylaw Enforcement Officer has the right attitude.

Bob Riley has told me frequently that his approach is to try to treat everyone fairly without judgment.

I view grudges as childish and since I'm no longer in Grade 5, I'd rather use that energy on something a little more productive.

We find ourselves promoting local business daily, even those who don't support ours, and I think the reason for that is because we frequently see tourists in our office or field phone calls from newcomers turning to us for some kind of help. Sometimes it's for a local phone number but often it's for direction on where to go to for a good meal or does anyone in town sell (fill in the blank)?

We have become an information service over the years and have no problem referring people to other local businesses, including those who don't advertise with us. I think it's good business because someone from Alberta could care less if Wilma's Home Cookin' hasn't put an ad in our paper because if we say it's a good place to eat, they will check it out. People tend to believe what we tell them, so if we like Wilma's, it'll show.

Oh, and we use our personal experience as our testimony. If we have heard bad things about Wilma's, we don't spread that, especially if we haven't had any problems ourselves. Even if we've heard that the people at Wilma's think we are jerks, we're still going to send customers there if the best flapjacks in town are what they are looking for.

That's probably one thing I admire about the local Chamber of Commerce. They promote all local businesses fairly - even those who don't carry a membership in their organization. It's a principle each and every member on the Board of Directors of the Chamber is responsible for because it reflects on his or her individual level of integrity.

Our business core is too small for grudges to get in the way. If you don't like someone, that's your problem. Spreading that around you're personal circle of influence only makes you out to be just as much of a jerk as the person you are trying to harm. This goes for all relationships, personal and professional.

Besides, how much trust are you going to put in someone if they tell you not to shop somewhere 'because the owner is a jerk' or some other petty Grade 5 reason?

After reading Ms. Tegart's glowing report about herself and her party, I had to pinch myself to make sure that she and I were in the same province and in the same town. Everyone is talking about the budget surplus but no one is talking about how that might have been accomplished. Let us talk about realities. Our medical premiums went up; my husband and I have to pay the same rate that a family that makes \$100,000/year, and we make a quarter of that and I believe that our present government will be raising that amount yet again. Our health performance ranks what? After health authorities successfully destroyed rural health care in our provinces and pocketed the money surplus. What did we get? From the start many people in town were not able to get a family doctor and it has become

progressively worse. I had to wait two months for an appointment, it was not an emergency but nonetheless, I have never had to wait that long before!

When I first came to Princeton, there were 3 doctors and later 2 others joined them. There were more people living in Princeton; we had our own hospital; we had an emergency room and an operating room; many surgical procedures were done locally and children were born here. Time progressed and it became clear that the government's agenda was a destroying mission, Princeton had fewer doctors but yet everyone was able to boast of a family doctor. When these doctors retired there were no others to take their place. Not only that, IHA made it extremely difficult for new doctors to get hired. In the end we got what every other rural community received, presented in such a way that it made us feel special, but we

weren't. Now, thanks to the BC Liberal Government (a misnomer), we have a fragmented health system. The community of Princeton built the hospital and the government took it away, a story repeated all over the province. When it comes to health care we have a farce.

The health story is not the only thing that Ms. Tegart got wrong. A government does not deserve kudos when it under funds essential services like libraries, museums, parks, crisis centres, etc. These services are an integral part the cultural, social, and economic fabric of a community.

Please, Ms. Tegart, put me on the same planet that you are coming from!

## Global Warming Hoax Revealed

Recently, I read an article describing the Great Lakes as 81 percent frozen over. The author of the article said it was all due to global warming. I couldn't believe people are still pushing that notion. How can more cold be the result of more heat? Are we supposed to believe black is white?

Although not much world news comes to us these days via major media, my computer showed me photos of children clearing snow in Istanbul at the same time I read about the Great Lakes and the horrendous snowstorm in eastern Canada and the United States. I saw photos of 70 cm. of snow in the mountains in Turkey along with 10 cm. of snow in Lebanon. For the third winter in a row, snow has fallen in northern Saudi Arabia. Refugees died in the cold temperatures in Turkey. Babies died of the cold in Bulgaria this winter.

Global warming has been proven a hoax, so when will people get over it?

Here are some facts about global warming. First, the data on which the concept is based is not valid. The original data was based on a 900 year study of tree rings in specific locations, not necessarily worldwide. The idea was that tree rings would be wider in warm weather and narrower in cold weather. No other growth factors were taken into consideration. Then, when calculating for years since 1960, instead of tree rings, they began using actual thermometer readings, which shot the numbers much higher. So, from 900 years ago to 1960, they were counting apples and in 1960 they began counting oranges. This is not the way you do scientific research.

This data had another flaw. It ignored the fact that 900 years ago Vikings were farming in southern Greenland. The data also ignored the century of cold weather in Charles Dickens' times, when the Thames River was ice-covered every winter. A further study was done, based on probable temperatures, but it had flaws, too.

Two Canadians, Steve McIntyre and Ross McKittrick dared challenge the data on which the global warming concept is based. McIntyre is a mining engineer and McKittrick is a professor of economics. They were promptly labelled as crazy, or closely affiliated with the oil industry, which was not true. Another Canadian, Donna Laframboise, wrote a book exposing the IPCC (an international organization promoting global warming), in which she exposed

the corruption in the IPCC and its affiliated organizations. Many other researchers tried to review the data on which the global warming theory was based, but were denied access on the grounds they might find something wrong with it!

Most damaging to the global warming promoters were the stolen emails between global warming colleagues which revealed their frustration in not being able to explain the decline in global temperatures after 1998. One email referred to a trick to hide the decline. The emails in general revealed the promoters of global warming had 'doctored' data. Despite this revelation, these promoters continued to call anyone challenging their theory as somebody 'deranged' and worthy of humiliation. In the meantime, Russian scientists were stating global temperatures were dropping.

Doctoring data continued, despite the 2009 Copenhagen conference falling apart as one group accused another. In 2010, works published were shown to be not only inaccurate, but some were outright lies. The melting of glaciers in the Himalayas was false, and had actually been taken from a WWF fundraising pamphlet and included as fact in an official report. Just this past January, a report on global warming was shown to be questionable because the report on 2014 temperatures did not include October, November or December! How can you accurately report .....continued on Page 19

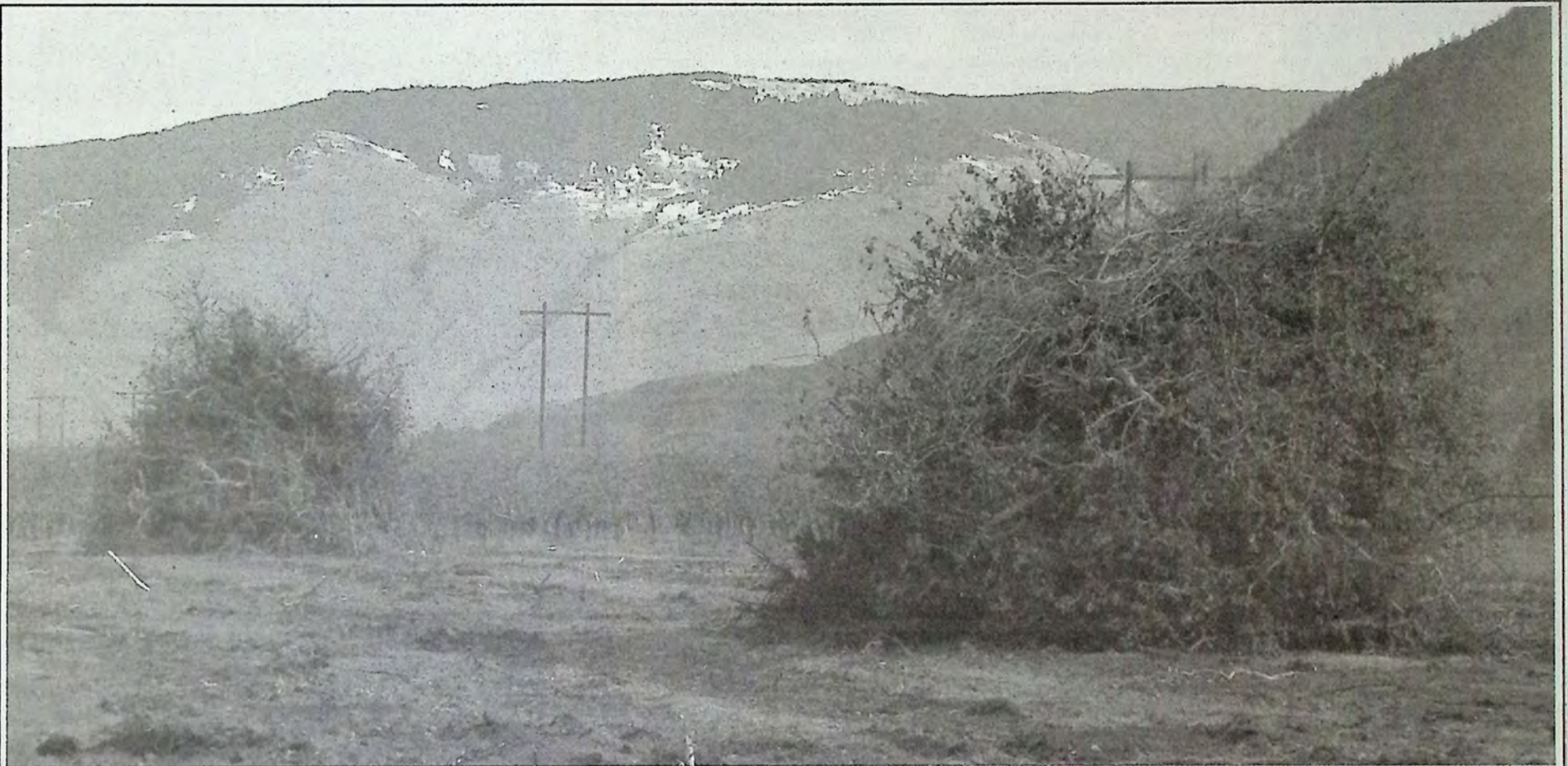

## Keremeos RCMP release 2014 Q4 statistics

Keremeos RCMP Detachment Commander Cpl. Michael Gallagher recently presented the fourth quarter report to Keremeos Village Council.

The date presented is from October to December 2014 and is intended to provide Keremeos Council with an overview of policing operations during that time in

the Village.

"Each RCMP Detachment is mandated to prepare an annual performance plan which addresses identified local policing priorities," Cpl. Gallagher stated.

"These are identified through consultation with elected officials, senior staff members, Community Policing Advisory Committees and

other stakeholders. As such, our 2014/15 plan focuses on the following issues: 1. Contribute to Safe Road 2. Reduce the Abuse of Drugs 3. Police/Community Relations - Police Visibility 4. Contribute to Safer Youth 5. Crime Reduction - Prolific Offender Management and 6. Contribute to Safer, Healthier Aboriginal Communities."

During the fourth quarter of 2014, Keremeos RCMP responded to 331 calls for service compared with 369 calls received during the fourth quarter of 2013, corresponding to a decrease of 10%.

In total, Keremeos RCMP responded to 1,686 calls for service this year, up by 10% compared with the 1,533 calls received in 2013. Keremeos RCMP responded to 22% fewer Criminal Code files throughout the detachment area during the fourth quarter of 2014 than during the same quarter last year, and ended the year with 39% more Criminal Code files than there were in 2013.

In regard to contributing to safe

roads, "Members conduct routine traffic stops on a regular basis for all MVA offences including distracted driving," Cpl. Gallagher reported.

"Keremeos members have teamed up with SOTS and IRSU in conducting traffic enforcement."

As for reducing the abuse of drugs, "Known drug houses in the community continue to be closely watched by members."

Keremeos detachment has one DARE member who provides outreach to schools relating to drug and alcohol awareness.

Cpl. Gallagher stated that as far as police/community relations and police visibility are concerned, "Several Keremeos RCMP members were in attendance during Remembrance Day ceremonies. Two members also participated in the Keremeos Christmas Light-up Parade. The detachment commander is in regular contact with media and strives to keep the community informed of ongoing issues, events and crime trends."

In addition, Crime Stoppers responded to six tips relating to events in the Keremeos area this quarter and 20 throughout 2014.

To assist the Keremeos Detachment in realizing the goal of Contributing to Safer Youth, three initiatives have been identified for 2014; continued support for the Restorative Justice Program, High Risk youth programming and ongoing commitment to the School

Liaison Program. Cst. Scheidl and A/Cst. Beglaw are school liaisons and DARE teachers for the schools in Keremeos.

"Prolific offenders are the small percentage of individuals who are responsible for a disproportionate amount of crime," Cpl. Gallagher explained.

"The Prolific Offender Management (POM) program is based on an inter-agency collaborative effort involving Community Corrections, R.C.M.P., Crown Counsel, Ministry of Housing and Social Development, Correctional Services of Canada and the Ministry for Children and Family Development (Youth Services, Child Protection and Youth Probation)."

Protection of the community and reduction of recidivism are the guiding principles of this program, achieved by collaborative case management, consistent sharing of information amongst the program partners and engaging the offenders with community services to address their criminal behaviour.

"Members continue to check offenders for compliance on court-ordered conditions such as curfews."

Cpl. Gallagher also stated that as for contributing to a safer, healthier Aboriginal community, "Keremeos FNP member Cst. Harper attends Chief and Counsel meetings on a regular basis as well as community events."

## Motion urges Home Children apology

NDP MP Alex Atamanenko introduced a motion in the House of Commons February 23rd urging the government to follow Australia and the UK's lead and formally apologize to Canada's British Home Children and Child Migrants as well as their families and descendants. It is estimated that over 11 percent of Canada's current population are descended from British home children and child migrants.

According to the BC MP, between the years 1869 and 1948 the Canadian government was complicit in a huge injustice when it allowed an estimated 100,000 orphaned or impoverished British children to be imported into Canada, often without their parents' consent or knowledge, to provide what amounted to indentured servitude for Canadian farms and households.

"Torn from family, friends and country, these children were met with severe discrimination and often placed with no further monitoring in harsh or abusive situations where they were exploited," noted Atamanenko.

"Never should defenseless, lonely, loveless children be treated in such a way anywhere in the world," declared Tom Isherwood, a Child Migrant brought to Canada at the age of 8.

"When asked to be heard nobody listened, not even God, as we were to be seen and not heard."

"Canadians have largely forgotten this fundamental aspect of their history," says author Sean Arthur Joyce, who last year published a history of the British Home Children in western Canada.

"Yet in a very real sense this country was built on the backs of these children at a time when the Canadian agricultural industry was just beginning. We're willing to thank our war veterans for their sacrifices but we need to do the same for the families of these children. It's a sign of strength, not weakness, to come clean and apologize for past wrongs."

Atamanenko hopes that Canadians in their numbers will get behind the idea of the motion and begin to exert pressure on the government until it is moved to act.

"Facilitating access to locked files being held by relevant British agencies that continue to hinder survivors and descendants of these officially sanctioned programs in their efforts to track down family members would be a helpful step," notes Atamanenko.

"I believe it is long overdue for our government to honour this important part of our nation's story in a .....continued on Page 18

## Living Past 100

### The Measles Hype And The Truth

Recent media coverage of the measles cases has blown out of proportion the real truth about measles, and major media has covered up the truth about the current measles cases. There are two sides to the measles issue.

First, measles vaccines do not prevent anyone from contracting measles. The vaccine is meant to expose the body to the measles virus in a way that makes the full-fledged disease less harmful. An outbreak of measles at the University of California Los Angeles showed 91 percent of those contracting measles were previously vaccinated. At a conference of the American Society for Microbiology on April 27, 1979, a paper was presented showing the results of a study which indicated an average of 41 percent of those vaccinated against measles would contract measles later in life.

The long term study of measles outbreaks up to 1975 showed a steady decline in serious cases. Public health researchers concluded the decline was due to better nutrition more than any other cause. In other words, the better fed a child is, the less likely that child is to suffer from serious consequences from having measles.

These are old facts, possibly forgotten by the general public, and perhaps never known by today's young parents.

There is another fact exposed by Dr. Suzanne Humphries, who decided to study the strain of the current cases of measles. Earlier this month, she reported finding measles virus in the urine of those who had contracted this particular strain of measles. The surprise was the fact that the specific strain of the measles cases she studied was a strain that came from the measles vaccination, which is unlike the 'wild' strain of measles. The other fact she reported was the virus was still present in the urine many days after the symptoms emerged in the patient. She expressed concern that the patients could have infected others after being vaccinated.

The uproar over unvaccinated children and efforts made to shame or force parents to have their children vaccinated to prevent measles cases is not based on the facts, but rather a reaction by those who do not know the facts.

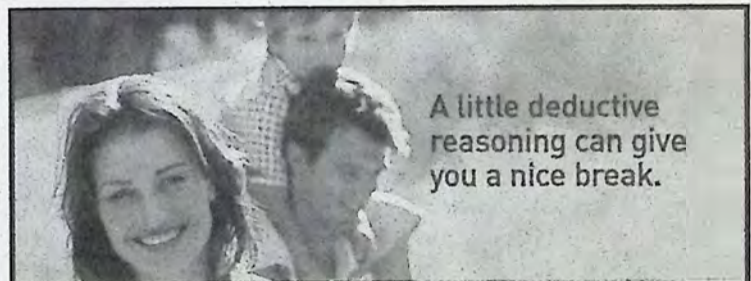

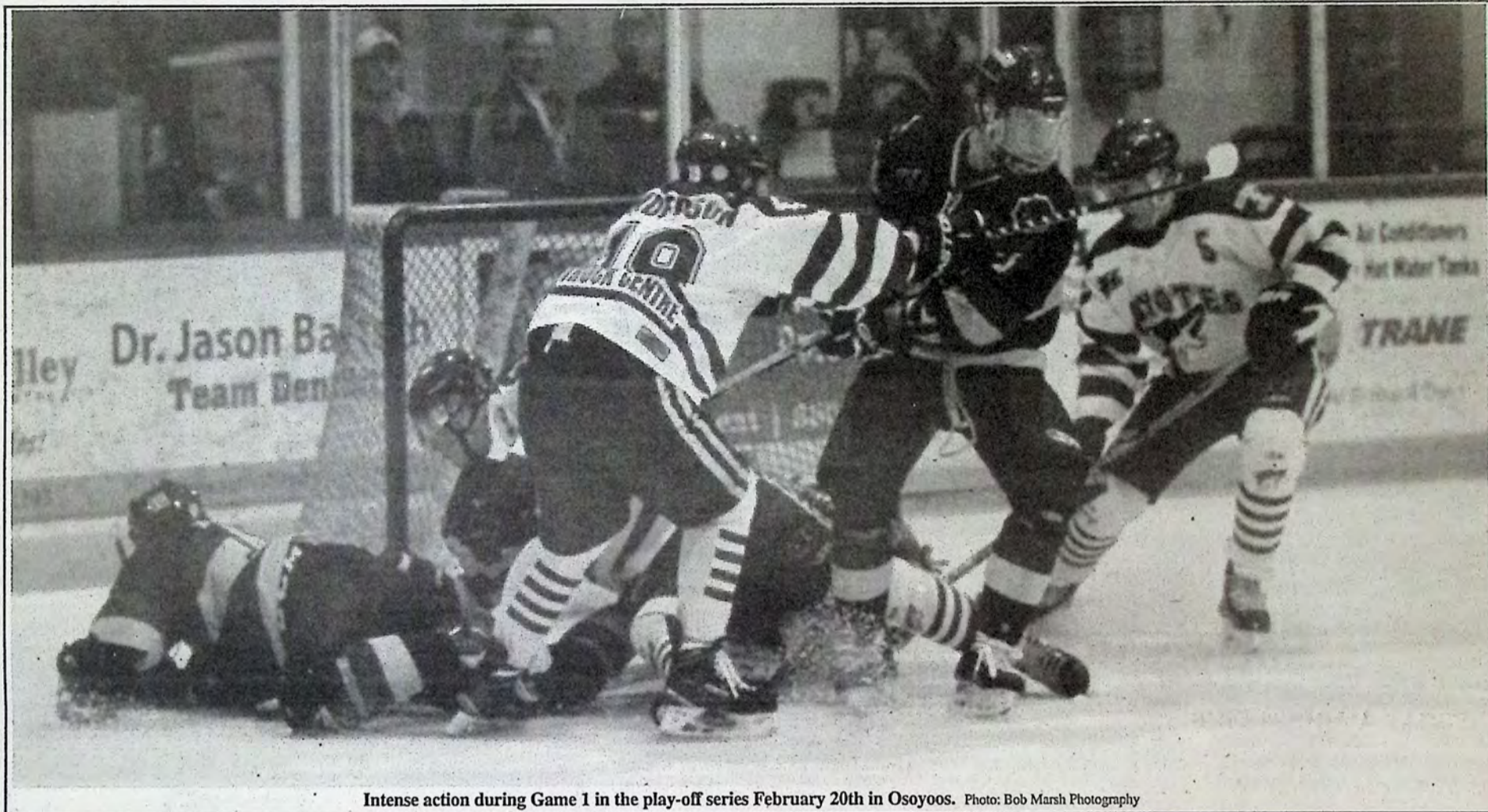

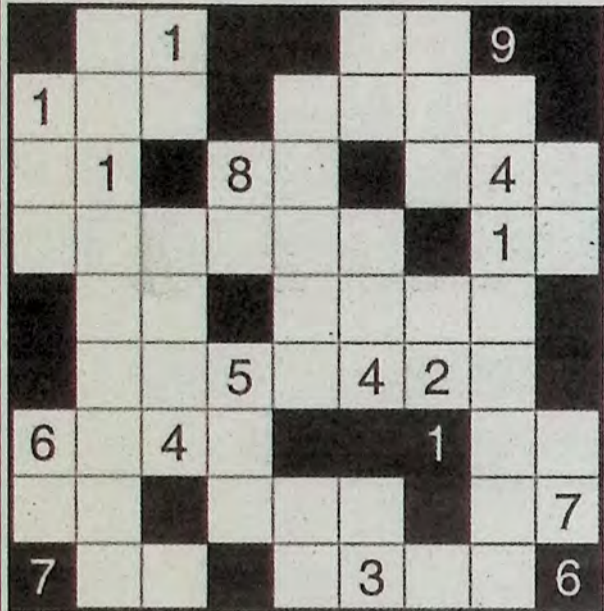

Osoyoos finished the series ahead 209-143 but both teams had most of their shots on goal in the second period of the play-off games. Osoyoos shots on goal stats for the

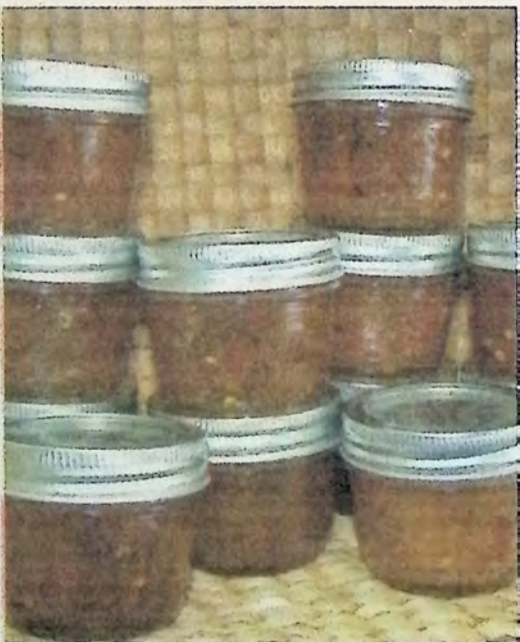
series were 69-73-60-7 with Princeton's per period shots at 42-50-48-3.

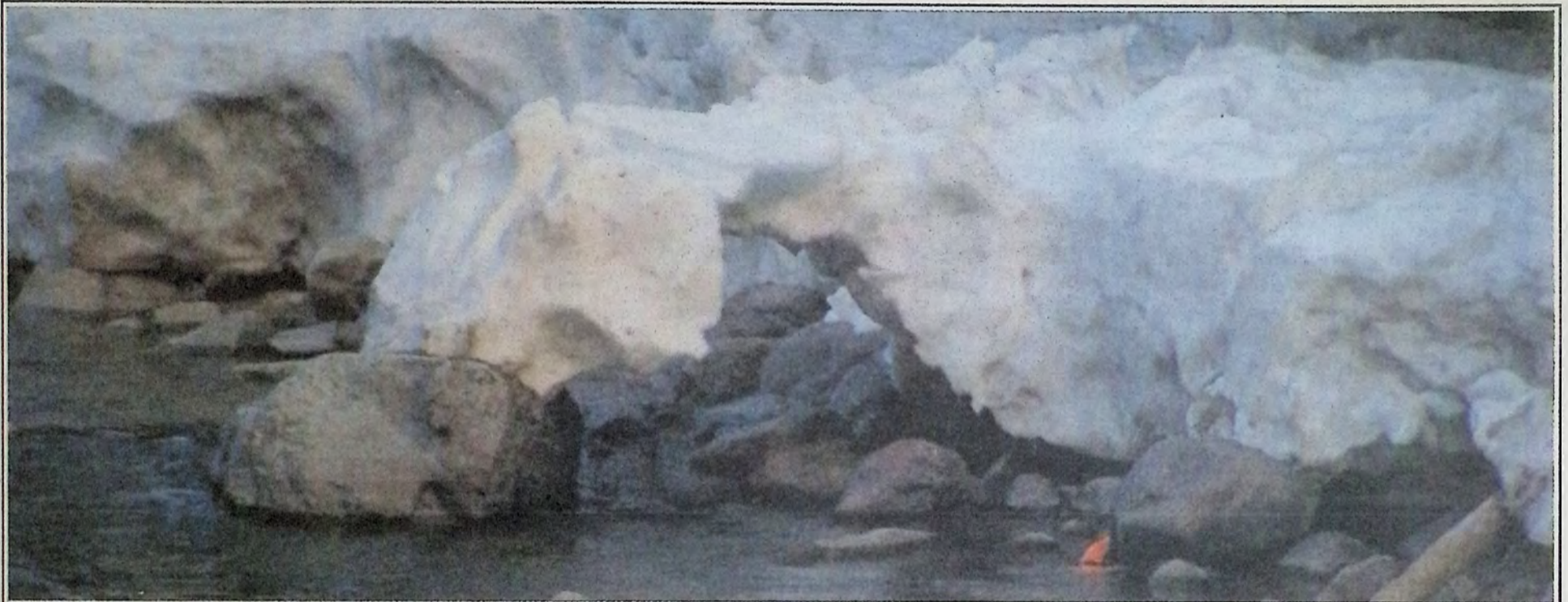

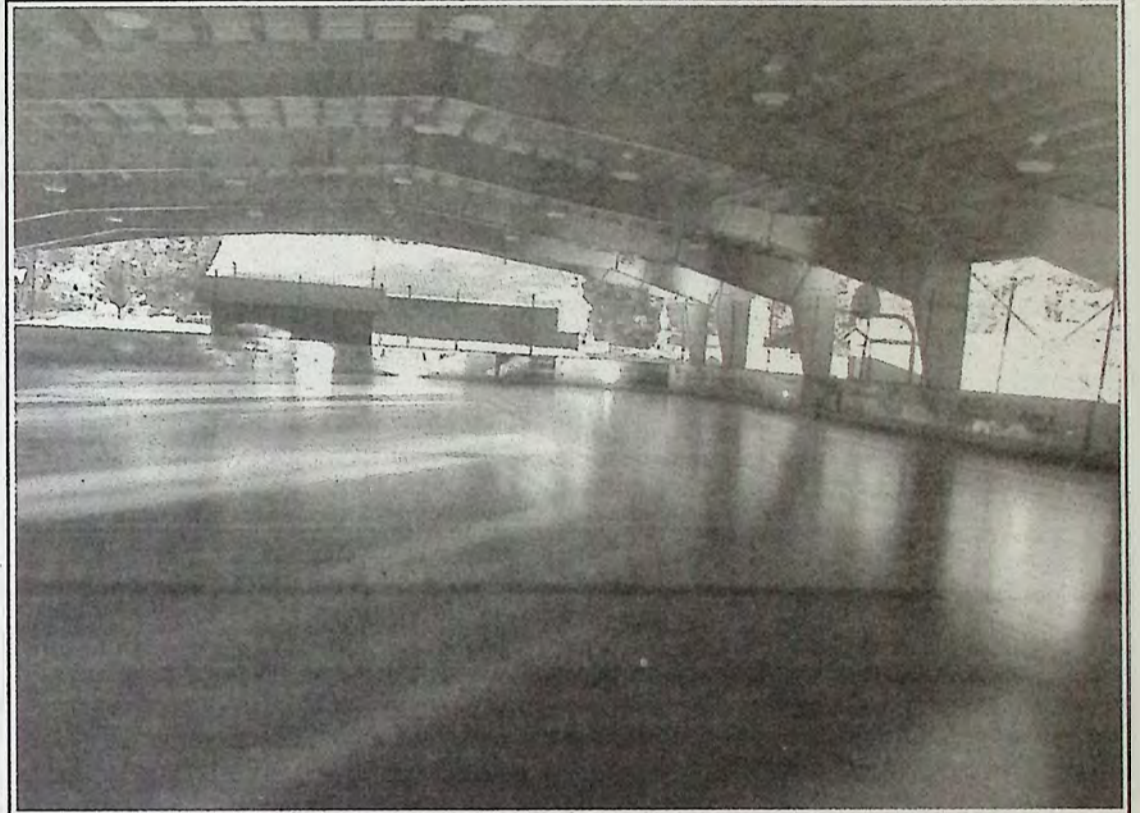

# Saving Downtown Princeton...

...An Ongoing Series by George Elliott

This week I want to take another look at something I really enjoy and that is marketing.

For those of you who don't know much about me, here is my short resume: I have been in the Media business since 1978. The majority of that time was in Radio and throughout my entire career I have been involved in advertising in one form or other.

To verify that I didn't recently fall off the turnip truck and in fact know a thing or two about marketing you can snoop around my website ([www.looseink.ninja](http://www.looseink.ninja)).

You'll probably notice there that in the past year I have spent an extensive amount of time studying internet marketing.

One of my favourite forms of advertising is commonly called Guerrilla Marketing. In simple terms, this is a form of advertising that may not be considered mainstream. Much of the advertising work I did in Radio involved an offshoot of Guerrilla Marketing where the ad copy sometimes had to be different to stand out. That often meant creating ad copy that may have been considered 'out of left

field' but would often achieve the desired affect of getting noticed and talked about.

I have used some of those tactics in some print ads here at the News Leader.

I love word play and a client of mine many years ago started selling cell phones in Princeton. I believe he was the first cell phone dealer in town. The ad I created for that contained only three words plus his contact info.

The ad read: "We cell phones" and it generated a ton of business for him because some people were pointing out that (in their mind) there was a glaring typo in the ad.

There are other, subtle methods of Guerrilla Marketing that are employed by some local businesses to this very day and I want to point out a few because, quite honestly, I'm jealous I didn't come up with the campaigns.

When Cowboy Coffee started opening at 4:30 AM I seem to recall

it was primarily to reach to the construction crews in town working on the Copper Mountain Mine. My apologies if my memory is not entirely correct.

That is a form of Guerrilla Marketing that did not require regular forms of advertising and became a huge draw built on word of mouth. Barb and Corry deserve a huge pat on the back for seeing a market niche and pouncing on it.

Another form of Guerrilla Marketing was when Cool Beanz moved into the location formerly held by Cowboy Coffee. John and Carolyn got a good jump start to their business using a spot familiar to travellers as a coffee shop. This is not uncommon in larger communities where clothing stores or gas stations move from one location to another used for the same kind of business.

In Princeton it has been common with restaurants (Elbow Room to BacktoJack's Cafe to The Funky

Monkey) and hair salons (Cut Above to The Style Chamber, Stylin' Jen's to Eikonic as examples).

Another person worthy of mention is Susan Robinson at Ace Hardware.

It was her idea that I create a series of ads on the Back Page of this paper that were not entirely 'selling' but informational as well. She called them infomercials and that is what they became. They must have worked as she told me often that she was receiving feedback about the content.

It is entirely because of her ad campaign that I started using the infomercial format for the JamBusters! product my wife, Brenda created in our kitchen.

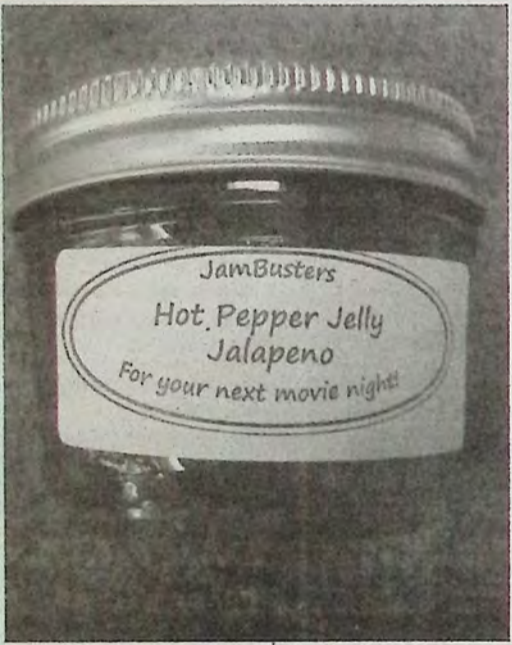

Ron and Nancy at Sweet Sensations get my top prize (if I was awarding one) for that incredibly amazing form of 'stealth marketing' (that's what it's called) with the flower petals on the sidewalk

outside their Bridge Street store at Valentine's.

An idea I wish was mine! There are risks associated with Guerilla Marketing, as there's always someone who may be offended in some way by what is nothing more than a gimmick to get people to see your product and become customers. I wouldn't doubt someone has found fault in

all the examples I have described here and that's too bad as none of them are malicious in nature.

I had a client years ago who ran his ad upside down weekly in this paper. I got many complaints, some from people claiming their intelligence was being mocked, but in the end, the client did well in his business.

I can tell you that the forms of Guerilla Marketing I have used for JamBusters! have also been successful as the products sell. I am using most of my tactics online, leaning towards Twitter mostly as that is where much of the traffic to the JamBusters! website is coming from. I have a program that tells me and the reach is greater there than on Facebook for the JamBusters! online product. This paper produces the majority of the traffic buying product in our store.

The past six months of the JamBusters! print marketing plan (I have a different one I am using online) has been an experiment of sorts. I can tell you that if you are talking about it, then it must be working. If you are a business owner, imagine if you were to employ some of the methods I've used when promoting your business.

The point I'm making here is that advertising and promotion works and sometimes it needs to be a bit unconventional in traditional forms of media.

Why have I told you all of this? I think one way to save downtown Princeton is to tackle some form of Guerilla Marketing. Our marketing .....continued on Page 20
