A new bylaw was introduced at the March 26th annual general meeting of Princeton and District Museum and Archives Society. The bylaw read: "The Society, at its Annual General Meeting, and on recommendation by the Board, may designate as Honourary President a member who is deemed to have made an extraordinary contribution to the Society. The Honourary President is exempted from the payment of membership fees and is a member ex officio of the Board."

Following acceptance of the new bylaw, long-time volunteer Evelyn McCallum was named as Honourary President.

"I'm honoured...and shocked," were her words following the announcement.

Fair Board loses key volunteer

Members of Princeton Fall Fair Association reluctantly bid farewell to a dedicated member on March 24. Unable to find employment in Princeton, Lisa Carleton is moving to another town where she has found a job. The Fair Board is losing a volunteer who, through the past many years, has run the Junior Fair, chaired the Entertainment Committee and served as Treasurer. Carleton's duties as Treasurer shifted to Jennifer Bernard, Secretary, and Rayleen Brewer takes over as the new Secretary. Bernard, a mem-

ber of the Entertainment Committee, continues in that role and is now the main contact for entertainment. A person is needed to run the Junior Fair.

A major concern for Fair Board members is securing suitable activities for children and youth. A growing company from Kamloops has been contracted to come to the fair with a variety of suitable attractions. The Fair Board is negotiating with a lower mainland company to bring mechanical rides to the fair, but no commitments have been

made at this time.

As it is the 50th Princeton Fall Fair, special displays are being made to highlight the families who were originally involved in the Women's Institute and the Princeton Light Horse Club who put together the first fair in 1966. Shirley Freding is making a large display board showing photos of those families, and is still gathering materials for this project. The local families include the Willis family, the Beys, the Sellers, the Allison, the Fredings, the Shopshires, the Fergusons and a number of others.

There are still Fergusons and a Freding on the Fair Board, descendants of those who began the fair. Three of the original Women's Institute members, who began planning the fair in 1965, are still residents of Princeton and will be honoured at this year's fair on

September 12.

Dawn Johnson has been collecting photographs and news articles from the Fall Fair back files to put on display. There will be many names and faces of people who participated in the fair during the past 50 years.

Shirley Freding will have her tent filled with children's arts and crafts materials once again, and the amazing milk cow she built will be available for children to try their skills at milking a cow.

Two members of the Fair Board will participate in a tourism networking opportunity on April 8 at Riverside Centre. They will be gathering information and tips on how to spread the word of the fair. Bernard gave an update of the successful booth at the BC Cowboy Festival, where she and Rayleen Brewer gave out information and goody bags to promote all of the

events taking place this year at the fairgrounds.

There are plans underway to hold an equestrian event at the fair along with a team roping event. Should both of these events take place, the fair will attract a great many out of town visitors.

Members of the Fall Fair will participate in the April 19th user group work party and potluck lunch. This is an excellent opportunity to examine all of the facilities, decide what needs to be repaired or updated for each event, and to plan priorities for upcoming work. As well, it is a great opportunity for all of the volunteers to get together socially. Anyone who volunteered for events last year is welcome to attend.

Bringing High-Speed Internet Access To All

One of the highlights of Budget 2015 unveiled last month was our commitment to bring high-speed Internet connectivity to more people in rural and remote areas of B.C.

In fact, our goal is to see every British Columbian, no matter where they live, have access to high-speed Internet by 2021 - and we will work with other levels of government and the private sector to make this happen.

Under our 10-year, \$1-billion agreement with Telus, we have already seen bandwidth upgrades in the Fraser-Nicola communities of Clinton, Lytton and Gold Bridge. We are also continuing to connect

B.C.'s First Nations at a steady pace. To date, 184 of B.C.'s 203 First Nations communities now have access to broadband infrastructure and we are working to see all 203 connected by the end of fiscal year 2016-17.

In Fraser-Nicola, almost all First Nations have Internet access, including the Upper Similkameen band.

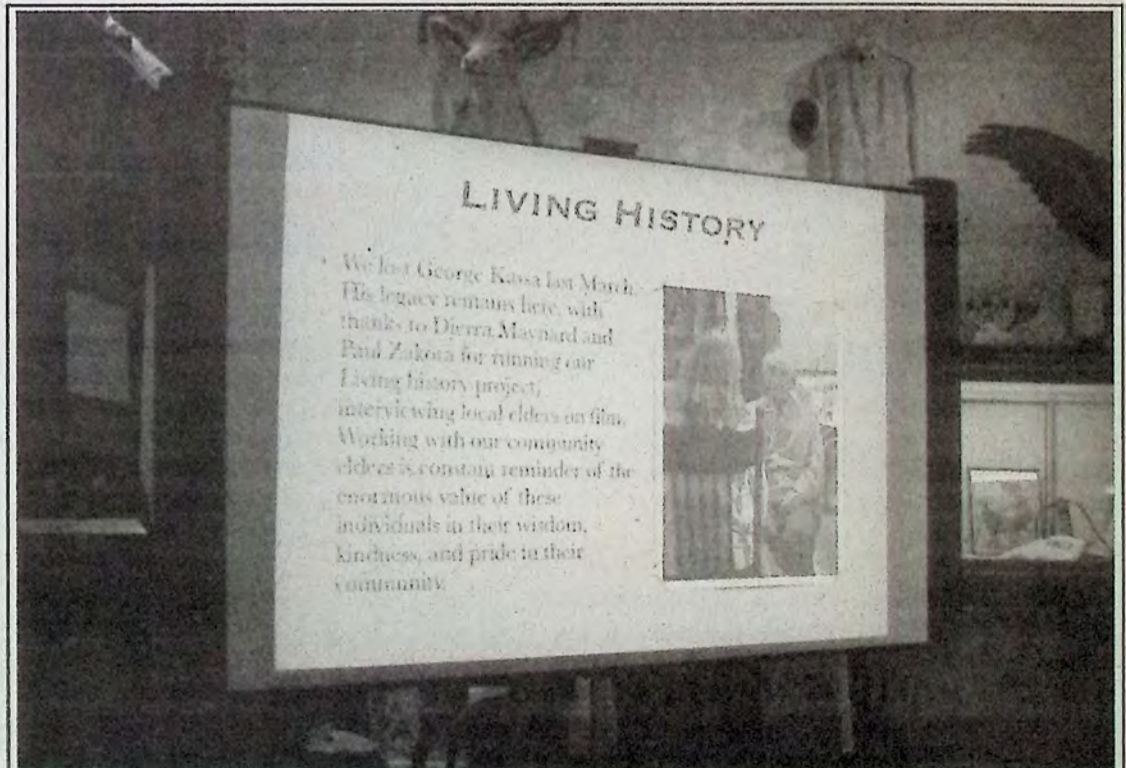
This is made possible through Pathways to Technology, a \$48.8-million federal-provincial project designed specifically to connect First Nations communities to the Internet.

Connecting people in rural and remote areas to high-speed Internet

service helps level the playing field with people in urban areas.

What does high-speed Internet access mean to people in rural and remote areas? Not only does it connect families, but it also improves access to educational opportunities and health-care services, creates jobs, and expands markets for businesses - connecting local firms to domestic, national and global customers.

Our government believes all residents of Fraser-Nicola should be able to share the rich potential for economic, educational and social benefits high-speed Internet access can bring. And rest assured we are going to make it happen.

Speaking of caves, it won't be long before we start seeing marmots out and about again.

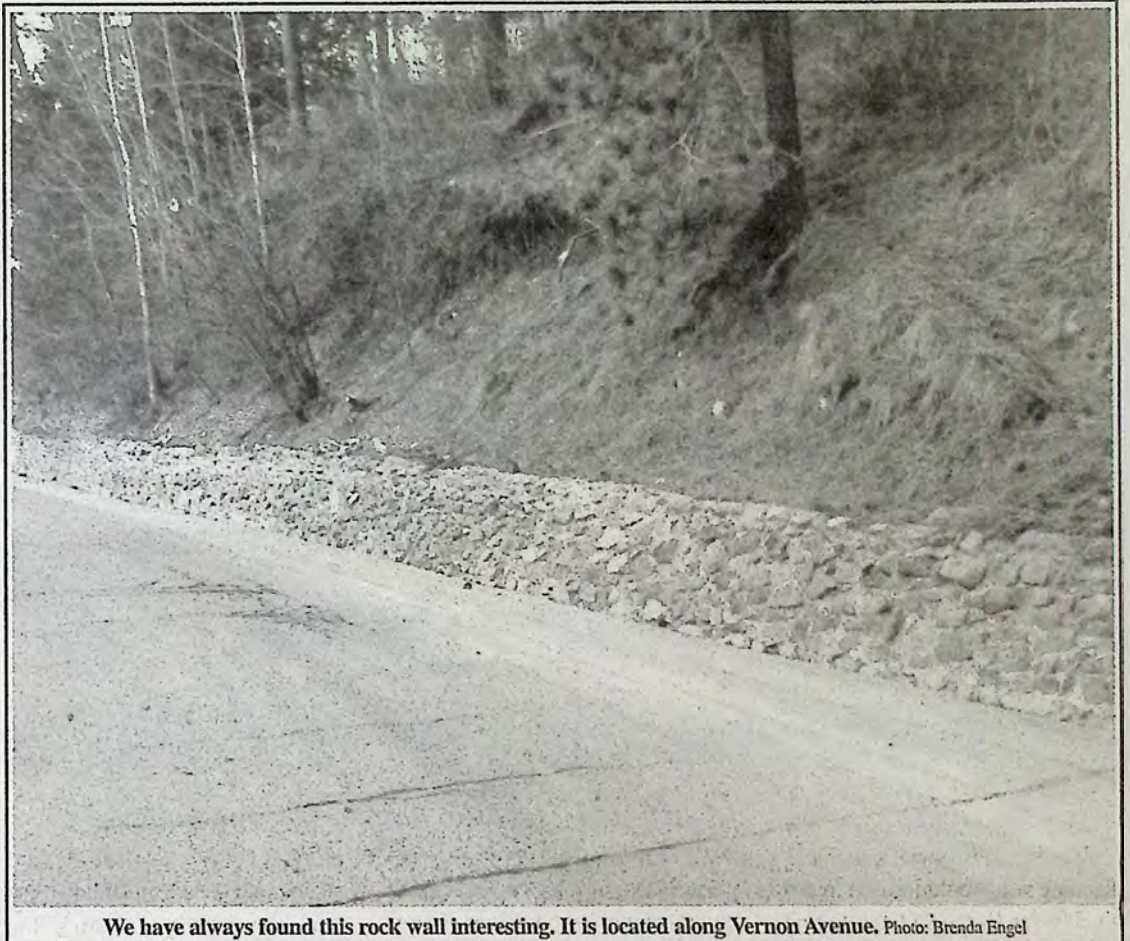
In the Lower Similkameen they are already mowing lawns and blossoms are popping out all over the area.

Bill 11 to strengthen K-12 accountability, efficiency and professional development

Bill 11, the Education Statutes Amendment Act (2015) will help school districts reduce overhead costs, establish a modern framework for teacher professional development and put a stronger focus on accountability for student outcomes, Education Minister Peter Fassbender announced March 26th.

Proposed amendments to the School Act, the Independent School Act and the Teachers Act are focussed on four objectives:

- building a framework for continuing professional development;
- facilitating delivery of shared services among school districts;
- improving the accountability framework for student learning; and
- aligning the provisions on the disclosure of student data with the Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act.

"British Columbians expect our K-12 system to be run efficiently, that teachers and students have the supports they need, and that everyone is focussed on what matters most - student learning. That's what these amendments are all about," stated Minister of

Education Peter Fassbender.

"British Columbia has one of the best education systems in the world, but we can't just sit back. We need to pursue new, innovative approaches that promise better results for students.

"The research is very clear that one of the most important ways to support students is to focus on quality teaching. That's why these amendments set a foundation on which the Province will work cooperatively with the teaching profession to build a truly modern framework for professional development.

"Most professions - such as lawyers, accountants, or nurses - set detailed standards for ongoing learning. Early childhood educators have clear requirements. It's time to put teaching on a similar footing."

Currently, there are no detailed requirements for certified teachers to maintain currency of practice. The proposed amendments to the Teachers Act will provide the minister with the authority to establish a more robust framework. Working with the profession, the goal is to enhance public confi-

dence that certified teachers have access to, and are regularly participating in, high-quality professional development aimed at improving student achievement.

Boards of education have been tasked with finding administrative savings and efficiencies, similar to what has occurred in the health and post-secondary sectors.

Amendments to the School Act will provide boards with clear authority to enter into shared service or alternative service delivery agreements with other boards or public sector entities. To maximize the opportunities and benefits, the changes also provide the Minister with the authority to require boards to participate in specific service delivery arrangements.

School districts are currently required to produce a series of annual reports to ensure they are accountable for local student achievement. In recent years it has become clear the K-12 system would benefit from more meaningful and flexible approaches. Amendments to the School Act will remove inflexible language and processes and replace themcontinued on Page 10

water surface is 361 million square kilometers. The atmosphere is 11 km. high, but you would have to travel 120 km. straight up before you would reach what scientists call 'space.'

Earth's crust, under oceans, is 5 km. to 10 km. thick. Under land, the crust is 30 km. to 50 km. thick. The continents move relentlessly over the surface, scraping each other, causing earthquakes at points where one mass slides under another. In places where the crust is thinner, the crust may crack a little, and volcanoes emerge over these 'hot spots,' often creating new small land masses, as in the case of the Hawaiian Islands or New Zealand or Yellowstone.

The size of a human when compared to the size of the planet is like comparing an ant to a human or comparing a molecule to an ant. When we build a bridge, we think we have achieved a great thing, but it is like an ant putting twigs across a tiny rivulet. I am sure the ant is very proud of his achievement, too, but it has no impact on the planet.

When a large volcanic eruption takes place, such as Mt. St. Helens or Pinatubo, we humans stand back in awe, but the eruption has little effect on the planet because the volcano is so small in compar-

ison to the mass of the planet. When there is a huge ocean storm, or a large tsunami, the waves are as tall as a three storey building, but the storm has little effect on the planet. Everything happening on the surface of the planet has as much impact on the planet as the waxy surface of a fresh apple. All of the things we do are just part of a very thin layer of Earth, like the waxy surface of the apple.

I have little patience with the human ego that says we are harming the planet. What we do affects that extremely thin layer of the planet's surface on which we depend for our lives. What we do to that thin layer can either benefit us or destroy us. The planet doesn't care. The planet has been around for more than a billion years and it survived well without us.

As part of the life that exists on Earth, all we have is each other and our intelligence to protect us from the planet and our own egos. I watch people dealing with floods, and recall my grandmother telling me, "Always build on high ground." Watching television, I see people's homes destroyed by land sliding into the sea and think, "The sea is constantly battering the coast, you shouldn't build so close to it."

We humans tend to take an egotistical view of planet Earth. Our view of Earth puts us at the center, as if what we do has a big impact on the planet. We need to change our perspective.

Earth is big, although not as big as five other planets. Measuring around the equator, you would have to travel 40,075 km. Through the middle, at the equator, Earth measures 12,756.3 km. From pole to pole, it is 12,714 km. deep. Its volume is one trillion, 80 billion cubic kilometers. Its weight is 5.98 X 10 to the 24th power kilograms, meaning you would have to multiply 5.98 kg. by ten 24 times to find the weight.

The land surface of Earth is 149 million square kilometers. The

Tegart announces two grants

Two organizations in Merritt will receive grants totalling more than \$15,000 from the province's civil forfeiture program toward reducing violence.

A grant of \$10,648 goes toward providing workshops and teacher training across the school district to promote anti-violence awareness and strategies for all students from kindergarten through Grade 10. Project funds will also support workshop trainers in Healthy Relationships and Second Steps programs to train staff and students.

"Every student has the right to go to school and go through life without fear of violence," Fraser-Nicola MLA Jackie Tegart said.

"This program promotes anti-violence awareness, but also goes much further by teaching self-awareness and self-confidence."

A grant of \$4,725 goes to the Nicola Valley Community Human Services Association. The project will enable 35 service providers working with women who have experienced or at risk of experiencing violence in Merritt and sur-

rounding area to attend a two-day interactive training seminar on understanding the dynamics and impacts of violence in relationships including vicarious trauma.

"This training will educate at-risk women about abusive relationships," Tegart said.

"It will allow them to make the right decisions that allow them to leave harmful situations and move on with their lives."

This year, the priority focus for civil forfeiture proceeds is on initiatives about violence against women, through the Violence Free BC initiative, as it will be in years to come. Other areas where funding was made available included serving victims through restorative justice, community and youth crime prevention, and police training and equipment.

For this round of civil forfeiture grants, a call for applications was made in November 2014 and recipients were selected using the established grant criteria set out in the application form.

Since the civil forfeiture program became active, it has returned

approximately \$15 million from successful forfeiture actions to crime prevention and victims programs in B.C.

Violence Free BC is the provincial government's long term strategy and commitment to end violence against women. Acting as a roadmap, Violence Free BC combines immediate actions with a long-term vision to end the violence, and to support women whose lives and well-being have been impacted by violence.

Look back to murder in Cawston

Thirty years ago, everyone in the Similkameen Valley was talking about the headless corpse found in an orchard on Ferko Road in Cawston. The corpse was identified as Florence Otilie Deflers of Toulon, a small town near Paris, France. The head had been removed from her body by a very strong blow that cut one of her dangling earrings in half.

Florence Deflers had been reported as missing in July, 1984. She had left her boyfriend's residence in the Cariboo in late June to trav-

el to Cawston to meet with friends. She bought some food at the health food store in Keremeos, then walked to Cawston to her friends' house. They were not at home. Somehow, she arrived at the Nicholson home on Ferko Road. The Nicholsons were gone for the summer. The house was empty.

Her boyfriend contacted the friends, then tried to contact her.

The 26 year old French citizen was a student at a university in California. When she did not arrive at the university, and nobody

had heard from her, her parents and her boyfriend became seriously worried. In November, her photograph appeared in a local newspaper asking for any information as to her whereabouts. Nobody came forward.

Deflers father was an important member of the Paris media community, and he put pressure on Canada's diplomats to find his daughter. The diplomats managed to put pressure on the RCMP, but there were no real leads.

Deflers boyfriend heard of a psychic who had assisted police dur-

ing the Clifford Olson murder investigations. The boyfriend contacted the psychic, taking personal belongings of Deflers to the psychic. The psychic said Deflers was located in an orchard in the Cawston area. The search for Deflers began and ended at the Nicholson property, where evidence had been found indicating Deflers had been there.

When the Nicholsons had returned home in the autumn of 1984, they found a few women's items that did not belong to them. They knew somebody had been in

their home, but they did not know who it might have been. Then they found a paper bag containing food from the health food store, and they found Deflers wallet in the bag. They reported it to police.

Police swarmed the Nicholson property and found the shallow grave under a loose piece of plywood. The head was never found. A person who had been caretaking the property was arrested, but was acquitted in a trial held two years later.

The true identity of the murderer remains a mystery.

Taking back public health care

It's time for Canadians to take back the public health care agenda. For far too long, forces have been chipping away at our most cherished social program.

To get a glimpse of the future facing public health care today, just follow the money. This March 31 marks the first anniversary of a decade-long \$36 billion cut to health care transfers to the provinces by Ottawa.

B.C.'s share of that historic ten-year long reduction totals \$5 billion. I think we can all agree that less money for health care is not what is needed for our province. In fact, a Conference Board of Canada report released last August determined Victoria must invest \$1.8 billion more than budgeted for health care between 2014 and 2017 just to maintain current service levels.

Living Past 100

Chocolate Is Over-Rated

The health benefits of chocolate are greatly over-rated. Researchers have found there are flavanols in cacao beans that could be of major health benefits, but you will not find them in your chocolate bar. The very process that turns raw cacao into edible chocolate destroys the flavanols. Even if the process did not destroy the flavanols, you would not enjoy eating chocolate: the flavanols are so bitter you would have to take them in pill form.

What makes chocolate so good to eat is the taste, and that good taste depends a lot on sugar. Try eating a teaspoon full of pure cocoa, and you will find it is not all that appealing. Chocolate, on its own, is somewhat bitter. Unsweetened chocolate is not something we love. What we love is that combination of chocolate, cream and sugar.

Health Canada is urging us to reduce our intake of sugar, so the chocolate we find so tasty is not a really healthy product because it depends on sugar to make it taste so good.

When we consider the average candy bar, although chocolate may be one of the components, the rest is sugar. Candy bars may contain nuts, caramel, wafers, and toffee, but its main ingredient is sugar.

Sugars come in many forms, both as starches and as plain sugar, maple syrup and corn syrup, but all sugars have an effect on the body. High dosages of sugar tend to create moods that swing from happy to tired. Worst of all the effects of a high sugar diet is the inflammation sugar causes. We tend to think of sugar as causing diabetes, but inflammation causes joint pain and plaque build-up in the arteries.

If we look back in time to the origins of our body systems thousands of years ago, we know humans lived on diets in which sugars and starches were scarce. Humans lived on meat, fish, eggs, vegetables and fruits. There were almost no grains in that diet and almost no sweets except in the sweetness of fruit or the occasional raiding of a honey comb. In short, our body systems were adapted to consuming almost no sweets.

Perhaps our compulsion to savour sweets is due to that very lack of sweets in the prehistoric diet. Perhaps we overeat sweets because sweets were so rare in the prehistoric diet that when sweets were available to our prehistoric ancestors they ate all they could. As a food consumed once in a rare while, sweet foods did no harm. Today, when sugary and starchy foods are readily available, we have suffered the consequences of too much of a good thing.

With an ageing population requiring more complex care, this deliberate underfunding of services by both federal and provincial governments is playing out in very ugly ways - and the signs are everywhere.

Take the growth in private health care. For a third-year in a row, B.C. was fined for allowing illegal extra-billing of patients for services that are supposed to be free to all Canadians under the Canada Health Act.

Later this June, a B.C.-based private hospital owner will push for the reintroduction of two-tier medicine into Canada at the province's Supreme Court.

Then there's the impact on seniors' care.

According to a poll conducted last September, many of B.C.'s frail elderly do not, receive the attention they require.

Approximately three-quarters of B.C. care aides surveyed said they are forced to rush through basic care for the elderly and disabled because of high workloads and reduced staffing.

And let's not forget the workers who bear the brunt of health care cuts.

Between January 21 and February 26, nearly 1,500 health care workerscontinued on Page 18

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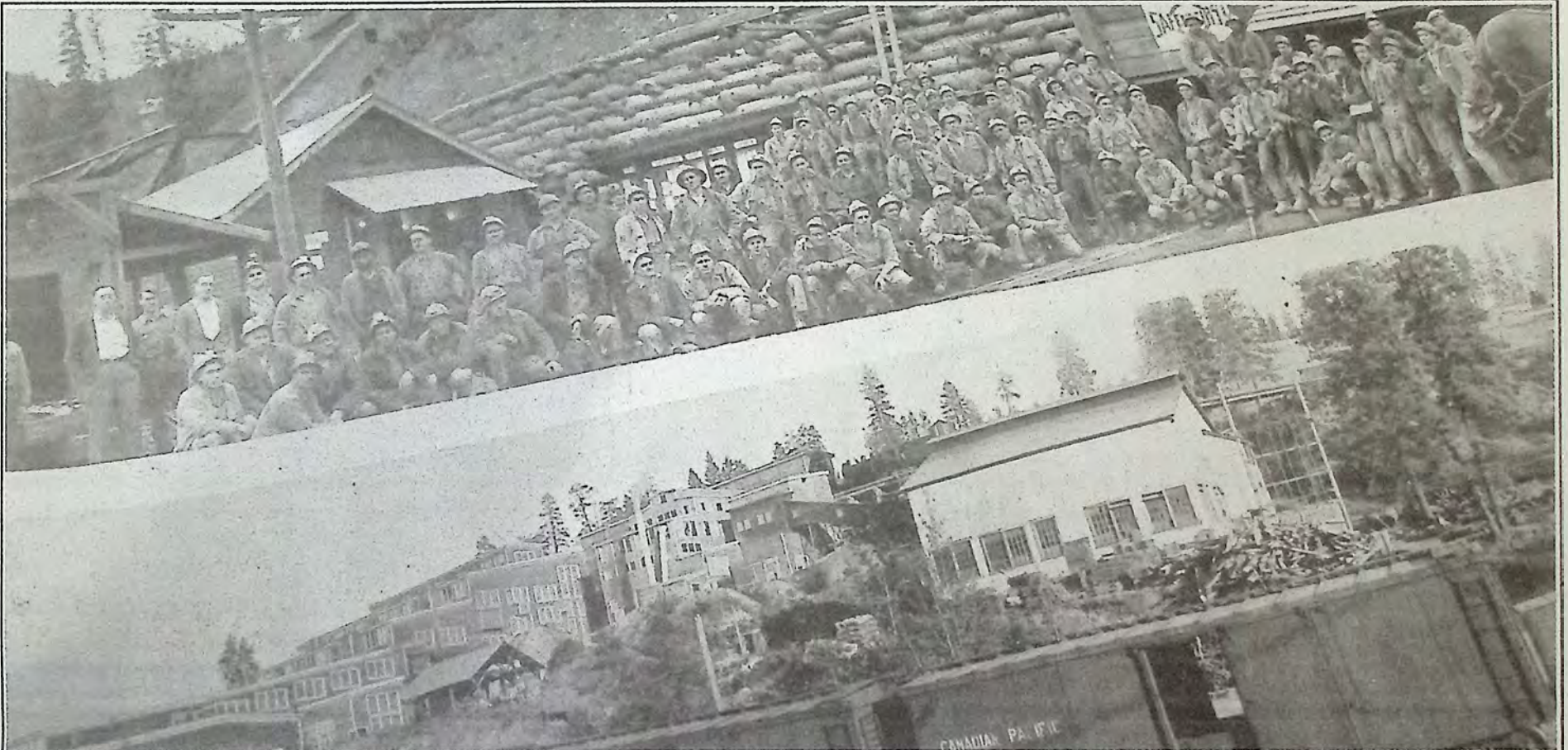

Health Care Steering Committee report

The Princeton Health Care Steering Committee (PHCSC) held its regular monthly meeting on Tuesday, March 17 at Princeton General Hospital. The meeting was attended by representatives from Area H (RDOS), the Town of Princeton, hospital administration, health care practitioners, Interior Health, and SOHC.

In January, the PHCSC formed an

Aesthetic Improvements Work Group to develop a more welcoming and healing space for patients, visitors, and staff in the health care buildings.

The work group consists of local artists, Susan Delatour, Marilyn Huycke, Nienke Klaver, and Ed Staples. Following a tour of the facilities, the work group prepared a report that was presented to the

Steering Committee. The report, entitled, "Princeton Art for Health," makes several recommendations, including the installation of artwork in various locations inside and outside Princeton General Hospital and Cascade Medical Centre.

The "Princeton Access to Specialists" program continues to provide local residents with access

to specialist medical appointments at Princeton General Hospital. However, there are still some people who are required to travel to Penticton or Kelowna for specialist services that are not yet available locally. Judy Short and Cherie Whittaker are working with Princeton and District Community Services to put together a list of volunteer drivers to provide trans-

portation for people in our community who may need a ride to a medical appointment. If you are interested in becoming a volunteer driver you can contact Judy Short in Princeton at 250-295-0217 or Princeton & District Community Services Society at 250-295-6666 for more information.

Marilyn Harkness informed the Steering Committee that on Monday, April 20, Betty Brown will be making a presentation to the Princeton Town Council providing a follow-up to the Partnership Agreement between the Okanagan Similkameen Healthy Living Coalition (OSHLHC) and the Town Council. Harkness and Brown are members of the OSHLC and have been working collaboratively to promote healthy living in our community.

Lori Motluk and Susan Brown will also be attending the meeting providing Council with an update on Interior Health Acute and Community Integrated Health Services.

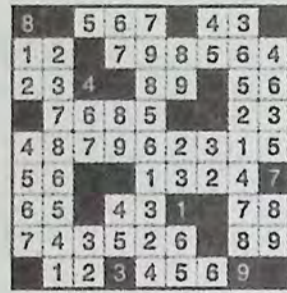
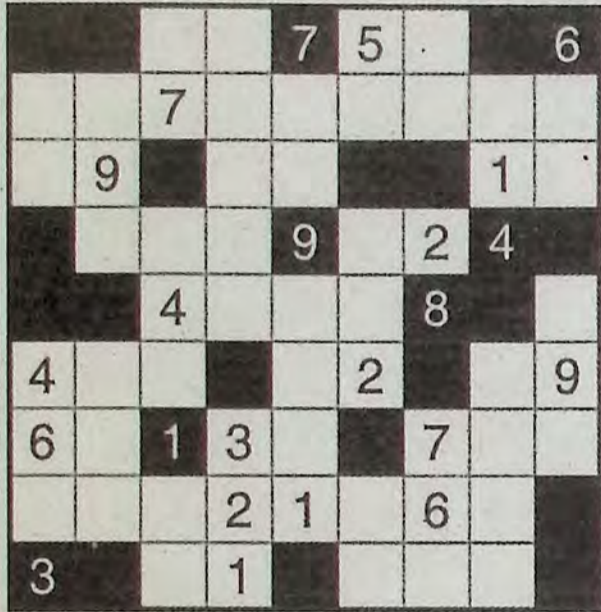

with more targeted, co-constructed approaches to enhance the system-wide focus on student learning. The use and analysis of high-quality data is essential to improving K-12 programs and operations and monitoring the impact of new curriculum and other learning innovations. Amendments will align the

School Act with more current provisions and safeguards found in the Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act. This will allow the ministry to disclose and use student data to improve the K-12 system while protecting personal privacy consistent with standards across the B.C. public sector, including health and

social services. "Taxpayers also expect their dollars to be used wisely and that every available dollar is going to help children in the classroom. With 60 school districts, there are many opportunities for shared services. "These amendments will give districts and the ministry additional

tools to turn these opportunities into ongoing savings. "The legislation sets the foundation and the starting point. We look

forward to working with our education partners on approaches and solutions that better meet the needs of students," Fassbender added.

Saving Downtown Princeton...

I have noted here in the past that I have no real opinion on the non-motorized/motorized debate on the Trans-Canada Trail.

Well, Town Council's recent decision to 'ban' all things motorized on the stretch of the Trans-Canada Trail between town limits caused me to look at this issue a little closer.

As a result, based on tourism potential, I think the Town of Princeton has made a huge mis-

take.

Here's why.

Hints coming from Council Chambers are for 'bypasses' around the piece of the trail that cuts through Princeton. I happen to think spending money on creating a new corridor of some kind to keep motorized vehicles off of an existing one is well, a waste of money. Even if it's grant money thrown at the community by the Province or Feds it's still money that could be

spent sprucing up the current trail.

Before you ask what I would do with it, I already have a plan.

The large lot near the trail gateway along Burton Avenue (see photo above) should be paved, marked and signed with welcome and informational signage directing trail traffic to points of interest or whatever.

I know, the Town of Princeton installed a lot of these kinds of signs already along the trail at this location and around the community.

My vision for this otherwise wasted piece of property is to convert it into an ATV parking lot, loading/unloading zone for horseback riders, bicyclists, bikers and

whoever else needs a place to stop and get ready for a trip along the trail.


This means there could be public washrooms erected, a large informational Town Map (I know, there's one just up the trail towards Phifer's Fountain) featuring advertising space for local services that would benefit from this kind of traffic. The Chamber of Commerce could have racks of brochures under a protective cover, Vermilion Trail Society could have informational panels on a kiosk next to the trail and there would be additional garbage containers, a small grassy area for pets to use and have it completely lit for late afternoon (winter) or evening use.

Even more picnic tables would enhance the site and encourage people passing by, either on the trail or viewing it from Highway 3, to stop a while.

Clearly with the vehicles parked at Phifer's Fountain daily there is some interest in the Trail Gateway and obviously trail usage.

You see, I view the section of the Trans-Canada Trail that runs through the town as an opportunity. Besides, as a Burton Avenue resident I doubt the dirt bike activity will ever come to an end there so why not embrace the uniqueness of the asset than try to shift motorized traffic to a yet-to-be designed or built alternative route.

While this may sound good to those who have been in the non-motorized camp, as it usually the method used by Town Council, a consultant will likely be contacted to examine, analyze, design andcontinued on Page 19

were laid-off at care homes and hospitals across B.C. because of contracting out or contract flips.

Any former workers rehired at these facilities can expect to start at the bottom of the employment ladder.

Some will lose their pension, others will receive lower probationary wages and most will have zero-earned vacation time.

And then there are the 175 family-supporting jobs in hospital laundry services across 11 Interior communities - including Princeton - that were put on the chopping

block on February 6.

Laundry cleaned at the hospital by local workers who earn decent wages and benefits will likely be shipped to a private firm in the Lower Mainland or Alberta for processing by employees earning far less.

It's plain to see public health care is going down a bad road.

As we head towards a federal election, Canadians have an opportunity to think about how they can best vote for health care in 2015.

The next government in Ottawa can take immediate steps to put

our nation's signature social program back on the right track.

Liquor law updates further modernization, flexibility

Modern, flexible approaches to liquor licensing, and fairness in awarding a limited number of special licences to sell B.C. wine in grocery stores, are broad goals of two pieces of legislation introduced March 26th supporting government's response to the Liquor Policy Review.

If passed, Bill 22, the Special Wine Store Licence Auction Act, will allow the highest bidders access to a limited number of licences to sell B.C. wine off grocery store shelves - delivering on government's commitment to

enhance convenience for consumers. This new legislation will create the legal framework for a future auction and ensure fairness and transparency in awarding a limited number of these liquor licences. Of note, these are not newly created licences - they are dormant licences that B.C. will be looking to issue via an auction process. Information about the auction's framework and the number of these licences will be available in the coming months.

Also introduced was Bill 27, a rewrite of the Liquor Control and

Licensing Act (LCLA) - modernizing outdated provisions and providing enabling amendments to address various review recommendations.

If passed, the changes in this new act will allow for the creation of a new, broader class of special-event permits accessible to more event operators, businesses and groups working with or raising money for non-profit and charitable organizations. Event promoters will be able to apply on behalf of a licensee, and annual special occasion licences will also be created so that, for

example, service organizations wishing to serve liquor with meals at their regularly scheduled meetings can do so without having to apply each time. This will cut red tape for real people and further the popularity of special occasion licences, about 25,000 of which are issued each year.

The proposed changes will also help streamline and expedite liquor licence applications for B.C. businesses, allowing Liquor Control and Licensing Branch staff and municipalities to manage applications concurrently. Government will also be

able to set limits on how long a licensee may allow a liquor licence to remain dormant - helping to provide certainty for communities and neighbourhood residents.

To provide greater flexibility for small businesses, the proposed changes will give government the option to better impose penalties that are proportionate and meaningful when a licensee contravenes the act. In the interest of protecting public safety and keeping alcohol out of the hands of youth, government will also have the option to regulate home alcohol delivery.

submit suggestions on how to achieve this bypass solution. These consultant-types don't do this work for free.

I think the Vermilion Trail Society, Chamber of Commerce and Town of Princeton could easily join forces on this matter and turn the section of the Trans-Canada Trail that runs through the community an even bigger asset than it already is.

One extra enhancement I would also consider is a slight change or adaptation to the lighting along the trail. While it is absolutely a lovely sight to see in the evening, I won-

der how many don't walk the trail for fear of something or someone jumping out at them from the darkness along the trail.

Daytime use is different and I'm not going to go through a series of 'what-ifs' but I have had this concern mentioned to me more than once. Aside from that, it is a beautiful paved path to and through Princeton. We should all view it as part of Princeton's tourism future.

How does this save downtown Princeton?

ATV groups have visited Princeton and there are local ATV groups in the area. Responsible ATV users would be attracted to a

'staging area' located along the trail where they could rest, load or unload, park a vehicle or whatever. They would very likely spend money in and around the community if they had easy access such as the trail gateway parking area I suggest along Burton Avenue.

The Town of Princeton wants to keep motorized traffic off of the Trans-Canada Trail within town limits, although they are allowed on the rest of the trail. If they were to reconsider this plan, it would help the local economy greatly.

Let your Town Council know if you agree with the plan to build bypasses for motorized trail users.

Of course, people build homes at the edge of a cliff so they have a great view and their property value goes up. Then they can pat themselves on the back because they own a house more valuable than those who do not have such a great view.
