Thieves strike bowling lanes

Sometime late on the evening of March 31st Copperhill Lanes in Princeton was broken into from both the front and back of the building.

Located in a residential area on Lapworth Avenue, it's amazing neighbours did not hear anything as evidence left behind at the scene show a considerable amount of time and effort would have went into smashing the safety glass in the front door.

Whoever is responsible knew what they were doing as they cut both the phone and cablevision lines in the

back of the building which disabled the alarm system. Once inside, the target was a safe with various other electronic devices left untouched.

A hole was cut into the top of the safe and a ladle (left behind) was used to scoop out the contents.

RCMP continues to investigate the incident and request your assistance.

Deer problem takes consensus

The solution to the deer problem in Princeton will require consensus among Princeton residents as to what ought to be done about the problem. That was the clear message conveyed by the Urban Deer Forum held at Riverside Centre March 31. More than 50 people attended the forum and had the opportunity to both learn and ask questions or make comments.

A number of people with expertise and knowledge of the problem gave their views at the forum. Speakers included Mayor Frank Armitage and Councillors Rosemary Doughty and Douglas Pateman, Wild Safe BC representatives Zoe Kirk and Frank Ritsey of Wild Safe BC, and Ministry of Environment representatives Jim Beck and Craig McLean.

Councillor Doughty and Lisa

Carleton had done a deer count, repeating a route around town to count every deer seen, and the average number was 31 deer. Councillor Pateman spoke of the lack of clear direction resulting from responses to a survey done last year. He spoke of his efforts to have Victoria change some of the wildlife legislation which would allow greater flexibility in municipalities.

Wild Safe BC representatives talked about methods used to prevent deer coming into the municipality to feed. One of the most important methods, emphasized repeatedly, was to stop feeding deer. In fact, for those who like deer, feeding them is the worst thing they could do. By feeding deer, the potential for human-deer conflict becomes magnified as

deer begin to approach people in expectation of being fed, which puts both children and adults in danger of having deer blocking a path.

There was no doubt left that there is a downside to having deer within Town limits. The deer in Town attract predators such as cougar and coyote. The deer bring diseases as well, not only in the form of ticks, but there is a disease cycle between deer and domestic cats that can affect both. The problemcontinued on Page 3

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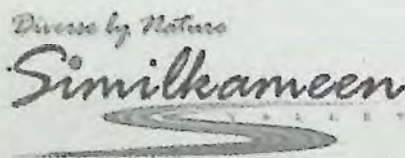


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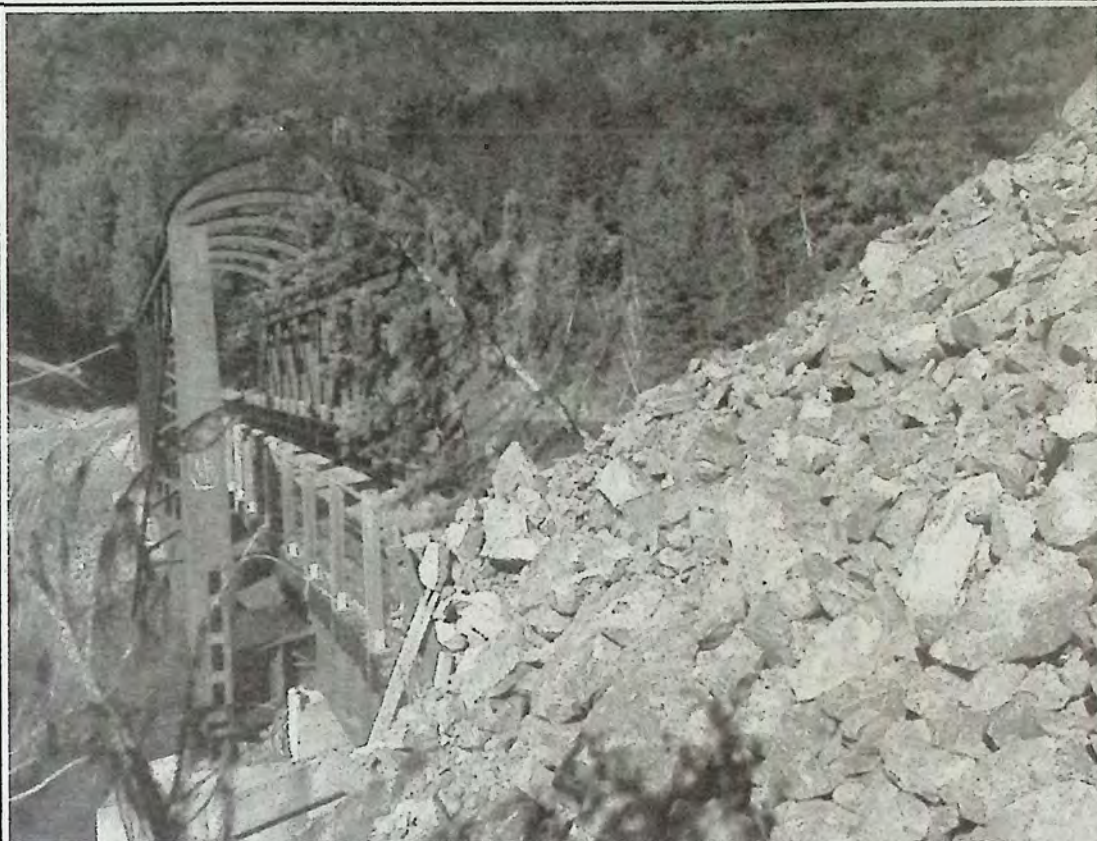

Locals mark Prevention of Violence Against Women week

Prevention of Violence Against Women Week is April 12 to 18 this year.

In 1993, the United Nations General Assembly defined violence against women as "any act of gender-based violence that results in, or is likely to result in, physical, sexual, or psychological harm or suffering to women" (United Nations, 1993).

Violence against women affects us all by impacting the safety and well-being of our mothers, grandmothers, daughters, sisters, aunts, partners and friends.

One quarter of Canadian Women will experience "violence" at the hands of someone they know. Women may experience extensive

physical abuse, sexual assault, psychological trauma, financial hardship, and even death. In many cases, children are also exposed to the violence. Peter Jaffe, a well-recognized researcher in Childhood Education at University of Western Ontario, estimates that 3 to 5 children in every classroom have been exposed to violence against women.

Imagine that you can never feel safe. That you feel alone and isolated, and you are afraid in your own home.

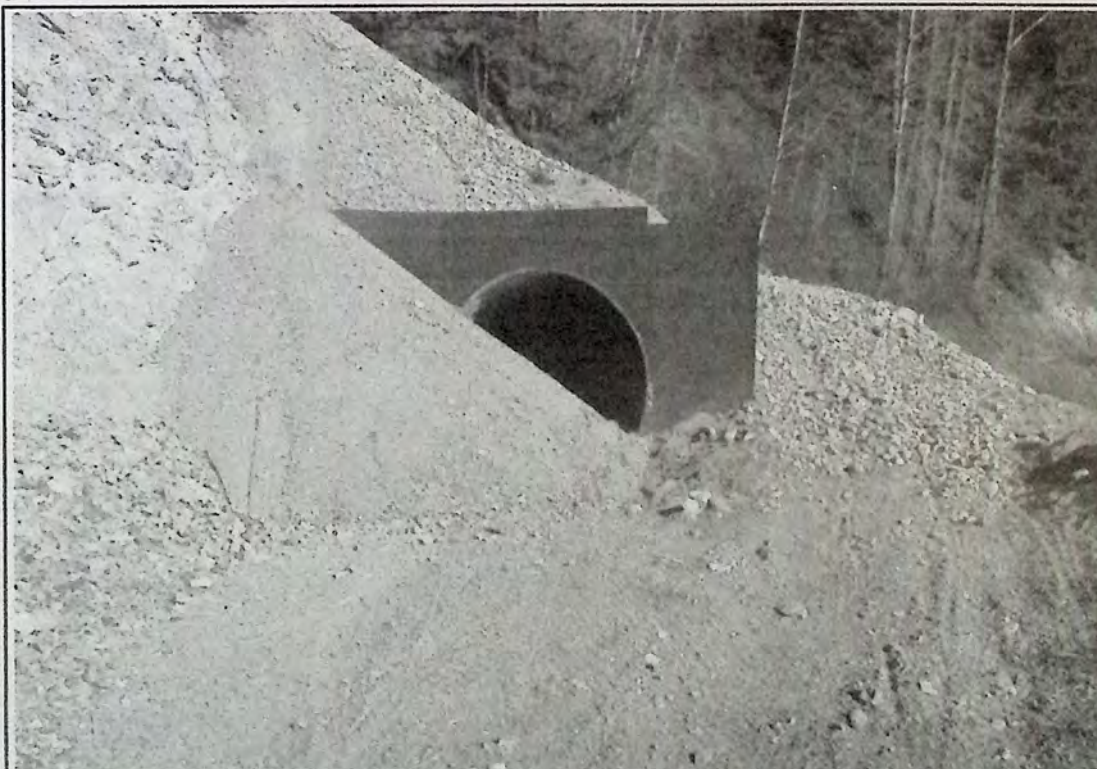
Knowledge is power. Being aware of the services available to women and children in our community ensures that every woman and child in Princeton has access to help

when they need it. Armed with this knowledge we, as a community, are one step closer to embracing the fact that EVERY woman and child has the RIGHT to be free from abuse.

Flip Of The Coyne

Since the news of the Visitor Centre moving from the Chamber of Commerce to the Town, and leaving the highway location to the old Town Hall, I have had a number of people (including a couple of business owners) ask me what is the purpose of the Chamber if tourism isn't there anymore. It is a very good question. The Chamber of Commerce has been geared for a long time toward one purpose: tourism. In its current form, the

Chamber will no longer serve its main role, so the Chamber will need to reinvent itself.

The Chamber should be having an AGM soon and it will be up to the new board of directors to set the agenda for the future. If the members of the Princeton Chamber decide to take a similar direction to other municipalities, they will have a lot of work ahead of them. If the plan is to do what other Chambers do, such as business advocacy with

government, or business training to help local businesses to grow and develop, they will need to look at a way to fund their operations in a sustainable manner. I can't see a group of volunteers, who are also business people, being able to run their own businesses, volunteer with the Chamber, and provide programming or support to other local businesses. Once the new board is elected, they will need to get right to work on setting out their

roadmap to the future. Once they have a roadmap, they will need to figure out a funding source that will keep them operational.

It will be important for the Chamber to have a good working relationship with the members of Town Council. They will need to advocate on behalf of all businesses in town on all things business. If there is a strained relationship, it will be hard for the Chamber to do that job.

I have heard that the Chamber of Commerce is toying with the idea of selling its building. I am not sure I like that idea. If the Chamber is able to sell the building (there are some conditions on the property) you would think that finding a tenant to lease the property would make more sense in the long run. If the Chamber board sells the building, then it is gone. They will get

some money now but if they lease it out they could have a steady income that could help them accomplish other things or pay rent wherever they decide to set up shop. If you are looking at a long term plan for the Chamber, keeping the building may be the best option, especially if they plan on doing advocacy work, training, and other types of economic development work. They will need the office space, the meeting space and the training space. All of this can be done out of the current Chamber building and they don't need to rent anything.

Maybe the Chamber is already taking steps to do some of this stuff, or they have decided to go in a completely different direction. I would like to invite the Chamber to give the community an update socontinued on Page 19.

.....continued from Front Page of deer feces, consumption of garden vegetation, and increasing numbers of deer as they multiply from year to year.

Methods of keeping the deer out of town were discussed. The landfill has been fenced and a cattle guard will be put in place to prevent 'garbage deer' from entering and feeding. People were told methods of 'hazing,' which means keeping deer out of the yard, but this is not a solution, as they simply go to another location.

The scarecrow irrigation system

was recommended. This is an automated motion-sensitive sprinkler which sends a jet of water to frighten the deer who enter the yard.

A deer cull is not the whole answer, either. It merely reduces the number of deer, but does not discourage deer from entering Town.

To be effective, a solution must have the full support of the community, and education as well as action is required.

Councillor Jerome Tjerkstra summed it up by saying, "This is just the first step."

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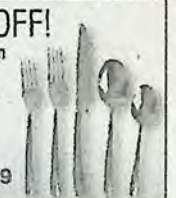
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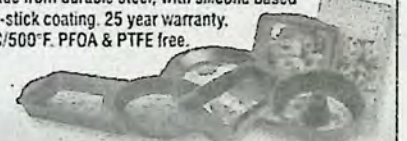


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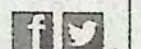

Coffin Nails

It has been a busy week in our office with a lot of visits from supporters of the Trans-Canada Trail. I should point out they were all what I identify as the 'pro' motorized' group.

From these conversations it became very clear to me that the proposed ban of all things with motors on the section of the trail that exists within Town Limits has struck a nerve.

I like to think it's the first nail in the coffin for our current Town Council.

At this rate they won't complete the remaining three years and eight months of this term and I'll be honest with you, I'm still somewhat stunned.

It was almost a year and a half ago that Town Council, with the support of the Chamber of Commerce, started hosting regular weekly meetings with local business owners and operators. One of the reasons for the meetings was to assist with finding solutions to generate economic development within the community.

In fact, at that very first meeting on January 15, 2014 Mayor Frank Armitage told the 25 stakeholders there that, "We are looking for solutions" and that "we've got to educate our people (local residents/visitors) on what is here."

These quotes appear on the front page of the January 21, 2014 Similkameen News Leader in an article about the meeting.

Armitage was quoted in the February 11, 2014 Similkameen News Leader from a follow-up meeting as saying, "The Town of Princeton has a strong interest (in helping local business) and we want it to work."

Apparently there has either been a lapse of memory or the goal posts have moved because I don't see how preventing tourists with money in their wallets from getting into town is going to help the local economy.

In my way of thinking, the ban of all motorized vehicles on the portion of the TCT within the Town tells me that ATVers are not the kind of people Town Hall wants in our community.

I think it's a missed opportunity and it will further split and fracture the relationship with Area H as any talk of an aquatic centre has in the past.

I'm actually ashamed to be a taxpayer in a community located in the middle of countless recreational opportunities that wants to limit access to them.

Here's the part where you get to be involved: Town Council will very likely start working on a bylaw to ban motorized traffic on the trail. The next Town Council meetings will be held on Tuesday, April 7, Monday, April 20 and Monday, May 4. They start at 7:30 PM and are held in the Library Conference Room on Vermilion Avenue.

If you care about the trail, whether you support the motorized ban or not, attend these meetings and share your thoughts.

If this ban is adopted what's next on the agenda of shutting down Princeton to recreational users?

We sympathize with and appreciate the sentiments of town council that have to deal with the issues associated with multi use of the Trans Canada Trail also known as the KVR.

Our intent is to alert Town Council that they are doing the res-

idents and business owners of Princeton a disservice when they don't welcome the Clubs that represent the off road community and the outdoor related activities that go along with it.

Freedom of Speech Takes French Dive

Remember all those government heads with their arms linked walking down a Paris street chanting "We are Charlie Hebdo?" They were standing up for freedom of speech, right?

Now the French President wants to shut down anybody who puts anything on internet that disagrees with the official government position on the war on terror, and anybody who might be a conspiracy theorist. In fact, five websites were shut down the day after he made the announcement.

What is so terrifying about the conspiracy theorists? To look further into the matter, why are there so many conspiracy theories around these days?

I can explain why. It is because so many governments have been found to be engaging in false flag incidents or who have 'admitted' involvement in false flag incidents.

A false flag incident is a horrific covert act by a government in order to blame an 'enemy' and gain support for some goal that government wants to carry out.

Conspiracy theorists are on the lookout for incidents which appear

to be false flags. This bothers governments. Governments like to feel they are above suspicion. What really terrifies governments these days is theorists on internet who have poked fun at, or who have poked holes in, incidents they suspect are false flags.

False flag incidents have been used by governments for centuries to gain public support for a cause. For example, a documented false flag incident occurred in 1938 when prisoners were dressed in German soldiers' uniforms, then shot. The incident was a brainchild of Alfred Naujocks and carried out under orders of Richard Heydrich. The incident was blamed on Polish soldiers. The goal was to gain support for Hitler's desire to invade Poland. The plot was highly successful.

A well-documented plot that was never carried out was called "Operation Northwoods." This was a plot by the US Department of Defense in which an American plane would be hijacked or shot down and Cuba would be blamed, thereby justifying an invasion of Cuba.

Historians have documented CIA attacks on mosques in Iran in 1953 aimed at overthrowing democratically elected Prime Minister Mohammed Mossadegh. This was called Project TP-Ajax. You can look it up on internet.

Many governments have admitted they carried out false flag operations. A Turkish Prime Minister admitted that Turkish agents in 1955 bombed the Turkish consulate in Greece in order to stir up anti-Greek sentiment in Turkey. The two countries were fighting over Cyprus at the time.

A former Italian Prime Minister

admitted he and the former head of counterintelligence, working with NATO, the CIA and the Pentagon, contrived 'Communist terrorist' bombings in Italy and other European countries so people would support the war against Communists.

The American National Security Agency admitted it lied about North Vietnamese firing on a US ship in the Gulf of Tonkin. This was done to gain public support for the war in Vietnam.

In Genoa, Italy, in July, 2001, police planted Molotov cocktails and faked a stabbing of a police officer. Senior officials later admitted this was done to crack down on protesters during the G8 conference going on in Genoa.

The FBI has admitted that the 2001 anthrax attacks were carried out by US scientists and the FBI under orders from White House officials who stated the attacks were to be blamed on Al Qaeda and linked to Iraq. The Bush government wanted to declare war on Iraq. It did not work right away.

People who go on internet can find all of this information. Books have been published about false flag operations. In fact, the FBI has a manual on how to conduct these operations and there is a book on the subject. Just Google 'false flags' and start reading.

Every false flag incident involves hurting somebody. Often, these incidents kill people who have no connection to politics. Often, the people killed are women and children. These deaths are called 'collateral damage.' The term collateral usually refers to real property, and using the term for human casualties places their value as equal to buildings.

Governments, such as in the Italian bombings, frequently kill their own innocent citizens. Why do they do it?

Here is a quote from Joseph Stalin: "The easiest way to gain control of a population is to carry out acts of terror. The public will clamor for such laws if their personal security is threatened."

Here is a quote from US President James Madison: "Tyranny and Oppression come to this land, it will be in the guise of fighting a foreign enemy."

Any resemblance between what is written in this column and what is happening in France or any other country is purely coincidental.

Lifestyle changes and dementia

It's never too late to make lifestyle changes to promote brain health.

"What is good for your heart is good for your brain," says Laurie Myres, regional Education & Support coordinator for the non-profit Alzheimer

Society of B.C. for Princeton and the South Okanagan & Similkameen.

Better control and detection for hypertension and diabetes, as well as measures to encourage smoking cessation and to reduce cardiovascular

risk, have the potential to reduce the risk of dementia.

Currently 747,000 Canadians – including many in Princeton – are affected by the brain disorder, and that number is forecast to double within the next 25 years.

"While there is no clear-cut way to prevent dementia, you can take steps to lower the chances of developing the disease," Myres says.

It starts with knowing your personal risk. Cardiovascular disease, diabetes, hypertension, smoking and depression can increase the risk.

"Healthy lifestyle choices are good for your heart, as well as your brain," she adds. Residents should choose a diet low in fat, incorporate exercise into daily routines, challenge their brains, be socially active, and protect their heads. Another important step: talking to your doctor about your personal risk or if you have concerns about dementia.

"There is a difference between normal aging and dementia."

The Society is doing its part by offering a variety of programs and services for local residents.

A support and information group, for example, serves as a forum for sharing practical tips and strategies for coping with the disease. It helps create support and friendship with others whose lives are affected by dementia.

"The group is there for people who want to inform themselves with current information that will help improve quality of life with the disease. It's a safe environment where you can learn, laugh, and help each other through mutual understanding."

Living Past 100

Mind Diet Reduces Alzheimers Risk

One of the most terrifying and costly diseases, next to cancer, is Alzheimers. This disease steals the mind first, then steals the body. A study in Chicago has shown the risk of Alzheimers can be reduced by over 50 percent by following the MIND diet (the initials stand for medical terms you do not need to know). Even people who only casually followed this diet had a 35 percent risk reduction.

So what do you eat if you are on a MIND diet?

You eat a lot more berries, particularly blueberries and strawberries. You eat a lot more fruit in terms of percentage of what you eat. You eat a lot more vegetables, and you eat lean red meat and fish, and you drink a little red wine (or take resveratrol pills). You use olive oil on salads. You eat whole grains in moderation.

Perhaps what is more important is what you do not eat, or eat rarely. These foods include fried foods, foods you find in fast food outlets, pastries and sugary foods. You avoid heavy cheeses such as cheddar, which has a high fat content. You use butter sparingly.

The MIND diet appears to be a very sensible healthy diet. Screening out fast foods, fatty foods, and sugary foods such as pastries, ice cream, and soft drinks, seems to be just common sense. In fact, the diet does not seem too difficult at all. It is the kind of daily food intake all of us should be following.

There is a catch to it, of course. If you follow it, you will rarely indulge in macaroni and cheese, and you will not fry your mushrooms in butter. You will rarely have a French fry or an ice cream cone. You will very seldom have a soft drink or one of those sweet juice drinks. You will not eat cake except at birthday parties and weddings, and you will not eat anything but whole grain bread and buns. You will not eat those expensive prepared cereals, especially those which come with a sugar coating.

The good thing is this: the diet was developed to reduce blood pressure, save your kidneys and heart, and keep you healthy well into your later years. The researchers added Alzheimers disease to the list of things to measure just to see if there would be any differences. Had they not included Alzheimers, they would never have discovered that a diet calculated to prevent high blood pressure and other problems would be beneficial to your brain.

If you are young and reading this, you can go a long way toward keeping your health into old age, especially if you have no more than one small glass of red wine a day. If you are an older reader, you can gain added years of mental alertness by switching to this diet.

Ballet Kelowna presents new work

The Ballet Kelowna performance at Riverside Centre on March 29 offered five new works by Canadian choreographers. The first, Winter Journey, by Simone Orlando, won a choreography award in 2006. Orlando is the new artistic director and CEO of Ballet Kelowna. Winter Journey was a combination of traditional and modern ballet, and

included a series of difficult lifts which were done to perfection.

The second piece, Dedication, was choreographed by Heather Myers to the music of Dmitri Shostakovich. This was a more gentle series of moves. The third dance was Creaturehood, featured some unusual lifts and very modern moves.

Ballet Kelowna is now a more balanced troupe, with male dancers equal in number to female dancers. This balance allows for the wide variety of lifts. The male dancers were asked, at the end of the performance, how often they worked out to maintain the strength to do the lifts.

Byrd Music was fascinating as two dancers played the part of pup-

The Ballet Kelowna performance marks the end of the concert series presented by Princeton Community Arts Council.

One other mining operation in Fraser-Nicola was also recognized. Copper Mountain Mine Ltd. in

Princeton received the Edward Prior Award, which is presented to operations with 200,000 to 1 million worker hours and the lowest injury-frequency rate.

Copper Mountain is one of the five new mines that have opened in B.C. since the start of the provincial government's B.C. Jobs Plan in 2011.

This past year saw a decrease in the total estimated injury rate at mines in B.C. as well as a decrease in the number of days lost to injury.

B.C.'s mining industry remains one of the safest heavy industries in the province, a direct reflection of the co-operative effort of mine employees, mine management and unions and the sector's commitment to maintaining high health and safety standards.

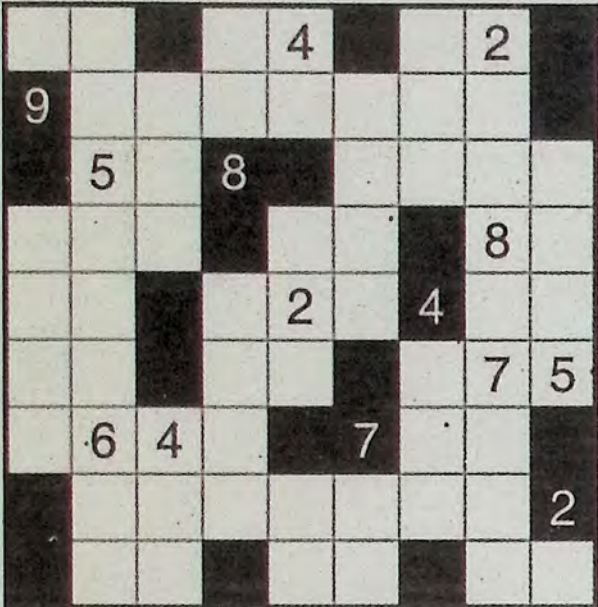

Saving Downtown Princeton...

...An Ongoing Series by George Elliott

The ATV controversy has put a new focus on what the Town of Princeton considers tourism. It has also hinted at the direction the municipality could be going when it comes to economic development.

I did a simple search online using the phrase "ATVs and tourism" which produced 515,000 results. Near the top of the first page of results was a link to an interesting item posted by Nature and Outdoor

Tourism Ontario.

The article, titled "ATVs - The Next Big Tourism Opportunity?" was reprinted from a Summer 2002 NOTO publication.

At the time stats revealed that the average ATV buyer was in their forties and considered 'affluent.' They were also very likely to own more than one off-road vehicle (including snowmobiles) and more often than not, took ATV holidays with their family.

I'm not sure about you, but I would think that would be the sort of target demographic the Town of Princeton should be trying to attract to our community rather than scare away with trail bans.

The article goes on to state that with the influx of interest in off-road trail travel, ATV vacation packages were starting to be developed in parts of Ontario.

This is where I think the Town of Princeton made a major mistake.

The 40-something demographic has money to spend and if you give them a place to do that, with easy access to trails, historic sites and shopping opportunities, they will come to your community.

Further to my suggestions last

week about developing a loading/unloading area with washrooms and parking on Burton Avenue I see further business opportunities at that location.

The property that will be remembered by most as the old farm and garden centre on Burton Avenue butts up against the Trans-Canada Trail at the rear of its property. Before the News Leader and JamBusters! filled our lives - about a dozen years ago - my wife Brenda looked at developing that property into a bistro/bike stop/repair shop with a focus on hitting the passing cycling traffic. Imagine if that was converted into the same idea but for ATVs.

The Cool Creek bulk plant next

door could open the rear gate of their property to provide direct access from the trail for ATVs to refuel. The same could happen at the Chevron for those who don't participate in the cardlock program.

Further down the same stretch of the Trans-Canada Trail there are even more opportunities.

The former machine shop on Burton Avenue could be a repair depot or even partner with Ace Hardware to provide automotive parts and accessories targeted at just ATVs. It would also be beneficial if they expanded to include various cycling accessories and repair kits to target traffic going right by their business.

Possibly it could include a partnership with Reichert Sales in Tulameen for year round service along the trail for ATVs and snowmobiles.

Military Extension Into Syria - Not The Answer

With the expansion of our combat role in Iraq and now Syria, there is little doubt that we are being drawn into what will inevitably be a costly and prolonged conflict.

The Prime Minister warns us our country is under grave threat from the Islamic State of Iraq and the Levant (ISIL). Our Minister of Defence postulates that only by military strikes can we prevent this organization from metastasizing into a state that will recruit and radicalize people from all over the world to implement attacks here in Canada. Does the government seriously believe that only by bombing the hell out this region will ISIL cease their recruitment campaign?

Whether we agree or disagree with expanding the war mission, we can legitimately state that Canada has done enough. Given our limited resources, it would be wiser to reinforce protections here in Canada and work on a strategy to prevent the radicalization of our youth by the siren song of fundamentalist propa-

ganda. We could also take some of the millions of dollars earmarked for combat and increase our contribution to desperately needed foreign aid. Why not use some of the millions we will spend in this futile endeavor to ensure our veterans receive the support they are entitled to?

Let us take a moment to reflect on what we have learned as a result of our engagement in Afghanistan. In 2005, the Liberal government was pressured by the then Chief of Staff, General Hillier to send our troops into combat. Most other NATO allies, however, stayed on the sidelines. This tragic conflict cost us 160 lives, 170 deaths by suicide and left hundreds of veterans with permanent physical and mental disabilities. Even with those costs, the tragedy is that we cannot say that today Afghanistan is a safe and secure country grounded in the democratic principles we were fighting for.

The United States and its coalition

of the willing, which we refused to join, illegally invaded Iraq under false premises in 2003. As a result, hundreds of thousands Iraqi civilians were killed, their country was turned into chaos and their army dismantled. What we are seeing today with ISIL is a direct result of the destabilization of Iraq by the George Bush regime. Canada has now entered the fray to clean up a horrible mess we had no part in creating and have no business dropping further bombs into.

If Canada were to withdraw from this conflict right now I suspect very little would change. The region would undoubtedly continue its slide into chaos until conditions were created that might begin to stabilize the region. A leading Iraqi researcher, Munqith al-Dagher believes that as long as the political and social grievances of Iraq's Sunni community go unaddressed and there is no hope for the future, Canadian airstrikes will not defeat ISIL.

ISIL is not the disease, (it) is just the

symptom. If we want to (push Islamic State) out of Iraq and the region, we should deal with the real reasons behind this disease. (Canada's) prime minister, and US politicians and other politicians in the world - all they think about is sending troops and aircraft - no matter how strong the army is, there will

not be any victory without a full cooperation from the people who are living there," states al-Dagher.

We have no business taking part militarily in this tragic quagmire. Let us be involved in peacekeeping and humanitarian efforts in a region that desperately needs our tremendous expertise on both these fronts.

Even A&W could develop an off and on ramp from the Trans-Canada Trail direct to their drive through lane.

With the power of the Princeton & District Chamber of Commerce cross promoting the Princeton section of the Trans-Canada Trail as being 'ATV Friendly' and the businesses along that piece (including Subway and Booster Juice) all making some money from the traffic that would attract I need to ask what thought process was being employed at Town Hall when they started writing the bylaw to ban all motorized vehicles from that paved piece of the Trans-Canada

Trail.

What a ban, as proposed by the Town of Princeton, has done is denied those businesses I've mentioned the opportunity to expand their customer base. You don't have to be a rocket scientist to understand that any local business that has a chance to expand their customer base also has the chance to increase their revenues.
