At 9:48 AM Tuesday, April 21st a fire call was received by the Tulameen & District Fire Department for a structure fire on George Street. Fire Chief Jody Woodford explains, "Upon arriving on scene the structure was found to be fully engulfed. Due to winds, radiant heat exposure and limited water supply the fire spread to another home." Through the efforts of the Tulameen Fire Department, Community members and Princeton Fire Department, the fire was contained to two structures with some minor exposure damage to one more house and three sheds. Council hears health update

Susan Brown, Local Community Health Service Administrator for Interior Health Authority, attended the April 20 meeting of Town Council to provide Council with an overview of services offered. These include four regional hospitals, 24 health care centres, two tertiary hospitals, 16 community hospitals, and 6,584 residential care and assisted living beds.

Much of her information concerned the tower to be constructed at Penticton Regional Hospital.

She reviewed the goals of the Ministry of Health: staying healthy, getting better, living with disease or

disability, and coping with the end of life.

Brown provided some interesting statistics. The top chronic disease for the region is depression and anxiety, 10 percent higher than the average for British Columbia. The region is slightly higher than the B.C. average for other chronic diseases such as COPD, asthma, dementia, diabetes, and heart failure.

Brown explained this is due to the high number of people over 65 years old.

Youth inspires PXA President

Paul Bedard, President of Princeton Exhibition Association (PXA), gave glowing praise to the young people who turned out to help at the grounds clean-up held April 19. Princeton cheerleaders and several other youth, including some very small people, raked pine cones, painted tables and moved portable stages. Adults cleaned office spaces, the concession building, repaired and painted rodeo fencing, and ran the loader. It was one of the best work parties in years, and Bedard noted, "The lunch was great!"

Following the work party lunch, members of Princeton Riding Club held a small gymkhana.

PXA members met April 21 to review upcoming events. The first event following the meeting was a barbecue with members of The Veterans Ride Across Canada, along with games in the rodeo arena. Princeton Riding Club and the PXA hosted this event. The Veterans horses arrived on April 21 and were given free horse accommodation as a gesture of support for their mission.

The horse pens at the grounds need repairs. Bedard recommended replacing some of the fences each year with steel fence panels. Members agreed. Horse boarding is now the top income source for the PXA.

Bill Allinott attended the meeting and stated he has secured insurance for the demolition derby and mud racing events. His insurance was granted based on crowd control, use of the main grandstand, and use of the rodeo arena for the demolition derby. He emphasized there would be no professional demolition derby competitors who come in with big tires and souped-up machines. He explained he is relying on local amateur competitors. The professional competitors want big prize money before they will come to an event. There will be no anti-freeze permitted in the arena event, in order to protect the animals. Any damages will be repaired prior to the Fall Fair, which happens the following week. An idea was presented to promote

all local events to tourists. Local restaurants will be approached to see if they would consider using place-mats advertising the events. This will be a pilot project for this year.

Council approved the request for assistance and materials.

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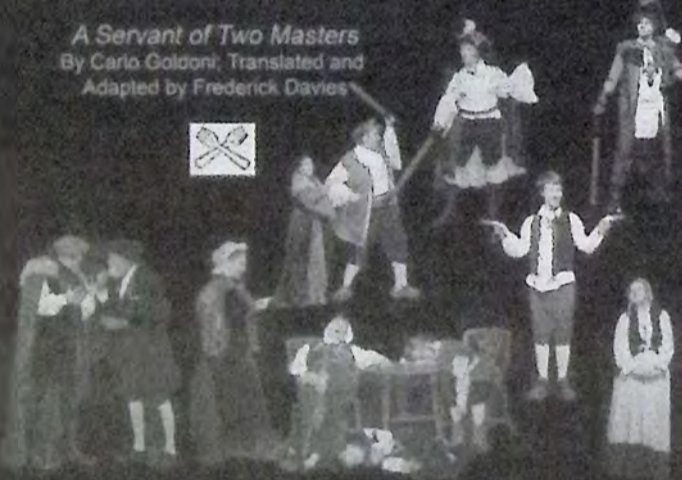

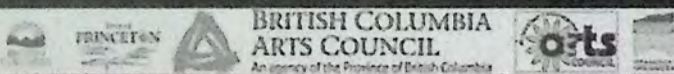


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The lobby of the new LSIB building in Cawston leads to a patio (yet to be completed). Photo: Dawn Johnson

LSIB holds open house

The finest new building in the Similkameen Valley was opened officially on April 21. The Lower Similkameen Indian Band (LSIB) members explored the new Band Administration building, talked with Band employees, and enjoyed refreshments prepared by Band members. The News Leader was pleased to have been invited to do a story on the new facility.

The building sits above Highway 3 west of Chopaka Bridge. The grounds look rather barren at the moment, but all this will change in the next few months. The landscaping has been done and just waits for plants to grow. A large parking lot allows for major events that will take place in the future.

The new building features a gymnasium on the bottom floor with a basketball court and an adjacent kitchen. This is the third basketball court in the Keremeos area, which means Keremeos can now host major basketball tournaments. The gym has multiple uses - conferences, celebrations, even a pow-wow could be held in it. The kitchen makes it possible to cater to any sort of event.

The lobby is large and leads to a circular stairway.

In the west wing of the lower level is the health department of the Band. There is a practitioner's room, an exam room, a place for foot care, and a bathing room with a therapeutic tub. There are offices

for reception, filing, and a comfortable waiting room for those seeking health care.

On the top floor, there is a fitness room, administration offices, the Chief and Council meeting room and a separate staff meeting room.

The new building gives administrative personnel the blessing of having individual offices. At the old Band Office in Keremeos, work was done in cramped quarters in shared spaces, not convenient for anyone. Those needing private offices now have them.

The furnishings are comfortable as well as utilitarian, and the views from the offices lift the spirit. The windows look out over the valleycontinued on Page 18

Flip Of The Coyne

If you know me you know that I am a student of history and I love my country. In the past I have even been known to be envious of the United States from time to time especially when it came to the way they love their country and learn about their history, even if I don't agree with their version of events. Growing up in Canada can be a hard thing for a patriotic student of history.

We don't celebrate our founding fathers the way other nations do. We don't mark our milestones like others and we downplay our struggles for independence and survival. much about Douglas in my history lessons. Even in my Canadian history classes in university the mention of the man who kept British Columbia British never really came up and that is sad.

Douglas was a visionary. He put his neck out and did what he thought was right to keep our province from falling into the hands of the Americans while they flooded into the interior seeking gold. I am also reading a book on the Royal Engineers and one on the early British Columbia police force. Again this represents more history that isn't taught in our schools and ought to be.

This is why I am envious of our American cousins.

If you go to school in some county, you learn about not just the founding fathers, the constitution, the history of the state you are from, you also learn about who founded your town and who the major contributors were to your area's development. We don't do that. In Canada it is like we are ashamed of who we are and what we did to get where we are. Yes, there are some dark times in our history but we shouldn't try and whitewash it. This does nothing to help future generations. We must learn from the mistakes of the past or we are destined to repeat them.

People need to understand that the reason we are here in this place with the laws the rights and the freedoms we have is not because we asked mommy if we could have them, but because we earned them. People from the very beginning fought for everything we have. The French Canadians who fought against the British did so because they loved their home.

They won certain rights and freedoms when they became subject to the British Crown and in return when the Americans invaded they stood with the British who defeated the American invaders. They kept us British. It is that British identity that we fought to keep in 1812 and the struggle in colonizing the West that made us Canadian.

It is from those laws, those liberties that we forged our identity. We need to be more proud of our past.

We need to teach our youth about who we are and how we came to be and all the good and bad that goes along with it because that is who we are. We never asked nicely to be Canadian. We earned our identity with blood, sweat and tears and it is time we understood that.

Town Council granted both requests.

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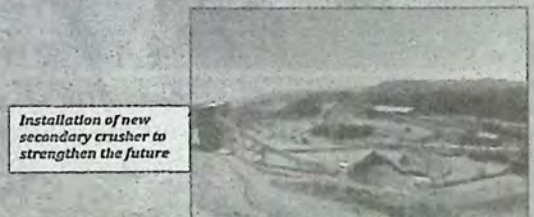

Taxing Situation

One of the things I have always found interesting as a taxpayer in Princeton is how cheap the property taxes are here.

We have two lots that sit side-by-side within the same fence line and pay peanuts for property taxes compared to similar size properties in nearby communities. I know, it's a kind of apples to oranges comparison but it tells me that I probably could not afford to live in any other nearby community.

That being said, I do believe we are getting a pretty good deal for what we pay in taxes here. I still object to the fact that we pay school taxes and have not put anyone into the local schooling system, but I also understand the reasons why we pay school taxes. I completely agree with the system of all of us paying for a service that not all of us use because it reduces the amount each of us would otherwise have to pay if the costs were not spread across to all taxpayers.

I use that argument when talk about aquatic centres comes up. While I probably would not use one very often, I would want to be able to help fund the project providing it is an affordable extra on my property taxes.

With this in mind I now feel the same way about the local library.

If I end up paying an extra six or ten dollars a year on my taxes to keep our library operational, then I would support that. If the cost to me ends up being much higher than that, I would be far more likely to support an existing facility with concrete numbers to back up the expenses than a project that has not even been built.

What I am saying here is that I think we all need to take a hard look at the services we currently get taxed for and if it costs a bit more to improve those services, let's support that before we start building new services.

In the case of the local library, something I rarely use, I can see a need for it in Princeton, as it is already part of the fabric of our community. Cutting back hours seems counter productive to me because five less hours a week is a 25-percent reduction. If any other service in the community was reduced by 25-percent would it get your attention?

I think that since ORL is looking for balance they need to take a bit from the bigger branches and use that to support the smaller branches instead of the other way around.

Call or e-mail your MLA and push for a change in provincial library funding and contact your local elected officials and tell them if you are interested in spending an extra six or ten dollars a year on your taxes to support services we already have instead of adding more we may not be able to afford quite yet.

I have been reading, with interest, the ATV issues in Princeton.

It seems to me that Mayor Armitage and town council may really try to accommodate all outdoor enthusiasts including the ATV riders. However time will tell.

I find it hard to believe that elected officials would let their personal attitudes affect carrying out their duties by making restrictive bylaws.

Last year my spouse and I spent six weeks travelling across Canada. We watched where the Cross Canada Trail stopped and started, shared highways in places, went through towns and cities and

disappeared completely in places.

We read signage that welcomed ATVs but not one of them banned ATVs. Cars, trucks and ATVs all together filling up with gas at service stations was a common sight. Many towns and even cities had ATVs on roads and streets with speed limits under 50 KmPH.

There are many places where ATVs are legal on roads and streets. For an ATV to share a road it must be registered, licensed, insured, have tail lights, brake lights, license plate light, a rear view mirror and a horn. Signal lights and a whip antenna are also sometimes required. These towns all share a kind of frontier rural atmosphere. I'm sure that

Princeton is not ready for this yet!!

British Columbia is one of the last places in North America to license and register ATVs. We are now in the 21st Century perhaps Princeton will be there, too.

There are insurance companies that will cover motorized liability on the KVR if our town, Princeton, needs one so that should not be an issue.

Also signage limiting speed and noise and stating courtesy rules would go a long way to ease concerns of residents.

A key concern would be to find some way to limit travel for those who would ride through Princeton with a possible place to stop and shop, as opposed to those joy riders who repeatedly would ride back and forth solely on the Princeton portion of the KVR.

Strict fines for nuisance riders should be posted and enforced.

Come on Princeton...let's be progressive, take up the challenge, and give it a try for a couple of years. If it doesn't work you can always change it.

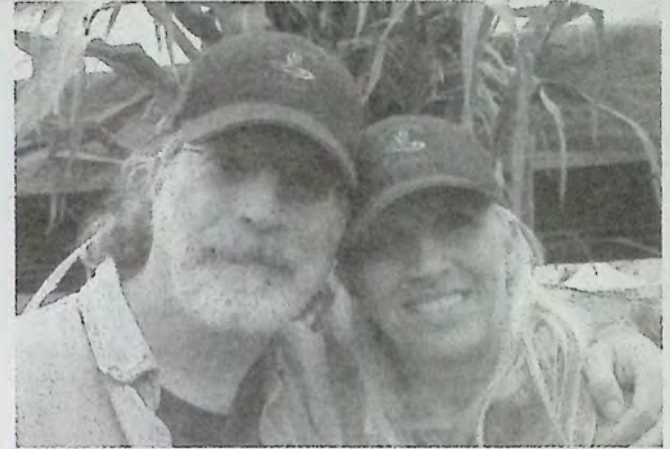

Here are the highlights from the April 20th regular meeting of Village Council as released by the Village of Keremeos:
Presentations and Delegations
- Cpl. Sean Hall, Acting Area Commander - Quarterly report January to March 2015. Cpl. Hall reported that the Keremeos RCMP

responded to 309 calls during the first quarter of 2015 compared to 359 calls during first quarter of 2014 - decrease 14%. Also responded to 22% fewer criminal code files in 2015 compared to 2014.
- Interior Health Authority - Lori Motluk, Acute Health Services

Administrator & Community Liaison and Susan Brown, Community Health Services Administrator gave an update on IHA activities including the Patient Care Tower project at the Penticon Regional Hospital. Total cost is \$325 million (\$122 million from Regional Hospital District and \$20 million from South Okanagan Similkameen Medical Foundation).
- Interior Health (Healthy Communities Initiative) - Betty Brown, Community Health Facilitator

The initiative is to work at the population health level to create healthy community environments and policies to improve health and wellness. The Village joined the Okanagan Similkameen Healthy Living Coalition (OSHL) in 2013. The first project of the OSHLC is Social Belonging in the South Similkameen.

ANNUAL PERFORMANCE PLAN
Each R.C.M.P. Detachment is mandated to prepare an annual performance plan which addresses identified local policing priorities.

These are identified through consultation with elected officials, senior staff members, Community Policing Advisory Committees and other stakeholders. As such, the 2014/15 plan focuses on the following issues:
1. Contribute to Safe Roads
2. Reduce the Abuse of Drugs
3. Police Community Relations Police Visibility
4. Contribute to Safer Youth
5. Crime Reduction\Prolific Offender Management
6. Contribute to Safer, Healthier Aboriginal Communities

Meeting discusses library future

A total of fifty people attended a public consultation meeting April 21st hosted by Okanagan Regional Library. ORL CEO Stephanie Hall presented a series of slides outlining the stats revolving around Princeton's library, which were actually quite impressive.

Hall explained that two surveys had been conducted to gauge the

feelings of branch users resulting in a lot of local feedback explaining how important the library is to those who utilize it.

"I can see this is a serious topic," she said.

"This is a really busy little branch."

The Princeton ORL is currently open twenty hours a week and has a total of 1,357 members. In 2013

they made 32,914 visits to the branch, which equates to 12.1 per capita visits. That puts the local library far and above the 7.1 average visit figure from the fourteen nearest population size non-ORL branches.

The Summer Reading Club recorded a 34-percent increase with attendance of 142 and program attendance at the library was 778.

"This is a very literate and active population," Hall added.

So why even consider a reduction in service?

According to Hall the financial allocation model used by ORL brings up value and has identified a serious imbalance system wide.

"Are we getting out what we are putting in," was how she described the situation that points to Princeton having a shortfall of \$61,237 in 2014. This essentially means that according to ORL there needs to be a cut in service in order to bring about balance.

When explaining where Princeton sits in the overall staffing picture within the library system, Hall pointed out that the local branch has 0.40 FTEs (full time equivalent) staff per 1,000 population which is actually much higher than Hedley (0.27), Kaleden (0.32), South Shuswap (0.24), Summerland (0.22) and Westbank (0.13).

"It's difficult to talk about cutting back service in Princeton when ORL is already incredibly lean."

Hall verified that with stats that show the ORL FTEs/1,000 population figure at 0.37 which puts it at the third from the bottom position out of the nine largest library systems operating in the province.

Living Past 100

Protect Your Liver: It's Life

Most people never think about their livers. They may worry about heart and lung diseases, or cancer, but seldom, if ever, worry about the liver. Every person should be concerned about liver health, because the liver is the site of the body's immune system. A healthy liver means a healthy life. The liver is what fights disease.

There are liver diseases which can cause death. Alcohol and drug abuse are the major causes of liver disease, and both are preventable. Hepatitis is a virus infection of the liver and can be prevented by immunization injections. Hepatitis virus is in more than one form. Hepatitis B is generally contracted through infected needles shared among drug abusers, and through blood or body fluids. There is a higher risk for hepatitis infection among homosexual men and anyone who has multiple sexual partners. Hepatitis A is generally spread through infected food.

You do not need to contract a viral infection to damage your liver. The most common form of liver damage comes from excessive alcohol intake. Those who get drunk are damaging their liver function. Those who consume alcohol on a day to day basis in excess of one drink are probably damaging their liver function.

The function of the liver is to clear toxins from the blood and to attack invading microbes that bring disease. A person with damaged liver function is likely to have a reduced ability to fight off infectious diseases.

The job of the liver is to clear blood of all toxins, such as pesticides, herbicides, strong medications and toxins produced by infectious diseases.

A damaged or overworked liver will cause early aging due to reduced ability to clear toxins.

Symptoms of liver problems include loss of appetite, swollen abdomen, swollen ankles, yellow in the white of the eye, itchy skin, dark urine, and pain. These symptoms call for professional treatment.

Prevention is better than a cure, always! Keep your liver healthy. Avoid alcohol, white sugar, and tobacco. Eat the 10 foods that protect the liver: garlic, turmeric, grapefruit, beets, leafy greens, green tea, avocados, lemons, and vegetables from the cabbage family, such as cabbage, kale, sauerkraut, broccoli and kohlrabi.

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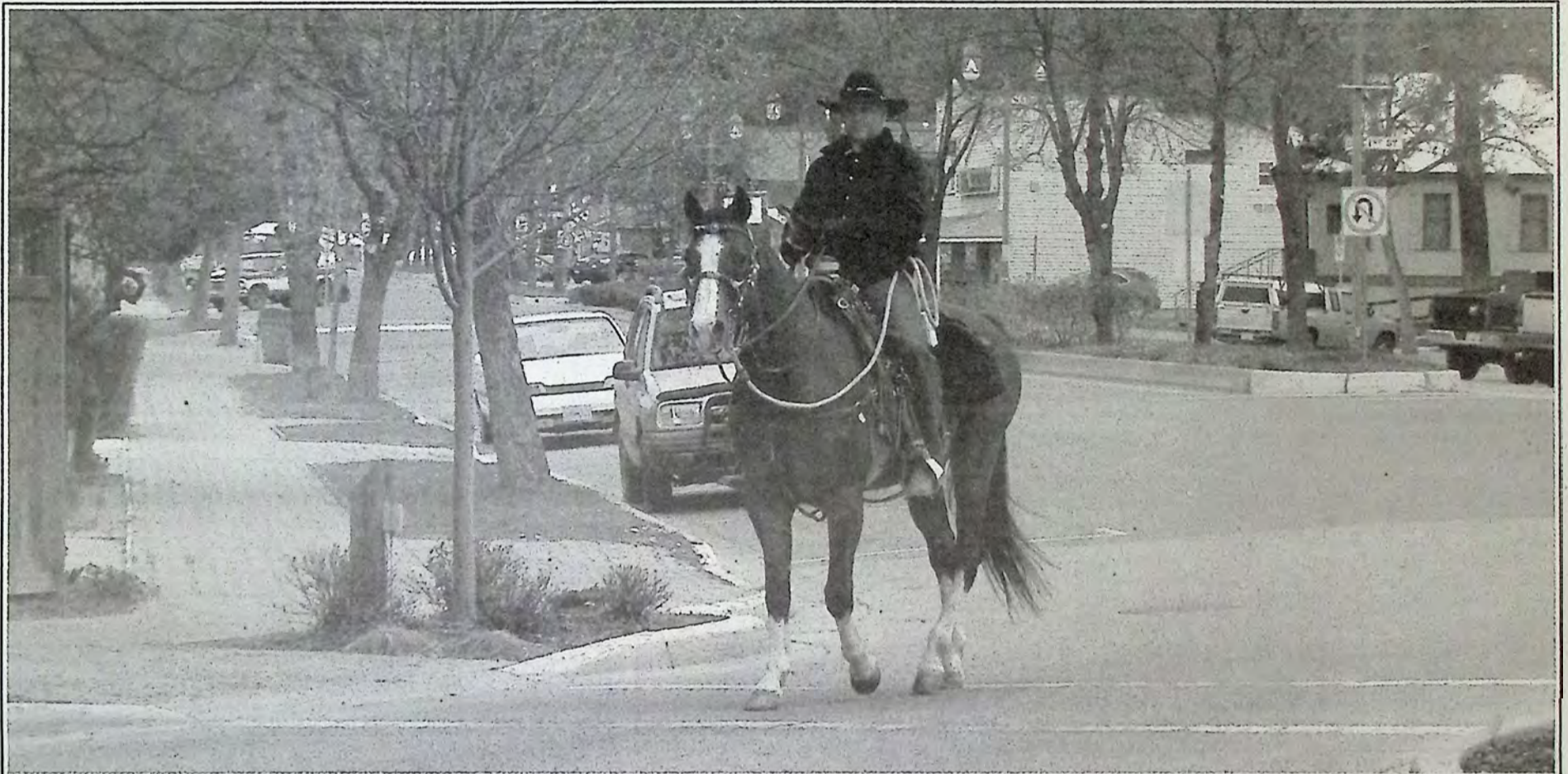

Meeting discusses local library future

 As for the "pretty good deal" Princeton is getting from ORL, Hall explained that the 2013 per capita levy in town was \$33.62 which sits below the ORL 2013

average of \$41.17 and even lower than the \$45.19 (2013) average in the fourteen nearest population size centres. She added that the cost increase to Princeton taxpayers to maintain the current level of service would be approximately \$6.28 per capita per year.

Hall explained that ORL "is committed to fairness" and presented a possible solution to the shortfall in Princeton which included a reduction of three Community Librarian hours, nine Assistant Community Librarian hours and a move from the branch being open twenty hours a week down to fifteen.

The majority of comments received from the surveys conduct-

ed by ORL requested either maintaining or increasing local library hours to which Hall said would not be possible without additional funding.

Those present at the meeting all agreed that they would be in favour of paying an extra six dollars in their property taxes to keep the service in place. Hall also suggested that residents should be pushing the provincial government to remove a freeze placed on provincial library funding.

"It's not our goal to decrease services," Hall pointed out.

"This is a fabulous facility and it would be a shame to be open only fifteen hours per week."

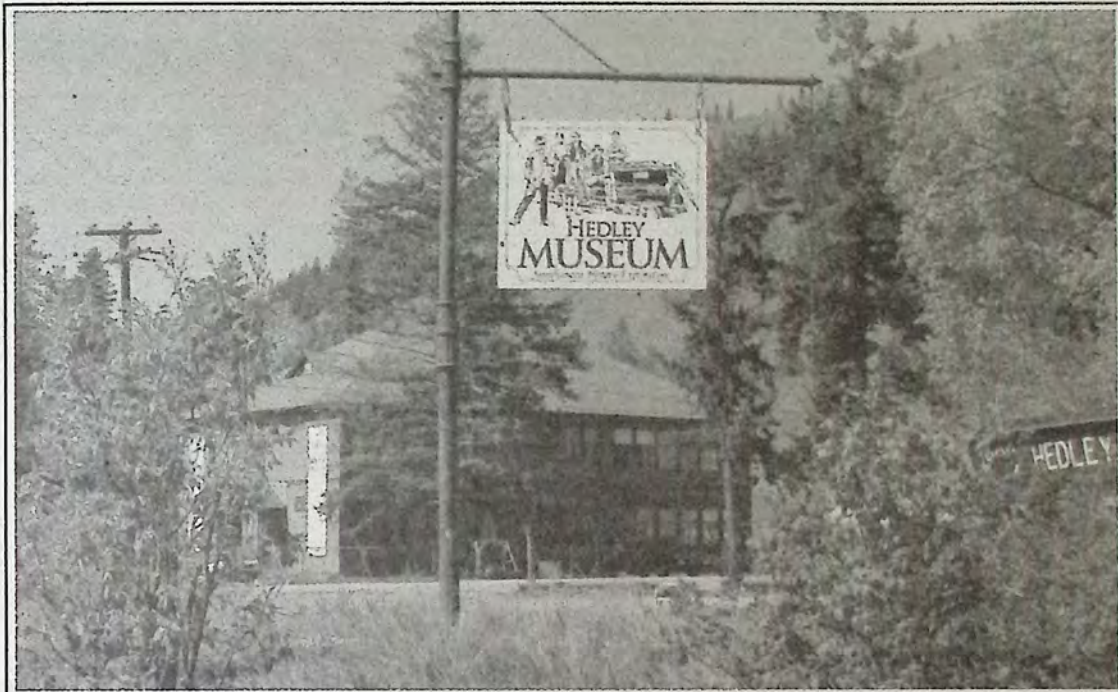

Saving Downtown Princeton...

...An Ongoing Series by George Elliott

The Princeton Branch of the Okanagan Regional Library is located virtually in the centre of downtown. At a meeting last week a number of stats were revealed that showed it is a very busy little place.

For example, there are 1,357 branch members who made 32,914 visits in 2013. That figures out to be 12.1 visits per capita which ranks our library far and above the average of 7.1 per capita visits in the 14 nearest population size non-ORL centres.

Even ORL CEO Stephanie Hall commented that those stats mean we have a "very literate and active population" and later referred to the Princeton library as being a "very busy" place.

The general purpose of the meeting was to gauge the feeling in the community should the local branch reduce its service by five hours a week. I know, that doesn't sound like much but when you look at the fact that it is currently open 20-hours weekly the proposed closure

is a 25-percent reduction in service.

Comments and statements made during the meeting ranged from a fear of if this cutback occurred, when would there be another one to how could the community save the service.

The building the library sits in is owned by the Town of Princeton, which puts some extra pressure on the community to become a bit more pro-active in working towards a solution.

What was pointed out by someone at the meeting was that there needs to be a realization at the provincial level that the 'haves' need to be supporting the 'have-nots' in order to bring about a closer balance of services.

I completely agree with that train of thought.

The majority of us moved into a rural setting by choice, I think it's also safe to say that the majority of us expect some services to be a bit harder to access than if we lived in a big city, but we still expect access to your basic services.

I have to admit I rarely use the local library. I think it was about a year ago I was last inside it but I do recognize the value of such a service. For many in our community it is an essential part of their lives providing a social connection to others in Princeton. It provides a very different social connection than for example, a senior's centre or social club, although those places work

together indirectly to keep social connections alive in the lives of many residents when the library is closed.

Taking away part of that service in a 25-percent reduction of hours puts more pressure on the remaining services used by the same segment of the population.

When we are hoping to see our community grow a little more with a small population burst here and there, taking away any kind of service slows down that process which hurts the overall community.

While I agree with bigger centres providing some sort of support to smaller ones, I don't entirely agree with the thoughts expressed at last week's meeting that hinted at saving the hours we already have at the local library. I think we should be showing ORL, based on their figures that say we have an active, busy branch that we should be

"Members conduct routine traffic stops on a regular basis for all MVA offences including distracted driving. Keremeos members have teamed up with SOTS and IRSU in conducting traffic enforcement," Cpl. Hall said.

Known drug houses in the community continue to be closely watched by members. Keremeos detachment has one DARE member who provides outreach to schools relating to drug and alcohol awareness.

CRIME REDUCTION - PROLIFIC OFFENDER MANAGEMENT (POM)

Prolific offenders are the small percentage of individuals who are responsible for a disproportionate amount of crime. The Prolific Offender Management (POM) program is based on an inter-agency collaborative effort involving Community Corrections, R.C.M.P., Crown Counsel, Ministry of Housing and Social Development, Correctional Services of Canada and the Ministry for Children and Family Development (Youth Services, Child Protection and Youth Probation). Protection of the community and reduction of recidivism are the guiding principles of this program, achieved by collaborative case management, consistent sharing of information amongst the program partners and engaging the offenders with community services to address their criminal behaviour.

"Members continue to check offenders for compliance on court-ordered conditions such as curfews," Cpl. Hall added.

How does this save downtown Princeton?

Any community is built on infrastructure. In a physical sense that means roads, sewer, utilities, buildings and various other services. Other infrastructure that builds a community comes from social and economic means.

The social elements relate to the culture of a community and what exists to keep residents connected. Removing or reducing access of any of these elements can have a ripple effect that touches far more of the community and can have direct and indirect influence inside and outside the community as well.

over age 65 have at least one chronic condition, and one out of four has three chronic conditions.

In Princeton, some improvements have been made. Cascades Medical Clinic has a fifth exam room, more nursing space and a new tub room has been added to the hospital. New X-ray equipment has been installed, and there has been a successful pilot project of rapid access clinics program. Brown congratulated Princeton Health Care Steering Committee.

Twenty-three specialists have signed on to come to Princeton.

This allows local citizens to access specialist appointments without having to drive to Penticton or Kelowna. To date, 450 patients have seen specialists in Princeton. A further bonus will be access to medical residents (physicians in training).

The second speaker on health was Betty Brown, Community Health Facilitator, who addressed the need to reduce illness by preventive action.

She talked of the growing number of obese youth and said younger people will probably not live as long as the present older genera-

tion. Younger people today are fatter and do less exercise.

Angelique Wood has been hired to oversee the activities of Okanagan Similkameen Healthy Living Coalition, a group working on developing healthier communities.

Marilyn Harkens, a Board member of the Healthy Living Coalition, was the third speaker. She noted the focus in Princeton was to reduce tobacco use and examine food security issues. She asked Council when an anti-smoking bylaw for public places would come into effect. She was told it would come to Council in May.

Park plans resurface on Earth Day

On Earth Day last week (April 22) New Democrat environment spokesperson Spencer Chandra Herbert urged the B.C. Liberal government to reopen talks to open a national park in the Okanagan Similkameen region.

"There is tremendous local support for the jobs and opportunities that a national park would bring to the region," said Chandra Herbert.

"It's time for the B.C. Liberal government to stop throwing up barriers to this economic development opportunity."

The Okanagan Similkameen is home to more than 60 federally listed endangered species and is a unique landscape that is not protected by any national park in Canada.

The Okanagan Similkameen is a globally significant ecosystem that is home to many of Canada's most endangered species. Protecting this area is key to maintaining British Columbia's incredible biodiversity, while growing the economy.

In question period April 22nd Chandra Herbert noted that support for a national park in the region cuts across party lines, with the all-party Finance Committee recommending talks be reopened.

"When you have almost 70 per cent of people in a region saying they want to explore an opportunity to both protect the environment and create jobs in their local communities, Christy Clark needs to stop throwing up barriers and get back to the table to re-start discus-

sions," said Chandra Herbert.

Herbert has visited the region and spoken with ranchers, tourism operators, vintners, First Nations, and local government who all support re-starting talks now. - submitted
