Town tosses out free dump days

Citing cost factors the Town of Princeton has eliminated Free Dump Days.

The decision was made at the May 4th regular meeting of Princeton Town Council in a motion made by Councillor Doug Pateman and seconded by Councillor Kim Maynard.

In her report to Council, Director of Finance Shirley McMahon explains, "The expenses associated with 'free' landfill days include costs we normally recover when a fridge or air-conditioner is brought to the landfill for disposal we collect ten dollars which covers the cost of

removal of the Freon."

McMahon adds, "Similarly with a mattress we charge five dollars to cover the cost of stripping the mattress to recycle the metal in the springs."

In addition to costs incurred by both the Town and the landfill contractor the problem with 'free' landfill days is that they tend to generate long line-ups.

The best solution, according to Town Hall, was to eliminate the event entirely and replace the exercise with stickers for use instead.

Plan receives three readings

Princeton Town Council gave the Town of Princeton 2015-2019 Financial Plan Bylaw 899, 2015 three readings at their May 4th regular meeting.

Section 165 of the Community Charter sets out the requirement

and time frame for the adoption of the municipality's financial plan. The time frame specifically indicates that the financial plan be adopted before the annual property tax rate bylaw, as is the case with all municipalities.

The five-year financial plan must include an explicit form of revenue and tax policy disclosure as required by the Community Charter. Also, the Charter requires municipalities to include in the plan objectives and policies regarding the proportion of

total revenue that comes from each of the funding sources; the distribution of property taxes among the property classes; and the use of permissive tax exemptions.

The Financial Plan shows Revenue from Taxation at \$1,922,893 in 2015, \$1,909,208 (2016), \$2,023,760 (2017), \$2,145,187 (2018) and \$2,273,897 in 2019.

Following projected expenditures over the five-year plan, surpluses

come out at \$898,900 in 2015, \$1,162,333 (2016), \$707,231 (2017), \$832,231 (2018) and \$942,231 in 2019.

The Revenue Sources for 2015 are identified as Property Taxes (38%), User Fees (18%), Grant Funding (12%) and Other Sources (32%). The distribution of property tax by property class for 2015 shows Residential (47.52%), Utilities (2.14%), Major Industry (23.11%), Light Industry (3.59%), Business & Other (23.45%), Recreation (0.19%) and Farm (0.001%).

The list of properties that were permissively exempted for the 2014 tax year include Roman Catholic Church (\$281.64), Princeton Silver

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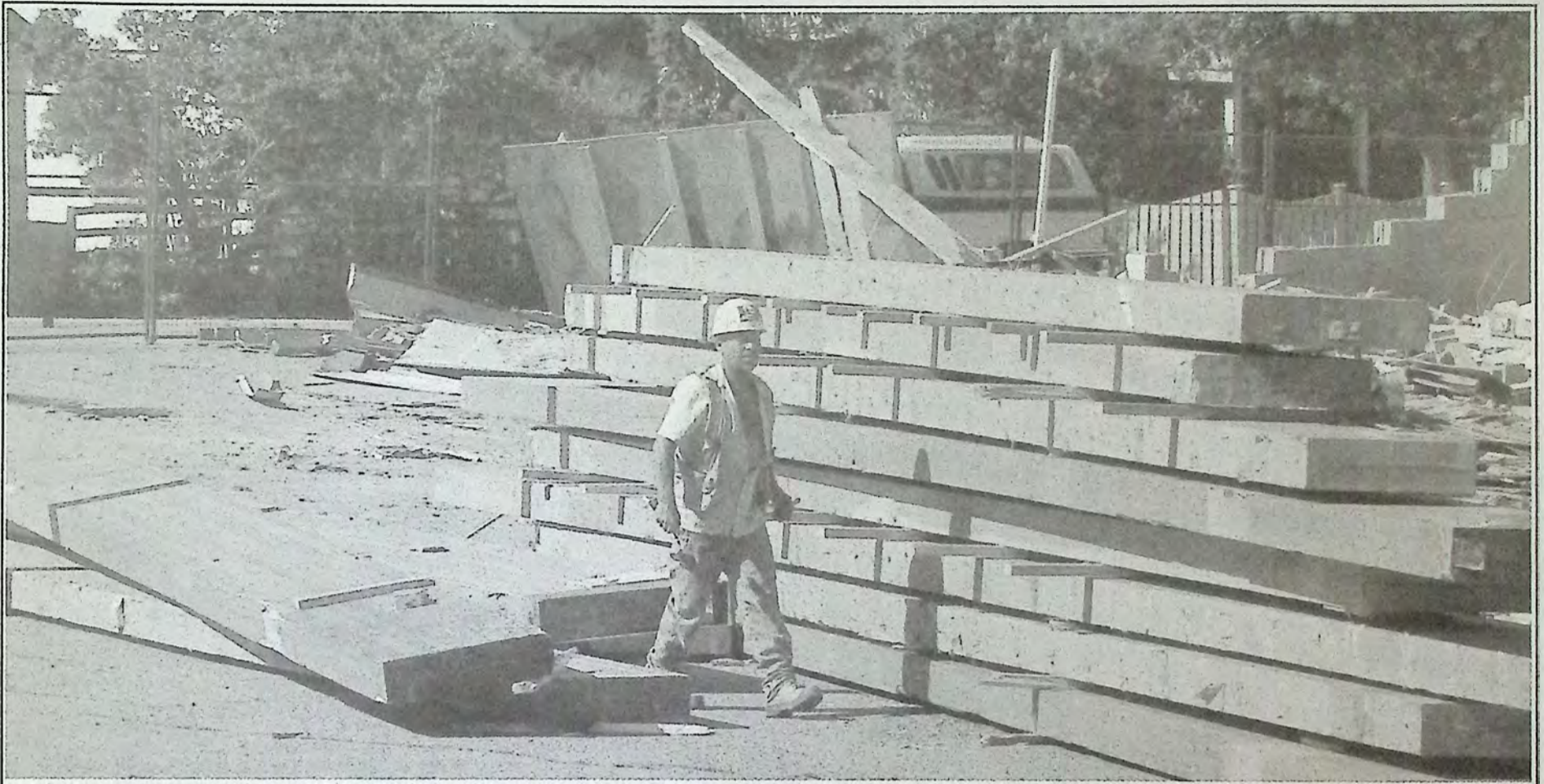

Chamber of Commerce update

The Town of Princeton provides the funding for the Visitor Centre and has decided to relocate the Tourist Information Centre from the Chamber of Commerce building on Highway 3 to the old town hall site.

"The goal is to bring the tourists into town and thereby increase local shopping," Chamber President Brenda Crawford says.

The tentative date for the move is May 15th.

"This will remove the Visitor Centre from the umbrella of the Chamber to the Town of Princeton."

This is making the Chamber explore options for the land and building on Highway 3 with find-

ings to be discussed at the Chamber of Commerce AGM set for 6:00 PM on May 28th.

This is an opportunity for the Chamber to revitalize and become the voice for business in Princeton.

"The Board of Directors has received formal training from the BC Chamber of Commerce focused on governance and that will assist us in working as a more effective Board," Crawford states.

"We do have some opportunities for Directors to join the Board to be part of these exciting changes. Come out to the Annual General Meeting to hear about our plans for the future!"

Tax rate bylaw receives three readings

The Town of Princeton must annually prior to May 15th and after adoption of the Five-Year Financial Plan, adopt a tax rates bylaw.

In her report to Town Council at their May 4th regular meeting, Town of Princeton Director of Finance Shirley McMahon explains, "The Tax Rates Bylaw contains the tax rates for the Town of Princeton, the Okanagan Regional Library, the Regional Hospital District and the Regional District of Okanagan-Similkameen."

She added, "It should be noted that the annual tax bill that residents and businesses receive includes these tax rates plus: tax rates from the provincial government for school and policing taxes; tax rates for the BC

Assessment Authority; and tax rates for the Municipal Finance Authority."

Although the municipality delivers each property owner a tax bill with all of these itemized taxes, the Town receives only the tax amounts for general municipal purposes which amounts to about 40-percent of the total tax bill. The remaining tax amounts are remitted to the appropriate agency.

Based upon an average single family residential property assessed at \$178,952 in 2014 and \$179,852 in 2015, the Municipal portion of the average property tax bill, including all agencies except school, police, MFA and BCAA would be (2015) \$560.20 Municipal Taxes, \$56.89

Regional Hospital Taxes, \$26.53 Regional District Taxes, \$34.20 Recreation Taxes, \$33.29 Regional Library Taxes for a total of \$711.11. That would be a slight increase over the 2014 figures of \$527.13 Municipal Taxes, \$54.50 Regional Hospital Taxes, \$65.27 Regional District Taxes, \$34.60 Regional Library Taxes for a total of \$681.50.

McMahon adds, "Beginning in 2015 the Town has assumed the responsibility for provision of Recreation services in both the Town and Area H with the cost of providing the service shared by the Town and Area H."

The average overall tax increase for the municipal share of taxes for 2015 was \$29.61.

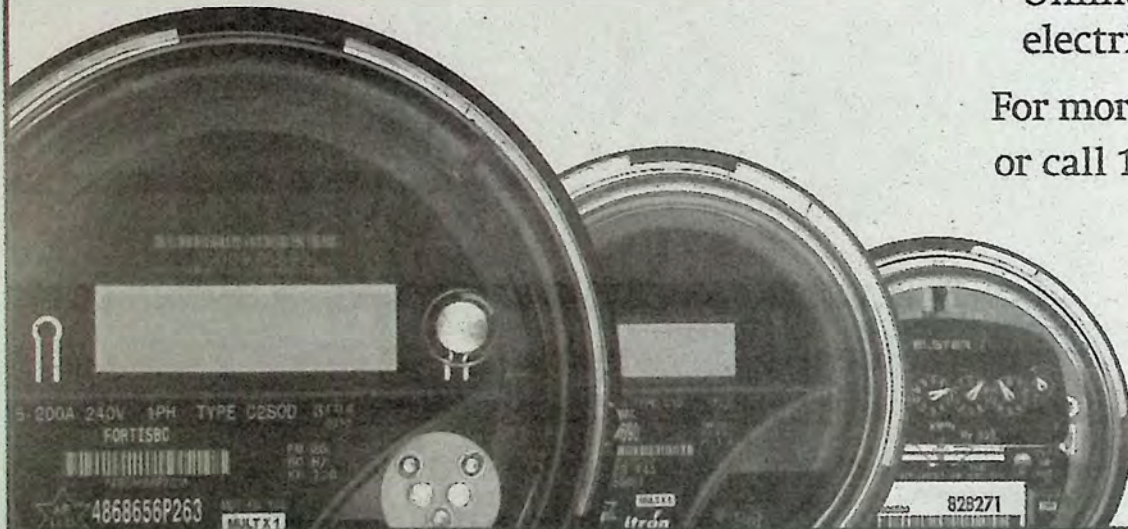

Sticking It To Dump Day

The Town of Princeton has banished Free Dump Days. Read that line again.

I purposely used the word 'banished' as I find it to be fitting. In recent months we have seen threats to other services provided in our community. The proposed reduction in hours at the Princeton Library being the most recent. Now Free Dump Days are getting pulled from the Community Calendar.

Before I jump all over that slash in service I'd like to look at it a bit deeper.

First off, it has never been free. Taxpayers in the Town of Princeton pay for the right to have a local landfill site annually. The operation of that service is contracted out and fees are charged for those of us who can't figure out how to recycle, repurpose or sell things we would rather throw away. I see the fees as penalties imposed on those of us who just aren't as 'green' as the guy next door.

In our house we recycle. We have barely a full bag of garbage weekly and probably a full blue bag at least monthly. Free Dump Day was not a celebration to us, but we did use it on occasion to rid our property of those items we couldn't fit into our normal garbage or recycle.

The Town says Free Dump Days costs too much to do anymore so they have chosen to pull the pin on that service. It won't have much of an effect on our household, but what will it do for you?

Oh, I should point out that the solution to Free Dump Days is now a sticker system where everyone gets a pair of stickers that can be used anytime. Apparently that will be cheaper and easier for everyone than flooding the landfill site with loads of crap twice a year.

I do see the contractor's point of view on this but see the whole situation as possibly even more work in the long run. I also doubt some residents will bother with stickers when they have been 'programmed' to pile up stuff for the twice a year trip to the dump.

While I get the concept behind 'staggered' trips of free loads to the landfill site I wonder what will be next. I would like to suggest staggering due dates for property taxes and water/sewer bills. Different due dates would be useful for some of us and would cut down on the influx of traffic on the eleventh hour at Town Hall. I think due dates in the same style that ICBC uses would cut down on that in a big way and it would ensure regular cash flow into the municipal bank accounts for taxes and utilities.

Or maybe pick two different times of year taxpayers can pay those bills together without penalty. Kind of like how Free Dump Days used to be.

They Call It Engineering

I ran into a term new to me. It is called consensus engineering.

Consensus engineering starts with somebody in authority talking about an idea as if it were a fact. Then some other people jump on the bandwagon and talk about the idea as if it were a fact. First thing you know, more people begin to think the idea is a fact and begin to support the so-called fact. Respected individuals and groups express support for the idea as if it were fact.

When enough people support the idea as if it were fact, somebody in authority will say a consensus has been reached. What began as an idea has now become fact for the majority.

As Abraham Lincoln said, "You can fool some of the people some of the time, but you can't fool all of the people all of the time."

There are those who will insist the idea is just an idea, it is not a fact. These people will be seen as having something wrong with them. If the non-believers present argu-

ments contrary to the majority, they will be seen as dissidents or conspiracy theorists or just plain nuts. In some cases, laws may be passed and force used to coerce them into being quiet.

I read about consensus engineering one day, then saw a documentary on Kent State University in Ohio the next evening. People around my age will have a definite emotional response at the words 'Kent State.'

It was where, in 1970, students were engaged in a protest against the United States going into Cambodia in the ongoing conflict in Viet Nam. The National Guard had been called out to disperse the students. The guardsmen began lobbing tear gas canisters into the crowd. The students threw the canisters back at the National Guard. Suddenly shots rang out, and students began to fall. Four students were killed and many injured because they were protesting an illegal war.

As shocking as the killings were, what was more shocking to me was the consensus of the American public that the killings were justified. One person interviewed in the wake of the news was saying, 'They should have killed them all.' Very few spoke out to remind people this was a violation of the fundamental American right to peaceful dissent.

In the following month, there was a great public rally of ordinary working people who were against dissent and in support of the government.

History has shown the involvement of the United States in actu-

al war in Cambodia constituted an illegal act under the Constitution of the United States. History has shown that the American involvement in Viet Nam was the result of a 'false flag' (the attack on an American ship, USS Maddox, on August 2 and 4, 1964, in the Gulf of Tonkin). In 1995, documents related to the incident showed there was no attack on the USS Maddox.

The students had been right to protest what their government was doing. Four students had died because the consensus was against what the students knew to be true.

One of the results of the killings at Kent State was fear. When the consensus of Americans thought the protest was wrong and the government was right, it was like saying all protesters deserved to be shot. This made dissidents of any sort seen as wrong.

How did this consensus emerge in the first place? The government had persuaded the American public that fighting Communism was justified, and supporting allies was essential. The ally was France. The French had occupied Viet Nam as a colony for generations. In fact, on old maps, Viet Nam was labeled French Indo-China. I often wondered if any Americans ever saw the irony of fighting against a people who were doing exactly what the Americans had done: trying to emerge from the control of imperialist government to form their own republic.

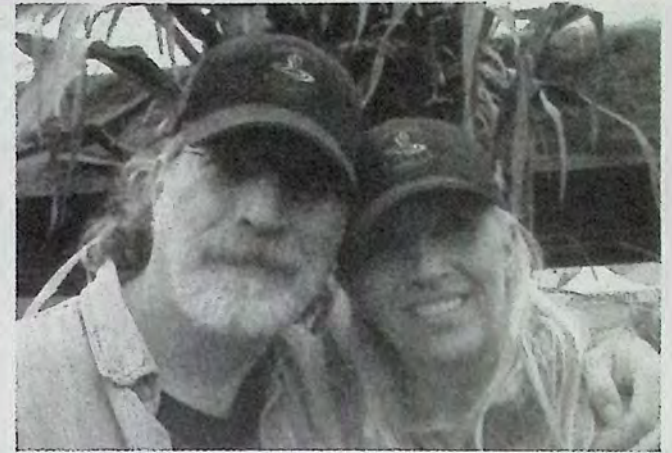

Living Past 100

Spring's Healthy Foods

There are foods commonly associated with springtime in Canada: spinach, asparagus, radishes and rhubarb. These were the earliest fresh foods available for harvest after the long Canadian winter.

Spinach is full of excellent nutrients, and is a great source of iron. It is an extremely easy crop to grow, even in a container. It does not mind a little frost. Spinach can be acidic, so if you are sensitive to acid, serve it with eggs or cottage cheese. Spinach should be washed thoroughly, but never soaked. It becomes limp and squishy when soaked. Spinach contains some calcium, but its main nutrient is Vitamin A, also known as beta-carotene.

Asparagus is a delicate plant to cook. After breaking off the stalk just above the white part, wash it well, then cook in a steamer. If you boil it, it will become soggy. You can freeze asparagus, but it will have to be blanched briefly in boiling water while preparing it for the freezer, and the frozen asparagus will need to be cooked in boiling water, so it will be soggy. If you don't mind it being soggy, go ahead and freeze a lot while it is in season.

Asparagus is not rich in nutrients, but is a special treat that is good for you. If anyone in your family suffers from blackheads and pimples, save the asparagus water and cleanse the infections morning and night. Asparagus is good for people who have hypertension. Asparagus cleans the kidneys and feet and hands of excessive uric acid, and eases constipation.

Rhubarb is highly acidic, but contains a lot of calcium and a lesser amount of phosphorus. This combination of minerals coats tooth enamel and strengthens the enamel. Despite the sour taste of rhubarb, do not shun it. Rhubarb contains anti-tumor properties that can prevent tumor formation. It is also a good laxative, but also eases diarrhea. It is very good for healing the digestive tract. Rhubarb lowers cholesterol. A heavy meal of fats followed by a dish of stewed rhubarb will keep cholesterol down. Rhubarb as a dessert can be sweetened with honey or maple syrup, and can be enhanced with a little vanilla. Rhubarb relish is a wonderful accompaniment for meat loaf.

There is another springtime food that is great for adding zip to meals: the radish. Radishes are really good for you. Eating radishes prevents the formation of gallstones and kidney stones, and aids in digesting starchy foods. Radishes help prevent cancer. Anyone with low thyroid can benefit from a daily serving of three or four radishes (more if you love them!). Radishes are especially good for older people who tend to gain weight due to low thyroid production.

Make the most of fresh springtime vegetables that improve health. The fresher the vegetable, the more healthy it is for you.

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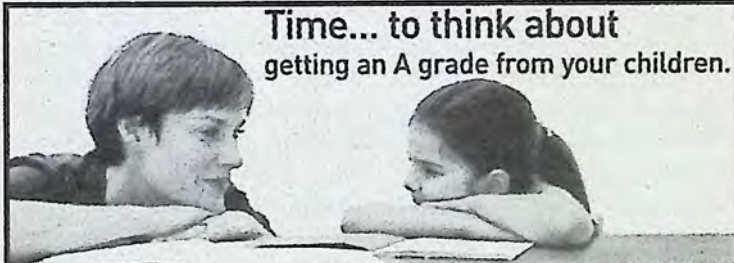
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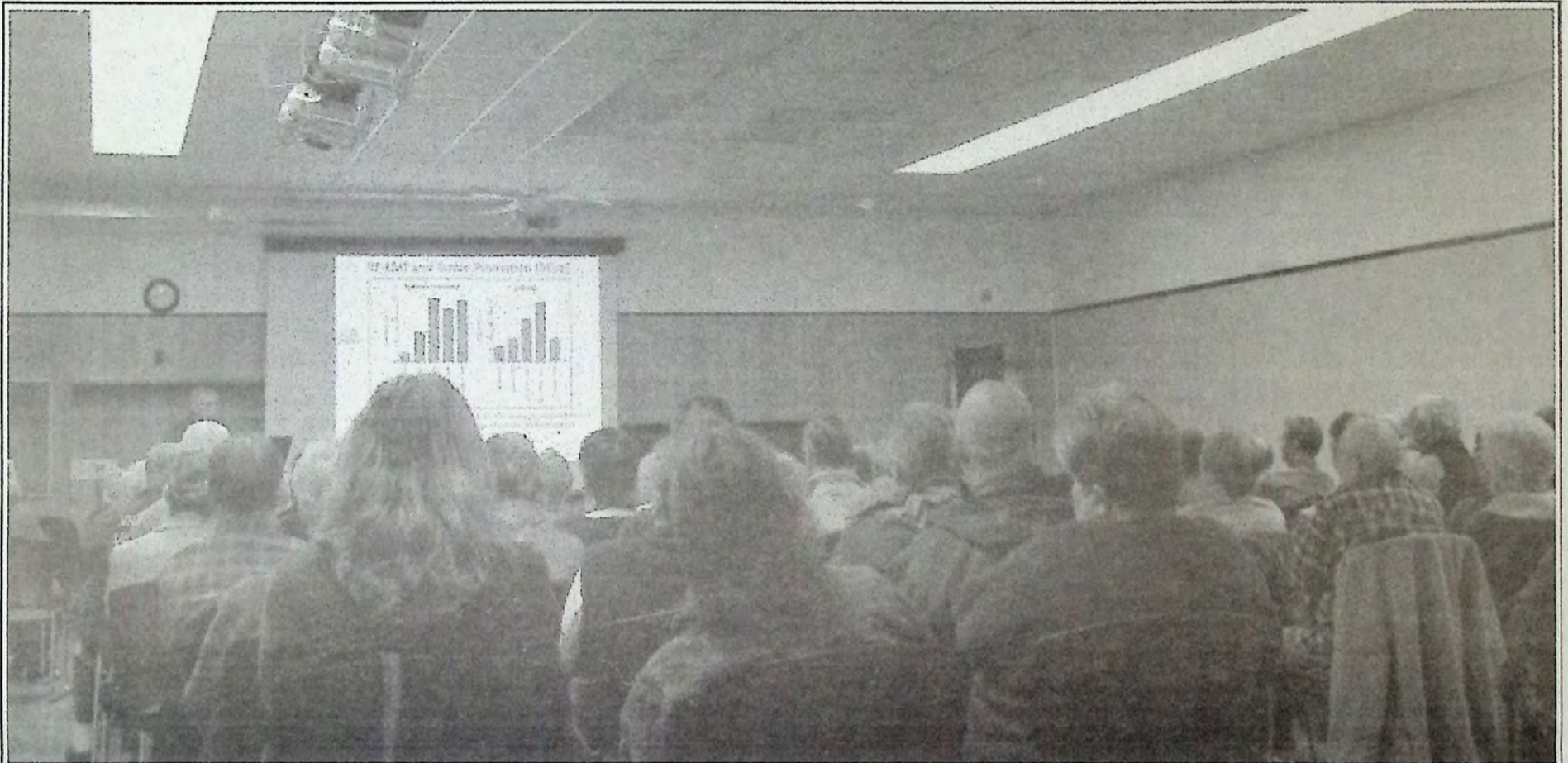

Meeting looks at RF radiation

Close to one hundred people attended a meeting in Cawston Hall May 5th that was being promoted as an information session dealing with Smart Meters and RF Radiation.

The event featured Dr. Malcolm Paterson as guest speaker who was later joined by Dr. Jennifer Strong.

Other officials included Area D Director Tom Siddon, who was also the MC for the meeting, Area G Director Elef Christensen and Area H Director Bob Coyne.

Following opening statements by Siddon and Dr. Strong, Dr. Paterson focused attention on what attendees called "very professional and well

accepted ideas on smart meters and wifi in general."

His presentation features a lot of data and was careful to not sound alarmist but presented facts and figures so that those in attendance could draw their own more informed conclusions.

He explained that the type of smart meters being installing have a shield to stop the radiation entering homes.

"Unfortunately it doesn't stop your neighbors meter from sending a pulse through it," was how the process was described to the News Leader.

A portion of the discussion centred

on Safety Code 6 from Health Canada and how meter companies work to get around the exposure levels.

Smart meters broadcast a series of high energy pulses much higher than those allowable under Safety Code 6 but they are allowed to average those few microseconds over 6 minutes.

Dr. Paterson also explained that although over time like anything

else we will probably see problems, mostly cancers, in our children because they have been exposed to RF signals since they were born where adults have had less exposure time.

I know I am willing to give it a chance and if it really isn't the direction I want to go, I will get off at the next stop, but until then I am only making an assumption about something that I don't know anything about.

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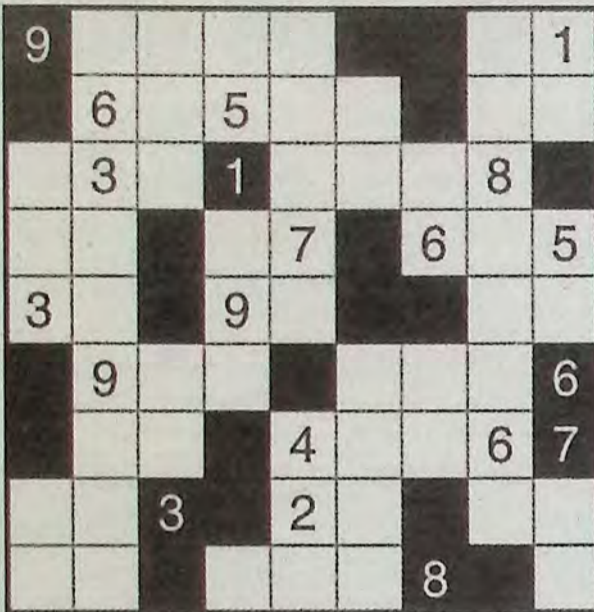

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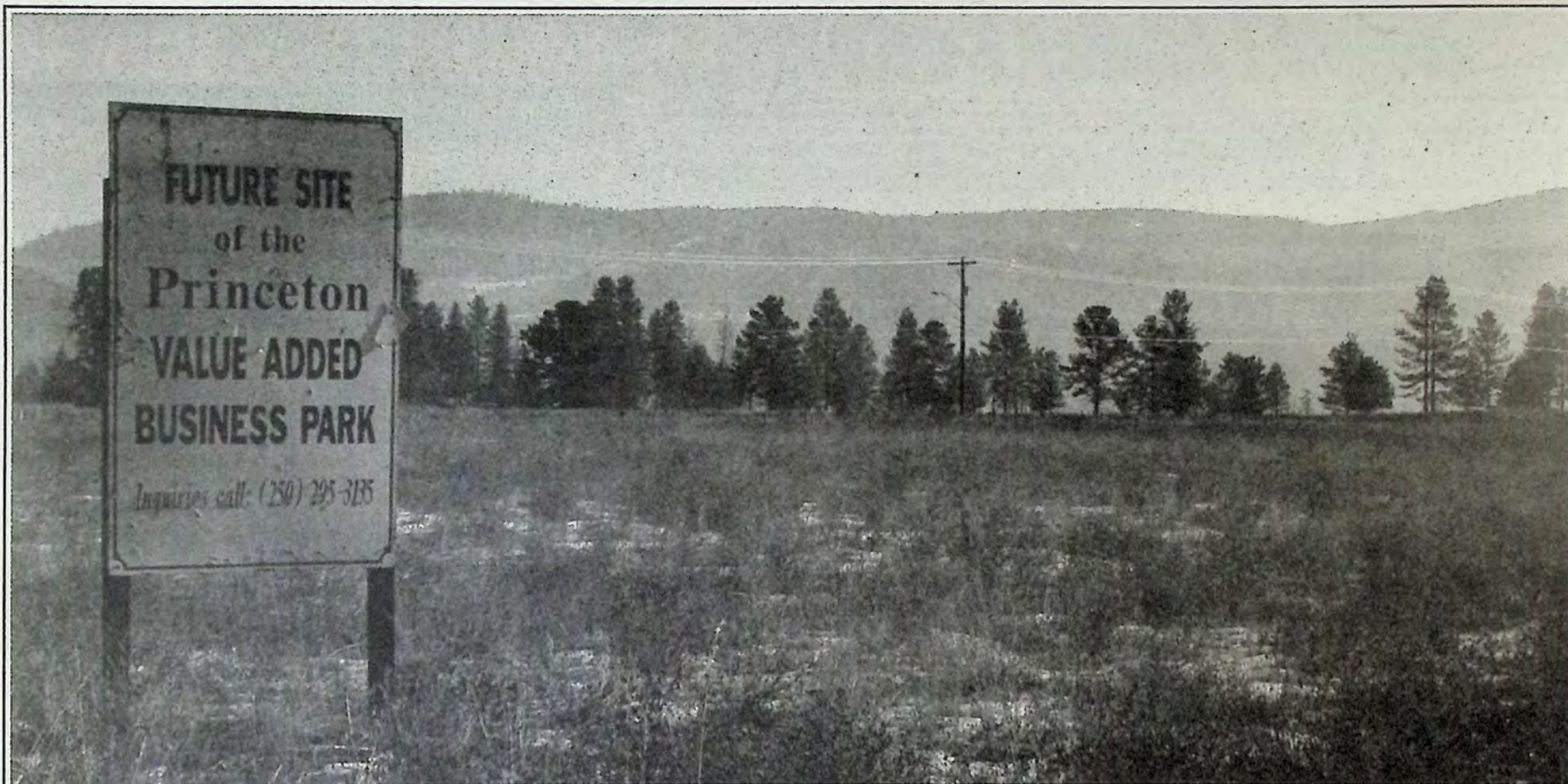

Saving Downtown Princeton...

...An Ongoing Series by George Elliott

If you have read this column for any length of time you know that I have been preaching about the importance of supporting local business. I have done my best to 'debunk' much of the misinformation that has had a lot to do with local shoppers forming opinions and attitudes about the apparent high cost of supporting the Princeton retail core.

Yes, I know there are often better deals in different communities, but still you should spend some extra

time comparison-shopping within the community you live (if you don't already) to get a better picture of what the local economy has to offer.

In our house we find that since we are in a fairly competitive business that we need to pay attention to what we charge customers to support our business. We also have to pay the bills associated with doing business in order to keep doing just that in a small town.

That's why our customers rarely

see 'give away' advertising prices offered because we are already charging the bottom line in order to maintain our bottom line.

I'm explaining this as a way to lead into a reminder that if you think a local business is charging too much for an item you want to buy, there is going to be a reason. Maybe they have a competitor out of town that has charged such bargain basement prices that the local business is doing their best to just stay alive.

Another way of looking at that is the bargain basement prices being offered could also be an attempt to put someone out of business.

Even if that is the last thing you think about when buying something in the local marketplace, it is a huge factor in the pricing scale in any business regardless of the size of that business.

Where it becomes unfair is when shoppers make comparisons to businesses that aren't really in the

same category. My example is the difference in price of an item sold in Princeton to a similar-type (but not identical) item in a box store sold in Penticton. Of course there is going to be a price difference but the same thing exists when you compare a name brand item to a non name brand item on the same shelf in the same store in Princeton.

It is a lot to do with the attitude I have discussed here in the past that shoppers figure that small town businesses are ripping off their customers. An example of that is whenever gasoline prices are compared between here and surrounding communities. While there are times when the price difference seems unfair, for the most part the local gas stations are pretty close, if not exactly the same price, as those in the region.

I also understand the argument from residents on fixed or limited incomes. I can honestly tell you we live on a reasonably tight budget in

our home, which makes us look at value when shopping locally. We have succeeded frequently with our habit of 'flyer shopping,' which I have explained in great detail in recent columns. We save easily hundreds of dollars, and thousands a year in our shopping and we do 90 to 95% of our purchases in downtown Princeton.

So why can we do it and others can't seem to figure it out?

Firstly, we do our homework. If an item is on sale and it is on our shopping list we buy two or three, which multiplies our savings. We also shop for items each week, opting to make smaller purchases instead of giant monthly trips. We find that by breaking up our shopping we a) buy only what we need when it is on sale, b) find that we save more because of the changing weekly sales and c) can afford to put most of our disposable income back into the economy that supports us.

changes to the Workers Compensation Act provide that all employers must have a policy to handle workplace bullying and harassment. All employees of the Village must not engage in the bullying and harassment of other workers and must report if bullying and harassment is observed or experienced.

Trail

- Council received information pertaining to activities occurring on the trail located between 7th and 10th Streets and approved expenditures of up to \$12,000 to locate, haul and dump rocks at intervals along the portion of the trail.

First Quarter Bylaw Enforcement Review

- Council received information pertaining to a review of Bylaw Enforcement statistics. As of March 31, 2015 the Village has received a total of 6 complaints, a 33% decrease in the number of complaints for the same period in 2014. A total of three dogs were impound-

ed and one municipal ticket was issued.

- Municipal Ticket Information Amendment Bylaw No. 803, 2013, Amendment Bylaw No. 803-5. Removal of fine for discharging fireworks in the Village from

Schedule 11.

- Land Use Procedures Bylaw No. 819. Updated to reflect current provisions of the Local Government Act.

- Sign and Canopy Regulation Amendment Bylaw No. 818. Updated to provide clarification of terms and to reflect current provisions of the Community Charter.

- Fire Regulation Bylaw No. 665, 2003, Amendment Bylaw No. 665-1. Updated to replace definition of 'prohibited material,' to regulate the size, location and responsibilities with respect to open burning and campfires within the Village and to restrict open burning between April 15th and October 15th.

Secondly, we accept the fact that shopping local is important to keeping businesses alive within our community. If we spent most of our disposable income out of town we are doing our own business a disservice if we expect locals to support us in advertising or by buying our paper.

Thirdly, when applicable, we will press for 'price matching' at local

businesses that honour this. This I can tell you we have rarely done, as we haven't felt the need to because the majority of our shopping is for items already on sale.

How does this save downtown Princeton?

If you don't already 'flyer shop' or pay attention to sale prices offered with in your own community I challenge you to start paying some atten-

tion to that. If you find yourself saying things like, "What a rip-off" or "Wal-Mart is cheaper" take a good hard look at what you are comparing to the big box store. If it isn't an exact match, then you are not really being fair to the local business you are dissatisfied with.

Informed consumers are smart shoppers and if the community were filled with them they would help local business in many ways from supporting business to pushing some to reconsider their pricing in order to keep locals coming through their front door.

.....continued from Page 5 that Communism was a danger to them was no problem after the witch hunt of the 1950s when Senator Joe McCarthy waved a paper at a meeting of the Women's League of Voters and declared the paper was a list of 250 government employees who had Communist affiliations. In short, he was saying the American government had been infiltrated by Communists. The fact is, as history has proven, Senator McCarthy was lying. He had no such list. He had to launch the witch hunt to cover up his lie. Despite the lie, it was soon the consensus of the American public that Communism was a threat to the United States. The consensus was not based on fact, it was based on an idea promoted by an authority figure.

Two human tendencies lead to

flawed consensus. The first is our desire to follow a leader, and the second is our wired-in desire to belong to the majority. If we follow an authority figure, we don't have to think things through by ourselves. If we belong to the majority, then we consider ourselves more acceptable, more right, and more safe.

It takes time and effort to discover the facts, to see whether an idea is fact or fiction. It is easier to go along with the majority. It is often safer to go along with the majority when the protest could lead to punishment or death by government forces. History gives many examples of such punishments: Nazi Germany, Russians banished to Siberia, and Kent State. My question is this: does punishment of dissenters have any place in a democracy?

McMahon explains in her report that residents will receive two 'Free Landfill' stickers in July with their tax notice.

"Each sticker will entitle them to dispose of up to 500-kilograms of refuse without charge and can be used at any time of the year."

Area H residents will be able to pick up their Free Landfill Stickers annually with their regular landfill stickers. There will not be more than two free stickers issued to any landowner in a single calendar year. Other alternatives considered but not implemented including reducing 'free' Landfill Days to a single weekend or the complete elimination of any 'free' program.
