## Group keeps gold rush history alive

The Granite Creek Preservation Society was formed in September 2013 and has quietly gone about the business of preserving the integrity of the ghost town and nearby cemetery. The significance of Granite Creek, or Granite City as it has mistakenly been called, is huge in relation to the history of the Similkameen Valley.

Mining and museum documents note that although placer gold had been reported as far back as 1877 it wasn't until the first major discovery in July 1885 that the creek attracted gold miners from as far

away as California. Suddenly a town sprung up on a flat just above the creek that ballooned to a reported population of 2,000 a year after the Gold Rush began.

At that time there were forty houses, six saloons and hotels as well as seven stores.

But as quickly as the rush started, it came to pass and by 1889 people began moving on to more productive ground.

A fire in 1907 destroyed part of the community but it bounced back and although the post office closed .....continued on Page 2

## Project looks at housing solutions

The concept of a Community Land Trust (CLT) was discussed May 4th at the regular meeting of Princeton Town Council. The presentation was made by Angelique Wood, Kim English and Dallas Brandt and focused primarily on how the concept could be used as

a revitalization tool in the Similkameen. The trio was using Hedley as their main focus.

For example, because employment opportunities that put Hedley on the map are no longer present, the community has taken quite a hit over the years. Stats shared

revealed Hedley currently has thirty empty homes, which equates to close to 20-percent of the housing stock in the community.

The reasons for the number of empty homes in Hedley are many and issues identified as having an impact include:

- Many seniors want to live out their days in Hedley,
- Little suitable new housing development occurring for seniors,
- Difficult to sell a home, and
- Poor access to health care and home supports create insecurity about aging in place.

What appears to compound the problem is aging trends in the Similkameen where 65-percent of the population in Keremeos was under 55 and 35-percent was 56+ in 1986. In 2013 the balance shifted where the Keremeos population figures showed 47-percent was under 55 and 53-percent 56+. The provincial average in 2013 was 30-percent under 55 and 70-percent 56+. Projections for 2030 place the numbers at 44-percent under 55

and 56-percent 56+.

What this means on the provincial scale is that only three of the twenty-eight Local Health Areas in the Southern Interior (Fermie, Golden and Revelstoke) are still below the provincial average in the 56+ age group. That number will drop to one if the projections for 2030 are accurate.

The CLT part of the plan is projected to take place in the next phase of the program identified as the SIBAC Innovative Solutions for Rural Housing & Seniors Services Project.

In the second phase there are three primary objectives and they include:

- The creation of a CLT Business Plan,
- The transfer of two properties into the CLT organization,
- Develop knowledge sharing materials, and
- Facilitate more learning at both the government and community levels.

Wood explained that, "CLTs give

communities a way to deliver their own services, housing, etc," and that "CLTs are self-supporting."

Two short videos were played that were produced in the United Kingdom and told about how small communities managed to save their housing through the development of a CLT. In one case the community also took on local community services (a pub, for example, which was the local meeting place and community hall) and helped keep the local economy moving forward.

The overall concept of a Community Land Trust is explained as "an innovative solution to reinvigorate communities by transferring some of the planning .....continued on Page 18

# Group cleans Granite

.....continued from Front Page in 1918, a few people remained in the town for many decades afterwards.

Because of the historic significance a handful of Coalmont residents pulled together and initiated the formation of the GCPS.

The Society, which has registered charitable status, meets monthly to discuss matters of interest to the group ranging from donations of documents for their website to decisions related to clean-up of the ghost town site and cemetery.

In addition to an extensive online catalogue of historic photos and doc-

uments, the group has been taking care of the cemetery. Chores there include the removal of trees that have fallen, repairs to damaged fencing around some of the grave markers as well as an ongoing cleaning project that has resulted in the restoration of many of the very old headstones.

The Granite Creek Preservation Society will see an active year ahead with summer camping season arriving. The group is in the process of educating users of the camping area in and around the ghost town to respect the historic significance of the site. This means not leaving

garbage behind and not using wood from any of the building remains for campfires. More than one building on the site disappeared from being used as firewood.

The GCPS also reminds campers to respect the fact that there are active mining claims in the area.

### Crayons And Pablum

I have a number of boxes of things I was able to salvage from my childhood home a few years ago before it went up for sale.

Due to time and cost factors I did not get much time to collect a lot but did bring back a number of things. The boxes have not been opened since I stored them for a variety of reasons.

I was quite fortunate that my mother was a bit of a pack rat as she saved just about anything and everything connected to us and growing up. She documented almost everything in scrapbooks and took pictures of every single life event, big and small.

One day last week I chose to flip just a few pages into one of the scrapbooks knowing that if I didn't set a time limit I would get lost in the artifacts and lose the better part of a day.

In the pile of books I found one that was labeled as my 'Work Book' from Kindergarten in Edmonton, Alberta. Mom had noted the dates, times and location of my stay in Kindergarten as well as the names of the teachers and bus driver.

In the workbook were drawings and sketches I did in the early 1960s. Each of them is dated with a short explanation in Mom's handwriting of what they represented. I discovered I was pretty good at drawing fruit as a 4 1/2-year old.

One scrapbook includes letters written in response to ones my mother mailed to various places, companies and agencies for countless reasons.

I found one dated November 1, 1961 from the makers of Pablum. Apparently Mom sent in a photo of me thinking I could become a spokes model for the product I was obviously eating as my regular diet at the time. Unfortunately the company Product Manager let Mom down gently by telling her that as I wasn't a professional model I could not be used to promote their food.

It made me chuckle to think that marketing and promotion goes back so far in my life.

One day I'll sift through some more of the boxes I kept and I know I'll discover more interesting finds. Well, interesting to me at least.

I think what interested me most about this was that my early years were not at a time when technology ruled the Universe and simple things like letters, typewritten by hand, were still important enough documents to be kept as souvenirs of an event or experience.

It also means that with trends pointing towards 'less is more' and the habit of just tossing out boxes of 'stuff' we can easily lose track of some of our personal history.

For me, I now know I was pretty good at drawing circles as a toddler. What does that really mean? It tells me that unlocking bits of our past can give us perspective on our future and clearly I have always been creative.

It also means that if there is a hoarder or pack rat in your family, maybe, just maybe, some of what they are saving will become valuable to you some time in your future.

## Wheat Board Sale Raises Food Issues

The federal government has sold the Canadian Wheat Board to G3 Global Grain Group, a Saudi and American group. G3 will have a 50.1 percent share, with 49.9 percent held in trust for Canadian farmers who sell to the Board. Farmers will get \$5.00 per tonne in units controlled by the trust. After five years, G3 will have the option of buying the farmers' equity. The selling price was \$250 million.

The present government, despite vocal opposition and several lawsuits, went ahead with the sale on April 15, 2015. The government had rejected a bid by a group of Canadian farmers.

I find this transaction alarming. It gives control of Canadian grain to two foreign countries at a time when food production worldwide is slowing.

Food is sold as a commodity which means the highest bidder wins, but in a time of food shortage, some nations will have an advantage because they control the food. For example, China is buying large tracts of farmland in Africa to

ensure a food supply for Chinese citizens.

During the air traffic shutdown due to volcanic ash covering southern England and most of France, food shortages were felt almost immediately because England and France relied heavily on fresh food flown from Africa.

Today, there is a shortage of beef. Most people will see these shortages as temporary, but it is time to look at the reality in terms of food production worldwide. Beef prices are not likely to drop anytime soon. Drought in Argentina and the American southwest forced ranchers to sell their cattle before the cattle died. In Argentina, the beef industry has not recovered. In the American southwest, recovery is not in sight.

What most people do not realize is the level of production of food has reached a point where it is not expanding. Canada has the potential to produce more, but farmland is not expanding. Production of chickens, eggs, corn and rice has peaked. In fact, the production of rice peaked nearly 20 years ago.

Fish catches have diminished. We are now eating fish species that would have been tossed back in the sea 50 years ago.

California's drought has an impact on our supply of fresh and frozen vegetables. You have seen the prices rise in our supermarkets, and you have seen the labels from Mexico and Chile.

Production of sheep has declined in the past 50 years. Lamb is very expensive. Pork is now and expensive meat.

Every shortage is reflected in price. Even beans, one of those sta-

ples of the Great Depression, cost more today. They are a meat substitute.

The number of people in our country going to food banks has increased dramatically in the past two years because food is becoming so expensive. Food banks are holding campaigns to encourage people to donate food or money.

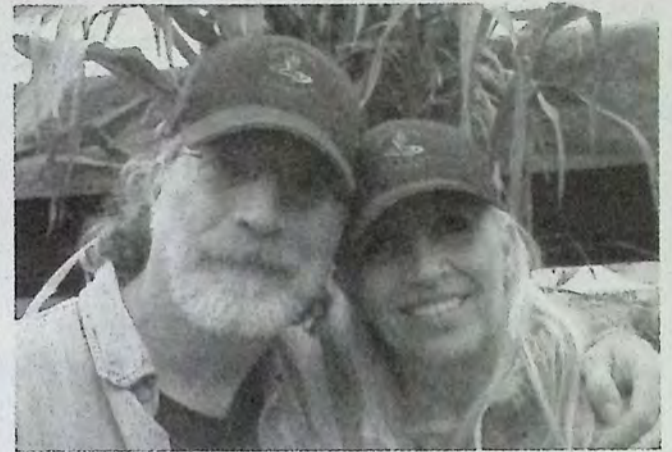
Hunger comes at a point when food intake is not sufficient to reach the protein-energy balance. People think they can always substitute one food for another, but this is simply not true if those people wish to remain healthy. A child who does not eat enough protein will sicken and die. A child who does not eat enough starch will sicken and die. A balance is required.

Rather than selling control of our food resources, our government should be taking steps to increase food production through incentive programs designed to help farmers expand land devoted to agriculture. There are many places where goats could thrive, or where more chickens could be raised. Land considered non-agricultural can be used for some kind of agricultural enterprise with the right kind of incentives.

I believe any responsible government ensures it has control over the nation's food supply and ensures there is enough food for every citizen. Governments can encourage expansion of food production by offering loans and grants to farmers to expand production. Only a foolhardy government lets another nation control its food supply, particularly at a time when food production is not keeping up with population growth.

## Funding aids Similkameen growers

British Columbia's agri-food industry is receiving more than \$1.5 million for 17 new projects that support a broad range of innovative products, practices and technologies of direct benefit to the sector.

The projects announced May 15th include:

- Testing the feasibility of a small scale micro-malting facility to produce local custom malted grains for the growing B.C. craft brewing and distilling industries.
- Investigating the potential of earwigs as a biological control of sev-

eral important insect pests in apple orchards in the Okanagan and Similkameen.

- Developing a specialized grinder that will crush raw ungulate bone into a dry bone powder. There is a demand for bone powder in the pet food and supplement markets.

The funding comes from the Governments of Canada and British Columbia's commitment under the Growing Forward 2 agreement to provide up to \$13.4 million between 2013 and 2018 through the Canada-B.C. Agri-Innovation Program.

Projects funded through the program must have the potential to lead to the commercialization and/or adoption of innovative products, technologies and practices. So far, 80 projects have shared more than \$7 million in funding.

Growing Forward 2 is a five-year agreement launched in 2013 that

provides a \$3-billion, federal-provincial-territorial government investment in innovation, competitiveness and market development.

The Canada-B.C. Agri-Innovation Program is administered by the Investment Agriculture Foundation of B.C. Additional program information and application forms are available

## Local groups receive gaming grants

Two organizations in Princeton have received \$14,000 in community gaming grants from the B.C. government.

The Kokanee Summer Swim Club Society: \$8,500 for its summer swim club programs;

The Princeton Traditional Music Society: \$5,500 for the sixth annual Princeton Traditional Music Festival.

"Sports and music programs play an important role in keeping smaller communities vibrant and ener-

gized," Fraser-Nicola MLA Jackie Tegart said shortly after the grants were announced May 13th.

"These organizations encourage people to live active and creative lifestyles and we're very appreciative of all the work they do in Princeton."

Both local groups depend on these grants.

About \$7 million in grants is being distributed this month to approximately 200 sport and arts and culture groups around the province.

The community gaming grant program allows non-profit organizations to apply for provincial gaming revenues to support direct delivery of a program that benefits the broader community.

## Living Past 100

### Minerals Keep You Healthy

One of the major reasons nutritionists encourage people to eat a wide variety of foods is to ensure people eat enough minerals. Minerals are essential. A deficiency of iron is a classic example of lack of one particular mineral. Adequate iron in the diet prevents anemia, a disorder in which the blood cannot carry enough oxygen. Lack of iron means lack of energy, sometimes to the point of fainting from very little exertion.

Lack of calcium results in poor bone formation in children. Leaching of calcium from the bones results in osteoporosis in older people.

Lack of potassium can result in high blood pressure. Lack of magnesium can be the cause of certain nerve disorders and muscle cramps.

Vegetables and grains are the primary source of many minerals, but meat, fish, eggs and dairy products supply many important minerals.

A wide variety of foods means a wide variety of minerals. Some people will say they eat a lot of vegetables, but they are missing the point if they are not eating a wide variety of vegetables. If a person eats only potatoes, carrots and peas, that person is missing the minerals found in spinach, Swiss chard, broccoli, cabbage, beets and other vegetables. A person who eats only one kind of fruit is missing the benefits other kinds can bring.

Eating a wide variety of foods means just that: a wide variety. It means including as many different kinds of food as possible. One day, a person could eat eggs, bread, rice, tomatoes, beef, asparagus and apples. The next day the same person could have something different, such as oatmeal with milk and fruit, fish, spinach, onions, eggplant, and yogurt. The next day could be different again, with pork sausages, watermelon, sunflower seeds, plums, and peanut butter. That is what a wide variety means.

Everyone has favourite foods, but eating only the favourites is not as healthy as eating a great variety. The minerals we need come from variety. Sometimes we eat a food containing only a trace of a particular mineral, but that is exactly what we may need to keep us healthy.

## ORL starts strategic planning

The Okanagan Regional Library (ORL) Board of Directors reviewed and accepted a clean audit of the 2014 Financial Statements at their Board meeting last week. Auditors BDO reported that the ORL's revenues and expenses were very close to what was budgeted and consistent with previous years, with the

exception of costs associated with the construction of the new Summerland branch due to open in late summer.

Taking Summerland out of the equation, total revenues for the regional library system were slightly higher than the previous year, totaling \$17,150,067.

Likewise, expenses were slightly elevated to \$17,613,159 with an increase in acquisition of electronic resources and modest wage increases. The ORL's Financial Manager, Don Nettleton, also reported that revenues and expenses for the first quarter of 2015 are in line with budget projections.

The ORL Board is embarking on a strategic planning process, and participated in a session reviewing the previous 2012-2015 plan and defining what success looks like for the future of the library. In order to accomplish this, the Board wants to learn more about how libraries are being utilized in the region, best

practices from other libraries, and hear from their communities about what services matter to them in a landscape of change.

Updates about branches included:  
- The downtown Kelowna Branch will be looked at for a reconfiguration in order to provide new technology-based services and maximize synergies with the adjacent Okanagan Centre for Innovation.

- Rutland branch is being expanded from its current 6,000 up to 10,000 sq feet and is targeted to open in early June.

- Director Carol Zanon reported that the District of West Kelowna held its budget consultation at the West Kelowna branch, which brought more public engagement than in previous years.

- Director Tim Lavery reported that the Salmon Arm City Council will hold its regular council meeting at their local branch on May 25.

- Director Karla Kozakevich with the Okanagan Similkameen Regional District noted that provincial funds have been received to pave the parking lot and make the Naramata branch entrance more accessible.

There was nothing noted during the meeting related to the proposed cutback in operational hours to the Princeton Library Branch.

## Granite Creek earns Chinese historic place designation

Places from Vancouver's Chinatown to historic Barkerville, and from Nam Sing Ranch in the interior to Cumberland's Coal Creek Historic Park are represented in the interactive on-line Chinese Historical Places Map unveiled on the Heritage BC website May 15th

at [www.heritagebc.ca](http://www.heritagebc.ca).

Heritage BC worked with the Ministry of International Trade, the Heritage Branch of the Ministry of Forests, Lands, and Natural Resource Operations, and members of the Legacy Initiatives Advisory Council to create a nomination

process open for the public to submit places with connections to the heritage of B.C.'s Chinese Canadian community.

Over 138 nominations for Chinese Historic Places were received from the public, representing 77 distinct and diverse places including cemeteries, community hubs, places related to industry and agriculture, as well as cultural, spiritual, social and educational places scattered across the province. A committee evaluated the nominations and submitted a list of places recommended for official recognition by the Province of B.C. All 77 distinct sites are represented on the map, along with photographs and other details. Complimenting the online map is the Recognizing Chinese Canadian History in British Columbia: Historic Places Nomination Report

Kathryn Molloy, Executive

Director, Heritage BC said, "Conserving British Columbia's heritage is more than just saving old buildings; it's about restoring community cohesiveness and honouring the diverse cultures that make up the fabric of our heritage. Working together with the Province of BC and the Chinese community to gather nominations, create this map, and host it on our website, has been a team effort. It's a great honour to be part of acknowledging the contributions of Chinese Canadians to British Columbia."

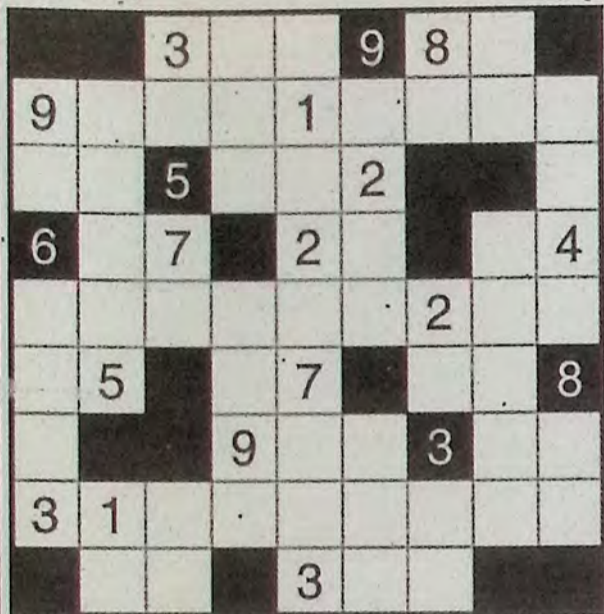

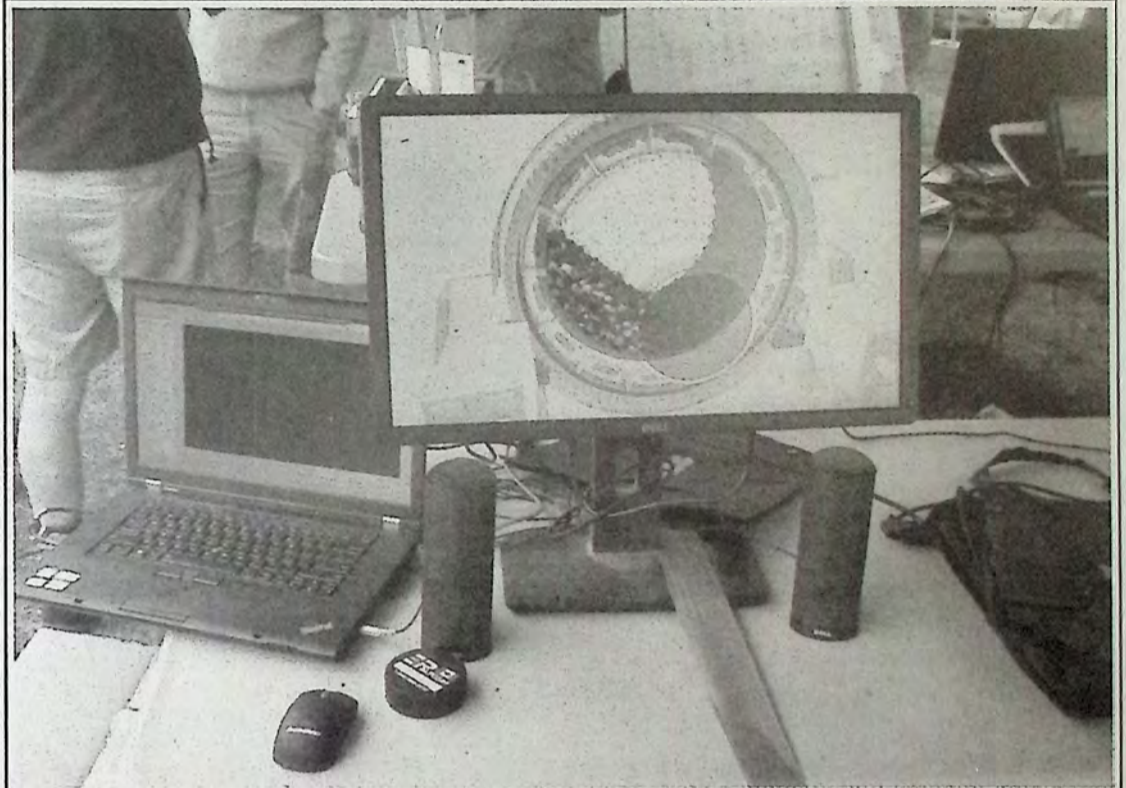

# Saving Downtown Princeton...

...An Ongoing Series by George Elliott

So, what do you think will save downtown Princeton?

A wish list collected a couple years ago in a survey conducted through the Town of Princeton Recreation Department pointed to an aquatic centre and theatre as two main attractions missing from the community.

As much as I'd like to believe the community needs these things, I notice that in many cases we barely use facilities already built in Princeton.

My example is this: the Princeton Museum.

When was the last time you were inside that building?

It's a tremendous facility that is much more than just a place filled with 'old things' and historic documents. A museum is a place where you can research and learn about the history of the area but it is also somewhere to meet and hang out and try different things. The recently held Amazing Literacy Race used the museum as one of the

event locations where students were given clues to hidden treasure.

It was basically a scavenger hunt with some history added.

The museum is a regular participant in this and many other youth-oriented summer programs organized by the Recreation Department. The majority of those events are huge successes and have probably been so because of two key elements.

In my mind the success of the Museum has a lot to do with the contemporary, current, upbeat and new approach to teaching history as has been employed by the youthful approach used by the Museum Manager. The second part of the success is that it is a museum that is very much hands-on as opposed to the typical don't touch guidelines in many other historic sites and warehouses of local history.

Of course, it helps that the Museum has a great deal of floor space and underwent a huge facelift

a few years ago when it expanded once the library moved to a different location.

If you have never set foot in the Museum you owe it to yourself to take a look and see what is happening there and remember it will play another role in the upcoming Canada Day celebration.

Another facility that is under used is the Princeton Fairgrounds.

My connection to the site dates back to 1990 when I became President of Princeton Racing Days. For a few years I also wore the President's hat for Princeton Exhibition Association as well as sat as a Director for years with Princeton Rodeo Club.

The Town of Princeton owns the land known simply as the PXA or Princeton Fairgrounds, but it is managed by a group of volunteers who lease the property for a dollar a year in five-year terms in exchange for paying for all the utilities and services.

Or at least that was the arrangement when I was still part of the group.

Trust me, the Town of Princeton is getting the biggest part of that deal with volunteers working what seems to be more hours than any sane human should in order to keep the grounds tidy and available for user groups to host annual events there.

The events are generally agricultural or equestrian in nature and are all used as ways to attract tourism to our community.

In recent years the PXA has added different events and activities that would never have happened when I was still involved.

The projects providing B.C. agriculture with innovative ideas receiving funding are:

**AgWest Veterinary Group Ltd.:** \$15,650 to demonstrate the Aqua Cow Rise System equipment and help downer cows regain the ability to stand. The project will take place on commercial farms in the Fraser Valley.

**Applied Bio-nomics Ltd.:** \$204,375 to research whether a storage mite is an alternative host prey for *Amblyseius fallacis*, a spider mite predator. If successful, a higher number of lower-cost bio-control tools will be available to berry growers.

**BC Agricultural Research & Development Corp.:**

\$115,500 to assess the technical and economic feasibility of building a gasification plant to convert used horse bedding and poultry litter into

ventional methods."

.....continued from Page 8 wants to learn more about the significant legacy of Chinese Canadians whose contributions have been diverse. The places reveal a side of our history rarely told: they fought wars alongside the British; contributed to the growth of BC's agricultural industry; and forged strong relations with First Nations."

George Elliott, Chair of the Granite Creek Preservation Society adds, "This is another of a long line of historic designations we have managed to secure for Granite. We have in place regional, provincial and national designations for the former gold rush community and achieving this latest goal is a testament to the hard working volunteers in the GCPS who are striving for protecting a site that was so significant in the development of the region."

The release of the report also marks a milestone in the work being done to implement recommendations from the final report from the historical wrongs consultation and to create a meaningful legacy for all British Columbians when it comes to addressing historical wrongs against Chinese Canadians in B.C.

The initiative is one of eight legacy projects to represent the history and development of the Chinese community in B.C., which grew out of the Chinese Historical Wrongs Consultation Report, prepared in May 2014, after the Province of British Columbia apologized to Chinese Canadians for historical wrongs.
