

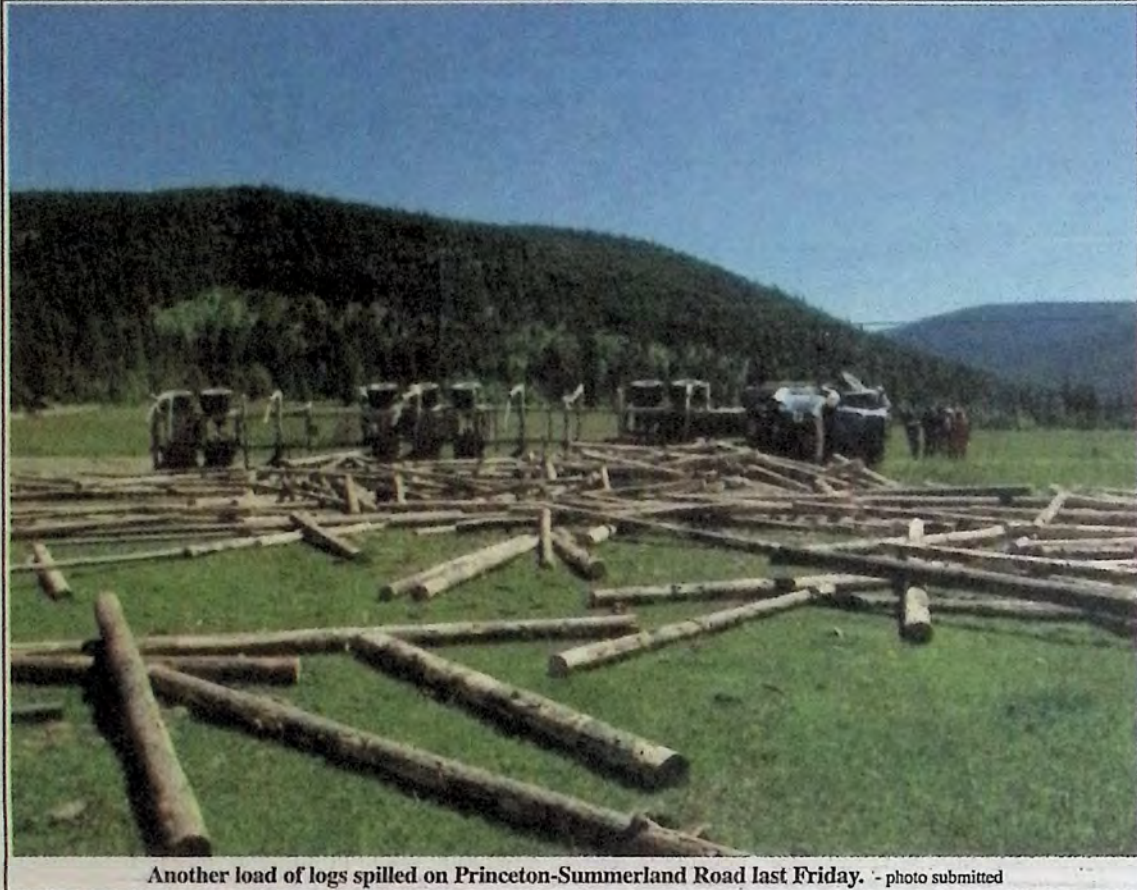

Speeding trucker dumps load

Another logging truck accident happened on the Princeton-Summerland Road last week. This one was at about 11:15 AM Friday, June 26th.

"The driver was slightly injured and luckily nobody else was hurt," states a reader from Osprey Lake.

"The driver was working for Tolko Lumber out of Merritt but there was no name on the truck."

The reader, who requested

anonymity, says Erris Fire & Rescue was first to respond followed by BC Ambulance and Princeton RCMP.

"The driver had no work boots on and wore only black running shoes and no safety vest and his driver licence was in the truck and he was afraid that WorkBC might be concerned if he climbed into the truck," the reader continues.

CMMC reports voting results

As required by the Toronto Stock Exchange, the following sets forth the voting at the Annual and Special General Meeting of the Shareholders of Copper Mountain Mining Corporation (TSX: CUM) (the 'Company' or 'Copper Mountain') held on June 18, 2015 in Vancouver, British Columbia on the election of directors. A total of approximately 54,722,030 common shares (46.06% of the outstanding common shares) were represented in person or by proxy at the meeting.

**PROPERTY TAX EXEMPTION**OKANAGAN-
SIMILKAMEEN

The Regional District of Okanagan-Similkameen recognizes the significant value of volunteers, volunteer groups and agencies to the spiritual, educational, social, cultural and physical well-being of the region.

These non-profit organizations have the opportunity to apply for a Property Tax Exemption. The following criteria will determine eligibility.

The applicant(s) must:

- Qualify for an exemption under the provisions of the *Local Government Act*, the general authority for property tax exemptions. (Sections 809 and 810);
- Be in compliance with Regional District policies, plans, bylaws and regulations (i.e. zoning);
- Be a non-profit organization;
- Not be in competition with for-profit business;
- Provide services or programs that are compatible or complementary to those offered by the Regional District.
- Provide a service that fulfills some basic need, or otherwise improves the quality of life for residents of the Regional District.
- Not provide liquor or meal services as their primary function or source of revenue.
- Not collect rent on a caretaker or other residence located on the property.

Application forms are available online at www.rdos.bc.ca or at the RDOS office, 101 Martin Street, Penticton, BC.The deadline for submitting completed application forms including supporting documentation is **JULY 31, 2015**.

Successful applicants may be asked to publicly acknowledge the exemption.

were rejected.

O'Rourke commented that he is very pleased that the shareholders have spoken and the Board immediately appointed Bruce Auger as the Company's Lead Director. O'Rourke, then went on to further comment that the Company welcomes comments and dialogues with its shareholders, as the Company strives to maximize shareholder value.

During the Annual General Meeting, O'Rourke presented the Company's updated investor presentation and announced the release of the Company's Annual

Report which have both been posted to the Company's website.

O'Rourke also advised that the Company recently filed an updated National Instrument 43-101 report on Sedar which included a 10 year mine plan with an average copper equivalent grade of 0.43%.

About Copper Mountain Mining Corporation:

Copper Mountain's flagship asset is the Copper Mountain mine located in southern British Columbia near the town of Princeton.

The Company has a strategic alliance with Mitsubishi Materials Corporation who owns 25% of the

mine.

The Copper Mountain mine commenced production in the summer of 2011 and has continued to improve its operations since start-up.

The 18,000 acre site has a large resource of copper that remains open laterally and at depth. The mine has significant exploration potential that will need to be explored over the next few years to fully appreciate the properties full development potential.

My Turn...

We Are All To Blame

After publishing a rather vague account of comments made by a Similkameen Valley elected official, my office has been busy. The past week saw a lot of local residents and business owners come forward to share with me stories of discrimination.

What really concerned me most about these stories is that each of the incidents shared occurred within our community and valley. In some cases, there is a fear of speaking out in case something serious happens in retaliation.

I saw a sample of it myself one afternoon last week outside our office on the main street during the middle of the day. Without revealing identities, a person in our community was called some pretty nasty names by a couple of younger individuals. I immediately thought about being bullied in school growing up in Kelowna. In my case it was physical in the form of pushing and shoving but name calling is another way of appearing superior.

A video making the rounds online has not helped matters much. It is of one individual in Princeton verbally attacking another. While the behaviour portrayed in the video is unacceptable, it is only just a small part of that particular story.

In fact, name calling is just a small part of the story of discrimination.

From the stories I have heard over the past few days the discrimination in Princeton crosses many lines: social, income, race, religion, sexual orientation and many more. I think the tendency as Canadians to become tolerant of all things may have dulled our senses when it comes to any form of unfair treatment.

Residents fighting the OCP feel bullied by Town Hall which could be viewed as a form of discrimination. Name calling on the main street of some of our more eccentric residents is another form of discrimination.

My wife is big on supporting the 'underdog' and I see her spring into action often when she recognizes an injustice taking place where an underdog is involved.

Secret societies as some organizations are called are notorious for being built on a foundation of discrimination. If you don't meet certain criteria then you aren't accepted as a member. Chambers of Commerce do it, most any social club and non-profit organization also follow a policy that accepts only those who meet the requirements. The same goes for the process to get a business licence in many communities. While I will argue that some of these examples have guidelines for good reason, in actual fact, they are all forms of discrimination that most of us have come to accept as the way the world works.

What really makes discrimination sting in a small town is when any of the decision makers use the 'criteria for acceptance' as a tool against progress instead of as a filter to determine the best match for the circumstances.

We need to stop tolerating this and demand equality across the board.

BC Well Positioned To Deal With Wildfires

It has been a dry spring in Fraser-Nicola and that means the possibility of wildfire is never far away. The recent fire that threatened homes south of Lytton is a frightening example.

Forest fires are never predictable, but careful planning has put B.C. in a strong position to deal with wildfires this summer.

We enter each forest fire season knowing that almost half of all wildfires in B.C. are caused by humans, which makes wildfire prevention, education and enforcement top priorities for our government.

Roasting hot dogs and marshmallows over a campfire is a highlight of most family camping trips - when conditions allow it. But we also know campfires are a major cause of wildfires. So in an effort to reduce the number of human-caused wildfires, the Ministry of Forests, Lands and Natural Resource Operations in 2010 reduced the size of legal campfires to a half-metre by a half-metre - about 19 inches square.

There are now online and social media tools to reach even more people in Fraser-Nicola and around the province. The

Facebook page BCForestFireInfo has more than 40,000 followers, and @BCGovFireInfo on Twitter has more than 7,800 followers.

You can stay up to date during the fire season with information on evacuation alerts and orders, road closures and air quality advisories at emergencyinfobc.gov.bc.ca.

Across B.C. we have more than 1,400 firefighters and support staff on hand for the 2015 wildfire season. We can also call on more than 1,600 contractors and many other resources if necessary, including those from other provinces.

In 2010, the B.C. government

opened the \$4.5-million Provincial Wildfire Co-ordination Centre in Kamloops, which serves as the province's nerve centre for wildfire response and management. So when a wildfire is reported, our crews are on it right away.

Anyone who spots a wildfire or unattended campfire should immediately call *5555 on a cellphone or 1-800-663-5555 toll-free.

Forest fire prevention is everyone's responsibility and all British Columbians must do their part by learning about safe fire use and obeying all campfire and open burning regulations.

The Dark Globalist Secret

I watched and listened to a television program about the music of the 1960s. There were a lot of old clips of performers from that era when the 'Motown sound' dominated the music. For younger readers, Motown stood for Motor Town, meaning Detroit.

Detroit was booming in those days. Automobiles were rolling off the assembly lines in a steady stream, and people in Detroit were living the good life. The music scene was centered on night club acts, and night clubs were at capacity every weekend. Detroit was the place for black people to climb out of the ghetto and join the majority. They bought homes, cars, college for their kids.

Today, Detroit is a wasteland in what used to be prosperous working men's neighborhoods. Detroit is so poor that a lot of people cannot afford to pay the city for water to their homes, if they still have homes. Going global left the American auto manufacturers trying to compete with the low wage manufacturers of Japan, and

American consumers switched rapidly to cars manufactured by Nissan, Datsun, Toyota and Honda. The Motor Town ran out of gas.

Globalism is pushed by multinational corporations who want to move industry to the countries where wages are lowest, taxes are lower, and employee fringe benefits are nil. This means higher profits for the multinational corporation, slightly cheaper prices for you and me, and jobs for people in poorer countries. However, in secret talks in head offices, there is a creeping reality about the future. Something is going on that scares boards of directors.

Two of the biggest multinational corporations are Walmart and McDonalds. They are everywhere. Coca Cola is another giant multinational. All of them are looking at a shrinking future. For the first time in the history of the Big Mac, they have fewer stores in the United States, despite recent efforts to change their menu to make it more health conscious. Walmart is beefing up their stores to turn them into 'super centers,' selling meat and fresh produce along with everything else. Coca Cola is trying a dozen new cola flavours. Automobile prices are lower. The cost of financing a new automobile is down to zero in many models. We have seen the downsizing of Target, Gap and a couple of electronic outlets.

These are indications of the scary truth. The reason for the scary truth is embedded in what corporations have been doing so they could make higher profits. Corporations have been employing cheap labour

with no health plans, no pension benefits and minimal safety standards. They have cut out jobs at every opportunity. The net result is reduction in consumers. If people can't afford to buy, it doesn't matter what you sell, they aren't buying. That is the scary secret sending chills up multinational spines.

In an effort to boost retail sales, some governments have increased minimum wages, but that has little effect. The bottom line for corporations is to increase profits, growing from year to year to satisfy shareholders. Any drop in revenue is seen as failure, so the solution has been to cut more jobs. It is a vicious cycle.

Governments have done the same sort of thing to reduce taxes, believing the corporate ideology that cutting jobs means improving the economy. Years ago, governments jumped on the privatization bandwagon as a means to reduce taxes and stimulate the economy. This did help corporate interests to some extent, but in many cases it resulted in lost jobs.

A clear indication of the truth is the growth of thrift stores, second hand stores, yard sales, food banks and homelessness. Consumers are no longer able to sustain the economy.

What the big corporations are learning, and governments are going to have to learn, is when a job is cut, a consumer is lost. When this cycle began, it did not have a big impact. A few hundred unemployed people found jobs at lower rates, but so what? When thousands of jobs were cut, it began to make an impact. When thousands of jobs were lost every year, from one year to the next, it made a big impact. Look at Detroit today. The city is poverty-stricken.

The richest nation in the world followed the globalist vision, and cities like Detroit, and the wage earners of Detroit, are collateral damage.

All of us can learn a lesson from this: if you want your economy to thrive, you must support your own economy. Supporting multinational corporations has done nothing for our economy in the long term, and has done little for the economies of low income countries. The one thing it has done is make the rich richer. At some point, they will become poorer, too, when none of us are buying what their corporations are selling.

Report on the June 16 meeting of the Princeton Health Care Steering Committee:

The Princeton Health Care Steering Committee (PHCSC) held its regular monthly meeting on Tuesday, June 16 at Princeton General Hospital. The meeting was attended by representatives

from the Town of Princeton, Area H (RDOS), health care practitioners, Interior Health, and SOHC.

The Aesthetic Improvements Working Group reported that the first of the two vending machines in the waiting room at the front entrance have been removed and the second machine will be removed shortly. This makes it

possible to move forward with improvements for this area of the hospital.

Once funding is in place, Merylyn Huycke will begin work on a mural that she will create for this area.

She is in the process of making a drawing of her proposed work that will be presented to an advisory group made up of hospital and clinic employees.

Susan Brown, Administrator of Community Integrated Services for the South Okanagan, reported that Nurse Practitioner Tanya ter Keurs has returned to work at the Clinic following her leave. She will be serving patients for three days a week and Viola Brown will continue at the Clinic for two days a week.

Cherie Whittaker reported that James Even, Registered Nurse, has begun working at the hospital.

The Town of Princeton and Area H (RDOS) are looking for volunteers to fill vacancies on the Steering Committee. Interested residents who would like to serve as representatives in one of these two areas can contact the Town of Princeton office or the Area H Regional Director.

The Pacific Is Dangerous Now

From the coast of California to the coast of British Columbia, toxic substances in the ocean are increasing as summer approaches. Marine scientists studying the algae bloom along the west coast of North America have issued an alert regarding toxic biological matter in the sea. Those who live along the coastline are familiar with the term 'red tide,' a warning that means 'do not eat shellfish.' The algae carrying the toxic substances enter the shellfish. When we eat the shellfish, we become poisoned.

The North Pacific is warmer this year than ever before, so the algae bloom is worse than ever. The toxins are entering not only shellfish, but small fish such as sardines. There has been one recorded death of a sea lion killed by eating these small fish that live on plankton.

The number of dead sea creatures washing ashore on the Pacific coast this year is much higher than normal. Not all of these deaths can be attributed to toxic algae, but marine biologists have just begun to study the situation and they are alarmed.

The toxins contained in shellfish and small fish is highly dangerous. These toxins affect the nervous system and cause seizures. The result is usually death, even in humans. The toxins are not eliminated by cooking. When the sea becomes cold, the algae carrying the toxic substances die, and eating shellfish and small fish is again safe. This year poses a greater problem because the north Pacific Ocean is two degrees warmer than normal, and will continue to be warmer as July and August are always the warmest months.

Going to the seashore this summer may pose a risk, particularly to children who may swallow sea water, or may handle live shellfish, then put their fingers in their mouths. Anyone planning a seaside vacation this summer should be aware of the risk. Check the local conditions at any seaside location.

Be aware that in some locations, authorities may close the popular beaches if marine biologists decide the hazard is too high. The Puget Sound area and locations along the Oregon coast are very concerned about the levels of toxicity this year.

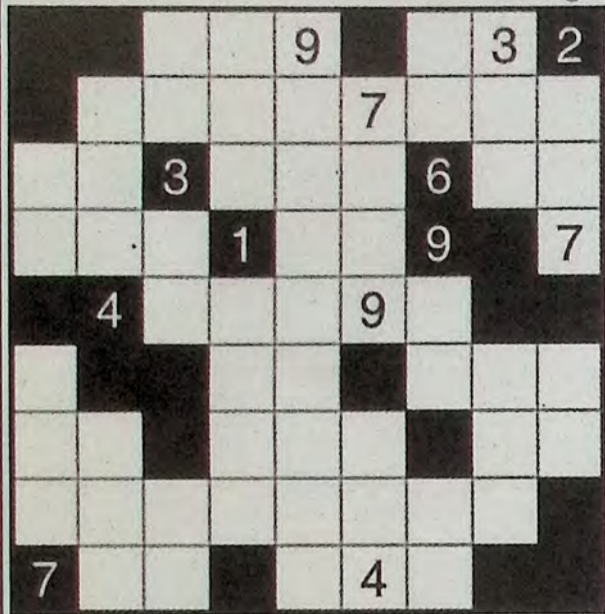

Early Friday morning, June 26, the Village of Keremeos towed a number of cars that were parked illegally overnight in the vicinity of the transient camp.

In talking with the Village Bylaw Officer and also Mayor Manfred Bauer they both told the News Leader that ample warning had

been issued and when the cars were not moved they were ticketed and finally impounded.

Mayor Bauer said, "We are not trying to be mean but we have to make a statement as they had ample warning."

species in the Similkameen and surrounding habitat. In 2014 the Outdoor Recreation Council of British Columbia named the

Similkameen, along with, the Peace and Fraser be put on the list of British Columbia's most endangered waterways.

.....continued from Front Page area has ramped up operations with a lot of private drivers and contractors from all over the province coming in and working and hauling logs to Weyerhaeuser and Ledcor in Princeton, to Aspen Planers and Tolko in Merritt, Gormans Brothers in Peachland and Tolko in Kelowna all in BC."

The News Leader was told that the month of June saw a huge increase in logging and service trucks on the Belfort Road and the Princeton-Summerland Road. "These workers start to arrive in our area around 3:00 AM and finish around 6:00 PM."

A meeting was held recently with BC Highways from Penticton and an Engineer from BC Highways from Kamloops to go over some concerns that the Osprey Lake Ratepayers Association and the Hayes Creek Fire & Rescue and local residents

had, "namely the excessive speed by the lumber and logging industries in our area and the lack of appropriate speed signs and other road hazard warning signs."

"Some work has been done but the lack of speed signs is the biggest problem as there is just no way of slowing the workers and this industry down."

The reader adds, "the big problem is that the big lumber companies have strict safety and health standards at their plants but could care less when it come to the hiring of a lot of logging contractors and their workers."

"This is totally irresponsible as pointed out no names on the trucks, driver without work boots on and no vest are just a couple of examples. The boss had no identification on his half ton truck either. You really can't know who is working for who and where these contractors are coming from."

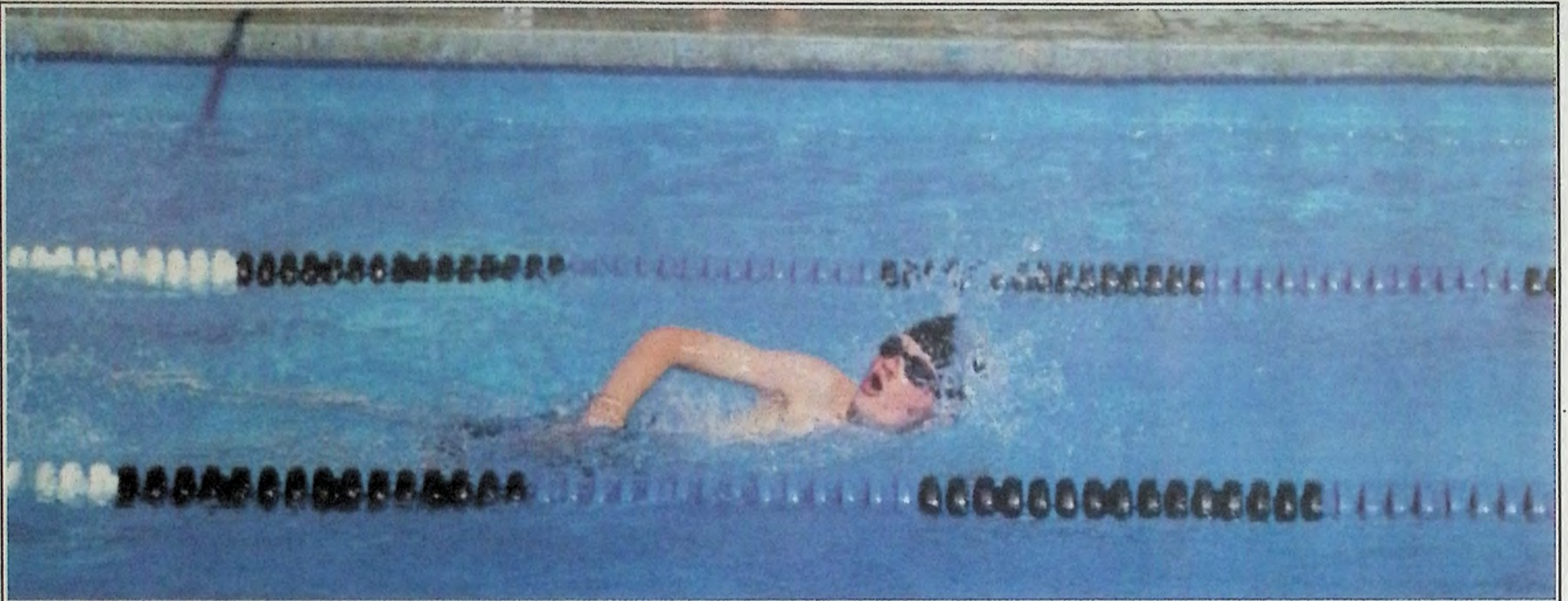

Saving Downtown Princeton...

...An Ongoing Series by George Elliott

Over the past week I have had many local business owners approach me. They have shared stories regarding how a few of them have been treated by Town Hall. Some of the stories reveal what could be considered unfair treatment, or the perception of it.

While I agree that a burned out shell of a building does not make the downtown core look very attractive, our neighbours in Keremeos are dealing with the same thing. What I'd like to know, as a downtown business owner, is why a

burned out shell of a building in the downtown core is any different than an abandoned shell of a building that sat in the very centre of downtown.

I'm talking about the former Overwaitea building that was quietly rotting for close to two years before it got knocked down. Conversations over the past few days make me want to make some comparisons.

One building was owned by a giant corporation based out of town and controlled by a company owned

and operated by one of the richest men in Canada.

A part-time resident who has tried a variety of different things to attract business and to stay in business owned the other building.

One building owner was born in Saskatchewan and became a hugely successful businessman. The other owner was born in Fiji and has been mistaken by many as being of East Indian descent. As if race should even matter.

I expect any day now that Town Council will dig out some bylaw regarding unsightly premises and put the screws to someone demanding an immediate clean up using the argument that tourist season is upon us and a burned out pile of rubble on the main street is not very tourist friendly.

Well, isn't that interesting.

I guess the seventeen or sixteen empty storefronts in the downtown core send a better signal to tourists

about our community? Possibly all the 'for sale' signs in the residential areas also sell the community better to tourists?

Since the Town of Princeton took over the delivery of tourism services for the community you'd think concerns would be focused on helping small business owners. That would include compassion towards those who have the unfortunate misfortune of losing their business due to a fire.

Remember all those meetings I've written about where business owners gathered together to save downtown Princeton? There were subcommittees that formed and each came up with plans and forwarded them to Town Council.

To date none of the suggestions have been used to my knowledge (except some signage improvements) and the regular meetings ceased many months ago.

I wonder if the committees were

made up of directors from the four or five largest employers if it would be different.

You probably already know the answer to that one.

Maybe our town leaders need to be reminded that although the people they are supposed to serve and represent in the community did not actually vote to put them in power, the very same people have the power to replace them.

How does this save downtown Princeton?

It's simple.

Our town leaders need to correct any misconception of unfair treatment to local business owners. If it does not exist, then they need to become more transparent and prove there is no 'funny business' going on when dealing with local business. Each business licence holder in the community should be treated as equals. Anything less hurts how new investors view Town Hall.

RCMP release roadcheck stats

On June 19th and 20th South Okanagan Traffic Services in conjunction with Penticton RCMP Detachment, Southeast (District Traffic Services) and Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure Area Vehicle Inspectors conducted roadchecks throughout the Penticton area. The roadchecks were conducted at various locations for most of this 48 hour period.

Twenty five RCMP officers participated in these roadchecks. The entire South Okanagan Traffic Services unit was involved as well as Penticton Municipal Traffic members. Nine members from other parts of Southeastern B.C. participated as well as three Reserve Constables.

The large purple vehicle that peo-

ple saw during these roadchecks is the RCMP E Division Mobile Road Safety Unit, otherwise known as Alexa's Bus (Alexa Middelaer). This is a self contained vehicle that can act as a mobile command post or police office.

It is equipped with Intoximeters (commonly called breathalyzers by the public), temporary holding cells, a dark room enabling Drug Recognition Experts to conduct eye examinations during their evaluations.

This and other equipment enable peace officers to process impaired drivers as if they were at a regular police office.

Pets 'n' Vets

Be Prepared to Prevent Heatstroke

We just had the first few hot days of summer and while it will be another month or two before they are consistently hot, it reminded me that we will be having pets come in with heat stroke very soon. Heat stroke and dehydration is as big of a deal in our pets as it is for us - dogs in particular. Most cats are inside and are less likely to run themselves to collapse but are still affected by the heat if left in a car or unable to get into shade on hot sunny days.

Heat stroke prevention for our pets is the same as ourselves. Ways to prevent heat stroke in our pets include:

Water - keeping hydrated is the most important way to prevent heatstroke. While our dogs and cats don't sweat, they lose large amounts of water by panting. On hot summer days, things progress so fast that we don't notice our pets are dehydrated until they collapse or go into a coma. Frequent water breaks also help keep our pets cool. A water bath of cool, not cold, water that our dogs can jump into as well as drink from will also help them cool off. I would include cats but most cats don't like jumping into water.

Frequent breaks - Heatstroke happens so fast that our pets, like us, often don't feel anything is wrong until we collapse. Dogs, especially, will run until they collapse without any indications of overheating other than panting. When your pet's muscles are working heat is given off as a by-product, increasing your pet's body temperature. By taking frequent breaks in the shade, we can prevent our pet's core body temperature from getting too high. These breaks are also a good time to re-hydrate to help cool off and replenish losses from panting.

Don't cool them off too fast - Our first thought is to cool our pets down as fast as we can but this actually slows down the cooling process. When the skin gets too cold, the blood vessels constrict, slowing blood flow. The temperatures are backwards but the outcome is the same as cooking a frozen turkey. If you cook it too fast, the inside is still frozen while the outside is burnt. Cooling our pets too fast means that the skin is cold but the inside is still too hot.


Cool off their foot pads - our pets foot pads have a large amount of blood supply. A great way to cool them off is by applying rubbing alcohol to the foot pads. The evaporation slowly cools the blood. Having your pet stand in cool water is another good way to cool them off if you don't have rubbing alcohol. Just make sure the water isn't too cold.

Wrap a damp, cool cloth around their neck - the neck is another good area to cool off because of it's high blood supply. It also cools the blood to the brain, preventing brain damage from high temperatures.

Don't leave them in hot vehicles - Most pet owners know this but I still see pets in vehicles without the windows rolled down every summer. You've felt how hot a car is when you first get into it - it is just as hot for your pet and they were stuck in there.


Signs of heatstroke include: Sticky, tacky gums; Exercise intolerance, Staggering; Convulsions.

If your pet is showing signs of heatstroke, it is an emergency and they need to see a veterinarian for intravenous fluids to cool them off and rehydrate them. Every year pets die from overheating - don't let yours be one.
