Rumours have been circulating through Princeton that a major development is planned for the former Overwaitea site.

Town Council was asked at the July 20 public meeting whether this is true.

Mayor Frank Armitage said

Council has heard of no plans for this property, which is owned by the corporate conglomerate generally known as the Pattison Group.

Mayor Armitage said Council has asked the owners if there are any plans but said Council has yet to hear of any.

## PXA hears success stories

Princeton Riding Club held a dressage clinic on July 18. At the July 21 meeting of Princeton Exhibition Association (PXA), members heard the report of a high-

Princeton had hoped to host a Little Britches Rodeo this year in August, having had to give up the June date. All August dates were booked in other locations.

The truck donated by the Bey family to the PXA is going to be re-fitted as a water truck. This will be used to keep dust down during events. Rodeo Club members are donating the tank and labour for the refit.

Members have been urged to close stable gates as they are being damaged by wind forcing them open and swinging. Locks will be purchased for the gates in the near future.

There is a problem with marmots at the fairgrounds. They are undermining the concrete floors of Fall Fair buildings. The Town is looking

## BC Transit has plans, no money

Representatives of BC Transit attended the July 20 meeting of Princeton Town Council asking for endorsement of the Okanagan-Similkameen BC Transit strategy. The strategy deals with improving the number of hours local public transportation is available, including some evening and Saturday

hours, and includes plans to connect the Princeton-Penticton trip with a Penticton-Kelowna trip for the convenience of those with medical appointments in Kelowna. Unfortunately, the BC Transit budget is frozen for three years, so it is questionable as to when the strategy might be implemented, despite

the fact there are waiting lists for bus trips from Princeton.

## Numbers up for Visitor Centre

The new location of Princeton Visitors Centre appears to have had a positive impact. The former location was just east of the Highway 3 bridge. It is now in the former town hall on Bridge Street. A report to Town Council shows more visitor traffic in the new location.

Visitor numbers for June 2014 were compared with this year's numbers.

In 2014, there were 1,025 parties (groups of people visiting) and 1,858 people. In June 2015, 1,322 parties were recorded, up 22 percent, with total number of people up 15 percent.

Lori Thomas, who manages the Visitors Centre, told Council she encourages visitors to walk around town and most come back with a shopping bag in hand.

At the end of the rodeo in June, the pedestrian entrance gate was torn from its hinges. The gate was repaired by Town crew. Vandals who did the damage have not been identified.

There was a great deal of discussion around the need for emergency shelter for livestock in the case of an environmental or weather emergency. Members agreed the stables and pens at the fairgrounds could be used in such an emergency, but there were concerns relating to care and

feeding of any livestock that might be on the grounds in such a situation. Members agreed the PXA could not be responsible for care, feeding and clean-up of any livestock moved to the grounds in such circumstances. The fairground facility has been used in the past during a wildfire emergency.

The Chamber of Commerce has offered a very large rocking chair to the PXA. The offer was referred to the Fall Fair Association for consideration.

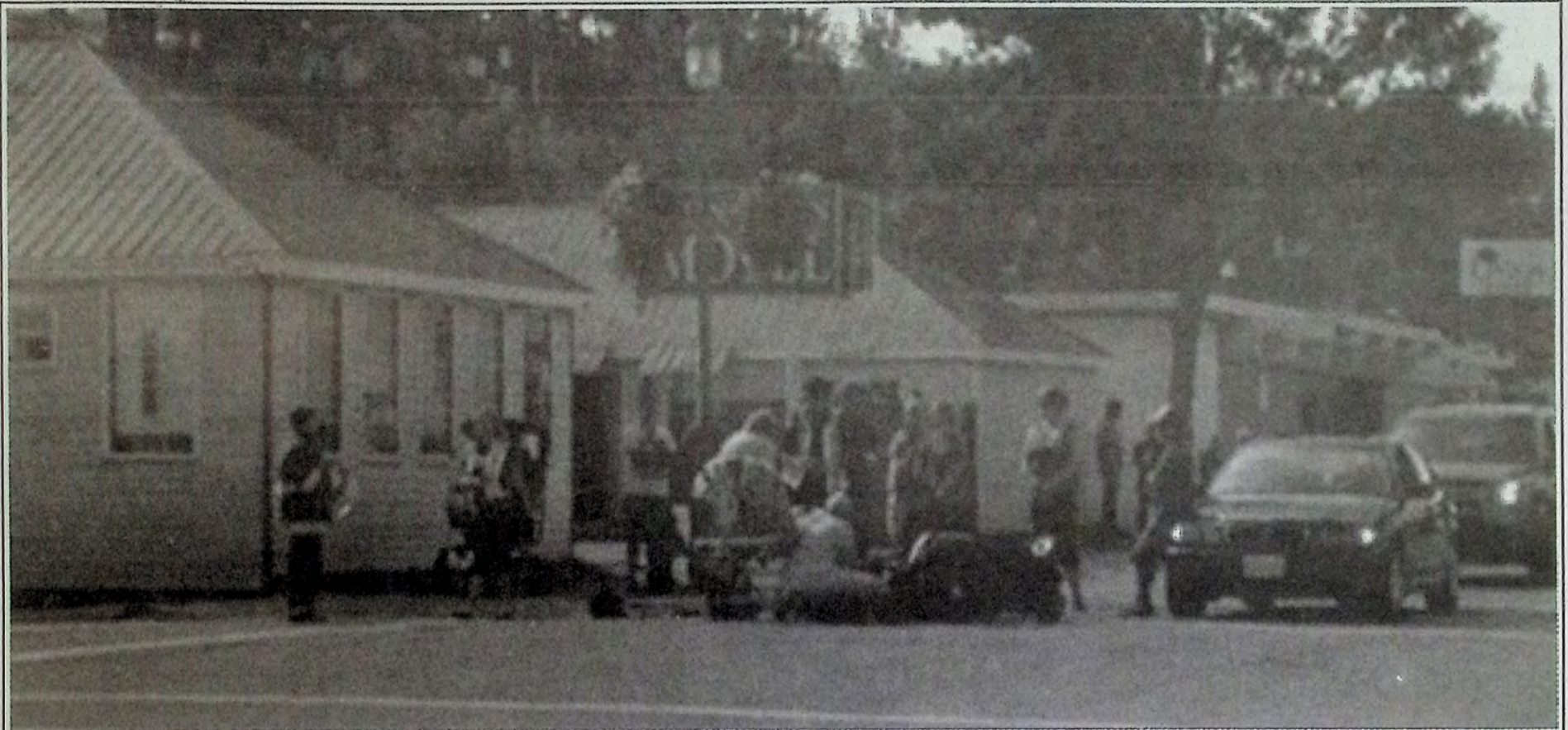
Three dates are reserved for fairgrounds events: Motorsports on September 5, Fall Fair on September 12 and 13, and the community

There was a great article in the Tye by an old friend Jeremy Nuttall where he talks with former Reform MPs, volunteers and organizers who

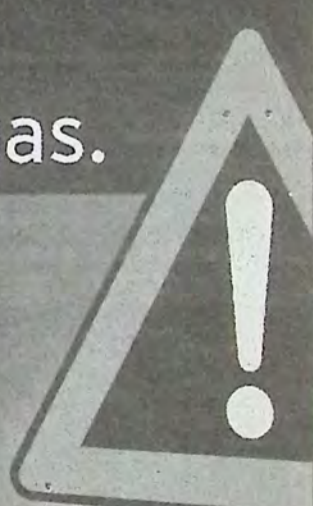

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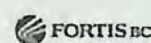

### Somewhere Over The Rainbow

The Town of Princeton has decided to paint a Rainbow Crosswalk in the centre of the downtown core.

While I accept the fact that our town leaders are trying to set the community apart by displaying a blatant sign that says we are pretty diverse in Princeton, it makes me wonder.

Although a Rainbow Crosswalk is most associated with Gay Pride, the symbol has morphed to point to represent acceptance of more than different lifestyles including cultures, social status and beyond.

The part that makes me wonder is whether or not our community leaders decided on the Rainbow Crosswalk as a way to try wipe out recent memories. It was reported in this very newspaper weeks ago that members of elected bodies on both ends of the Similkameen Valley had made racial comments following devastating fires in their communities.

A Rainbow Crossing does not suddenly change the attitudes of those within the community who look down upon 'diverse' residents as lesser beings. For example: signs appeared recently at a local commercial property that had a racial tone to them and I still hear comments tossed about that are far from complimentary of some of our 'rainbow community' members.

## Understanding Town finances

The 2014 Town of Princeton financial statement says the Town had \$23,126,648 in accumulated surplus as of December 31, 2015. If you have been reading this on the Town website, you may have been wondering what the Town is doing with all that money, and why you still had to pay taxes this year.

The truth is this: *accumulated surplus* does not mean the same to you as it does to an accountant. Those of us who are not accoun-

tants would call it "net worth." What it means is the dollar value of everything owned by the Town plus every dollar in the bank. On December 31, 2014, the Town had nearly a million dollars in the bank, but that had to do them until the tax money started coming in this year.

In addition to money for operating, the Town has reserve funds. This is money allocated to various departments. This is money being saved for future expenses, just as

you might save for a new car or for purchasing a home. There is money saved for firehall equipment, parks, landfill closure, sewer system improvements, water system improvements, and capital projects and machinery. These are necessary savings reserved for specific purposes in the future. The total in reserve funds is \$1,890,238.

The practice of setting money aside for future use is wise financial management. Having nearly two million dollars in the bank means the Town can avoid a situation in which annual taxes fluctuate significantly from year to year depending on what expenditures must be met that year. Without these savings, the Town would be like people who live from payday to payday with no savings for major expenses that may come from time to time, and taxpayers would have no idea what their property taxes might be from year to year.

With the Town reserving money for future major expenses, taxpayers can budget for their property tax bills with a fairly good estimate of what those tax costs will be.

## Princeton Has An Underground History

before water went over the top of the dike, water was bubbling up out of the ground behind the store where Princeton Brewing is located. The same was true across the river. I recall a story told me about the construction of the Overwaitea store where the heavy equipment sent the ground to vibrating like an earthquake due to the water underneath. When I worked at the post office building, the sump pump in the basement ran all year round, all day, every day. I recall my father talking about coaching hockey on the pond behind our former Town Hall. I remember catching tadpoles in a slough on Allison Flats located between the river and the playground. Not so long ago, on Auburn Crescent, the Town hauled in fill to create a playground in an area of marsh. I remember a teacher trying to plant a lilac bush at the old school grounds, where Princeton Plaza is located. The rivers were high. He dug down half a metre and the hole filled with water.

I started remembering all this when I began hearing about the new Official Community Plan (OCP) and properties rezoned. The information came to me from affected property owners, and I started to wonder, "Who made these zoning decisions?"

I came to the conclusion whoever made the decisions had no knowledge of Princeton's underground history, for starters, and had an odd way of looking at the town. Among my native ancestors there was a saying, "Always build on high ground." They built their houses where Memorial Park is now located, not in the marshy area where downtown Princeton grew.

They also had a saying, "Look at the land and see it." Anybody can look at the land, but apparently few actually see it.

It may surprise you to learn there was once a nice house and garden located at the river's edge below N&L Automotive. My mother boarded there in the 1920s when she was going to school in Princeton. That house washed away in a flood during the 1920s. There have been a number of floods in Princeton during its history, notably in 1894, when the original Allison home went downstream, and in 1948, 1972, 1990 and 1995. During my lifetime, I have seen the road between the wooden bridge and N&L collapse on three different occasions, as a result of high water and erosion.

Shortly after the flood of November 1995 and the high water the following spring of 1996, land began to disappear behind the curling rink and Husky station. It moved very slowly and seemed to disappear into the ground below. This went on for six weeks. At the same time, one lane of Highway 3 fell away just past the pub on the hill, and Rosemary Clarke's house, a short distance from that landslide, had to be moved quickly before it slid downhill. There was some speculation the two rivers joined underground, because people on River Road had land sliding into their back yards.

When it comes to zoning, it is wise to know this information. Dikes do not protect land from underground water.

Other decisions about zoning made me wonder. For example, the two commercial enterprises at .....continued on Page 7

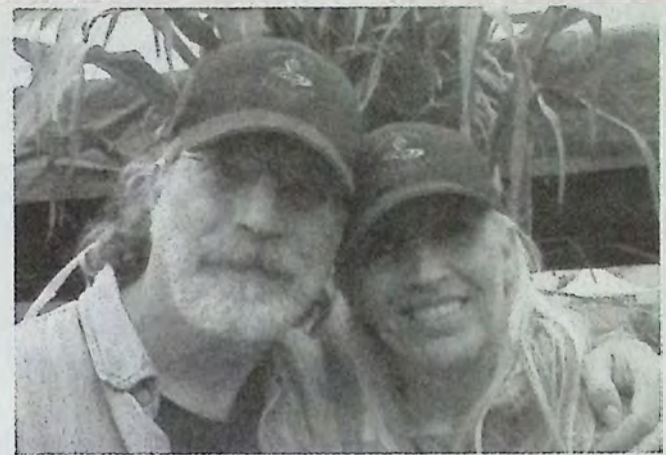
I bet some of you read the headline and thought, 'Coal shafts!'

No, I am not talking about coal shafts. The biggest single problem in the development of the Town of Princeton is, and always has been, underground water. Building a town where two rivers meet was pure foolishness promoted by greed and skullduggery. Originally, what we call East Princeton, where the sawmill is located, was to have been the town. It was surveyed by the Royal Engineers more than 100 years ago. However, a person who owned the marshy area where the two rivers met decided he needed money and lobbied Victoria for a change in the town site designated by the Royal Engineers. In Victoria, they had no interest in what was going on in the lands beyond Hope, so Princeton was developed where it is now.

Water flows underground in Princeton, and not too deeply underground. During high water, even if there is no flood, there are residences where a sump pump runs all day and night. During the flood of November 29, 1995, long

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
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**Timber Supply Review  
Merritt Timber Supply Area (TSA)  
Discussion Paper**

Members of the public are invited to review and provide comments on a new discussion paper as part of the Ministry of Forests, Lands and Natural Resource Operations' Timber Supply Review of the Merritt Timber Supply Area (TSA).

The Timber Supply Review provides the province's chief forester with information required to determine the allowable annual cut (AAC)—the maximum volume of timber to be harvested from the TSA—for the next 10 years.




The discussion paper includes background information, a summary of key issues to be addressed in the timber supply review and a summary of harvest forecasts from the timber supply analysis. The chief forester will consider the timber supply analysis, public and First Nations input, and other information required under the Forest Act when a new AAC is determined.

# Church installs new Pastor

the top of the hill east of the wooden bridge have been rezoned residential. I wonder who thinks these are desirable residential locations

with all the heavy truck traffic going there, to say nothing of the school, arena and Riverside Centre traffic which are fairly heavy at certain times of day and night.

A person I know lives east of the Highway 5A bridge and her property has been zoned light industrial, in direct competition with the Town's industrial park. Was that wise?

Another couple of properties near Subway have been rezoned residential, and I sat at a table in Billy's Restaurant and observed the traffic and general conditions and I thought, "There's no way I would build a house in that location. That should be zoned highway commercial, if anything."

Princeton would have been so much easier to manage if Victoria had stuck to the plan made by the Royal Engineers. East Princeton area has never flooded during the past 150 years. Room for expansion of a town was simple. A bridge from East Princeton went across the river near the golf course. A town reservoir could have been fed from Allison Creek upstream and the system pressure would have been from gravity, not all these pumps we need today.

Expansion would have followed along Old Hedley Road or north along Highway 5A and the Princeton-Summerland Road. Zoning would have been so simple under those circumstances, and what is now Princeton could have remained the pasture it once was.

## Living Past 100

### Argentine Doctors Launch Attack

Glyphosate is the active ingredient in a weed killer called Round-Up. In Argentina last month, 30,000 health professionals signed a manifesto stating glyphosate must be banned from Argentina because it is a serious health risk. The document states glyphosate not only causes cancer, but is linked to increased numbers of spontaneous abortions, birth defects, skin diseases and diseases of the nervous system.

The World Health Organization announced two months ago that glyphosate is probably a carcinogen, meaning it probably causes cancer.

In the Argentine document, the health professionals say 28 million hectares of cropland are sprayed each year with approximately 320 million litres of glyphosate putting 13 million people at risk. The health professionals want this practice stopped now.

There is a link between genetically modified plants and the notorious weed killer. The GMO plants can absorb and tolerate the weed killer. When the weed killer is sprayed, all other plants die. This is a major concern when wild natural growth is affected by drifting weed killer.

The issue of the use of glyphosate weed killer is not new. There has been much written about it in the past. The manifesto signed by Argentina's health professionals is the first major attack by a unified body of health professionals.

For those of us living in Canada, there has been a lot of concern expressed by a variety of groups who have lobbied government to ban such weed killers, particularly to ban it from use on food crops. While this may be effective for a specific location, such as our own country, it does not apply to all food products. Many foods are imported from areas where this type of weed killer is in wide use on food crops.

Most soy products have been exposed to weed killer spray containing glyphosate. Corn is another product genetically modified to accept and tolerate the weed killer. Most of this corn is feed corn, and what is in that corn will go into poultry, hogs, and beef which will be found on meat counters in supermarkets.

It will be interesting to see what the Argentine government does about this issue, and it will be interesting to see if health professional unions in other nations will do what the Argentine health professionals have done. In the meantime, consumers have the last vote: they vote with the money they spend.

## Pets 'n' Vets

### Stray Pets, Public Health and You

Every city and town has a feral dog and cat population, strays and inside-outside pets, to differing extents. In 2012, the Canadian Federation of Humane Societies released a report on the Canadian cat population as shelters were over capacity and it was estimated that over 600,000 cats don't find homes annually in Canada. In many cases, the stray population began because pet owners let their sexually intact pets outdoors who then breed, rather than getting them spayed or neutered by their veterinarian, leading to a population of wild strays that then keep breeding. What most people don't know is how large of a role the stray population plays in the spread of diseases that can affect both people and our pets.

When stray populations get too large, they can start to affect people and our pets by spreading diseases, parasites and injuries from bites and fighting. In some areas, these can be put a huge strain on not only human medical facilities but also veterinarians. For example, many people don't realize the importance of Rabies vaccinations to protect ourselves. In the United States, prior to the mid-1900's the majority of Rabies cases were in domestic animals and have dropped substantially as we began to vaccinate them. In areas of the world where people haven't vaccinated their pets, and there are large numbers of stray animals, people are still contracting Rabies at an alarming rate. The World Health Organization estimates that over 55,000 people die from it annually.

Stray pets can also spread parasites such as tapeworms and hookworms. When people are infected with eggs from these worms, they migrate through the body and can affect other organs than the intestine, leading to blindness and neurologic disease. Toxoplasma is another parasite that can be carried by cats that causes miscarriages in women. Pets are also often carriers of parasites that cause intestinal disease in people such as Giardia and Coccidia.

On top of the risk to people, strays can spread these same diseases and more to our pets. Because of this, it is important for owners to keep their pets vaccinated and dewormed. Vaccines only improve your pet's immunity to reduce how often they get sick. With high numbers of strays, they can come into contact with enough pathogens that even their increased immunity is overwhelmed. This is even more important with longer vaccination intervals, as their immunity wains near when their booster is due.

Pet owners can help reduce stray populations by ensuring their animals are spayed or neutered so they won't be adding new puppies or kittens to the overpopulation. You can also help out more by donating to your local SPCA to help them spay and neuter strays and find new homes for the homeless pets.

The Princeton Traditional Music Festival presents music that comes out of communities where people participate in music-making. The Festival tries to provide this sense of participation by remaining intimate. Performers are close to the audience and invite them to participate by singing along or by dancing.

The ultimate participatory experience at the Festival is the Shanty Session under the gazebo in Veterans' Square. Shanties are songs that were sung by sailors on tall ships. The songs helped sailors work in rhythm and gave them extra oomph while raising sails or hauling in the anchor. Shanties were led by a shantyman, an experienced sailor who knew the right rhythm for each job. Shanties also

had simple choruses that were easy to learn and sing so that everyone could join in.

Shanties can be sung only in a group. The Shanty Session at the Festival dispenses with the stage and the microphones and gathers everyone under the gazebo to sing. The gazebo provides almost cathedral-like resonance for all the voices joined together. Each shanty is led by an experienced shantyperson and the choruses are easy to join in on.

Being in the middle of so many voices joined together under the

gazebo can be a transcendent experience. For many people it is the high point of the Festival.

This year the shanties will be led by many expert shantypersons. Come and join the singing thronq under the gazebo!

In early Princeton there were regular community dances with people of all ages participating both as dancers and as musicians. The Festival hopes to recreate the community spirit of those early dances with the Friday evening street dance. The streets will be closed off and in the middle of Veterans' Boulevard, right next to the Legion, there will be a stage for the band. A caller will teach the dances and guide people as they dance to the music on Veterans' Boulevard.


We have done this dance every year for the past seven years and it's always been a big hit. People dance with their loved ones - spouses, offspring, siblings, grandchildren, friends - or with someone they've never met before. The caller's skill soothes any dance phobias and the community spirit

overrides shyness. The dance begins right after the 6:15 PM opening ceremony on Friday, August 14. Bring your family, friends, visitors and kick up your heels. If you have a broken leg you can come anyway and have fun watching everyone swing their partner.

The Shanty Session and the dance are just two of the events taking place at this year's Princeton Traditional Music Festival.

The Festival begins at 6:15 PM on Friday, August 14 with an opening ceremony and a participatory dance on Veterans' Boulevard. On Saturday and Sunday there is music from 10:00 AM until 6:00 PM right in downtown Princeton.

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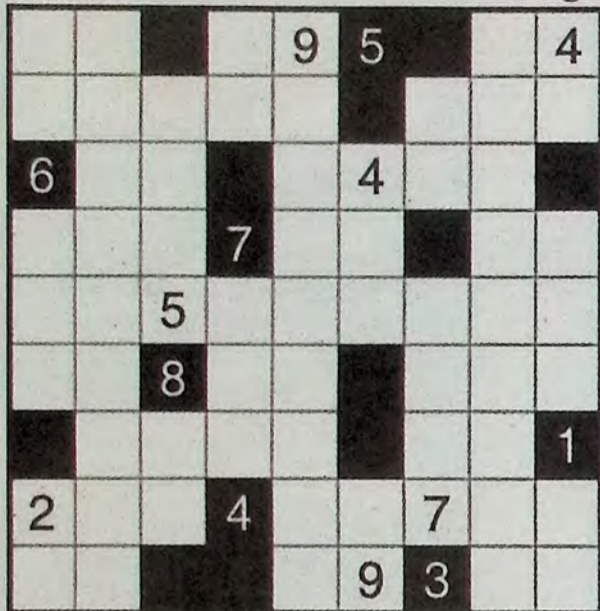

**RDOS proposes economic development bylaw**

Regional District has proposed a bylaw that would allow hiring of an Economic Development Officer for the Okanagan-Similkameen area.

The bylaw was sent to Town Council for adoption. Council deferred the decision, as it will involve a cost to the local taxpayers.

The method of recovering the cost will be based on the value of property and improvements within each Regional District Area.

There is no time frame for implementation contained within the bylaw proposed. Town Council must consider the bylaw in terms of costs to local taxpayers and probable benefit to local taxpayers. The decision was deferred to the next Town Council meeting which will take place on August 17.

**Councillor reports**

Councillor Jerome Tjerkstra reported at the July 20 Town Council meeting that the Town had sold two lots in the industrial park.

Councillor Kim Maynard attended a meeting in Washington regarding the Enloe Dam, which is located on the Similkameen River and can be seen from the highway connecting Nighthawk with Oroville, Washington. Councillor Maynard had attended a meeting of the Highway 3 Coalition, a group of representatives of municipalities located on Highway 3.

He stated this group is still seeking improvements to the Hope-Princeton Highway, and would like to advertise Highway 3 as the 'elec-

tric highway,' meaning each municipality has a charger for electric cars. Councillor Maynard, along with other Council members, attended a meeting of the health steering committee, and he reported better communication between Interior Health and local people than in past years.

All members of Council reported on their participation in community events of the past month.

Councillor Rosemary Doughty did a count of deer in town on July 9. She reported sighting 27 deer, of which six were fawns.

Council thanked all of the groups who participated in making the July 3 weekend events a success.

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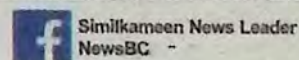
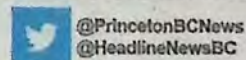

# Saving Downtown Princeton...

...An Ongoing Series by George Elliott

On my way into work the other morning I counted a total of 22 marked crosswalks on Bridge Street between Highway 3 and the Harold Avenue intersection. There's at least another six or so from there to the brown bridge that crosses the Tulameen River.

Then there's at least that many on Vermilion Avenue totaling close to 50 crosswalks on the two main streets.

Since the Town of Princeton has

chosen to paint one of them a variety of colours in the tradition of a Rainbow Crosswalk I have an idea for the rest of them that I think will actually enhance the downtown core.

First off, I must thank Town Council for inspiring the following idea with the desire to openly display their acceptance of all residents in our community with their Rainbow.

I think each and every crosswalk

on Bridge Street should be painted with something. My suggestions include: Legion logos on the crosswalk at Veterans Boulevard that runs between the Legion and Veterans' Square. Local churches should have more than one crosswalk to paint their logo and Sunday Service time. I think the Foursquare Church should have the one on Kenley Avenue between the Post office and Visitors Centre.

Moving down the street, the Princeton Arts Council should be able to use the crosswalk that marks the start of Vermilion Avenue and leads to the fountain at the intersection with Bridge Street.

Vermilion Avenue crosswalks could receive the same treatment

with Princeton Museum, the Masonic Lodge, Princeton United Church and many other clubs, groups and organizations getting on board with the whole "we are a diverse community" theme set in motion with the Rainbow Crosswalk approved by Town Council.

Even individual businesses could get into the program. Maybe two or four key crosswalks could be selected for private businesses to bid on the right to have their logo on them. Imagine giant Ace Hardware, Weyerhaeuser, Copper Mountain Mine, Cooper's Foods and A&W logos filling specific crosswalks.

The money raised through the

"paint the crosswalks" program could go towards maintenance costs or something special to celebrate the diverse natural of the entire project. Maybe an annual Sidewalk Sale hosted by the Town of Princeton as part of their commitment to local tourism development. Or better yet, the establishment of another walking tour around the downtown core to compliment the historic walk already in place.

There is a bit of a hook to this plan, by the way.

If Town Council does not permit say, the Legion from using a crosswalk to celebrate their contributions to our community - and their list is rather lengthy - then it should be a loud and clear signal that Town Hall really does not understand the whole point of their Rainbow Crosswalk.

## RDOS issues tree pest warning

To protect the commercial fruit industry in the South Okanagan and Similkameen, the RDOS has had a bylaw in place, Bylaw 2070, since 2001, to ensure better control of fruit tree pests in Electoral Areas A (Osoyoos Rural), B (Cawston), C (Oliver Rural), D (Kaleden/OK Falls), E (Naramata), F (Okanagan Lake West/West Bench), G (Keremeos Rural/Hedley) and the Town of Oliver.

All cherry tree owners are responsible for controlling pests such as the Western Cherry Fruit Fly and

Spotted Wing Drosophila on their properties to prevent them from severely affecting nearby neighbours and professional cherry growers.

Complete control of Western Cherry Fruit Fly using sprays can be difficult and ineffective for non-commercial growers. Therefore, cherry tree owners should control these flies using other acceptable control methods.

Acceptable pest control methods are available on the Ministry of Agriculture website posted online

at <http://www.agf.gov.bc.ca/crop-prot/tfipm/fruitfly.htm> Western Cherry Fruit Fly or visit <http://www.agf.gov.bc.ca/crop-prot/swd.htm> Spotted Wing Drosophila.

Because of the prevalence and very serious economic impact of the Western Cherry Fruit Fly and Spotted Wing Drosophila, the RDOS asks that all cherry tree owners with infected trees do at least the following:

1. Strip trees of all cherries as soon as they are ripe.
2. Ensure no cherries are left on the ground.
3. Prune hard-to-pick branches to a manageable height.

Removal of all cherries will ensure that the Western Cherry Fruit Fly maggots contained within the cherries are removed before they can burrow out and fall to the ground. This will prevent them from maturing to hatch as adult

fruit flies the next year. ## RCMP capture Teneycke in Cawston

On July 23rd, at 10:35 AM in Cawston, an RCMP officer involved in the active search for Ronald Teneycke, spotted a vehicle similar

to the one stolen by Teneycke the previous day in Oliver.

"As the officer got closer he was able to confirm Teneycke was alone

in the vehicle," states Cpl. D.J. (Dave) Tyreman.

"When Teneycke saw the officer he accelerated in an attempt to flee.

Teneycke drove to Fairview-Cawston Road and into the rural mountain pass that leads to Oliver."

Cpl. Tyreman says RCMP Air Services were involved in the search and followed Teneycke up Fairview-Cawston Road where he was intercepted by the RCMP Emergency Response team. Teneycke did not stop but instead turned around and drove back toward Cawston.

"Teneycke was pursued by the Emergency Response team to Lowe Drive in Cawston and then into an orchard where he was ultimately apprehended. We are thankful the arrest was made without any injuries

to our officers, the general public, or Teneycke."

RCMP resources from Oliver, Osoyoos, Penticton, Princeton, Keremeos as well as the RCMP Emergency Response Team, Police Services Dogs and the Federal and Serious Organized Crime Section were utilized in the search and successful apprehension of Teneycke.

"Thank-you to the general public for their patience while we attended to this dynamic situation as well as those from the public that provided updated sightings of Teneycke throughout the area," Cpl. Tyreman concluded.

# PUD looks at Enloe Dam...again

 scheduled to present an update to the CBC regarding the reenergizing of the Enloe Dam.

The Enloe Dam sits on the Okanagan River 6.5-kilometres west of Oroville and was construct-

ed in 1919. It started generating power in 1920 and ceased operations in 1958.

The site, described as being in a "partly ruinous state" was added to the National Register of Historic Places in October 1978. There have

been numerous attempts since then to put the facility back into operation.

Edward spoke for nearly a minute in Nselxcin before switching to English when he was given the floor at the meeting.

"The one thing I want to make sure you understand is that our laws come from chaptikwt. The protection of that at all cost is for the betterment of our people," he said.

"We all have this tie that has held us together by our land and the stories that come from there."

The chaptikwt legend, retold by Edward following the meeting, tells that coyote placed a dam in the Similkameen River when the people there refused to give him a wife.

Edward further noted operation of the dam could disturb the Coyote Dam on the Similkameen River as well as other cultural sites.

Edward explained that in the 1990s the Lower Similkameen Indian Band first signed a public letter against the reenergizing of Enloe Dam. He pointed out that the LSIB had support from both the Colville Tribes and Yakama Nation at that time and that the LSIB has since re-issued the letter.

In July 2013, Okanagan PUD received a license from the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission that allowed a two-year development period and three-year construction period related to the reenergizing of the dam. According to PUD's Grubich, the utility applied for a two-year extension for the development period of the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) license.

"At this point, we have not heard back from FERC," said Grubich.

"All indications are that they typically give that as a one time extension. We are anticipating that.

Absent the extension, the board will have to make a decision sooner rather than later."

Currently, the Colville Tribes' hold a memorandum of agreement for 49 percent of the dam's potential production. Over the last year, CBC has hosted discussions related to the removal of the dam often initiated by former Inchelium Representative Allen Hammond, but CBC Chair Jim Boyd noted the CBC has been divided between removing and reenergizing.

Okanagan PUD has outlined three requirements for removal which include that an entity interested in removal is willing to take on full liability, has a detailed plan and has financial backing.

"We haven't had a serious enough discussion at this table," said CBC Chair Jim Boyd.

"We need to have a very serious discussion and make sure our due diligence is done."
