

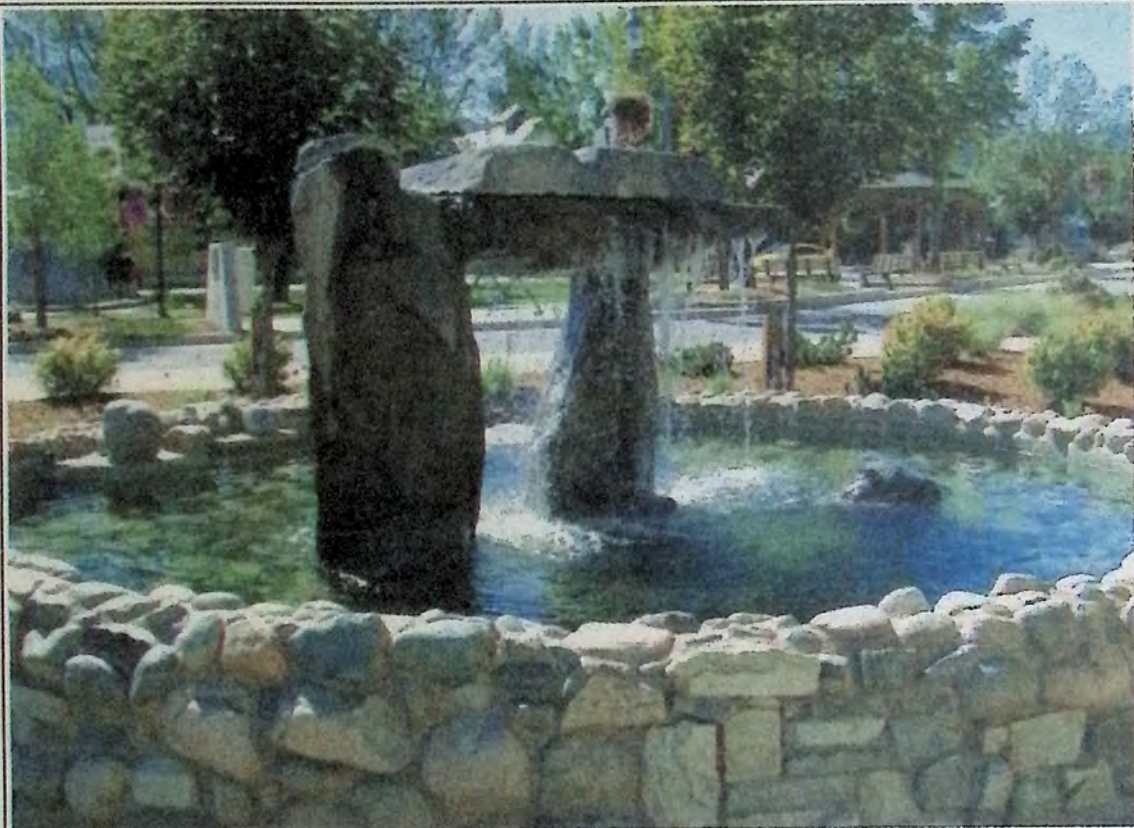

## Town further restricts water use

In response to the Province of BC rating the Similkameen watershed at Level 4 drought, the Town of Princeton issued this notice July 28th advising residents that Stage 2 watering restrictions are now in effect until further notice.

They are as follows:

- Even numbered civic addresses may water on Wednesdays and Saturdays only.
- Odd numbered civic addresses may water on Thursdays and Sundays only.

- No watering is permitted between 12 Noon and 6:00 PM.
- Washing of boats or motor vehicles with a hose is permitted only if using a hose with an automatic shut-off device.
- No one may use a hose to wash sidewalks, driveways, walls, roofs or other outdoor surfaces, unless the hose is equipped with an automatic shut-off device, and the purpose of washing the surface is: to prepare a surface for painting, .....continued on Page 2

## Watershed report links to valley aquifers

A technical review of water sources in the Similkameen Valley suggests a strong relationship between the Similkameen River and aquifer-based water sources.

That's one conclusion of a report completed for the Similkameen Valley Planning Society as part of its commitment to building a watershed plan that emphasizes an integrated, holistic approach to water management in the Valley.

"Although the report is very technical, what it tells us is that as we draw more water out of the ground we may be impacting the flow of the Similkameen," explained SVPS Chair Manfred Bauer.

"Conversely, as the Similkameen loses flow, the aquifers may also be depleted."

The Phase 2 report was conducted by Vernon-based Summit Environmental Consultants. The consultants also conducted two other studies, reviewing water demand and availability and risk and water quality.

One study concludes there is a trend toward increased water demand in the valley, which, accompanied by expected warmer, drier summers could result in more frequent water shortages.

The Similkameen's flow, the consultants concluded in the final study, is consistent with other B.C. rivers for water temperature, fecal

coliforms, colour, pH, and total metals.

The Similkameen Watershed Plan (SWP) is a responsibility of the Similkameen Valley Planning Society and a component of the Sustainable Similkameen Strategy.

The plan emphasizes an integrative, holistic approach that links water quality, water quantity, wet-

lands, riparian habitat and biodiversity with the valley's economic and social priorities. Its goal is to significantly improve water management of the Similkameen watershed and foster collaborative water management and make water conservation a permanent ethic.

The Similkameen Valley Planning

Society is a not-for-profit society originally comprised of seven governing bodies within the Similkameen Valley: the municipalities of Keremeos and Princeton, Electoral Areas B, G and H of the Regional District of Okanagan-Similkameen and the Lower Similkameen and Upper Similkameen Indian Bands.

## MVA requires airlift

A single vehicle accident at 9:30 AM Wednesday, July 29th sent two to hospital.

The incident, which occurred 29-kilometres east of Princeton,

involved a Dodge Caravan traveling eastbound that left the road and went down the embankment towards the Similkameen River.

The two occupants in the vehicle, from Osoyoos, sustained injuries and were transported to hospital. One required airlift service to Kelowna General Hospital.

RCMP Cpl. McLeod of South Okanagan Traffic Services in Keremeos told the News Leader

last week that in addition to SOTS officers, Princeton RCMP, BC Ambulance Service, Hedley and Keremeos emergency responders attended the scene. RCMP collision analysts also attended.

Highway 3 was not closed at all but was reduced to single lane alternating traffic during clean up and recovery efforts.

### Demolition Derby Plans Prompt Open Letter to Town Council

Re Planned Demolition Derby

The Princeton Rodeo Club wishes to bring to your attention our concerns regarding the Demolition Derby planned for the rodeo grounds.

#### BACKGROUND:

The Rodeo Club has been an inte-

gral part of the history and activities of the community each and every year for some 30 years. During that time literally thousands of hours of volunteer effort has gone into making the rodeo arena one of the best in Western Canada. The Princeton Rodeo Club has received awards for the care, attention and quality of these facilities.

This year alone, hundreds of hours were spent doing repairs, upgrades, and maintenance to the rodeo grounds. The success of this year's

rodeo attests to this effort.

#### CONCERNS:

The Town has endorsed the holding of a demolition derby in the rodeo arena. We have several concerns, including:

1. The Jim Lind Memorial Building is located in the northwest corner of the arena; this facility was funded, built, and utilized by the many volunteers active in the rodeo and riding sports; one of its many uses is to enable handicapped persons to view the various activities from a safe, protected building behind glass. The glass and the building itself are at risk from the demolition derby.

2. Thirty years of effort have gone into the bucking chute part of the arena. It was built to contain animals. It was not built to withstand a demolition derby.

3. The west end of the arena contains the timed event end and catch pens; this area is of light rail and again will not withstand impact by demolition derby action.

4. The east end of the arena contains the stripping chute facilities; the area is again constructed and improved over many years. It is also of light rail materials.

5. The railing around the entire arena is hollow core pipe. It is constantly repaired, upgraded, and in first class shape. It will not withstand impact by cars.

6. Arena ground: we understand that the topsoil in the arena is to be removed. This is to ensure that the top quality rodeo ground will be returned to its world class shape. With respect, the ground is a thin layer of sand/soil developed over

many years to the high quality for rodeo and riding events. Removal will result in damage to the condition of this material.

7. Under the arena ground: there are pipes, wires, and services. We have to be very careful when disking the ground for the rodeo and other events that no damage is done to these services. We note that the services are just below the subgrade. The digging of a trench for 'mud drags' would guarantee the cutting of the lines and would require the employ of both a plumber and an electrician to repair them. Further, after the event, the trench would have to be re-filled carefully using major compacting equipment to insure the hardness of the subgrade. If this is not done properly the ground will settle leaving a permanent uneven swale which will make for unsure footing and result in a higher chance of injury to both animals and contestants.

8. We know what takes place at a demolition derby. We are very concerned about contamination of the grounds from oil, gas, and other spills. We do not know how that natural consequence of a derby can be addressed.

#### CONCLUSION:

The Princeton Rodeo Club does not think this rodeo arena is a place to hold a demolition derby.

This is especially the case, from our point of view, when there is adjoining ground inside the race track that can be used. This area, at the west end of the grounds, has been used before for this type of

event.

There are portable bleachers that can be used. There are rodeo club volunteers to assist and advise. There is potential for this area to have repeated annual use without the major disruption of the rodeo arena.

We sincerely believe that the demolition derby will result in serious damage to the arena facilities. We hesitate to try and estimate the costs that will need to be faced both in preparing the site and repairing same. Further, should the promoter of the event fail to return the arena to pre use condition the Town would be faced with the significant costs of remediation.

There are reasonable and inexpensive alternatives.

Stage 2 restrictions do not apply to any person who is watering in compliance with a valid permit.

Public sector entities may, during Stage 2, water lawns, boulevards and playing fields at any time, but no more than every second day.

# Flip Of The Coyne

By the time this goes to press if everyone is right we will be knee deep in what may be the longest election in Canada's history. Why? The Prime Minister and his strategists are betting the farm that they can win a drawn out political battle over the opposition parties because they have more money in the bank than the other parties. That means outspoken Conservatives may not get a chance to go to the rallies because they won't pass the background check first. The Harper government holds the public in contempt.

There is a problem for Harper. People are mad, tired and fed up. There is a reason that the NDP is neck and neck with the Conservatives. People are tired of

legislation that treats the Canadian people as the enemy. Now if you've been out of the country for so long you are disqualified from voting. I have friends who can no longer vote, yet they pay taxes here. They work overseas for Halliburton and other oil companies and are disqualified from voting because their holiday visits back home do not qualify them for a long enough period of being back. They get the privilege of paying taxes to a homeland that they are no longer allowed to vote in. That is the Harper Conservative definition of more democracy. They try to eliminate their opposition by finding ways to exclude them from voting. That is why no matter who you are thinking about voting for, it is so important that you vote. There has been a lot of discussion online and on the street since the Rainbow Crosswalk was completed last week.

I know this because for many of the public Town Council meetings held in the past six months I was either one of two people present or, as happened frequently, I'm the only member of the public sitting there.

Oh, and when I say 'report on the regular activities at town hall' I actually should clarify that the items discussed and dealt with at a public Town Council meeting are really quite different to the daily dealings at Town Hall. The meetings are open to the public and always have been but, as I've stated, if I'm not excited to be there I highly doubt the average taxpayer will be either.

But to claim little knowledge of what is going on in your community I think is a bad excuse. Sure, maybe meetings are not your thing, but asking questions we can all do.

In fact, that's my favourite way to get some answers.

## Grasshoppers And Beef Prices

the price of all wheat products will climb.

The worst news is that there are likely to be drought problems next year, too, as the current El Nino is just now moving north. The drought in California is not going to end, and we will probably see our own dry conditions continue. If it were only Canada affected by inclement weather, we would have no reason to worry, but the farmer's best friend and worst enemy is the weather. To a farmer, the weather determines his crops' success or failure. India was hard hit this year. Many farmers have committed suicide due to having a 100 percent crop failure.

In the heartland of the United States, where agriculture is the top industry, flooding has wiped out corn crops as well as numerous other crops. Flooding in Texas has had the same effect. In the lowlands of Europe - Belgium, Holland and Denmark - frost in July has made an impact on crops. Snow in July in the Highlands of Scotland made an impact. Wildfires and inclement weather in the Ukraine, to say nothing of political upheaval, has made an impact on crops. Crimea was hit with a locust invasion two weeks ago, destroying 27,000 hectares of field crops.

Northern China saw one of the coldest planting seasons in decades, and Inner Mongolia suffered from an invasion of locusts (very large grasshoppers).

Southern China saw some of the worst flooding in decades, wiping out not only crops but livestock.

Flooding and bad weather has hit hard in some of the best agricultural land in the world and it will affect food prices this winter. It is important to remember food is sold as a commodity. In other words, buyers bid on it and the highest bidder gets the food. This happens not only in the big city food wholesale houses, but one nation will bid on crops in another nation. Food is big business, and the highest bidder wins. For example, wheat is sold by the hundreds of tons. So are potatoes, rice, beef, pork, poultry, and just about anything we consume in quantity.

Because we are a relatively rich nation, we can bid higher than many other nations, so we will not starve as long as we can afford the prices in our grocery stores. Rest assured, it is the consumer who ultimately pays everybody on the food supply chain. If any food commodity is scarce, like beef is now, you and I are going to pay more for what we get.

The next time you are reading the news about some bad weather somewhere, or watching some weather disaster on television, you might want to check what crops are grown in that area. This will tell you what food was destroyed and it might tell you how much more you are going to pay for that food. In the meantime, please squash every grasshopper you see!

Grasshoppers in southern British Columbia and across the prairies are going to drive up beef prices next year. If you think beef prices are bad now, wait until next spring! Grasshoppers have eaten entire fields of hay. Ranchers are desperate for hay for the winter, and hay is going up in price. With not enough hay, and/or not enough money to buy hay, many ranchers will be downsizing their herds. Prices may drop temporarily in November, but climb again. By spring, ranchers who have cattle will be holding them for the calf crop, and beef will be more scarce than it is now.

Grasshoppers have eaten entire fields of wheat, too. Drought on the prairies has wreaked havoc on grain fields before the grasshoppers hit. At this time, nobody knows whether there will be a shortage of wheat, but if there is,

## Province increases regional drought level

Responding to continuing dry conditions, the Government of B.C. announced on July 27th a Level 4 drought rating for the South Thompson, Similkameen, Kettle and Skagit areas due to ongoing low stream flows.

At Level 4, conditions are extremely dry. Further declines in stream, lake and aquifer levels could lead to water shortages and affect people, industry such as agriculture, wildlife, and fish stocks. All water users, including those who access groundwater, are urged to maximize their water conservation efforts.

The establishment of a Level 4 drought advisory, signals that regional water managers may take additional regulatory actions if they are deemed necessary. Any such actions will be site specific depending on individual stream conditions. Specific actions could include the temporary suspension of water licences or short-term water

approvals in affected watersheds if necessary. Ministry water management staff will continue to monitor conditions, work closely with First Nations, local governments and key stakeholders, and provide updates as the need arises.

Although residential, agricultural and industrial users within municipalities and regional districts backed by reservoir storage are less vulnerable to water supply shortages than water users served by smaller water systems from streams, lakes and wells, all water users are encouraged to observe local water conservation bylaws to prolong water supplies and to maintain flows for fish and ecosystems.

Water users are also reminded to ensure that water intakes are screened to prevent fish from being pulled into water systems as water levels drop. Low water levels can impede the passage of salmon to spawning grounds, increase suscep-

tibility to disease, or cause stranding or death due to low oxygen and high water temperatures.

Drought ratings for the South Thompson, Similkameen, Kettle and Skagit areas were last adjusted on July 10, 2015, when they were increased to Level 3.

The Okanagan area remains at Level 3 at this time.

Water conservation is everyone's responsibility. Many communities in B.C. are prepared to deal with water supply shortages and low streamflow conditions through drought management plans and water conservation programs that are already in place.

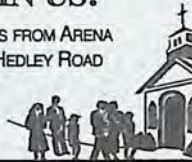

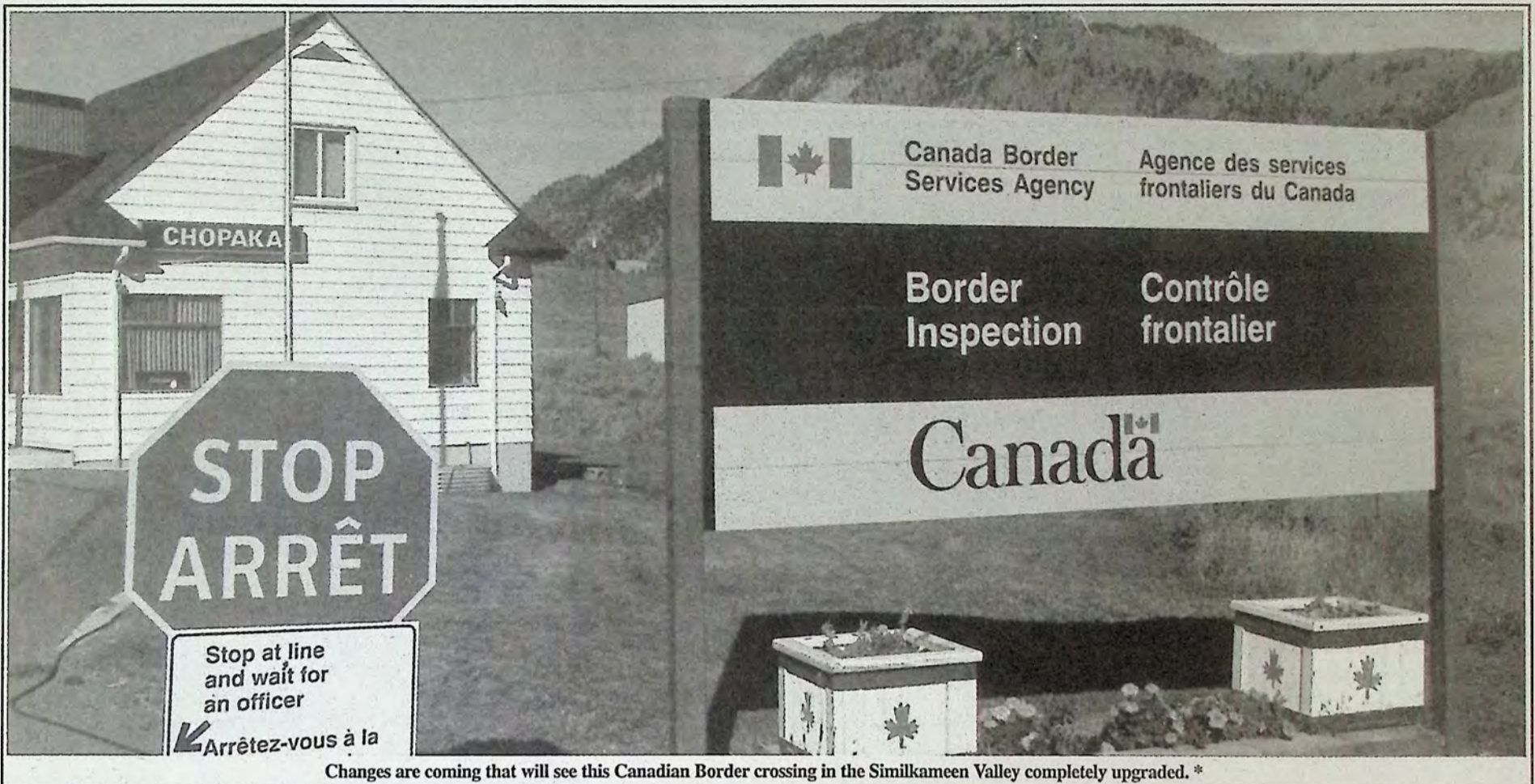

## Chopaka to be modernized

MP Dan Albas, on behalf of Steven Blaney, Canada's Minister of Public Safety and Emergency Preparedness, announced July 29th the Harper Government will invest an estimated \$37.5 million to improve infrastructure in British Columbia including the Chopaka, Midway and Paterson ports of entry. This investment is part of the \$440 million in infrastructure

funding announced in November 2014 by Prime Minister Harper to replace aging ports of entry across Canada.

"Improvements to port of entry facilities help ensure the free flow of legitimate travel and trade across Canadian borders. Our commitment to invest \$440 million in border infrastructure to modernize ports of entry demon-

strates our government's ongoing commitment to the safety and prosperity of our country," stated The Honourable Steven Blaney, Canada's Minister of Public Safety and Emergency Preparedness.

The infrastructure investment includes design finalization, site services, geotechnical and environmental assessments, as well as modular building construction, including structural, mechanical, electrical, internal fit-up, commissioning, project management and signage. Construction work is planned to begin as early as 2017. "By investing in border infrastructure at the Chopaka, Midway and Paterson ports of entry, the Harper Government is helping support the economy in British Columbia," MP Dan Albas, Okanagan-Coquihalla added.

The \$440-million border infrastructure investment, combined with previous Beyond the Border infrastructure commitments, provides a huge boost to upgrade ports of entry. The majority of Canadian ports of entry will be fully upgraded or replaced with modern facilities, consistent with the Canada Border Services Agency's efforts towards modernization.

This is over and above the \$241 million that the Harper Government has already invested in expanding and modernizing its ports of entry over the last five years.

New and modern facilities will help meet new space demands due to recent operational requirements. Improvements to facilities will help ensure our small, remote and medium ports of entry will continue to deliver service excellence to travellers and traders.

## Prize booklet hits street

Exhibitors should read the instructions, both the general instructions and the instructions at

the beginning of each category. For example, if you have been taking photographs during the past year, now is the time to go through them, keeping in mind each photograph must be mounted. Art work must be framed. Don't leave this to the last minute.

There are instructions for entering any kind of exhibit, and plenty of different categories to enter, ranging from vegetables and fruit to hobbies, livestock, woodwork, eggs, and chickens. Junior Fair has a tremendous number of categories for children to enter.

## Alpacas come to Fair

Sunkeya Farm Alpacas, a business owned and operated by Linda and Clay Schultz, is bringing alpacas to the fair this year. An alpaca is a smaller form of llama, and is one of the natural species of South America. Alpacas are known as camelids, meaning they belong to the same family of animals as camels. Alpacas are raised to produce hair, the fibers of which are famous for softness and warmth.

Linda and Clay Schultz are bringing a mother alpaca and her

baby, and a very social alpaca. Most alpacas are reserved and avoid human contact, but this special white alpaca loves to be close to people and likes to be cuddled.

In addition to the animals, Sunkeya Farm is bringing alpaca fiber products to the fair to sell: scarves, socks, and skeins of alpaca fiber.

Educational materials will be available at their booth, which will be near the front fence at the fair.

## Small Community Grant Programs

Let's suppose you're running late for an appointment and you've been caught speeding in a 30 km/h zone in Princeton.

You're pulled over and a police officer hands you a fine for \$196.

What a way to start your day!

But have you ever wondered what happens to the money you and thousands of other British Columbians pay to resolve traffic tickets?

You might be surprised to learn a portion of your fine comes back to B.C. communities twice a year in the form of a grant to fund policing initiatives and community safety projects.

There's more. As a community with a population of less than 20,000, Princeton also qualifies for a twice-yearly Small Community grant. Since March 2011, Princeton has received \$2,244,824 in Small Community grants, including \$295,712 just last month.

These grant programs are great for local governments because they pay for municipal projects without affecting local taxes.

The Small Community grant program provides unconditional

grants, meaning local governments can spend the funding according to their needs and priorities. The grants apply to communities with fewer than 20,000 people and are used for infrastructure, administration and delivering services.

Traffic Fine Revenue funding comes from ticket fines and court-imposed fines on violation tickets. The program returns 100 per cent of net traffic fine revenues to communities that are responsible for policing costs. Rural communities and municipalities with populations under 5,000 who do not pay directly for policing participate in the program through a reduction in the police tax.

There is a third grant program as well. Regional District grants are also applied twice a year and, like Small Community grants, are unconditional and can be spent however each regional district sees

fit to assist with administration costs. The Regional District of Okanagan-Similkameen received \$112,797 from the program last month, and \$850,234 since 2011.

Since 2009, the Traffic Fine Revenue, Small Community and Regional District grant programs have provided more than \$792 million in funding to communities throughout B.C., to help pay for local projects.

Unlike other grants that go toward a specific purpose, these grants can be used at each community's discretion on local projects that might otherwise go unfunded.

Our government understands there is no standard formula for addressing priority projects in individual communities. These programs allow decisions to be made locally to help pay for projects that build safer, stronger communities - without burdening local taxpayers.

## Fall Fair plans work party

Fall Fair Board members are preparing for the 50th anniversary fair on September 12 and 13. A work party and potluck lunch are planned for Sunday, August 29. The

next meeting of the Fair Board will take place August 11 at 6:30 PM at the fairgrounds. Anyone wishing to volunteer at the fair should try to attend this meeting.

A schedule of events will be drawn up and posted for the convenience of those attending the fair. Any group or vendor wishing a space at the fair should contact Keith Olsen as soon as possible (250-295-0277). Educational display space is free. A fee schedule is in place for vendors, scaled according to the amount of space and electrical services required.

A painting project is in the works to paint the back of the Fall Fair buildings. Three women are going to go out early one morning and start slapping paint on the buildings.

A major problem has developed from the invasion of a group of highly active large marmots commonly called 'groundhogs.' They are undermining the front of three buildings by digging under and chewing holes. The Town has promised to bring in exterminators before the fair.

Prior to the fair, all buildings will be cleaned, and general repairs done. Anyone wishing to join the August 30 work party is more than welcome. Food and drinks will be provided.

## Living Past 100

### Fixing Liver Damage

Look for the ingredient listed as corn syrup or fructose in the fine print and avoid that product.

Cut out white flour products, including brown bread. An easy way to do this is to go for foods labelled gluten free, but be extremely moderate in the amount you eat of gluten free products. Fortunately, most supermarkets now stock plenty of gluten free products.

Eat plenty of fruit, nuts, seeds and vegetables. Eat good oils, such as olive oil, coconut butter, avocados and fish oil (Omega 3). Eat kale, cabbage, Brussels sprouts, arugula, garlic, onions, and Daikon radish (also known as lo bok).

Exercise. Go for a one-kilometer walk every day, or every second day, if possible. Swim. Dance. Jump on a trampoline.

Some doctors recommend taking lipoid acid and L-Acetyl-L-Cysteine to help the process of cleansing the liver.

So, what do you get if you do all this? After about two weeks, you will have an increase in energy and clearer thinking, sharper memory. After two months, you will feel much more energetic, think in a more positive attitude, your waistline will shrink, and your skin will look healthier. You will look much better and you will feel much better all over. Your greatest reward will be an improved immune system and a longer, healthier, happier life.

# Festival includes Songs of Social Justice

While CEOs and corporations float in a stratosphere of riches, much of the world struggles on the

ground just trying to get by. Everywhere, including Canada, the gap between the rich and the poor is getting wider each day. If you think about it too much, especially if

you're near the bottom of the financial heap, you could get really depressed. The Princeton Traditional Music Festival would like to pull you out of the doldrums by offering a whole hour called "Songs of Social Justice," that will feature songs about the struggle for a better world.

Songs about social justice have a long and respected history. Those of us who grew up in the sixties will remember the civil rights movement in the US. Songs such as 'We Shall Overcome,' 'If I Had a Hammer' and 'Where Have all the Flowers Gone?' became the

anthems of a generation trying to break out of the conformity and racism of the fifties. Union members who have been out on strike will likely have heard or sung, 'Solidarity Forever.' There are numerous other union songs that speak of struggles for safe working conditions and fair wages. Some of these songs come out of the coal mines of Britain and the Appalachians. The early coal mines on Vancouver Island also produced songs of solidarity and struggle.

The women's movement of the seventies was another fertile garden for song-making. It gave birth to such songs as 'I Am Woman, Hear Me Roar' and 'There was a Young woman Who Swallowed a Lie.'

The "Songs of Social Justice" session will feature an impressive array of singers who will share their repertoire of political songs. Bob Bossin from Gabriola Island has been rocking the musical boat for decades. He is the originator of the musical trio, Stringband that performed in coffeehouses and universities in the early seventies. It soon became better known and began touring nationally and internation-

ally. The group was 'socially activist,' performing frequently for anti-war, environmental and other causes.

Linda Chobotuck from Burnaby grew up in a political family and was familiar with picket lines and demonstrations from an early age. She is a fine song-maker whose topics range from working in an office or a fish plant to songs about what you owe your boss.

The Rabbleberries, a quartet from Victoria, much in demand for political gatherings and social causes, brings its tasty harmonies and multi-instrumentality to energize its social message.

Tom Rawson is a folksinger and storyteller from Orcas Island in Washington, strongly influenced by Pete Seeger's passionate commitment to socially conscious music. He travels all over the Northwest playing at festivals and coffeehouses as well as leading community singing at conferences and retreats.

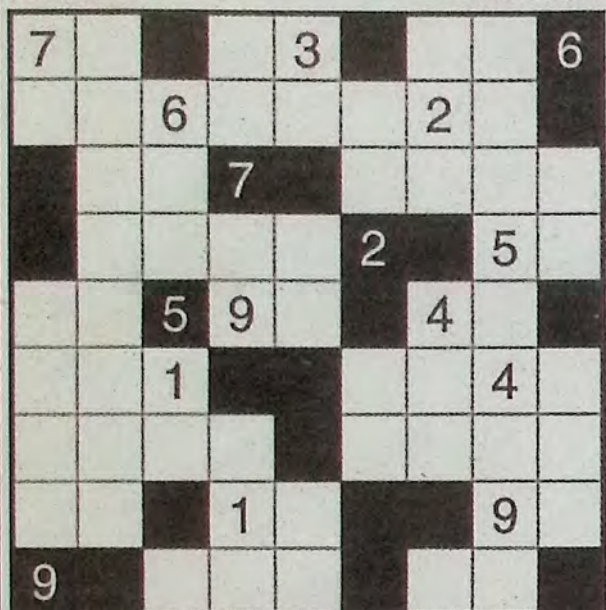

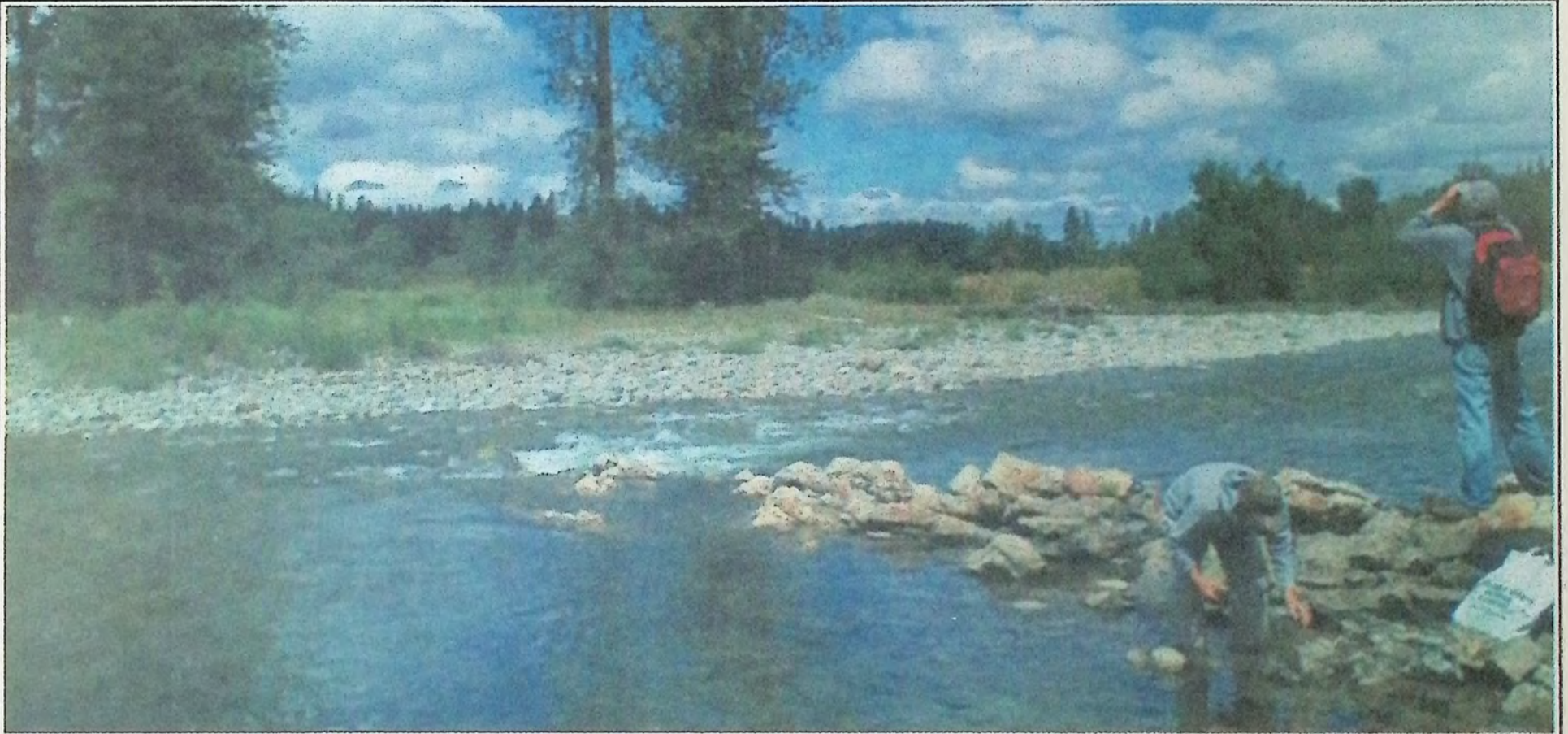

the shore, where we enjoyed intermittent sunshine as we ate our lunches and panned for gold. Although flecks of gold and platinum were discovered, we left these treasures behind!

The riches that we did enjoy that day included a Bald Eagle standing sentry over us while Canada Geese swam nearby, two coyote pups romping through the woods, a Cooper's Hawk, a Raven family vociferously protecting their young, and several Blue Grouse lurking in the grasses.

We sampled sweet salmon berries, wild raspberries and the less palatable Oregon-grape berries. The fit-

ting finish, however, was sipping Peter's cherry wine at his home after our five-hour field trip had ended!

Our next field trip will take place Saturday, August 8th, when Jim and Margaret Hale will lead us on an easy hike up Hedley Creek, a great walk for a hot summer day, as the trail is shaded and cool. No need to bring a lunch with the Hitching Post nearby.

## Saving Downtown Princeton...

...An Ongoing Series by George Elliott

Now that the Chamber of Commerce has officially indicated they have plans to sell, rent or lease their building on Highway 3, I have some ideas.

First off, I must state that I am a firm believer that if the Chamber is going to become a strong force within the community, they will have to reinvent themselves. Considering the level of business experience that currently sits on the Chamber Executive I think some

big things are possible.

In the years I was part of the Chamber executive, in the late 1980s, the group was viewed as simply a club. It was difficult to get much done in the way of business advocacy or economic development because we didn't have an office (the caboose was our home at the time).

I also believe that the Chamber of Commerce needs to be a stand-alone entity with no ties to Town

Council or Town Hall in any way, shape or form. I say this because I see the Chamber and Town as opponents on many issues and when you are in opposition you control accountability.

So what about that beautiful building on Highway 3?

In discussions last week with former Chamber President (and now Vice President) Brenda Crawford I learned that the structure is only about fifteen years old. It is in excellent shape and sits on a pretty large piece of real estate with the Similkameen River running behind it.

If I recall correctly, the Chamber has a hand panning reserve allotted on the river behind the building.

This is where my ideas come from for the future of that building.

Let me make it clear that I do not think we need another food services business in town, so I would strongly oppose one setting up shop

there. That includes a pub or any such thing. Besides, I'm not sure the current zoning of Commercial Tourist would allow those kinds of developments anyway.

I see a huge potential in using the site to promote our rich historic heritage in a way where visitors and residents can stop by and actually interact with it. I see a partnership of some kind with the neighbouring Upper Similkameen Indian Band forming where the building is leased out long-term providing regular income to the Chamber of Commerce.

I see the regular income opportunity as essential because I would never suggest looking to the Town of Princeton for grant-in-aid funding if the Chamber ends up battling the Town on business issues in the future.

The USIB arrangement would provide them with a chance to develop the top part of the

Chamber building into an interpretive centre along the lines of the Snaza'ist Discovery Centre in Hedley. The First Nations history in Princeton differs from that in Hedley and with the huge grounds surrounding the building there is room for outdoor displays of many kinds.

History of the area could focus on the First Nations including details on the history and significance of pictographs (of which many line Old Hedley Road), the arrival of white settlers and the railway (the Trans-Canada Trail passes alongside the property).

The idea would be to not overlap what is currently on display or exists at Princeton Museum although I can see a potential partnership forming there that would benefit both parties. The top portion of the Chamber building could be used to house displays that

.....continued from Page 16 would not be suitable for outdoors, possibly a corner to preview short films and videos on the First Nations history in the Princeton area and also a gallery of First Nations art - some of which would also be available to purchase.

The river behind the property could include interactive displays on First Nations transportation, fishing and even could trace a timeline up to the gold rush days of the late

1800s.

I just see huge potential in what the First Nations history can do for our community. I think of the accomplishments of the USIB in Hedley, LSIB in Cawston and massive business ventures of the OIB in Osoyoos and Westbank First Nations and I see a hole here that is still in need of filling.

The best part about this idea is that the Chamber of Commerce would still be able to retain the basement of

their building for storage and meetings. Even bigger, the Chamber and First Nations connection would catapult the Chamber into territory that would quickly translate into credibility attracting members wanting to be part of such a high profile and ultimately powerful local business organization.

How does this save downtown Princeton?

I see this as two-fold.

The First Nation Interpretive Centre on Highway 3 in the former Chamber building will stop travelers. Some will come to the area just to learn more about the local history before white settlers. Anything that stops people on the highway near downtown will benefit the community and downtown indirectly.

Secondly, with a strong Chamber

of Commerce receiving regular funding from a lease arrangement they will be able to afford building upon this success with an ongoing source of financial life support. It will remove many stresses related to operating costs and allow the Chamber of Commerce to become a business advocacy group within the community, which will have a direct affect on downtown Princeton.
