IHA adds Princeton to paramedicine program

An innovative partnership announced earlier this year to benefit patients and help sustain the presence of paramedics in rural and remote communities is now being launched in the Interior Health region.

Creston and Princeton have been selected as communities in Interior Health for the Community Paramedicine Initiative introduced by BC Emergency Health Services (BCEHS).

"Community paramedicine is enabling us to develop an integrated approach to patient care to best suit the unique needs of each community population," said Health Minister Terry Lake.

"We know that health-care providers in rural and remote areas may face challenges and we value their guidance in how we can best engage local paramedics to address gaps in service."

Under the initiative, paramedics will provide primary care services within their scope of practice to increase access to basic health-care services in non-urgent settings, in partnership with local health-care providers. The enhanced role is not intended to replace care provided by health professionals such as nurses, but rather to complement and support the work these important professionals do each day.

BCEHS has been coordinating the implementation of community paramedicine in BC with the Ministry of Health, the province's health authorities, and the Ambulance Paramedics of BC (CUPE 873).

Communities in northern BC were

announced in April 2015, with Vancouver Island communities expected to be announced later this summer. This measured start allows BCEHS to focus on one health authority at a time, and to develop the contacts needed in each community to ensure community paramedics will be well-integrated members of the established health-care teams.

"This new role in community health is well suited for BC's highly trained paramedics," said Bronwyn Barter, President of the Ambulance Paramedics of BC (CUPE 873).

"With the community paramedicine program will come enhanced patient care and new full-time career opportunities across the province."

In phase one, BCEHS paramedic unit chiefs will help confirm the specific services required in the community, which community paramedics, given their training, are able to provide.

It is expected that community paramedics will be delivering community health services in the initial communities, including Creston and Princeton in the fall of 2015. The program will be expanded to additional rural and remote communities across the province in the

Steering committee report

The Princeton Health Care Steering Committee (PHCSC) held its regular monthly meeting on Thursday, July 16 at Princeton General Hospital. The meeting was attended by representatives from the Town of Princeton, Area H (RDOS), health care practitioners, Interior Health, and SOHC. The meeting was chaired by Town Councillor, Kim Maynard.

Prior to the meeting, PHCSC members and hospital staff attended a luncheon to celebrate the one

year anniversary of the 'Specialists for Princeton' project, a joint initiative sponsored by the Shared Care Committee and Doctors of BC. Several of the participating specialists joined the celebration from their home offices by teleconference. The occasion was also an opportunity for the latest member of our Cascade Medical team, Dr. Tim Van Der Heide, to meet the specialists and receive a welcome from the community. There was also a short presentation to Dr.

Devinder Sandhu, thanking her for her two years of service to our community. Dr. Sandhu will be leaving Cascade at the end of August.

On the agenda for the Steering Committee meeting was Sharan Jung, manager of the Princeton and District Community Skills Centre, who outlined a proposal to offer a Health Care Assistant program in Princeton. The Skills Centre is in discussion with Okanagan College and is exploring a potential partnership with the Steering Committee in the program development and execution. This partnership would involve possible equipment loans and commitments to practicum components. Jung also explained that there is a province wide shortage within this sector and feels this would be a beneficial program to be offered locally. The Steering Committee acknowledged the important work being done by the Community Skills Centre and offered their support for the future development of this program.

One of the Steering Committee's action items is the Community Outreach program, with the goal of developing ongoing partnerships

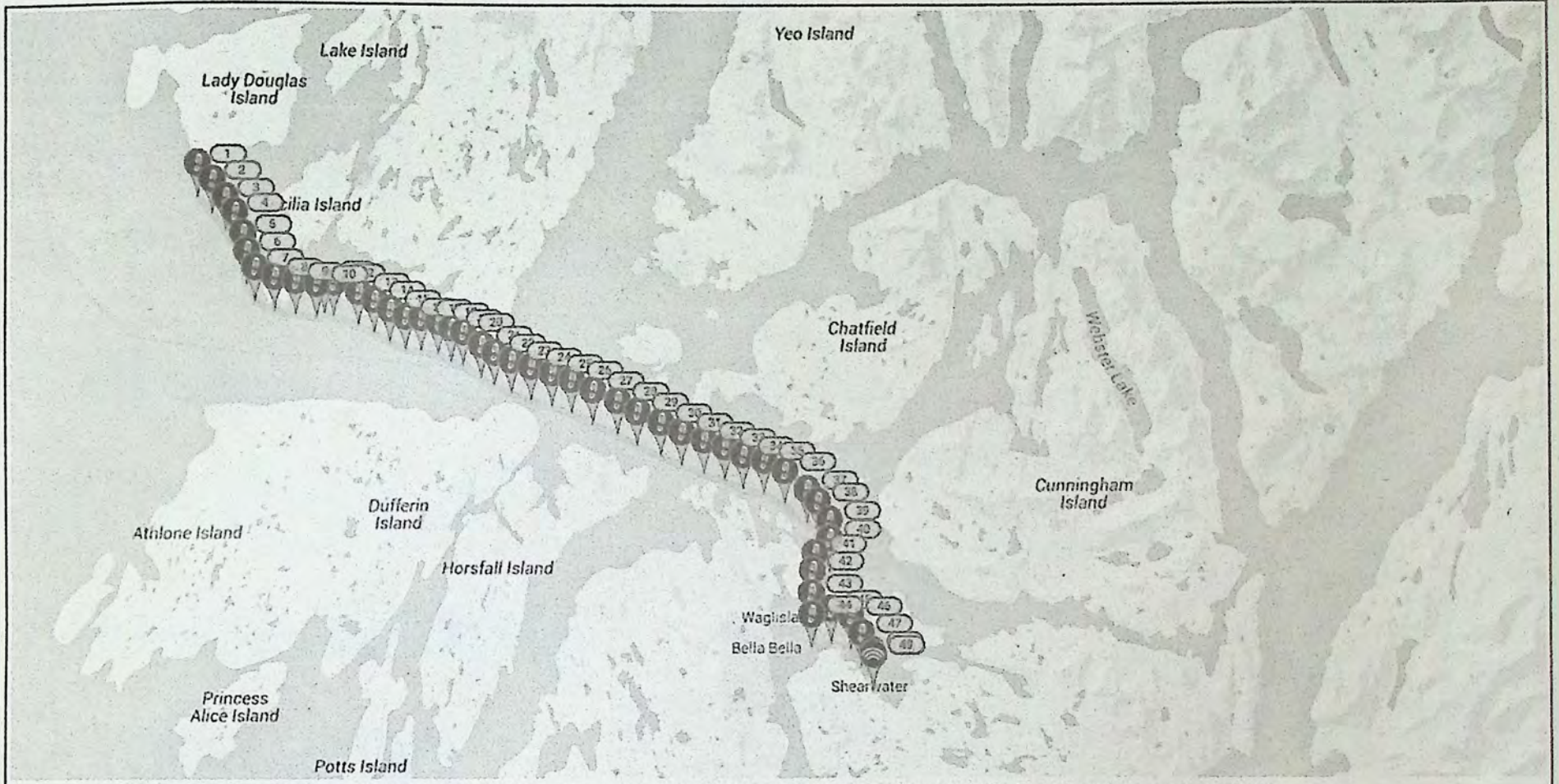

Cox rows the coast once more

Princeton's Neal Cox did it in the summer of 2012.

He took a rowboat he had made himself from Vancouver to Alaska - solo. The 10-foot Cindy's Row Boy was paddled the 1,300-kilometre route without much else. No sponsors, not much in the way of supplies and very little fanfare. It was the way the adventure went.

This past July 7th Cox launched into the West Coast water from Hyder, Alaska with a plan to reach Horseshoe Bay a couple (or so) months later. This time around Cox took local Mike Davis along and rigged his rowboat with two fixed sails.

Last week the pair passed through to the Shearwater Resort and Marina in Shearwater, near Bella Bella in northern British Columbia.

The first 21 days of the trip was highlighted by 19 of them being rainy, says Cox, who has been in contact with Princeton friends. He was reported as crediting the sails for keeping the pair from failing further behind schedule.

Cox estimated last week they were a week to ten days behind and Davis has already made arrangements with his employer for an extended leave to complete the journey.

The pair has opted to follow ferry routes for the balance of the trip, which will keep them away from open water unprotected by islands.

The pair will work their way south to Port MacNeil on Vancouver Island and down to Campbell River through the Discovery Passage. Then it will be a crossing over to Powell River and south between the British Columbia mainland and Texada Island.

The Similkameen News Leader has joined other friends of Cox and Davis following their adventure online tracking the GPS unit aboard the rowboat.

Safe home programs receive \$\$\$

The Lillooet Safe Home is receiving \$10,000 and the Princeton Safe Home \$5,000 from the Ministry of Children and Family Development to help support Aboriginal women and children who are affected by domestic violence and fleeing abuse so they can rebuild their lives.

Aboriginal women and children make up a large percentage of British Columbians who are affected by domestic violence and other crimes. In fact, Aboriginal women in B.C. are nearly three times more likely to be victims of domestic violence than non-Aboriginal women.

"No one should experience violence or live in fear in their own homes," Fraser-Nicola MLA Jackie Tegart said.

"Our government is helping to make Aboriginal women and children safe, empower them and give them the tools to make a better life for themselves."

This funding will allow the Lillooet Friendship Centre Society and Princeton Family Services Society to help improve programs and services and make them more accessible to the Aboriginal women

and children who need them, especially in rural and remote communities.

For example, the subsidy will be used toward the cost of:

- Transportation to a transition house/safe home, a doctor's appointment or lawyer meeting, or to fly a high-risk client out of the community;
- Medical and legal services;
- Important documents, such as identification;
- Clothing and personal items if the woman/child had to leave their home quickly.

The August 7th announcement is part of the provincial government's second- and third-year commitments under the three-year, \$5.5-million Provincial Domestic Violence Plan - to provide direct services for Aboriginal children, youth and families in rural and remote communities.

The B.C. government commits more than \$70 million per year in prevention and intervention services and programs that benefit victims of domestic violence and other crimes.

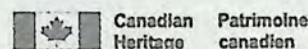

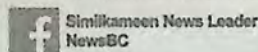
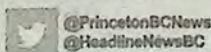

Medical Turmoil Hits USA News

During the past few weeks, news related to vaccines has been hitting American news outlets and is causing serious waves that could result in major lawsuits.

William Thompson, an epidemiologist working for the American Center for Disease Control (CDC), told Congress on July 28 that the CDC had concealed the results of a study that linked the Measles-Mumps-Rubella (MMR) vaccine to autism in African American boys. He stated that the hard copies of the study had been put in a trash can. Believing this was a violation of two American laws, Thompson kept his own hard copy and computer files.

Congressman Bill Posey, representing Florida's 8th congressional district, brought Thompson before Congress. Thompson had been granted immunity by President Obama from prosecution as a whistleblower.

The CDC has spent the past 11 years telling the public there is no link between autism and the MMR vaccine. Thompson had

sent a letter in 2014 to Dr. Julie Gerberding, head of the CDC, expressing concern that the CDC was concealing the data. Nothing was done. Dr. Gerberding no longer works for the CDC. In 2015 she began working as executive vice-president for Merck, the pharmaceutical company which is the sole manufacturer of MMR vaccine.

No action has been taken toward any prosecution of anyone at CDC, and the major news networks have ignored Thompson and Congressman Posey. However, the path may be open for lawsuits. Up to 2015, according to Congressman Posey, the United States government has spent \$3 billion on a vaccine injury compensation program for children injured by vaccinations.

As if the Thompson revelation were not shocking enough, there is the matter of the dead and missing physicians. In less than a month, five American physicians were found dead and two were missing.

Three Mexican doctors and two health care workers from Acapulco were reported missing. The first American physician was Dr. Jeff Bradstreet, a Florida researcher who had moved his medical practice recently to Georgia. He was found dead, floating in a river in Georgia. He had a bullet wound in his chest. A gun was found in the river in the vicinity of his body. Police ruled it a suicide, despite family protests. He died June 19. On June 21, Dr. Bruce Hedendal, of Florida, was found slumped over the steering wheel of his car,

dead, with no indication of cause of death. The same day, another Florida physician, Dr. Baron Holt, was found dead, no obvious cause of death. On June 29, Dr. Teresa Seviars, of Florida, was found brutally murdered in her home. On July 1, Lisa Riley, a naturopath, was found dead in her home from a gunshot wound to her head. Dr. Nicholas Gonzales, who was an associate of Dr. Bradstreet, collapsed and died suddenly on July 21 of an apparent heart stoppage that had been unexpected in an otherwise healthy man.

On June 26, Dr. Patrick Fitzpatrick of Bismarck, North Dakota, was declared missing after his truck and camper were found abandoned in Montana. He had been traveling to visit his son in Boseman. On June 29, Dr. Jefferey Whiteside was vacationing with his family and had an argument with his wife. He walked away from their lakeshore vacation home and did not come back. After several days of searching, police found his dead body with a rifle alongside it, and police assumed he had committed suicide.

Mexican police found five dead bodies on June 19 and said they were the missing physicians and their assistants, but the families of these people said the bodies were not their relatives.

Dr. Ted Broer, an internationally respected physician specializing in holistic healing of cancer, told one news outlet there was a link between Dr. Bradstreet and Dr. Gonzales: both suspected a linkcontinued on Page 6

Scam targets FortisBC customers

FortisBC is warning customers about a telephone scam on the rise in B.C. in which a caller, pretending to be from a utility company, threatens to disconnect service unless the customer makes an immediate bill payment. The call can take a variety of forms, but most commonly, the customers are instructed to use a prepaid credit card.

FortisBC works closely with customers to address overdue accounts with the aim of continuing service - disconnecting service is considered only after all attempts for payment are unsuccessful. Customers receive multiple notices including bill messages, automated and personal

calls and mailed notices all in an effort to continue service. FortisBC also offers a number of payment methods; customers can choose the payment method that is most convenient to them.

In addition, FortisBC will not contact customers in any way, including by email, asking for their credit card numbers, social insurance or similar personally identifiable information. If customers are asked for this information, they can be confident FortisBC is not the entity asking.

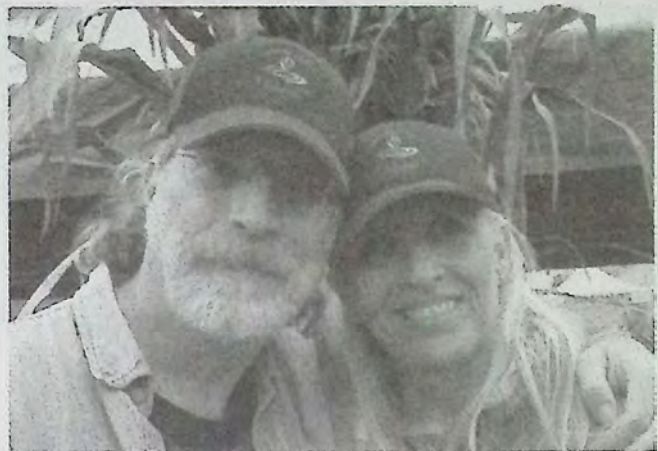
Customers can be certain they are speaking to a legitimate FortisBC customer service representative if they call us directly using a number published on their statements

or on our website.

FortisBC advises both its business and residential customers that if they receive a threatening phone call about their account or are asked for payment using a specific payment method, they are likely dealing with a fraudster. Princeton Museum Lecture Series

A Lot More Than Just Cool Looking Rocks

Princeton Museum was reduced to standing room only when just

over seventy residents gathered there August 6th. The occasion

was a part of the Princeton Museum Lecture Series titled Paleontology and Climate.

Four experts in the study of fossils made presentations that ran for nearly two hours and then examined specimens brought to the event by spectators.

Dr. Tammo Reichgelt spoke first on paleoclimates with a focus on why Princeton is so important to scientists. Part of his work centres on determining how ancient environments differ from those of the

present day.

Reichgelt explained that the majority of fossils found in the Princeton area date back to the Eocene Period - from between 35 and 55-million years ago.

Dr. Bruce Archibald spoke about fossil insects and what they can reveal about biodiversity and climate. His studies have shown that insect community responses to climate has an affect on us all and that seasonality is key to determining global patterns in biodiversity.

Dr. Jaelyn Eberle discussed fossil mammals and explained that they are identified by their teeth. The interesting connection to the study of fossil mammals is that they are used to estimate the relative age of rocks.

Princeton is of particular interest to her work in that a rare fossil mammal, the tillodont, was identified through a set of cheek molars found near here in 1935.

.....continued from Page 5 between autism and MMR vaccine. Dr. Bradstreet had been using a new treatment for autism that he claimed cured 15 percent of the cases, and improved the rest. He gave the same treatment to cancer patients and found 85 percent of the patients responded to the treatment. Further, he had identified a substance called nagalese which is at high levels in autistic children. Nagalese prevents the body's

immune system from fighting cancer. Dr. Bradstreet found nagalese is not in the bodies of newborns, so it must be introduced later. He suspected vaccinations may be the cause. He shared his concern with other physicians.

The treatment is too complex to go into this article, but look up Dr. Bradstreet on the net for a clearer picture of what he was working on.

These are strange times.

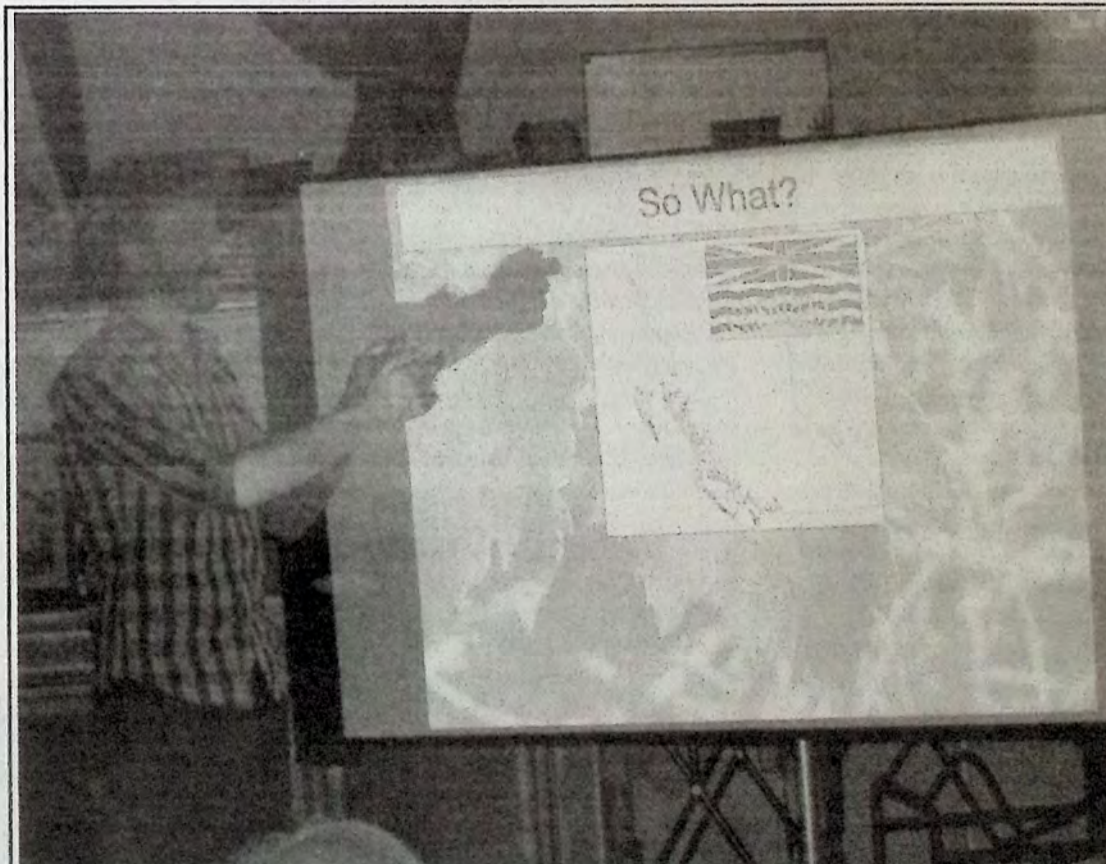

"Paramedics have long been vital partners on the health-care team," said Interior Health Board Chair Erwin Malzer.

"We welcome this innovative new approach to expand community-based care for rural and remote communities in the Interior."

The Province of British Columbia and BCEHS have committed to creating at least 80 new full-time equivalent positions (FTEs) to support the implementation of community paramedicine programs over the next four years.

"BCEHS is continually striving to find new and better ways to provide patient care and to strengthen its

ability to respond to medical emergencies," said BCEHS Executive Vice President Linda Lupini.

"Enhancing the talents and skills of paramedics in a community-based setting will help keep paramedics engaged in remote communities that have low call volumes."

The Community Paramedicine Initiative aligns with the recently released Rural Health Services in BC: A policy framework to provide a system of quality care, which was created as a planning document to identify common concerns and policy directions, and will be joined together into a rural health strategy. This strategy will help guide the future of rural health care for British Columbians.

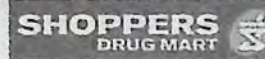

Festival features all kinds of fiddlers

Traditional Music Festival

What's the difference between a fiddle and a violin? Some people would say there is no difference — they are exactly the same instrument; same shape, same size, same number of strings, etc. If you put a

fiddle and a violin side by side they would be identical. The difference comes when someone picks up the instrument and plays it. If the music they play sounds like it comes from the court of an 18th century king; if it is played in a concert hall and/or in an orchestra, and if the musician

plays from written music then it's a violin. If the music is played at a party and makes you want to get up and dance then it's a fiddle.

We recognize fiddle (as opposed to violin) music when we hear it. What most of us here in western Canada have probably heard is either American bluegrass-type fiddle tunes such as 'The Orange Blossom Special' or, if we're older than 60, Maritime fiddling such as that heard on Don Messer's Jubilee. But fiddle music has rich and varied traditions throughout the world, ranging from Scottish folk dance tunes to the complex rhythms of Balkan fiddling to the Norwegian Hardanger tradition and to Jewish Klezmer music. Even within Canada we have very different regional styles of fiddling. The tunes heard on Don Messer's Jubilee are very different from what you would have heard at a parish hall dance in Quebec, a Metis community in northern Alberta or a Newfoundland kitchen. The reason these traditions have evolved into such unique and varied styles is because the music comes out of specific cultural communities.

These communities were isolated from one another and developed their own, individual styles of music. With vastly improved communication and transportation, fiddlers these days are often masters of various styles of music.

At the Princeton Traditional Music Festival you will have the rare treat of being surrounded by a plethora of master fiddlers. A group of them will get together on the Saturday morning of the Festival for a one-hour session called 'Five Fiddles.' Annie Brown has performed at the Festival since its beginning in 2008 and is one of Vancouver's leading Irish and English Country dance fiddlers. Michael Burnyeat is the resident fiddler at Vancouver's Jericho Folk Club. Rosie Carver, who will be hosting this session, plays with Blackthorn, a Vancouver-based folk quartet who play Celtic music. Their repertoire is rooted in the musical traditions of Scotland, Ireland and England as well as English and French Canada.

Valerie Cohen from Seattle has organized and performed in children's and family concerts. She

plays French, Canadian, Irish and Scandinavian tunes. Bryn Wilkin, a multi-instrumentalist fiddle player from Grand Forks is one half of, Vazzy, a duo that plays traditional songs and tunes from Acadia and Quebec with some newer compositions in the traditional style.

These fiddlers will share their love of the instrument and their musical virtuosity in the Five Fiddles session, which is just one item on the rich menu of music available at the Princeton Traditional Music Festival.

The Festival begins at 6:15 PM on Friday, August 14 with an opening ceremony and a participatory dance on Veterans' Boulevard. On Saturday and Sunday there is music from 10:00 AM until 6:00 PM right in downtown Princeton.

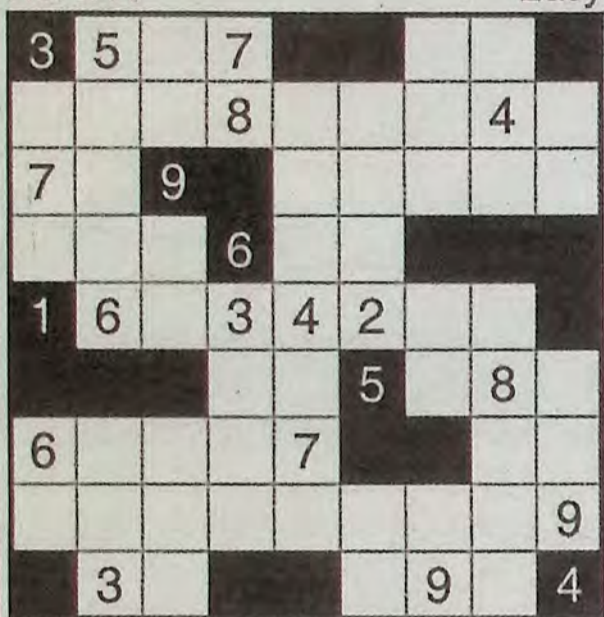

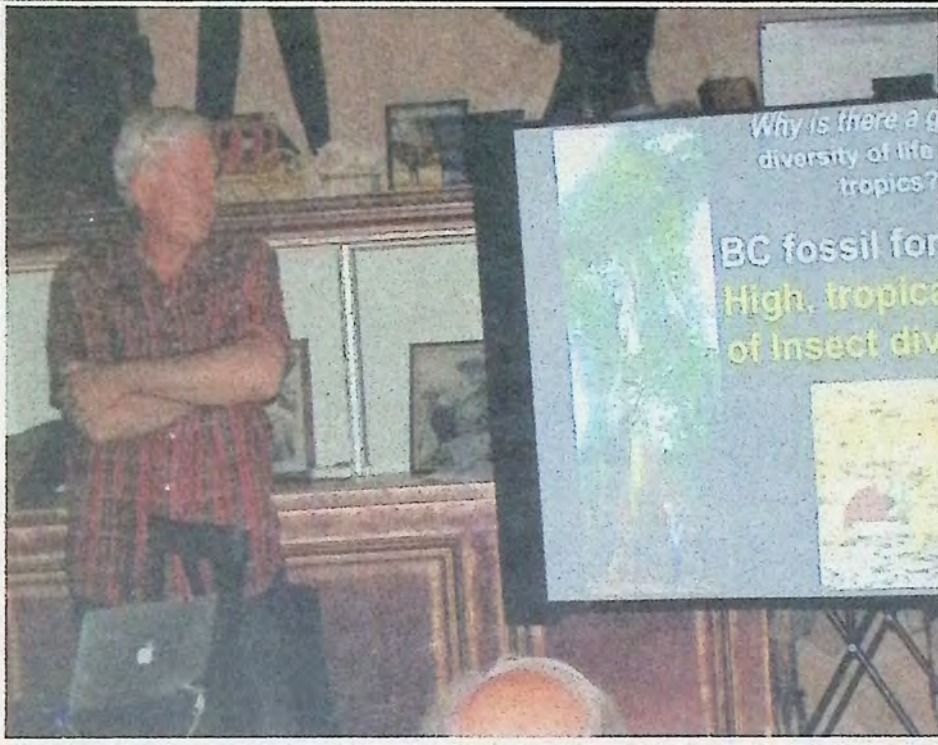

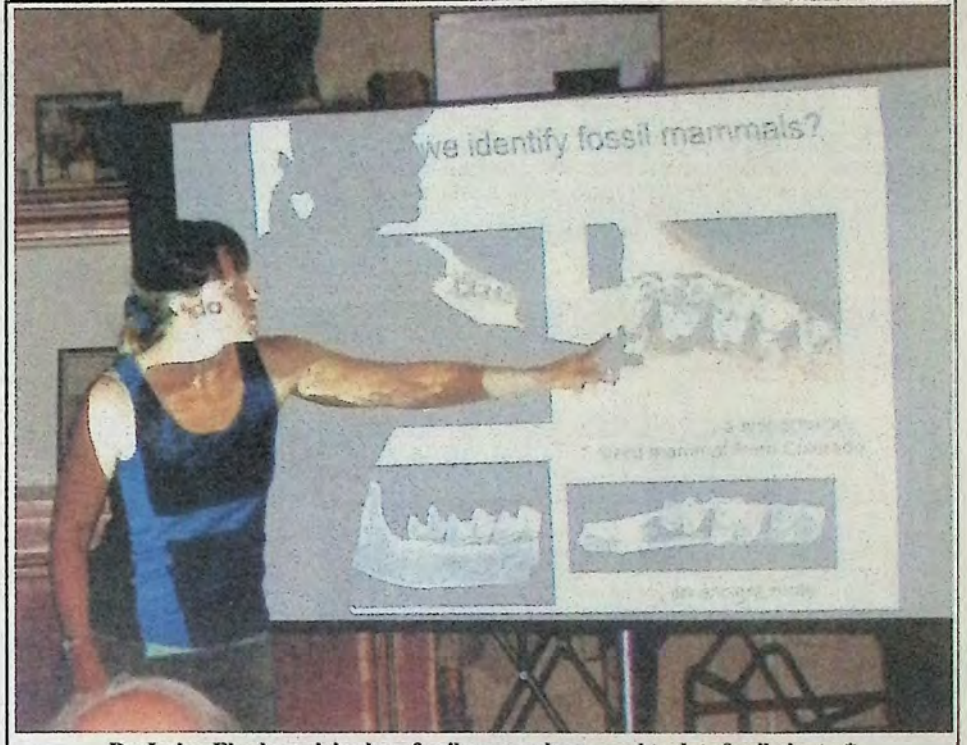

fossil plants and climate where he explained that plant distributions have changed significantly. Ancient climates were much warmer in this region and that British Columbia forests provide superb fossils as a result making them important for study.

Princeton is also the location of a fossil site along the Similkameen River identified as the Princeton Chert. First discovered in the 1960s, it is considered a significant site.

The overall message coming from the lecture was that ancient climates were more tropical in zones that are

countless hours at great personal expense. The upcoming event alone is comprised of many volunteers who are dedicating their time and money to make this a success for everyone.

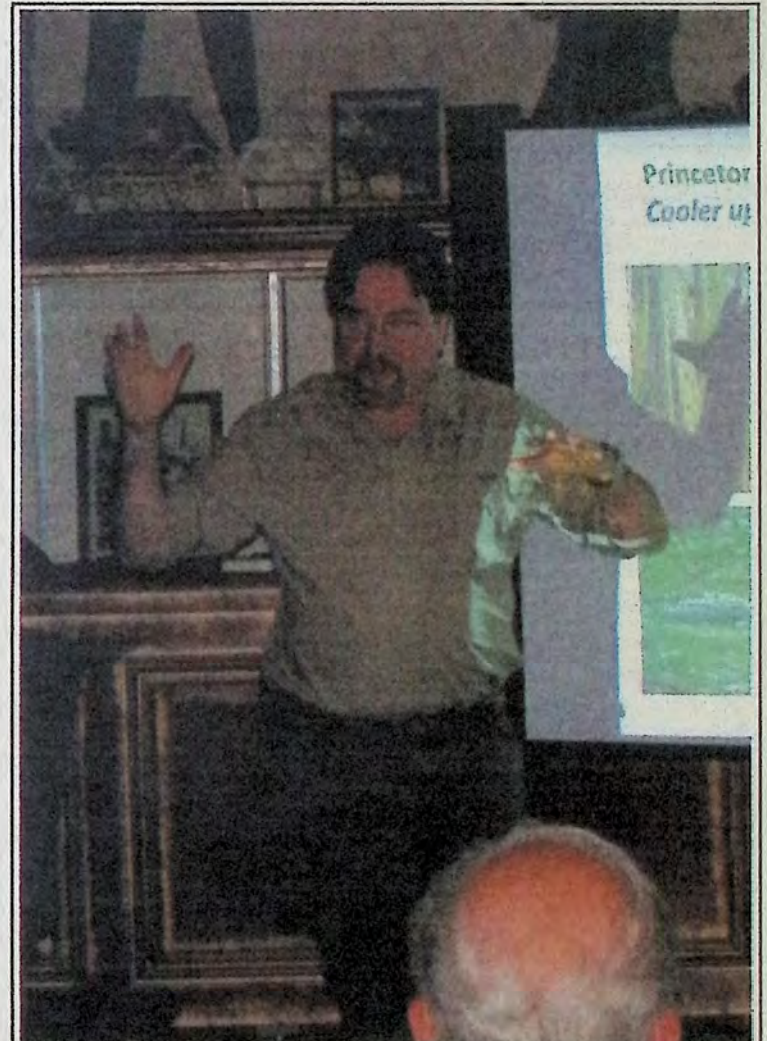

mammals that exist today in tropical zones are often found in fossil form in much cooler regions of the world.

The discussions also explained that the Princeton area has a rich collection of fossilized history that

scientists have used and will continue to use to study changes in the world during the Eocene Period. The word Eocene translates to mean 'dawn of the recent' and it is at that time period when many mammals first emerged.

Saving Downtown Princeton...

...An Ongoing Series by George Elliott

Since the Town of Princeton appears to have adopted a policy of media silence in recent weeks, I'm going to do a little bit of crowing for them.

I think that with the numbers coming out of the new Visitor Centre, Town Council is deserving of credit and I suspect there's been some thumbing of noses and "told you so" comments getting kicked around the hallways at Town Hall. Quite honestly, they deserve the

right to act like that because the tourist information centre has done extremely well located in the middle of downtown Princeton.

I do believe I have been saying all along that the proposed location was a stroke of genius once the Town assumed tourism responsibilities from the Chamber of Commerce. What makes it even better is that the office has the numbers to prove this.

Visitor Centre Manager Lori

Thomas was quoted in this newspaper weeks ago that figures for June showed an increase of 22-percent in the number of parties stopping by the office and an increase of 15-percent of the total number of people stopping in. Those increases are measured against June 2014 when the InfoCentre on Highway 3 was still in operation.

Thomas provided me with the July figures last week and they continue to show a trend. In 2014 there were 1,778 parties (groups of visitors) with that number shattered last month with 2,143. The total number of individual visitors last year at the Highway 3 location was 3,504 with the Bridge Street location recording 3,872 last month.

I'm considering putting a large banner ad somewhere in this issue with the words, "We told you so!" and giving it to the Town of Princeton for free so they can pat themselves on the back for this one.

Seriously, I believe the downtown Visitor Centre was the best idea to come out of Town Hall since they moved the Municipal Headquarters to Vermilion Avenue.

I point all of this out simply to remind us all that in order to save the downtown core we need to get people downtown. If it's not going to be flooded by locals, then we need to attract visitors to the lifeblood of the community.

Since the Visitor Centre opened on Bridge Street we have noticed a very visible change in traffic in our business. We see a lot more tourists than I can remember in the eleven years we have been in our present storefront location. I give a great deal of the credit for this to the location of the Visitor Centre and the job the staff is doing there sending visitors down the street to wander, shop, explore, stretch their legs and poke around.

While it isn't the complete solu-

tion to saving the downtown core, it is a pretty impressive start. I don't even mind the RV and camper traffic as I love to see the big rigs in the downtown. It means someone in business down here is getting some business that may have otherwise passed us all by on Highway 3.

I see the downtown Visitor Centre as having a huge role to play in revitalizing the downtown and it has already done a great job of attracting people to the retail core. But what else can Town Hall do to help local business?

Getting out and talking to local business owners would be a good idea. I know that there was a wave of visits being made at one point and I think that needs to continue. Local business owners need to feel that Town Hall cares about them.

Mayor Armitage has stated more than once his desire to help downtown business and the Visitorcontinued on Page 20

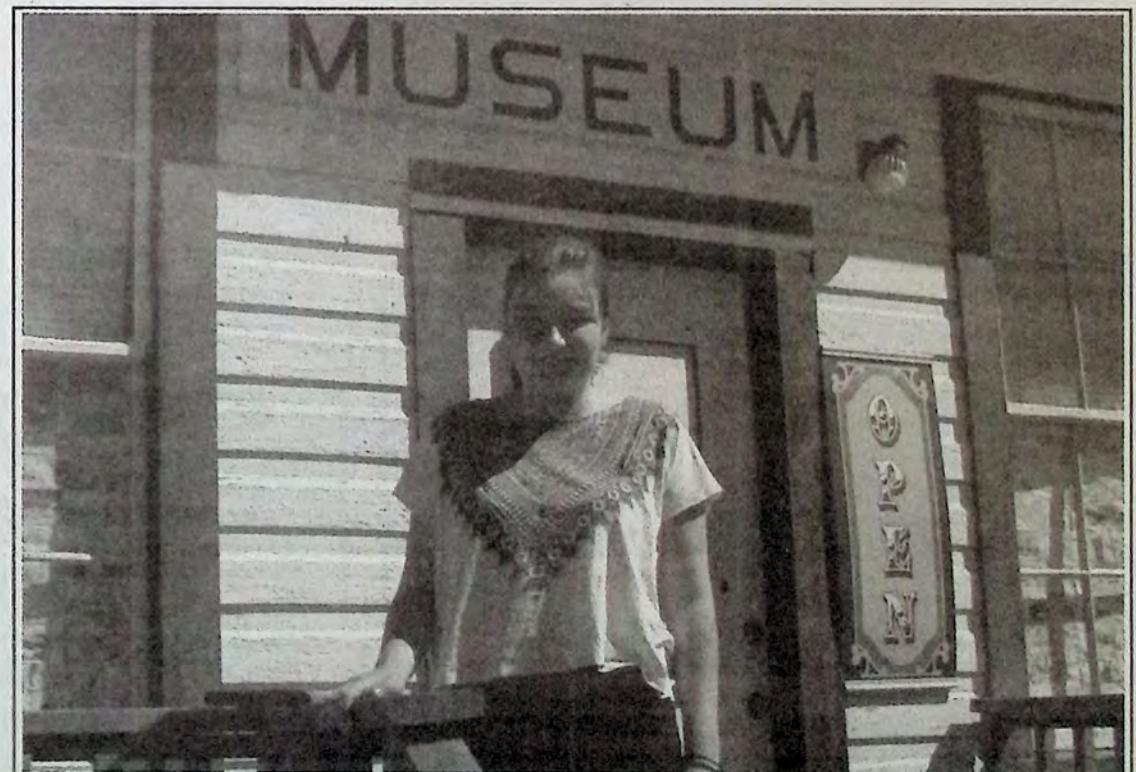

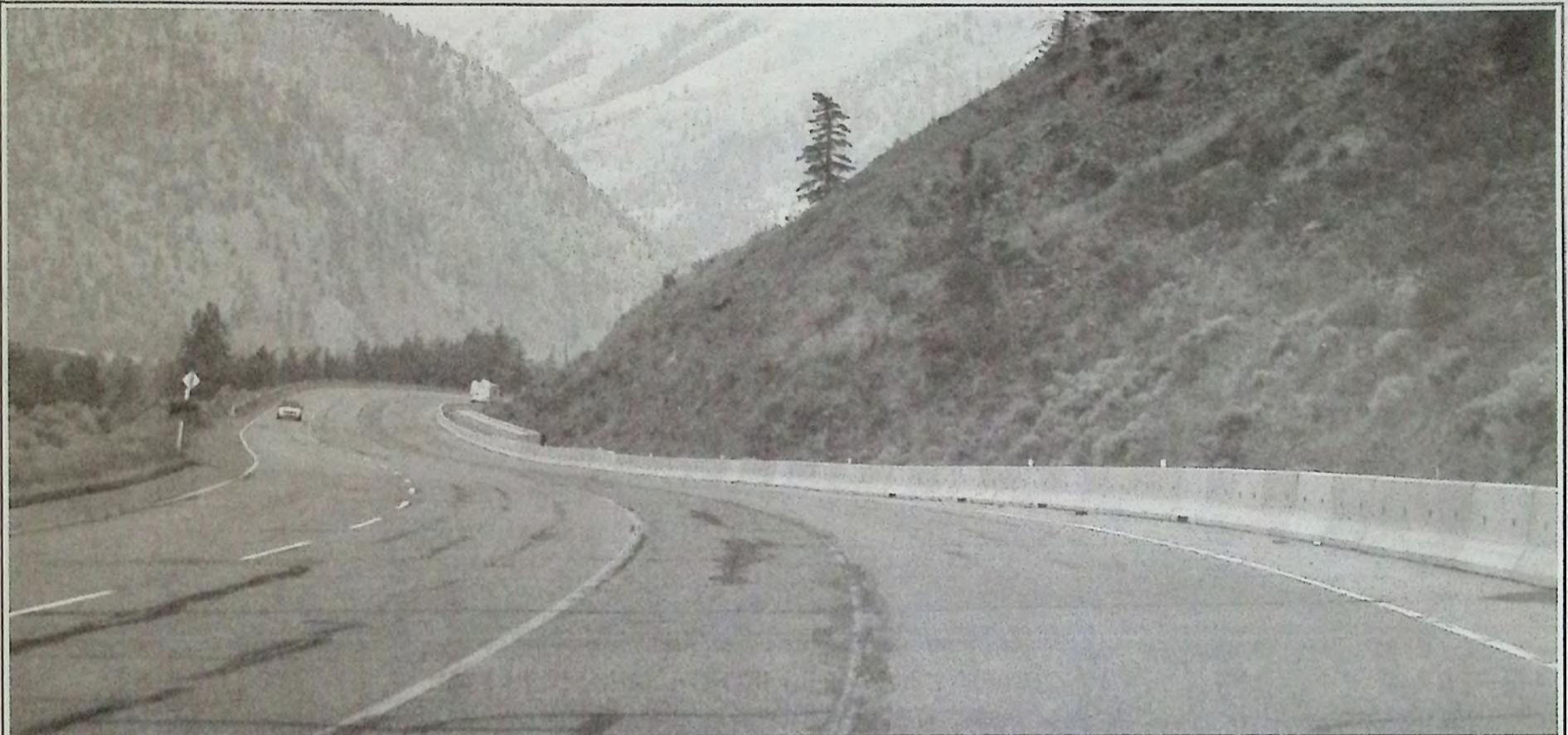

"Show us your mussels!" Watercraft inspection stations are serious stuff, and should you drive past one of these stations instead of pulling in with your boat or sea-doo, you could get a hefty fine. There are 6 crews in the BC Southern Interior trained to inspect - and impound - watercraft that show any signs of the invasive mussels such as Zebra or Quagga Mussels. Those crews work out of Penticton, Valemount, Invermere, Cranbrook plus there are two crews in Nelson. The larvae of the invasive mussels are invisible to the naked eye and can hold up inside boat motor intakes, ballast areas and anywhere that water accumulates. Your responsibility as a boat or watercraft user is to inspect the vessel each time it leaves a water body and clean the vessel regularly. There are chemical treatments to kill invasive mussels but the most common treatment is to wash the vessel with hot water that is at least 140 degrees Fahrenheit or 60 degrees Celsius. July 2015: Hot but not the hottest in Similkameen

Princeton area residents sweltered in the heat in July 2015, but while the weather was hot, there have been years when the thermometer hit higher.

The highest temperature recorded for Princeton in July was 36.7

degrees Celsius. The highest July temperature on record (since 1937) was 41.7. From 1939 to 1942, there were a number of 38 and 39 highs, and one or two at 40.1 degrees.

The nights were warmer than

average in July 2015. The lowest temperature was 8.1, but the lowest on record was 0, recorded in 1952 and in 2011.

The 1950's was a period of colder than average temperatures year round.



Brandon and Elyse are Auxiliary Conservation Officers who are happiest when they don't see anyone's mussels - that would be "invasive mussels". This duo was set up at the weigh scales south of Penticton recently in an effort to raise awareness about the invasive Zebra and Quagga Mussels. The Federal Government implemented regulations this year giving Provinces the authority to set out exactly who can inspect watercraft for invasive mussels and the penalties of non-compliance. If you are transporting a watercraft and you drive by one of these inspection stations, you had best watch your rear view mirror. Commissioned Auxiliary Officers have the legal right to pursue you, impose fines and impound your watercraft if it is not in compliance. In the time that this duo was being interviewed, one pickup with a motorboat in tow drove right past the clearly-marked inspection station. Fortunately for the motorist, Auxiliary Conservation Officers cannot pursue offenders down the highway. Brandon said that as many as 50 watercraft have been inspected each day that the station is open. Until this year Canada lagged behind our southern neighbours: all the bordering states in the USA have formal watercraft inspection protocols. If you see a watercraft out in the public and you have reason to believe it may contain invasive mussels, call the RAPP line at 1-877-952-7277 (RAPP). You can also go online at <http://www.env.gov.bc.ca/cos/rapp/form.htm> to report a suspect watercraft.
