## Healthcare committee reports progress

 On Tuesday, October 20, the Princeton Health Care Steering Committee (PHCSC) held its monthly meeting at Princeton General Hospital. The meeting was attended by representatives from the Town of Princeton, Area H (RDOS), health care practitioners, Interior Health, BC Ambulance Services and Support Our Health

Care (SOHC). The meeting was chaired by IH representative, Susan Brown. The main item on the agenda was a review of the PHCSC Action Plan. The Committee looked at action items from the previous year, identifying them as completed, active and ongoing, or shelved for future consideration.

Completed items included the development and implementation of a plan for the reduction of narcotic prescribing, completion of a new clinic room at Cascade Medical Centre as part of the ongoing goal to provide adequate space for the practitioners, and implementation of a 'Rapid Access' clinic for attached patients.

Several action items remain 'active and ongoing' for the next year. Recruitment and retention of health care practitioners and staff continues to be a priority item for the PHCSC. The addition of Dr. Tim Van Der Heide to the Cascade Medical Team brings our community closer to the goal of five full time General Practitioners and one full time Nurse Practitioner. The Committee will continue to work with health care professionals to fill present vacancies.

The PHCSC recognizes that access to both local and regional health care services remains an .....continued on Page 7

## Commission preserves riding

Attorney General Suzanne Anton introduced Bill 42 October 28th, the Electoral Districts Act, to adopt the Electoral Boundaries Commission's (EBC) final report. The new electoral map maintains

the number of districts in rural and northern B.C. and creates two new districts in the Lower Mainland - all to ensure effective representation for British Columbians. The independent commission pre-

sented its report to Government in September, and last week, the Legislative Assembly voted to adopt its proposals. Among them:  
 - Increasing B.C.'s electoral dis-

tricts to 87 from 85, with new ridings in Surrey and Richmond/New Westminster to reflect growing population in these areas.

- Preserving current districts in the North, Cariboo-Thompson and Columbia-Kootenay regions, to ensure citizens in less-densely populated, yet geographically large, districts can be effectively represented by their MLAs.

- Boundary changes to 48 districts, including substantial changes in the Fraser Valley, Hope/Princeton and Comox Valley/mid-Vancouver Island regions.

The EBC undertook provincewide consultations in developing its recommendations which, if last week's amendments are passed, will take effect for the 2017 and 2021 provincial general elections.

Attorney General Suzanne Anton stated, "The work of the Electoral Boundaries Commission has resulted in recommendations that provide for both equal and effective representation in British Columbia. Ours is a province with dense and growing urban areas, and more-remote .....continued on Page 3

## Fisherman's Rest

The First World War was touted as "the war to end all wars." It was in fact that War that started nearly every war of the 20th and 21st centuries, for which we might justly blame the British government. Had that government not entered, in 1904, the 'Entente Cordiale' with the French, there would have been

no First World War - and thus no Lenin or Stalin or World War II: Hitler himself would have ended up a house painter or a designer of birthday cards. No end to the Ottoman Empire either; no carving up of the Middle East by the British and French, no need to buy off European Jewry

with the Balfour Declaration of a 'Jewish Homeland' in return for financial support for the war. And finally no Afghanistan adventure, no invasion of Iraq, no Canadian jets bombing ISIS positions, and no consequent exodus of tens of thousands of Europe-bound refugees.

Those who started World War I, and those who entered into it with such enthusiasm, as did many British settlers in Canada, never knew, as we do, the unintended consequences. The 'Jack' of the poem on Page 6, printed in the local paper in 1917, would never have left the Similkameen, and the family he never had - because of his death that year in France - might still be at his lakeside cottage, the Fisherman's, watching the fish rise to the fly.

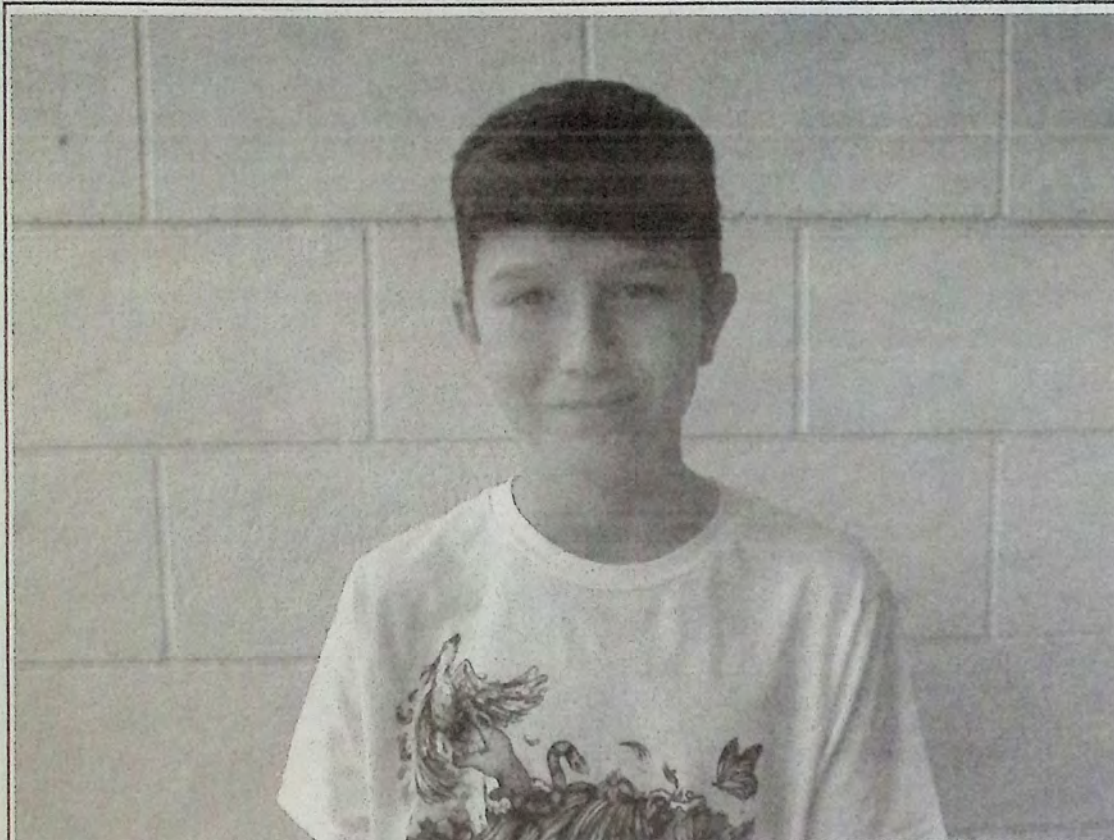

## Flip Of The Coyne

The town is going to drop \$42,500 on updating the official community plan. \$20,000 is going to come from the province and the other \$22,500 from the local tax base, but no matter how you spin it, the town is going to spend \$42,000 of taxpayers' money to update a community plan that has been plagued with problems and controversy since it was passed. As George pointed out in Saving Downtown Princeton last week, it wasn't like it just occurred to Council to fix the broken OCP. It was already scheduled as it is something that is updated from time to time as part of the process.

If Council had come forward and said, "You know what? We have had nothing but problems with the current OCP. We should sit down and see how we can fix it," I would be jumping up and down with joy. I was going through old meeting notes and it came up in the Fred Thomas election. The OCP has to go, not just get a facelift and a new pair of fancy cloths. Fortunately, there was one objection from Councillor Jerome Tjerkstra. Unfortunately, he was out-voted and the money pit that is the update of the OCP will move forward. I

haven't talked to Councillor Tjerkstra since the council meeting, so I am not sure if he only objected on a financial basis, but I have to give kudos where they are deserved.

There is only one member of council who has any skin in the game when it comes to the downtown and it makes it hard to explain why it is important that some real leadership comes from Town Hall when it comes to rejuvenating the downtown. The business owners can only do so much on their own. Taxes increased on commercial properties this year, and what is there to show for it? The town has no growth strategy for commercial business, unless they have hidden it in the nether regions of their hard-to-navigate website.

At the same time Council was passing its plan to spend money on the OCP facelift, the mayor of Penticton was in the Penticton Herald explaining the importance of small business and stated that small business is the economic engine that drives the economy. Mayor Jakubeit, being a small business person himself, started a task force on economic development. The Penticton city council believes

in helping business grow and uses Economic Improvement Zones where it can put developments and or improvement areas on a tax hiatus so that the business owner can expand and grow his business. By utilizing this ability of Improvement Zones, Penticton has seen assessed values skyrocket and the taxes collected increase significantly, creating a larger tax base for the community and atmosphere for job growth and development. This is progressive thinking and something that I wish would happen in Princeton.



### We're All Small Business

Saturday, October 24th was Small Business Saturday as organized and promoted by the CFIB. The CFIB, of which this newspaper and many other Similkameen Valley businesses hold membership in, is the Canadian Federation of Independent Business. They are essentially an advocacy group for small business owners and through membership there are some perks.

For example, in our business we use a CFIB-sponsored credit/debit card machine and as a result we pay less per purchase than some of the other programs in use.

You didn't know there was a fee that is paid by the business each time you use your credit or debit card at? Well, now you know.

The CFIB has defended my business at two different levels of government and does this on a regular basis for any member when it comes to regulations and guidelines. Their big push is to cut down the amount of red tape small businesses typically encounter in their regular operations.

Small Business Saturday was just one way the CFIB used to encourage people - and in this case they targeted elected officials specifically - to support their local economy. I think it was successful in many ways and let me tell you why.

The commerce of a community is driven by business.

When you support your local businesses it feeds the local economy.

Money you put into the cash registers of local shops and stores gets recycled into other local businesses and services. Sure, not all of what you spend at a local business ends up back in the downtown core, but a chunk of it does and that then gets recycled and so on.

Imagine Princeton without any businesses downtown or along the highway.

Imagine no mine or mill or value-added wood remanufacturing plants.

There would be no services of any kind and Princeton would look much like Aspen Grove does today.

In order to keep what we have, we need to support the existing businesses.

As we are normally open Saturdays I was curious to see what Small Business Saturday was going to be like downtown. It was not an unusual day of business but it was not a bad day, either.

We had two local elected officials stop into our office to show their support and I understand they did this in many other independently owned downtown businesses. I know that made a bit of a difference for me.

There aren't many of us in business in Princeton who aren't busting our humps to keep the local economy chugging. When town leaders come around - even for a photo-op event - it shows they do recognize the role of small business in the community.

From where I'm sitting that makes the CFIB's event a success.

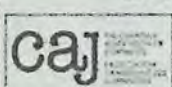

## Memories Of My Childhood War

Seventy years have passed since the end of World War II. I am old now, but my memories of a childhood in a world at war are still vivid. I was born the year the Second World War started, and all of my memories of childhood are colored by that war. I remember our Japanese neighbours being taken away. I screamed and cried at losing a favourite playmate. I remember my brother defending his good friend of Italian descent because people were saying mean things about anybody of Italian origin. I remember being told to tell people my grandfather was born in the States, even though his name was German. Prejudice ran amok.

I have heard people say war is good for the economy, that the government can always find money for war. That may be true, but I know where they found that money: it came from depriving civilians of all kinds of things. We were rationed. There were ration coupons for butter, sugar, chocolate, gasoline, and who knows what. I remember my mother and her good friend cutting up old winter coats to make snowsuits for us because woolen fabrics could not be had. I remember my grandfather working until he could work no longer to expand his farm production because we Canadians were trying to feed England and Scotland.

I remember my mother trying to make bomb-proof packages of food to ship to my older brothers on the front lines. She would assemble the carton, then sew a piece of oilskin around it so the contents would stay dry if it land-

ed in water. One funny story was about the Christmas cake one brother received. The carton looked a little beat up, but was intact. He opened the cake tin to find the cake was all in little pieces. Some kind of concussion had separated the ingredients. He shared it with his buddies. They put the crumbs, raisins, nuts and all into their mugs, added rum to moisten it, and ate it with a spoon.

I remember being shushed when the news came on the radio, and my parents would listen, grim-faced, to the reports of death and destruction. I remember my mother praying every night for the safe return of my brothers. I remember the friends whose fathers had been killed in war. Most of them could not remember their fathers and knew they would never know their fathers.

I remember the end of the war, and how we were going to have peace, and everything would be so much better. I remember how good it was for the adults, how people could buy new cars, tractors, and farm machinery, and how nice it was to have real cotton stockings instead of the horrible itchy wartime stockings made from wood fiber. I remember the joy of having my brother come home at last, and telling us he had fallen in love and would marry and raise his family. I felt so lucky my brothers had survived and were all in one piece, unlike some who had lost a leg or an arm or worse.

The United Nations was formed so that we would never have war again. People would get together and talk out their problems instead of taking up guns and killing each other. We would never again send men and women to foreign lands to risk their lives and perhaps be mutilated or die.

Peace and prosperity did come, and it was wonderful. Every day construction would start on a new house. People were getting married every week, and babies were born almost daily, or so it seemed. People were buying new furniture, new clothes, new cars, taking trips by car or train, some wealthier people were going to Europe. Lots of people were trav-

eling the other way, coming to Canada as Displaced Persons. Walking down the street in Princeton, I remember hearing all kinds of different languages. Life seemed so good.

Good things were happening all of the time. People were building, business was expanding, more goods were in stores, new things were being invented, like pop-up toasters, stainless steel knives and cutlery, home permanents, nylon stockings, plastic tooth brushes, ball point pens, and on and on. Our family had a reunion on Vancouver Island and for the first time, I traveled outside Princeton.

Suddenly, our government had money to build highways. We marveled at the new Hope-Princeton Highway.

You could drive all the way from Kelowna to Vancouver on paved highway! A new school was being built, and a new Post Office building. There was a bus depot, because now you could catch a bus to the Okanagan or Lower Mainland and it took half as long as going by train.

Just as suddenly, the Americans decided Communists were a threat to our peace and prosperity, so Canadians went to war again, this time in Korea. There had been fighting in the Middle East, Cyprus, India, and Africa. The United Nations did not seem able to get people to talk instead of killing each other. I have lived long enough to hear of war in Viet Nam, Indonesia, Bosnia, Afghanistan, Rwanda, Rhodesia (gone), the Congo, Central America, Libya, Laos, Cambodia, Chile, Iran, Iraq, and the Ukraine. So much for peace and prosperity in my time.

Very little has been done to educate people in how to have peace and prosperity. Nations seem as willing as ever to spend billions on military equipment, going to space for military advantage, and on research to find new ways to kill each other. As we gather at the Cenotaph once again on November 11, we remember the cost of war in human lives and human misery. We remember those who have given their lives to preserve our freedoms, and we honour them for their sacrifice. Was it in vain? Have we done a good job of honoring what they fought for? Have we broken faith with them?



Through the Access to Specialists Project, many patients requiring specialist care have experienced improved service over the past year. This very successful project, sponsored by the BC Shared Care Committee, will continue with a focus on long term sustainability and the addition of improved access through telehealth and home

monitoring programs. In addition, the Committee will continue to work towards improved public transportation options for access to regional health care facilities in the Okanagan valley.

There will also be a focus on informing local residents of the present options available for patient transport. Improvement in clinical support remains an important action item and will focus on

improved pre-natal care to meet the needs of women in Princeton and the development and implementation of a chronic disease management plan.

## Living Past 100

### Depression Linked To Inflammation

Brain researchers have discovered a higher than normal level of inflammation in the brains of people who suffer from clinical depression. The question remains as to whether being depressed causes inflammation or whether inflammation causes depression. One group of researchers say inflammation is caused by depression. This does not address what causes depression.

Knowing the brain is suffering from inflammation in a depressed person does offer the hope of new ways of treating depression. If the inflammation in the brain could be reduced through treatment, would it reduce the depression?

Many foods trigger inflammation, and some foods trigger inflammation in some people.

Foods to avoid are fried foods, hydrogenated fats such as margarine, lard, hydrogenated peanut butter, dairy products, processed foods such as foods prepared and packaged, refined foods, and white sugar. Sweets and artificial sweeteners have been implicated in causing inflammation. Grains containing gluten, particularly wheat products, can cause inflammation in many people. Coffee can cause inflammation in some people. Alcohol is a product to avoid.

Some meats increase inflammation, particularly pork and chicken. Bison meat is the least likely meat to promote inflammation.

Foods to prevent or reduce inflammation include blueberries, strawberries, blackberries and raspberries. Celery, celery seeds, spinach, kale, broccoli and Swiss chard (dark green variety) are beneficial. Ginger, cayenne pepper and turmeric are anti-inflammatory. Fish is anti-inflammatory. Cherries (including preserved cherries). Walnuts, flax seed and flax oil are all foods to combat inflammation.

For those of us who endure long winters with little sunlight, taking Vitamin D capsules help prevent depression.

The newly discovered relationship between depression and inflammation of the brain has not been developed into methods of treatment, but is a new area of research to be explored. In the meantime, perhaps correcting diet by eliminating foods that promote inflammation and eating foods that prevent or reduce inflammation may be helpful in dealing with depression.

Vermilion Forks Field Naturalists traveled up Nickel Plate Mountain on October 24th to explore the old French Mine site, a busy location in the 1950s, and last mined in the 1980s. We began our hike a few kilometres up the road, and fifteen of us trekked along a trail already in

use by several cows and calves. Our bovine companions were unsettled by our presence, and tried to keep ahead, with laggards ultimately jostling us as they pushed their way to the front. We felt as though we were herding cattle as we made our way to the mine!

Eventually we reached an old ore

bin, a tall, free standing structure with a chute at the bottom for loading ore onto trucks, and we scrambled up a sharp incline to reach the mine shaft. John Henry, our leader on this outing, pointed out a nearby layer of limestone originally formed in the mid to late Triassic period, 225-250 million years ago, and showed us a small nugget of gold he discovered in the area decades ago. Another member of our group recalled when he and his buddies used greased brooms to whiz down the mountainside on tram tracks!

We continued upward along a nar-

row trail and then challenged our physical prowess by struggling up a couple of steep slopes, almost as agile as mountain goats! This brought us to an upper area of the mine site that is cavernous due to extensive excavation. We spent some time exploring the caves, eating lunch, and reliving past adventures. Back on the trail, we continued to enjoy spectacular views of the valley from many points. Once again, this was a hike filled with laughter, song and camaraderie.

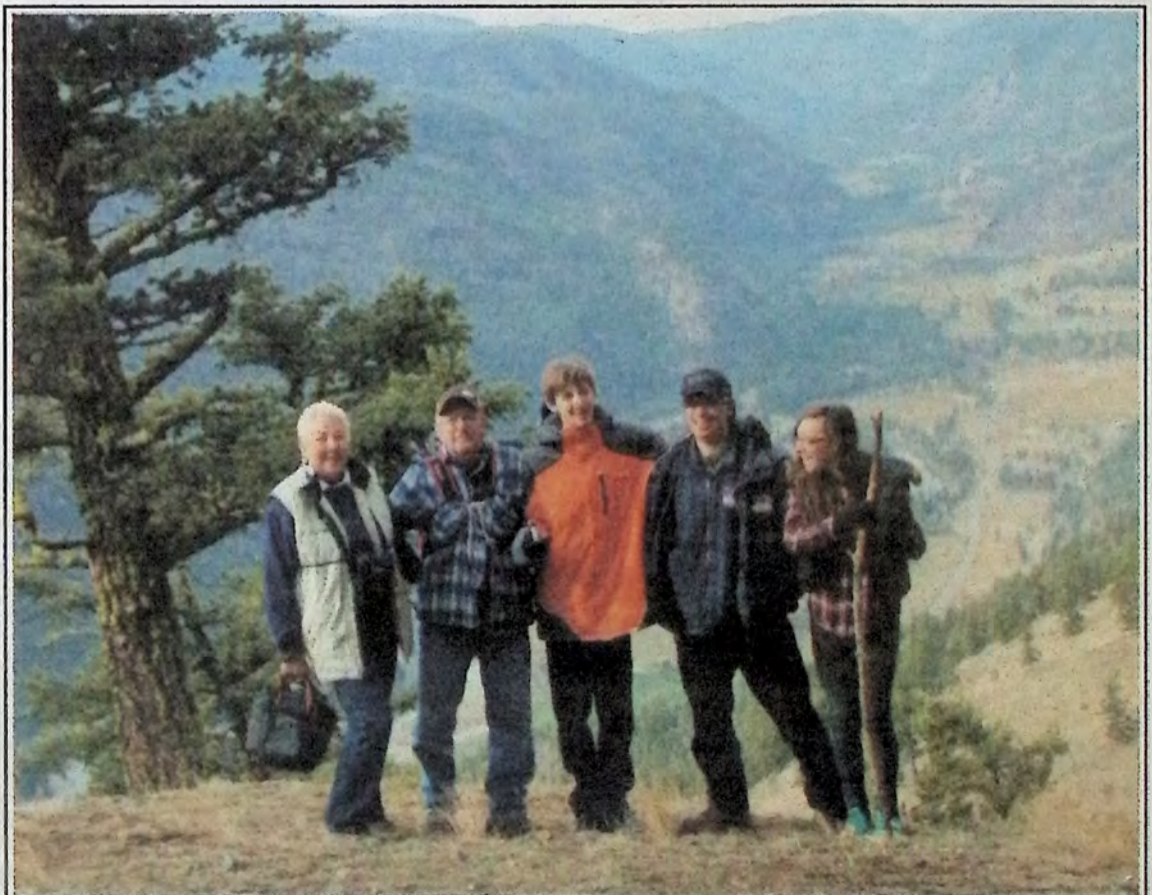

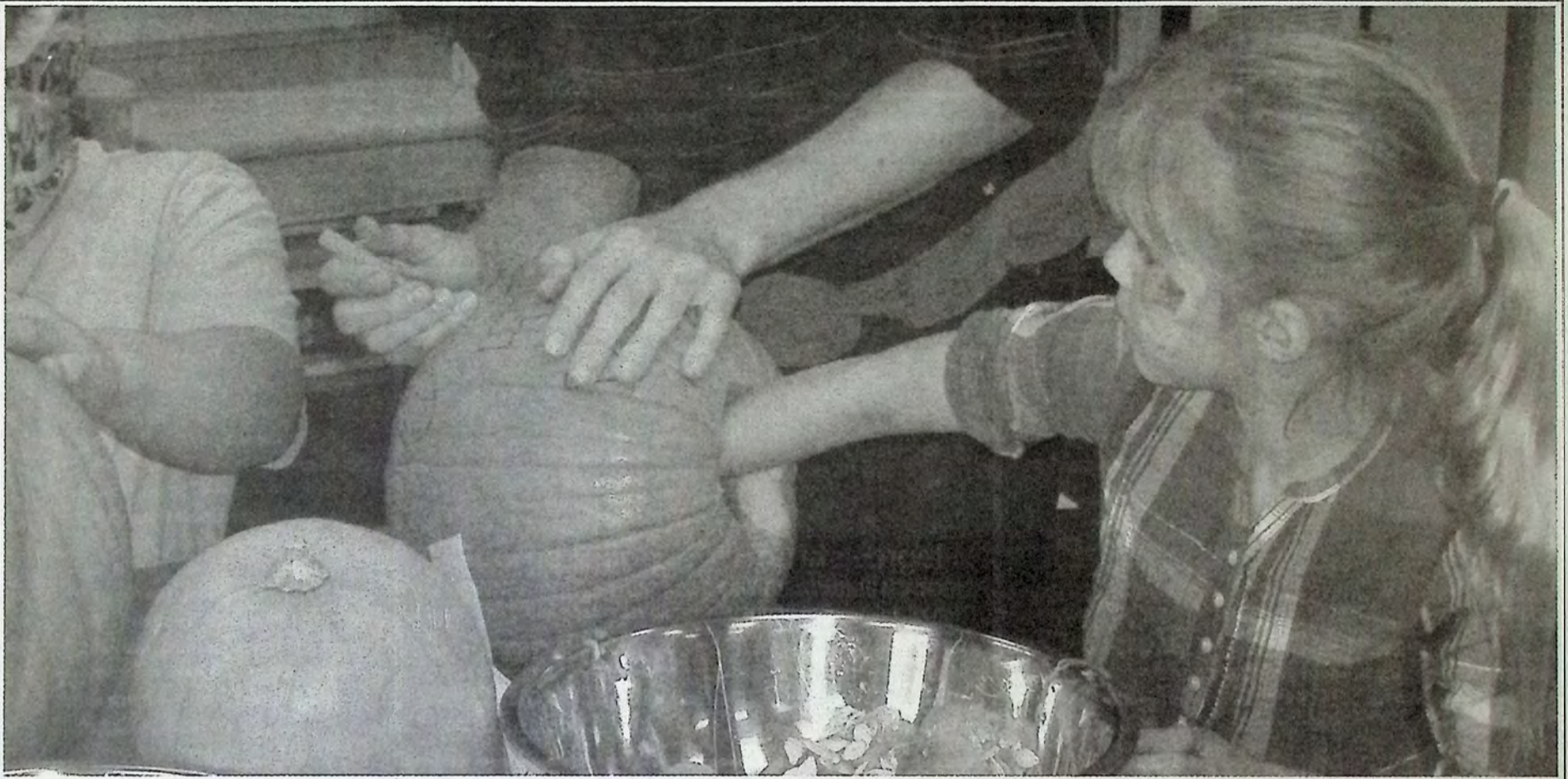

One of them was with a local business owner and the other was with a well-paid municipal employee. The contrasts were great when comparing the content of both but the messages were clear.

The local business owner I'm going to call X and the municipal employee I'm going to call Y. X

told me the past twelve months have been a huge struggle. X owns a small business that has some seasonal clientele along with a steady flow of regular customers. I think that's a fairly typical description of most of the local businesses in the community. X was worried about what the future would bring and shared with me a fear of possibly having to close the family business if things don't turn around.

"We're barely hanging on," was what X said about 2015.

This is not the first time I have heard this story, nor has it been from the same source. There are a number of local businesses hurting and hurting bad. In fact, a hot rumour I heard last week was that there is a very good chance that there will be another empty storefront in the downtown core as I hear business owner Z is considering "pulling the pin" if there isn't a big change sometime soon.

The conversation I had last week with municipal employee Y had to do with fair pricing of products and in this particular case, pricing of the services we provide at this newspaper. Y was doing some comparison shopping and pointed out my prices were what Y considered "non-competitive."

The gist of the conversation revolved around a desire of Y to be fair and pricing was the deciding factor. We came to a place where compromise resulted in an under-

standing and I think I can say my level of fairness was acceptable within the limits of the budget available and a deal was struck.

The two conversations made me think about what is considered fair in what appears to be a lagging economy. I know that neither store-owner X nor I can afford to give away our inventory. When we do that we suffer even more because it makes digging out of a hole of debt even more difficult.

The other side of the coin is municipal employee Y who is trying to save a few bucks while shopping for a deal for services. I do the same thing when shopping for commodities but I have little success when I tell places like Fortis and Telus that I think their rates are too high.

It really makes me wonder what local consumers consider fair and what is being used to measure that fairness. I think we all know that

you can very likely save some money shopping at a big box store versus a family-owned corner store. But is that fair because the comparison isn't?

Big Box Store A can purchase the item at a far lower price because the entire chain of stores under the same banner can buy in volume and pass the savings on to you. Corner Store B can't buy nearly as much for various reasons ranging from cash flow to storage and therefore can't get as good a deal. The price you pay for the same item will be higher as a result.

Because consumers are looking for the better deal they just start taking away the money they used to spend at the local corner store and spend it at the bigger box store, which is often located out of town. This hurts the local economy and actually does not drive local prices down. It actually does the opposite .....continued on Page 20

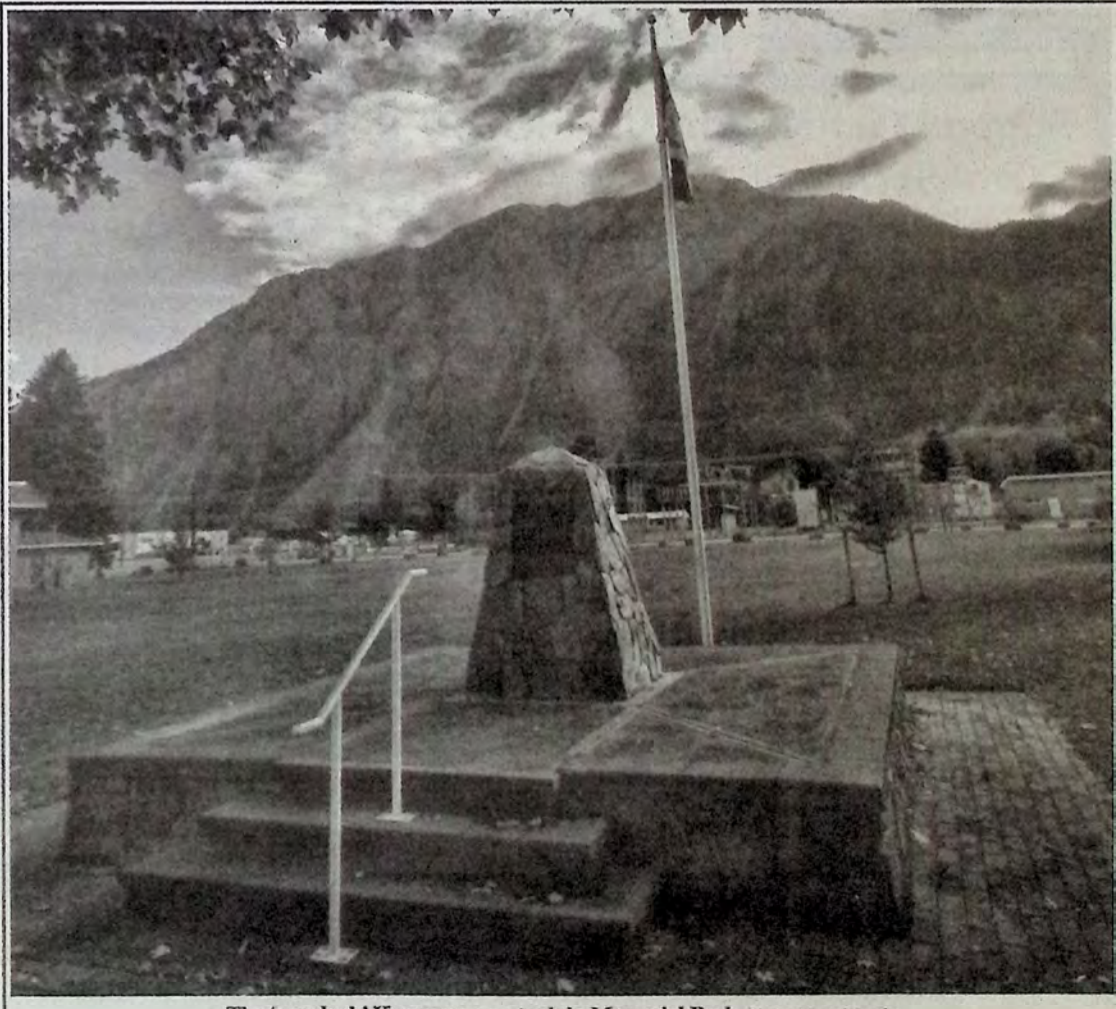
