Council approves elevator contract

Town Council awarded the contract for the supply and installation of an elevator at the Town Hall during their November 2nd regular

monthly meeting. The contract will total \$79,800 plus GST and went to Thyssen Krupp Elevators, Ltd.

The elevator will provide access to the second floor of the Town Hall building on Vermilion Avenue for everyone in the community. It also means Town Council will be able to hold their regular meetings in the Town Hall building instead of the library conference room.

Town Council has been aiming at making the Town Hall fully accessible since renovating the building in 2013. The elevator is expected to be complete in about sixteen weeks.

In her report to Town Council, Director of Finance Shirley McMahon explains, "Users will enter the elevator from within the building and will ride up the outside of the building to the second floor."

There was only one other quote submitted for the job. It was from Kone and totaled \$101,300. The Otis Company did not respond to the request for a quote.

Details will be taken care of to match the elevator with the rest of the existing building decor.

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Council releases financials

The Third Quarter Financial Statements for the Town of Princeton were released at the November 2nd regular monthly meeting of Town Council. In the words of Director of Finance, Shirley McMahon, the documents are used to "assist with strategic planning and to monitor the overall financial well being of the municipality."

The overall picture is quite good with a slight surplus at the end of this quarter resulting from the end of the taxation cycle. McMahon says that this is typical as taxation is the primary source of revenue for the Town of Princeton. The final quarter of the year will likely absorb part of that

surplus, as there are three months of normal expenses left to include.

The Town of Princeton has contributed a total of \$59,828.00 to local clubs, groups and organizations, which was just marginally higher than had been budgeted for the first three quarters of the year.

The grants went to: Princeton Arts Council (\$5,000), Princeton Posse (\$15,000), Princeton Fall Fair Association (\$4,500), Princeton Museum & Archives (\$26,000), Princeton Hospital Auxiliary (\$750), Princeton Youth Ambassadors (\$500), Princeton Traditional Music Festival (\$2,000), Halloween Family Fun Night (\$2,000), Kokanee Swim

Club (\$2,000), Princeton Rodeo Club (\$2,000) with an additional \$78.00 going to fund t-shirts for the Princeton Terry Fox Run Volunteers.

So far this year Town Council expenses totaled \$37,945.19. The detailed breakdown for 'Council Expenses' includes Meeting Expenses (\$2,163.95), Civic Celebrations (\$2,256.50), Gifts/Cards (\$465.29), Princeton Health Coalition Contribution (\$7,500), Friends of the Similkameen Contribution (\$100), Volunteer Recognition (\$236.65) and Repairs to the old fire truck (\$5,179.35). The breakdown for 'Travel and Conference Expenses' includes Mayor Armitage (\$3,932.57), Councillor Doughty (\$4,192.96), Councillor Maynard (\$5,120.09), Councillor Pateman (\$3,779.58) and Councillor Tjerkstra (\$3,018.25).

The Princeton Municipal Campground continues to turn a

profit. The 2015 Financial Statement shows total revenue for the year at \$71,995.12 and expenses at \$59,249.45 leaving a profit of \$12,745.67.

Centennial Pool showed a loss of \$43,304.65, which was far less than the projected loss of \$81,473.00. Repairs to the facility and lower wage costs contributed to the better than expected cost. The pool generated revenue of \$23,918.19 and had expenses totaling \$67,222.84 with salaries and wages the largest chunk of that coming in at \$49,591.65.

The new Visitor Centre produced revenue to date of \$16,738.94, including a grant of \$11,290.63. Expenses totaled \$41,722.26 with salaries and benefits coming in at \$27,502.18. The cost of the renovations of the former Town Hall to become a new Visitors Centre was \$107,015.45, which was higher than the budgeted \$75,000.

Ottawa is once again a hub of activity as Members of Parliament have arrived in our capital and for a few days many departing and retiring MP's will also be in attendance as the changeover occurs. The 42nd Parliament is so far a very demanding one on House administration as there are over 200 newly elected rookie MP's that will require offices, staff, orientation and training that can lead to delays in getting up and running. Also occurring this past week was the official swearing in ceremony for our incoming Prime Minister at Rideau Hall along with the traditional swearing in of the new cabinet.

The new Liberal cabinet at 31 members is smaller than the 39 member cabinet that was announced after the 2011 election by our former Prime Minister. The new cabinet also follows a gender parity policy mandated by the Liberals, so there are fifteen women and 15 men in the new cabinet. If you are wondering why the math does not add up to 31 members, it is due to Prime Minister Trudeau naming himself as a Minister for Intergovernmental Affairs and Youth in his cabinet.

My thoughts? While it is somewhat

customary for opposition members to criticize a newly appointed cabinet, I will largely refrain. For any newly elected Premier or Prime Minister, it is always a challenging task to select a cabinet where there are so many different variables that must be taken into consideration and compromises are not always popular. On a local level I have heard some complaints that British Columbia has just three cabinet seats compared to Ontario and Quebec that have 18 seats combined; however I would caution that the appointment of Parliamentary Secretaries have yet to be announced by Prime Minister Trudeau and I believe there is a good chance one or more will end up in British Columbia and may likely include our new Kelowna-Lake Country MP Steven Fuhr.

I would also like to congratulate our new Ministers who are from British Columbia that include Minister of Justice and Attorney General of Canada Jody Wilson-Raybould, Minister of National Defence Harjit Singh Sajjan and Minister of Sport and Persons with Disabilities Carla Qualtrough, all from the Lower Mainland. A criticism I do have of the

new cabinet is that one of the portfolio's that was eliminated to achieve a smaller cabinet means there is no longer a Minister of State for Seniors and this is also a concern I will share in Ottawa.

Finally the Official Opposition is currently meeting and it is expected will name a new interim leader shortly that in turn will lead to the announcement of a shadow cabinet of official critics. The third party NDP is also meeting this week and is also expected to announce its own shadow critic line up shortly.

Hopefully by the time you read this week's MP report the Liberal Government will announce the date when Parliament will be recalled for an expected throne speech. My expectation is that this will occur in early December however this date has yet to be confirmed.

Make sure you and your vehicle are ready for winter

That familiar nip is in the air, which

means winter is on its way.

Is your vehicle ready?

Winter tire rules are now in effect in the Princeton area. Since October 1, motorists must equip their vehicles with winter tires if they're travelling in certain areas of the province, including the Interior.

I want everyone to be well prepared as they set out for driving this fall and winter. This means getting your vehicle winter ready, and remembering to always drive to the road conditions.

Winter tires have been defined as those labelled with either the Mountain Snowflake symbol or the Mud and Snow (M+S) symbol. Winter tires must be in good condition with a minimum tread depth of 3.5 mm.

Drivers who do not have the proper winter tires on their vehicle on the designated routes can receive a fine of \$121. Drivers who do not have the minimum tread depth on their tires (3.5 mm) on the designated routes can receive a fine of \$109.

Winter tires improve safety by providing better traction in snow, slush and icy conditions - which can happen at any time around Princeton at this time of year. Drivers are also reminded to check tire air pressure frequently, because it decreases in cold weather.

Commercial vehicles that are 27,000 kg gross volume weight (GVW) and greater, such as tractor trailers, are

required to carry chains on the designated routes. The Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure recommends that commercial vehicle drivers carry chains at all times.

In addition to winter tires, here are some more tips for safe winter driving:

- Get your vehicle ready for winter in the fall.
- Wear your seatbelt.
- Drive to the road conditions - during times of bad weather or limited visibility, slow down.
- Learn and practise winter driving techniques before you need them.
- Don't drive under the influence.
- Keep your gas tank topped up.
- Pack an emergency kit.
- Plan your trip and tell your friends and family.
- Check road and weather conditions on DriveBC.
- Remove all snow from your vehicle before each trip.
- Give yourself extra travel time in bad weather.
- Avoid using overdrive and cruise control on slippery roads.
- Travel with a fully charged cell-phone for emergency situations.

Winter in the Princeton area is magical, but it can also be dangerous on the roads. Having proper tires, planning ahead and driving according to road conditions will help keep you safe when driving in tough winter conditions. Please drive carefully!

Flip Of The Coyne

Being born in the late 1970's and growing up in the 80s and 90s, war was something that you saw in the movies. My great grandfather was a veteran of the trenches of Europe with the British Army. Unfortunately, I never got to meet my great grandfather. He died before I was born. I only have the stories that my dad shared with me. My granddad on my mother's side was with the United States Marine Corps and fought in the Pacific Theatre in the Second World War. He never talked to us kids about the war. For the most part, the two World Wars were something I learned about in textbooks. Over the years I met other veterans, all sharing just a little bit of their own experiences. From people who lived in occupied territories or those who fought, the stories have always been something I cherished. I knew how hard it was for my own grand dad to talk about it, so for people to tell me about their experiences was special.

Luckily in the years I was growing up we never saw major wars unfold. We had the first Gulf War, but for most of us it was more of a television spectacle than a real war. I was too young to remember the

Falklands and Grenada. All I can really tell you about Grenada is that Clint Eastwood made a terrible movie about it. The Invasion of Panama didn't even register with my peer-group. It wasn't until Iraq invaded Kuwait in 1990 that war hit home for me and most people my age. We grew up watching Vietnam War movies and the old World War II films, but in 1990 the war was on our televisions in real time. We didn't know what to expect as Saddam Hussein was a maniac who could unleash chemical weapons on anyone in the region at any moment. There was a real fear in the air. I am old enough to remember adults being afraid of the Soviets during the Cold War, and this was the first time since the fall of Berlin Wall

that I noticed people afraid of someone overseas.

When I was in university, the conflict in the former Yugoslavia became real when one of my friends in the Armoured Reserves in Kelowna shipped out. He was the first person of my own age that I knew who would go overseas with the blue helmet of the UN. There were a few other Princeton guys who were older than me who went, but this time it was different. It was someone I saw and interacted with daily. He was a roommate in the dorms and he was shipping off to war. As the years passed he and other friends would volunteer or be deployed to Afghanistan. My grandfathers who fought in the World Wars had always been my heroes,

but now I had a new list of heroes made of the guys I called friends and they were now answering the call of their nation.

I could never understand during the war in Afghanistan why people would feel it important to make a comment about my 'Support the Troops' magnet on my car. It was stolen a few times. I had complete strangers come up to me and make negative or insulting comments about my 'support' of the war. I would always respond the same, "I don't care if you support the mis-

sion, the war or the government, until there is not one person I know there. I will support the troops until the end." Those were my friends fighting, and thankfully they all came back, but not all of their team members did. My step brother was supposed to go with the US Marine Corps to Iraq, but he was medically discharged before deployment and many of his friends never came back. War is a politically charged topic, but one thing that we cannot escape is that those men andcontinued on Page 10

More Than Just Facial Hair

I haven't spoken out about this, choosing to keep this mostly to myself but this month I think I need to say something. I'm talking about cancer and prostate cancer in particular. November has been known in recent years as 'Movember' and has become a fundraising month just as October has been for Breast Cancer.

Cancer is one of those things that have always been foreign to me. I've known people who have won and lost their personal battles with just about any form of the disease, but it never made an appearance in our family.

Then one day a few months ago I received a phone call at home from my younger brother. He had been diagnosed with prostate cancer and urged me to get checked out immediately. As the elder sibling in our family I was not only shocked, I got a bit worried. I hadn't seen a doctor in years. I became one of those local "I-don't-have-a-family-doctor" patients in Princeton days after Dr. Adams retired.

I started to wonder if possibly I had a slow ticking cancer time bomb hidden in my body so I did what anyone in my situation would do - I turned to the internet and did tons of research. It didn't really help much at all.

Since I was in need of a doctor this was as good a time as any to shop around. Of course, there were no openings anywhere in the Similkameen and I ended up finding a doctor in Merritt. As much as I did not want to go out of town for a doctor, I had no choice and accepted the situation.

During this time my brother went through a radical operation to remove tumours and whatnot. It did not sound like anything I'd want to experience so I was slightly relieved when I finally had an appointment booked in Merritt.

That appointment resulting in a variety of tests on fluids removed from my body and a follow-up appointment. By this time my brother had a relapse after going back to work too soon. The last I heard was he was back recovering and my test results were pretty good.

This November is the first time I've looked at 'Movember' with a different perspective. The testing is far from difficult. For me it was sample of blood and a fecal smear. The physical exam was quick and far from as uncomfortable as I imagined. Combined, both took just minutes.

I think the whole 'Movember' movement is intended to take away some of the fear and to 'macho up' something that some men are embarrassed to discuss or have examined. In my case I was more or less pushed into the check-ups because of a direct blood relative having a positive result. That alone increased my chances of contracting the disease.

In discussions with my doctor he also determined that the very different lifestyle of mine compared to my brother may have helped in my case. I don't smoke and I haven't had any kind of alcohol for well over ten years. There are other factors, too.

The bottom line is that if 'Movember' makes you think you should get a check-up...maybe you should quit ignoring that voice and just do it.

Community Success Depends on Younger Folk

The community Halloween party was a success again this year, thanks to six people who constructed the spook house and a few others who contributed their time and effort to entertain the children during the event. Parents in great numbers brought their children to the Halloween party, but there was a noticeable lack of parent participation in both the construction portion of the event and the clean-up the next day. This is not the first time this has occurred. In fact, it is the pattern.

It may not be possible for a lot of parents to be part of the construction before the event. It is entirely possible for parents to go with their children for the clean-up the next day. I believe it would be good for the children to help clean up and put away all of the props that go into the spook house construction. They would see how their scary experience was rigged and learn how many of the things that frighten us most at night are not at all frightening during the day. (That's a life lesson for all of us!)

The Halloween party is a genuine community event. It is host-

ed by the Rodeo Club, the food in the concession is provided by the Rodeo Club and Fall Fair, the grounds are donated by the PXA, and Weyerhaeuser and other local industries contribute materials. The Halloween party is financed by the Town and a number of local businesses. The volunteers of the Fire Department make sure the bonfire is guarded.

The fireworks display is very expensive, and those goody bags the children receive are a cost item. This Halloween party could not take place if the community had to pay for the hours of work that go into constructing and removing the spook house and activity centers.

I feel free to criticize parents who do not help because I am one of the people who turns out every year to help clean up after the event. I am 76 years old, my children and grandchildren are too old to go to a spook house. My great-grandchildren would go if they lived here, so I am not doing it for them. I am not the only old-timer out there helping. What bothers me most is the lack of participation by those who benefit most: the parents of the school-age children for whom the party is put on.

The success of our community depends on the participation of people younger than I, but there seems to be an unwillingness to give back to the community in some age groups. I have watched the Lions Club die due to lack of younger members. The Elks Lodge has gone the same way. The Halloween party very nearly did not happen this year for the same reason.

I know many parents are busy with their children in activities, but surely not all of them are too

busy to give a few hours to this community project for children.

The lack of volunteers these days is an old story often repeated in every group trying to do something for the community. Even in groups with a high membership list, there are usually just a few who will volunteer to do the work. This is a contradiction, because it is the work they do that makes the difference! If everybody joined groups just to be there and do nothing, nothing would happen.

I went to the Rodeo Club annual general meeting and a handful of people showed up. I had thought, after all the controversy in August about the demolition derby using the rodeo arena, there would be many people there to support the goals of the Rodeo Club. No, they were not there. I guess they just wanted to kick up a fuss in August but not volunteer to do the work of planning and creating next year's rodeo.

What we do for our community, creating events that provide entertainment, meet certain needs, and develop community assets like the trails, parks and recreational facilities, provide us with added quality of life for our community. For example, the Royal Canadian Legion members arrange Remembrance Day services, but they do much more than that. They have been quiet sponsors and participants in many community projects, such as housing for seniors, or sponsoring students or sports activities for young people. Their members work hard to make money, and their work pays off to provide funding for quite an extensive array of benefits to the community. Even the building they maintain is used for all kinds of community activities, from banquets to memorial services to wedding receptions and elections.

The Vermilion Trails Society works to provide a recreational facility. Princeton Minor Hockey Association works to keep children fit and provide us with sports entertainment. Every group does something to benefit the community, and every group needs volunteers. Without the participation of members and volunteers, these groups will die, and our community will lose.

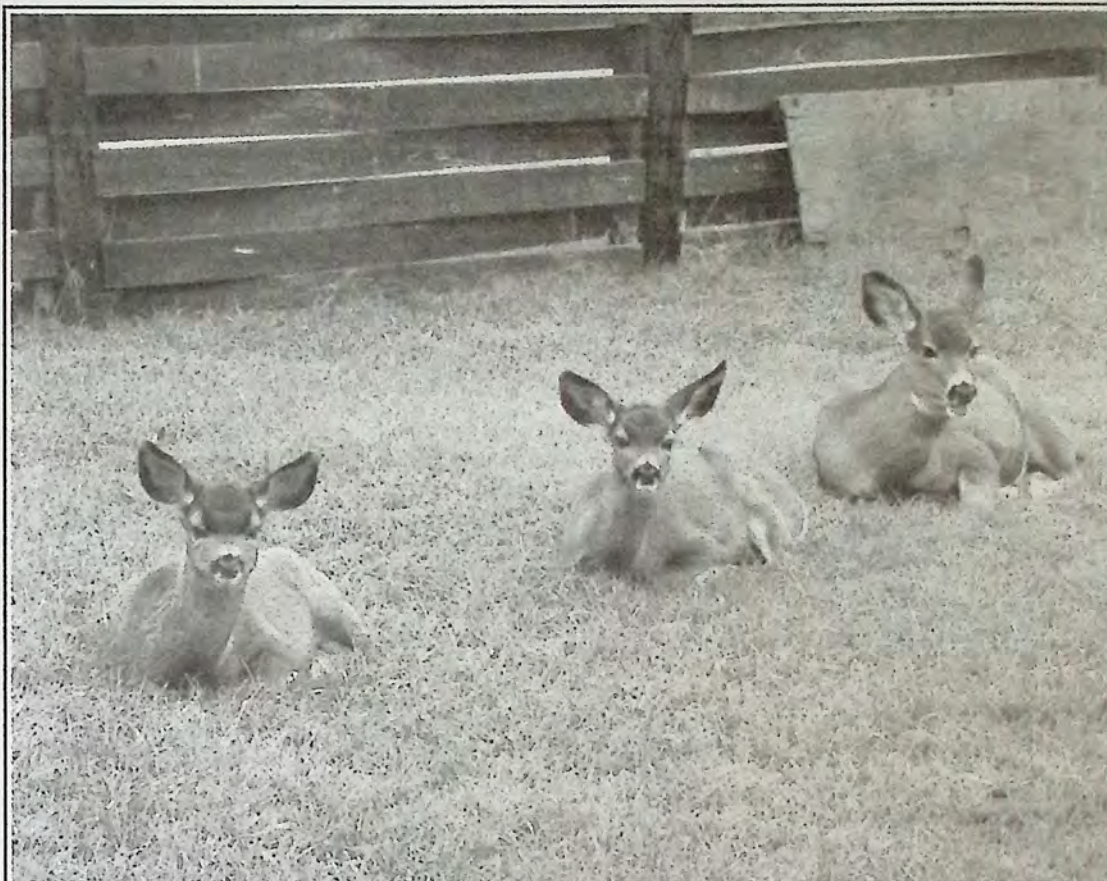

Council approves truck purchase

The Town of Princeton will soon own a "new to us" piece of equipment that will assist with annual sewer system maintenance. The 2001 Vector Combination Catch Basin Sewer Cleaner is essentially a vacuum truck.

The \$80,000 purchase was approved at the November 2nd regular monthly meeting of Princeton Town Council. In explaining the need for such a piece of equipment, Director of Finance Shirley McMahon reported that in order for the municipality to maintain the 20+ kilometres of sewer lines they service an annual flushing program is conducted. This mandated process includes an annual inspection.

"The Town has historically sub-contracted this annual sewer flushing program at a cost of over \$25,000 each year as we do not

have the equipment required," McMahon states in her report to Council.

The process involves a high-pressure nozzle that is used to flush water down the sewer and dirt/debris is collected by a vacuum truck from a manhole and transported to the Princeton landfill site.

"Only a part of the town can be flushed each year due to financial constraints and means that some areas are long overdue for maintenance," she adds.

The new vacuum truck will allow the Town to service existing infrastructure more efficiently.

Public Works Manager Kevin Huey indicated to Council that the cost of a new vacuum truck was in the \$375,000 to \$400,000 range and that this unit was just retired by the District of Campbell River as they upgraded their equipment and

is described by the Campbell River head mechanic as being in "excellent condition."

Mouldy Leaves and Compost Can Kill Pets

Have you picked up the leaves from your trees this fall? If they are still scattered or piled in the yard, your pets are a risk of becoming sick. As the leaves compost, fungi (commonly known as mould) begin to grow in the pile. While they grow, certain species of moulds/fungi produce toxins called mycotoxins ('myco' = mould) that can harm your pets. Of course dogs are more likely to eat rotten leaves than cats but cats can ingest a toxic amount even from licking themselves clean.

As it cools off, we begin to not worry less about mycotoxins because moulds become dormant at low temperatures. The temperature we feel outside however, isn't the temperature inside the pile of composting leaves. As bacteria, moulds and fungi digest the plant material they produce heat, keeping the pile of leaves warmer than it is outside. Because of this, mycotoxins produced by fungi can still infect your pets until the pile of leaves is completely frozen for a few days. If at any time it warms up, the fungi can wake and produce more

toxins.

Not all fungi produce damaging toxins, only certain species in the Aspergillus, Penicillium and Fusarium families. Each mould produces its own toxin that affects our pets in a unique way. The severity of the toxin not only depends on the type but also the dose your pet absorbs, age of your pet and any other stresses your pet might be experiencing. These stresses can include disease and nutritional imbalances.

Early signs of mycotoxin ingestion, which can also be caused by other toxins or diseases, including: vomiting, diarrhea, and convulsions. Even if your pet survives the initial signs without treatment, the toxins can have serious delayed effects. These late signs depend on the toxin and dose, ranging from liver failure to brain damage and death. In some cases, they can be carcinogenic (cancer causing) as well.

Given the long-term damage that mycotoxins can cause, as well as the immediate risk of death, preventing our pets from getting into these moulds is extremely important. First,

clean up any leaves and grass clippings around the yard and throw them away. If you compost for your garden, which is a great way to save money and is good for the earth by the way, keep it in pet proof containers or fence the area off.

If your pet does ingest these toxins, treatment depends on the symptoms. I cannot stress how important it is to promptly have your pet seen by a veterinarian if you suspect they have eaten rotten leaves or show any of the early signs. If caught early and the pet hasn't vomited, we can induce vomiting and reduce the dose of toxins your pet absorbs. More often, our pets are vomiting by the time we realize what they got into. At this point, treatment consists of supportive care and preventing other possible complications such as liver or kidney disease.

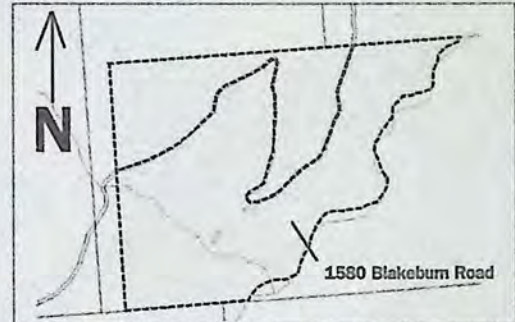

The Anti-Cancer Diet

A diet that helps prevent cancer and helps shrink tumors in those undergoing cancer treatment is called the 'ketogenic' diet. This diet is based on the action of ketones, a substance released from fat cells when they break down through weight loss. Medical researchers have discovered these ketones function as an anti-cancer agent. Cancer cells are broken down, sometimes committing suicide, in the presence of ketones.

As a cancer prevention measure, the ketogenic diet focuses on getting rid of carbohydrates in your daily diet. Carbohydrates are sugars and starches. This means cutting out things like candy, potatoes, breads, soft drinks, alcohol and a number of high carbohydrate foods. What is surprising about this diet is that it is a meat eaters diet that does not worry at all about saturated fats. On this diet, you could have bacon (not sugar-cured) and eggs for breakfast, but you would leave out the toast. You can put butter on your vegetables, but not margarine. You can soak your salad with olive oil, but not hydrogenated oil (oil that has been cooked). You can eat fish, but not deep fried fish and chips.

The purpose of the diet is to cut down inflammatory foods. Top-ranking good foods are those that grow above ground, such as lettuce, Swiss chard, parsley, cucumbers, zucchini, tomatoes and so on. Those vegetables to be eaten in moderation are those with a lot of starch, such as potatoes, winter squash, and yams. These are vegetables which contain not only starches, but the kinds of starch that convert quickly to sugar in the bloodstream. Sugar in the bloodstream is considered a leading cause of inflammation.

The ketogenic diet allows nuts in moderation, and dairy products in moderation.

This diet is being used to treat diabetes, Alzheimer's, and other conditions, but it is not for everyone. Those having certain nutritional deficiencies, people with kidney, gall bladder or liver problems, and a number of other conditions, should not go on a strict ketogenic diet. Nobody should go on a strict ketogenic diet without first consulting a physician.

While a strict ketogenic diet can be harmful to a variety of people, a moderate ketogenic diet can be beneficial to those who are overweight. In the process of losing weight, the benefits of ketones will come into play within the body. Those who suffer from inflammatory illnesses will benefit from the reduction in blood sugar levels. However, use common sense when going on a low carbohydrate diet, as low blood sugar can cause dizziness and fainting. The important thing is to get your carbohydrates through vegetable sources, not through candy, cookies, bread, and foods with high sugar content.

The second period saw

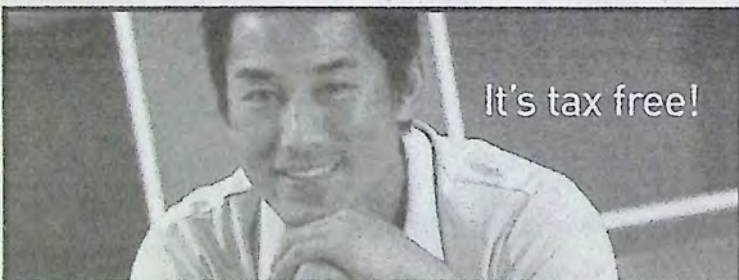
Summerland pelt the Posse net with 14 shots to Princeton's four and the Steam added more stats on the scoreboard as a result.

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Hockey action behind the play during the October 31st game against Summerland. Photo: Bob Marsh Photography

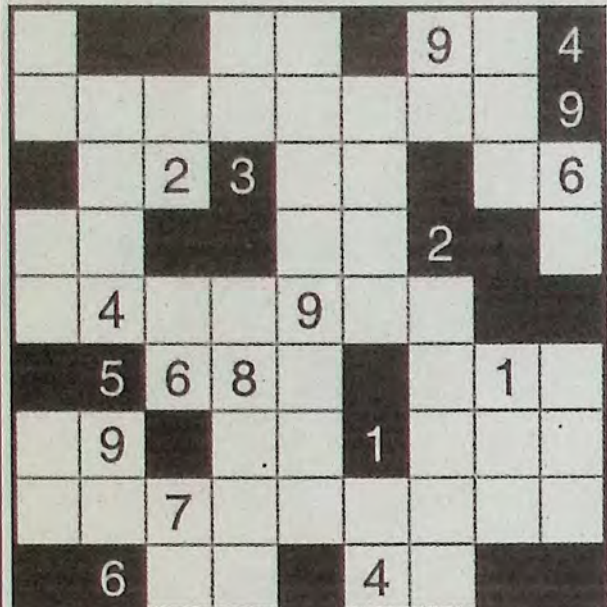

Notice of Alternative Approval Process

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN pursuant to Section 86 of the Community Charter, that the Board of Directors of the Regional District of Okanagan-Similkameen seek the approval of the electors within the boundaries of Tulameen Fire Prevention and Suppression Service Area of the Regional District for the adoption of Tulameen Fire Truck Acquisition Loan Authorization Bylaw No. 2704, 2015.

In general terms, the bylaw is to authorize the borrowing upon the credit of the Regional District a sum not more than two hundred thirty thousand dollars (\$2230,000) for the purpose of acquiring and have installed all such materials as may be requisite or desirable in connection with the purchase of a fire truck in and for the Tulameen Fire Prevention and Suppression Service Area.

The alternative approval process applies to qualified electors within the Tulameen Fire Prevention and Suppression Service Area.

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE that the Regional District may proceed with the approval of Tulameen Fire Truck Acquisition Loan Authorization Bylaw No. 2704, 2015 unless at least ten percent (10%) of the qualified electors (those meeting the criteria below) within the Tulameen Fire Prevention and Suppression Service Area indicate their opposition by signing the Elector Response Form.

The Regional District has estimated the total number of qualified electors in the service area to be 963 and that 10% of that number, or 96 qualified electors, must submit signed Elector Response Forms to prevent the Regional District from adopting the bylaw without the full assent of the electors by referendum.

An elector response form must be in the form established by the Regional District. Elector Response Forms are available from the Regional District office, including by mail, fax, or email, on request or on the Regional District website at www.rdos.bc.ca.

The deadline for delivering the original signed Elector Response Form to the Regional District is 4:30 pm on December 21, 2015.

The only persons entitled to sign an Elector Response Form are those who meet the following criteria:

- Resident electors must:**
- (a) be 18 years of age or older;
 - (b) be a Canadian citizen;
 - (c) be a resident of British Columbia, for at least 6 months;
 - (d) be a resident of the Tulameen Fire Prevention and Suppression Service Area for at least 30 days; and
 - (e) not be disqualified by a Provincial enactment, or otherwise disqualified by law, from voting in an election.
- Non-Resident property electors must:**
- (a) not be entitled to register as a resident elector of the Tulameen Fire Prevention and Suppression Service Area;
 - (b) be 18 years of age or older;
 - (c) be a Canadian citizen;
 - (d) be a resident of British Columbia, for at least 6 months;
 - (e) be a registered owner of real property in the jurisdiction for at least 30 days;
 - (f) not be disqualified by any Provincial enactment or otherwise disqualified by law, from voting in an election; and
 - (g) only register as a non-resident property elector in relation to one parcel of real property in a jurisdiction.

Saving Downtown Princeton...

The annual Christmas Light-Up is coming to Princeton but this year there will be a twist. It will be the first time that the event has been planned by the Town of Princeton.

In case you were not aware of this, the Town of Princeton assumed all tourism promotion and activities earlier this year when they essentially removed those things from the Chamber of Commerce. The first visible step towards the 'split' was in the renovations of the former Town Hall building on Bridge

Street into the new Town of Princeton-operated Visitor Centre. The next event handled under this new arrangement was the Town of Princeton-organized Canada Day Celebration.

I have been a huge supporter of this change for a variety of reasons. The Town of Princeton has the resources available to put these things on and make them a bigger part of the community than the Chamber of Commerce ever could. Don't get me wrong, the Chamber

did fine when they organized these events, but did not have the resources the Town has to pull off a bigger and better show.

The Christmas Light-Up, set for November 28th, will see the Town of Princeton host probably one of their bigger annual events. The Chamber of Commerce will be involved with their usual Passport shopping program and that's a good thing. When you look at the event in the eyes of a planner it makes a lot more sense to be organized in this fashion.

The Town of Princeton handles the part where they host an event to attract residents to the downtown core. It takes various elements to attract that attention which will include Santa Claus and whatever else they decide will get you outside and downtown on a chilly November Saturday night.

With people now downtown they need things to do in addition to

singing carols, visiting with Santa and drinking hot chocolate. This is where the Chamber of Commerce fits in. Their job is to encourage their members and all other business owners to provide some sort of incentive to the potential customers drawn downtown on that chilly November Saturday night. The Passport program gets shoppers moving in and around the downtown core.

When you take a different look at the event you see there are really just two elements in play: the magnet and the opportunity. The magnet is whatever is used to attract people downtown. The opportunity is whatever merchants use to draw those people into their businesses. The same simple concept can be used time and time again with different events and activities. What makes it work best is when the organizers work together for the same goal.

In the case of the upcoming Christmas Light-Up I see the start of a really productive relationship between the Town of Princeton and Chamber of Commerce. I think in matters related to driving people downtown to support local business this kind of relationship can work very well.

But as I've also said many times before, the Chamber and Town need to be viewed as very different players in a number of different situations. When it comes to the advocacy role the Chamber will have to play at one point, the relationship with the Town will have to change slightly. Much as two friends will get along most times and disagree at other times, I see a real strong working and building relationship potential between the Town and Chamber.

The Village of Keremeos has entered into an agreement with Cantex Okanagan to make winter road sand as well as recycle old concrete and asphalt they have been storing near the Skateboard Park. According to Public Works Foreman Jordy Bosscha, "This will stockpile at least five plus years of road sand that we will not have to buy in the winter and also provide crushed road base that can be spread to upgrade non-paved roads in the Village." Before crushing old concrete, all metal and rebar must be removed from the concrete. The concrete is broken into approximately one-foot chunks before processing. Paul Carey, General Manager of Cantex commented, "When crushing concrete we may end up applying magnets to the concrete before and during processing to remove wayward metals. Society provides caregivers with relief

Asking for help is never easy for most people. But for the increasing number of Similkameen Valley residents caring for a family member with Alzheimer's disease or another dementia, it's essential.

"You really can't support your family member by yourself," says Laurie Myres, regional Education & Support coordinator for the non-profit Alzheimer Society of B.C.

for the South Okanagan and Similkameen.

The Society makes it easier for caregivers who need help by running free local support and information groups. Participants meet monthly to share practical tips and strategies for living with dementia.

"They create support and friendship with others whose lives are affected by dementia," says Myres.

Participants receive much-needed emotional support.

"It's a safe environment where you can learn, laugh, and help each other through mutual understanding."

The group serves people who want current information that will help improve quality of life for themselves and their family member.

In addition to joining the support and information group, she says, caregivers can think about some of these strategies to take care of themselves too:

- Staying fit
Activity is key for physical and mental health. Walking or any other exercise helps. So does healthy eating.

- Making time for yourself
Take some time regularly for activities that you enjoy. You'll likely have to arrange for someone else to be with your family member, so plan ahead.

- Creating a sanctuary
Since the demands of caregiving sometimes make it difficult to leave your home, designate a room in the house as your quiet space. Spend a few minutes there each

day, away from the demands of your life.

- Accepting help
This can be as difficult as asking for help. But it's important. Whenever family and friends offer you assistance, take them up on it.

I think moving it to the end of November (which has been tried before) is one of the biggest positive moves to help develop an event for greater success in the local market. With the Town of Princeton organizing this event now, it has the support of more than just a small membership-driven organization. That extra support creates the

foundation that other groups can use to build upon, such as the Chamber with their Passport shopping program.

Anything that gets people into the downtown core at hours not normally considered 'prime shopping time' also presents a lot of opportunity for local businesses to capitalize on with deals and specials. It all works together to bolster the local economy.

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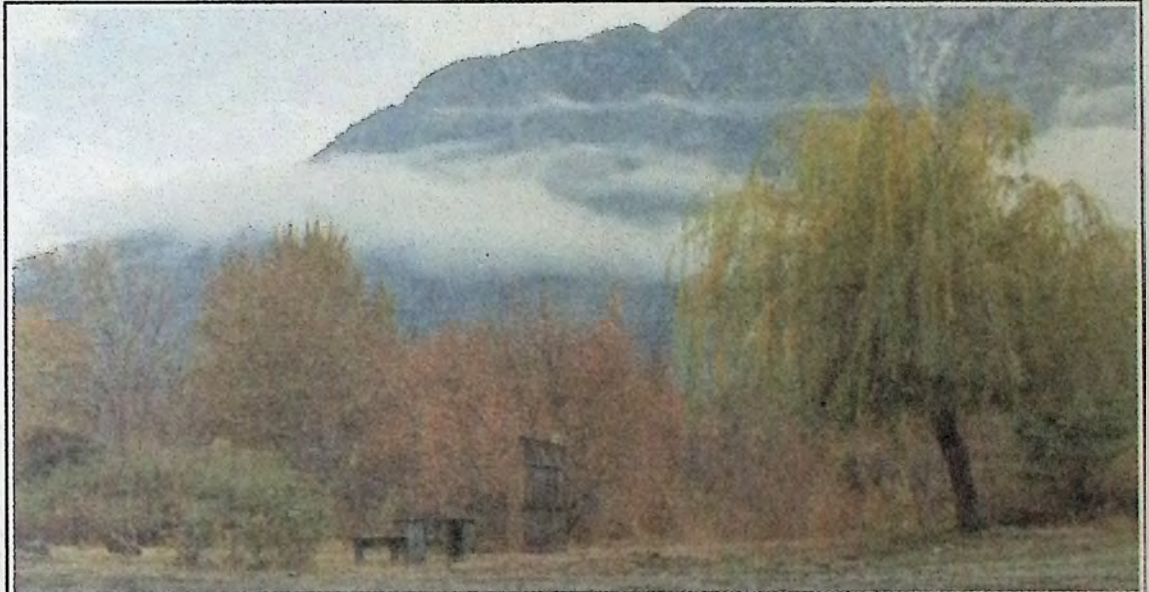
