ORV update

On Thursday, November 5 the Tulameen Community Club held a General Meeting in the Town Hall. In attendance was Sgt. Barry Kennedy of the Princeton RCMP and Sandra Boltz, Branch Manager for Westland Insurance. They fielded questions regarding the new laws for off road vehicles (ORVs). Sgt. Kennedy stressed that the new registration was mainly put in place to curb the number of ORV thefts. He stated there is a big industry in

stealing ATV's and snowmobiles. The registration is mandatory as of November 1, 2015. It is not required if a vehicle is used ONLY on private land; however, Sgt. Kennedy advised to get it in case a vehicle was stolen. Registration will help identify it and return it to the rightful owner should it be recovered.

The new regulations state acceptable, standard helmets MUST be worn when driving or riding on an off road vehicle. If the quad has seatbelts, they must also be worn. Lights must be used in low visibility conditions and 30-minutes before sunrise and 30-minutes after sunset.

Children are permitted to drive on Crown land but must be supervised and be riding an appropriately sized ORV.

There are two different types of ORV plates: red and blue. Red plates are restricted to farming, law enforcement, highway maintenance and snow ploughing. No permits are needed to cross highways or travel on highways within 100 m of where the driver is going.

Blue plates (what most will have) require special permits. Permits are needed for EACH crossing and for EACH ORV. Permits can only be issued by the RCMP of the appropriate jurisdiction where the ORV will be travelling (in this area that is the Princeton RCMP office). ORVscontinued on Page 7

CMMC announces Q3 results

Copper Mountain Mining Corporation (TSX: CUM) (the "Company" or "Copper Mountain") announced November 9th third quarter revenues of \$63.7 million after pricing adjustments and treatment charges from the sale of 21.9 million pounds of copper, 7,800 ounces of gold, and 65,300 ounces of silver. Total cash cost for the quarter ended September 30, 2015 was US\$1.72 per pound of copper sold, net of precious metals credits.

Highlights (100% Basis)

- Copper, gold and silver production for the third quarter of 2015 at Copper Mountain Mine was 20.4 million pounds of copper, 6,300

- ounces of gold and 64,900 ounces of silver, or 58.2 million pounds of copper, 21,900 ounces of gold and 216,300 ounces of silver for the nine months ended September 30, 2015.
- Revenues for the third quarter of 2015 were \$63.7 million from the sale of 21.9 million pounds of copper, 7,800 ounces of gold, and 65,300 ounces of silver, net of pricing adjustments, bringing nine month revenues to \$192 million from the sale of 61.8 million pounds of copper, 21,700 ounces of gold, and 224,700 ounces of silver, net of pricing adjustments.
- Adjusted EBITDA was \$14.7 million for the quarter; and \$48.5 mil-

- lion for the nine months ended September 30, 2015.
- Adjusted earnings were \$2.0 million for the quarter; and \$9.8 million for the nine months ended September 30, 2015.
- Cash flow from operations was \$4.7 million for the quarter; and \$18.1 million for the nine months ended September 30, 2015.
- Cash on hand at the end of the quarter was \$18.5 million.
- Mine production continued at a mining rate of 160,000 tpd moved during the quarter.
- SAG mill achieved an all-time monthly throughput record of 39,100 tpd during the month of July and averaged 37,400 tpd during the quarter.
- Site cash costs for the quarter were US\$1.21 per pound of copper produced net of precious metal credits, a reduction of 11% over Q2 site cash costs.
- Total cash costs for the quarter were in-line with expectations at US\$1.72 per pound of copper sold net of precious metal credits and after all off-site charges, a reduction of 5% over Q2 total cash costs.

- Realized prices on metal sales for Q3 2015 were US\$2.39 per pound of copper, US\$1,118 per ounce of gold and US\$14.70 per ounce of silver.
- Jim O'Rourke, President and CEO of Copper Mountain, remarked, "We are very pleased to see another consecutive quarter of mill throughput improvements that have been made possible by the addition of secondary crushing. During the quarter the mill achieved a record quarterly average throughput of 37,400 tpd, 7% above our design capacity of 35,000 tpd. The 39,100 tpd average mill throughput achieved in July provides management encouragement for further improvements. We continue to focus on maximizing production while minimizing all costs. Recent modifications have provided further gains and we are confident these gains are sustainable."
- O'Rourke continued, "Copper Mountain Mining generated positive free cash flow during the third quarter. In keeping with this trend, no major capital expenditures arecontinued on Page 2

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

CMMC announces Q3 results

.....continued from Front Page planned for balance of 2015 and production improvements are expected to continue through to the end of the year. Mine plans are continuously being reviewed and optimized to best address current market conditions."

During the quarter, the company completed four shipments of concentrate containing approximately 21.9 million pounds of copper, 7,800 ounces of gold, and 65,300 ounces of silver to Japan for smelting and recorded revenues, net of smelter charges and pricing adjustments, of \$63.7 million. The total cash cost of copper sold for the quarter ended September 30, 2015

was reduced to US\$1.72 per pound of copper net of gold and silver by-product credits as a result of ongoing cost cutting measures taken at the mine site.

During the quarter the Company continued with mining ore mainly from the Pit #2 area where a majority of ore will be mined from for the balance of 2015. At the same time the Company continued with the Phase 3 pushback on the west side of Pit #3. During the quarter the Company received approval from the BC Government to incorporate the Virginia and Oriole deposits into the mine plan. Mining from the Virginia area has commenced with overburden removal,

while the Oriole deposit will be incorporated into the mine plan once the Virginia pit is completed. Management is now planning on first ore delivery to the concentrator from Virginia in December as a result of the delay in receiving the mine permit amendment that was submitted to government last October. Both of these deposits will provide small volumes of higher grade ore that will be blended into the mill feed. Copper head grade for the year will average about 0.33% copper or approximately 0.41% copper equivalent. During the quarter a total of 14.7 million tonnes of material wascontinued on Page 7

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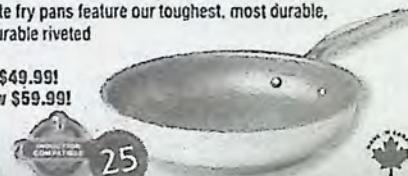

Having A Blast

You ever notice how many earth tremors occur in and around Princeton? One earthquake recording site I looked at last week showed there had been nine different quakes in the past month with the closest one measuring just 0-kilometres from town.

Oh, and they have a very unusual pattern.

For some reason these quakes only take place between 2:15 and 2:30 PM.

Okay, I know we aren't talking about 'real' earthquakes as each of the tremors listed for the past month are described as an 'explosion' and they range in magnitude from 1.7 to 2.3 on the Richter Scale.

To give you an idea of what that really means, tremors measuring 2.0 and less fall under the 'micro' category and are "not felt or rarely felt" however, they are recorded by the highly sensitive instruments known as seismographs.

In fact, one website describes an earthquake of 1.5 as having the "seismic impact of a typical small construction blast" with the TNT equivalent recorded at about 2.7-kilograms.

What makes this series of micro earthquakes interesting is that they are coming from Copper Mountain Mine, in case you didn't already put together that the blast schedule there is typically every few days at between 2:15 and 2:30 PM.

Ever since they started blasting Princeton has shown up on earthquake websites all over the world. In some cases the cause of the micro tremor is identified as a "quarry blast" but rarely are they considered unidentified.

The website I was looking at last week was curious in that the location of the past nine explosions recorded in the past month were in eight different locations and not a single one was anywhere near the Copper Mountain mine site.

This is probably what is confusing people into thinking we are on an active tremor bed I would imagine. What I find particularly unusual about the series of locations listed (ranging from 0 to 6-kilometres south, north-northeast, south-southeast and north-northwest of Princeton) is that if the recording equipment is so sensitive and technology exists to pinpoint locations within feet with GPS that these micro earthquake locations are not better identified.

The closest seismograph station is in Penticton. It has been recording earth tremors since January 1, 1960. From what I could tell from the specifications outlined on the website detailing the Penticton recording station, it is rather high tech compared to other sites in Canada.

What does all of this mean?

Beats me.

I guess I find some comfort knowing that Princeton is showing up on international radar for something other than bad news. Because, let's face it, bad news is typically all people outside of this area hear about our community.

For a change it's earthquakes identified as explosions and I'm quite okay with that.

Songs Can Make History

A couple of weeks ago I watched a documentary on the life of a famous folk singer, Pete Seeger. It was the second time I had seen this documentary, first on PBS, then on Knowledge Network. The documentary was worth seeing twice because Pete Seeger made history with his songs. In addition to bringing back memories of times I lived through, there was more significance to the songs than just listening to old folk songs.

Unlike so many of today's popular songs, it was the socially significant words that made the impact of his songs so powerful. Often, the words of songs are less important than the tune, but revising and updating the words to fit social conditions of the time was a hallmark of Seeger's work. When the young and old of a nation begin singing songs whose words call for change, history is made.

Pete Seeger's career began with trade union gatherings where he sang old songs about the lives of workers. A song, 'Sixteen Tons,' became a hit song. Here are some of the words: "Got up one morning I was feeling fine, picked up my shovel and I walked to the mine. I loaded 16 tons of number nine coal

and the straw boss said 'well, bless my soul.' I loaded 16 tons and what do I get? Another day older and deeper in debt. St. Peter don't you call me 'cause I can't go. I owe my soul to the company store." Those simple words resounded with workers everywhere, whether they mined coal or worked on the docks or for a railroad company, they knew the life and reality of what the song described.

Because Seeger went to trade union rallies and supported the workers, he was labelled a Communist sympathizer, anti-American, and a subversive agent. The FBI watched his every action, even going through his household garbage trying to gather concrete evidence he was engaged in treasonous activity. He was brought before Congress and asked to swear a loyalty oath. He refused on the grounds it was un-American to ask him to do so.

Seeger happily jumped from the frying pan into the fire of social justice issue during the American civil rights movement. He sang "If I had a Hammer" and the nation sang with him, despite the fact that he was not invited to television and radio shows. He was blacklisted from major media for 17 years! Anyone who lived in North America during the civil rights crusade will remember the impact of thousands of people standing with their arms linked, singing "We shall overcome." Pete Seeger did not write the words, it was an old song, but he introduced it to students on campuses across the U.S.A. and he sang it in coffee houses. These were songs of faith, hope, and protest against injustice. In the end, they did overcome.

The war in Viet Nam brought Seeger into a new kind of cause,

and some new songs were sung with words that expressed the feelings of so many young Americans: they did not want to go to war. Songs such as "Where Have all the Flowers Gone?," "Big Muddy" and "Turn, Turn, Turn" raised the awareness of the public. One song, "Bring 'em Home," contained these words "I won't fight for oil, and I won't fight on foreign soil, Bring 'em home, bring 'em home." This was a direct call to bring American troops home from Viet Nam, as well as words of support for those who refused to go to Viet Nam. In another part of the song, Seeger states he would fight to defend his homeland, making clear the principles which led him to oppose the war in Viet Nam.

Pete Seeger played a banjo and led an army against what he saw as wrong or misguided actions or policies of his nation. He was eventually honored by President Bill Clinton.

It is amazing what a song can do if people understand the words and feel the cause is right. Songs like these still work. Before the recent federal election, I watched the music video by Blue Rodeo titled "Stealin' All My Dreams," a song of protest against Stephen Harper's Conservatives. The song spoke of so many of the issues Canadians had raised over actions and policies of the Harper government. The song was in the tradition of Seeger, Buffy St. Marie, and so many other musicians who had used songs to overturn injustice. I commend Blue Rodeo for their song, and I hope it is the beginning of more such songs being sung. There is absolutely nothing as powerful as words of protest set to music. When the tune is right and the words are right, the song takes on a life of its own and it makes history.

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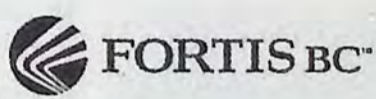

 mined, including 5.4 million tonnes of ore and 9.3 million tonnes of waste for a strip ratio of 1.73:1. The mining rate at the end of the period was in the range of 160,000 tonnes per day moved.
 Mill throughput from the concentrator continued to improve month-over-month, averaging 37,400 tpd during the third quarter, which is an improvement over Q2-2015 and about 7% above design capacity of 35,000 tpd. This improvement included an average throughput of 39,100 tpd for the month of July, thus providing management with the confidence that the budget rate of 37,500 tpd is very achievable on a consistent basis. The increase in throughput is directly attributable

to the installation of the permanent secondary crusher and mine site management's ability to optimize the crushing and grinding circuit.
 During the quarter the mill processed a total of 3.4 million tonnes of ore at an average grade of 0.33% copper to produce 20.4 million pounds of copper, 6,300 ounces of gold, and 64,900 ounces of silver. Sag mill availability was 93.4% during the third quarter and copper recovery averaged 82.4% which was in line with the Company's plan. Throughout the quarter management remained focused on cost reduction and capital discipline.
 Exploration activities at the mine site during this period of low metal prices were minimized as part of the mine cost reduction plan. A relatively small, 4-hole, 1500m, diamond-drill program was undertaken to test for mineralization in an area immediately to the south of the Virginia deposit. The drill-hole locations were planned to test for the potential extension of economic mineralization. No economic mineralization was encountered in the area adjacent to the southeast end of the Virginia Pit. One hole was extended to test the area below the Virginia deposit for high-grade underground minable mineralization. Assay results are not yet com-

plete but visual inspections suggests that no economic mineralization extends to depth and at this point no further drilling is planned for this area.
 A second drill program has recently been initiated to test the continuity of mineralization through the upper part of the saddle zone (the area between Pits 2 and 3). The results from this drill program will provide the infill drill data for mine design.
About Copper Mountain Mining Corporation:
 Copper Mountain's flagship asset, is the 75% owned Copper Mountain mine located in southern British Columbia near the town of Princeton. The Company has a strategic alliance with Mitsubishi Materials Corporation who owns the remaining 25%.
 The Copper Mountain mine commenced production in the latter half of 2011, and has continued to improve its operations since start-up. The 18,000 acre site has a large resource of copper that remains open laterally and at depth. The mine has significant exploration potential that will need to be explored over the next few years to fully appreciate the property's full development potential. TCC received ORV update

.....continued from Front Page are not allowed to drive on public roads. According to Section 24 of the Motor Vehicle Act, no permits can be granted for this. Permits can

be issued to give permission to drive along the gravel shoulder of a roadway, but permits are required for EVERY road shoulder the operator wishes to drive on. Permits are also

needed to cross at unmarked crossings (ie: where the KVR crosses the Coalmont Road). Permits are only valid for the uses an operator applies for. They are not blanket permits for everywhere. You do not need a permit to drive on Crown Land, Forest Service Roads, private property, or cross at a marked crossing (ie: stop light or stop sign). Permits are valid for TWO years. Operators are instructed to keep the permits with the vehicle when driving as proof of permission.

License plates and insurance are not required to move an ORV on a trailer or in the back of a pickup when you are moving from private property to private property. If you unload in a parking lot, the operator must have a valid plate and insurance.

Sgt. Kennedy stressed that the goal of the new regulations is to curb thefts and prevent "yahoos" from wreaking havoc and causing damage with their ORVs. He stated the RCMP will not be hiding behind trees and setting up check stops to bother responsible drivers. He did state that if there are problems at an event, the RCMP will be reactive and the following year will have a presence at the event to prevent repeat incidences.

The response of those in attendance at the meeting was positive and it appeared everyone was satisfied with the new regulations. It is obvious that the concerns of citizens regarding children driving ORVs and driving along the shoulders of roads was heard and, in accordance with the worries, the regulations were modified.

Virotherapy: Latvia's Gift to Cancer Patients

After years of research, Latvian physicians have developed a cancer treatment with no side effects. A virus is injected into the patient's body. The injection contains no chemicals that would be detrimental to the human system. The virus targets cancer cells and kills them.

Although this is not a cancer 'cure,' it has proven far more effective than the typical surgery-chemo-radiation scenario that has been used in North America for the past several decades. Survival rates are at least double that of traditional treatments. Many patients in Stage 4 cancer have recovered and lived for many years.

First used to treat patients with melanoma, a very dangerous form of skin cancer, the Latvian treatment, called Rigvir, has been used effectively to treat cancers of the lung, stomach, colorectal, prostate, uterine, and a few types of sarcoma. Even pancreatic cancer, considered fatal in all cases, has been successfully treated in Latvia.

You can look into this treatment by searching Rigvir on internet. There is a great deal of information available, including the fact that Rigvir is an accepted treatment for melanoma in most member states of the European Union. You will also find, if you search 'biotherapy,' the street address, phone number, fax number and email address of the treatment center.

Rigvir treatment is free to Latvian residents. Non-residents must pay for their treatment. Treatment costs vary according to the cost of medical assessments, tests, etc. Expect treatment to be very expensive.

There is a North American contact for treatment. Search the net for Hope4Cancer and you will find all kinds of information on how to contact, and the site offers other information. There is no promise of any sort of cure.

In Latvia, people from 40 nations have been treated with virotherapy. The North American Hope4Cancer center began using virotherapy just over a year ago. Hope4Cancer offers other treatments in conjunction with Rigvir.

One physician in Latvia, who did not have cancer, decided to take Rigvir to see what the effect would be. In three days, his immune system had become much stronger. This is the major side effect of Rigvir - it stimulates the immune system.

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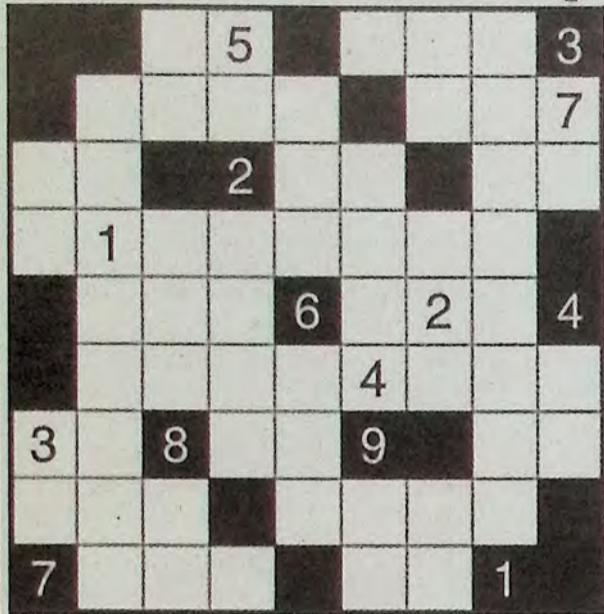

Naturalists Visit Barcelo Falls Near Cawston

Vermilion Forks Field Naturalists' November 7th field trip took us to Cawston, where we hiked to Barcelo Falls and beyond. Six of us, led by Rika Ruebsaat, walked through aromatic sagebrush to reach the entry to Barcelo Canyon, a path that was covered with a layer of golden aspen tree leaves as we began our journey, and became rock-strewn as we continued.

The trail is a 4-kilometre gentle incline that runs alongside Barcelo Creek, which is but a trickle at the moment.

It took us 1 1/2 hours to reach the waterfall, a picturesque setting, despite the minimal water flow. We explored a little behind the falls, then sat and enjoyed our lunch. We

needed the extra energy to climb higher, along a steeper trail that leads to grasslands and a viewpoint overlooking the valley floor to the south. On our descent we noticed a small section of volcanically created columns, where basalt has contracted while cooling, after already solidifying - this is identifiable by the characteristic vertically-hexagonal columnar jointing.

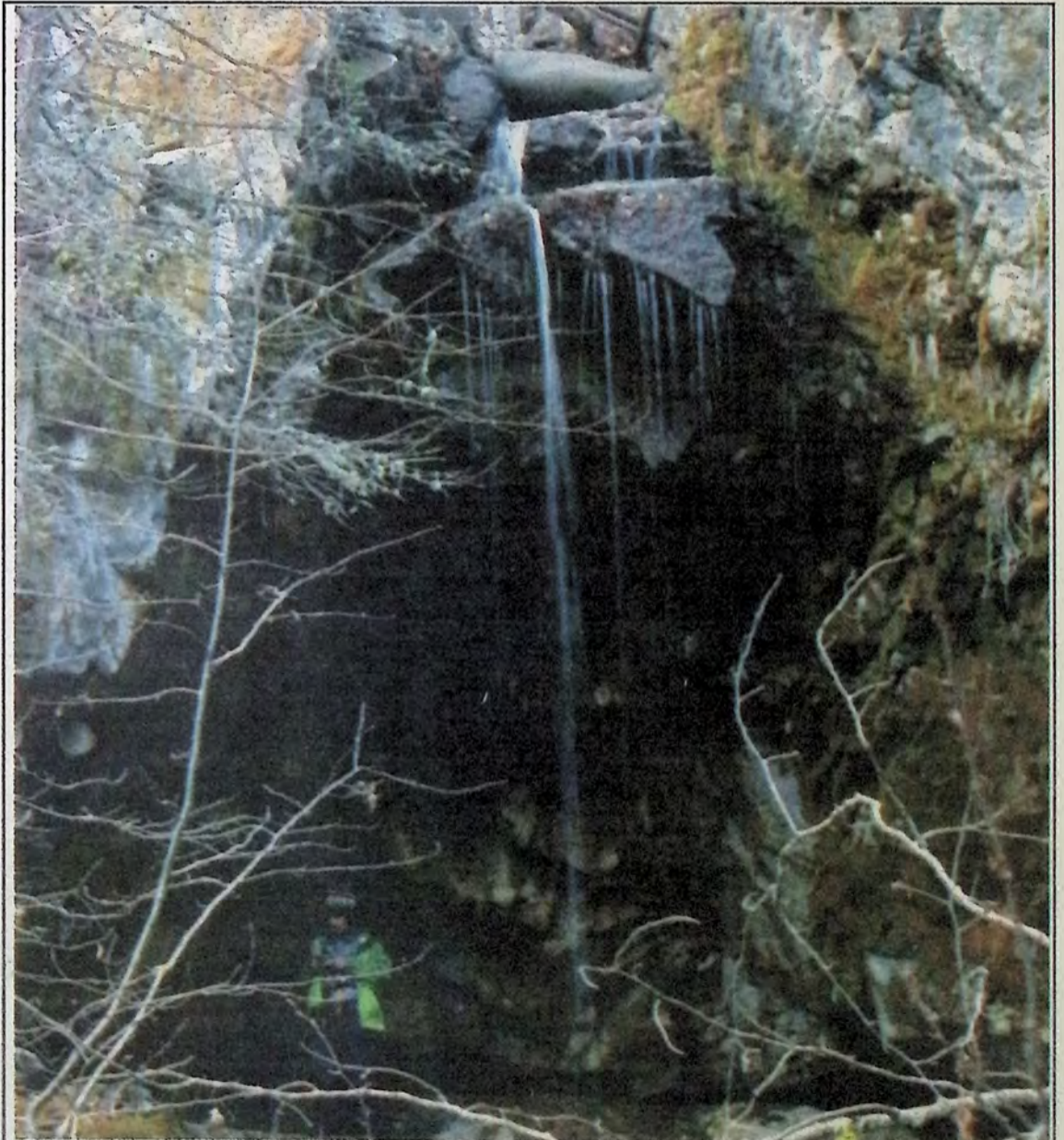
Although we were prepared for rain, we were thankful to have nary a drop. The day was dry, calm and mild, while our 4 hours on the trail were invigorating, interesting and good fun!

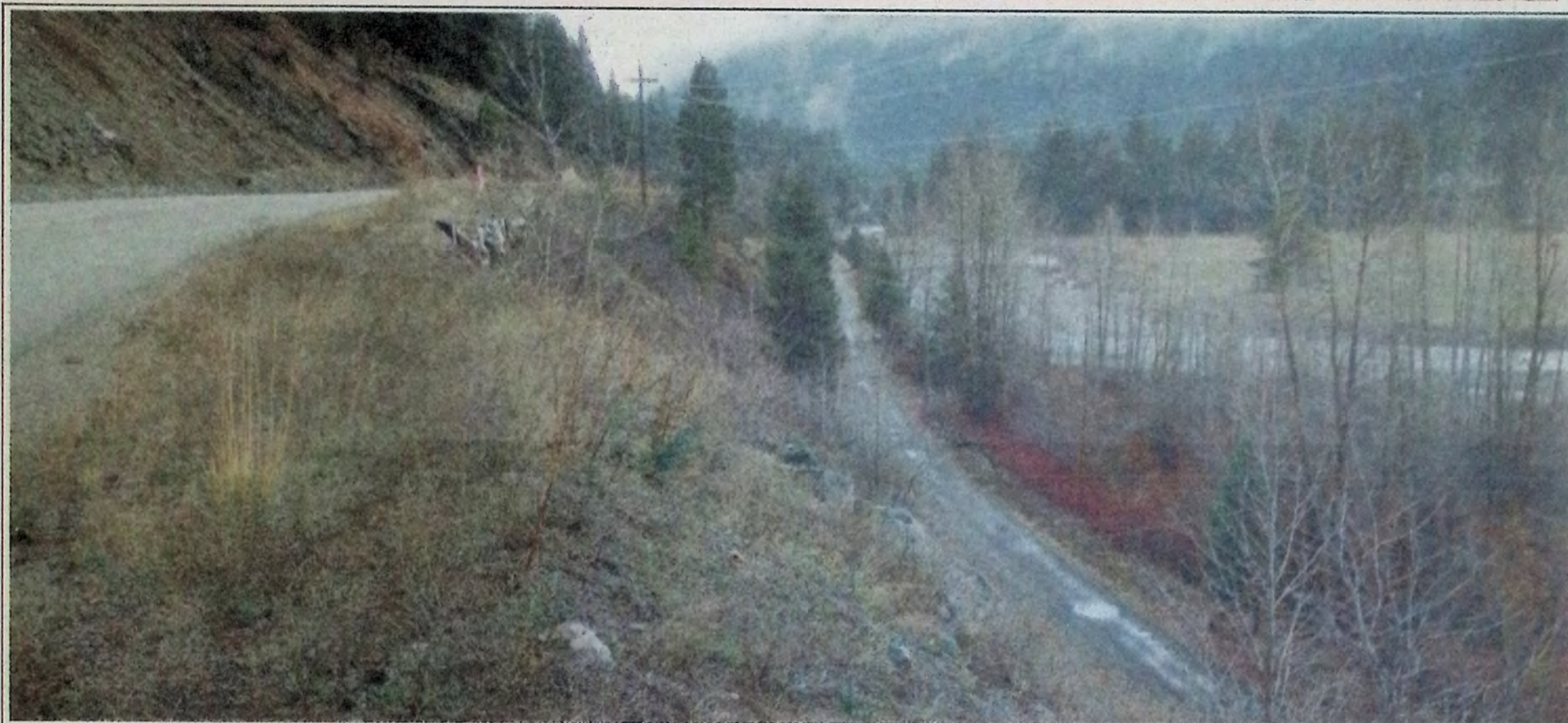
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Three transportation routes in one photo. From left, Coalmont Road, the Trans-Canada Trail and Similkameen River. This view is just outside Coalmont. *

I'm still thinking about the OCP. According to Wikipedia an Official Community Plan is defined as, "a comprehensive plan created by an incorporated municipality which dictates public policy in terms of transportation, utilities, land use, recreation, and housing. OCPs typically encompass large geographical areas, a broad range of topics, and cover a long-term time horizon. The process of creating an OCP is today often referred to as a Community Vision."

This is exactly as I've always

understood this document to be, a plan for the future.

As you already know, the Town of Princeton will be updating the current OCP at a cost of \$42,500. I'm sure it's probably pretty easy to come up with an argument related to value versus cost and I am certainly not equipped to step into that pool however, I do think there needs to be more consideration placed on input from within the community.

Yes, the OCP update process has a component that allows for a public

meeting for residents to have their say. Typically this occurs after a draft has been completed and I'm not sure how much influence the public has at that point.

I think Councillor Jerome Tjerkstra was on the right track when he pointed out at a recent Town Council meeting that the public should be consulted during the process. I have suggested many times in the past that (to their credit) our elected officials need some help. They are only five individuals carrying the weight of the day-to-day operations of the business of running the municipality. Sure, that's not entirely true as the municipality has people on staff to handle these things, but Town Council is the face, eyes, ears and voice of the community.

Or that's how I always thought it worked.

So when the OCP is ready for an update, how do we get our face,

eyes, ears and voice involved since the document will have a direct and indirect affect on what happens to the community and community services that you and I pay for?

Well, if Town Council represents you and me, it makes sense to me that they should be consulting with us throughout the entire process. This is what I'm pretty sure Councillor Tjerkstra was getting at. I'm not convinced that an "open house-style" public meeting after a draft has been drawn up is going to get the job done. I say this for two reasons. My first one is that I know how poorly attended these events are. It's easy to confuse poor attendance with acceptance and that becomes an issue down the road. Just ask the property owners who pushed for OCP and zoning amendments that resulted in a public hearing before Town Council on November 16th.

My second reason I've already

touched on. If the public meeting is held with an OCP Update Draft already in place, who's really telling who what direction the community is going to move? At least with public consultation throughout the process, as I believe was Councillor Tjerkstra's point, when the public meeting is held the OCP Draft at that point would have had input from within the community already and poor turnout at that meeting misinterpreted as acceptance would be a fair assumption.

So, how do you and I get a chance at being part of the OCP Update?

As much as I'd like to suggest we all mob Town Hall at 3:00 PM on a Friday afternoon to be noticed I think we have a more logical route. I have mentioned that the members of Town Council are supposed to be representing you and me. This is your chance to put them to the test. Start contacting the Town

Village installs valley's first E/V fast charging station

The Village of Keremeos is proud to announce the opening of the Similkameen Valley's first electric vehicle fast charging station located just north of the Village Municipal Office at 702 4th Street.

This station has been installed as part of an initiative supported by BC Hydro, the Province of British Columbia, the Government of Canada and various municipal and industry stakeholders to increase electric vehicle refueling infrastructure in our Province. The Village of Keremeos has agreed to play host to one of these fast charging stations in an effort to both promote electric vehicles as a viable mode of transportation in our valley while enabling electric vehicle owners to reduce their overall carbon footprint by utilizing such infrastructure.

The station located at Keremeos is equipped with both the CHAdeMO

and SAE combo fast charging standards and will be able to serve most electric vehicles including the Nissan Leaf, Chevy Spark EV and BMW i3. The Tesla Model S may also be charged at this station but will require a special adaptor. The station will be able to charge electric vehicles up to 80% in about thirty minutes time, which is significantly less compared to other electric vehicle charging stations in the Similkameen Valley and surrounding area.

Users of this station will pay for charging transactions through a pre-registered account with a company called Greenlots Sky Network, which offer a flexible station management platform through their Smartphone app. The Greenlots app is available for free download on the Google Play and Apple Stores and enables users to locate charging stations, view

their availability, start and stop charging, check charging progress and pay for electric vehicle charging transactions. Customer support and any questions related to charging will be directed to Greenlots through a toll free number located on the station.

The Village of Keremeos is proud

to play host to this electric vehicle charging station as doing so will support the Village's Climate Action Plan by directly reducing greenhouse gas emissions in our community. The station also has potential to increase electric vehicle tourism in our valley by connecting the British Columbia

southern interior transportation corridor to an international network of electric vehicle highways spanning from British Columbia to California. We are excited to be a part of this initiative and look forward to the impact this new infrastructure will have on our community.

ORL meeting confusing to attendees

It's almost impossible to get a hundred people in Keremeos to come out to a anything without wine and plentiful food involved but that's exactly what happened November 6th at Victory Hall.

It was a meeting called by the Okanagan Regional Library, ORL, and all of the people who arrived felt it would be a discussion...it wasn't.

It was organized 'Cafe Style.' For the uninitiated that's broken into small separate groups. Although people wanted to comment publicly, as they are genuinely concerned about the direction of the library, the ORL wouldn't allow them, so about 20 odd just went home.

Those who remained were told to jot down their thoughts on large poster size paper. The thoughts

were to be on three themes, predetermined by the ORL, for 15 minutes and then they were to move to another differently themed table. Problems with this structure showed up at the second table. Our group had no idea how, or why, the terms 'hours,' 'computers' and 'washrooms' were important to the previous group. The third move showed our group two separate large sheets

of paper with apparently unrelated random thoughts jotted on them. It was more an exercise in futility than, "The ORL wants to hear your thoughts..." as was stated in the first line of the paper given to about half the people attending, as they ran out in short order.

Stephanie Hall, Chief Executive Officer of the ORL, admitted the format was "not ideal" and that their previous survey, "had failed to respond to those that had filled it out." This failure to listen to the residents of Keremeos both in the survey and in the meeting has left a bad taste in many mouths. There was a much better way to deal with this, by having a Town Hall style meeting and just laying it all out on the table and talking about it, as was conducted in Princeton many

months ago.

The things people wanted to comment on were a need for more computers, lack of parking, increasing hours, a larger space, the increased use of the library in the summer, and pay by use options for non-residents. None of this was debated and just ended up on a piece of paper with no one to explain these cryptic phrases left for the ORL.

Hall also confirmed a meeting between the ORL, the Village, and the RDOS in which they had all but decided on a tax increase option for our library.

Mayor Manfred Bauer said before the meeting, "We can keep our existing service if we raise taxes seven to eight dollars per household." That sentiment was arguedcontinued on Page 20
