Town Council changes zoning for some, balks at others

A public hearing into zoning changes and changes to the Official Community Plan (OCP) was held November 16. Council had a public meeting following the hearing. Council gave third reading to allow the property at 112 Jacobson Road, a tire shop, to be changed from residential to Business Transition. Council gave third reading to allow two properties on Old Hedley Road, an automobile servicing business and car lot, to change from residential to Business Transition.

A property on Burton Avenue was recommended for third reading, but Councillor Kim Maynard made a motion to defer a decision to a later date so he could seek more information. He said he asked for this extra time because the property in question, owned by a builder's supply business, was "the most controversial."

As two Councillors were absent, and Councillor Rosemary Doughty refused to second the motion, Mayor Frank Armitage was seconder. The motion passed, but Councillor Doughty asked that her negative vote be recorded. The decision on the Burton Avenue property will come sometime in December.

Mayor praises local veteran

Mayor Frank Armitage made a small speech at the November 16 Town Council meeting to honour Cathy Orser, who assisted him on November 11 to lay a wreath at the cenotaph on behalf of the Town of Princeton.

"She is 94 years old, the most senior veteran in town," Mayor Armitage stated. He reviewed her service as a member of the Canadian Navy deployed to Scotland during World War II. Councillors Rosemary Doughty and Kim Maynard expressed their appreciation to the Legion for the Remembrance Day service and luncheon on November 11. Both Councillors attended.

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PXA reserves 2016 dates

Princeton's fairgrounds have been booked now for events in 2016. Princeton Exhibition Association (PXA) has negotiated a deal with Back Country Horsemen for that group's 25th anniversary get-together on May 27, 28, and 29, 2016.

Princeton Rodeo Club has reserved the weekend of June 11

and 12 for the rodeo. Princeton Riding Club will hold a horse show on May 21. Motor sports has reserved Labour Day weekend, September 3 and 4, for another demolition derby and mud racing event.

October 29, 2016, has been reserved for the community Halloween Party.

The PXA met November 17, its final meeting of the year, welcoming several new members. The requests for bookings came rapidly. The budget committee has been at work forming an operating budget for 2016 and a budget for improvements to the grounds. The budget is subject to negotiations with the Town of Princeton and the final

budget will not be known until those negotiations are completed.

The horse owners who board their animals in the Ag barn over the winter have been moving in. Assistant barn boss, Stephanie Antonick, requested an upgrade to electrical service in the barn so that water for the horses can be heated to prevent freezing. The present service is not adequate. Her request was approved by the membership.

President Paul Bedard reported the grounds are soaking wet, but this has not been a problem except on the race track, which has become too sloppy for horse conditioning for racing. The rest of the grounds are ready for winter.

PXA will not meet again until January 19, 2016.

Remembering Flood '95

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Twenty years ago this week the Tulameen River flooded portions of the region. We share our personal memories of that event.

Dawn's memories

I was working as a reporter on November 29, 1995, the day the rivers went wild. The Princeton area had had record snowfalls for November. There was a lot of snow on the ground on the hills around town, and more than a metre in the mountains. On November 27, a typical El Nino rain began. Nobody was too concerned. The rain continued all night and all day on November 28, and the rivers began to rise. People were becoming a little concerned. By the morning of November 29, after a third night of rain, everyone was concerned.

My first alert of flooding came at about 9:30 AM when I heard a report on my radio scanner from a highways maintenance employee who was at Manion Creek near Tulameen. He was telling his boss he was getting out of there, there was nothing he could do, he thought the road was going to wash out. I turned up the volume on the scanner and heard a number of comments from highways maintenance people in the Tulameen area. Flooding was occurring around Otter Lake. The water from Otter Creek was backing up, pushed by higher level water in Tulameen River.

By noon, Coalmont was flooded. Some people were lucky to get out, having to wade through water up to their thighs. Emergency service people were arranging evacuation and accommodation for victims of the flood.

As I drove home for lunch, I noticed people standing on the wooden bridge watching the river. I caught a glimpse of the river filled

with debris which included a travel trailer.

After lunch, I went out to the bridge and took a look. An hour later I took another look. Under the bridge, there is a marker for water level, measured in feet up to 13 feet. The water lapped at the 11 foot mark. It had risen a foot in two hours.

At 3:00 PM, I took a drive around Lime Street, and saw a manhole cover burst upwards under water pressure. The storm drains were lower than the water level in the river, and the water from the river was flowing up the drain and onto the lower end of Fenchurch Avenue. I drove to Allison Flats, where the same thing was happening near Allison Court, and people were being evacuated from that building. Some were rescued in the bucket of a front end loader.

By 4:00 PM, the area behind the newspaper building was filling with water. Water was trickling over the dike, but it was also seeping up out of the ground. People moved their vehicles out of the area. Sandbagging efforts were abandoned half an hour later.

The water had reached the 13 foot level by 5:00 PM and the word was out that people who needed to cross a bridge to go home had better do so immediately as the bridges were going to be closed. There was worry that the number of big trees floating down the river might catch on the underside of the bridges and possibly take out the bridges. (In Chopaka, they said it was like a whole forest going under the bridge.)

I put my chair on top of my desk and left. As I drove home, I checked the lower end of Angela Avenue and Allison Avenue. On Angela, seepage was filling the lower end of

the street. Police used loudspeakers to tell residents to leave their homes.

The Tulameen River did not peak until near midnight. The Similkameen River peaked a little later. The next morning, more than 200 people were being housed with friends or in motels. There was driftwood on Bridge Street! An entire block near the wooden bridge had been flooded, including Santa's Workshop, the location of the Christmas hamper drive, which had been located in the basement of the building housing the barber shop.

In the aftermath, television news crews came in to view the damage and tell the world what had happened. I received a phone call from relatives in Ontario asking if we were safe. Princeton was national news.

Fortunately, no lives had been lost. Crews of generous, good-hearted people came from the lower mainland to help with the clean-up, and they set up shop in a vacant store. They trucked in goods of all kinds to give to people whose homes had been flooded. Donations of toys came from everywhere for the Christmas hampers, so many toys that two years later, a generous trucker heading east took them to a flooded town in Quebec. Local people who had not been flooded gave what they could to the effort.

The skies cleared, the sun shone, and three days after the flood, everything froze down solid for the winter. Anything removed from wet basements froze solid in yards, waiting to be taken to the landfill in the spring.

When spring came, the clean-up continued at the flooded residences. Another bit of repair was taking place on the stretch of highwaycontinued on Page 6



Tulameen Fire Truck Acquisition Loan Authorization Bylaw No. 2704, 2015

Notice of Alternative Approval Process

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN pursuant to Section 86 of the Community Charter, that the Board of Directors of the Regional District of Okanagan-Similkameen seek the approval of the electors with the boundaries of Tulameen Fire Prevention and Suppression Service Area of the Regional District for the adoption of Tulameen Fire Truck Acquisition Loan Authorization Bylaw No. 2704, 2015.

In general terms, the bylaw is to authorize the borrowing upon the credit of the Regional District a sum not more than two hundred thirty thousand dollars (\$230,000) for the purpose of acquiring and have installed all such materials as may be requisite or desirable in connection with the purchase of a fire truck in and for the Tulameen Fire Prevention and Suppression Service Area.

The alternative approval process applies to qualified electors within the Tulameen Fire Prevention and Suppression Service Area.

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE that the Regional District may proceed with the approval of Tulameen Fire Truck Acquisition Loan Authorization Bylaw No. 2704, 2015 unless at least ten percent (10%) of the qualified electors (those meeting the criteria below) within the Tulameen Fire Prevention and Suppression Service Area indicate their opposition by signing the Elector Response Form.

The Regional District has estimated the total number of qualified electors in the service area to be 963 and that 10% of that number, or 96 qualified electors, must submit signed Elector Response Forms to prevent the Regional District from adopting the bylaw without the full assent of the electors by referendum.

An elector response form must be in the form established by the Regional District. Elector Response Forms are available from the Regional District office, including by mail, fax, or email, on request or on the Regional District website at www.rdos.bc.ca.

The deadline for delivering the original signed Elector Response Form to the Regional District is 4:30 pm on December 21, 2015.

The only persons entitled to sign an Elector Response Form are those who meet the following criteria:

Resident electors must:

- (a) be 18 years of age or older;
- (b) be a Canadian citizen;
- (c) be a resident of British Columbia, for at least 6 months;
- (d) be a resident of the Tulameen Fire Prevention and Suppression Service Area for at least 30 days; and
- (e) not be disqualified by a Provincial enactment, or otherwise disqualified by law, from voting in an election.

Non-Resident property electors must:

- (a) not be entitled to register as a resident elector of the Tulameen Fire Prevention and Suppression Service Area;
- (b) be 18 years of age or older;
- (c) be a Canadian citizen;
- (d) be a resident of British Columbia, for at least 6 months;
- (e) be a registered owner of real property in the jurisdiction for at least 30 days;
- (f) not be disqualified by any Provincial enactment or otherwise disqualified by law, from voting in an election; and
- (g) only register as a non-resident property elector in relation to one parcel of real property in a jurisdiction.

The bylaw is available for public inspection at the Regional District Office 101 Martin Street, Penticton, BC V2A 5J9, during regular office hours, or alternatively, on our website at www.rdos.bc.ca.

Flip Of The Coyne

I was reading George's 'Saving Downtown Princeton' and I got to thinking about the Official Community Plan (OCP) again. I was thinking how great it would be if the council would have listened to the objections from Councillor Jerome Tjerkstra and actually consulted with the community prior to the open house where the community will be allowed input on the town's draft of the OCP updates.

I am a fan of the community approach on those things that directly impact the community. That being, said I am not blind to the fact that if the OCP process was opened up to community scrutiny from start to finish, the process would be bogged down and go nowhere, but that doesn't mean that there cannot be a process where the community offer input before pen is put to paper and the plan begins. The town has used online surveys in the past. It could invite input from the public in the form of online survey, letter, or even a questionnaire where the ideas are compiled into a list and added to the Community Plan. Before there can be community input there must be an apparatus to open the lines of communication between the current Town Hall and the citizens of the community. It is a novel idea. If members of council have any future political ambitions, maybe they ought to listen to those who will decide who keeps his seat. There is a will on the part of some council members to work with the citizens of the community to update the OCP. Councillor Tjerkstra showed us that. Unfortunately, unless


two other members of council step forward, Councillor Tjerkstra will be the odd man out. I want to believe that he can't be the only one who believes in talking to the electorate about the future of its community. I don't know what the hangup is when it comes to this two way dialogue between the citizenry and the politicians. Does one office want to build walls, or are there multiple offices taking the circle the wagons mentality? I hope that Councillor Tjerkstra continues to stand for what he believes. Even though he and I don't always see eye to eye on most political ideologies, I do support his move to include the people of this community in some of the decision making.

It would be great if we were to see a

flood of letters to the paper, to Town Hall and to whatever other medium is accessible to you, telling Council that you want to see more openness and inclusion in some of the things that happen down in Town Hall. The OCP is a major issue. We have seen businesses put into limbo. We have seen homeowners told that there would be no more development in areas, so they built their homes only to see industrial activities continue or expand. The things that the council will decide will have an impact on you, your friends, the stores you shop in, and in some cases, your wallet. Like George said, don't wait for the open house to see what Council is going to do. Tell them now what you would like to see. Land use will be a

big issue in this OCP update from the tunnel area to future growth. George also alluded to the Trans-Canada Trail and how council deals with the issues surrounding the trail. I know Council isn't about to take advice from me, but if they were to listen even a little bit, I would suggest that before they start this update pro-

cedure that they call on businesses, community groups, recreation groups and service organizations for input. After all, these groups are the pulse of the community, and by working with rather than against these groups, it can only help make our community a stronger more vibrant community.




When time came to make the presentations - after a meal we will be talking about for some time and measure all future volunteer dinners against the recipients (Rod Dixon, Ed Reichert and Marg Reichert) were not only completely unaware that the medals were coming, it proved that the close knit nature of the crew could keep a big secret amongst themselves even if it meant breaking, or bending an unwritten code of integrity.

I know I'm pretty good at keeping secrets and have been trusted with some rather interesting information over the years. To see how a few members of the TVFD squirmed when I asked them how they kept it quiet told me these were genuine people who were so proud to see some of their own honoured in such a significant way that, bending the truth leading up to the presentation was worth the risk.

It also confirmed for me that it takes a special kind of person to take on such responsibility to the community. I've volunteered all my adult life but never in such a capacity. Volunteer firefighters, regardless of the community they serve, are most definitely at the top of my list of people I admire.

And clearly, as we saw in Tulameen a couple Saturdays ago, they also aren't afraid to show their admiration and respect for members within their own ranks. Especially when it's members who have set the bar at such a standard that you can't help but become a better person as you try to reach the goals they have set in place for those who follow.

Thanks to the legions of warm, welcoming and caring Buddhists who bestowed 'honored guest' status on me in Thailand in 1985. I learned that any small act of generosity or kindness was repaid a hundredfold over my 25 glorious years there. I returned to Canada in 2011 a calmer, gentler and, I hope, a wiser husband, father and son. Thank you Thailand, and the Buddhist people, for giving me a soulmate, a family and a whole new perspective on life.

Finally, Thanks to the Canadian First Nations community who in 2012 accepted me on equal terms as a non-native Tour Bus Driver and Guide. Your faith in my ability kept me on the path of continual learning and personal growth and your ability to still contribute to an evolving Canadian identity inspires me to see a richer future for Canada than I ever imagined.

Peculiar Happenings In Our Neighbour's Land

A couple of peculiar things have happened in the United States recently. The first involves a decision made by the federal government's Department of Justice. What was really peculiar was the decision announced at the United Nations. The announcement was made on September 28, 2015, by Loretta Lynch, Attorney General, Head of the Justice Department. Under the United Nations global police initiative, Lynch announced the formation of a Strong Cities Network (SCN) "to address violent extremism in all its forms." An initial steering committee of 25 cities would provide "strategic direction." City police forces were to undergo specific training to deal with violent extremism.

The most peculiar thing about this announcement was it bypassed Congress. In other words, this plan had not received the blessings of the elected body assigned the task of governing the country. Suddenly, that seemed to have been passed to the United Nations.

To better understand the United Nations global police initiative, you need to understand that is the initiative under which peacekeep-

ing forces are sent out to establish some kind of control over violent situations within a nation, such as the action taken in Kosovo many years ago. The global police initiative was never intended for use within American cities. I was surprised the American press did not pick up on this and blast it as unconstitutional, particularly as cities involved in the steering committee would need to have the state's approval. Did this also bypass state government?

I wondered what this would be like if our own local government decided to join in such action. Would we have a local police force dedicated to sniffing out extremists? What would be the criteria for labeling a citizen as an extremist? I thought it sounded very dangerous. Would it bypass my right to think and believe what I choose?

The other peculiar thing that happened next door to Canada was the sentencing of ranchers, father and son, to several years in prison because they had set fire to some grazing lease land. In the United States, the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) determines who may have a grazing lease and what may be done with that lease. It has been the custom of the BLM to burn off grazing lease lands to get rid of undesirable plant species and improve the grazing. This practice is not new. Back in 2001, the Hammond family decided to burn off their own lease lands. They were charged with arson.

Initially, they were sentenced to five years in prison plus a fine. Then the government appealed the sentence, saying it was not stiff enough. After serving a short time in prison, the ranchers went home and the process began again. They have been sentenced

to five years and three months for the 73 year old father, and six years for the 46 year old son. They will not be allowed grazing rights for two successive years.

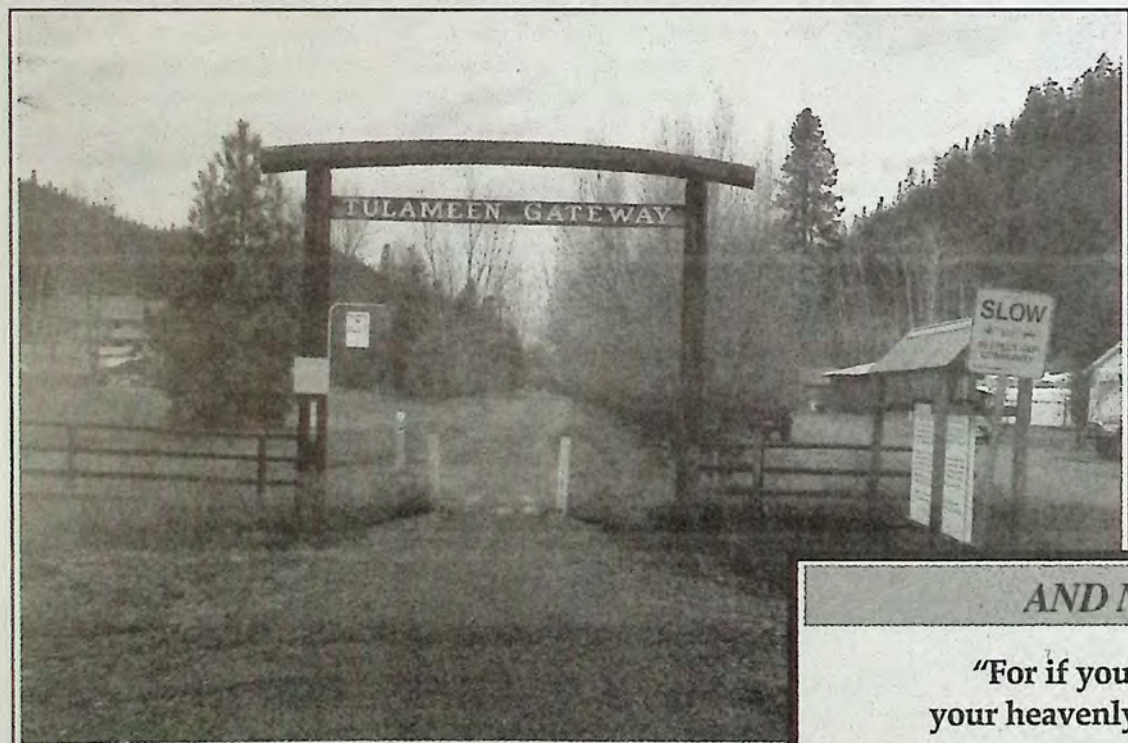
This sentence was imposed despite the fact that their lawyer objected on the grounds that the charge was laid under legislation designed to deal with domestic terrorists!

That situation sent a chill up my spine due to the fact that we now have Bill C51 in Canada with legislation that could be misused under similar circumstances.

I am a great believer in having laws that protect people. Laws should be imposed for the purpose of protecting the innocent from harm from those who would take advantage of them in any way, or cause harm to them in any way. In the case of the ranchers, no harm was done to anyone or anything. The real offense was not asking permission from the federal BLM to burn the grazing lease.

Why these ranchers were prosecuted under anti-terrorist law is something I do not understand. Is this the new rule in the land of the free: you are branded a terrorist if you do something on the land without asking permission, even though it has been the custom of the government to do this very thing? I thought about what might be a similar situation here. What if I had snow clearing equipment and cleared a road without asking permission of the Highways Department? Would I be branded a terrorist?

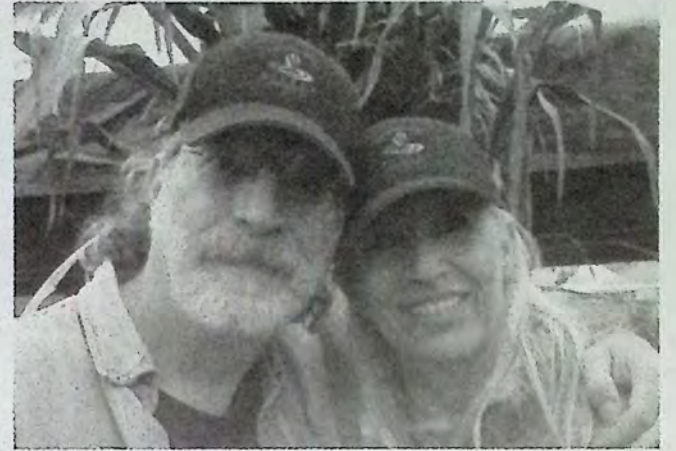
These peculiar things really give pause for thought. While the ranchers are in prison, nothing is being done about the Justice Department for bypassing Congress. What on earth is going on in the United States?

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Remembering Flood '95

between the wooden bridge and the top of the hill toward Riverside School. A lot of fill had been washed downstream along the roadway. As crews worked on restoring the roadway, the entire thing collapsed and the road had to be rebuilt.

At the Ken Thomas farm, the hayfield was covered with gravel and rocks. The soil was gone. In Tulameen, a house was left with one corner suspended above air. On the famous Tulameen Days camping sandbar, trees had piled up to the extent logging trucks took five loads of usable logs to the mill, and a huge number of unusable logs were piled at the roadside to be cut into firewood. Down at Chief Joseph Dam in Washington, they harvested trees from behind the dam.

As a final cap on the disaster, the following summer my husband and I were traveling with relatives from Australia. We wanted to take them on a tour of Grand Coulee Dam. When we inquired about visiting the generators, we were told they were out of bounds due to maintenance.

"We usually do maintenance in winter," the man said, "But last November some river in British Columbia went nuts and dumped so much water into our system we had to keep the floodgates open and couldn't get the maintenance done."

"The name of the river is Similkameen," I told him.

George's memories
 My recollection of 'Flood '95' is a bit different.
 I was working as the Assistant Manager to the local radio station (CKRP) that operated downtown

from a studio located in what is now an apartment on one side of the top of the liquor store building.

I remember the snow plus rain conditions well as I have often referred to the November 1995 conditions when we experience similar weather patterns.

I don't remember exactly when during that day I got completely involved but I do remember I did my usual morning shift from 6:00 AM to 10:00 AM. I seem to recall that some time after lunch I got back to the station and found my boss, Laurie Currie trying to figure out how to go on air. After our local live broadcast time we would switch over to a network feed that came from Penticton. We could interrupt it at any time, if needed, but that was not common.

I think Laurie had received an important notice of emergency of some kind from Town Hall and was trying to get the word out. I would have taken it from there very likely tagging a network newscast with an announcement and maybe frequently during that hour.

I do remember tracking down Councillor Betty Pilon, or maybe Laurie contacted her, from her job at the post office. We were looking for more information and by this time I wanted to do an on-air interview with some details.

By 2:00 PM I had her in the studio and we went at great length about what was happening with the rising river. By this time we were getting phone calls at the radio station and reports from people in and around the area.

This past week I have asked a few people I know what they remember about the flood of 1995. Confusion and disorganization was what many said they sensed.

When I was on the radio with Councillor Pilon, which I should point out we did right up until 12 midnight that night without breaks, the information coming into us at the radio station was similar. We had reports of buildings completely washed away in San Ang, which was false.

We heard that Old Hedley Road was washed away in places, which was not entirely true, either. Sandbagging crews were gathering at Rotary Park and along the dike at the Tulameen River and we were sending people there.

At 4:20 PM Mayor John Stinson declared a State of Emergency. I think he made the announcement with a bullhorn on the corner of Bridge Street and Vermilion Avenue, or at least that's what I heard. I was too busy at the radio station taking phone calls and discussing developments as they were happening on air with Pilon to actually see Stinson in action.

Evacuations started of the Allison Flats area and many residents from Coalmont and Tulameen were also heading into town. There was confusion over where the evacuees were going. We heard more than one place and tried to keep feeding out accurate information, but that was not easy with so many different versions coming in throughout the afternoon.

What I do remember clearly was that we were able to get a number of volunteers in place and someone decided those volunteers also needed to be fed along with the evacuees.

Alf and Eileen Carver owned what had been Fisher's Meats and they organized the sandwich building efforts and before long food donations started flowing from

Living Past 100

The Best Snack Is Healthy

Do you ever snack on sunflower seeds? If you do, you are snacking on one of the healthiest foods you could select for a snack. Sunflower seeds are loaded with nutrition.

Sunflower seeds are full of Vitamin E, which is good for your circulation. In addition, sunflower seeds are a good source of two trace elements not found in most foods: manganese and selenium. Both of these elements are excellent for strengthening the heart and keeping it healthy. A snack of sunflower seeds mixed with dark chocolate chips would be great food for your heart, as dark chocolate contains manganese, too. It is healthier to eat unsalted sunflower seeds.

You can mix sunflower seeds with bits of dried fruit such as cranberries, ginger, dried apricots, dried blueberries, and so on.

Sunflower seeds are good as a substitute for nuts in baked goods, and far less expensive. They are great in cookies, squares, loaves and cakes (make sure the shells are off). You could grow your own sunflower seeds. You would have to harvest them as soon as they are ready, because birds love sunflower seeds. To be sure the seeds are ready for harvest, pull a seed from the sunflower head, open the shell, and make sure the seed inside is fully formed and plump. When you pick the flower after it has gone to seed, let it dry for a few days in a warm location. Remove the seeds from the flower (you could use a coarse comb or a fork), then roast the seeds in the shell for about 15 minutes. When the seeds are roasted, the shell should be very dry. Put seeds in a deep bowl and with a hand beater or electric mixer, whip the seeds around until most of the shells are broken. Do not use high speed. When most of the shells are broken, put the seeds in a pan of water. The shells will ride to the top, and the seed will sink. Then all you have to do is skim the shells from the surface.

Dry the seeds by spreading them on a tea towel until thoroughly dry, then store them in a porous container, such as a paper bag, and place in a cool, dry location.

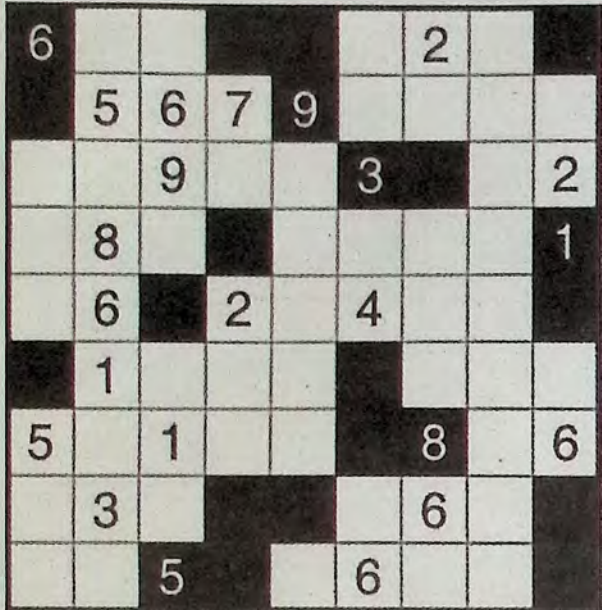

various directions. We were also sent food at the radio station as I kept broadcasting live information.

We heard that parts of Allison Flats were flooded and that part of downtown Princeton was also under water. I remember at one point moving my car to the first bench and running down the 'zigzag' to get back to the radio station not knowing how serious the situation was. I expected the entire downtown to be flooded.

What I also remember vividly was that Crisis Assistance Society's 'Santa's Workshop' got flooded. I was Vice President of that organization at the time and the blow was devastating. We were just getting into the pre-Christmas Hamper Drive season. We ended up moving to what is now Field's Store on Vermilion Avenue and that saved our Hamper Drive. Some months later we ended up with an additional location where the Crisis Store is now next to the library.

I remember the trailer park behind the former Similkameen Vending being under water and more than one trailer being moved from where it had been sitting. I remember seeing unbelievable amounts of debris, including items obviously washed out of someone's yard, floating down the Tulameen River. I remember Tulameen River being so high that some of us doubted many of the things we saw floating by were going to make it underneath the bridge.

I know I thought the wooden bridge was going to be washed away.

The stories coming into the radio station that night were scary. It was clear that some people lost everything and others did not. What I also remember was that for months afterwards the community experienced a change. Pitching in to help others was a normal thing around here but I think many of us did not realize how vulnerable we still were when conditions out of our control get out of hand.

I remember going home well after midnight that night thinking I had done a good thing along with so many other residents who had also done something good for a friend, neighbour or stranger. I remember thinking that I would never forget the kind of impact we had broadcasting details late into the evening reassuring everyone that there was help available. I remember calming frantic callers down on the phone.

I also remember getting hammered by management in Penticton the next day for interrupting a network feed because advertising didn't run while I was trying to assist in an emergency situation. My conversations with them I'd rather not remember. What I do carry with me to this day from that whole experience is that as long as people care about their community, they take care of it. And I can honestly say that a lot of us banded together on that November afternoon/evening in 1995 and took care of Princeton.

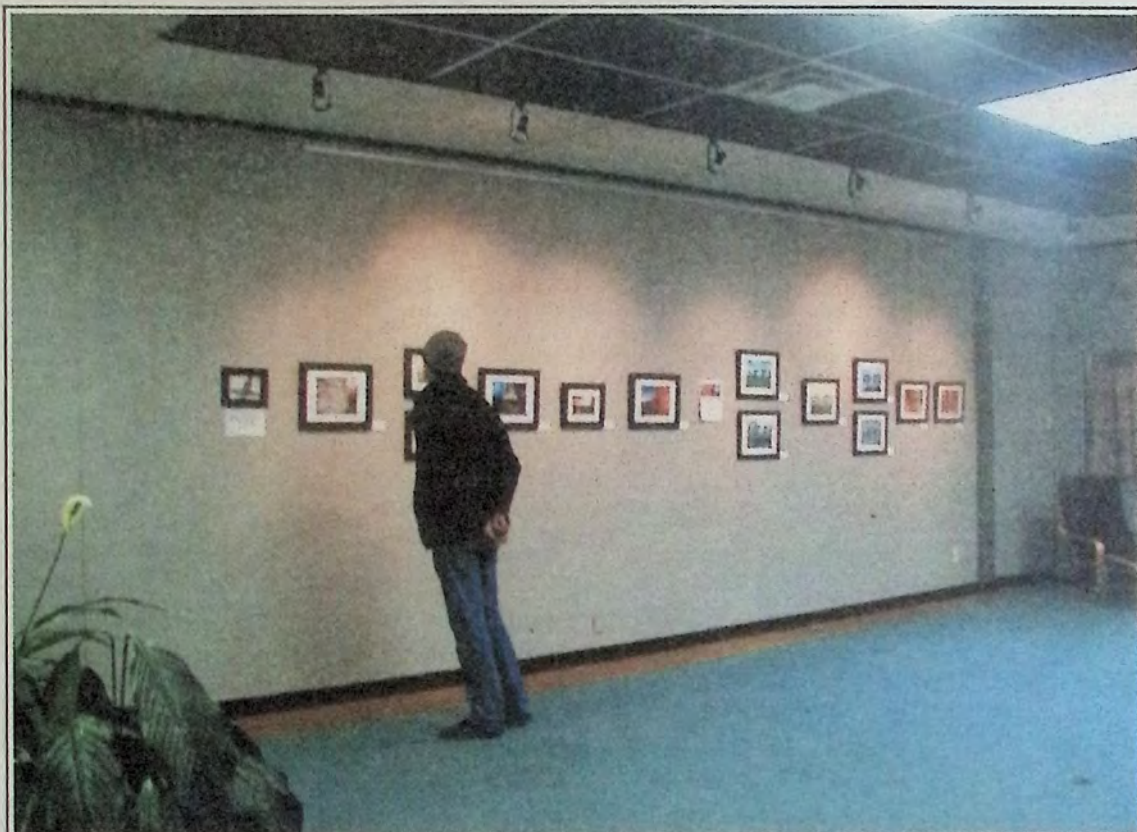

Local book tells nasty history

Most of the people who could remember what happened to miners in the Dirty Thirties are dead, and what happened then is not well known. Young people today do not know ordinary working people were labeled 'communists' and local businessmen put together a chapter of the KKK to engage in vigilantism. Few younger people know we had provincial police sent in to deal with men on strike.

Jon Bartlett and Rika Ruebsaat launch their new book this week. It is titled "Soviet Princeton, Slim Evans and the 1932-33 Miners' Strike." This book is well researched and well written, telling this part of Princeton's history accu-

rately, naming names and telling both sides of the story.

When violence and politics become part of the story of workers looking for decent wages, the feelings about what happened do not die until those involved are dead. Bartlett and Ruebsaat accurately state "such knowledge can poison the atmosphere between new and old residents of the town."

However, those who were personally involved in the conflict of that time have passed on. Those of us who read this book will have a variety of responses. This was our town during tough times. There are some lessons to be learned after thinking about what is written. "Soviet Princeton" is that kind of book.

Saving Downtown Princeton...

...An Ongoing Series by George Elliott

I am going to go on a bit further about the OCP this week.

In particular I'm going to focus on developments that came out of the Public Hearing held November 16th and the resulting decision that came about in the following public meeting of Princeton Town Council.

To review, the Public Hearing was held to allow members of the public to have input into proposed amendments to zoning of a total of seven properties, four of them on Burton

Avenue. The majority of the amendments were approved with Councillor Kim Maynard opting to table a decision on property on Burton Avenue saying that it was the most controversial of the amendments.

As two members of Town Council were absent, and Councillor Rosemary Doughty refusing to second Maynard's motion, Mayor Frank Armitage did and the properties in question will go through the process again.

I'm not going to get into whatever the controversy is, as that will likely become evident as the process moves forward.

What I want to look at is an extension to what Spencer mentioned last week and how I see it working to assist progress and forward motion of our community. In a nutshell, Spencer discussed how many elected officials are controlled, or directed on decisions by what he called 'handlers' and others like to identify with the term 'puppet masters.' However you look at it, his point is clear, someone in the background generally has influence on politicians regardless of what level of government they participate in.

I see Councillor Jerome Tjerkstra's outspokenness regarding the expensive OCP update, Councillor Kim Maynard's motion to look deeper into the OCP/Zoning amendments of certain properties and Mayor Frank Armitage's deviation from

protecting the status quo by seconding Maynard's motion as a huge turning point in the maturity of our current Town Council.

Trust me, this is big.

I am extremely impressed with the fact that these things are happening as it tells me a lot about the workings of Town Hall versus the working of Town Council. While I would never suggest that our Town Council is being controlled by others, the recent breaks from the mould happening shows me that if they were being controlled, it's not working as members of Town Council are now acting on their own on certain issues.

I cannot tell you how happy I am to see this nor can I express the amount of joy I feel that the changes in our Town Council are showing over such an important issue to the very fabric of our community - the Official Community Plan.

As I explained last week, that document is pretty much the blueprint for our future. You and I don't want it screwed up very much if that can be avoided. By the looks of it, members of our current Town Council see the same thing. Sure, there are opportunities to make revisions, but we all know that costs money so if we can all get on the same page at the same time we could avoid a lot of revisions.

The way to achieve that is to work with a clearly defined vision.

The OCP is an essential part of that vision and, depending on whom you talk to, is what keeps that vision on track by documenting it.

Because there has been a delay put in place for at least part of the recent collection of OCP/Zoning amendments, this gives you a chance to act on my suggestion last week - to contact members of Town Council to share your feelings about the

Les Louis of the Lower Similkameen Indian Band was commissioned to create the painting, titled *The Land Before Us*, which now hangs next to the elevators off the front lobby at PRH.

"It's representational of our four food chiefs - the bear, the bitterroot, the Saskatoon, berry and the salmon," he explained.

"I wanted to represent our traditional lifestyle. Everything we need is provided for us by the land."

Louis said being asked to create the medicine wheel artwork for the hospital was a pleasant surprise.

"Traditionally our land provides

everything for us that we need, but times have changed," he said.

"By having the piece here in the hospital, some of our First Nations people can find some comfort if they're here (as patients)."

A number of local First Nations dignitaries and Interior Health officials were on hand for the November 16 unveiling ceremony. Also in attendance was retired teacher Lois Dyck, who had encouraged Louis to develop his artistic talents when he was a student in her Grade 4 class in Keremeos.

Lori Motluk, Interior Health's

health service administrator for the South Okanagan, said the indigenous art recognizes and commemorates a historic health agreement

signed in June 2012 by the Okanagan Nation Alliance and Interior Health to work together to improve health services for First

Nations people in this area.

Other artworks are on display at Kelowna General Hospital and Vernon Jubilee Hospital.

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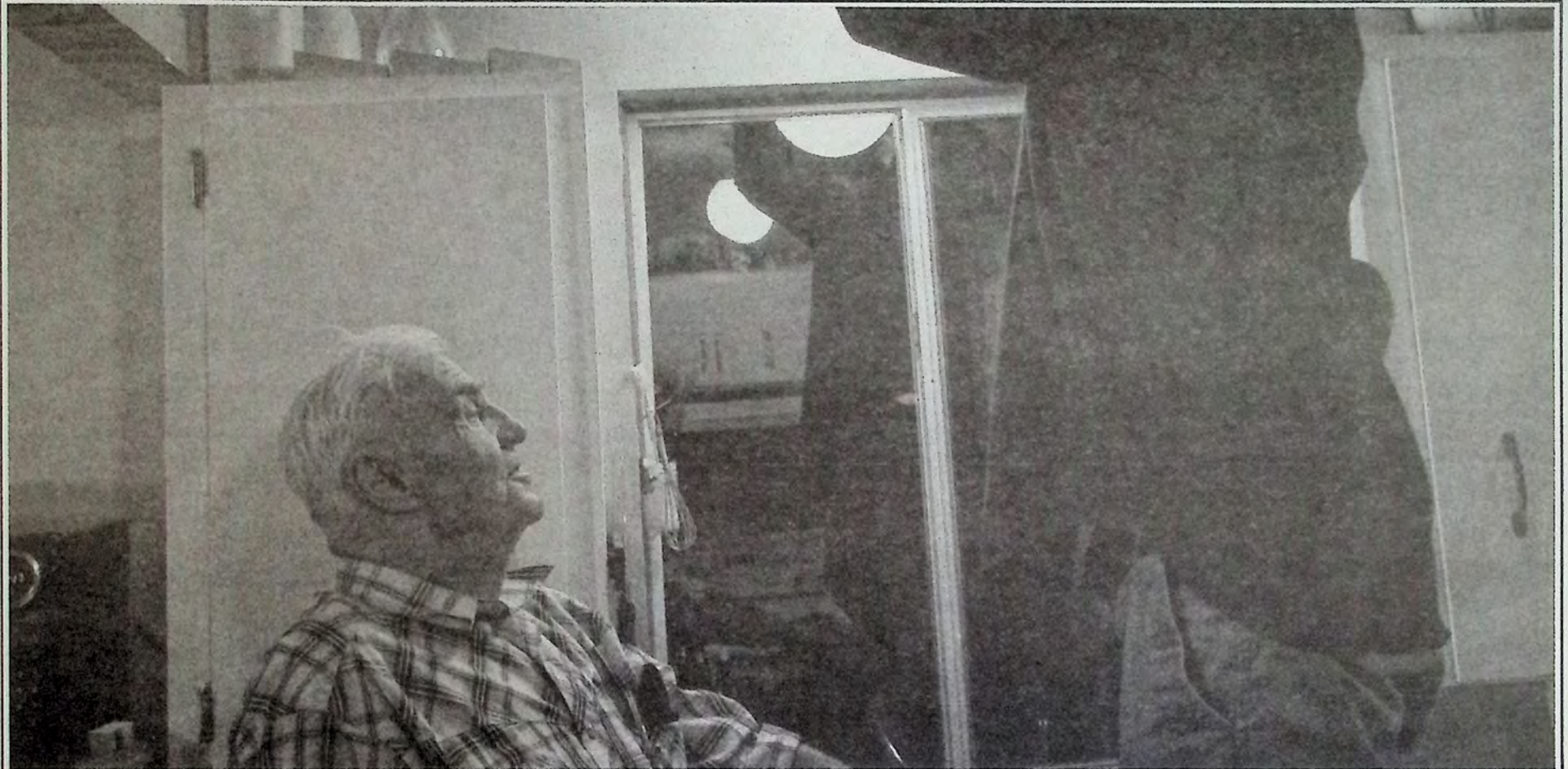

Merriman first to join new Fortis program

FortisBC is extending the Energy Conservation Assistance Program (ECAP), a program aimed at helping income-qualified customers make energy efficient improvements to their home, to an estimated 25,000 residential electricity customers in the Southern Interior and the Kootenays. This will help more customers lower their household energy use and have more comfortable homes.

ECAP participants will receive, at no cost, a visit by an energy evaluator who will provide a home energy assessment and personalized energy saving advice. The evaluator will also install simple energy savings products like energy-efficient lighting, draft proofing and low-flow water fixtures. The home will be assessed to determine if it's suitable for insulation upgrades, a refrigerator upgrade or a more energy-efficient

furnace.

The installation of these simple energy-saving measures alone can save participants up to \$165 per year in energy costs. This can have the greatest impact for customers who likely experience higher than average utility bills over winter because their homes may be less efficient or they have heating systems that are more expensive to operate, like electric baseboards.

Heating and cooling can account for more than 50 per cent of a home's energy use and utility bills can spike during periods of cold weather. Water heating can account for more than 25 per cent of use throughout the year. Taking steps like the ones offered through this program are important for all customers to consider especially prior to the winter heating season.

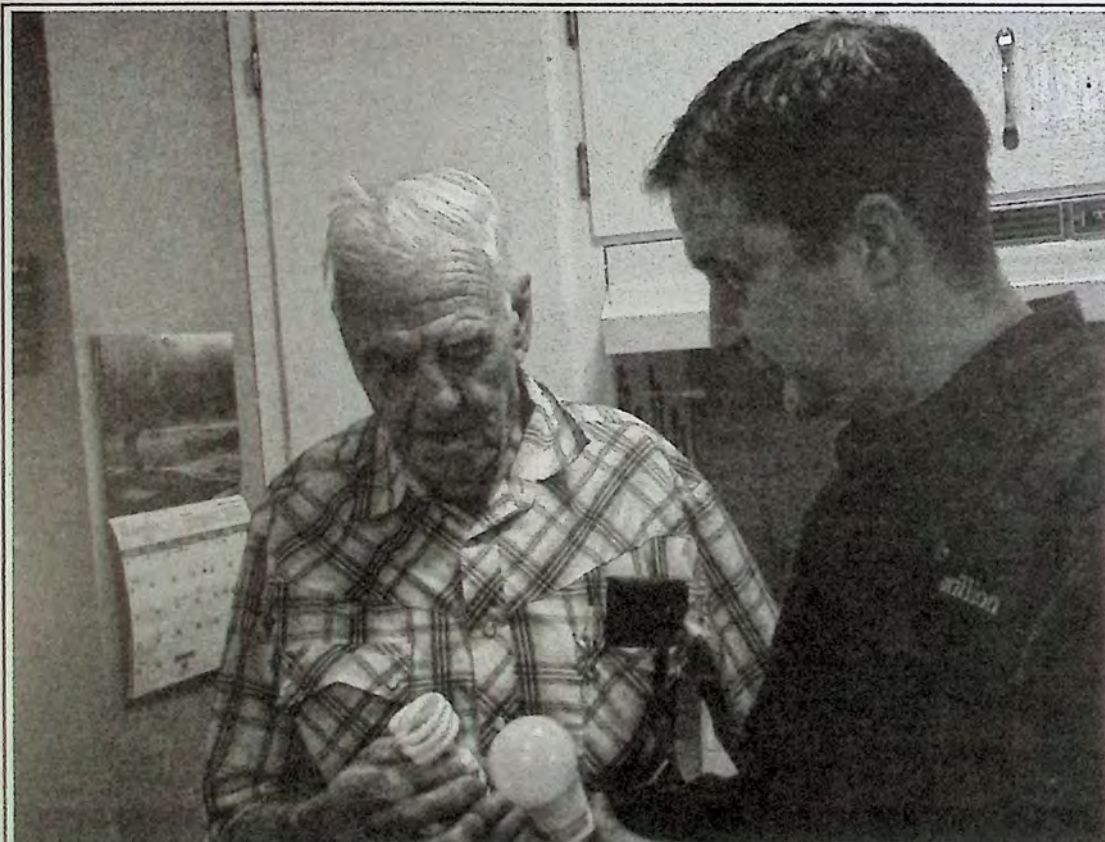
FortisBC works closely with the B.C. government and other utility providers to make sure all B.C. residents have access to energy savings programs regardless of their energy provider and location.

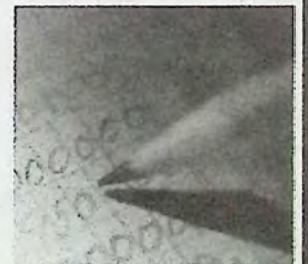

 amendments. Only this week you can add Councillor Kim Maynard and Mayor Frank Armitage to your list of contacts. They obviously want to hear from you or all the amendments would have passed at the November 16th meeting of Town Council.
 I want to take a moment to thank those members of Town Council who are taking steps to listen to the community. You represent us, so it's

nice to see you are listening to us as well. Believe me, we all understand you want the best for your community but in order to find out what that really is, you need to find out what those of us in the community actually want and not what you think we want. Or what your 'handlers' are telling you the town needs.
 This could lead to a great deal of cooperation from both sides and a great deal of progress for our community.

How does this save downtown Princeton?
 It's tough not to see how elected officials standing up for things due to moral or personal reasons can't do anything but be a huge help to the growth of the community. The OCP controversy started a while back when some property owners 'discovered' how proposed changes to zoning would affect earning potential of their real estate when on the market. It showed how a better sharing of information regarding such municipal matters was needed. Town Council responded and has been working on improving those things. Members of Council speaking up over the matter in recent weeks shows they see the concern and want to make things right.
 Providing opportunities for you and me to get more involved in the process leading to important decisions makes our elected officials more accessible and shows a better understanding of the accountability we expect from them.
