## PHCSC reports on health care

On Tuesday, November 17, the Princeton Health Care Steering Committee (PHCSC) held its monthly meeting at Princeton General Hospital. The meeting was attended by representatives from the Town of Princeton, Area H (RDOS), health care practitioners, Interior Health, BC Ambulance Services, and Support Our Health Care (SOHC). The meeting was chaired by IH representative, Susan Brown.

Laila Bird, President of the Princeton Hospital Auxiliary, attended the meeting as the first presenter in the Steering Committee's

'Community Outreach' series. The purpose of this program is to form collaborative partnerships between the PHCSC and organizations in our community that are involved in the delivery of health and health care services.

Bird made a short presentation explaining that the primary role of the Auxiliary is to provide funding for the purchase of additions to Princeton General Hospital. One of their most recent purchases is a data card reader, used in the analysis of diagnostic information. The Hospital Auxiliary has been supporting our hospital for over 100 years.

It also provides funding to Princeton Search and Rescue, Highway Extrication, Vermilion Court, Meals on Wheels, and other related health organizations. The main source of income is their Thrift Shop which is run entirely by volunteers and relies on donations through the goodwill of Princeton and Area residents. The Steering Committee thanked Bird for her presentation and congratulated her on the outstanding contribution the Auxiliary is making to our community.

Bird summed up their involvement by stating, "It's our hope that we can help to keep the hospital vibrant."

Susan Brown, IH representative, and Karen Reader, BC Ambulance Services representative, reported on the Community Paramedicine Program being established in our community. Princeton has been chosen as one of the two prototype

communities for the early planning around preparation for and introduction of this new program. This initiative is a joint project funded by the BC Ministry of Health in cooperation with BC Emergency Health Services, provincial Health Authorities, the Ambulance Paramedics of British Columbia (Local 873), and the First Nations Health Authority. Details of the program will be shared with the public in the near future.

The final report of the Princeton Access to Specialists project was presented and discussed. From January 2014 to 2015, 46 specialist outreach clinics and nine lunch hour Continuing Medical Education programs were held in Princeton as part of the project. Approximately 450 patient appointments were made in eleven specialty areas, including cardiology, general internal medicine, general surgery, methadone

program, nephrology, orthopaedics, paediatrics, psychiatry, respiratory, rheumatology, and urology. The results of a survey of patients, specialists, and practitioners indicated 98% clinic attendance and 100% patient satisfaction.

The report showed that the program resulted in less strain on low income families, a savings of at least 70,000 kms of patient travel in one year, and greater sustainability for rural practice. Recommendations for the future include continuation of the outreach clinics, establishment of more contact between practitioners and specialists, and improved flow of chart information for continuity of care.

The Steering Committee acknowledged the value of this important program and recognized all those responsible for its success.

# 1001 Arabian Nights

## Crimson Tine Players Score Another Win

I am not a 'play person.' In fact, neither my wife nor I are huge on live theatre although I have performed on stage in my past.

My very first role was that of Joseph in a Christmas play produced by my Grade 1 class in Edmonton. The second, and final, role I had was that of The Devil in a Christmas play produced by my church a few years ago. So, ironically, I appear to have a strange connection to Christmas plays and the roles of good or evil.

I'd like to think that gives me enough background on what goes on in putting together any form of live theatre. Last Christmas I got a whole new education when I was welcomed into the background and followed the entire process from casting to performance of Crimson Tine Players' Christmas 2014 production of Yo, Ho, Ho A Pirate Christmas.

So when I was invited to review the current production of that group I already had a sense of the amount of work that had taken place in the past two or three months to get to where they were comfortable in performing what is commonly called a Press Show.

The main incentive behind a Press Show is to get some 'ink' prior to Opening Night with hopes of generating some extra buzz to fill the theatre on performance dates.

I will start off by saying I am not a very good reviewer of live theatre.

I would love to be highly critical of various aspects of the performance but I also realize the show I saw was

not the one-hundred percent finely tuned and completely polished version you may see this week. I also don't see myself sitting back and writing things like, "The dialogue was as dull as dishwater, a close match to (some other unrelated, nasty comment)" simply because we are not watching professionals.

With all of this in mind I did shoot some short videos while watching the Press Show, which will slowly appear on my YouTube Channel (PrincetonBCNews) to help promote the event. The videos also help me to look at the performance a bit differently than trying to write a review from memory or notes scribbled during the Press Show that I could no longer read or decipher.

The play is called "1001 Arabian Nights and A Matinee" which does not appear to have much to do with Christmas. But in the spirit of giving, it is clearly a gift from Crimson Tine Players to the community for continuing to support their efforts.

What stood out for me immediately were the backgrounds. I cannot say enough about the talented artists we have in our community who painted and constructed such vivid and realistic sets. From the town market to a desert to a cave environment, the sets/backgrounds needed absolutely no explanation, as they were clear, concise and magnificent.

The cast, which this time included a majority of 'first-timers' was solid and even during the Press Show required very little in the way of prompting. This stood out for me

simply because I noticed right away that there was a massive amount of dialogue. I can't remember three different computer passwords and I use them daily. How anyone can remember pages and pages of scripting continues to be beyond me and earns my admiration and respect in any live performance. 1001 Arabian Nights gets a bit more of that from me since most of the cast consists of local youth.

Players who you have to watch as I suspect they will have an incredible career in local live theatre include Natasha Ferdinand (Genie) and Jordyn Sawicki (Bob/Princess Bobastasia). Honourable Mentions go to Gabe Oliver (Ali Barber) and James Sawicki (Dame Barber). Two performers I can't even try to 'rate' are Dayton Wales (Singbad Barber) and Kaylie Gibb (The Grand Vizier) simply because they are in a category all their own.

Without giving away much of the storyline, minor role players all contribute something significant to the play, even if it is just a sight gag. Speaking of gags, there is a generous helping of humour throughout 1001 Arabian Nights, but you may have to listen carefully as most of it is hidden in clever dialogue. I suspect some of the funny lines will get lost in laughter from the crowd reacting to one or two others in the beginning of a string of jokes - so listen carefully!

There are segments of what would be considered 'audience participation' and you will want to get involved in that. I scored points .....continued on Page 6

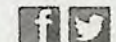

### A Book Called "(Censored) Princeton"

I attended the book launch last Friday night at Princeton Museum of Jon and Rika's new publication titled, "Soviet Princeton."

I counted about 50 others there with me and we sat through an enjoyable tale of what Princeton was like in the 1930s and a chapter of the history of the community that some still refuse to talk about. I'm referring specifically about the coal miners' strike(s) and the way in which local media at the time whipped the incident into a source of fear and confusion.

In addition to being entertaining storytellers, Jon and Rika (we all know who they are, so I won't add their surnames) are thorough in their research. What I found most intriguing about the whole story about the strike(s) and surrounding details was the fact that still to this day it appears to be a sore spot for many.

Jon indicated that even some police files on the incident are 'missing' at the federal level and Rika added that interviews of old timers archived in the local museum show changes in subject when the miners' strike is mentioned.

Censorship took place even up to last week with the downtown electronic information sign oddly referring to the published book by anything other than it's actual title of "Soviet Princeton." I'm surprised that for the week there were still messages on the glitchy sign in red letters, considering the fear that must have bubbled up when the word Soviet was spoken in hushed tones at Town Hall. I can just imagine the crisis that would have arisen if Jon and Rika had used words like 'Farmer' or 'Rancher' or 'Canadian' or 'Canuck' in the title.

Maybe that's why I enjoyed the presentation at their book launch so much. They can look at the way things were before political correctness homogenized thoughts and minds and just tell it like it was.

Let's face it, Canadian History has many examples we should all be ashamed of but those should also be the foundation of lessons learned in order to make the future better. Trying to hide these incidents under a rug, or in the case of "Soviet Princeton," cause some to well, pretend it never happened, is an injustice to those involved and censorship of the worse kind.

Coal mining was not pretty and the stories from that era can be just as dirty and thanks to the superb detective work of Jon and Rika, they have managed to bring back to the surface a piece of Princeton's history many of us appreciate learning more about. The controversy that comes with the territory, especially modern day fears, just makes the book that much more valuable in my mind.

It also means they could have a best seller on their hands, which I predict will be the result.

Change in a community can be a good thing - if it leads to positive outcomes like an improved, expanded and more vibrant community, better services and amenities for its citizens, and of course, a more pleasing public image - one that will generate community pride and attract visitors. However, change for its own sake, without due consideration for consequences, is seldom worthwhile! Sometimes it is best to leave well enough alone!

When I first read about some of the zoning changes proposed within the new Official Community Plan my reaction was, "what on earth are they thinking?" In a town where stable businesses are desperately needed, how can it make sense to pull the rug out from under successful enterprises that have been around for decades, even if they are not pretty to look at! Here, I refer to N & L Automotive and the Tire Shop across the street on the Old Hedley Road near the Arena. By latest report, these two have now been amended to Business Transition! I gather this means that when these businesses close the zoning will change to Residential. This, in turn, means that the proprietors, after working for many years to

establish themselves, will be left with some very low value, difficult building lots to fund their retirement. How utterly unfair!

Then we come to the most egregious zoning change - that for the Fletchers Building Supplies (ACE) on Burton Avenue, formerly Irly Building Supplies. This location has been Princeton's main Building Supplies store for decades. It has always been, and continues to be, a conveniently located and attractive business - one on which most of us in the construction and renovations field rely on for our immediate needs. The new owners have shown themselves to be excellent corporate citizens and enthusiastic par-

ticipants in community affairs. They have invested themselves heart and soul, and pocket book, in this business with much personal effort and through ongoing expansion and innovations. Now Town Council decrees that after a Business Transition phase (if granted) zoning would change to Medium Density Residential - again vastly diminishing value. Here the Town Planners perhaps foresee a development of ground floor stores and offices with residential suites above, as we currently see across the street from ACE; attractive but still underutilized! The entire Business Transition concept (OCP 5.8B .1 to .5) seems .....continued on Page 20

## The Master Power Broker: David Rockefeller

sus around free market Western capitalism." The Bilderberg Group is frequently accused of fostering a world government. Dennis Healey, a 30 year member, has stated the accusation is "not wholly unfair." He said they "felt we couldn't go on forever fighting one another for nothing and killing people and rendering millions homeless. So we felt a single community throughout the world would be a good thing."

A steering committee organizes the annual conference of two members from 18 nations. The steering committee is currently made up of a prince, three barons, a viscount and two others without royal titles. They choose who will participate in the annual conference. The content and decisions of the conference are not for publication, so there is no public scrutiny. There is also an Advisory Committee, of which David Rockefeller is the sole member.

In 1965, David Rockefeller founded the Americas Society and the Council of the Americas, a business organization to promote free trade and open markets throughout the Americas. These organizations are now amalgamated.

In 1973, David Rockefeller founded the Trilateral Commission to foster closer cooperation between North America, Western Europe and Japan. The Trilateral Commission was originally made up of academics, politicians and CEOs of huge corporations hand-picked by Rockefeller.

The Trilateral Commission has been referred to as Rockefeller's version of the Council on Foreign Relations, but although both are think tanks, the members of each are often interchangeable. Both these non-governmental groups promote much the same thing: globalization and less restrictions on corporations.

One of the biggest projects undertaken by the Bilderberg Group was the unification of Europe. Following World War II, members of a government branch now

known as the CIA developed an operation funded by the Ford Foundation and the Rockefeller Foundation to persuade western European nations to unite. Out of this effort, the European Union was formed.

There were flaws in the entire plan: it was based on ignoring a great deal of the rest of the world, and it was based on the view of people who had a lot of money. The average person trying to make a living was not represented in the mind set of these organizations. The other flaw was the fear of communism, a fear which motivated the need for a strong, powerful western Europe and North America.

In the years following the formation of the Bilderberg Group, the British Empire began losing its nations in Africa. It had already lost India. Then India lost territory resulting in the formation of Pakistan and Bangladesh. France lost Viet Nam. Nations in Central and South America wanted greater independence and less interference from the corporations of the United States. In Europe, nations fell apart, as in Yugoslavia and Czechoslovakia. The increasing role of corporations in influencing politics and global policies met with resistance from ordinary people. The Soviet Union collapsed, freeing many nations who became independent. Today, even the European Union is suffering from threats to separate, mostly for economic reasons. The Middle East has been a hotbed of national goals clashing with corporate goals.

The rise of China and Russia in recent years has given greater challenges to the original goals of the groups formed by David Rockefeller.

David Rockefeller and the groups he formed had tremendous influence over politics and national policies, but does the thinking of those who became part of those groups truly reflect what is happening in the world today?

People born to a different kind of world have a different view of the world, and their priorities are quite different from those set 50 years ago. People are better connected via communications devices, and are becoming more informed through these devices. I believe we are going to see many more changes coming out of new generations of thinkers who have entirely different mind-sets.

The most influential voice in Western policy in the years after World War II was that of David Rockefeller. He is 100 years old this year, having survived six heart transplants. He is the world's oldest billionaire.

Born the youngest son of John D. Rockefeller Jr. and grandson of John D. Rockefeller, co-founder of Standard Oil, he joined a family famous for wealth and philanthropy. For example, David Rockefeller's father donated \$8.5 million to buy the present site of United Nations Headquarters in New York City.

What does the youngest son of a very rich family do to make himself known? In David Rockefeller's case, he set out to make a place for himself in history by finding power through extraordinary influence over government policy. The question now is whether his influence and the influence of the groups he formed has been beneficial for the world.

David Rockefeller was co-founder of the Bilderberg Group who first met in May 1954. 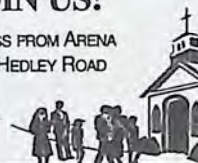

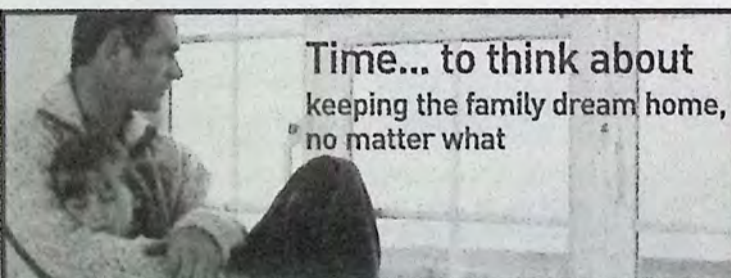

# Pets 'n' Vets

## Winter Pet Safety

It seems that old man winter is here again and with him, some things we need to remember to keep our pets safe while he hangs around.

Over winter, many pets die because of the cold or things related to winter. Here are some tips to keep your pets safe until the groundhog says spring is here again.

### Outdoor shelter:

Many pets freeze to death because they don't have proper shelter or they get left outside for longer than expected. Regardless of whether your pet only goes out

to use the bathroom, they should have some shelter - you never know if you will have something come up and your pet is outside longer than they should be. Proper shelter for winter is insulated and the opening is protected to stop wind.

Most designers focus on insulation and aesthetics and forget about the most important part of a pet's shelter - the roof. If the roof is too high for our pets, their body heat rises too high to keep them warm. The ceiling of the shelter should be only a few inches above their head standing up.

### Reflective collars or coats:

Slippery roads are a part of winter. Unfortunately, our pets don't realize that vehicles can't stop as fast on ice as they can. Reflective leashes or coats when our pets are outside help warn drivers that they should slow down, before the pet darts out in front of them.

### Heated Water Dishes:

If your dog is outside in the winter for long periods, it is as important that they stay hydrated as it is in the summer. To ensure they do, and that the water doesn't give them hypothermia, water dishes outside should be heated.

### Road Salt:

When our pets come in from outside in the winter, they often have road salt and ice stuck to their

feet. They then proceed to lick their feet clean which can lead to salt toxicity, not to mention what other poisons were in the road salt and ice. The simplest way to prevent this is by purchasing a set of boots for your pet's to wear outside. The cheapest way is to wash their feet with warm cloths to melt the ice for them.

### Vehicle Safety:

Just like in the summer, leaving pets in a vehicle during winter is dangerous. If the vehicle is left off, they run the risk of freezing. Turning on the vehicle with the window's up to keep them warm, and your pet could die from carbon monoxide poisoning.

While driving, pets should be kennelled or seat-belted. Slippery roads makes a pet distracting or bumping you much more serious than summer.

### Walking your dogs:

Emergency rooms across Canada deal with broken hips, wrists and concussions every winter from people slipping when walking their dog. On icy sidewalks, even a chihuahua can pull you off your feet. Many stores sell slip on cleats for traction on ice to prevent such accidents.

As winter settles in, keep your pets and yourself safe so you can enjoy cuddling with them and a cup of hot chocolate.

Those with multiple sclerosis need Vitamin D. The link between multiple sclerosis and Vitamin D deficiency was established many years ago. Adequate Vitamin D is essential in preventing multiple sclerosis. Multiple sclerosis is most prevalent in those areas of the world receiving the least sunlight. Canada is one of those nations with a high rate of multiple sclerosis.

Maintain your health this winter. It is not enough just to eat well and exercise. You need that Vitamin D.

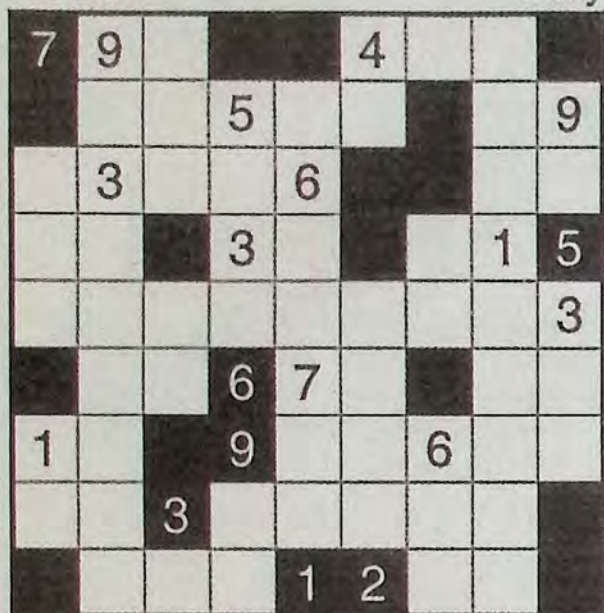

### Naturalists Hike KVR North: Otter Lake to Frembd Lake

Vermilion Forks Field Naturalists took to the trail again on Saturday, November 21st, when Joan Kelly led 18 of us along the Kettle Valley Railway in the Tulameen area.

We began at the south end of Otter Lake and walked northward along the path, which is wedged between the eastern shores of the lake and steep mountainsides. The temperature was a cool -10 degrees, but the sun was shining and there was little wind. We were an eclectic group, with ages spanning four generations and a couple of dogs to complete the mix.

We walked 4-kilometres before stopping for an early lunch, taking advantage of a picnic table and fire pit placed close to the lake for opti-

mum viewing of the scenic landscape. We mixed and mingled, while warming ourselves with hot chocolate and lunches toasted over the fire.

After lunch our group split in two, with half heading back to the vehicles as the others continued north another 8-kilometres, past Otter Lake to the north end of Frembd Lake.

The latter route took us alongside Otter Creek, where the trail crosses the waterway to travel along its west side, and past the confluence of Otter and Frembd Creeks, a particularly picturesque segment of the KVR.

During our three hours of walking we had spotted eight different species of birds, including Red-

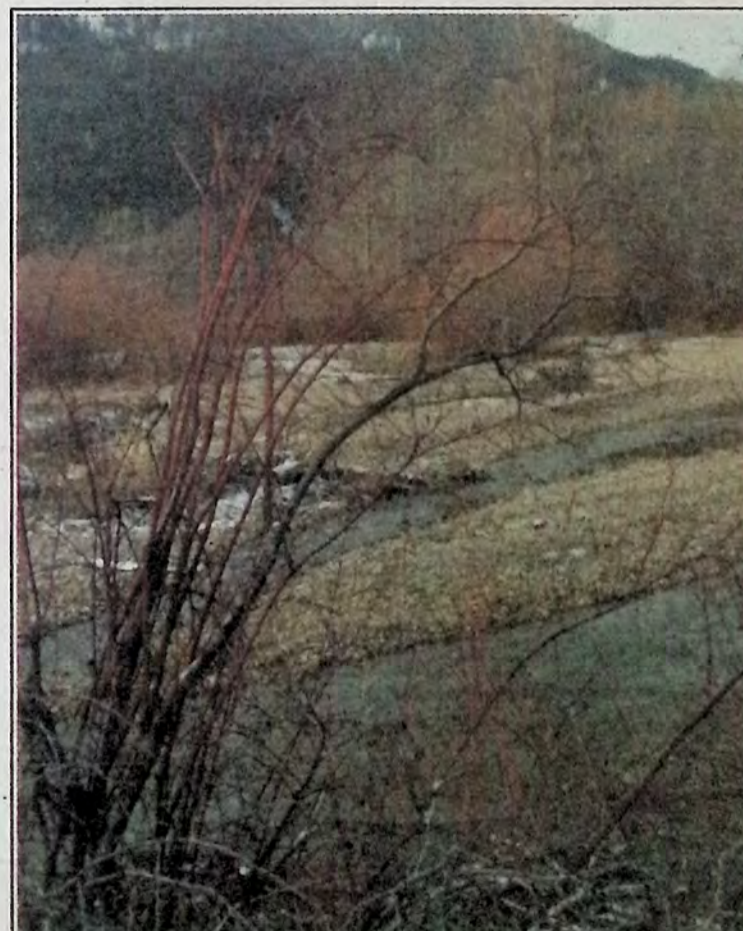
necked Grebes, Pied-billed Grebes, Common Mergansers, and Common Goldeneyes, but two more species captured our attention as we approached the north end of Frembd Lake. Tundra Swans and American Wigeons gracefully dotted the icy water, an exquisite sighting that brought our outing to a perfect conclusion, as our companions were nearby on the road, ready to pick us up and travel home!

Our next field trip will be December 5th, when Tip Anderson will lead us along the trails of Swan Lake, show off the new gates that the Rotary Club has built for us, and provide a small campfire for our lunches. We'll drink a toast to much loved and greatly missed nat-

uralist and Rotarian, Frank Kelly. Please bring food and drink, and meet at Billy's Restaurant parking lot by 10:00 AM.

We will have no December meeting, but our January 12th meeting will feature local archeologist,

# Saving Downtown Princeton...

## ...An Ongoing Series by George Elliott

As we celebrate the first anniversary of our new Town Council this week I think it is fitting to issue a report card on their progress.

Expect this to be an annual activity.

Overall, I have to say the good pretty much overrides the bad after reviewing activities over the past twelve months of our elected (I know, acclaimed) Town Council. This is the first Town Council to sit for four years, following changes to the Local Government Act that saw

elections in November 2014 in British Columbia shift from a three year to a four-year term of office.

It is going to be a long time for each of our members of Town Council and although it may not always be obvious, I have a great deal of respect for anyone who willingly steps up to fill any position in public office. That being said, the current Princeton Town Council has had an interesting year. There have been some tremendous highs and a few mistakes.

Probably the biggest 'first step' our new council took was in mid-January when they announced they were going to take control of recreation. This amounted to include Riverside Centre, Princeton Arena, Centennial Pool, the Princeton Fairgrounds and, "all other recreational programs offered to Princeton and Area H residents"

I give council a 'B' for that because I'm stingy with my grading. The first major event under this new approach was Family Day in February and included other events such as Canada Day and Christmas Light-Up. All were successful in different ways.

In February the Town announced their intent to hire a Deer Manager and hosted Okanagan Regional Library CEO Stephanie Hall to a public meeting of Town Council. An Open House meeting that followed at the Princeton Library saw a presentation pushing towards a

supposed requirement to cut back local library hours in order to balance a system where new libraries in the Central Okanagan needed the hours.

I give both Town CAO Rick Zerr and Mayor Frank Armitage high marks (likely a B+) for calling their bluff and pressing for actual cost figures to 'save' the local hours. I was at that meeting and it was great to see local officials challenging the stance of the ORL and before long everyone in the room agreed that even an extra five or ten dollars tacked onto their taxes was worth keeping the library open.

The best line spoken that evening came from Zerr who hinted that since the Town owned the building ORL was in that maybe Princeton could break away from the regional system and go on their own. Town Council actually saved Princeton's library that night and that earns an A+ from me. It will be one of the

best things to come from our new Town Council in this term.

In March the Town took control of the Trans-Canada Trail with a 30-year license. The trail system through Princeton has been a controversial subject for some time and a desire by our community leaders to make it non-motorized has been an issue with many. The pressure from ATVers pushed the Mayor enough that he came out with the classic line in a public meeting of, "We will not be intimidated."

Read what you want into that but I think it was a mistake and rates a C- from me although it has had tremendous potential as a line I have used many times since as an explanation of why certain things appear to happen in Town Hall.

It was in April when Town Council actually deferred an ATV bylaw as changes were coming on responsibilities of off-road vehicle .....continued on Page 20

## RDOS seeks input on strategies

The Regional District of Okanagan-Similkameen (RDOS) is holding a series of public information meetings to outline changes to Environmentally Sensitive Development Permits (ESDPs), as well as gather public feedback on the establishment of a nature conservation fund.

Since 2009, RDOS has been working in partnership with the South Okanagan Similkameen Conservation Program (SOSCP) to create the biodiversity strategy, 'Keeping Nature in Our Future.'

Completed in 2013, the strategy refines information on sensitive

areas in the RDOS and makes up-to-date recommendations for critical directions and opportunities for conservation and stewardship.

"Based on the updated information coming out of 'Keeping Nature in Our Future' we wanted to refine and improve the science-based ESDPs for clarity and consistency," says Christopher Garrish, RDOS Planning Supervisor.

"We were delighted to work with the SOSCP on this very important strategy for the long-term health and sustainability of this region."

ESDPs have been used in the RDOS since 1997 to assess the

impact of development on the natural environment and help protect ecosystems and biological diversity. The upcoming meetings will provide information on how ESDPs will continue to benefit our region and outline the refined ESDP areas with updated mapping and guidance.

A second initiative that came out of "Keeping Nature in Our Future" is the need for increased financing to protect important environmental values through the establishment of


a local conservation fund.

Conservation funds are dedicated sources of revenue held by a regional district or municipality for the specific purpose of undertaking conservation projects. Several BC communities such as Central Okanagan Regional District, Regional District of Central Kootenay and Regional District of East Kootenay have had great success with local conservation funds.

"Without a doubt we live in one of the most spectacularly beautiful

regions in the world," says Bryn White, SOSCP Program Manager.

"Our natural environment contributes greatly to our enjoyment and quality of life, including essential resources and services. A healthy environment ensures clean air and water, rich soils, pest control, fire prevention and pollination, among many other benefits. These natural assets are at risk of being lost forever, and along with them, the benefits they provide to our economy and our communities."

.....continued from Page 16 operators. Councillor Jerome Tjerkstra was the member of Council to make the motion to defer, which may have not seemed significant at the time, but was probably the start of changes within the chemistry of Town Council. Tjerkstra became a more outspoken member in the following months.

In May Town Council pulled the pin on Free Dump Days saying cost factors were the reason. So to accommodate the need of those of us who keep a lot of large pieces of junk piling up just for those days, a decal system was put in place allowing two large loads per year regardless of the date.

The second most significant accomplishment of the current Town Council was later in the same month with the completion and opening of the new Visitor Centre. I have gone on, and on at great length on this one.

The removal of the tourism component from the Chamber of Commerce set this in motion and if I could give something better than an A+ on this, I would.

For any Town Council to hit two biggies out of the park (saving the library and the new visitors centre) so early in a term, with two first-time Councillors is significant. These two items will very likely be what the balance of this term will be measured against.

In June a building downtown burned to the ground and someone on Town Council (my sources tell me) said a really bad thing about it. The comment got swept under the carpet and our Mayor called the scene an eyesore. Later in the month Council announced they had budgeted just over \$10,000 to keep Princeton's library hours unchanged for 2016.

In July a petition regarding the Official Community Plan hit the

streets and the following months saw a game of chess played between property owners and town officials related to the OCP.

Tourism numbers explode in August at the new Visitors Centre and pretty much everyone is convinced that RVs can actually find their way down the downtown core. There was also movement in the industrial park where lots were purchased (rumours indicate there was also one tossed in as a gift) while the OCP discussions heated up.

September, October and November included a string of activities, mostly related to the OCP ranging from awarding an update contract the Urban Systems to Councillor Tjerkstra speaking out about the cost and method to OCP and Zoning amendment meetings. Councillor Kim Maynard put up a roadblock on one part of that procedure seeking more information as the properties in question were "the most controversial" of the bunch. The lack of Councillors present at the meeting and refusal of Councillor Rosemary Doughty to second the motion saw Mayor Frank Armitage oblige.

Also in November the Town approved a contract for an elevator at Town Hall. Work was halted at one point, for reasons that have not been revealed by Town Council. It has however, become ironic proof to us that not everything 'over there' reaches the top floor.

The final conclusion:

Year One I would grade with a generous C+. What hurt the overall mark is the fact that they still aren't very good a "playing (communicating) with others" nor do they excel at "sharing during play time." Or in other words, news releases and open dialogue are lacking. Just ask anyone currently dealing with zoning issues how much love they feel in those closed door meetings.

That being said, there has been a shift of sorts in the overall workings of Town Council and it took controversial issues to snap some of them out of their coma.

One important addition to this report card is for the ladies at the front counter. They are indispensable. They are vital. They are in a class of their own and I sense they are underappreciated and not treated with the

respect they deserve. They should not be abused or bullied. I give them all A+ for surviving the first year.

They deserve a huge pat on the back for all they do for you and me. Consider this a hint for those who treat them poorly.

How does this save downtown Princeton?

We look to our town leaders to push our community into the future. There have been great strides in that direction however, there has also been some backtracking. The OCP and TCT will be issues that may define Town Council's second year in office depending on the end results.

Those results, and other decisions made at the Town Council level, have everything to do with how our community grows and that has a direct affect on the residential core as well as the retail core.
