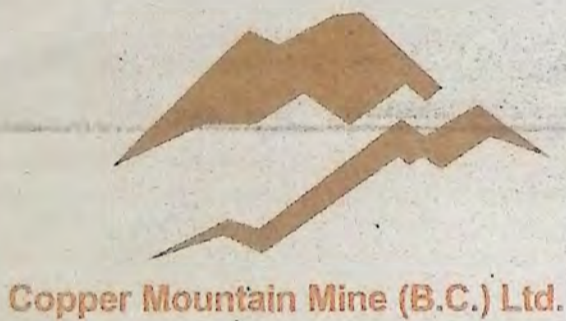
PXA hears motocross plans

Motocross could be coming to Princeton Exhibition Grounds in the near future. At the March 15 meeting of Princeton Exhibition Association (PXA), Dan Lankinen, a local proponent of dirt bike racing, presented an outline of Motocross plans for the grounds. Motocross is a popular sport, attracting hundreds of competitors and spectators to race competitions.

Lankinen outlined a race track design for the grounds, using a portion of the area within the confines of the horse racing track. The dirt

bike racing track design, done by a professional from Kamloops, includes sharp curves, small inclines and straight level stretches. The track would not conflict with thecontinued on Page 2

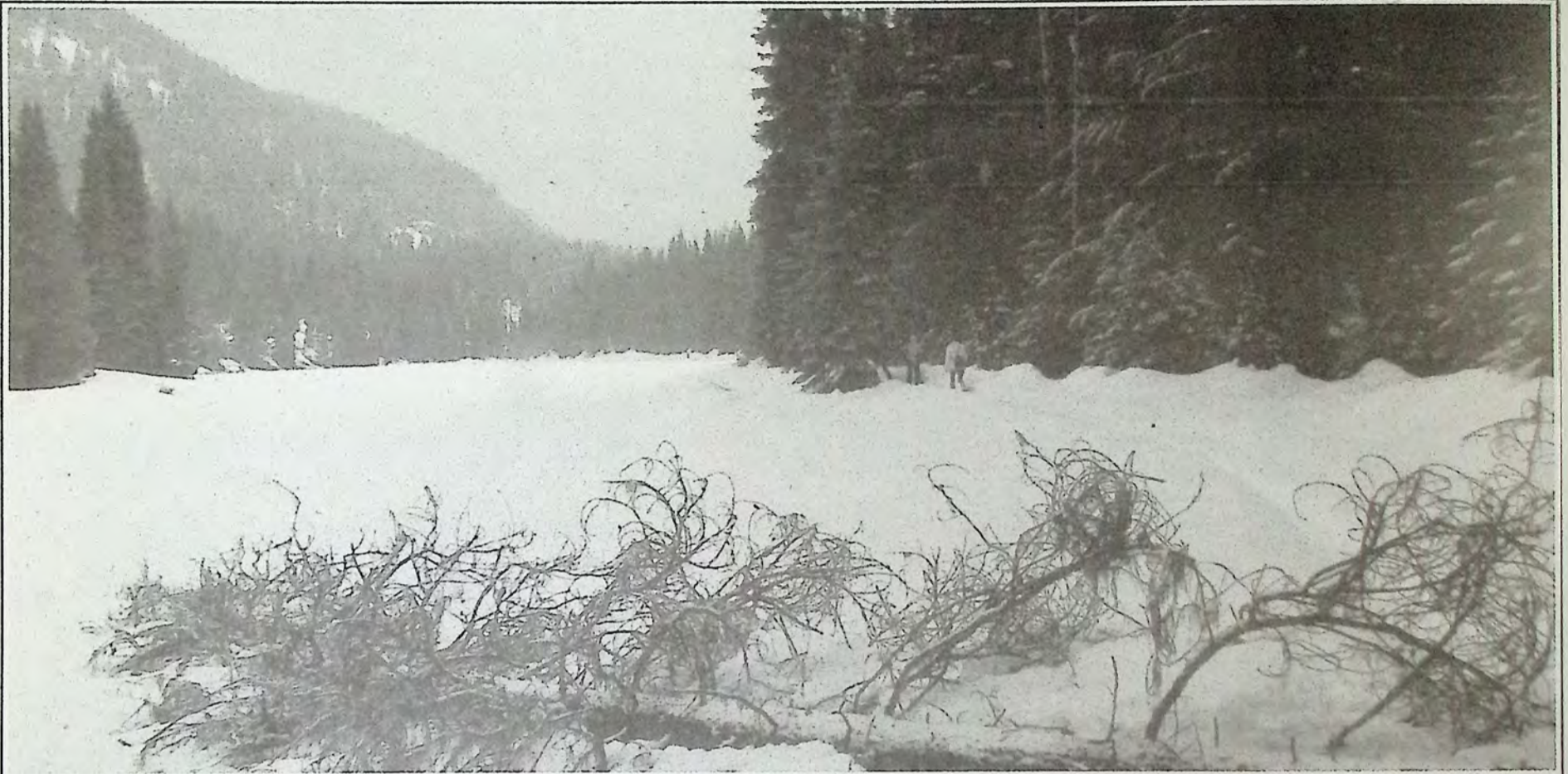

Amended wildfire laws will increase fines

The B.C. government is taking a tougher stand to discourage behaviour that contributes to increased wildfire risks to help protect communities, natural resources and infrastructure from wildfire damage.

Proposed legislative amendments introduced March 14th as part of the Forests, Lands and Natural Resource Operations Statutes Amendment Act (Bill 12) include provisions aimed specifically at people who interfere with firefighting efforts in B.C.

"These tough new regulations are aimed at discouraging people from

interfering in the fighting of wildfires or violating our wildfire laws," Fraser-Nicola MLA Jackie Tegart said.

"Last year's fire season in B.C. was one of the busiest and most expensive in recent years, so we must do all we can to limit the damage in our forests and ensure the safety of our firefighting crews."

Additional legislative changes will result in significantly increased ticket fines for 19 violations under the Wildfire Act and for seven violations under Wildfire Regulation. These changes mean that B.C. now has some of the highest wildfire-

related violation fines in the country.

For example, the fine for failing to comply with a fire restriction under the Wildfire Act is increasing from \$345 (including a \$45 victim surcharge) to \$1,150 (including a \$150 victim surcharge). This represents a 333.33 per cent increase over the previous fine for that offence.

In addition:
- Bill 12 clarifies what is considered

to be 'interference' in terms of actions that could hinder firefighters. The proposed amendments would also clarify that interference does not have to be intentional to constitute a contravention of the Wildfire Act.

- The proposed amendments to the Wildfire Act would strengthen compliance and enforcement provisions by establishing an offence and penalties of up to \$100,000 and/or

imprisonment for up to one year for failing to comply with a stop work order.

On average, 30 to 40 per cent of wildfires in B.C. are human-caused. The 2015 fire season saw more than 283,400 hectares burned and more than \$278 million spent on wildfire management.

.....continued from Front Page existing rodeo arena and mud racing pits.

From the perspective of the PXA, which manages the grounds, one problem was the lack of an existing formal body, such as a society or formal association, with which contracts can be negotiated. Lankinen stated the formation of such a legal entity is in process. What Lankinen needed immediately was permission to store dirt for future use on the dirt bike track, and approval in

principle for the use of the grounds for dirt bike racing.

There was discussion of the plans, and members noted the PXA has been storing Motocross starting gates for years. These had been put in place for Motocross racing many years ago, when another group intended to build a dirt bike race track but abandoned their plans. The PXA did not oppose current plans and gave approval in principle to the plans, with details of use to be agreed upon at a later date,

when a legal entity has been formed. PXA members gave approval for storage on site of dirt to be used in construction of the track. There was no opposition from any of the existing user groups.

From One Fossil To Another

Are you about as confused as I am about the situation at Princeton Museum?

Depending on where you get your information, there's either going to be a hostile takeover or a bloodless coup. I still see some logic in the proposed plan (as far as I can figure, anyway) of Town Council. If they take over control of the building and grounds that they already own, they will be able to bring about a budget for maintenance, improvements and funding the Museum Society could never amass even if they charged five bucks a head for each person who entered the building.

I did not attend the museum AGM last week but I did see members of Town Council going to the event. I was at another nearby photo-op so I had a good vantage point. I was glad to hear that the meeting saw a few of them in attendance. I am told that not one of them spoke during the meeting other than the Council Liaison and again, that makes sense to me.

One person with one message.

Read it how you wish but taking control of the home of Princeton's history does not exactly mean they are taken all the history as well.

There has been no indication whether or not the Museum Society would be expected to dissolve and forfeit their stewardship of historic artifacts. This is really the issue as far as I can tell and I agree with most that the Society should remain and keep taking care of the 'stuff' that keeps the Museum a Museum. I see absolutely nothing wrong with the landlord assuming everything else. It means a lot of good things if you take a hard look at it. Probably at the top of the list is a full-time, union-rate paid position which would include full benefits and the perks that come from not wondering year to year if there was enough funding to keep someone employed 'half-time.'

It would be a huge help if Town Council would spell out some of the details of their plan as this is where much of the confusion for me comes from. If they are taking control of Princeton Museum I'd like to know why. If it is part of a grand plan to bring all Town-owned facilities under one roof - as I speculated in last week's News Leader - then say so. I doubt many of us would have a problem with that.

I think we need to look at the pros and cons to get a better picture of what can come out of this. But in order to see things clearly we also need to leave our feelings out of it and look at just the facts. If the 'takeover' does not make financial, economic or cultural sense, then the matter should be dropped and we all go about our business as usual.

Will this actually happen?

Your guess is as good as mine.

At least if the Town takes control of the actual facility expenses, it'll mean there won't be another debate regarding who has to pay for such things as toilet paper or phone bills.

From where I'm sitting, small stuff like that may be a thing of the past, and they should be.

To the Editor,

I attended the AGM for the Princeton and District Museum Society held March 17, 2016. It was definitely a learning experience. As many know, the President of the Museum Society, Rika Ruebsaat, re-elected President of PDMS, wrote a letter which was released to the public about her concerns with Town Council's interest in the management of the Museum.

In Rika's open letter to the public, published in this newspaper March 15, 2016, she explained the history of the PDMS, its purpose, and its function. She clearly explained what would happen to the PDMS if they were forced to dissolve, the consequences to our Museum would be great and some important artifacts would be returned to the original donors.

So, bottom line is, the bone of contention seems to be the management and 'custody' of the artifacts and whether the museum manager will become an employee of the Town, or remain under the employ of PDMS via funding.

Rika is very much involved in the

community, an articulate and intelligent person, who felt that the Town was about to take over the management of the Museum. I personally applaud her desire to inform the public and to alert us all as to what was happening behind the scenes.

PDMS is dependent on funding on an annual basis, dependent on the physical building that the Society's artifacts are housed in, which means they are beholden to Town Council for the generosity of the building and monthly maintenance of said building, as well as a certain amount of funding annually. Attempting to have a legally binding agreement with the Town about said building and maintenance seems to have prompted Town Council to remind PDMS of their vulnerability, prompting a discussion about Town essentially taking control of the Museum.

If there were no problem with how the museum has been run all these years, the big question is WHAT IS THE PROBLEM NOW? The citizens seem content to allow the PDMS to manage the Museum, as they have done an excellent job so

far, attendance last night is significant proof that the community supports the Museum Society.

All the councillors, except Mr. Pateman, as well as CEO Rick Zerr were in attendance last night (March 17). Rosemary Doughty, a Town Councillor, basically said that she felt it would be better for the Museum and the taxpayers if the Town took over the Management of the Museum. By the end of the meeting not one of the Town Councillors stood up to address the crowd or to assure the members of the PDMS that the intention of Town Council, was not to take control of the Museum. This in itself speaks volumes.

Once again we are left with the question, what are the true intentions of Town Council concerning the Museum Society, the building, the annual funding and the Museum manager's position. My suggestion is to begin seeking other funding immediately and possibly another building. I would certainly try to consult with First Nations on funding possibilities and collaboration. Just an idea!

Store Closings Are Handwriting on the Wall

Store closings by major retail firms are causing some alarm for investors. The following are the numbers: Wal-Mart - 269 (115 Latin America); Kohl's - 18; Sears - 50; Sports Authority - 200; Target - 13; Best Buy - 30 last year, more to come; Office Depot - 400 by 2017; K-Mart - 24 stores; JC Penney - 87; Macy's - 36; The Gap - 175; Aeropostale - 84 (casual apparel); Finish Line - 150 (athlete's shoes). The total is 1,836 stores, with thousands of laid off employees.

What is their problem? When sales began to drop, these retailers blamed online shopping. One analyst has stated point blank there is not enough online shopping to close so many stores. He says the problem is lack of spending on the part of the middle class, the people who have lost jobs and have either moved away from the store's area or simply do not have money to spend on non-essentials.

Although the impact of these store closures will not make much of an impact on the overall economy of the United States, these closures are an indication of what is going on in the economy. One of the spokespersons for Wal-Mart stated the company was losing money by keeping the stores open. In other

words, closing the stores was not simply a matter of less profit, it was a matter of losing money. Each store could have kept operating with less profit, but could not remain open if it was losing money.

The money lost made an impact on the value of the shares. If you owned 10,000 shares of Wal-Mart stock, you would have seen your income reduced by \$1,400 last year. If you owned 100,000 shares, your income would have been reduced by \$14,000.

You might think, "Oh, the rich are less rich this year."

That would be true. The major shareholders have a lot less to live on this year. What if the major shareholder is a pension plan? Then a lot of people depending on that pension plan are living on a lot less this year. A sign of the times was a pension fund in the southern United States which informed its investors their pension income would be reduced by 40 percent. That is a major impact on people who are not rich.

Another impact of store closures hits at a local level. Most of these stores operate in shopping malls. They do not own real estate, they lease it. When the lease runs out, and the store closes, who fills the blank space? In most cases, nobody. The mall owners lose money, but they still have to pay utility bills, security bills and city taxes. If this was their investment for pension income, they are living on a lot less. If the mall owners borrowed money to build the mall, they still have a mortgage to pay on top of everything else.

In one small town in the United States, Wal-Mart moving in had resulted in mom and pop grocery stores closing along with the town's only pharmacy. Now the town has no grocery store and no pharmacy within 10 miles. This

might mean opportunity for some other small business to move in, but in the meantime, those who do not have a vehicle are in a really difficult spot. Many residents may feel they have to move, which will have a further negative impact on the town. Those who worked at the big store may not be able to remain without a job income.

In that town, with fewer incomes and fewer people, who pays the taxes to keep the town running?

In any town, big or small, to stay in business retailers rely on having enough customers with solid incomes. A solid income means a steady income from a full-time job that pays enough to allow the wage earner to buy more than the bare necessities. In Princeton, we have a sawmill and a mine to provide the kind of incomes that support the retail businesses and help pay our taxes. If the sawmill and mine shut down, we would see most of our retailers vanish. We would see a large portion of our population move elsewhere. Our tax base would be cut so badly we would be lucky to have our streets plowed in winter, let alone have potholes filled. If our taxes rose too much, we would see even fewer people residing here. People who depend on rental income would lose first, and those who hold mortgages may find themselves with defaults. Those without jobs cannot pay mortgages. Homes would be abandoned and our bank and credit union would feel the pinch.

This is the kind of scenario being played out in one small town in the United States, but it may not be the only town affected. The situation in that small town is handwriting on the wall for many towns. If jobs are not protected, if local businesses and industries cannot survive, then the economy is failing. When what was once the richest nation in the world does not have enough steady employment to support retailers, then economists had better look for what went wrong and fix it.

Public says, "If it ain't broke..."

The annual general meeting of Princeton District Museum & Archives Society proved to be lively as members of the society and of the public dealt with the concept of the Corporation of the Town of Princeton wishing to assume control of the museum. The Town proposed doing this for the good of taxpayers, justifying their plan, according to Councillor Rosemary Doughty, on the basis of the Town owning the land, the buildings, and financial support in the form of grants and covering the cost of utilities.

Councillor Doughty stated, "The Town has spent a lot of money on the museum."

As one person responded, "The Town has spent a lot of money on other things."

The real issue for most of those in attendance was the ownership of the artifacts donated to the Museum Society and the furnishings and equipment of the museum, which belong to the Museum

Society. Several people noted "the landlord cannot claim ownership of the tenant's property."

Councillor Doughty, who is Town Council's liaison person for the Museum Society, said, as the Town owns the land and the buildings, and gives financial support, she did not see why the Town should not have it all.

One of the things the Town proposed to do was provide a full-time job for the museum manager, which would include benefits (above those legislated) as well as salary, which the museum is not currently able to provide. There was no explanation why the Town would have to assume complete control of the property of the Museum Society in order for the Town to employ the manager, nor was there any explanation of why the Town could not simply grant enough money to the Museum Society to pay for a full-time manager and provide benefits above those legislated.

While there was recognition by both the Museum Society executive and the Town representatives that the matter had been under discussion for some time, without agreement, there appeared to be nothing in writing.

At no time was there any allegation of mismanagement or misconduct by the Museum Society, which left those in attendance wondering why any change in the

current arrangement was necessary.

The members and general public had many questions and comments, but one of the themes was the old adage, "If it ain't broke, don't fix it."

There was a warning from one person in attendance who commented that the City of Grand Forks had attempted a takeover of the Grand Forks museum and it

had gone to court, and the city lost.

Approximately 60 people attended the meeting, and the majority of the comments gave solid support for the Museum Society.

Discussions between the Town and the Museum Society will continue but, as one member stated, no agreement with the Town will be made until it is presented in writing to the Museum Society in writing and ratified by those members.

Museum elects new board

Princeton District Museum & Archives Society held an election March 17 to determine who would comprise the new Board of Directors for 2016-2017 year. Mayor Frank Armitage conducted the election which saw Rika Reubsaat returned as President, with Gerald 'Tip' Anderson returned as Vice-President. Martin Hough was re-elected Treasurer with Marjorie Holland, Secretary. Directors for the year are Lori Weissbach, Jon Bartlett, John Henry, Terry Malanchuk, Ken Heuser and Kathy Clement. Evelyn McCallum remains a member of the Board as Honorary President.

President Reubsaat gave her annual report, saying Princeton's museum is the envy of many small towns.

Paleo talk, August

- Public Talk - Paleontology and Climate: We were lucky to have 8 paleontology researchers here this summer doing field work in and around Princeton. The four PhDs in the group offered a free talk here on Thursday, August 7th, that ran over 2 hours, we had over 70 people in attendance. The four speakers had 20 minutes each on their specific field of study, with a question and answer period at the end. It was after 9:00 PM when we locked up due to the audience's question and answer period.

Paleontology

The 'ant': Ed Staples and Nienke Klaver have donated is an important insect specimen to our museum. It is the first prehistoric ant of

its type to be discovered in our area, and is scientifically important. Bruce Archibald spent a few days in Princeton doing site visits (October 26-29 and March 7-10) and spent some time in our Pollard room. We now have a system and template for a Data entry and Cataloguing protocol which has us now going forward with on a numbering system for our masses of fossils that are currently not cataloged.

John Henry has spent hundreds and hundreds of hours organizing and identifying fossils, and we are so grateful for his tireless efforts. Thanks also our newest volunteer Kathy Simpkins who is working with John Henry in cataloging and developing a database with advice from Marji Johns at the Royal BC Museum.

Gift Shop Gift shop: Lori/Robin/Rolf Success! We had increased sales this year with books being of particular interest. Special thanks to Lori and Rolf Weissbach for loaning us cabinetry, as well as delivering and installing the unit. Also to Lori for her time and effort in finding suppliers, and for physically setting up the shop. Your help was invaluable this year Lori, thank you for your time.

- Smoke Fund - Lori and Evelyn Princeton, Tulameen, Coalmont, Hedley, Keremeos and Cawston Over 500-600 hours invested in this project so far 1,342 letters 250 named soldiers.

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IHA reminds you it is Tick Season

The early spring weather means many of us are spending more time outside. We aren't the only ones enjoying the unseasonable warmth - the change in weather also brings out ticks - small bugs that feed on the blood of humans and animals and can sometimes transmit disease.

Ticks are most often found in tall grass and wooded areas, so covering up before you head outdoors and checking for ticks on yourself, your children, and your pets after being outdoors, are simple things that go a long way to prevent tick bites.

"The most common tick species in the Interior Health region is the Wood Tick (*Dermacentor andersoni*), which is not known to carry the Lyme disease bacteria," said Dr. Silvina Mema, Medical Health Officer with Interior Health.

"The Wood Tick can carry other diseases such as Rocky Mountain spotted fever, although it is very rare. Some ticks also have toxins that can cause temporary muscle weakness and paralysis but the symptoms fade once the tick is removed."

The tick species that carries Lyme disease (*Ixodes pacificus*) is more common in the coastal areas of B.C., but may also be present in low numbers in areas within Interior Health. Less than one per cent of *Ixodes* ticks in B.C. carry Lyme disease. In addition to fever, headache,

and muscle pain, people infected with Lyme disease will often develop a rash that looks like a 'bull's eye' target and expands from the site of the tick bite.

"Most tick bites do not result in illness; however, all tick bites should be cleaned, as infection can occur whenever there is a break in the skin," added Dr. Mema.

"It is important to watch for signs of tick-transmitted illnesses. Signs of many tick-borne infections can be quite similar and include fever, headache, muscle pain, and rash. Anyone who experiences a bulls-eye rash or other symptoms should see a doctor as soon as possible."

Other precautions include:

- Walking on cleared trails when in tall grass or wooded areas.
- Wearing a hat, long sleeves, pants, and light-coloured clothing.
- Tucking pant legs into socks or boots.
- Applying insect repellent containing DEET on uncovered skin.
- Carefully checking clothing and scalp (covered or not) when leaving an area where ticks may live.
- Having a shower after returning from areas where ticks may live.

To reduce ticks from entering your home and yard, try these steps:

- Keep your lawn short and remove any fallen leaves and weeds.
- Keep a buffer area such as wood-chip or gravel border between your lawn and wooded areas or stone

walls. Any play equipment or play zones should be kept away from wooded areas.

- Trim tree branches to allow more sunlight in your yard.
- Keep wood piles and bird feeders away from the house.

- Widen and maintain trails on your property.

If you find a tick on yourself, a family member, or pet, wear gloves and gently remove it. Use needle-nose tweezers to gently grasp the tick close to the skin and pull the

tick straight out without squeezing. After removal, clean the area with soap and water. If you have concerns or need assistance removing a tick, please contact your family doctor or visit a walk-in medical clinic.

People suffering from anxiety are likely to go to a physician. The physician is likely to prescribe an anti-anxiety pill and advise reducing stress. This may not be the best solution.

Many people develop anxiety from improper nutrition. Stress does play a big part, but the feeling that one cannot cope with stress leads to anxiety, and every life has some kind of stress. At the same time, we see people working or living in circumstances of daily high stress situations, and they do not suffer from anxiety. What they eat may make the difference.

There are five nutrients essential for preventing anxiety. First are the Vitamin B food group, generally known as protein sources. All meat contains Vitamin B, but turkey has a high amount, along with potatoes, whole grains, peas, beans (dried) and bananas.

The second nutrient essential for preventing anxiety is magnesium. This mineral feeds the nervous system. It is found in nearly all vegetables, meats, nuts, seeds and whole grains. Excellent sources include watermelon, figs and parsley.

The third essential nutrient is tryptophan, found in large levels in turkey, winter squash, yogurt, fish, peas and dried beans. Tryptophan is a nerve soother and helps a person have a sound sleep.

Vitamin D is essential in preventing anxiety. For those who work indoors, the winter months in Canada almost guarantee Vitamin D deficiency unless they take Vitamin D supplements. Health Canada urges all Canadians to take Vitamin D supplements from October through March.

The last essential nutrient is calcium, found in dairy products, soy meal, almonds, broccoli and kale, and oatmeal. Cheeses of all kinds are especially rich in calcium, and the calcium is in a form readily absorbed by the body.

When you feel anxious, start looking at what you have been eating. Maybe you should have baked beans instead of pizza, or a cheese sandwich on whole grain bread instead of peanut butter and jam. When was the last time you ate winter squash, broccoli, kale, or figs? How about pea soup? Improving your intake of the right kind of food should be your first option before taking prescription medications.

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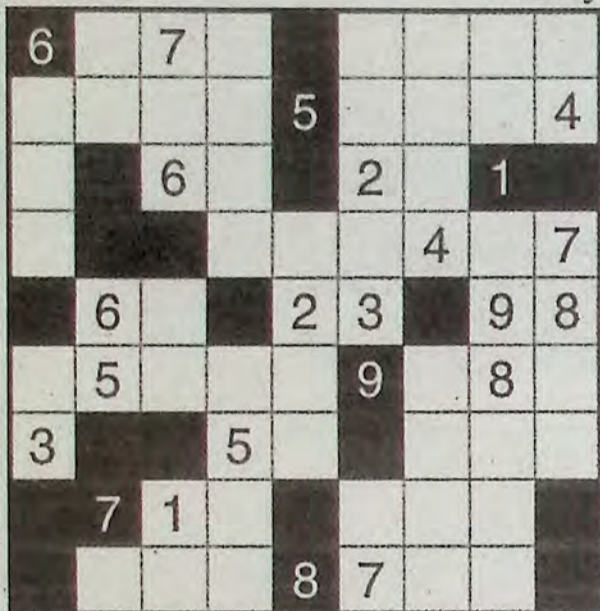

Saving Downtown Princeton...

...An Ongoing Series by George Elliott

One item receiving a lot of attention in and around town is the apparent loss of the local 'market' that was set up on Highway 3 at the Princeton Plaza. Without debating the legalities of insurance and reported problems that stemmed from the weekly exchange, let's look at what a 'market' is and what it can do for a community.

When we travel out of town we normally like to stop at any outdoor or indoor venue we discover that has a market-type activity. Many

locals are aware of the two different locations in Hedley as well as one popular spot in Penticton. We have also frequented ones in downtown Osoyoos, Oliver, Okanagan Falls and Enderby.

While most of these are not true Farmer's Markets, the ones that are have strict guidelines that must be followed by participants. They don't just drive up, park, unload their stuff and sit there for part of the day at random or in a "first come, first to the best spot" fashion.

The Farmer's Market in Hedley is extremely well run and adheres to many guidelines to prevent abuse and to protect consumers.

The indoor and outdoor Flea Market in Oliver is another well-organized event. It fills a handful of adjoining buildings and fees are charged and spots assigned for long-term use. It contains just about anything you can think of including a concession and operates as a fundraiser for a local community group.

The 'market' in Princeton was a good idea at the beginning, but without guidelines and qualifications of the participants, it morphed into a mixture of food, collectibles, clothing and assorted items. While this gave the spot a lot of character, it also took away some of the Farmer's Market aspect. Eventually it started to get called a Trader's Market and before you knew it, people from out of town who could not sell in other locations due to

non-qualification would pull up and start selling without having to pay an entry fee or prove anything related to their product.

In some cases this was fine because the addition of outside participation enhanced the 'market' but did it ever occur to ask why they were selling in Princeton and not their hometown? Probably not.

The fact that Princeton's 'market' was left to grow and expand on its own may have ended up killing it. It grew too big and included too many different items. Don't get me wrong, that was obviously a sign of success that I'm sure no one expected. This alone shows there is either a need or a demand for such an activity in our community.

As for the ranting pointing to Town Hall and Town Council as bullying the 'market' to submission is concerned, that is far from the truth. The way things work in most small towns is like this: nobody does anything until there's a com-

plaint. Town Hall is just doing what any small town government does, they are being reactive. That's how bylaws get enforced in small towns. That's how police, conservation officers and any other service works. They spring into action to respond to complaints.

Clearly there is an attraction to a market-type activity in Princeton. The hurdles at this point involve finding a new venue and possibly setting some ground rules. In my mind, the logical solution is to form a local society, join a provincial entity that aligns with the goals and purposes of the local society and move forward from there. There will be some restrictions on what does and does not qualify as an accepted item(s) for sale at the new 'market' but that's up to the newly-formed society to sort out.

What happened locally is simple. A great idea got too big and had no solid structure. Forming a societycontinued on Page 20

Farmers food donation tax credit information

Local residents who use food banks and school lunch programs will now have greater access to healthy, local food that has been

donated by their neighbours, thanks to the new Farmers' Food Donation Tax Credit, Fraser-Nicola MLA Jackie Tegart said February 29.

"The hard-working people who grow food in Fraser-Nicola give back to our communities in so many ways," Tegart said.

"The Farmers' Food Donation Tax Credit connects local growers with local registered charities, and we all benefit as a result."

The tax credit, worth 25 per cent of the fair market value, is available

to individuals and corporations that carry on the business of a farming and donate a qualifying agricultural product to a registered charity.

The agricultural product may include meat products, eggs or dairy products, fish, seafood, fruits, vegetables, grains, pulses, herbs, honey, maple syrup, mushrooms, nuts or other produce that has been

grown, raised or harvested on a farm in B.C.

The tax credit was introduced with Budget 2016, the B.C. government's fourth-consecutive balanced budget.

The credit is available for the 2016, 2017 and 2018 tax years, after which the credit will be reviewed.



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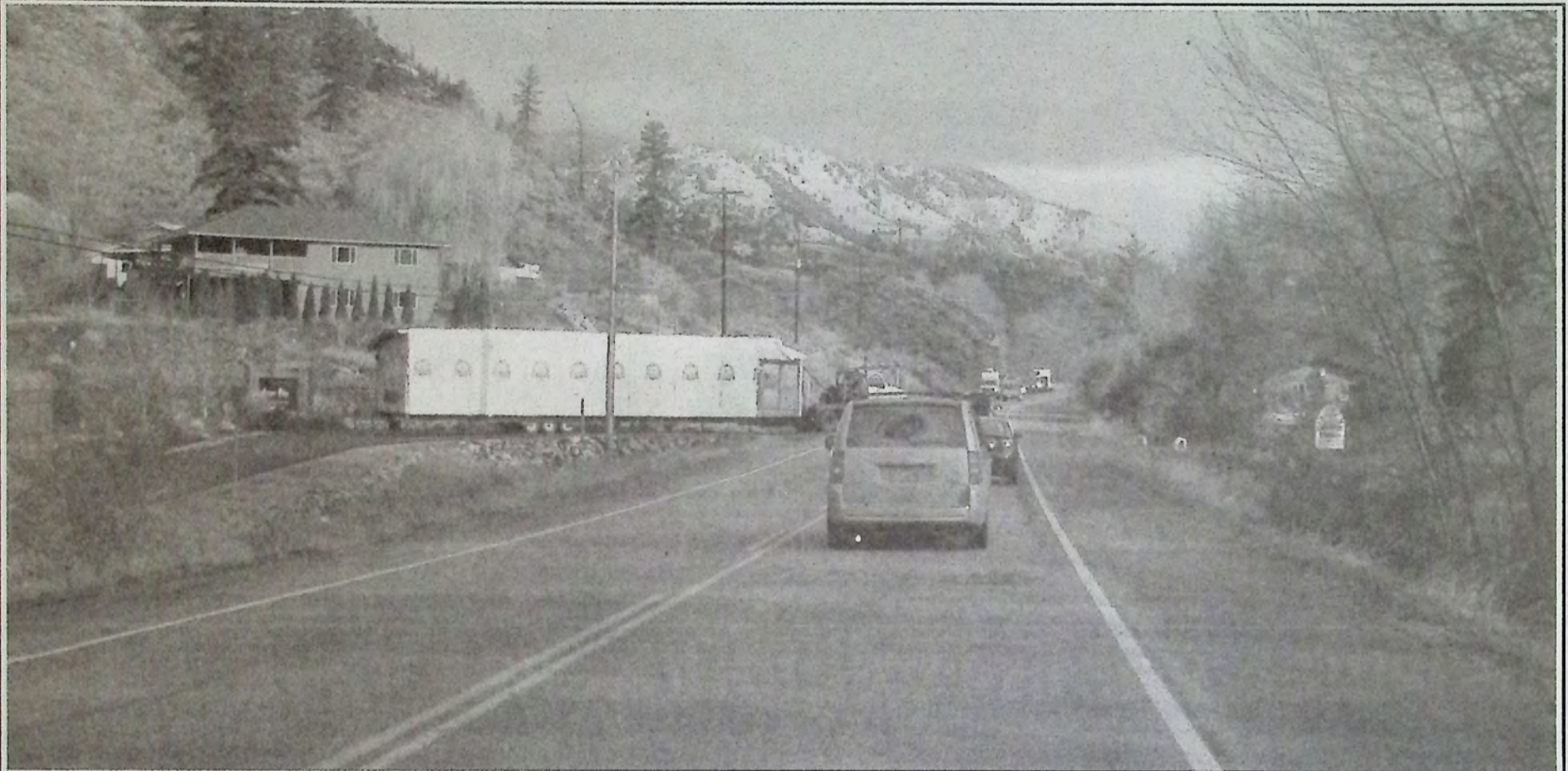

and accessibility of social media

won't make it go away. This is the
reality of the world we live in. I
suggest that Council Googles

"why social media is important."
Sadly, the community is unifying
behind a cause, but it isn't some
great project that will see massive
economic growth or a tourism ini-
tiative that will see our streets full
of summer visitors. No, the com-
munity is coming together in sur-
vival mode to stand against what
the next decision from Town Hall
might be. I believe that Council
does make its decisions based on
what it feels is best for the com-
munity, but the community at large
doesn't seem to agree with much
of it. They can try to deflect the

criticism to people like me, or the
commenters on Facebook, but this
will only work for so long. We
saw at the Museum meeting peo-
ple coming together, uniting to
stand up with a single voice. We
saw the same thing when it was
made public that the Loonie Bin
was told that there would be a ban
on fireworks sales. As word
leaked out that the PXA might be
facing its own issues with Council,
people were coming together to
stand with the PXA against
Council. The 'People' is not a col-
umn or two in the paper, or a few
comments on the Princeton and
Area Issues Facebook page. It is
much bigger than that.

When the community feels that it
is being threatened by its elected
officials, the social contract that
gives them legitimacy is under
threat. The social contract
becomes null and void, a recipe for
disaster. It is up to the elected offi-
cials to fix the breakdown. This
happens with communication,
transparency and outreach, not by
painting one group of people as the
problem or ignoring that it takes
two to tango. This problem is
growing and it isn't getting any
better, but it can if the problem
wants to be fixed. We want good
news in the paper. People don't
want to be constantly complaining
on social media or organizing
shows of support for volunteer
organizations.

.....continued from Page 16 gives the structure needed to be even more successful than before and would likely attract even more participants knowing their interests

were being taken care of as part of their fee to rent space.

As for location, we have been to Flea Markets and Farmer's Markets that are not on the main highway.

With proper signage, and a good product, people will find you. The key here is to put together a regular event that is attractive not only to locals, but to visitors as well.

It is also important to note that these market-type events bring out entrepreneurs doing business in your community who may not have any other affordable method to this kind of exposure. When they have a chance to be 'seen' it helps their business in many different ways

ranging from building a customer base to building confidence as a new business owner to serve the community with their product.

How does this save downtown Princeton?

Anything that feeds money into the local economy is a benefit to the downtown core. Even if the new 'market' moved well off of the highway and had signage that fed people down Bridge Street or Vermilion Avenue to find it, there

would be spin off. There is something about outdoor market-type activities that draw people like magnets. It is because of this that there should be no problem rebranding in a different place. The push out of the current location should be viewed as a door opening to a new opportunity, rather than an end of something good. With support from local retailers of a new 'market' it will feed traffic and business to the downtown core.
